Accused assassins ask trial, not exchange

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Two accused, Symbionese Liberation Army assassins wanted to answer the murder charges against them in a trial instead of being released in exchange for kidnapped Patricia Hearst, a public defender said Thursday.

"That's pure nonsense," James Jenner of the Berkeley County Public Defender's office said in Oakland Municipal Court in response to a suggestion the suspects were angling for their release from custody.

The lawyer told Judge Stafford J. Buckley that Russell Little, 24, and Joseph Remiro, 27, want to proceed with the trial, but they don't want to be released in exchange for Patricia Hearst. "The suspects appeared before Buckley to discuss the conditions of their confinement at San Quentin Prison where they have been held until recently when they were transferred to the County Jail in Oakland. Because they were moved to the County Jail, their hearing was not held."

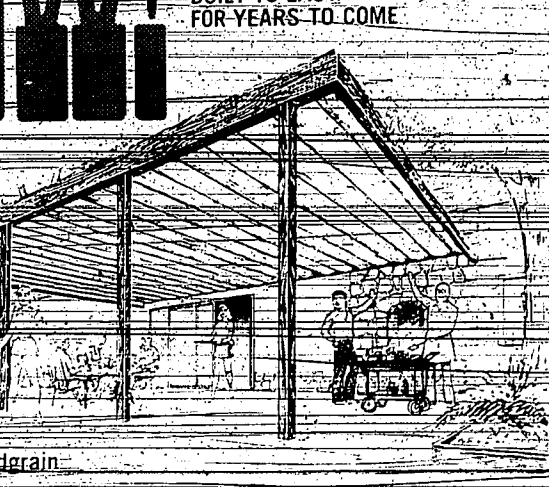

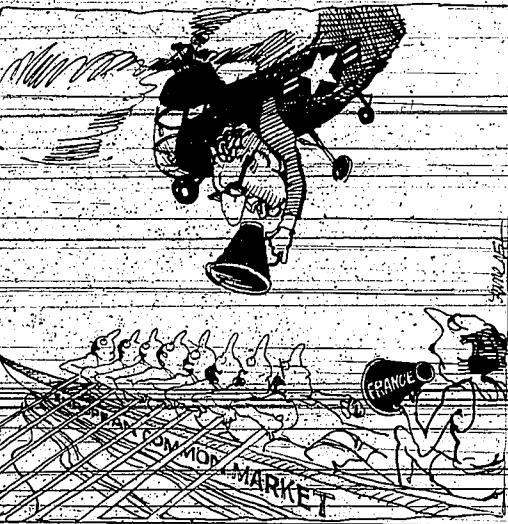

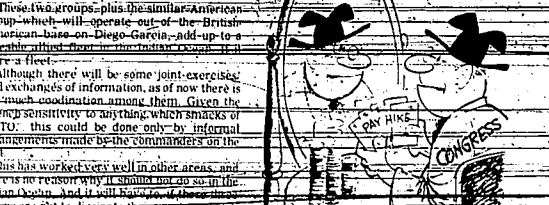

BSU head says presidents' pay too low

BOISE (UPI) — President John B. Barnes of Boise State University thinks Idaho's college and university presidents — now among the highest paid state employees — are paid too little for their efforts.

"I am surprised at the Senate's decision to set a maximum of \$30,000 on all people employed by the state of Idaho," Barnes wrote Gov. Cecil D. Andrus recently.

He referred to Sen. James Storch's bill to prevent paying any state employee more than the governor. Andrus gets \$39,000. Barnes makes \$29,850.

"I think most people through the country recognize that Idaho faculty and administrative salaries are near the bottom of the nation," Barnes said, enclosing a letter asking him to nominate candidates for a presidential vacancy in neighboring Washington.

"They at the Washington school have a minimum salary of \$40,000 and quite a range of fringe benefits that are associated with the position," Barnes said. "This is a college of about 7,500 students, and I would say it possesses a range and diversity of programs that would be quite similar to Boise State."

"I cannot say to personally know that I have never complained about my own salary and don't intend to," he said.

In addition, Barnes can use a \$3,000 per year "subsistence allowance" — set up with the aid of the State Board of Education for public relations and official entertainment. Other BSU officials can use some of these money, but Barnes gets first shot at them.

A few years ago legislative audit criticized BSU's "travel, hotel and entertainment" expenses. Financially, the

President Roger Green said BSU now pays Barnes' country club dues out of "social" funds and not state tax money.

When Barnes must entertain officially, he is able to call upon a special food service or caterer with which BSU contracts. He pays for food out of the president's account, but the food service caterers for him.

His fringe benefits also include a Ford Mustang, according to Green.

Barnes is the third highest paid of the three university presidents in Idaho. Harting gets \$37,175 at the University of Idaho, and William F. Deaver makes \$31,500 at Idaho State University. Jerald Baeger, president of Lewis-Clark State College in Lewiston, is paid \$22,500.

"Harting, Deaver and Baeger all have incomes that are comparable to those of a professional official in other employment," said Harting, but no arrangements for it.

Andrus said other university presidents have complained about Storch's bill and the effect it may have on recruiting department heads and other top university officials. Sometimes, he said, the state must pay more than it pays the president to get top personnel.

Storch did not necessarily agree. He struck when Storch said "It can get it done."

257 still survive

NEW YORK (UPI) — The last veteran of the War Between the States died in 1959, but 257 Civil War widows are still alive, according to the Veterans Administration (VA).

Seventeen of the 27 widows still alive last October have passed away in the past 10 months, according to VA officials. Released Wednesday, The VA observed, "The widows are dying fast."

The oldest survivor is Mrs. Anna Davala Moratic Hush, who lives in Polanco, a suburb of Mexico City.

The survey also showed 234 dependent children are still living, including those who never married or who became permanently incapable of self-support because of physical or mental defects.

Gem school funding changes proposed

MOSCOW (UPI) — A coalition of Idaho public school districts is recommending reducing emphasis while retaining use of property tax as a source of revenue to equalize educational practices and changing the distribution of funds to the state's 115 school districts.

The Idaho Educational Association of school administrators said currently Idaho's public school foundation formula, which means state funds are sent to each school district an amount less than any district actually needs.

Instead, he said, state support should at least equal the average contribution toward education made by school districts.

Archambault said the state distribution formula attempts to consider district property wealth and school size in its equalization formula.

But, he said, small school districts compared with larger districts, have higher per pupil property wealth, spend more per pupil, offer fewer courses to students and raise the dollars for education less than larger districts.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The government was ready to show the Mitchell-Stans jury today that he got the ball rolling for a contribution by financier Robert L. Vesco to the Nixon 1972 campaign — a gift with which Vesco "asked for help" without asking for help.

The witness, due up next for the government, was Daniel Holgren, a volunteer fundraiser in 1972 for the Nixon election finance committee. On a commercial flight early that year, Holgren met Vesco executive who said the financier "probably wanted to contribute."

Holgren passed the word to the committee, and the government says Holgren was also the man who arranged the \$200,000 contribution to the Nixon campaign.

Vesco had offered \$500,000 to Maurice H. Stans, who had resigned as committee chairman to head the finance committee. The two former cabinet members are charged in

Soviet capsule fails to work

MOSCOW (UPI) — Western experts said today the Soviet Union's failure to place a working instrument capsule on Mars has set back Russia's exploration of the red planet by at least two years.

"I'm very disappointed," one Western source said. "We all had high hopes of getting some good data from this mission."

The Soviet Union said Thursday their Mars spacecraft landed an instrument capsule on the planet two days earlier, but the probe's radio went dead just before touching down.

The Russians said an accompanying Mars 7 spacecraft tried last Saturday to land a capsule, but its equipment "breakdown" caused the package to miss the planet by 810 miles.

Senator charges oil firms

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Henry M. Jackson, charged today that major oil firms were using a gimmick to double the price of domestic crude and that their lax profit reports would be "astronomical" compared to other industries.

"It's a trick," the Washington senator, who has been tangling with the administration on fuel policy, said in an interview with UPI.

Jackson predicted that, partly because of the loophole, there would be a shortage of vital equipment to develop new domestic sources of crude.

However, a top Federal Energy Office official, Charles H. Owens, deputy administrator for policy planning and regulations, denied that the industry could hitchhike through any such loophole in the regulations.

"There may be one or two cases," he said in reply to a UPI inquiry. "That would be the maximum. I doubt even that."

Jackson said the loophole consisted of setting up new wells at established oil fields to get around price regulations. The price of oil from the wells is controlled at \$5.25 a barrel. The price of new sources of oil is not regulated and has increased to more than \$10 a barrel.

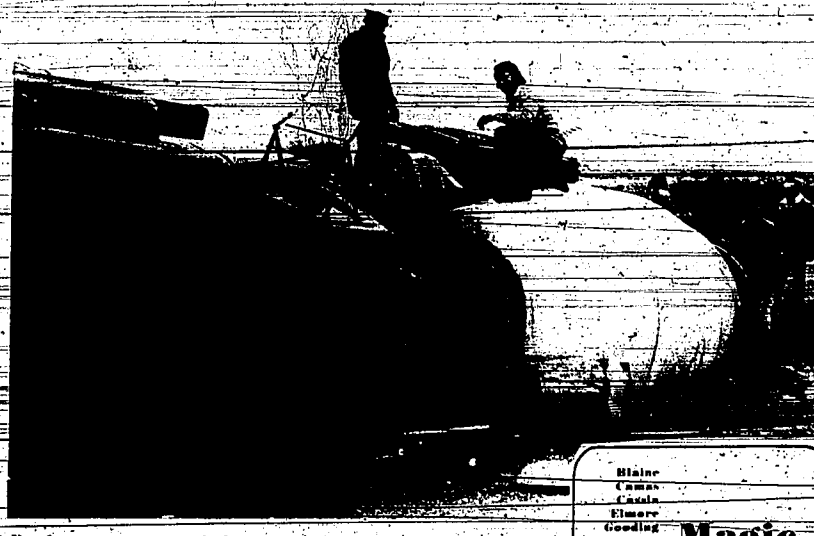

- that an environmental impact statement be formulated for the entire development;
- that sewage provisions be engineered according to soil and water table conditions, with no septic tank effluent;
- that cluster development be considered in suitable areas with one, land set aside in unsuitable areas;
- that the roads be installed according to state specifications and road grades must not exceed 6 per cent.



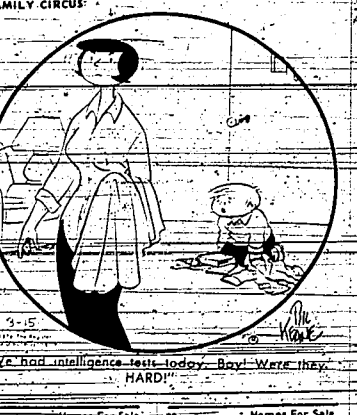

Wire act promoters ease complaints

TWIN FALLS—Requests for ticket payments by California promoters of a high wire act to be sponsored this summer by the Sheriff's Search and Rescue Unit have resulted in a number of complaints, according to Sheriff Paul Corder.

Corder said Wednesday that promoters for a high-wire act have been making \$500 tickets to Twin Falls residents contacted some months ago by phone. Corder said he has received a request that payment for the ticket be made to the Sheriff's Search and Rescue Unit.

Corder said promoters are not to be paid until the act is completed by breaking the glass out of the store's front door.

Some confusion is being caused by residents who may think they are under some obligation to pay when they see that the event is sponsored under the Sheriff's name.

All that was done was sponsoring the show with the expectation of coming up with a high-powered searchlight and generator for the act, and some time, Corder said.

Corder said neither the promotion of the European show for the volunteer search and rescue unit, nor the act, is a commission with the Sheriff's office.

"I don't want anybody to think we're connected with this," Corder said.

He said he had talked to the promoters for payment with the Sheriff's office for the act, but they would not pay until the act is completed.

The high-wire act is scheduled for July 25.

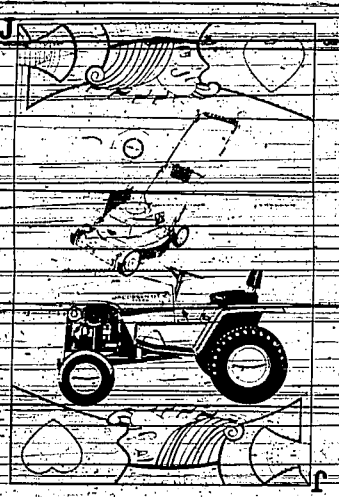

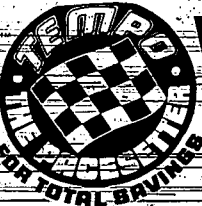
