Tornado deaths mount

By United Press International

More names were added today to the list of tornado deaths as rescue workers from Alabama to Ohio searched through mounds of rubble for victims of the nation's worst cyclonic disaster in a half-century.

Five of the 12 states hit, Ohio, Alabama, Kentucky, Indiana and Tennessee were declared major disaster areas by President Nixon. Vice President Gerald Ford, who flew over part of the Ohio destruction, called it unbelievable.

The death toll was 341 in 12 states in the Midwest and South and included the bodies of 100 people. Some were right next to winds that sounded like "10,000 freight trains."

Haldeman backs Nixon



ACAPULCO (UPI) — Former White House aide H. R. Haldeman has predicted President Nixon can weather the Watergate crisis and will go on being what he termed "a great president."

Haldeman repeated that neither Nixon nor himself was guilty of any crime, as everyone said he did not mean to imply anyone else was guilty.

Mistrial denied; charges reduced

NEW YORK (UPI) — Federal Judge Lee P. Gagliardi denied today mistrial and dismissal motions by the defense at the Mitchell-Stans conspiracy trial but reduced the charges slightly. Gagliardi dismissed one obstruction of justice charge because of a technicality in timing and recessed the court so he "could make further deliberations on a single count of obstruction."

The judge rejected defense arguments that the government had failed to prove that a conspiracy existed in testimony of 40 witnesses which concluded Wednesday. He also left untouched another obstruction count, and six perjury counts against each defendant.

Golan front erupts

The Golan Heights front erupted in artillery exchanges between Syrian and Israeli forces today and Israel went on high alert to prevent another surprise attack such as launched the October 1973 war, the military command said.

Passover begins at sundown Saturday. The Israeli cabinet met in emergency session for an hour to discuss what a government communiqué described as security matters, evidently the situation on the Syrian front.

Nixon flies to Paris

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon and several top aides flew to Paris today to represent the United States at memorial services for French President Georges Pompidou. The president's plane left Andrews Air Force base at 10:19 p.m.

A White House spokesman said Nixon was making the trip "to pay his respects on his own behalf and on behalf of the American people to the late President Pompidou."

Deputy Press Secretary Gerald Warren said Nixon would not take advantage of the trip for substantive talks with leaders of other nations because it would be "inappropriate," and will return to Washington Saturday night.

Bond knocks rights 'disaster'



FREDERICK, Md. (UPI) — Black Georgia legislator Julian Bond says the cause of civil rights under President Nixon has been "a disaster."

In a speech Thursday night to students at Hood College, Bond said Nixon has played "political, penny-political football" with school desegregation, lobbied against extension of the 1965 Civil Rights Act in 1970 "and will probably do it again."

LDS president blasts abortion

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (UPI) — Spencer W. Kimball, presiding at a general conference of the Latter-Day Saints Church for the first time, today attacked abortion as a "growing evil."

Kimball, 79, succeeded to the presidency of the 3.3 million member Mormon faith last December upon the sudden death of Harold B. Lee.

He spoke for nearly half an hour in the historic Salt Lake Tabernacle to more than 8,000 key church leaders and by radio and television to thousands more Mormons throughout the nation. His address opened the church's 144th annual general conference that will continue through Sunday afternoon.

Kent State defense fund builds

CLEVELAND (UPI) — The father of one of four Kent State University students slain by Ohio National Guard gunfire on the campus nearly four years ago, Thursday joined a growing list of persons who have promised to help defray the legal cost of defending eight former Guardsmen indicted in connection with the shootings.

All eight men pleaded innocent to charges of violating the civil rights of the victims in the May 4, 1970 confrontation with antiwar demonstrators. The men are to appear today at a pretrial hearing before U.S. District Judge Frank J. Battisti, at which time trial dates will be set.

Nixon tax Stumble kills TF man woes told

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The \$457,000 tax debt President Nixon owes will leave him "almost totally wiped out" financially and may force him to obtain a loan to pay the bill, according to the White House.

Offering a gloomy assessment of the president's financial picture, a presidential spokesman hinted Thursday Nixon may also have to consider selling one of his homes to meet his back-tax obligation.

"He has to completely reassess his financial position, which has been almost totally wiped out by this," deputy White House press secretary Gerald Warren told reporters. While Nixon worried about where the money would come from to settle with the Internal Revenue Service, a potentially bigger headache was building on Capitol Hill.

There, House unpopularity investigators began "pioneering" through the 784-page report from a congressional tax committee which concluded Nixon and his wife Pat underreported their income and exaggerated their deductions during his first term in office, 1969 through 1972.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Board of Education Thursday decided to increase tuition and part-time educational fees as it completed work on a \$43 million budget for higher education for the coming fiscal year.

The board voted to increase the cost for an out of state resident at the state's institutions of higher education by \$20 a semester. At the same time, members agreed to bring the charge for part time students to \$20 per credit hour at Boise State University (BSU), Idaho State University (ISU) and Lewis Clark State College (LSCS). The University of Idaho is already charging at that rate.

The two changes voted by the board permitted funding for a series of priority items costing \$612,000 that the four schools said they needed for the next year.

All states due more gas

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Every state in the union will get increased gasoline allocations in April of at least 50 per cent of 1973 levels, Federal Energy Administrator William E. Simon announced Thursday.

April allocations represent a 5 per cent boost over March, when states were given 85 per cent of the gasoline they used in 1973.

Simon said gasoline suppliers had been ordered to draw 11.1 million barrels from their stocks to meet the April allocations.

Stocks will be boosted again shortly from oil soon to flow to the United States from the Middle

East following the end of the Arab embargo, he said. "But Simon's deputy John Sawhill warned that a news conference low gasoline lines are likely this summer if drivers fail to continue observing speed limits and other conservation measures."

Planners scrap building limit

TWIN FALLS — A proposed partial homebuilding moratorium for Twin Falls apparently was scrapped Thursday night.

A summit meeting of Twin Falls city and county officials led to general agreement on a number of zoning questions. A final draft of a proposed zoning ordinance and map is being prepared for final action by Twin Falls County commissioners by next week.

The consensus of the meeting of Twin Falls Joint Planning Commission was that residential building should be permitted on about 5,000 acres adjacent to the Twin Falls City limits instead of the 2,000 acres recommended by Twin Falls City.

County planner David Richey said the county commission and chairman of the Joint Planning Commission, said he believes when the final draft is completed it will be acceptable "to all of us" and can be voted on by the county commissioners by next week.

In an executive session of the planning group which continued after midnight agreement was reached to recommend the ordinance requiring residential-agricultural zones have a minimum building lot size of one acre where scenic lands are located and one-half acre where a sewer system is available.

County city planner Richey said he favors the one-acre size for all homes where septic tanks are necessary for disposal, but he said he is willing to concede to the recommendations of others that smaller lot size is acceptable in low and medium density residential zones in the county.

The recommendations from the executive session last night are for half an acre in both low and medium density zones where septic tanks, and 10,000 square feet on sewer connections.

Richey said today the bill feels residential zoning should be held to a minimum during a two-year planning period, but is willing to accept the 5,000-acre figure. "This is far better than what we have now, and I am willing to agree we must work with the builders and developers and find a middle of the road time," he said.

Richey said another of his recommendations which appears to be resolved is for the conditional use factor. Rather than a simple conditional use procedure, he said, the recommendation is for a review board to hear applications for conditional uses in various county zones.

This board, comprised of a county commissioner and several county planning and zoning board members, will study each application, meet with the applicant and owners of adjacent property. If there is no particular problem, the use will be granted with conditions stipulated by the review board. If they feel it is necessary, they can call a public hearing.

Richey said the county zoning administrator, Ed Woods, is now preparing a final version of a zoning map showing the location of the various zones.

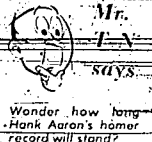

TF City Hall renovated

There will be two small offices on the second level vacant for a time. One housed the district health director and the other the assistant director and an environmentalist.

The office formerly occupied by the city parks and recreation department was given the city attorney a few months ago. It will be appointed on a full-time basis. This will revert to the parks and recreation directors when the remodeling is complete.

Joe Coon, city sanitation director, who had a desk in the office of the city treasurer and water department, has already moved to one of the small second floor offices in the health department suite.

Parks and recreation department directors have been business since the fall, but the city hall offices, Chad Browning, recreation director, is working out of his home and the small building at Harmon Park. Superintendent of parks, Howard Johnson, moved to the city shop.

State health laboratories located on the lower level of the building will be used by the city engineering department. Milar said much of the old laboratory space will remain a laboratory, but it will give engineers an opportunity to move indoors with their testing programs.

It will also allow them to do all of the city's own testing of concrete, gravel, asphalt and

First Amendment, Constitution safeguards

WASHINGTON — We are back again at this business of a federal "shield law" for newsmen. A Subcommittee of House Judiciary finally has agreed on a bill sponsored by Wisconsin's Robert W. Kastenmeier. If the full committee can stop hawking over it for a few days, in order to consider this matter, this bill may even be to the floor.

It has taken 18 months of hard work to reach this stage. Scores of witnesses have been heard, a dozen drafts of proposed bills have been reviewed and discarded, if any bill at all is to be passed, it will be the Kastenmeier bill or something close to it.

My own suggestion, for whatever it may be worth, sounds a good deal more brutal than I mean it to be: Kill the bill. Kill all the shield law bills. The constitution itself, interpreted close by, says it challenges come along, remains the one best shield the press could possibly possess.

The various proposals before Congress have the same admirable purpose in mind. It is to protect the public interest in a free press, and especially in investigative journalism. This

interest is real — and it is in real trouble. Many of the most important stories carried in the press are developed in this fashion: A telephone rings on some reporter's desk. The caller is a friendly clerk, let us say, in the local public works department. He has come across evidence of what appears to be graft. He is willing to point the reporter in the direction of this evidence, provided one thing: "You've got to protect me." The reporter gives this assurance, and goes to work on the story.

Sometimes these things pan out. Sometimes they don't. Suppose that in this case the tip is solid. After hard digging, the reporter goes to press. An uproar ensues. The local city council demands to know the reporter's source. A grand jury is empaneled to investigate the corruption. The reporter is subpoenaed. In an extreme case, the director of public works may be indicted. His lawyers demand that the reporter be summoned as a witness for the accused.

The object of a shield law is to protect the reporter in such situations. Under the Kastenmeier bill, he would be granted absolute immunity from having to reveal his source to a legislative committee or to a grand jury. Only in the most compelling circumstances could the reporter be ordered to identify his source at a criminal trial.

Yet to say that the object is to protect the reporter is to put the matter too narrowly. What is being protected is the public interest in having the graft exposed. If confidential sources cannot be assured that their names will be kept secret, confidential sources will simply dry up. The hypothetical clerk in the public works department will not risk being fired. He will keep his mouth shut, and the corruption will continue.

My own conviction is that in 99 cases out of 100 the courts will understand this problem and will defend the public interest. To be sure, a majority of the Supreme Court has not yet been persuaded, but in the "key" case in 1972, *Branzburg v. Hayes*, Justice Lewis Powell was wobbling. Given a fresh case with a good set of facts, Powell could vote the other way — that is, Powell might vote to protect the reporter, the source, and the public interest alike.

Adoption of a federal shield law would only complicate matters. It would be impossible, in my view, to restrict application of such a law to then and women generally identified with the working press.

Reply law repressive

President Nixon has proposed a new federal law giving both candidates for office and public officials the right to reply to slanderous libelous attacks by newspapers.

Right to reply is interpreted as meaning that a rebuttal of equal length and prominence would have to be printed by the newspaper, upon request. While newspapers have been singled out in his statement, it is a certainty that television and radio would also be included in any such law.

Two states, Florida and Mississippi, have such statutes and Senator John McClellan of Arkansas has been urging such a law for his state.

The Florida law, now sixty-one years old, has been challenged by newspapers of the state on grounds of constitutionality as an abridgement of the First Amendment.

Newspapers and other media will consider such a law as repressive, unconstitutional and designed more to be a deterrent to publication of charges than a sincere wish to gain as "equal" public forum.

Reputable newspapers have long offered candidates and public officials the opportunity to reply to criticism, both out of a wish to completely inform, and as a matter of justice.

And as a matter of practicality, the great majority of candidates and public officials, too, do not wish to engage in running debates of charges against them. Their attitude, usually, is to hope that the judge will be better.

The courts have been gradually removing the umbrella of libel threats from political candidates and officeholders.

In the New York Times vs. Sullivan and other buttressing opinions the courts have held that only malice justifies a libel verdict against publication.

It has been the courts opinion that the right to publish stories about public officials was so basic that newspapers should not operate under the threat of crippling libel suits any time that a public official or candidate, or public figure, was charged.

Election of public office has long meant renunciation of many of the rights of privacy, held by a private citizen. And even attainment of "public stature" has been equally operative as in the case of General Walker vs. The New York Times.

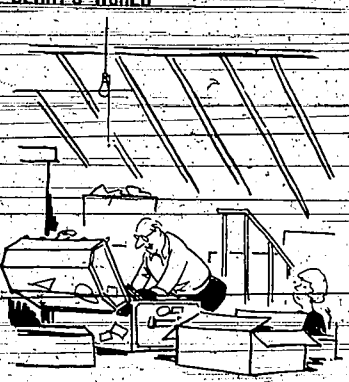
There is a bit of irony in that the legislative branch is being asked to pass a restrictive law against the press, while the judicial arm of government has been strengthening the right to publication without fear of retribution by suit.

Congressmen are granted a special immunity in the Constitution. Article I, Section 6 reads in part: "They shall in all cases except treason, felony and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective Houses, and in going to and returning from the same. And for any speech or debate in either house they shall not be questioned in any other place."

The founding fathers thought that enough protection for Congressmen. They did not feel they should be immune from other criticism or charges. The scandals of Thomas Dodd, Adam Clayton Powell, Sherman Adams, and of course Watergate, might never have come to public knowledge, if it had not been for a vigilant press operating in a great degree of freedom.

The so-called "Right to Reply" theory is designed as a deterrent. If passed, it would operate to impede the flow of information to the public. As such it should not become law.

Ford's gain temporary

WASHINGTON — Vice President Gerald R. Ford's Chicago speech denouncing the Committee to Reelect the President (CREP), largely repeated a favorite Republican ploy to cloud over responsibility for Watergate.

Ford not only absolved the Republican Party of complicity in Watergate but, by implication, also immunized the White House and President Nixon. Republicans were divided over whether he did or did not intend to criticize the President who elevated him to national office. Thus, Ford temporarily solved the problem of separating himself from the President without alienating him.

But to do that, Ford had to misrepresent the role of the White House in the 1972 campaign and buttress the President's claim of noninvolvement in his reelection.

Ford's speech was the outgrowth of his political dilemma. As he has traveled the country since his resignation, his soaring popularity of last November has dropped. (Net loss of 8 percentage points in a trial heat against Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, according to the Harris poll). How to halt that decline without alienating the Nixon hard core?

The answer, arrived at by Ford several days before the Chicago meeting, was scarcely in innovation: blame it on CREP. That's precisely what Republicans of all stripes, led by National Chairman George Bush, have been doing for months without causing any great stir. Ford's reelection had a curious residue from Midwest Republicans (partly, no doubt, because of its Agnewesque rhetoric attacking "an arrogant, elite guard of political adulterers" like CREP). This helps the blame for Watergate on a demagogic organization supposedly manned by youth nonpoliticians some of whom may be headed for federal prison.

Thus, Ford joined the horde who ignore the

fact CREP was an offspring of the White House itself. Anybody close to the 1972 campaign knows it was controlled by the White House with Charles Colson the dominant figure.

At 9:15 each morning, Colson presided over the daily meeting of a campaign strategy board, of both White House and CREP officials in his office next door to the President's own retreat. The only challenge to Colson's authority came from White House chief of staff H.R. Haldeman.

Ford's attack also buttressed Nixon's repeated claim, of having had no "true" part in running his 1972 campaign.

But on Jan. 1, 1973, Nixon disclaimed power. While House staff decisions in the blighted 1970 Congressional campaign and bragged things would be different in 1972. "When I am the candidate, I run the campaign."

Send Lowell Weicker's compilation of White House logs for the period immediately following the Watergate burglary, late June and all of July, in 1972, suggests Nixon was true to that promise. Although the President claims he was preoccupied with foreign affairs, the logs show him in frequent conferences with Colson that summer.

What the logs suggest is backed by veterans of the 1972 campaign. In handing down campaign orders, Colson and Haldeman habitually presented themselves as underlings, the discretion of the President himself. Nor was there the slightest doubt close attention of campaign tactics and strategy.

Aspin asks lid on Nixon moves

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., Thursday introduced three resolutions in Congress designed to prevent President Nixon from creating a crisis and signing any treaties with foreign nations during an impeachment trial.

"Congress should begin now to prepare for the earliest impeachment will have on our national security," said Aspin in a speech prepared for delivery in the House.

Aspin said the three resolutions are designed "to keep the President from playing fast and loose with our national security during an impeachment trial, and to make sure at the same time that no foreign power tries to take advantage of the situation."

"We cannot doubt that there is at least the possibility that international politics will become impeachment politics, and it is clear the dangers this could hold for all of us," he said.

One of the resolutions, Aspin said, would make it impossible for the President to "create or exacerbate a crisis for his own ends." It would require regular briefings for congressional leaders by the Central Intelligence Agency, and the secretaries of defense and state.

The other two would advise President Nixon that during an impeachment trial he should not sign any treaties or executive agreements with foreign nations or make any state visits abroad.

Aspin said that during an impeachment trial Nixon might be under great pressure to bargain away more than he should in order to sign a history-making treaty such as a Strategic Arms Limitation Agreement.

"The harsh state visits would be to keep Nixon from using them to interfere with such a trial in the way the Watergate hearings were interrupted by the visit of Soviet Communist Party General Secretary Leonid Brezhnev last year."

"The purpose of these three concurrent resolutions is to begin to define the role of the President and Congress during the twilight zone between the time the House of Representatives votes a bill of impeachment and the final disposition of these charges by the Senate," Aspin said.

"Congress has the utmost moral responsibility to protect our national interests against a chief executive who might be tempted to compromise them to save his own skin, or foreign powers that might be tempted to exploit the situation."

Aspin said the resolutions, which would make it impossible for the President to "create or exacerbate a crisis for his own ends," it would require regular briefings for congressional leaders by the Central Intelligence Agency, and the secretaries of defense and state.

Bigger Soviet missiles threaten US deterrent

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger believes the Russians must spend up to \$45 billion deploying the huge new missiles, that he claims will soon threaten United States land-based missiles.

"The prospect of having that cost, he has told the Senate foreign relations subcommittee on arms control, is 'one of our major advantages' in the nuclear talks with the Soviet Union."

"The time to nip it in the bud is before they have made such massive investments," he said. Schlesinger's remarks in three hours of private testimony March 4 were made public Thursday as he prepared for a public session with another subcommittee.

The earlier session gave the fullest details yet on the Soviet buildup and on how the administration would like to halt it through negotiations. Schlesinger spoke to the subcommittee before Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's unsuccessful attempt in Moscow to achieve a "conceptual breakthrough" in the deadlocked nuclear talks.

Schlesinger said the Russians plan to begin installing the big new rockets in 1975. By installing them at a rate of 15 per cent a year, he said, their new missile force would be in place by 1985.

This "retrofitting" of the missile force is allowed under the first strategic arms agreement, signed by President Nixon in Moscow in May, 1972, provided none of the old missile silos are enlarged by more than 15 per cent.

SALEM, ORE. — Former Supreme Court Justice Tom C. Clark has predicted President Nixon will not finish his term of office, because of the "enormous pressures" of Watergate.

Clark said it is more likely that Nixon will be impeached than that he will resign.

The Watergate scandals are "like a cloud over the whole country," Clark told a news conference at Willamette University, where he is a visiting lecturer. "I think we must somehow get this out of the way."

Clark predicts short Nixon term

Clark, discounted the argument that impeachment of Nixon would endanger future presidencies. "I think a President's place in history depends largely on the person himself," he said.

Clark, 74, was appointed attorney general by President Truman in 1945 and was named associated justice of the Supreme Court in 1949. He retired in 1968 to avoid potential conflicts of interest arising from President Johnson's appointment of Clark's son, Ramsey, as attorney general.

Asked to define an "impeachable crime," Clark cited the constitution's "high crimes or misdemeanors" definition, but said he believes the decision actually rests on the interpretation of the House of Representatives.

He said he expects the President, if impeached, would be required to produce any documents requested in connection with the trial by the Senate.

Clark said that, personally, he would advise Nixon to turn over all the materials requested by Watergate investigators.

Clark was once in a position to supply information to Congressional investigators himself, but at that time, 21 years ago, he refused.

In June, 1953, the House Judiciary Committee invited Clark to testify on allegedly improper Justice Department

handling of seven cases during his tenure as attorney general. Clark refused to testify, citing the separation of powers concept of the Constitution — the necessity to guard the Supreme Court's independence of Congress.

VD ignorance deplored

"Dear Dr. Thosteson: I am 18 and a virgin. Before I indulge in sexual intercourse I plan to go on the pill. Could you give me some information about the pill—how long until it takes effect, any physical changes, etc.?" S.M.

"Oh, dear, another virgin who thinks the pill is the answer to everything. At best, you're 18, and not 14 or 15 like so many girls who are writing me letters much like yours. Frankly, I don't intend to turn this column into a daily explanation of how to jump into bed and not get in trouble."

All the same, I do think it is better for girls to know about some of the dangers and how best to avoid them, so I'll go this far:

You can spend 25 cents and a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope to me, in care of this newspaper, and ask for our booklet, "The 12 Methods of Birth Control."

The booklet won't, I assure you, give you my permission to start playing house—but it will tell you what you need to know before you're galloping off into the arms of romance or whatever you choose to call it. And I'll add this—one of the

dangers of the pill is its absolute, 100 per cent protection against venereal disease. Yes, I know: You're going to be careful and go only with nice boys.

Only there are between two and three million boys and girls every year who wind up with V.D., and no doubt most of them felt sure that "that cute boy" or "that nice girl" just wouldn't be diseased.

Now they know better. I've been treating, prescribing, ranting and what-have-you for several years now against the risk of V.D., and so far the only progress has been back wards. I even wrote a special booklet on V.D. in hopes that at least a few young people would send for it and stay healthy.

Or at least have a better chance of staying healthy.

The amount of V.D. is now higher than ever—and I have a whole bin full of booklets that people didn't send for. They sent for mine, however, by not being read, so if you send an extra dime, I'll include the V.D. booklet along with the other one.

The printed bill was such that it's going to be a financial loss—but that's better than letting them sit around gathering dust while girls and boys are gathering V.D.

terms. I'm not kidding. The ignorance about V.D. among our young people is beyond belief.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Would you explain about breakthrough bleeding when you take birth control pills? Is there anything to stop it besides stopping taking the pills? Mrs. N.

The probability is that you are taking a pill containing more estrogen than you need—the bleeding can be the effect of the estrogen on the uterus. Tell your doctor about the bleeding and he may switch you to a pill with less estrogen to solve the problem.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: I had dental X-rays taken of my whole mouth before I knew I was pregnant. My last period was the fifth of the month and the X-rays were taken the 9th of the next month. Could the X-rays have affected the baby? My doctor said there was no reason to worry but I still do. S.W.

If you won't believe your doctor, why should you believe me? Dental X-rays directed at your mouth would not reach the "baby" down in your abdomen. I can't see what reason you have to worry.

Officials say Patricia talked 'under duress'

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Authorities are assuming Patricia Hearst was "under duress" when she renounced her former life, called her father a liar, and said she was joining the terrorist Symbionese Liberation Army (SLA), according to a U.S. District Attorney said there was no evidence the newspaper heiress had been a willing kidnaper victim when the SLA dragged her, kicking and screaming, from her Berkeley apartment Feb. 4.

"It is a possibility," Browning said, "but I don't believe it."

"We are assuming that what she said in a taped message broadcast Wednesday was said under duress—someone holding a gun at her head or the like—or she felt it was necessary to say those things to get free."

About the same time Browning was meeting with reporters in San Francisco's federal building, Patricia's mother issued a brief written statement saying only a personal meeting with her daughter would convince her that Patty voluntarily joined the SLA.

"Only Patty in person can convince me that

the terrible, weary words came from her heart and were delivered of her own free will," Catherine Hearst said.

"We are a close family, and I cannot believe that the daughter I know so well has willingly adopted the life of a life described by the SLA."

Until the day of her capture, Patty was a young lady of great assurance who was content with the direction in which she was going," her mother said.

At the University of California, where Patricia was a student until her abduction, a professor of political revolution said she may be the victim of a psychological school of motivation termed "Chang-Fang" or "work spirit."

Wes Davis said it could mean that although Patricia believed what she said Wednesday, she might not have reached the conviction through her own free will.

Faced with the psychological fear of death and forced into periods of mental and physical exhaustion, her captors would have made her feel guilty for the "crimes" of her family and the capitalist society they represent against the poor and the masses, Davis said.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Counsel for two former Nixon cabinet members called Edward Nixon, President Nixon's youngest brother, to testify in an influence-peddling trial in federal court today.

He was called to testify for his defense—if necessary—in the case of former Attorney General John N. Mitchell and former Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans, charged with conspiracy, perjury and obstructing justice.

His testimony would be unnecessary if the judge in the case dismisses the indictment, or calls a mistrial, a routine request made by the defense when the government rested its case.

He will be the second brother of Nixon to appear on the stand

at the 7-week-old conspiracy trial of the President's former cabinet members and reelection campaign directors.

Earlier this week, P. Donald Nixon, the older brother, testified as a reluctant government witness.

Tornado deaths mount

XENIA, Ohio (UPI) — With the death toll running into the dozens and property damage estimates soaring into the millions of dollars, many rescue and cleanup efforts continued in tornado-torn southwestern Ohio today.

At least 40 persons were killed Wednesday night, including 25 in this city of 26,000, and authorities feared the count could climb higher as rescue workers searched through the rubble.

Xenia City Manager Robert Stewart declared a state of emergency Thursday and set a curfew from 7 p.m. until 6 a.m. to prevent possible looting and to keep people out of the way of cleanup operations.

The American Red Cross said 2,300 homes and buildings in Xenia were damaged, Com-

munications were almost nonexistent, and many families separated by the disaster remained apart.

The Federal Disaster Assistance Administration (FEMA) Thursday declared victims in Adams, Butler, Greene, Hamilton, Madison and Warren counties eligible for disaster assistance. The FPA said the list of counties may be expanded as additional information about damages was obtained.

The President Gerald Ford flew from the Irish Thursday and said from what he saw he thought the victims were well qualified for disaster relief.

Sen. Robert Taft Jr. of Ohio, and Sen. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, were touring the devastated area today. Bishop F. Gerald Enley of the United

Methodist Church of the West Ohio Conference said more than 600 churches in 19 counties would take up a relief offering for the homeless and injured on Sunday.

A spokesman for the state department of natural resources said more than 100 park rangers had been assigned to help—the Ohio Highway Patrol, the Ohio National Guard and county and local law enforcement officers maintain order.

The department had made heavy equipment available for digging through the debris, the spokesman said, and state foresters throughout Ohio were put on alert to stand by in case they were needed.

Gov. John J. Gilligan said Xenia would be supplied with 86,000 gallons of gasoline to meet the demands for fuel in the tornado-ravaged community.

Boyle murder trial testimony continues

MEDIA, Pa. (UPI) — A former United States Marine organizer who said Jack Vabloski was slain because he was "only a heartbeat away from the presidency" resumed his testimony Thursday in the murder trial of former U.S. president W.A. Boyle.

William J. Prater, convicted of first degree murder in the shooting of Vabloski, his wife and daughter, testified Thursday about a kickback scheme involving pensioned Appalachian miners that was the payoff for the murder of Vabloski.

The UMW reform candidate against Boyle in 1969, Boyle, 72, is accused of ordering Vabloski's assassination and authorizing the payment of \$100,000 in union money to pay for it.

Prater, 53, from LaFollette, Tenn., is a former field representative of UMW District 19 and is now serving a federal term of life imprisonment for violating Vabloski's civil

rights. He said he was recruited by Vabloski for a murder scheme in July, 1969, by Pass, 54.

Pass is former secretary-treasurer of District 19 and was at the time a member of the UMW international executive board. He and seven others, including Prater, have confessed to or have been convicted of the Dec. 31, 1969, murder in the Vabloski home at Clarksville, Pa.

Sentences are pending against all eight.

Two months after Vabloski announced he would oppose Boyle for the UMW presidency, Prater said Pass told him "Joe Vabloski had to be 'bumped off.' It's only a heartbeat away from the presidency," Prater said. Pass also told him that "Vabloski knew too much about affairs of the union."

Prater said Pass recruited him because "Albert knew of my intention to run in the UMW

Federal financing defeated

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate backers of the bill for public financing of federal election campaigns were not dismayed by their four-vote defeat Thursday on a bid to invoke the Senate's gag rule to stop debate. A second try will be made next week.

Majority leader Mike Mansfield said a new motion for cloture would be presented today. Under Senate rules, it will be voted on Tuesday.

The Senate, by unanimous agreement, decided there will be no roll-call votes before Monday afternoon in deference to members who departed to assess damage and federal agency relief in their tornado-whipped states.

However, voice votes will be taken and amendments will be made by Sen. Herman Eugene Talmadge, D-Ga., which specifically makes it a federal offense to cause to be published, knowingly, false or fraudulent statements about candidates in federal elections.

The public financing bill would earmark for all major party candidates a campaign fund equivalent to 15 cents per eligible voter in general elections and 10 cents in primaries.

\$668 million voted to S. Viets for aid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House has approved a \$668 million supplemental defense authorization after rejecting a \$274 million increase in military aid to South Vietnam.

After debate reminiscent of the hawk-dove battles of the late 1960s, the House voted 177-154 Thursday night against increasing aid to South Vietnam, which propels the argument needed to offset the effect of inflation.

The House approved the "mainstream military" authorization—the first sought by the Pentagon since 1967—on a voice vote. The money will go for various military material, for both U.S. and allied forces, and for construction and research.

Supporters of the South Vietnam aid increase argued the United States was obligated to replace Vietnamese military losses and the additional money was needed because of inflation.

The original \$1.126 billion South Vietnamese military aid program, passed last year, was unaffected.

The Pentagon originally asked for supplemental appropriations totaling \$1.142 billion, including the additional funds for South Vietnam, saying the money was needed because of "a number of unforeseen problems relating to maintaining adequate levels of military readiness."

The original request budgeted

\$474 million in extra money for South Vietnam; but supporters immediately compromised to \$274 million. It appeared they would have no problem getting that before the House split into pro and anti-war forces and heated debate erupted.

"Will shipping yet more arms to South Vietnam help strengthen the ceasefire agreement," asked Sen. Mark O. Hatfield, D-Ore., "Will an increase in the levels of war help build the peace?"

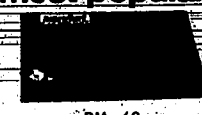

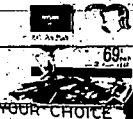

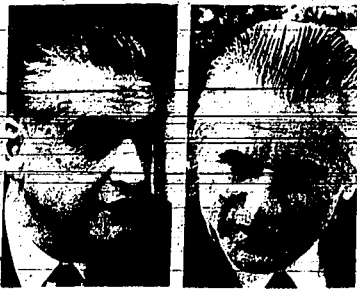

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Federal Energy Office auditors think they have uncovered significant pricing violations by oil refiners that would have jacked up the cost of gasoline to America's motorists.

FEO general counsel William N. Walker told the Senate Interior and Insular Affairs Committee Thursday that the violations may have occurred in the price foreign affiliates of U.S. oil companies charge the parent firms.

"Certain practices have come to light which FEO believes may constitute significant pricing violations by refiners in the area of transfer prices," Walker said.

But, Walker added, the evidence is tentative and no action has been initiated thus far.

There have been reports that some foreign affiliates of U.S. oil companies overcharge the parent companies, with consumers consequently paying higher gasoline prices.

Walker said 60 Internal Revenue Service auditors are at work in the headquarters of 30 of the largest refiners, and the first cycle of audits will be completed by May 31.

Walker said his office at present has no power to subpoena records of oil companies that do business in the United States, but he indicated the FEO would go to Congress for more muscle if it is needed.

Top France post sought

(C) New York Times service PARIS — The race for the presidency of France was begun Thursday by Jacques Chaban-Delmas, a liberal Gaullist and former premier under President Georges Pompidou, who died Tuesday.

The announcement of candidacy of Chaban-Delmas was followed shortly by that of Edgar Faure, also a former premier and now president of the National Assembly.

Chaban-Delmas, 59, a member of parliament and mayor of Bordeaux, appealed to the three parties of the governing coalition to give him their support. He said: "having been prime minister for three years, I have followed the tradition laid down by General De Gaulle. I have decided to be a candidate for the presidency of the republic."

At the biannual Gaullist convention last November in Nantes, he was clearly pushed forward as an outstanding party leader and almost unanimously received by the 5,000 party faithful attending the gathering.

He has the endorsement of Michel Debre, the former premier who represents Gaullist Orthodoxy, and of Alexandre Sanguinetti, the party chairman.

The Gaullist party is allied with the conservative Independent Republicans led by Finance Minister Valery Giscard d'Estaing and liberal centrists under Jacques Duhamel, a former cabinet minister.

Faure, 66, has his supporters among Gaullists too. More importantly, he commands wide sympathies among centrists in and out of government groupings. He was reported today to have received the backing of Jean-Jacques Servan-Schreiber, a publisher and one of two heads of the reformist grouping.

Faure might also receive the endorsement of the other leader of the opposition reformists, Jean Lecanuet.

But later tonight, Servan-Schreiber hedged by announcing the reformists would make no decision until Monday.

The three governing parties will now have to decide whether they will put their strength behind Chaban-Delmas or Faure, although either man could try to run on his own.

The party coalition could also compromise on a third candidate. Prominent among them is Finance Minister Giscard d'Estaing, who said today he would make no statements before the memorial service for Pompidou at Notre-Dame Cathedral on Saturday.

NJ girls step closer

TRENTON, N.J. (UPI) — New Jersey girls are a step closer to getting on all-boy Little League teams. The state Assembly narrowly rejected a one-year moratorium on a rule that allows them from the field.

A "Save the Little League" committee called Thursday for a delay to give local leagues time to train women coaches and prepare for the admission of girls. Some volunteers on the committee said they would cancel their seasons rather than allow girls to play this year.

Still out of business

CHICAGO (UPI) — It was the biggest batch of moonshine here since 1933, when prohibition was on its way out, the federal agents said.

John A. Meyer, assistant U.S. attorney, said Thursday agents arrested two men on charges of fermenting mash without a license and operating a distillery without a license.

Agents of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms seized equipment and material

capable of producing 250 gallons per week of 100-proof distilled spirits, Meyer said, and the last operation of that magnitude was smashed up by agents in 1933.

Food stamps speeded up for students

MOSCOW — The state of Idaho is trying to take the wait out of food stamps for University of Idaho students. Students who formerly had to wait in line at the Latah County Courthouse to have their applications processed now make appointments in advance but at a special office located on campus.

The Department of Environmental and Community Service (DECS) opened up the one-man office last week. Since that time, according to eligibility worker David Reynolds, about 25 students have come in to apply for the government subsidized program.

According to a regional DECS official, Mrs. Mary Abraham, the lines at the courthouse sometimes mean a

five hour wait. But with the new office, according to Reynolds, it only takes about 15 to 20 minutes for an application to be processed.

Then, if they are declared eligible, the students walk to the Student Union Building about two blocks away, and purchase the stamps. They are entitled to.

"We couldn't handle in the waiting room all the people coming in and there was no more space in the courthouse to expand," Mrs. Abraham said. As a result, DECS and the university got together to open the eligibility office on campus.

Mrs. Abraham said about 700 households in Latah County had been certified to receive food stamps during March. Several hundred involved students, she said.

She said the food stamp operation was almost like "financial aid to students." She also said there were probably large numbers of students who are eligible for the assistance but hadn't bothered to apply. She attributes the difference,

to the reluctance of some students to receive government assistance. Reynolds said that since Latah County established the food stamp program last Jan. 1, the number of students certified for food assistance had increased. Until beginning of the year, he said, the county operated a commodities program.

The council received a request for assistance for a study of the Silver Creek aquifer from water users. SCS district conservationist Doug Bishop reported that Silver Creek water users are concerned that the watershed is decreasing and have asked for a study by the Idaho Department of Water

Administration. The Pacific Northwest Regional Commission has supplied the WRRRA with five 30 x 40 inch color aerial photos of the cities of Teton and Shoshone. Accompanying these photos are 56 frames taken from the 1942 flights covering a broad band through Magic Valley. Price said.

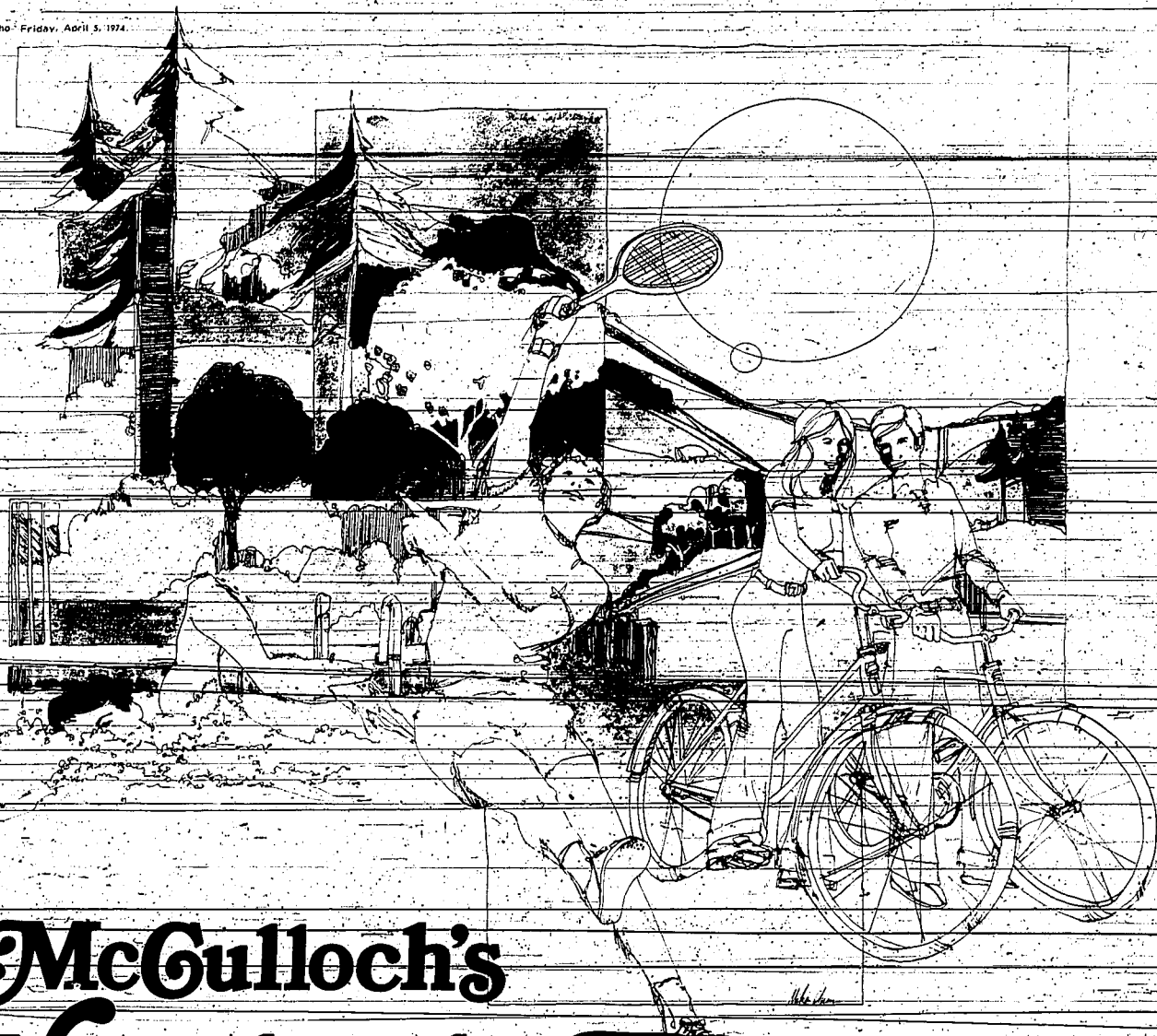

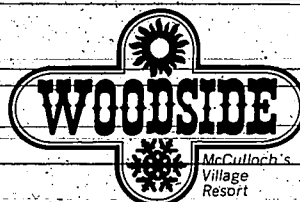

BLM presents land use plan at Blaine

HAILEY — Bureau of Land Management officials presented a national resource land use proposal to Blaine County officers Thursday.
The study includes the northern part of the Shoshone-Blaine district, which lies entirely in Blaine County. BLM personnel hope for approval and implementation of the plan by July 1.

Major conflicts and problems were presented within the plan that includes 121,000 acres of private land, 16,000 acres of state land and 99,000 acres of national resource ground.
The bureau presented a proposed oil and gas activity which included livestock forage, wildlife, recreation, minerals, forestry and watershed use.
Many of the recommendations naturally conflict with each other and there are many

uses which cannot be accommodated without degrading or eliminating other uses, according to a BLM statement.

BLM officials are seeking input from the public before making final recommendations.
O'Dell Frandsen, district BLM supervisor, said, "I just have a better proposal for these lands than what we want to hear. We are now just trying to minimize conflicts."

The multiple use proposal is bounded on the north by the Sawtooth National Forest, on the south by State Highway 20, by the Blaine-Cannas County line on the east and by the watershed boundary of the Big Wood River.

Wood River area management specialist Jim Lewis sketched conflicts in the Poison Creek area, Ohio Gulch, Wood River corridor on these lands seen when driving on Hwy. 20, Bald Mountain, block north of Sun Valley and Hulen Meadows.

The plan, also provided that almost all

resource recommendations were to eliminate livestock trails.

Sagebrush on about 44,000 acres of national resource lands was recommended to be eradicated by spraying, plowing or burning increasing livestock forage areas.

No brush removal was recommended within those areas identified as big game feeding areas or within two miles of sagebrush strutting grounds.

These areas conflict with approximately one-third of the 44,000 acres proposed for livestock forage.

When questioned about county planner recommendations, Frandsen said to plan "of course was not final."
"It has to be dynamic," he said. "It has to be able to change."
"We think our plan and the county plan can be compatible," Frandsen said.

The county can't override on federal lands

however, he added. The final decision will rest with Frandsen after recommendations by the public.

Cassia aide to withdraw from case

BURLEY — Cassia County Pres. Atty. Gordon Nielson has declared he will withdraw from the criminal libel case against the South Idaho Press.

Nielson requested permission from Fifth District Judge Sherman Bellwood Thursday afternoon to withdraw from the case, which charges were brought by magistrate Judge Gleason Anderson against the South Idaho Press and its editor, John Eberline.

If Nielson's request is granted by Judge Bellwood, the case would be assigned to another magistrate to represent the state against the newspaper. Judge Bellwood had not announced his decision by this morning.

State Atty. Gen. Anthony Park refused a request by Nielson Wednesday to allow him to get out of the case and the attorney general's office appoint a special prosecutor. Park told the Times-News Thursday that "the attorney general's office will not be involved in the case."

Nielson said he would withdraw from the case because of conflicts between his position as a prosecutor appearing before Judge Anderson and prosecutor in this case in which the judge is the complaining witness.

"To be fair to the judge, the people, and to myself, and with the consent and at the suggestion of Judge Anderson, I am withdrawing from the case and requesting that a special prosecutor be appointed," Nielson said.

Judge Anderson signed the complaint against the South Idaho Press and John Eberline and had Eberline arrested last Friday. The criminal libel charges were brought in response to an item which mentioned the judge by name in a questionnaire answer column that appeared in the South Idaho Press Wednesday of last week. Mindako, Magistrate Judge Lefty Blacker withdrew from the case earlier this week. He disqualifies himself, citing his working relationship with Judge Anderson as the reason.

Bellevue studies 3 city projects

RELLSVILLE — The Bellevue City Council embarked on three possible city projects Thursday night.

The projects include determining the ability of brand funds to construct an additional water line in the city; development of a comprehensive plan and determining the feasibility of expanding the city library building.

Mayor L. T. (Pete) Johnson requested city

clerk Anna-Paive O'Donnell to write to the department of Environmental and Community Services to determine if a grant would be available for the water line project.

Johnson said the proposed project would involve laying a second water line parallel to the existing line from the water source in Alluloon Canyon into town — a distance of about 3,000 feet. The new line would serve as a reserve line, as well as to increase city water volume.

The move said the project would have cost about \$22,000 last summer. However, with the increase in pipe cost, he said he didn't feel the city could afford the project without assistance.

The project, if conducted, would use the overflow water at the city waterworks facility. Johnson said he felt the city was presently using only about 80 inches of water out of its 150-inch allotment.

Allderman also discussed possibly installing a supplementary well as an alternative to the new water line.
The council also agreed that as it applies for a grant, work should begin on a city comprehensive plan.

James Pigg, who serves on the Blaine County Planning and Zoning Commission, said a comprehensive plan would be required to enable the city to receive future state and federal grants.

He said that he and county planning and zoning administrator Robert Barnes could meet with the city planning and zoning commission to discuss the project.

Pigg said he felt the project would not require too much work because the county comprehensive plan, tentatively scheduled to be completed May 1, contains information which could be tied into Bellevue's plan.

In other action, under the night not Duke Martin were appointed to determine whether it would be feasible and beneficial to expand the city library.

During a meeting, a letter was reviewed from state librarian Helen Miller, in response to an inquiry by city librarian Mary Griffin.

Ms. Miller said the Idaho State Library Board would possibly consider a city grant request at its May meeting. Ms. Miller said she felt such an expansion project should not be too expensive and that it could possibly include an area to serve for City Council meetings, story hours or other small meetings, as well as additional space for books.

However, alderman John Pascoe said the city may have to consider constructing a new city hall to house the clerk's office, fire truck and maintenance equipment. He said he felt the need for a new city hall may be not too far off.

Board members briefly discussed equalizing the charge to out-of-state students at each of the four schools, but rejected the idea.

The new increase will mean an out of state resident going to school at BSU will pay \$220 a semester, while a student at ISU will have to pay \$425. University of Idaho students from out of state will pay \$400, while those at LCSC will pay \$350.

BSU President Dr. John Bennett said he would like to see the non-resident charges equalized at the schools over a period of time. But one of his

— \$12.44 million for ISU, including \$11.24 million from the general fund;

— \$1.84 million for LCSC, including \$1.31 million from the general fund;

— \$10.71 million for the University of Idaho, including \$11.72 million from the general fund.

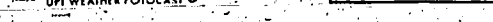

Blaine meet reviews pasture, land use

CAREY — Pasture and hayland fertilization, legume and grass selection, irrigation and pasture management were reviewed at an irrigated pasture workshop here.

About 20 area farmers and ranchers attended the workshop jointly sponsored by the Blaine Soil Conservation District and the Blaine County Agricultural Extension Service.

County agent James Eakin began the program with a discussion of hay and pasture fertilization.

Eakin pointed out that good responses have been obtained with both sulfur and phosphorus as well as nitrogen. He also reminded participants that a balance between nitrogen and sulfur should be maintained if plants are to benefit from the use of these fertilizers. Citing a Carey farm as an example, Eakin illustrated how a good fertilizer program brought hay production up from three tons to six tons per acre.

Eakin also presented recent information on alfalfa

varieties, including Resistador and Dawson. These and other new varieties are beginning to be utilized within the county.

Dorrell L. Larsen, Boise extension irrigation specialist, discussed irrigation water management with sprinkler systems.

Larsen said the soils, the crop, and to some extent, the personality of the farmer must be considered to design the sprinkler system to accomplish the desired job. The intensity that the farmer is willing to manage will determine what

sprinkler design will suit him best.

Larsen also detailed the costs and efficiencies of hand lines, side rolls, low lines and center pivots, and their adaptability for use in a pasture situation.

Featured program speakers Gene and John Thomas discussed the pasture management system utilized for their operation in Filer and Blaine.

Beginning with high quality latar orchard grass and hanger alfalfa pasture, the Thomases apply management to make beef their cash crop.

Gene Thomas used slides to illustrate how the intensive grazing system works, and some of the problems that management can solve. John Thomas described how irrigated pasture pays from the economic standpoint.

The Thomases pasture management has consistently resulted in more than 1,200 pounds of beef per acre each season.

District conservationist Duane Bishop, Soil Conservation Service, concluded the program with a discussion about selected grasses and legumes that show superior performance and work well in Blaine County.

For well drained soils, Bishop recommended either latar orchard grass or hanger alfalfa for straight grass or alfalfa-grass hay for pastures. He recommended Alta tall fescue for saline sites with water table problems, and Garrison meadow for wet sites.

Bishop also briefly mentioned the merits of the legumes lemont, sainfoin and latana milkvetch.

Supermarket spokesman denies profit charges

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A supermarket spokesman Wednesday denied that retailers have fattened profits by keeping beef prices high during recent months of depressed live cattle prices.

Clarence G. Adams, President of the National Association of Food Chains, told a House Agriculture subcommittee that retail beef prices have closely followed changes in wholesale prices charged by meat packers.

With recent declines in wholesale prices, Adams testified, "the price of beef at retail has been continuing to decline and many cuts are now selling at the lowest prices since early 1972."

Adams' testimony rejected assertions by several farm belt lawmakers that retailers had prescanned an abnormally wide gap between live cattle and beef prices. He also charged that Agriculture Department statistics showing the farm retail price spread on beef widened to a new record in February, before narrowing this month, were erroneous.

Adams said earlier studies indicate the federal report overstates the price gap by 20 to 40 per cent.

"The fact is that the (government) numbers now being reported still have no real-world validity," he said.

"I would like to assure this committee along with cattlemen and consumers that retailers are not over, nor have they been, fattening their profits on beef or any other item at the expense of anyone," Adams added.

Spokesmen for cattlemen gave the lawmakers a new series of warnings that unless producers can get out of the red, consumers will face shorter supplies in the future.

"Our real concern today is that unless something is done immediately, the cattle feeders will be bankrupt and will not be able to continue feeding cattle," said A. W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, Tex. Other witnesses included officials of the National Livestock Feeders Association and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

Anthony spelled out the problem in blunt terms with a detailed accounting on 106 head of beef cattle he bought for fattening last August 1. The Texas said he paid \$30,000 for the cattle and spent another \$28,334 fattening them on high-priced grains, bringing total costs to \$58,334.

When the cattle were sold on March 8, 1974, the Texas said, they brought a total return of \$46,392. The loss, he said, was \$12,342, or \$192 per head.
