CSI names Grant coach

TWIN FALLS — John Boyd Grant was named head basketball coach at the College of Southern Idaho today.

Grant, a graduate of American Falls High School, has been assistant coach at the University of Kentucky for the past two seasons.

Dr. James E. Taylor, president of the college, announced Grant's appointment at a late morning press conference in the Commons Building.

Grant will replace Jerry Hale who resigned three weeks ago to become head basketball coach at Oral Roberts University in Tulsa, Okla. Grant has been coordinator of all basketball recruiting at the University of Kentucky at Lexington.

Grant graduated from American Falls high in 1951, attended Snow Junior College at Ephraim, Utah, for two years, and earned his bachelor of science degree from Colorado State College at Fort Collins. He earned a master's degree in physical education from the same college.

After two years of coaching at Mountain View, Wyo., high school, he became a graduate assistant varsity coach and instructor in physical education. Grant received his master's degree in physical education from the University of Colorado State in 1965-66 season.

From 1966-72 Grant was freshman coach, varsity assistant and coordinator of recruiting at Colorado State. He went to Kentucky in the fall of 1972.

Grant served in the Army-Signal Corps from 1957 to 1959 as an instructor in cryptography.

Big wind batters all Valley

Multiple pileups, highway blockades, power outages and travel delays were among the troubles caused by Wednesday's wind storm.

Gusts up to 62 miles per hour occurred in Twin Falls, according to the U.S. Weather Bureau.

Winds up to 75 miles per hour blew an 18-foot Greyhound bus off the road at the intersection of 10th and 11th streets, Dave Steele, ticket agent at Greyhound said.

The bus did not turn over—it was blown sideways off the road and a tow truck was needed to pull it out, Steele said. "We've never had problems like this" because of the wind, he said.

The winds were hard on policemen. Wind-blown dust led to the arrest of a police officer in a Hagerman City patrol car and the former Hagerman police chief.

Two multi-car pileups occurred on mile west of Twin Falls on Highway 30. State Police officer John Gould said winds blowing across a farmer's plowed field caused low visibility conditions.

Following the accidents, state police re-routed traffic heading towards Hagerman from 3 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Drivers Hurl bound from Twin Falls had to go to Bliss and back-track Hagerman the rest of the way around from the Salt Lake City interchange at Burley to the Utah State line from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. due to snowdrifts. Drifts also closed State Highway 77 from Delco to Malta from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. the State Highway Department reported.

The department reported that Highway 30 to Nevada was hazardous, but kept open. A section of Rock Creek Road three miles south of Hansen was shut by the Twin Falls Highway District for three hours during the afternoon. Supervisors county roads in other districts were reported closed because of hazardous dust conditions.

Electric power outages occurred in numerous scattered instances throughout the Magic Valley, according to Jim Johnston, electrical superintendent for Idaho Power. Power lines downed service wires and broken overhead conductors hit buildings in Hagerman, according to Steele. The electricity cuts were scattered and only a few customers in clusters of a cluster.

A stained glass window blew out of the Church of the Ascension in Blue Lakes.

Blowing dust caused three multi-car pileups on US Highway 30 west of Twin Falls Wednesday. The highway was closed to traffic twice during the day.

There were also three other accidents reported in the county as wind-whipped dust brought visibility to near zero in typical areas.

Three persons were treated for minor injuries and released from Magic Valley Memorial Hospital. There were no serious injuries reported.

The traffic accidents were particularly hard on police vehicles. A state police car was smashed in one of the chain collisions on US 30, and on Rock Creek Road a pickup truck used by the Hagerman city marshal was hit from the rear. A private car driven by the recently released Hagerman police chief was also involved in one of the US 30 accidents.

Three accidents on US 30 occurred near Jackson Corner about one mile west of Twin Falls.

The first wreck occurred just before noon. Five eastbound cars rear-ended one after another, apparently after the lead driver slowed down because of the dust. Reports of the accident are incomplete as most police officers spent the day controlling traffic and did not complete reports.

People involved in the first wreck were Hill Haggren, Jerome E. Haggren, William J. Haggren, Larry San, Kenen, Hurl, Hobbs, Maxwell, Filer, and Leroy Haggren, Filer. There were no injuries.

Porter draws 30 day term
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Herbert L. Porter, Jr. is sentenced today to 30 days in jail for lying to the FBI about the bugging scandal.

"I am absolutely positive in my heart—all the way down to my toes—that I will never get into trouble again," Porter said, just before Judge William B. Bryant sentenced him.

Japanese Pull air service halted
TOKYO (UPI) — Some 4.3 million workers carried out the biggest series of strikes in Japan's history today, shutting down train and air services and slowing the world's third largest economy.

The strikers were demanding pay increases averaging about 30 per cent to meet an inflation rate of 24 per cent over the past year. They also wanted to legalize strikes against government-controlled industries.

Satellite launch delayed
CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) — The launch of Western America's first domestic communications satellite, was postponed today because of problems with the Delta booster rocket.

The launch had been scheduled for 5:21 p.m. MST but was put off while technicians studied the problem.

Three Arab guerrillas seized an apartment house in the Israeli border settlement of Kiryat Shimon today and methodically killed residents one by one before blowing themselves up with explosive-laden belts they had worn for their suicide mission.

The mayor of the town near the border of Lubangon said 21 persons died in the killing raid in which the guerrillas shot women and children and threw them out of the window. The commandos also went from door-to-door to shoot anyone who answered. Some hostages apparently died in the suicide blast.

Mayor Avraham Aloni put the death toll at three guerrillas, two Israeli soldiers, eight adult civilians and eight children.

A statement by a Palestinian guerrilla group in Beirut said the guerrillas had hoped to force Israel to release 100 Palestinian commandos from Israeli jails but destroyed themselves when Israeli paratroopers landed by helicopter on the roof of the three-story apartment house.

The raid came at the height of an Israeli political crisis in which Prime Minister Golda Meir and her cabinet resigned. Despite the seriousness of the political crisis, Defense Minister Moshe Dayan left an emergency cabinet meeting to fly to Kiryat Shimon.

Whether the guerrillas were involved in the operation was not known but both Israeli and guerrilla sources said three men aged between 20 and 30 years and firing mechanisms and bazookas seized the apartment building in a raid just after dawn. Military correspondents reported earlier that guerrillas had been in the area for some time. The army did not deny these reports but said as far as the army was concerned only three men were involved.

TF teachers, district in accord on pay boost

TWIN FALLS — Tentative agreement was reached Wednesday night giving Twin Falls school teachers 11.36 per cent pay increases next year.

The base starting salary for teachers would increase from \$6,735 to \$7,500. The top base salary would go from \$10,115 to \$11,264.

But a higher salary, than \$11,264 may be possible, according to Curdren Meyer, assistant superintendent of schools. Salary schedules are being revised to include pay classes for teachers with master's degrees plus 30 and 50 hours of advanced study. No classes above a master's degree exist in present schedules.

The 11.36 per cent increase does not include the increment teachers receive for experience on the job, Meyer said.

Meyer said the increase is due to extra money appropriated by the legislature, in order to bring Idaho teacher salaries up to level competitive with other states.

"We run just about at the bottom of the barrel," Meyer said, in comparison with the national average. Montana and Wyoming pay their teachers an average of \$1,000 more than Idaho does, Meyer said.

Oregon top Idaho's average salaries by about \$1,000.

Meyer said this increase, I'm hoping, will be a little higher than the rate of inflation. That is the legislature's philosophy.

The U.S. Department of Labor statistics indicated that the cost of living has risen 10 per cent from February, 1973 to this time in last year but low-salaried persons the most

Meyer said, and therefore figures the 11 per cent raise "just about does it."

Twin Falls teachers were given a 7.5 per cent, compounded raise last year, that is 8.5 per cent for the past two years, but paid all last year. The total increase last year was then 11.32 per cent.

Before that, teachers had not been given significant salary increases since about 1967, Meyer said.

Jailed seaman US citizen?
WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. officials said today they are investigating claims that a Lithuanian seaman now in a Soviet prison after being denied political asylum in America in 1970 could have a legitimate claim to American citizenship.

An American Lithuanian group called Americans for Simas, claims the seaman, Simas Kudricka, was born out of wedlock in Lithuania to Marija Kudricka who was born in the United States in 1906 after her parents moved here from Lithuania. They said Kudricka was given his mother's family name.

Rebel gunners sink 2 ships
PHNOM PENH (UPI) — Rebel gunners sank two Cambodian naval ships on the Tonle Sap River Wednesday night, killing at least 17 government soldiers and destroying 30 tons of ammunition.

Rebel reports said the ships were hiding in the jungle along the waterway and the two naval landing vessels.

Demos reject compromise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Seeking to avoid a subpoena, the White House offered today to provide the House Judiciary Committee some of the tapes it wants for its impeachment inquiry. The move failed to satisfy the committee's Democratic majority.

The Democrats demonstrated in a test vote that they have the strength to issue a subpoena.

A motion picture was anticipated some time in the afternoon following a 9:30 p.m. test vote.

The last minute compromise offer was made by James H. St. Clair, President Nixon's Watergate lawyer. St. Clair telephoned John M. Donahoe, chief counsel for the committee inquiry, 45 minutes before today's showdown meeting.

St. Clair offered to provide in a day or two most of the tapes sought by the panel since Feb. 17.

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Scoggin sets retirement from bench

FAIRFIELD — Senior Fifth District Judge Charles Scoggin Wednesday announced he will retire in January at the end of his current term.

He has served on the Fifth District for 16 years.

At the same time Wednesday, Douglas Kramer, a Twin Falls attorney, said that he will seek the court seat to be vacated by Scoggin.

Judge Scoggin is a native of California. He moved to Idaho in 1928, living in Fairfield since 1936. He said he will maintain residence in Fairfield.

The judge said his retirement from the office may be interrupted if the Idaho Supreme Court calls on him to help in a district where the work had been excessive illness or death in a district or temporary need for another judge also may bring him back to duty.

In announcing his candidacy for Judge Scoggin's post, Kramer said he had resigned as chairman of the Twin Falls County Republican Central Committee.

Kramer will seek the nonpartisan position on the August primary election ballot. If a candidate receives a majority of the votes at that time the election closes. Otherwise the law

highest vote getters appear on the general election ballot in November for a run-off.

Laird Noh, vice chairman, has moved up to second place among the Twin Falls County Central Committee and will serve under the setting status until the reorganization meeting following the August primary election.

Kramer, 49, said Wednesday, "After 21 years of law practice in this district involving all types of trials, I believe I have the experience and knowledge to occupy the position of district judge. It would be a real challenge which I would like to accept if the people of Magic Valley, Wood-Hever Valley, and Carnas Prairie elect me to the office."

He said the district involves the eight counties where he has spent most of his life and he is excited to serve the area right now.

Kramer was born in Fairfield and graduated from the Carnas County High School. He has a B.A. and juris doctor degree from the University of Idaho.

If elected to the post held by Judge Scoggin, Kramer said, he would move to Gooding.

Murphy out of race?

BOISE (UPI) — Lt. Gov. Jack M. Murphy may bow out of the race for the Republican nomination for governor.

Murphy said he was being pulled back on his race north of Boise Saturday and his return to the state is uncertain.

"I'm kind of up in the air," Murphy said. "There is a possibility I may not run for governor."

"I could get some medical advice. I would know whether I should run or not."

Should he decide not to seek the governorship this year, Murphy said, he will run for a third term as lieutenant governor for the committee inquiry.

"I will take an energetic man to run for governor," he said. "But I can't be my hobnobbing around."

Before making his decision he will discuss the matter with party leaders, Murphy said.

Murphy said he already has advised some key Republican legislators of his condition, among them Rep. Vernon Rasmussen, R-Tuttle.

"I will have to talk to a lot of people before I get that ambitious and right now that is not my plan," Rasmussen said.

However, Rasmussen said he would not oppose Murphy for lieutenant governor.

Most seemed to relish the bit they were playing in the historic drama of Nixon's political survival. They turned out for their prospective farmhouses and stores, holstered hand-lettered, welcoming signs and generally had a good time. There was a lot of gawking as

the presidential motorcade slowed at rural crossroads and by-ways of this rich farming area in the Michigan Eighth Congressional District.

It was circus day and the Fourth of July rolled into one. Merchants spruced up their towns, dusted off the patriotic bunting and strung banners across main streets.

"This is the first time we've ever had a President in Bad Axe," noted Gordon L. Gempel, the local Republican chairman.

Folk straining out along the 57-mile route of the presidential motorcade, accorded Nixon a friendly — though not enthusiastic — personal welcome. Most gave less than full attention to his speeches — he made four — although they did enjoy the spectacle.

"You put Cass City on the map," read one placard in the hand of a matronly Nixon supporter.

Nixon has singled out this unpopulated rural area of Michigan as a testing ground for his own popularity. Which he and his advisors believe is

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Salmon Dam project starts in storm

TWIN FALLS — County and federal representatives broke ground in a dust-filled windstorm Wednesday for a \$125,000 Salmon Dam recreation development.

The ceremony at Salmon Dam launched the Salmon Falls Recreation site project which has been in the making since 1965. It is financed by federal funds allocated to the Bureau of Land Management through a grant earlier this year.

In addition, Twin Falls County through the Waterways Commission, will provide the construction of two new boat ramps and assist with maintenance and provide a caretaker.

Stick Conatos, district BLM director, Burley, said in the brief, dedication ceremony Wednesday the cooperation from these three major agencies and many individuals will make it possible to have a year-around facility.

There will be a number of picnic tables and camp sites, water system installed and lights erected for the campgrounds. About 20 trees will be planted around the picnic and camp sites.

Bill Matthews, Boise, state BLM director, thanked the participating groups and commented on the increased use of recreation sites such as the Salmon Dam reservoir which he said can be used for fishing, boating and water skiing.

William L. Chancey, county administrator chairman, also emphasized the importance of cooperation in achieving the project. He introduced Neal Oliver, waterways chairman, who explained the financing

through boat registration fees returned to the county.

Lester McGregor, Salmon River Canal Co., said the electrical line which was brought to the site has made it possible to operate the pumps of the dam electrically.

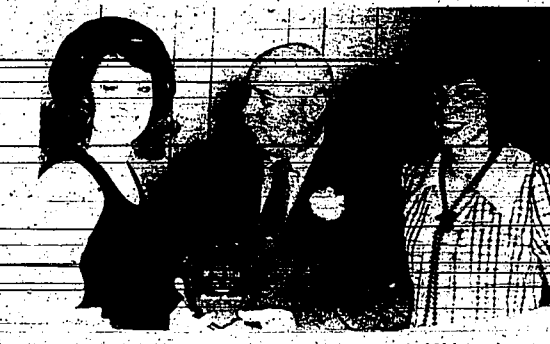
Since the dam was built in 1910 he said, they have been raised in various ways with the latest prior to electricity being runline operated motors.

Chancey said the electrical line cost \$12,000 and the canal lining \$2,000 and the canal project \$5,000. A new home has also been built for a caretaker.

Matthews said it is hoped the project cost will be completed by August of this year.

About 25 persons braved extreme winds and cold weather to attend the program. Several people who were present attended as did other BLM officials, county parks director Clark Kleunkopf, fish and game and sportsmen club members and canal company officials also attended.

Using gold colored shovels, Matthews and McGregor, joined ground for the location of picnic areas.

Missing Idahoan located

TWIN FALLS — A missing man whose truck went over the Snake River Canyon rim in March has been located in Seattle.

Sheriff Paul Corder said Wednesday Darrell Lee Smith, 34, Soda Springs, was tentatively located in Seattle after a note concerning a Seattle jaywalking citation was sent to his Idaho home.

Smith has been missing since March 18 when a camper truck belonging to him was spotted on the canyon floor near the Hansen Bridge by fishermen. According to his family, Smith had gone to the Hansen Bridge to meet friends to go fishing the day before the truck was found.

Corder said at the time the truck was discovered that the case had elements of mystery since no sign of Smith was found and there were tracks of a second vehicle near where the truck went over the rim.

Corder said today Smith's whereabouts was traced from Soda Springs after she received a form letter concerning the Seattle jaywalking citation.

Corder said an investigation by Seattle police revealed that Smith is apparently living with a former Nampa acquaintance now residing in Seattle and that Smith himself is working somewhere in the Seattle area.

Corder said there is little question that the Smith in Seattle is the same Darrell Smith whose camper went over the canyon rim. To make sure, Corder said, he will send pictures of Smith to Seattle police for an identification check.

Corder said no charge has been filed against Smith. He said a possible littering charge on the camper in the canyon would be a misdemeanor and would not be sufficient to extradite Smith to Idaho.

Corder said he would like a statement from Smith describing how and why the truck went over the cliff, why Smith went to Seattle and why he got there.

Smith's location might never have been learned if not for the

jaywalking ticket, Corder said. The letter sent to Smith's Soda Springs home by the violations bureau of the Seattle Municipal Court read in part: "Because of your good driving record your citation is cleared without a fine."

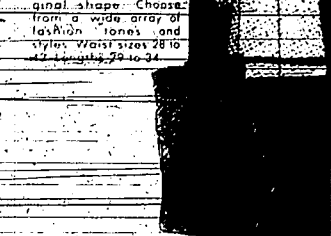
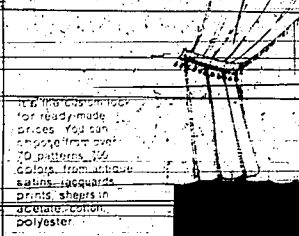

The vote came after an hour of debate. The bill would have required replies to be printed in the letters to the editors section of the paper. Editors would have been allowed to delete any language from the replies.

TIA warning sign

By GEORGE C. THOSTESON, M.D.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My husband had what is called a T.I.A. The doctor called it a transient (something) attack. It was explained to be something to do with the blood vessels in the brain and the flow of blood. I'd like more information. — Mrs. I.G.M.

T.I.A. stands for "transient ischemic attack," a brief interruption of the flow of blood to the brain or some part of it. (Ischemia means a deficient flow of blood to an area.)

The symptoms may be such things as a temporary disturbance in vision, brief unconsciousness, weakness of a limb or a disturbance in speech.

The explanation is a disturbed blood flow in one of the small arteries in the brain due to "hardening" of the arteries. Or, alternatively, there may be a partial obstruction in the carotid artery in the neck which is the artery carrying blood to the brain.

The location of the trouble can be determined by carotid angiography. In this special arterial is injected into the carotid artery, and then X-rays of the neck and skull show the distribution of blood flow.

If the T.I.A. episodes are recurrent, it may be a harbinger of a stroke. From 20 to 70 per cent of such patients

ultimately have strokes, perhaps under stress or tension.

Management of the condition varies. In some cases the use of anticoagulants to "thin" the blood — to reduce its clotting ability — is in order. If the principal problem is in the carotid artery, surgery may be required to remove or to bypass the obstruction.

Excess weight should be shed, and if blood pressure is elevated, steps should be taken to bring it down.

In any case, a T.I.A. is a warning sign and should be investigated thoroughly.

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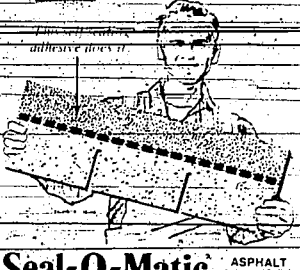
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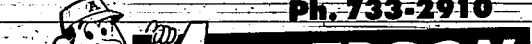
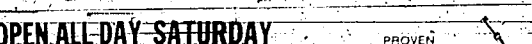
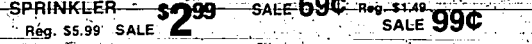
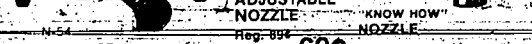
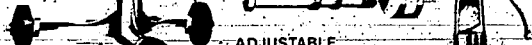
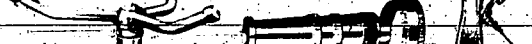
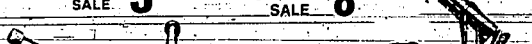
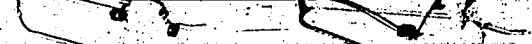
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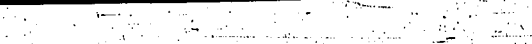
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Pullback bid continues

WASHINGTON — Diplomats and administration officials said today they expect American efforts to bring about a troop separation agreement between Israel and Syria to continue despite the latest political crisis in Israel.

Although they warned that Premier Golda Meir's decision to resign could create still unforeseen problems, experts in Washington tended to believe that the caretaker Israeli government, which Mrs. Meir will continue to run, will be able to negotiate a troop

separation accord in the Golan Heights.

Mrs. Meir's resignation came only hours before a high-level Syrian delegation arrived in Washington for an exchange of views with Secretary of State Kissinger on disengagement with Israel.

The Syrian group, led by Brig. Gen. Hikmat al-Habib, head of military intelligence, will present Kissinger on Friday with Syria's disengagement proposals and listen to those conveyed to Kissinger.

Mrs. Meir's resignation was announced by Defense Minister Moshe Dayan

of Israel.

State department officials said that plans were going ahead for Kissinger to again visit the Middle East about April 20 to seek a disengagement agreement.

But the experts did acknowledge that the Israeli government crisis, which could force another election in the summer, would slow down the American efforts to move along an Israeli-Syrian disengagement accord or a permanent settlement between Egypt and Israel and an agreement between Israel and Jordan in the West Bank area of the Jordan River.

Israel prime minister resigns

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Prime Minister Golda Meir at the end of the road formally tendered her resignation to President Ezer Weizman today in reaction to the national "hitting" in her ruling Labor party.

"Mr. President," Mrs. Meir said in her letter of resignation, "in accordance with provisions of section 23 of the basic law of government, I am having to inform the cabinet of my intentions to resign from the post of prime minister."

Before sending her letter to Kedar, Mrs. Meir met with her cabinet to inform it officially. It met an hour later, some 90 minutes after a band of Arab guerrillas attacked the town of Kiryat Shmona near the Lebanese border, killing at least 16 persons.

Defense Minister Moshe Dayan, at the center of the crisis, which provoked Mrs. Meir's decision to resign and potentially one of the candidates to succeed her, left the cabinet meeting to fly to the scene of the attack.

Twenty minutes after receiving Mrs. Meir's formal resignation, Kedar said he would begin consultations immediately with political leaders in an effort to find a replacement for her and her government to run Israel on a caretaker basis.

Foreign Minister Abba Eban said Israel would continue to meet its international obligations during the transitional period, Israel is engaged through American Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger in delicate negotiations for a troop disengagement with Syria on the Golan Heights where there has been daily fighting for a month.

There will be no atmosphere of tentativeness," Eban said.

Rather comments on impeachment

HOUSTON (UPI) — The consensus among both Republicans and Democrats in Washington is that President Nixon will most likely be impeached by the House of Representatives but probably will not be removed from office by the Senate, CBS White House Correspondent Dan Rather said Tuesday.

However, Rather said that based on his "own assessment he is not yet convinced that Nixon is likely to be impeached."

Rather also said instead of leaving office, the President might in fact take an extended leave of absence under the

provisions of the 25th Amendment, retaining power over big decisions, but turning the day-to-day operation of the government over to Vice President Gerald R. Ford.

And Rather told the final meeting of the National School Boards Association that the President has not told the truth. "I don't see how he is going to survive. If he has to run the truth, I don't see how they're going to impeach him much less remove him from office."

Rather said he considered it "highly unlikely" that Nixon would resign, asserting: "It is not of his nature to quit. It is not of his nature to resign."

Tax probe asked

WASHINGTON — Donald C. Alexander, the commissioner of Internal Revenue, has asked that the special Watergate prosecutor's office initiate a Grand Jury investigation into a possible criminal conspiracy stemming from President Nixon's claim of a \$750,000 tax deduction for his vice presidential papers, well-placed sources said today.

The sources said that Alexander discussed the tax deduction with the special Watergate prosecutor, and provided him with a list of former White House aides and presidential aides who had contact with reporters, Attorney General William French Smith, a California lawyer who prepared an admittedly

backdated deed for the papers, as among those cited by Alexander as a potential Grand Jury target.

Saxbe also said that the question of possible criminal involvement on the part of Nixon was for the congressional impeachment inquiry to decide, and not an issue before Jaworski's office.

The letter protested the handling of the probation of two district teachers, Elmer Hicks, sixth grade, and eighth grade Spanish teacher, Virginia Fife. The letter stated the probationary matter should have been dealt in confidence and no names released to the public.

The letter related to action taken at last month's regular board meeting when the teachers were placed on probation by the trustees.

Lyle Van Orman, board chairman, said that according to the school attorney, any official action taken by the board should be done in an open meeting with the press in attendance.

Mrs. Sheryl Hymas, trustee, asked that the names be requested not to say anything and withhold the teachers' names.

Supt. John Campbell said that if they are good citizens of this community, they would do this; it's up to the press to hold this kind of information back and all we can do is hope the press will hold this type of news until the people are notified. I think this is bad when the teacher hears of the board's action from the press before official notification has been made by the district.

Campbell said Mrs. Hymas further said, "It's bad because the press is reporting the board's decision and interfering with the board's authority."

Campbell requested that consideration be given to the district's holding the driver education program during the summer months and discontinuing the program during the winter.

Shoshone aides vote for project

SHOSHONE — Shoshone school trustees voted Monday in favor of participating in the Vocational Education Research Project.

This project has been carried out in the Wood River High School the past year. Students enrolled under the vocational education program who need assistance in reading, spelling and arithmetic will be given special instruction through the government funded program.

The funds available would help provide for the program, with the respective school district only responsible for providing the room. Teacher salaries, equipment and material would come under the government funded project.

Wood River School District is requesting an expansion of the program to be used as a pilot district for a school smaller, one in the medium range and a larger school. The school is considering the program for these classes include Carey for the small school; Shoshone, the medium; Wood River to continue and the Twin Falls district for the larger schools.

Mrs. Leigh Kelley met with the board to renew the lease her husband has on some school property. The matter will be further considered at a later meeting. Supt. Kenneth Crothers said, as boundaries of the property must be established for use as needed.

Principal of the high school, James Clements, and athletic coach, Edward Sandy, presented proposals for coaching assignments for the coming school year. These will be further considered.

After a discussion of finance, the board set a special meeting for 8 p.m. April 22 when the tentative budget will be set and official budget hearing date established.

Decision must also be reached at that time. Crothers said, as to whether or not the two mill plant facility levy needs to be renewed. The mill levy is expiring this spring.

The district has had two mill levies, to total four mills, for this purpose, but they were voted upon at separate times and thus the current one which is expiring will be considered for three.

One of the two mill levies was voted upon, and approved two years ago. These mill levies have been in force for the local district for about 10 years.

Crothers estimated. In approving the inspection report by the Idaho Department of Labor, the board noted that necessary corrections will be made. Possibly the most expensive of these will be installing electrically lighted exit lights and signs at all exits in the school buildings. At the present

time the only lighted exits are at the gymnasium area. Other required repairs are minor.

In keeping with new government regulation on the minimum wage, the board approved increasing the minimum pay to school employees to the \$1.50 base. The board approved library

purchase projects under Title Two, Elementary, Secondary School Act, expenditures of \$50 for library and resource materials for the two schools.

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Truancy plan eyed

HAILEY—A plan to keep truancy students out of magistrate court is being recommended by School District principals.

The recommendation asks that one more step be added to school board truancy policy to have the student from compulsory expulsion. Under the present policy, a pupil is subject to action leading to expulsion upon the third truancy.

Wayne Egan, superintendent of Blaine County schools, said the recommendation suggests that upon the third truancy, the student be referred to the Blaine County Youth Services Agency. The agency, sponsored by Blaine County, is headed by Mack Reynolds. Reynolds was hired by the county two months ago to offer counseling and advice to pre-delinquents. Egan said the recommendation was intended

to keep kids from ending up in magistrate court. Reynolds said his capsule was practical diversion. The ex-policeman said he is "not a truancy officer."

The new recommendation, if acceptable to Reynolds, will allow him to counsel pre-delinquents before they get into serious trouble. "Hopefully we can get to the kids before the third truancy, however," Reynolds said.

There is a definite need for the third truancy recommendation, Reynolds said. At least eight junior high pupils from Blaine County have been absent over 30 days. They can miss up to 27 days, then they get automatically suspended or expelled, Reynolds said.

"If a student has extreme trouble with truancy, it almost always leads to trouble with the law," Reynolds said.

Teacher pay hike okayed

HAGERMAN—Hagerman school trustees Monday approved a \$600 raise to all teachers, bringing the base salary up to \$7,100.

Top salaries would rise to \$9,600. The addition to the raise is the lowest since 1965. It will be a \$171 increase for each year of experience.

Elections in zones 2 and 3 will be held May 21. The trustees posts are currently held by Louis Goppman and Vern Cox. The school budget hearing was set for June 2. A tentative budget

has not been set.

The chamber voiced support for a committee to look into the problem.

The chamber suggested several routes for a proposed four-mile highway through the Wood River Valley. Several objections were raised to allowing the highway to pass through Main Street.

Don Angell, city councilman, said, "If the highway runs through here it will kill Main Street shopping."

Some members suggested parking would be impossible on Main, provoking people to utilize shopping centers which may build on the outskirts.

The chamber decided to get a definite statement from the highway district on proposals before making any decisions.

The chamber will meet April 15 at noon to draft recommendations.

The chamber also decided to give \$35 to the Wood River High School scholarship fund.

Wendell chamber OK's bond

WENDELL — The Wendell Chamber of Commerce went on record this morning as supporting the \$965,000 school bond election.

Previous attempts have failed to narrow margins. LaRue said it takes two years to raise out on one vote.

Taxpayers interested in learning what the 11-mill levy increase will add to their taxes should multiply their assessed and valuation based on their tax statement by 0.11, LaRue said.

There are only minor changes in the present architectural plans from previous plans, he said. The point of the physical education building has been slightly redesigned and more storage has been added in some rooms.

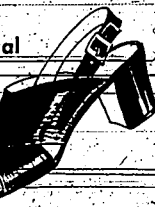

Nicklaus slight favorite over Miller in Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga.—(UPI)—Relaxed and confident Jack Nicklaus, winner of more major titles than any other golfer, past or present, was the

favorite today at the start of the Masters, but the oddsmaker thinks Johnny Miller's chances are almost as good.

Nicklaus, who already has four Masters among his 14 major championships, was to tee off at 11:55 a.m. MDT as a 3-1 favorite while Miller, winner of

four tournaments the first three months of this year was scheduled out an hour earlier as a 1-1 favorite.

Although he insists he has had no specific goals since winning the PGA last August and thereby eclipsing Bobby Jones' previous record for most major victories, the 27-year-old Nicklaus admitted he liked being in the favorite's role.

"I'm just dreading the day I'm not the favorite," said Nicklaus, also the only man to win more than \$2 million playing golf. "Although I don't have any specific goals for this year, I'd like to be in position to win all four major tournaments by the end of the year."

The Masters annually is the first leg of the so-called Grand Slam, which also includes the U.S. and British Opens and the PGA championship. Nicklaus has won all four at least twice, but never more than two the same year.

Thelma Ferguson, Gooding, has been appointed clinics chairman by Rex Palnter, Gooding County chairman of the Idaho Heart Association.

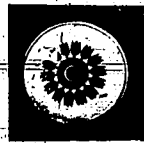
Clinics will be held from noon to 5 p.m. all four days. A five-minute resting period is required before blood pressure is measured.
