WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon has been given more time, at his request, to respond to a House Judiciary Committee subpoena for tape recordings and other materials relating to 42 of his Watergate-related conversations, a White House spokesman said today.

White House officials said the President intends to deliver a "sufficient, comprehensive and complete" response to the subpoena.

In New York Monday, "I hope the White House will follow that pattern. I've told him (Nixon) he should do anything reasonable to clear things up."

The Judiciary Committee last April 11 subpoenaed 42 tapes, conversations between Nixon and former White House aides on dates before and after the President said the first learned of the Watergate cover-up.

# University meets 2 of 11 charges

MOSCOW (UPI) — University of Idaho President Ernest Hartung says two of 11 charges made last week by the school's Black Student Union have already been met, but that certain other demands are inappropriate.

Hartung responded Monday in a six-page statement and touched on each demand made by the BSU in an April 17 communique.

The BSU generally demanded that the university take steps to change what it considered to be discriminatory practices toward minority race "black political methods" to accomplish BSU goals.

Hartung said his statement complied with the demand that the university submit a written response to the original BSU demands.

He also said revision had already been approved in student disciplinary regulations to allow student organizations to have their own choice of housing as other students starting next fall.

The BSU had demanded that black athletes be allowed to live in dorms.

However, Hartung said a demand that a minority person be hired immediately as director of intercultural programs was inappropriate and could not be resolved unilaterally.

ing of several one minority group, served by the office have made strong presentations in support of the present director and do not want a change, he said.

Hartung also took issue with a demand for a black cultural institute and a comprehensive black studies program.

He said the BSU had 36 black students in a student population of 7,100 and the university had no obligations to other students and the people of the state, who support the school through taxes.

Hartung also responded to a demand for more minority hiring instructors and counselors stating that the university's affirmative action program monitors hiring practices to insure that minority applicants are sought and carefully evaluated.

Though not collecting a BSU demand for a review of university hiring practices, Hartung suggested that the Idaho Commission on Human Rights or a similar group be sought out to conduct such a review.

The BSU demanded that a three-person committee be selected to review hiring practices made up of the Idaho Ed Board, a black staff member at nearby Washington State University.

# Aid program eyed

(C) Washington Star-News — The U.S. State Dept. administration is working out crash-aid program for Egypt estimated at \$250 million, including \$15 million for opening the Suez Canal, officials said.

This money will also go to help reconstruct devastated cities of the canal area. The program dramatizes the suddenly closer ties between Cairo and Washington, and the widening gap between Egypt and the Soviet Union.

However, officials expect a tough U.S. controversy in Congress, which must approve the new aid.

Since the 1967 war between Egypt and Israel, Egypt has received no more than \$500,000 yearly in technical aid from the U.S.

# 2 blacks sought in mass slaying

OGDEN, Utah (UPI) — Two blacks sought in the execution-style slaying of three persons and wounding of two others have apparently eluded a police dragnet, but city police said today they have "substantial leads in the mass slaying."

Police said the mass-slaying heard about 8 p.m. when two men forced their way into the shop. The store was robbed of an undetermined amount of cash and the four employees taken to the cellar and tied up. The men spent about 15 minutes in the shop, forcing their victims to drink some type of caustic acid which burned their faces and mouths. The victims were then all shot in the head with a small caliber weapon. The girl's body was found nude.

The elder Walker went to the store to see why his son was late getting off work and walked into the midst of the grisly scene. He was the only one to become one of the victims. Another son waiting outside heard his father's cries for help and kicked down a door to discover the murder scene. He summoned police. Hospital spokesmen said police guards were stationed outside the survivors' rooms.

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# Legality Valley Obituaries

(c) N. Y. Times Service SANTIAGO, Chile — The trial of 52 Air Force officials and 10 civilians accused of sedition and Marxist sympathies has led to the first public debate here over the legality of the military junta's overthrow of the elected Marxist cabinet last September and its conduct since.

The Air Force court-martial has been far more open than both supporters and opponents of the junta and foreign legal observers expected.

Defense attorneys have been permitted to raise as many issues and call as many witnesses as they have wished. The prosecution has also broadened the legal and political scope of the trial by arguing that the Marxist government, though legally elected, had lost its legitimacy and become "the enemy of the armed forces and the nation."

Civil libertarians, noting that hundreds of Chileans have been tried in closed courts-martial, have suggested that the junta may use the Air Force trials as a "showcase."

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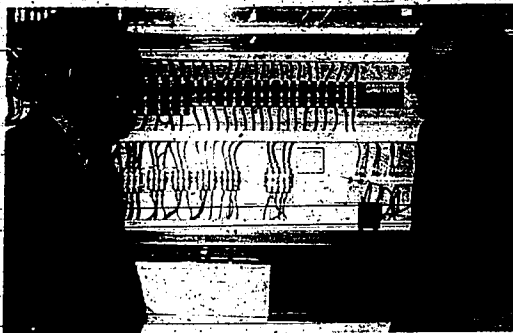

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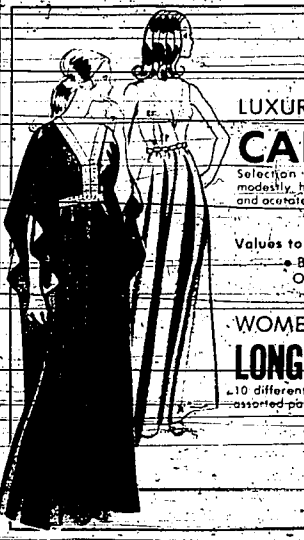

Much Praise due on TF zone plan

The Twin Falls County commissioners, their zoning advisers and the many people who participated in the creation of the new Twin Falls County zoning ordinance should be commended.

Given the fact that it is impossible to please everyone, it should be said that the new zoning ordinance is a reasonable compromise which should do much to shape the future growth of the county.

The ordinance is perhaps the most important single governmental planning action since the well-intentioned but ill-fated attempt to lay out the original Twin Falls townsite on a diagonal pattern about 70 years ago.

The county commissioners showed a healthy determination to solicit the opinions of the public. They persevered through two years of continual pressure from organized lobbies and suggestions of many interested citizens.

The history of the ordinance, which has been repeatedly amended, suggests the commissioners attempted — and succeeded — in keeping an open mind.

Among the major accomplishments of the zoning ordinance:

— It buys valuable time for the Snake River Canyon rim. The rimland will be retained in agricultural zoning at least until a comprehensive land-use plan is developed.

— The ordinance partially limits expansion of strip commercial development along major highways leading into Twin Falls. Earlier drafts had long "fingers" of commercial development lining the highways.

— The ordinance backs away from a two-mile-long residential appendix along the road leading south to the airport. The designation of land along the airport road as agricultural should cause the city of Twin Falls to think twice about a major sewer-line plan to extend over two miles to the airport.

— The ordinance limits trailer-houses to areas at the northwest and south of the city, and bans them from prime development sites to the northeast and east of the city.

— Requires environmental impact studies for all conditional uses, zoning variances and changes in subdivisions, planned unit developments and mobile-home parks.

— Tightens up some of the zoning categories previously in use, and creates a wider variety of zones.

In spite of its accomplishments, the ordinance incorporates several troublesome things. For one, it provides a rather large area for residential developments. In this respect, it does too little to halt reckless urban sprawl.

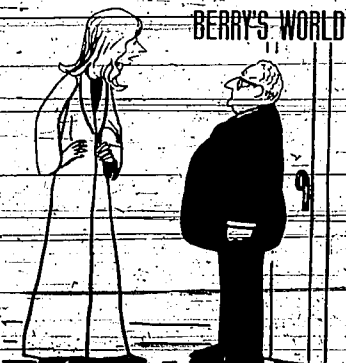
And it provides for a three-man review committee to consider all conditional or questionable uses in any zone. There is no requirement that the review committee notify the general public of pending applications for conditional uses, a situation that could be used to bypass public input into major decisions.

However, taken as a whole the ordinance is a major accomplishment. It should be given strong support by the public.

The county commissioners now have an even harder task before them. They must show the courage to stick by their guns to strictly enforce the zoning ordinance. The pressures from interest groups predictably will be immense.

The history of zoning in many sadder but wiser communities has been that of gradual erosion of zoning designs until zoning becomes a winked-at charade.

Twin Falls County has most of its growth ahead of it. If the county commissioners have enough courage and public support to enable them to see their plan through, their great-grandchildren still will think of Twin Falls County as a good place to live.

Watching trees wrong

WASHINGTON — In any catalog of President Nixon's troubles, a certain incongruity would rank high on the list.

One part of him — the best part — is the world statesman, seeking peace into the year 2000. Another part of him — a more responsible part — is the Washington politician, fretting at the gnawing irritations of the press.

This combination of "bigness and littleness" surely is not unique to Nixon. Doubtless every president has manifested the same symptoms to some degree. One recalls Harry Truman and the music critic, Dwight Eisenhower's private tantrums, John Kennedy's anathema upon the Herald-Tribune, Lyndon Johnson's boiling rages. Farther back in our history, Thomas Jefferson repeatedly denounced the newspapers with an eloquence Nixon has never approached.

Yet other presidents, in other times, had something goes for them that Nixon does not have. Their lapses from greatness made them only human. Nixon, alas, is made to seem only paranoid.

This past week, Connecticut's Sen. Lowell Weicker made public another set of White House documents acquired by the Senate select committee in the course of its Watergate hearings. Among the documents is a memorandum prepared for H. R. Haldeman by Jeb Stuart Magruder in mid-October, 1969. It is a detailed list of "approximately 27" requests from the President in the past year for "negative" information relating to what could be considered unfair news coverage.

The list is too long to quote in full here. A few examples will have to suffice. On Sept. 23, the President had read an Evans-Novak column charging that Nixon was retreating on tax reform. The President wanted some answers prepared. Ralph Nader had said the President was paying too little attention to consumer affairs; the President "wanted" a critical article; Herbert Klein and Ron Ziegler were directed to mount a counterattack. On Oct. 7, John Chancellor of NBC had said something unfavorable about the nomination of Clement

Haynsworth to the Supreme Court, the President instructed Klein "that you demand equal time."

Magruder's memorandum chronicles half a dozen instances in which the President himself proposed to bend the press to his own "image-making purposes."

What emerges from this poignant document is a picture of a President suffering from a terrible insecurity. The least thing was enough to trigger a presidential request for counteraction. He was fretting away significant time and energy worrying about Dan Rather, Jack Anderson, and Howard K. Smith.

At the time Magruder's summary was prepared in the fall of 1969, Richard Nixon had been actively in public life for more than 20 years — as congressman, senator, vice president, candidate for governor of California, and winning candidate for president.

He was beginning the overtures that eventually would lead to Peking. He was meeting with the heads of state of Israel, Mexico, New Zealand and Iran. Yet neither his long experience nor his heavy schedule allowed him to ignore the petty chirping of the daily press.

This same defensive obsession runs through much of the Watergate story. Time after time this complex and sensitive man, whose greatest gift in world affairs is to see the big picture, has lost the big picture entirely.

And one of the reasons he now faces his greatest political crisis is that, when he should have been looking at the forest, he was looking at the trees instead.

White House staff power next Ford target?

DETROIT — Well before Vice President Ford was rebuked by White House Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler for being "the source of not straight news" in a possible Ford cabinet, the outlines of a major speech denouncing arrogance of power by a President's White House staff were beginning to take shape in Ford's mind.

Being pressed by political intimates and purveyors to make such an encore to his assault last month on the "arrogant, elite guard of political adolescents" controlling the Committee for the Re-Election of the President (CREP).

But Ford, aware of the position at the pinnacle of Republican influence, would cut much closer to the bone by attacking the old Berlin wall of H. R. Haldeman and John Ehrlichman.

Moreover, even before Ford's complaining speech, the White House mood changed. Whereas resentment had previously been directed strictly against Ford's staff for

insufficient loyalty to Nixon, it is now being aimed at the vice president himself. The White House was outraged by the New Republican magazine article last week that left no doubt Ford was the source.

The vice president is aware of all this. As Republican leader in the House, he was excluded by the Berlin wall. Hence, a warning by him against any future president permitting his inner staff to monopolize power is regarded by him as a public duty. But it would also be a political tonk-strike.

Thus, Ford has come far since he took the

oath of office under President Nixon's gaze. No political figure has shot from obscurity to acknowledged presidential hot-apparatus so fast, and none with so few inherent political problems ahead.

A symbol of Ford's position in the Republican Party is the way he can speak even on such forbidden subjects as changes he would make in the Nixon cabinet if he became president tomorrow.

Republican leaders have said nothing. Ford has so clearly become the depository of the party's future — hopes that even Nixonite stalwarts (outside the White House) hesitate to rebuke him.

The applause was deafening when a letter from Sen. Robert Griffin was read stating that "Jerry Ford's service to the nation has just

begun." It was thunderous when Rep. William Broomfield of Michigan talked about Ford's "unique ability to bring people together, and that's what we need in this country today."

But an amplifier was needed to hear the scintillating applause when Ford praised Nixon and declared him "innocent of any of these charges that have been made against him."

The future holds some risks: He will be the party's aspirant in this year's midterm election, and could be contaminated to the extent his party loses seats in a possible Democratic landslide. But a confident Ford, seems totally unconcerned.

"That would be a problem," he told us. "If I were a candidate for President, but I'm not." Ford's closest political friends don't believe that disclaimer. Moreover, the feud between his staff and Nixon's adds to the disbelief. Ford's lieutenants perceive him not as the President's right-hand man but as the single most influential Republican in the country.

Foreign ministers emerging from shadows

PARIS — A political phenomenon marking the early 1970's was diminishment in the role of foreign ministers.

Everywhere there seemed increased tendency by the executive to assume direct control of policy while leaning less upon the normal diplomatic apparatus.

No sharp dividing line underscores this shift in the United States. It started after John Foster Dulles resigned. It flourished in Nixon's first years when he leaned on Henry Kissinger, his national security adviser.

Meanwhile, similar developments were occurring elsewhere. In France, DeGaulle, then Pompidou, used such Elysee Palace strongmen as Alain De Boissier and Robert to oversee application of their wishes.

In London, Prime Minister Heath placed Sir Alex Douglas-Home in the foreign office but overshadowed him on matters such as Common Market negotiations.

To Bonn, Chancellor Willy Brandt employed Egon Bahr, to handle secret parleys with Communist states. Even Brezhnev depended more on Andrei Alexandrov, than on his foreign minister to handle East-West dealings.

In conversations with such men as Nixon, Kissinger, DeGaulle, Pompidou, Zolbert and Brandt, I discovered a general belief that this development was imposed by the nature of our epoch.

Today, it is not even possible to discern that the era of giants ended with De Gaulle's departure, it is possible to see a change in administrative methods arising from the break-up of the group who inherited leadership. With Heath's ouster, Pompidou's death and Nixon's weakening position, the foreign minister lurking in the shadows re-emerge.

In America and France, this was achieved by naming Kissinger and Robert to the foreign ministries themselves. While they remained brilliantly able — and loyal lieutenants, the

weakening of Nixon's authority and Pompidou's physical decline gave more power to the ministries Kissinger and Robert took over.

This process was mirrored elsewhere. Brandt came to rely less fully on Bahr and Walter Scheel, his foreign minister, gained influence. Scheel will shortly move up to the federal presidency and Dietrich Genscher, present interior minister, will replace him.

In England, the new Harold Wilson government has pushed its foreign secretary, James Callaghan, into the foreground.

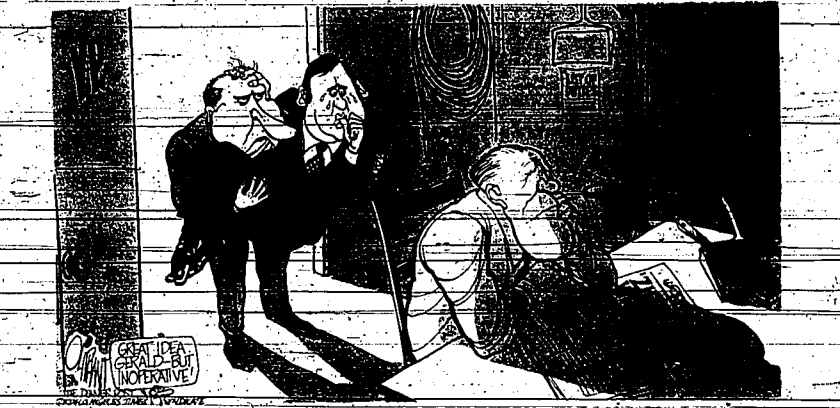
Even in Moscow there seems to be a effort to bolster the foreign minister's position by naming Andrei Gromyko to the Politburo.

The ministers, almost everywhere, are moving again to stage. In Washington, Kissinger was helped in this process by Nixon's steadily

weaker personal position which allowed the new secretary a fuller role.

How will this phase proceed as the old executive leadership slips gradually away?

Today, the traditional apparatus has assumed greater diplomatic responsibility. We must now see who holds the executive reins — and whether they will devise new policies or replace ministers charged with applying old ones.

After the American Civil Liberties Union filed suit in federal court to halt the random stop and search of black men, about 300 community coalition members called outside City Hall chanting, "Stop Police dragnet."

### Warning issued by SLA general

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — An FBI official says he has to assume for the moment that a tape recording and pencilled note claiming to be from the Symbionese Liberation Army are authentic. "We cannot treat it as a hoax at this point," John M. Reed, special agent in charge of the FBI office in Sacramento, Calif., said late Monday after the recording and note were received by the Sacramento office. The messages said that five California policemen would be killed "for every SLA member murdered."

### Romney cites 'loyalty'

RICHMOND, Va. (UPI) — Former Housing and Urban Development Secretary George Romney says President Nixon must have known what his top aides were doing at the time of the Watergate break-in. "John Mitchell, Maurice Stans, John Ehrlichman, Bob Haldeman — they didn't do anything without making certain this was what the President wanted them to do," Romney said. "I don't think they did anything without his approval."

## Tax relief pushed

CHICAGO (UPI) — Fifteen Democratic governors Monday urged Congress to push through tax relief for the low and middle income families hit hardest by inflation. In a statement sent to the Democratic leadership of Congress, the governors joined in urging relief "for those citizens adversely affected by this unprecedented inflation through selected tax credits or exemptions." The statement, coming at the end of a two-day conference, did not mention a specific tax relief program. But Kentucky Gov. Wendell Ford, chairman of the Democratic Governors Conference, said they supported the tax cut bill sponsored by the Democratic Sens. Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts and Walter Mondale of Minnesota.

Ford said all governors are aggrieved by the lack of confidence in government, taxes, the energy shortage and campaign financing were the major problems facing the nation. Individual governors submitted about a dozen resolutions that were forwarded for consideration at the National Governors' Conference which is scheduled for June. "Three of the resolutions were sent with the unanimous backing of the 15 governors present at the Chicago meeting."

Urging continuation of price controls on the health care industry until Congress passes a national health insurance program, the conferees agreed April 23. Asking that no rail freight lines be shut down until thorough review has been given to a proposal that would eliminate approximately 25 percent of the nation's freight lines.

Urging passage of a bill allowing all citizens to register to vote by mailing a post-card to federal or state authorities. Before the conference ended, the governors also forwarded resolutions urging public financing of campaigns, rent increases due to the energy crisis and free broadcast time for presidential, congressional, gubernatorial and legislative candidates.

**Tax cut said unwise**  
LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Economist John Kenneth Galbraith said Monday that it would be unwise to cut taxes during the present period of heavy inflation. He said that he was parting company with many of his fellow liberals in the Congress on that issue. "I don't think you can reduce taxes with this kind of inflation," Galbraith said in an appearance at USC.

Galbraith, an economic adviser to various Democratic administrations and a former ambassador to India during the Kennedy administration, said "it wouldn't make sense to cut taxes during a period of runaway inflation."

## No survivors sighted

DENPASAR, Bali (UPI) — Airborne rescue teams found no signs of life today in the scattered wreckage of a Pan American World Airways jetliner that crashed into jungle mountainside on the island of Bali with 107 persons aboard.

Search and rescue coordination headquarters on the resort island of Bali said by nightfall helicopters and other rescue aircraft had not sighted survivors when they overflew the crash site on a 4,743-foot mountain slope. Among the 96 passengers were 28 Americans, one of them Hilton Hotel executive Maurice Reynold of New York City. A Pan American spokesman in New York said that by nightfall rescue teams got only within three miles of the crash site after 15 hours of struggling to get through heavy undergrowth and rugged terrain.

**Conspiracy trial testimony ends**  
NEW YORK — Testimony in the criminal conspiracy trial of John N. Mitchell and Maurice H. Stans ended Monday, and the case is expected to go to the jury Wednesday night.

Tuesday will be devoted to summations by defense lawyers; the government probably will not sum up its case until Wednesday. This will be followed by the judge's charge to the jury, and then it will be up to the jury to decide.

Among the last witnesses to testify Monday was John W. Dean III, former counsel to President Nixon, who twice before had testified in this trial for the government.

In all, the jury heard, in 42 trial days, 50 persons on the witness stand, 45 of them solely for the government. Fifteen persons testified for the defense, and three testified for each side. On Friday and Monday the government put on nine witnesses to rebut the defense; four of them had testified previously in this trial. Former Attorney General Mitchell and former Secretary of Commerce Stans, who were leaders of President Nixon's re-election campaign, are accused of attempting to impede a securities and exchange commission investigation of Robert L. Vesco, a financier, on return to a secret, \$200,000 cash contribution that Vesco made to the campaign. Vesco also was indicted in this case, but has fled the country.

Rescheduled Monday mainly against Stans, Stans had testified that he withheld contribution from the SEC on the advice of Dean, given over the telephone and once when the two men were lying together from Washington to New York.

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

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



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# US court takes anti-obscenity powers case

**WASHINGTON**—The Supreme Court, again confronting the issue of obscenity, agreed Monday to decide when federal courts have the authority to strike down state anti-obscenity laws.  
 The justices, in a brief order, said they will hear the appeal of the State of New Jersey, whose statute was invalidated last July by a special three-judge federal court.  
 A final decision on the New Jersey case is expected to be handed down by the justices some time next winter—

aristic, political or scientific value," and "material that does not depict or describe sexual conduct in a patently offensive manner."  
 In the appeal, New Jersey Atty. Gen. George F. Kugler Jr., contended the federal judiciary should have refrained from ruling on the state law.  
 He said he had issued a

directive after the Supreme Court's guidelines were issued last June, instructing all law enforcement officials in the state to enforce those guidelines despite their variance with the state law.  
 Kugler argued that his enforcement policy was based upon the strong likelihood that New Jersey courts would construe the

state's anti-obscenity statute so as to incorporate the guidelines from the Supreme Court.  
 The intrusion of the federal court, Kugler said, "seriously impairs the ability of the state judiciary to discharge its responsibilities and thus tears at the very roots of our federalism."  
 The federal panel ruled on a

suit brought by several movie theater operators who showed the film "Deep Throat" and by the proprietors of an adult bookstore.  
 The court refused to hear Chicago's plea for the authority to fire six police officers who invoked the 5th Amendment and refused to testify before a grand jury.  
 The six were dismissed for

violating the police regulation requiring all officers to answer questions when summoned before a grand jury. They had been called to testify in a probe of police corruption.  
 However, a federal judge and the 7th US Court of Appeals reinstated the officers, stating that the city could not intrude on their 5th Amendment right against self-incrimination.

## Mole keeps digging



# Probe checks IRS tie

**WASHINGTON**—Investigators for the Senate Watergate Committee now believe the White House played a major role in coordinating the Internal Revenue Service's investigation of a controversial \$100,000 campaign contribution from Howard R. Hughes, well-placed sources said Monday.  
 The sources said the investigators had recently interrogated J. Fred Buzhardt, President Nixon's counsel for more than three hours behind closed doors and decided to "order him back for further questioning because of what was depicted as Buzhardt's 'evasive' testimony."  
 Buzhardt could not be reached for comment, but another White House official, who did not wish to be named, was "harsh in his criticism of the Senate investigators, led by Terry F. Tenzler, a former assistant United States attorney for New York." The White House said he was referring to newspaper accounts in the last two weeks about the committee's progress in tracing the \$100,000 contribution, which was given by the Hughes Corporation in cash to Charles G. Rebozo, one of President Nixon's closest personal friends.  
 The New York Times and other newspapers have published accounts of testimony by Herbert W. Kalmbach, before the committee, which Kalmbach, President Nixon's former personal attorney reportedly told on April 19, 1973, conversation with Rebozo, in the conversation according to the accounts of the Kalmbach testimony, Rebozo said he had used the \$100,000—given him in \$50,000 increments in 1969 and 1970—for personal gifts or loans to President Nixon's two daughters, E. Donald Nixon and Edward C. Nixon, and his personal secretary, Rose Mary Woods.

# Oil search plan scored

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—Representatives of oil states, the petroleum industry and the House of Representatives lined up against a proposal to create a federal energy corporation to compete with private business in developing and marketing energy.  
 At a hearing Monday before the Senate Commerce Committee, opponents termed the plan a step toward "expropriation" and "nationalization" of the oil industry.  
 Sen. Adlai E. Stevenson III, D-Ill., author of the proposal, said the energy problem boils down to the fact that a few companies control supplies and prices and they do not really compete.  
 Stevenson's Consumer Energy Act of 1974 would put lids on oil and gas prices, would extend federal regulation of natural gas rates to sales within the states and would establish a Federal Oil and Gas Corp.

 WASHINGTON—Saudi Arabia has indicated it will propose a sharp cut in oil prices and a sharp increase in production, during Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's Middle East visit next week, administration sources disclose.  
 A key official in the Federal Energy Office said there were signs the Saudis are prepared to reduce prices by more than one-third and raise production the same amount—lowering the posted price from \$11.65 to \$7 a barrel—and increasing production from 10 million to 12 million barrels a day.  
 Such a move would remove the threat of a renewed energy shortage in the United States for several years.  
 The concessions—designed to reward the United States for its peace efforts and spur an Israeli withdrawal from Syria—would have to be approved immediately by the four major members of the oil-producing bloc.

 Lobbying by the trial lawyers and the insurance companies was blamed by Sen. Frank E. Moss (D-Utah) for the fact no meaningful no-fault auto insurance bill ever has been passed by Congress or by any state legislature.

 The U.S. Postal Service said Monday it would abide by a Canadian government request to suspend mail service because of a strike by postal workers, which has made it impossible to deliver letters and packages already stacked up in mailrooms across Canada.

During her telephone call to the Jerome police, Mrs. Reasch said she heard "several gun blasts. She could not say how many."

She returned to the front door screen to see the man leave the Moore house and return to his pickup.

She saw the man reload the gun at the pickup and re-enter the home, she said. Three "loud, kind of deliberate" blasts could be heard in the Moore house after the man re-entered, Mrs. Reasch said.

The man then "nonchalantly" left the Moore house again, got into the pickup, and "drove off at a normal speed," she said.

"He was just as cool as they come," Mrs. Reasch said.

After the man drove off, Mrs. Reasch said she left her home and crossed to the Moore home, where she saw Mr. Moore lying on his side on the living room floor. "He was not moving," she said. She said she still had a "dreadful" fear.

Mrs. Reasch then returned to her home to call the police again. As she was returning to the telephone, her husband, Lawrence "Shorty" Reasch, returned home, she said.

Reasch said Mr. Moore appeared at her door and yelled to him across the street as he was getting out of his automobile.

"Shorty, I need help," Mrs. Moore said, according to Reasch.

Mrs. Reasch's recollection of the incident is confused after her second telephone call to the police, but she said Mrs. Moore "somehow" was brought to her house where she was comforted.

Mrs. Reasch said she telephoned Mrs. Moore's physician.

"She told me she hid in the kitchen," Mrs. Reasch said.

Mrs. Reasch said there was a time span of "about five or ten minutes" between the time she saw the gun and the time that Mrs. Moore appealed for help.

She said she heard no screams or yells during the shootings.

Mrs. Reasch said she was "very close" to Joy Nelms, "just like sisters."

She said the Moores were "ordinarily friendly" neighbors.

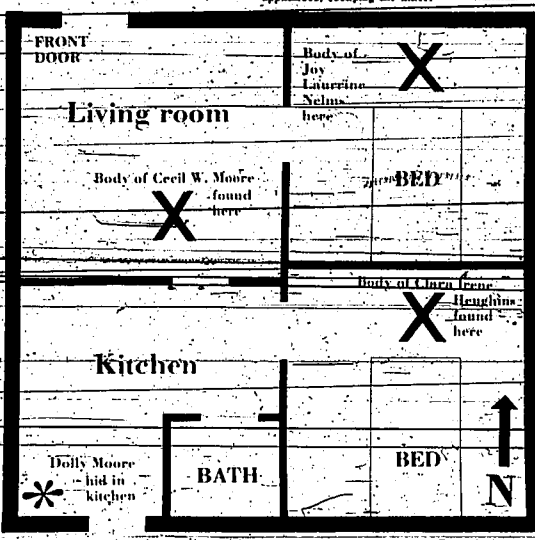

**TWIN FALLS** — Rep. Hugh Olmstead, R-Twin Falls, Monday dubbed the 1973 legislative term as "the year of the big spenders."

Olmstead addressed the Twin Falls County Republican Women's Club along with Rep. William Roberts, R-Buhl; Rep. Ray Lincoln, R-Twin Falls; and Sen. John Barker, R-Buhl.

Because of unprecedented agricultural prosperity, Olmstead said, the state had \$52 million or 26 percent more money this year than it had last year for programs.

Having spent these additional dollars, the state is "probably becoming addicted" to "bigger" government programs, he said. The likely result, Olmstead maintained, is less prosperous times, taxes will be raised.

Olmstead also termed the legislative session "backward" because a great deal of time was spent considering the more minor issues which came at the first part of the session. Most of the important appropriations bills were rushed through in the last three or four days of the term, he said.

Olmstead called for the streamlined bills being brought out of committee earlier in the session so that these measures can receive more attention in the House and Senate.

As a member of the party's more conservative wing, Olmstead said he came home from the session "bloodied and bruised." He likened himself to a dog who barks at cars.

The dog has no chance to catch the vehicles, but sure enjoys barking, he said.

According to investigating officers with the Idaho State Police, the accident occurred about a quarter mile east of the intersection when Sherman was in the right lane of the US 93 and struck a power pole, knocking the pole into the roadway.

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## 27 more dairy cows marked for slaughter

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**JEROME** — National Farm Organization dairymen committed another 27 pregnant dairy cows for slaughter at an NFO meeting here Monday night.

Together with the 33 animals promised to the meat cleaver Friday, about 60 pregnant cows have been committed so far, according to Rich Curtis, NFO dairy chairman for the western Magic Valley.

This action is part of a nationwide NFO protest of government policies allowing importation of huge quantities of cheap and inferior milk. The national cheese market has fallen 90 percent in the past two weeks because of the flood of these imports, dairymen say.

Curtis said he hopes to send between 60 and 65 pregnant cows Thursday to slaughter at a meat plant either in Stockton, Calif., Ontario, or in Roberts.

"We don't want to do this. But we are not going to take less than the cost of production," Curtis said.

In recent months the government has been importing 10 times the normal amount of cheese coming in from abroad, he said. Curtis said that much of this foreign produced cheese has been stockpiled and is now being released to flood the market at one time.

The mostly European foreign cheese is cheaper because, unlike the situation in the United States, foreign governments generally subsidize their dairymen, Curtis said.

"They're forcing us to compete against these cheaper imports," he said.

Curtis maintained that driving the American dairy farmers out of business will only lead to insecure dependence on imports. "If people think the 'free' crisis is bad, they haven't seen anything but imports are cut out," he said.

US Department of Agriculture figures indicate that many American dairymen are cutting down production or going out of business. Seasonally adjusted USDA data show that national milk production has declined for 17 months in a row.

The production drop has occurred despite soaring milk prices. In March 1973, \$1.40 was being paid to dairy farmers for a hundredweight of milk. This March dairymen sold milk at \$1.90 per hundredweight, up 36 percent.

But Twin Falls dairy farmer Alvin Smutny said he made half as much profit the first 90 days of this year as he made during the same period last year. Coupled with the jump in milk prices, he said, was a two-fold production cost hike.

"If cheese producers pass on the full brunt of the market drop, dairymen will soon receive 75 cents for 100 pounds of milk."

NFO's figures put the cost of producing milk at \$1.40, \$1.90 per hundredweight, with costs including interest on buildings, and land,

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# Market Review

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — Climbing interest rates, and a tough monetary stance by Federal Reserve Chairman Arthur Burns pulled stocks broadly lower at the opening Tuesday on the New York Stock Exchange. The trading was moderate.

The Dow Jones industrial average had fallen 1.25 to 857.32 shortly after the opening. Declines led a two-tone edge over advances among the 385 stocks traded.

Burns' statement Monday confirming his determination to keep the lid on the nation's monetary aggregates may have cheered some on Wall Street who believe the tide of inflation has to be turned. But the appearance of a recession is not serious question whether the nation's economy can turn upward in the second half of 1974 as had been widely hoped.

In one of Burns' strongest anti-inflationary statements in months, he said, "We are not going to sit back and prepare a monetary path for a continuation of rapid inflation." He said, "We hope to do our part in subduing it. Let there be no mistaking its determination in doing this."

On the interest rate front, Franklin National Bank of New York Monday raised the prime rate. The interest charged on a loan to best commercial borrowers was up 1/2 point to 10 1/2 percent.

The nation's banks are widely expected to follow with similar rises this week.

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WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate will debate this week whether taxpayers should pay poultry raisers millions of dollars in compensation for the 1967 Mississippi chicken massacre.

B. Allen, D-Ala.; John Sparkman, D-Ala.; Sam Ervin, D-N.C.; Jesse A. Helms, R-N.C.; J. William Fulbright, D-Ark.; and Edward J. Gurney, R-Tex., plus Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M. The Agriculture Department stated its opposition to direct compensation for the poultry firms when a House committee held hearings on a plan similar to Eastland's, sponsored by 25 congressmen. The Agriculture spokesman was the only opponent to speak up at that hearing. In the Senate, opponents reportedly are drumming up "amendments" to the Eastland bill, demanding like compensation for economic interest groups in their own states, such as mushroom growers and cattle-feed producers, in hopes they will price the valuable bill out of the political market.

AF reservoir fills to maximum level

BURLEY — The American Falls Reservoir filled to the restriction point, elevation 4342.2 feet, with 1.12 million acre feet of water April 18, 1974. Carlos W. Randolph, 1714 S. 10th St., Project Superintendent, said. The contractor constructing piers for the new highway bridge immediately below the dam (finished the April 11). The discharge from American Falls Dam has been given to facilitate the work since December, 1973. Water releases from the dam are now flowing through that work area. The Snake River watershed in the Island Park and Jackson Lake areas now contains about the same amount of water in the snowpack as in 1971. Randolph said there is 150 inches of snow on Lewis Lake

Divide containing 64 inches of water at this time. There is flood control space available at this time in Island Park, Grassy Lake, Jackson and Fallsides Reservoirs. The filling of the available space will provide flood protection downstream. The controlled discharge from Island Park is 1,000 cfs; Jackson Lake, 4,000 cfs and Fallsides, 15,000 cfs, as needed. Flood space in the reservoirs is provided consistent with available data from the Upper Snake River watershed. Water from the snowpack will fill all reservoirs on the Upper Snake; supplying water in ample amounts for the 1974 irrigation season. Shoshone Falls continues to be a fine display of hydraulic power in action, Randolph said.

Cattle futures off

CHICAGO — Live cattle futures fell to near limit losses Monday in all options. Prices fell sharply late in the session. Commodity News Service reported final quotations ranged from 55 cents lower in nearby June to 97 cents lower in October. Volume was 9,597. Prices opened lower, with most weakness in the back. Prices retreated steadily until late session when heavy cash interest selling and brisk local pressure shoved the middle contracts down the daily limit. Some observers said uncertainty concerning the market's direction created

liquidating pressure, although the market was ready to react to any force from either side. Dressed beef markets held firm at 56 cents per pound for 50-70 pound beef carcasses. A sharp overrun in the cash markets contributed to the early pressure in the light meat trade, which 700-800 pound carcasses were selling for 65¢ per hundredweight. Revised egg contract set in San Francisco — On Monday morning the Pacific Commodity Exchange Inc. began trading in its revised western shell egg contract. The major revisions from the previous contract are that deluging now takes place at approved producers plants, with inspection there final and tendered delivery no longer required. Grade remains U.S. next Fin but now must be at least 90 per cent A and AA quality to enable the buyer to transport eggs while still maintaining acceptable grade at destination.

Gem spuds close lower

CHICAGO — Idaho russet potato futures closed 20 points lower Monday. After trading unevenly in an attempt to find any opening, the futures option settled at \$18.95 hundredweight, Commodity News Service reported. There were 20 carlots traded. The close seemed to reflect limit losses in May Minut potatoes on the New York market. There appeared to be little clear consensus on the future despite rising cash market prices. In New York, Maine potatoes closed with limit declines after falling sharply four successive days. The nearby contract opened 20 cents lower and dropped another 30 cents. New York's main crop is expected to range from 5 cents lower to 10 cents higher. Volume was estimated at 388 carlots.

Idaho stock levels down

BOISE (UPI) — A decline in the number of cattle on feed for slaughter in Idaho feedlots the first of the month was reported by the Cattle and Calfstock Service. The service said there were 10 per cent fewer calves year ago. On hand April 1 of this year, the number of calves was 172,000, which compared with 192,000 last year and 227,000 the year before. The biggest decline in production was with heifers, which was off 30 per cent. While production declined, the service said that higher prices for cattle, sheep and hogs pushed growth in heifers. In 1973 a record 434,752, or up 12 per cent from 1972.

Farm 600 wild horses located in Idaho

BOISE (UPI) — A state-wide inventory conducted by the Bureau of Land Management, has identified 600 wild and free-roaming horses on national resource lands in Idaho, according to Idaho BLM Director William L. Matthews. Matthews said the horses remaining from the Lost River herd, held by the Forest Service and BLM in Idaho Falls, are not included in the 600 figure. The inventory was conducted according to regulations set by

the Wild and Free-Roaming Horses and Burros Act of 1971. Action is presently underway which will lead to the formulation of management plans for each herd of wild horses, according to the BLM. As progress is made in the development of plans, public comment and suggestions will be solicited. Horsemen were given until Nov. 15, 1973, to file claims for horses running on national resource lands without authorization. But Jens Jensen, Boise, range chief for the BLM in Idaho, said spite of the deadline, some owners can still claim a horse loose on the range. Jensen said the horse must be branded, or two, he must have proof that the horse was in his custody after Dec. 15, 1973. Anyone who may have lost a horse on the range is advised that permission must be obtained, prior to any attempt to recover, from the local BLM district office, Jensen said.
