Henry, Saudis confer; Cairo next on schedule

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (UPI) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger arrived in Saudi Arabia today to report on the Israeli-Syrian troop-disengagement negotiations and received an "our friend Henry" welcome from Foreign Minister Omar Sqaq. Kissinger took time off from the negotiations to visit two of the most important Arab supporters in the Middle East — King Faisal of Saudi Arabia and President Anwar Sadat of Egypt, both of whom have backed his efforts to ease Middle East tensions. He flies on to Cairo tonight while Syria and Israel ponder the latest compromise proposals for ending their war of attrition. His shuttle diplomacy will take him back to both Jerusalem and Damascus before the weekend is over. Israeli Foreign Minister Abba Eban said Wednesday night after further talks in Tel Aviv with Kissinger that the Syrian negotiations had reached the "concrete stage." Kissinger was less optimistic, saying only that some progress was made, but no agreement was reached. In his airport statement Kissinger said that in his talks with King Faisal, "we will also discuss in detail bilateral cooperation between our two countries, which we are now in the process of establishing."

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WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Peter W. Rodino, D-N.J., told the nation today at the opening of historic impeachment hearings that the House Judiciary Committee understands its "high constitutional responsibility" and "will faithfully live up to it." In an opening statement carried live on television and radio before the committee began "four days" of closed hearings to receive impeachment evidence against President Nixon, Rodino, the committee chairman, said: "I don't need to stress again the importance of our undertaking and the wisdom, honor and principle which we must bring to it." Rodino added: "We understand our high constitutional responsibility. We will faithfully live up to it. For some time we have known that the real security of this nation lies in the integrity of its institutions and the trust and informed competence of its people. We will conduct our deliberations in that spirit." The impeachment hearings opened as Republican criticism of Nixon was becoming more open, and the White House continued to stress he had no intention of resigning. The committee's 194-member staff has been gathering the evidence since January, but until now the committee's 38 congressmen — all lawyers and none nationally known — has concerned itself with procedural matters. Wearing earphones in a scene comparable to a United Nations debate, the congressmen will listen to some of the 10 recorded Nixon conversations it has received, including the famous March 21, 1973, discussion of whether to meet E. Howard Hunt's demands for blackmail. At the outset, 17 members, all Democrats, were believed leaning toward a vote to recommend impeachment to the House. Thirteen members, all Republicans, were believed leaning against such a vote unless hard evidence of Nixon's guilt of a major "criminal violation" is presented. Eight members — four Democrats, four Republicans — were believed undecided. Except for formal opening statements today's hearing, at 1 p.m. EDT in a high-ceilinged chamber in the Rayburn Office Building, across Independence Avenue from the Capitol, was closed to the public for the presentation of confidential evidence. This includes the contents of the briefcase submitted to the panel by the Watergate grand jury after it was told by special Watergate prosecutor Leon Jaworski that it lacked authority to indict a chief executive. Televised hearings are expected to be held starting May 21 with the committee meeting weekdays through Thursdays. Rhodes said he was not recommending that the President resign. Industrial price hikes push April index higher

WASHINGTON — Sharp increases in prices of industrial goods offset a drop in agricultural prices in April raising the wholesale price index 0.7 per cent, the Labor Department said today. The rise in the broad index was only about half as large as the March increase, and it was the smallest price advance since the decline last October. Nevertheless, the 0.7 per cent April increase, adjusted to discount seasonal influences, works out to an annual rate of 8.4 per cent — highly inflationary by all but present standards. In "absolute" terms, without seasonal adjustment, wholesale prices rose 0.5 per cent from March to April. Two months of declines in agricultural prices at wholesale indicate that retail food prices will remain relatively stable or decline, at least for a while. However, sharp increases in wholesale industrial prices point to a rise in the price of most other goods bought by consumers. Prices of refined petroleum products declined last month, after soaring since last fall. But energy problems were reflected in rapid price increases for coal and most other fuels. The total wholesale price index has risen at a

seasonally adjusted annual rate of 13.8 per cent during the last three months, and the index last month was 18.8 per cent higher than in April, 1973. Farm prices dropped 4.3 per cent seasonally adjusted last month, and prices of processed foods and feeds declined 1.9 per cent. Combined, the agricultural category declined 3 per cent, but these prices still were 14.7 per cent above April, 1973. Industrial commodities, which are considered the most significant reflection of underlying inflationary trends, rose 2.3 per cent in price last month following a 2.9 per cent rise in March. These prices have averaged a combined 0.6 of 2.4 per cent in the last three months, and in April were 20.7 per cent higher than a year earlier. Metals, paper and chemicals accounted for nearly three-fifths of the increase in industrial prices.

Israeli jets hit foes

By United Press-International. Israel sent its air force into action against Syrian and Arab guerrillas today in the first air strikes since Monday. The Israeli national radio reported only light artillery and tank shelling. The air action came as Syria was reported to have called for an Arab summit conference, a meeting which could complicate the Middle East peace mission of Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger. The Israeli command said Israel jets strafed Syrian positions around strategic Mt. Hermon and guerrilla concentrations near the Lebanese frontier between 2 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. "All planes returned safely to base," a command communiqué said. The command carrier reported shelling exchanges for the 59th consecutive day around Mt. Hermon and in the southern sector of the salient Israel captured from Syria in October. It said no Israeli casualties were reported.

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Gem. aides sniff TF coffee

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho attorney general's office is interested in the 25 cent cup of coffee in Twin Falls restaurants. Neal Custer, an investigator in the Business Regulation Division of the office, said Wednesday "I have an idea we might investigate the price of the cup of coffee." Custer, telephoned the Times-News concerning a report last week that most restaurants in Twin Falls hiked their coffee prices to 25 cents per cup on May 1.

H.K. Kleinkopf, owner of the Russel Inn said the price boost was set in a meeting of most restaurant owners and managers three weeks ago. Only two of three Twin Falls restaurants were not represented in the meeting at the Black Whale Inn, according to Kleinkopf. "No solid coffee was the only item with a higher price fixed by mutual agreement in the meeting."

Judge queried Reform plan wounded

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — U.S. District Judge Matt Byrne has been questioned by House impeachment investigators about the alleged wiretap attempt to influence the Pentagon Papers trial, the Los Angeles Times reported today. The influence accusation is one of 32 priority charges against President Nixon.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Democrats refused today to accept a proposed reform of reassigning jurisdiction of the congressional committee. The proposal called for a "reform" of the committee system. The Democrats voted, 111 to 95, in a closed party caucus to public esteem of Congress. A committee created three years ago is now more popularly lower than Nixon's.

US 'copters Korean targets

SEOUL (UPI) — North Korean ground batteries Thursday fired on two U.S. Army helicopters flying south of the truce line between South and North Korea, a U.S. military spokesman said. The pilot of the two helicopters — an OH58 and a two-man Cobra — immediately moved their aircraft out of range and no one was injured, the spokesman said. The spokesman said the incident was under investigation. Asked what kind of fire was involved and if the aircraft suffered any damage, the spokesman said no information was immediately available.

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GOP campaign bug claim denied by ex-FBI aide



W. MARK FELT bug charge denied

By RICHARD G. HIGH Times-News managing editor. TWIN FALLS — W. Mark Felt, the former number two man at the FBI, today denied statements by President Nixon and John Dean that the FBI had bugged the Republican campaign during 1968. Felt, a Twin Falls native, had played a prominent role in private White House discussions on Feb. 18, 1973, when Nixon and Dean were attempting to develop information for the FBI. The bug had been used against Republicans in 1968. Nixon and Dean were seeking a way to counter early news accounts of the Watergate break-in. According to edited transcripts of taped conversations released by the White House, Nixon and Dean apparently denied Felt would not provide the information sought by the President because of the unbearable financial and career pressures that could be brought to bear on him. In a telephone interview at his home in Fairfax, Va., Felt today denied the FBI had conducted political wiretaps during the 1968 campaign. "I don't know what they're talking about. I'm sure that is completely false," he said.

However, Felt said the FBI had conducted wiretaps on the South Vietnamese embassy in Washington, as reported in the White House transcripts, but not on political figures. Felt said the wiretaps were ordered by President Johnson, who reportedly feared his efforts to establish a Vietnam cease fire were being undercut by Republicans. Johnson reportedly feared the Republicans were negotiating with the South Vietnamese to back away from a cease fire. A cease fire, both Johnson and the Republicans believed, would have helped the presidential candidacy of Democrat Hubert Humphrey. The South Vietnamese Embassy wiretap in Washington, Felt said, "was strictly a national security wiretap." Moreover, he said, Johnson's suspicions were not confirmed by the wiretap results. Felt's name cropped up in the Feb. 28 conversation "and several people who probably had full information" of reports of wiretaps ordered on the South Vietnamese embassy, a woman thought to be a conduit between the Republicans and the South Vietnamese, Anna Chennault, and the Agnew plane.

Although Nixon expressed doubt about the reported bugging of Agnew's plane, both he and Dean apparently considered the wiretaps political, not national security, wiretaps. Nixon asked what would happen if "Felt comes out now and says he did it." Dean replied that "he can't do it." Nixon began a long statement in which he concluded that the pressures on Felt would be too great. "The informer is not one in our society. Either way, that is the one thing people can't survive. They say no civilization (characterization) depends on informants." Felt said today he had not been asked to provide the information discussed in the transcripts. Felt said he already had refused several requests from the White House, relayed by John Dean, which perhaps explains the White House conclusion that he would not reveal FBI secrets. Felt was reared in Twin Falls and graduated from the Twin Falls High School and the University of Idaho. He married the former Audrey Robinson of Gooding, the sister of Gooding dentist Dr. E. S. Nixon's decision this week to close the door to the committee's request for 75 more Watergate tapes, pulling committee Republicans and Democrats together.

Even the normally cautious Ford recommended serving a second subpoena on Nixon.

The President's standing also appeared to have been hurt by publication of the 124 pages of intimate and often profane conversations with the aides.

Republican leaders have denounced the transcripts as more for their "shabby" moral tone than for what they reveal about Watergate.

Many Congress feel public opinion will be a bit, perhaps decisive factor in the ultimate impeachment decision.

Every House session up in November and many members know they will be junked on

their vote on impeachment.

Republicans have most to lose and many privately wish Nixon would resign first.

But Gerald Warren, presidential spokesman, repeated Wednesday that Nixon has no intention of resigning.

Even if the Judiciary Committee decides to take no action, an impeachment vote on the House floor appears inevitable. Any member can force a vote on a resolution of impeachment.

Of the 38 committee members, three all Democrats, are black. Two, both Democrats, are women.

California is represented by five members, New York by four, New Jersey three. Only five Deep South states are represented, New England, the Pacific and Midwestern states and the Northwest have sparse representation.

Rodino, who assumed the chairmanship from Roman Celler in 1973, is believed to favor Nixon's impeachment.

Rep. Edward Hutchinson of Michigan, the senior Republican conservative, is believed to oppose it unless evidence of criminal wrongdoing is produced.

The sheriff's office, he said, is awaiting positive identification on the recovered stolen guns before filing additional charges. The Maughan house is on Highway 93 between the Highway 93-Highway 30 interchange and Hollister, Corder said. Jaggers was apprehended by sheriff's deputies Wednesday after store owner Joe Cosentino held him at gunpoint outside his store. Rouse was picked up when authorities stopped a vehicle he was driving.

Tribune issues call for Nixon resignation

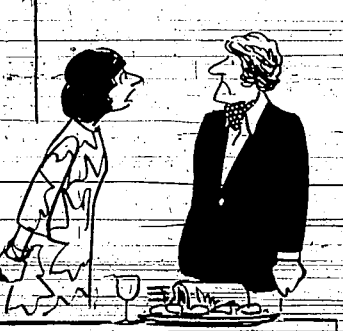
CHICAGO (UPI) — Here are excerpts from today's editorial in the Chicago Tribune which calls for President Nixon to leave office:

LISTEN, MR. NIXON. We would like to see the public man in his first administration, and we were impressed. Now in about 300,000 words we have seen the private man, and we are appalled. What manner of man is the Richard Nixon who emerges from the transcripts of the White House tapes? We see a man who in the words of his old friend and defender, Sen. Hugh Scott, took a principal role in a "shabby, immoral and disgusting performance."

Tapes prove investigation phony

WASHINGTON — The White House transcripts have unmasked President Nixon's "investigation" of Watergate in the spring of 1973 as a bungled effort to grab some credit for cracking the scandal. That the investigation claimed never took place has long been obvious. What the tape transcript reveals is the White House's attempt to fabricate a Watergate investigation after months of containing the scandal.

The March 21 transcript, however, shows no standard President covering up wrongdoing. Rather, this and earlier meetings reveal Nixon seeking to keep the lid on Watergate. On March 22, Ehrlichman suggests that the report be published, adding: "I am looking to the future. Assume that some corner of this thing is going to leak. You're then in a position to say, 'Look, that document published is the...'"

Expectation it will be relayed to the Watergate prosecutors. Ehrlichman called in Magruder late that afternoon but learned Magruder had told everything to the prosecutors. At 6 p.m., Ehrlichman telephoned Kleindienst to inform him that the White House "had been investigating Watergate."

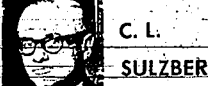

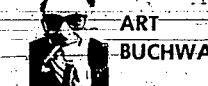

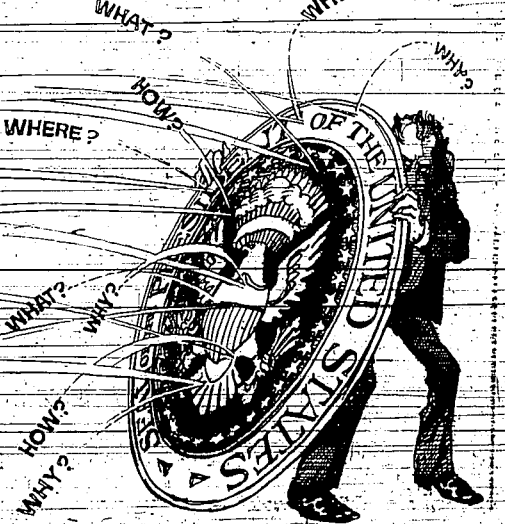

If that happens, the probability that the edited parts will stay secret virtually vanishes. 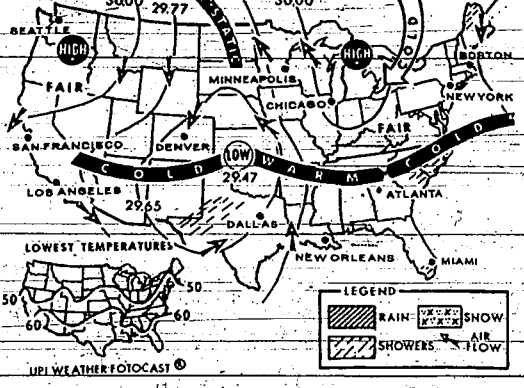

Editor, Times-News: The Twin Falls High School department budgets will come up soon in the school board meeting and I wish to bring up some facts that might surprise you and your readers.

The board has in past years been very lax in its allocations. For the '74 school year they allowed 47 per cent of the funds raised by the student activity cards to athletics, 23 per cent to the music department, and approximately 7 per cent to debate and drama.

This is clearly an unfair gap. I hope that the board will be more fair this year, but this seems unlikely since the citizens make it clear to them they feel that academic and fine arts are important to them.

To show even more clearly the gap in funds, on Dec. 17 the athletic department had \$18,172.82, and the second richest department, music, had only \$990.44.

Next to the athletic department and music department in allocation out of student-activity cards is Government, which spent more on cheerleaders than any other group (\$450 this year and \$530 for '74-'75).

I urge students and citizens who wish to improve the high school to tell the board members their feelings before the May 14 meetings. We will then have a chance of equalizing the departmental budgets that have been unfair and discriminatory for years.

Pills not cause

By GEORGE C. THOSTESON, M.D.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Can you tell me what causes crib death in infants?

A 5-month-old died that way recently. One young woman approached me and said it must have been that the mother had taken some pills while pregnant.

I don't believe this is true as I've been reading about it in newspapers. Seems to me they can put a child to bed with no symptoms of being ill, and the child is found dead.

Would appreciate it much if you could help me out in this matter. — Mrs. R. C.

I hope that thoughtless remark never got back to the mother. Think what her guilt reaction could have been — and for no reason.

No, I cannot tell you what causes crib deaths. Doctors and research scientists are hunting for clues that will lead to an answer. But they don't yet know.

As to the mother "having taken some pills," there is no indication that that is involved. It is true that there are a few drugs that, taken in early pregnancy, can interfere with the development of the fetus and cause physical defects. There are many more drugs about which little or nothing is known in that regard, so the rule today is to avoid any drugs known to be safe or known to be urgently needed.

But crib deaths are not singling out defective babies as the victims. There is, in fact, no visible pattern. Perfectly healthy babies do indeed die in infancy and the strongest suspicion is that, not yet having been gradually exposed to many kinds of germs (colds and other kinds), such babies may pick up an infection that in some way stops respiration. Breathing.

With a tiny baby who happens to encounter a germ against which he has as yet no resistance, infection can flare up with frightening speed. In a few hours. Overnight.

Ford criticizes tape deletions

CHARLESTON, Ill. (UPI) — Vice President Gerald R. Ford today criticized the White House editing of President Nixon's Watergate transcripts and pointedly omitted in a prepared speech his earlier claim they would prove Nixon innocent of wrongdoing.

In his strongest criticism of the Nixon administration yet, Ford referred obliquely to "missing portions in the transcripts which were labeled 'characterization deleted' when the President or his aides were talking about an individual."

"What has taken place up to now has created a diminished confidence in our public officials, basic distrust of their motives," Ford said in a speech prepared for an appearance at Eastern Illinois University.

Ford referred to a "grave situation" caused by a continuing series of revelations and reports of "omission, misfeasance and wrongdoing in the federal government, not the least of which is the sorry mess which carries the label of 'Watergate.'"

"We have seen charge and counter-charge, indictments, confessions, convictions and resignations involving some of the highest offices. These have been hammer blows to the confidence the American people have placed in their government."

Ford said the most serious problem the government faces today is "a crisis in confidence," illustrated by recent public opinion polls that showed "the lowest confidence rating the federal government had received in all the years such polls have been made."

Resignation asked

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Chicago Tribune today called for President Nixon to leave office for the good of "the Presidency, the country and the free world."

The Tribune said Nixon should leave office either by resignation or through the process of impeachment, but should leave in any case.

In a three-part editorial appearing in today's editions, the Tribune said, "It is saddening and hard to believe that for the first time in our history, it is better that the President leave office than to fight to keep it. But things have reached such a state that Mr. Nixon's departure, one way or another, is the best course for the Presidency, the country and the free world."

Nixon made strategic errors, the Tribune said, both when he released the transcripts and when he made public his income tax records.

"Both stripped the man to his essential character, and that character could not stand that kind of scrutiny," the Tribune said. "Both miscalculations demonstrated an essential Nixon defect — an insensitivity to the standards of ethics and morality that Americans expect of their leaders."

"The President is right in urging a quick end to the Watergate affair."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Regardless of how far the impeachment process against President Nixon goes, the initial decision is to be made by the 36 men and two women who make up the House Judiciary Committee.

They are nearly a microcosm of the entire House. Liberal Democrats like Reps. Jerome R. Waldie, Calif., a gubernatorial candidate, and Robert F. Drinan, Mass., offset conservative Republicans like Reps. Lawrence Hogan, Md., and Delbert Latta, Ohio.

The committee has bright members — one a Rhodes scholar — and some not so bright. It has the lethargic and energetic, reasonable and un-reasonable, strident and reserved, formal and informal, quiet talkative and people to people, publicity seekers.

It has its share of large-state representatives and those from the smaller states, East, West, North and South. It has three blacks, 21 Democrats and 17 Republicans, and there is a cross section of liberals and conservatives from each party.

They range in age from the 72-year-old of Rep. Harold D. Donohue, D-Mass., to the 32 years of Rep. Trent Lott, R-Miss.

All that is reflective of the makeup of the entire House of 434 members.

But the committee departs from the House makeup in that all 38 of its members are lawyers. They are different kinds of lawyers. Most gained experience with law firms, but there also are former prosecuting attorneys, a state attorney general, two assistant U.S. attorneys, a law professor, county judge, justice of the peace, district attorney and assistant D.A., corporation lawyer and four former FBI agents.

Almost all say publicly they have not yet made up their minds about impeachment, but estimates are that 17 lean in

favor of it, 13 against and 8 undecided.

Chairman Peter W. Rodino Jr., D-N.J., wants the evidence supporting an article of impeachment — if there is any — to be overwhelmingly convincing. He doesn't want to recommend an article of impeachment by a partisan vote. He wants it to be clean and unmarred by any possible charge of partisan politics.

To avoid that, Rodino has been especially cautious about making concessions to the

White House-ordered government actions boosting prices for milk producers after they pledged \$2 million for Nixon's re-election campaign.

A \$200,000 cash campaign contribution from financier Robert L. Vesco at a time when he was under criminal investigation by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC).

A \$100,000 cash transfer from industrialist Howard Hughes to Nixon's close friend and occasional business partner, Charles G. (Charlie) Rebozo, purportedly returned after remaining unused in Rebozo's hands for some two years.

CHROME AND HOT LEATHER

New price hike round hits US

The American consumer faced another round of price increases today, eight days after the last of the federal price restraints were lifted. Hikes were announced Wednesday in the prices of cars, copper, kerosene and diesel oil, and recreational vehicles.

But amid the new increases, the Agriculture Department predicted retail food prices would rise only slightly during the rest of the year.

Agriculture experts in Washington confirm an earlier prediction that retail grocery prices would be 12 percent higher in 1974 than they were in 1973, but they said much of the 1974 increases have already occurred.

In Detroit, the Ford Motor Co. raised prices of its cars and trucks an average 163, saying the higher costs overshadowed its commitment to hold the line on prices until the 1975 models are introduced.

John T. Dunlop, director of the Dept. of Living Council, called the 3.5 percent increase "unwarranted" in light of an agreement made in December in exchange for the lifting of price controls.

Chrysler Corp. last week increased its prices an average \$99.

In other hikes, Sun Oil Co. lifted kerosene and diesel oil prices by 2 cents a gallon for all its customers. Exxon raised its prices by 3.2 cents a gallon earlier this week.

Recreational vehicles also will cost more. Winnebago Industries raised wholesale base prices 7 percent on most of motor homes and all travel trailers, camper coaches, fifth-wheel travel trailers, buses and commercial vehicles.

Copper Range Co. said its domestic refined copper will no longer be sold for 90 cents a pound, the price level announced last week by other major copper producers.

The producer said its new prices would be based instead on New York Commodities Exchange quotations for the metal. Copper Range said its prices for copper will vary constantly, but it is believed that selling at free market prices offers long-term advantages to the company and its customers.

Rising sugar prices, which eventually affect consumer products from loasters to automobiles, spread to the United States from Canada.

Agency queries oil cost

(By N. Y. Times Service) WASHINGTON — In the first of several promised actions against major international oil companies, the Federal Energy Office challenged the Gulf Oil Corporation to justify \$4.5 million of costs claimed by Gulf for crude oil it bought from "one of its foreign affiliates."

The agency has conducted an intensive investigation of transactions between United States oil companies and their foreign affiliates.

Under federal petroleum pricing regulations, oil refiners can pass along increases in crude oil costs so that ultimately they are borne by buyers of gasoline, heating oil and other prices.

The issue is what price to allow a big company like Gulf to enter on its books for crude bought from a company it controls.

The energy office's formal notice of probable violation to Gulf asserted that from October through January, the company entered on its books excessive crude oil costs of \$3.6 million for oil from Nigeria and of \$1.1 million for oil from Gabon, a Portuguese possession on the West Coast of Africa.

A Gulf spokesman in Washington said the company had no immediate comment, but was preparing a statement.

Plan voted down

(By N. Y. Times Service) WASHINGTON — The House of Representatives blocked and probably killed Wednesday a bill that would have registered voters by post card for federal elections.

Republicans and Southern Democrats teamed up to defeat 204 to 187, the proposed ground rules under which the House would have debated the bill, thus blocking its consideration.

A similar bill passed the senate, 57 to 37, after a lengthy floor fight last year.

"We'll try again," John R. Dent, a Pennsylvania Democrat and floor manager of the bill, said after the vote.

He said he might try to attach the bill to a campaign reform bill now pending in the House administration committee, but House Majority Leader Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., acknowledged to reporters afterward, "There wasn't too much enthusiasm for it, frankly."

15 votes assured

BOSTON (UPI) — The Boston Globe said today President Nixon has "15 secure votes so far" for acquittal if he is tried by the U.S. Senate on impeachment charges.

The Globe's Washington Bureau said in a front page story that 23 other senators are considered "leaners," possible votes-for-acquittal.

The 15 "stone wallers" in administration strategists are joined by 23 others whom White House aides here can be persuaded to acquit the President.

Republican candidate

Businessman runs for No. 2 Gem post

TWIN FALLS — Pat Harwood, Caldwell, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor, doesn't think government will automatically do a better job of solving problems than private business.

"The candidate, who has been in private business all his life, has taken a leave of absence from J. R. Simpler Co., Caldwell, where he has been director of public affairs. He said he is seeking the nomination for the Aug. 6 primary because he is concerned about the "anti-business mentality."

"I don't think government can necessarily do the job better," he said. "The candidate also worries about what he calls the "frenzy of legislation" taking away rights from the individual.

Businessmen, farmers and all segments of the country are losing their decision making power, he said in an interview. Now they are making less than half of decisions affecting them because of the "broadening scope of government."

Harwood has had past legislative experience, having served two terms from Jefferson County. He said that while government can't be run like a business, some business principles can be applied to the operation of government.

Harwood, who has been active in school and community activity in Caldwell, said he was appalled by the number of taxing units in Idaho — more than 700. He cited as an example his own county of Canyon which has nine separate school districts.

"If anyone is one of the smaller counties, geographically, and none of the nine districts has an adequate tax base," he said. The candidate also said there has been a lack of overall leadership in the state in education. One of the changes he proposed would be to rectify the diversified and scattered districts to avoid duplication. He also strongly favors giving vocational — education more than lip service. The candidate comes from a family of educators. His mother is a retired principal and the Harwood Elementary School in Rigby is named after her. His late brother was a teacher also.

Harwood cited the College of Southern Idaho as "refreshing" example of innovation in education with much emphasis on vocational education.

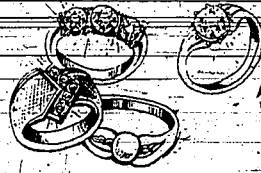
He said the lieutenant governor's office affords a unique opportunity to bring about changes by having legislation proposals put together during the interim between sessions.

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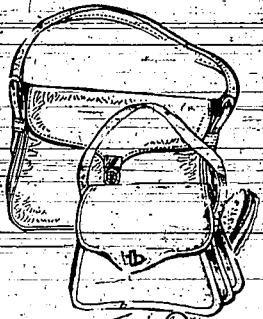


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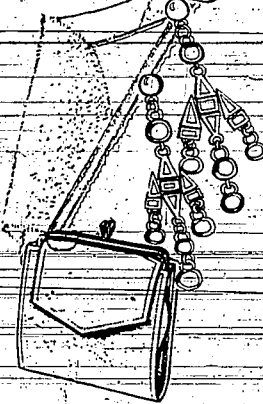

Jerome water users threatened

JEROME — Illegal use of irrigation water in Jerome will result in a citation to the user.

The Jerome City Council Tuesday night agreed to a "get tough" policy against residents illegally using irrigation water on days they are not entitled to it.

Prompting the "get tough" policy was the new federal regulation concerning payment of overtime.

Marshall Everheart, the councilman, said it was time the city started enforcing the irrigation schedule by issuing citations to violators.

"Most of the overtime calls the ditch rider gets is someone wanting to irrigate at the specified time and someone

also has the water. Every time the ditch rider goes out it costs the city money," Everheart said.

Councilman S-N-(Shorty) Weeks said the city was going to start issuing citations two or three years ago and "so far I have not seen one citation yet. The same people seem to be the violators and perhaps a couple of citations will convince them to stick to the regular schedule," Weeks said.

Howard DuBols, chief of police, said a city ordinance could be passed giving the ditch rider authority to issue citations. "However, it is not too much trouble for the police department to be notified and issue the citations. We have, on several occasions, gone with the ditch rider when they looked

like a fight with somebody would occur over the water," DuBols said.

In other business before the council, approval was given to a new overtime policy for city employees—a 40-hour week will be observed, except during an emergency situation; when equal time off in the same week will be allotted if possible.

"If not, employees will be paid for the overtime incurred during the emergency. An exemption to the policy will be the ditch rider who will remain on the same 56-hour a week work schedule.

The council also agreed to pay for all accumulated overtime the city employees now have up to May 1st and begin the new policy. Authorization for payment of

the overtime will be made at the next council meeting.

City Clerk Marilyn Bragg told the council the city will be \$15,000 short this year in revenue sharing funds received.

The council decided to look into the contract the city has with Orin Mauldin for spraying of weeds within the city.

Several complaints have been received from Jerome residents who have had their lawns sprayed with a soil sterilant. Mauldin has been using Weeks said the city was presented with a three-year contract by Mauldin, but the contract has never been signed and that an agreement had only been approved for spraying last fall.
