Ford to visit Red China next year

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford will visit the People's Republic of China in 1975, the United States and China announced jointly today at the conclusion of Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger's visit to Peking.

Ford's scheduled visit to China, the second for an American president since President Richard M. Nixon went to Peking in 1972, was announced simultaneously by the White House and the Chinese government.

The U.S. and Chinese sides held frank, wide-ranging and mutually beneficial talks. They reaffirmed their unchanged commitment to the principals of the Chung Hui communique. The two governments agreed that President Gerald R. Ford would visit the People's Republic of China in 1975.

China relations more normal and the United States promised to reduce its military forces on Taiwan as tensions in the area diminished.

Nixon unable to testify

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A panel of three physicians said today that former President Richard M. Nixon is unable to testify in the Watergate cover-up trial and probably would not be able to until Feb. 6, 1975.

The specialists, who examined the former president at the request of U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica, also reported that Nixon would be unable to make a deposition until Jan. 6, 1975, and then only in two daily sessions of one hour each.

Nixon, who has been hospitalized twice since he resigned from the presidency last Aug. 9, was examined personally at his San Clemente, Calif., home by the three court-appointed physicians.

The 3-page physicians report to Sirica said:

1. Mr. Nixon is not personally able to travel to Washington to testify.
2. It is difficult to predict with accuracy when such a trip to Washington, D.C., might be accomplished without excessive risk. It requires proceeds at the anticipated rate, and there are no further complications, we would estimate that such a trip be possible by Feb. 16, 1975.
3. Mr. Nixon is not presently able to appear and testify at a site near his home.
4. His recovery proceeds at the anticipated rate, and there are no further complications, we would estimate that he should be able to give a deposition in his home by Jan. 6, 1975.
5. Mr. Nixon is not presently able to be deposed by the parties in this case.
6. If recovery proceeds at the anticipated rate, and there are no further complications, we would estimate that he should be able to give a deposition in his home by Jan. 6, 1975.

Contract approval urged

CHARLESTON, W. Va. (UPI) — United Mine Workers officials, in local meetings and radio and television messages, began a campaign today to convince 120,000 coal miners to approve a new wage contract and end their two-week-old strike.

Copies of the three-year pact, which UMW President Arnold Miller calls the best U.S. labor settlement in 10 years, were distributed Thursday to miners throughout the nation's coalfields.

A referendum vote was expected to be completed Monday, and appeared likely to pass. UMW officials said if the contract was approved, miners could open late next week for the first time since the walkout began Nov. 12.

The contract provides a 64 per cent increase in wages and benefits, but UMW leaders said there was some misunderstanding on some facets of the proposal.

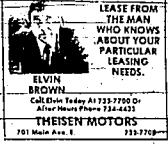
Joe Duffie, a member of UMW District 7 in Charleston, said he was "very optimistic" the contract would be approved.

"There's still quite a bit of confusion, but it's possible we can straighten that out at local union meetings," said Carl Bunch, secretary-treasurer of UMW District 29, the union's largest, in Beckley, W. Va.

Bunch and district officials in other states spent much of Thanksgiving Day distributing copies of the contract to local union leaders, who in turn passed them on to the membership.

Miller and other high-level UMW leaders were confident the contract would be approved but Bunch said "it's hard to tell at this point. It (members) still seems kind of divided."

The strike has caused layoffs in coal-related industries, including steel, coke and railroads.



Holiday deaths top 100 mark

Highways, jammed with persons hurrying to turkey dinner, had claimed more than 100 lives by the end of the first 36 hours of the Thanksgiving holiday period Thursday.

The death toll counting period began at 6 p.m. Wednesday and by 24 hours later, the tabulations showed over 20 persons dead in traffic accidents, and 101 dead by the time Thanksgiving Day ended at midnight EST.

Eight persons were killed Thursday when their car smashed into a highway overpass abutment at Leeds, Ala., 25 miles east of Birmingham.

Authorities said five men and two women were dead at the scene and another man died later in a Birmingham hospital.

The National Safety Council came out before the holiday predicting one of the fastest Thanksgiving holiday periods.

A six weeks long holiday period ends at midnight Sunday. Another 27,000 to 32,000 persons may be victims of crippling injuries.

A United Press International count, at 8 a.m. EST today showed there had been at least 112 traffic deaths since the Thanksgiving holiday period began.

'Happy' spends holiday at home

NEW YORK (UPI) — Margaretta "Happy" Rockefeller went home for Thanksgiving dinner unexpectedly from a Manhattan hospital where she had been recovering after her second breast cancer operation in less than six weeks.

Mrs. Rockefeller, 48, smiling and holding on tightly to her husband, left Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center's Memorial Hospital Thursday. As she and Vice President-designate Nelson A. Rockefeller left for their Fifth Avenue apartment, Mrs. Rockefeller told newsmen, "I feel great and very thankful."

A hospital spokesman said originally that Mrs. Rockefeller would be discharged a few days after Thanksgiving, but she asked her attending physician, Dr. Jerome A. Urban, if she could spend the holiday at home and he consented.

Kissinger ends 5-day China trip

SHANGHAI (UPI) — Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger ended a five-day trip to China today, visiting ancient gardens, touring an embroidery factory and stopping six times for tea and snacks during the trip.

At one point he said, "Well, I haven't eaten for at least 30 minutes."

Then he sat down and ate again.

Kissinger was scheduled to arrive in Tokyo tonight to meet Japanese officials on his talks with Chinese leaders. He was due to fly home to Washington Saturday, ending a four-nation tour of Asia.

Cross replacement set for spring

TWIN FALLS — The cross at Shoshone Falls, burned down by revelers during festivities surrounding the Evel Knievel jump, will not be replaced until spring.

The youth group of the Twin Falls First Christian Church announced its intention to replace the religious symbol shortly after the two-foot-square wooden structure was burned through on the night of Sept. 6.

However, according to First Christian assistant pastor Don Pyle, the rebuilding effort will not be undertaken until this spring.

Pyle said the youth group had not backed away on its intention to replace the cross.

"We just shelved it temporarily," he said. "We will put it up."

Pyle said no building materials for a new cross have been donated as yet, although he said previous publicity did result in several offers of help, among them an offer by a local architect to help design a new cross.

President awaits Brezhnev message

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford today awaited a message from Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev, documenting their tentative verbal agreement to put a ceiling on each country's offensive nuclear weapons.

Ford planned to make the 10-year accord public once he has the aide de memoir from the Soviets in hand.

He may hold a press conference today or early next week to disclose the numbers of missiles and delivery systems each side would be allowed under the new equivalence pact reached at the Vladivostok summit.

The White House has said only that each side would be limited to less than 2,500 missiles and strategic bombers under new negotiating guidelines that could lead to a new, 10-year arms control treaty.

If Ford does not receive the agreement in writing this week, he will wait to disclose the pact next week when Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, who participated in the breakthrough negotiations, is in the White House.

The Carter family had been scheduled to depart for a skiing vacation over the Yuletide holidays starting Dec. 18, but there were indications the President might hold off his departure from Washington until a date closer to Christmas, and remain at the White House until the lame-duck Congress adjourns.

Victim delirious

NORWICH, Conn. (UPI) — Sierr Charles, 19, of Hartford, Conn., was found delirious and suffering from frostbite and two broken ankles Thursday in a wrecked car where she had been pinned for 44 hours.

She was in satisfactory condition in a hospital today.

Two passers-by said Miss Charles was delirious when they found her off Route 49 in rural Colechester, Conn. Her car had plunged down a 100-foot embankment and landed out of sight of the road. The men were driving down an abandoned railroad right of way when they saw the wreck.

Robert Jones, 27, of East Hartford, Conn., said she was screaming when he and a friend found her. She was clad in a dress but wasn't wearing any shoes or stockings. Her coat was out of reach in the backseat.

The car had overturned several times, landing upright without a windshield. Temperatures fell below 20 degrees during the 44-hour period she was trapped in the wreckage.

Miss Charles had started two days before for Norwich to see her boyfriend.

We would like to see Mr. Ford put his own White House team to work bringing in the best experts - Democrats as well - to build an image of credibility and bipartisanship.

Then, once a comprehensive program encompassing all aspects of the economy is worked out, we would urge him to work actively and daily with Congress to get it enacted.

We do not think there is need for panic in the country, but only by building up a strong administration and conveying a sense of discipline and concerted action can President Ford dispel the nationwide frustration and lift the public's spirits to cope with the difficult times ahead.

Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of little beasts and wild men; and what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not; for which way soever they turned their eyes, up toward Heaven they could have but little solace or content in respect of any outward objects; for summer being ended, all things stand in decay and wither; and the whole country, full of woods and thickets, represented a wild and savage hue.

If they looked behind them, there was a mighty ocean which they had passed; and was now as a main bar or gulph to separate them from all the civil parts of the world.

Shall we go quietly?

WASHINGTON - Let the record show that I find not altogether unpleasant the thought that the United States eventually will be thrown out of the United Nations by the so-called "Third World," which now constitutes a majority of the UN's membership.

Such an action would not alter the character of what once was called the world's "peace organization," because the U.S. wields about as much influence in the UN as Costa Rica.

The prospect is not all that preposterous. South Africa's delegation was suspended from the current session of the General Assembly because of the coalition of Communist and "Third World" countries was effectively the bifurcation of the UN's membership.

But in the new UN, dominated by totalitarian governments, there are two sets of standards - one for the new majority and one for the few minorities, which includes thee and me.

We've got Watergate. We've got pockets of racial and sexual discrimination. Even today, we're too rich.

Let me just remember, is fascinated by so-called "people's revolutions" - except, of course, within the countries that form the new

Therefore, should the meagre coalition of Communist and "Third World" delegates decide to throw us out of the UN club, maybe we should go quietly, counting our blessings.

Ford White House rewriting history about Nixon foreign successes

HONG KONG — As the Chinese did with Lin Biao and the Soviets with Nikita S. Khrushchev and Joseph Stalin — before they changed their minds about Stalin — the Ford White House seems in the process of rewriting history about Richard M. Nixon.

From the conquering foreign policy hero of the 1972 campaign, Nixon suddenly is being portrayed as the man who couldn't put it together.

Evidence of the trend came in the remark that

White House press secretary Ron Nessen made to reporters aboard Air Force One as it headed home from Ford's summit meeting in Vladivostok.

The SALT agreement achieved there, said Nessen, was "something Nixon couldn't do in five years," but "Ford did it in three months."

Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, in a comment with many implications, said that Nixon was unable to achieve a SALT agreement because, Watergate or no Watergate, he was a "lame duck president," which Ford, of course, is

not — at least, not yet.

These remarks by Nessen and Kissinger were only an record expressions of attitudes stated privately by several Ford aides during the Far East trip last week.

The emerging line was:

— Nixon was, after all, not a good negotiator. Deals had to be carefully worked out in advance to his summit trips, leaving only ceremonial signings to take place when he met a foreign leader, and not bargaining.

— Nixon was so personally flawed that he

could not look an adversary, such as Soviet Communist Party Leader Leonid I. Brezhnev, in the eye.

— The 10-year approach to SALT was the result of decisions made by Ford and developed "from scratch" since Ford has been in the White House.

— Besides being a gifted strategist, Ford is a master negotiator, able to give and take as second nature, and, unlike Nixon, is self-confident enough to make decisions at the bargaining table.

— Ford and Brezhnev, both bluff, open characters, got along famously, and the chemistry between them — never good between Nixon and Brezhnev — sealed the SALT agreement.

So persuasive was the promotion of this line during Ford's trip that it is impossible to believe that it was not being peddled with Ford's knowledge and consent, though he was not engaged in the peddling himself.

The White House behavior is ironic in the extreme.

Painful cyst not malignant

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My leg is sore and there is a sizable lump on the back of my leg behind the knee. My doctor tells me it is a Baker's cyst. What is the cause and treatment? Is there a possibility of malignancy? Do you recommend removal? Am I likely to have a recurrence? — N.B.

A Baker's cyst is a bulge filled with a jelly-like fluid behind the knee. The amount of discomfort can vary a good deal. So can treatment. It is not, however, malignant.

The cause of a Baker's cyst, has led to some difference of opinion. Some believe it is basically a disease of the knee joint, with the fluid accumulation behind the joint. Another thought is it may be inflammation of a bursa under a tendon in that area but may or may not have anything to do with the joint itself. Injury to the knee can be involved but often there is no evidence of that.

Sometimes a Baker's cyst disappears when you get treatment, but you cannot depend on that to happen.

Conservative treatment consists of drawing out the jelly-like substance, and with the injection of hyaluronidase, may solve the problem. And then again, it may not.

If the cyst, after this withdrawal of matter, recurs, then surgical removal is the logical step. Any recurrence with the knee joint is sealed off, and recurrence of the cyst is unlikely.

I am not saying that surgery is always necessary, nor whether any treatment is necessary. It depends on the size of the cyst, and on how much discomfort it causes. Your age may be a factor, too.

A Baker's cyst is most commonly found in older people, but it can occur in younger age groups.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: Is there a medication I could take for osteoporosis? This past year I've had two implants put in my knees and they are working well. I've also had two leg fractures, but they are fine, again now. But my doctor said, the other day that my bones have softened. He was going to put me on hormones, but changed his mind. I am 62. — Mrs. R.N.L.

Osteoporosis is a lack of sufficient calcium in your bones — the bones "soften" — or become brittle. It is a baffling problem of metabolism, and there is no rapid means of treating it. Since a decline in hormones gives evidence of being involved, treatment revolves around giving hormones, plus making sure that the diet includes adequate protein and calcium. Both are essential for strong bones.

(There has been some work involving use of fluoride, but I do not know how successful that is.)

Your doctor no doubt had some overriding reason for deciding not to give you hormones, so the best I can suggest is to make sure that you get plenty of protein and adequate calcium in your diet.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: After reading your column about mouth breathers, I couldn't resist writing. You forgot to mention another cure for mouth breathers — probably the most common — or the best.

My son is also asthmatic and takes allergy shots and was a mouth breather, but since he has had his overbite corrected he is no longer a mouth breather.

I have no reason to think that possibility applied to the case I was discussing, but I thoroughly agree with you that correction of a faulty bite could be an answer to some cases of mouth breathing, and am glad to publish your letter.

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Legal abortion OK'd in France

PARIS — In the small hours of this morning, after three days of often passionate speeches, the French assembly voted to legalize abortion.

In general this means any woman can have an abortion at the first month of pregnancy, and even later with certain precautions.

The reform, one of President Valéry Giscard d'Estaing's pet projects for modernizing France, was only carried by massive support from Socialist and Communist members of parliament. There was no official party line, but the political result was to split the President's parliamentary majority down the middle.

The old, tough anti-abortion law voted in 1920 by an all-male assembly has been replaced at rebuilding the French population which had lost more than one million young men and potential fathers in World War I.

Nov. 24 years later, with backstreet abortions estimated at from 300,000 to 500,000 a year, 275 men plus the only 10 women deputies carried the vote, which will allow pregnancies to be terminated legally and under medically supervised conditions.

Main opposition to the bill came from the Gaullist UDR party, where some members were against it on religious grounds.

Others, led by former Prime Minister Michel Debre, saw it as a threat to France's falling birthrate, which is a monstrous historical error," he said, "for Europeans to reduce their populations while others, on our doorstep, grow and rejuvenate."

In spite of being defeated on the main issue, Debre was responsible for an amendment that not more than 25 per cent of the surgery in any one medical establishment must be abortions. This should prevent the setting up of "abortion factories."

Many of those speaking for a change in the law added pleas for better social conditions — housing, schools, etc. — which might avoid the need for any abortions.

They also emphasized the need for widespread information and education about contraception so that abortion should never be seen as just another form of birth control.

At present only 12 per cent of women in France use any form of contraception, less than two per cent taking "the pill."

Anti-IRA bill unopposed

LONDON (UPI) — Parliament and Queen Elizabeth today outlawed the Irish Republican Army and gave the police wider emergency powers to arrest and hold suspected bombers and terrorists.

Scotland Yard maintained tight security throughout the capital against retaliatory IRA attacks.

The anti-IRA bill received an unopposed third and final reading in the House of Commons after a marathon 17-hour session. The House of Lords gave it rubber stamp approval less than 15 minutes after receiving it and sent it to Queen Elizabeth, who signed it.

Despite a night of criticism by opposition legislators, calling the measure "too soft," the bill went through the House of Commons unopposed on its third and final reading.

Scotland Yard warned Britons to guard against reprisal bombings. A series of blasts has wounded 29 Londoners since the IRA crackdown was announced Monday.

Worried London mailmen, fearing a new outbreak of letter bombings, refused to handle packages to and from Ireland.

Despite the delaying tactics of some legislators, the House of Commons passed the "Prevention of Terrorism" bill

and armed police with wide powers to seize IRA suspects.

The government drafted the bill following bomb attacks in Birmingham last week that killed 20 persons. Police blamed the IRA for the blasts.

Bomb blasts have killed 30 persons and injured more than 800 in Britain in the past two years as part of an IRA campaign to end British rule in Northern Ireland.

The government-sponsored bill makes the IRA illegal in Britain for the first time and bans wearing of IRA uniforms. It also gives authorities power to bar or expel IRA suspects from Britain.

Spokesmen for all parties united to support the crackdown in Parliament.

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US population growth declines

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — U.S. population growth has fallen below one per cent a year and appears to be dropping toward zero, according to a United Nations report.

The Economic and Social Council put U.S. population growth at 0.9 per cent annually for the first four years of the 1970s — a drop from 1.3 per cent a year in the previous decade.

The council said young American couples anticipated an average of 2.2 children in a family, just above the 2.2 replacement level. It also reported a slowdown in immigration.

The United States, the report said, appeared "to be approaching a natural rate of increase close to zero."

Although much of the council's data was more than a year old, the report said the last two years had seen some reduction in violent crime in American cities.

The report said the increase in crime at the start of the decade was due to a rise in heroin use, but "it is possible that drug addiction in the United States has passed its peak."

The council said one reason for the drop in population growth was an increase in Americans living alone. It said the number of persons alone rose from 1.9 million in 1970 to 4 million in 1972.

Another significant factor in the drop in population growth was a change in the distribution of age groups.

The report said the number of children under five years of age dropped from 8.9 per cent in 1968 to 7.8 per cent in 1972, while the proportion of people over 65 rose from 9.5 per cent in 1965 to 10.1 in 1972.

It reported a sharp increase in the number of Americans who had moved from central city areas to the suburbs in the past decade.

The report put the population of the suburbs at 69 million compared with 55 million, 10 years earlier, while in the central city areas the increase was from 58 million to 61 million.

Israel, Egypt bargaining asked

JERUSALEM — Israel wants to negotiate with Egypt, and not Syria, in the next round of Middle East peace talks, Israeli officials said today.

Foreign Minister Yigal Allon plans to tell Secretary of State Henry Kissinger this when he meets him in Washington Dec. 10 for talks designed to push Middle East peace negotiations.

The Israelis have a genuine fear that they might be forced, most likely because of American pressure, to negotiate with the Egyptians and Syrians simultaneously, a step the Israelis consider undesirable.

"We are not interested in a situation where Israel will have to make concessions to Syria without getting anything in return in order to make a deal with Egypt," said one official.

American policy involves reportedly pressing for Syrian involvement in the next negotiating round, fearing Egypt will not agree to any new compromise with Israel as long as Syria is left out of the diplomatic wilderness.

Largely because of what they view as Syrian reluctance to take concrete steps toward peace, Israeli officials doubt that any agreement is possible soon with Syria. Still the pressure of Israel's army mounting to enter into a new accord with Syria as the best way of avoiding a new war.

Butz slapped for 'mockery'

NEW YORK (UPI) — The office of Cardinal Terence Cooke has accused Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz of "climatic mockery and vulgar religious prejudice" for a joking reference Butz made in a mock Italian accent to Pope Paul VI's views on feeding the poor.

A spokesman for the cardinal demanded Butz's resignation or an apology, and Rep. Mario Biaggi, D-N.Y., urged the President to defame what Butz has tried.

The dispute arose after

Thursday's editions of the New York Daily News reported Butz had dismissed the Pope's advice on the world food shortage by saying in a mocking Italian accent "He no plays the game, he no makes the rules."

Butz made the remark "out the record" to some newsmen at a private breakfast meeting. Wednesday, and a spokesman said later the secretary did not originate the comment, but was simply repeating a story he said had been making the

rounds at the World Food Conference earlier this month in Rome.

Responding to the report, Monsignor Eugene V. Clark, a spokesman for the cardinal, said in a telegram to President Ford:

"I call upon Sec. Earl Butz to apologize immediately or resign following his crude, pointed insult directed at Pope Paul VI, spiritual leader of the world's Catholics."

Biaggi sent a telegram to Ford demanding that Butz be fired "for his anti-Catholic, anti-Italian remarks concerning Pope Paul VI."

The spokesman for the head of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of New York pleads for immediate relief to starving people smothered by global mockery and vulgar religious prejudice by Secretary Butz.

"If Mr. Butz can speak this way and remain in your Cabinet," Clark told the President, "Catholics, Latinos and other ethnic leaders, people of the world will all know how poorly they are esteemed in your Cabinet."

A White House spokesman said Ford would have no comment until he talked to Butz and found out exactly what had been said.

UN leader predicts war

Cairo — United Nations Secretary General Kurt Waldheim is convinced that unless a breakthrough in Middle East negotiations is achieved, a new Arab-Israeli war may well break out by next September, the summer.

Waldheim reached his conclusion after three days of intensive talks with the leaders of Syrian, Jordanian and Egyptian delegations in the Egyptian town of Sharm el-Sheikh, the main port of the Sinai Peninsula, Thursday.

On Monday, Waldheim obtained from President Hafez Al-Assad a commitment that Syria would accept the presence of U.N. forces on the Syrian-Israeli front for another six months. The first half-year mandate of the forces will expire on Saturday.

Uncertainty about Syria's intentions had been one of the principal problems in a war scare that had paralyzed the area for the last several weeks.

In his hotel suite here Wednesday night, the secretary-general, in short sleeves and obviously tired from a long day of talks in Jerusalem and Cairo, expressed gratification that his visit had helped the Syrians and Israelis avoid the worst.

But he made it clear that he felt that the threat of war had not merely delayed, but not removed

Israeli troops smash guerrillas

Israeli troops pursuing a small band of Palestinian guerrillas and killed seven of them, the Tel Aviv military command reported today.

One guerrilla escaped. The first mortar blast in a month took place north of Kibbutz Dolev, about 100 yards away, a member of the Israeli patrol said in an interview with the armed forces.

He said the equipment they carried included "two were aiming at hitting Israel's settlements," he said. "It was a sharp, heavy rocket."

A military command

spokesman in Tel Aviv said there were no Israeli casualties in the battle near the collective settlement of Dan, built on the site of ancient Israel's northernmost outpost.

The Palestine News Agency said in Beirut the guerrillas attacked an Israeli army camp west of Dan with artillery, rockets and machine guns, but gave no casualty figures.

A "big confrontation battle" took place between the "revolutionaries and the enemy forces in the area," the news agency said.

The Beirut newspaper An-Nashar quoted Arab diplomatic sources today as reporting Egypt has told U.N. Secretary General Kurt Waldheim it will reject any Israeli withdrawal from Sinai unless it is accompanied by a similar withdrawal from the Golan Heights.

Nixon aides directed 1971 Mayday arrests

WASHINGTON — Minutes of meetings at the Justice Department before and during the 1971 Mayday antiwar protests reveal the planning for government response of mass arrests and the use of troops was supervised by then Attorney General John N. Mitchell with advice by White House aides John Ehrlichman and John W. Dean II and apparently with the approval of President Nixon.

The notes, filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in a civil case stemming from the arrests, apparently offer the first hard evidence of White House participation in the controversial arrest policy during the demonstrations.

At one point during a meeting on May 1, Ehrlichman is quoted as stating that the President wanted the city kept open if it took 100,000 troops. He added that if we were short on troops someone will be in big trouble.

After an army general questioned whether the presence of the troops might have caused the protests, the minutes state: "Mr. Ehrlichman stated that it could not be kept secret but that there were different ways of doing things."

Ehrlichman, who appeared to take a hard position on handling the demonstrations, was later quoted in the notes as saying "that a lot of questions were being raised as to why the government was permitting and violations of the law in the demonstrators' camp in West Potomac Park adjacent to the Washington Monument grounds." He stated that "the President was ready to go further than that. It had been discussed up to now in this meeting."

The District of Columbia

Chief of Police Jerry V. Wilson, later took full responsibility for "all tactical decisions relating to the recent disorders," and was praised for his efforts by Nixon. But some local civic leaders criticized the arrest procedures and charged that Mayor Walter E. Washington was left out of the decisions on how the police would proceed, also indicating that the federal government was forcing Wilson to take a hard line.

Stable oil price backed

VIENNA (UPI) —

Representatives of the world's major oil exporting nations have recommended that their governments keep the price of crude oil at the present level and adopt a new pricing system to protect consumers' from manipulation.

The recommendation, made Thursday by the Economic Commission for Europe's Exporting Countries, will be

submitted for approval to OPEC's ministerial meeting here Dec. 12.

"We recommended the maintenance of the present oil price level for the sake of economic stability," an OPEC delegate said. "We did not propose an increase for 1975."

He said the recommendation was "for a longer period" than the usual three months but that it was up to the ministerial meeting to decide how much longer.

More flu cases due

BOSTON (UPI) — More cases of flu beginning earlier in the winter, can be expected this year, according to the medical director of John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Co.

In addition, Dr. Harry R. Mushlin said Wednesday, "The influenza epidemic, if it does occur, will occur at an earlier date than in previous years."

Mushlin said modern medicine is unable to keep up with the rapid mutations and variations of influenza A, which is expected to cause the outbreak this year. While the vaccine is as up to date as possible, he said, they commonly are a year behind the mutation which causes the flu.

He said "Medication is purely symptomatic and usually consists of aspirin in one form or another to help relieve the aches and pain, and to lessen the fever. It also may be desirable to increase the protein intake in one's food during the illness to make it more available in the production of antibodies."

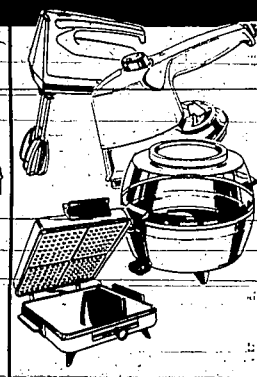
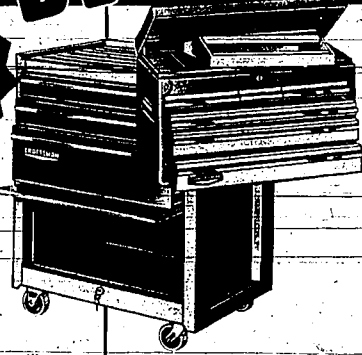
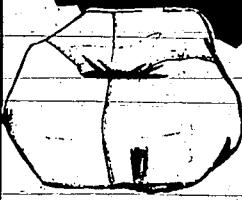

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Mormon missionaries concern leads to death

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—Mormon missionaries Gary Darley and Mark Fischer felt sorry for church dropout Robert Elmer Kleason and as a result spent their Monday nights off talking to him about religion, their faith and their church. "I'd see say Kleason, 42, who fancied himself a big game hunter and liked to have his best trophies mounted by a taxidermist neighbor, visited the young churchmen, dismembered their wires and concealed parts near his trailer house. "They felt sorry for him," said fellow missionary Brant Hurdcastle. "Kleason always told them about how the church treated him. He was a member of the church here in Austin but not at all active in the last two or six months. "Kleason had begun attending Sunday school, church and Bible classes regularly at a Protestant Church in Burnet. "I think most of all they were interested in trying to help him," said Frank McCullough, local bishop of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. "I guess they were concerned about him and wanted him to become active and accept the word of Jesus Christ."

Church officials Thursday declined to discuss what caused Kleason to leave the fold. Kleason was committed to a federal prison hospital at Springfield, Mo., Wednesday for 90 days of psychiatric tests. Austin police found parts of the missionaries' bodies near the camper trailer where he lived west of Austin. Kleason, a carpenter's aide, was wanted on felony assault charges in Williamson, N.Y., and had been jailed last year in Burnett County, Texas, on buffalo rustling charges. The missionaries, aged 19 and 20, were not aware of his record. L. M. Rathbone, a taxidermist who let Kleason park his trailer in a wooded area behind his shop, described him as "a pretty religious man." "He wasn't a real jolly fellow but he wasn't too bad," Rathbone said. "Carpentry was kind of a fill-in 'til he could find a position. Some of the stuff he did around here didn't look too good to me. It looked like he had two left hands." New York authorities seized 136 rifles and shotguns, 32 handguns, four machine guns, tear-gas canisters, grenades, 100 pounds of gunpowder and 42,000 rounds of ammunition, when he was arrested there.

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Fatima crusaders reject Pope Paul's changes

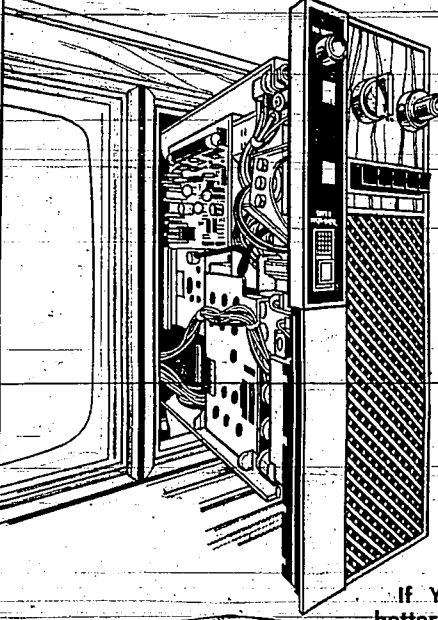
RATHDRUM — A small band of Catholics, who seven years ago rejected the Pope as a heretic for modernizing the Roman Catholic Church, have found new lives of stability and spiritual devotion among the forests of northern Idaho. They are members of the Our Lady of Fatima, a crusade and their City of Mary three miles north of here has become the spiritual mecca for a growing population of Catholics, whose to start their lives over rather than tolerate the Pope's stamping with their faith. The crusade, has attracted hundreds of disgruntled Catholics and even a few non-Catholics who want to make spiritual devotion, modesty and material sacrifice the foundations of their lives. They have been criticized by Catholics who follow the Pope, suspected by non-Catholics of being a fanatical cult, and mistakenly identified as members of the Black Army. In spite of this, crusade members do not regard themselves as outcasts. They believe they alone are carrying on the Catholic faith. They reject all changes handed down from Rome by Pope Paul VI and the Second Vatican Council of the early 1960s. "Paul has changed the teachings and liturgy of the church while we have remained faithful to them," Rev. Bishop Francis K. Schuckardt, the crusade's leader, said. "We can't accept Paul VI, who contradicts all Popes before him and who we reject as a false pope." Bishop Schuckardt and his followers stren-

uously object to changing the liturgy from Latin into the vernacular because they believe, by doing so, the meaning, and therefore church doctrine, was altered. Catholics who continue to follow Pope Paul do not agree, contending the necessities of Catholic faith, not the fall itself, was changed. Bishop Sylvester Treinen of Idaho has stated because the Fatima crusaders reject Pope Paul VI, they are no longer considered members of the Roman Catholic Church. Those who adhere to crusade's belief number about 600, in the Coeur d'Alene area and reportedly several thousand nationwide. Locally they are scattered throughout Coeur d'Alene, the Rathdrum-Post Falls area and round the City of Mary. They have come from throughout the United States, particularly southern California, giving up good jobs or promising careers to practice an intense faith with a special devotion to the Virgin Mary, who they believe delivered a message of peering chaos and final hope at Fatima, Portugal on Oct. 13, 1917. Crusaders believe the Virgin Mary predicted that man would experience a second world war, the spread of communism, the annihilation of entire nations and a period of great chaos in the church if men did not amend their lives, pray the rosary, do penance, dress modestly and spread devotion to her. They accept that message literally. Fatima crusaders are strongly anti-Communist.

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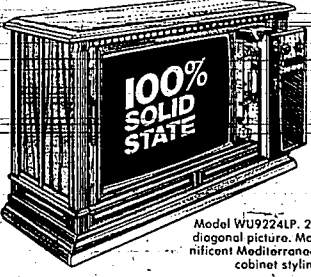
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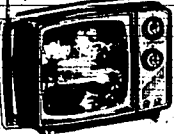


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Biographer criticizes author

MOSCOW (UPI)—Exiled Soviet author Alexander I. Solzhenitsyn lost communism but found God in a Stalinist labor camp. He writes about his spiritual experiences in the recently published second volume of his prison camp history, "The Gulag Archipelago." Illusionist Irya A. Medvedev in the book handles a constant critic of the Soviet regime but has hung on to his Marxist beliefs. He argues, in a review of Solzhenitsyn's book which he gave to foreign correspondents Monday, that the author is too hard on the materialists. "Having identified socialism with Stalinism, Solzhenitsyn found 'not' understand those people who whom tragedy in the camps became a stimulus for increasing the struggle toward Socialist 'justice,' Medvedev says. "Solzhenitsyn could not understand that the basis for really humane morale may be Socialist convictions. Medvedev, a biographer of former dictator Josef Stalin said he agrees with Solzhenitsyn that Stalinist crimes should be condemned. But he added: "I continue to think that only the real victory of socialist society will firmly guarantee mankind against the repetition of similar crimes." He said that "if today problems of ethics and morals have not found satisfactory application in Marxism, this does not mean that scientific socialism is unable by its nature to create moral values." Solzhenitsyn, in a chapter of his book called "Soul and Executioner, Wrote" said all revolutions in history have been false and brought evil in their wake. He criticized Marxism as an "infallible, impotent doctrine that demands only results." And he stated that "only belief in God saved and devalued the spirit of people in the camps." Solzhenitsyn—this—insubstantial and arrogant," Medvedev said.

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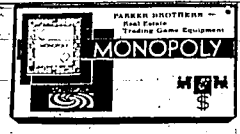
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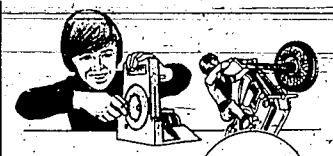
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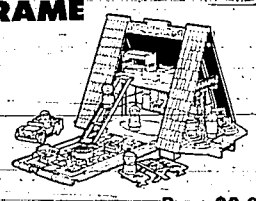
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Spud usage plan drawn

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rio, Oral Hansen and former Rep. Ralph Harding have asked the Ford administration to buy and ship 50 million pounds of dehydrated potatoes to countries in Africa and Asia suffering from a severe food shortage.

Hansen and Harding said they met with White House officials and later with Agriculture Secretary Earl Butte to outline the proposal to help deal with the food crisis in many parts of the world.

"The response to our plan has been positive," Hansen said. "It will enable this country to take a positive step to help save the lives of hundreds of thousands of persons who would otherwise die of starvation."

"And," he added, "it will bring positive benefits to the potato industry and the national economy."

Harding said they proposed that nations of the Middle East who have indicated a

willingness to help solve the world food crisis be invited to participate in financing the purchase and transportation of potato products to those nations threatened with mass starvation.

Waste water permits OK for Utah

DENVER (UPI) — The Environmental Protection Agency announced plans Wednesday to issue wastewater discharge permits to five agricultural operations in Utah.

The EPA regional office in Denver said the permits, good through Sept. 30, 1979, would be issued unless major objections are received by Christmas.

They will be issued to Fazio Eggs Farms in Salt Lake County, J. Y. Ferry & Son in West Corralie, Intermountain Farmers Association in Delta, Miller Brothers feed yard in Hyrum and Minersville Cow Palace in Minersville.

Under the proposed permits, all applicants will be required to dispose, without discharge, of any wastewater and contaminated runoff resulting from a 10-year, 24-hour rainfall event or the equivalent. For rainfalls of greater intensity, discharges of excess wastewater would be permitted.

BLM clears seed work

SHOSHONE — The Shoshone District Bureau of Land Management has let three seedling contracts involving 35 tons of various seed to over 9,000 acres of national resource lands.

Charles J. Walter, district manager, Shoshone office, said the 1974 seedling program is nearing completion at this time.

"I have no doubt that I could see an additional 10,000 acres of national resource land next year."

Fed head outlines \$\$\$\$ use

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Since quadrupling the price of oil, members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries have piled up huge financial reserves.

Arthur F. Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve System, testifying Wednesday before the Joint Economic Committee, gave Congress this breakdown of what OPEC members have done with the \$75 billion in oil revenues they received in the first 10 months of 1974.

— \$9 billion for imports of goods and services.

— \$10.5 billion invested in the United States, with \$5 billion put in government securities and most of the rest deposited in U.S. banks with scattered amounts invested in real estate, bank acceptances and other private securities.

— \$6.5 billion invested in the Eurocurrency market, most of it in short-term Euro-dollar deposits. (Eurodollars are American dollars held abroad.)

— \$1.5 billion invested in British institutions, mostly British banks but also British government bonds, private securities and real estate.

— \$1.5 billion loaned to governments in Western Europe and Japan.

— \$2 billion invested in bonds of international financial institutions or loans to the International Monetary Fund.

— \$1 billion given in grants or loans of which Egypt has probably been the largest recipient.

— The remaining \$7 billion scattered in other items including private securities and real estate in continental Europe and Japan.

Disaster area label pondered

OLYMPIA, Wash. (UPI) — Gov. Dan Evans said Tuesday he will decide before the end of the week whether to declare a part of the Colville Indian Reservation a disaster area because of high concentrations of DDT in reservation cattle.

The Colville Confederated Tribes asked for disaster status last week when it was found that about 6,000 head of cattle could not be sent to market because of too high pesticide levels in each cow.

Tribal officials said the cattle ingested DDT during the spraying of 150,000 acres of reservation land last summer under the tussock moth control project.

"If granted, a disaster declaration would clear the way for emergency feed for the cattle," tribal officials said.

Earlier this week, the Oregon Department of Agriculture reported about 5,500 head of cattle exposed to DDT in northeastern Oregon were being held from market until levels dropped within federal standards.

Chemical residues such as DDT accumulate in the fat of animals and break down in time, department officials said. "It would probably not be before spring that exposed cattle could be released to market."

In all, about 426,000 acres of forest land in Washington, Idaho and Oregon was sprayed with DDT in a one-time test as approved by the federal environmental protection agency.

Residue of the pesticide was reportedly found in some grass such as deer shortly after hunting season opened in areas of the northwestern earlier this fall, and hunters were advised to trim off fat.

Beef fed on grass on more tables now

LOGAN (UPI) — More grass-fed beef may be turning up on the tables of consumers because of rising production costs.

Flora Bardwell, Utah State University food and nutrition specialist, says the consumer won't notice any difference in the taste of meat, even though he may be buying more "choice and less 'prime' beef."

Normally, cattle are moved from grass ranges to a feed lot where special grain is used to quickly increase the animals' weight. But with grain shortages and high feed prices, ranchers are leaving their animals on the range to be fattened.

Mrs. Bardwell said grass-fed beef will be older, since range feeding takes longer than in the feed lot. She added that there would be less fat on the meat.

But she said the grading system for meat will not be changed.

"Beef will still be graded by the accepted USDA grading system so consumers can expect the same quality to which they have become accustomed," she said.

She said if the practice of bypassing the feed lot continues, it will mean buyers will become accustomed to more "good" and "standard" grades on the dinner table.

"And if the current high cost of grain continues, prime and choice grades of beef may become a luxury for the American table," she said.

Tobacco quota hike proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Agriculture Department officials generally feel the federal marketing quota for increased tobacco should be raised in 1975 for the third consecutive year, a government source said today.

The official stressed, however, that no final decision has been made yet on the 1975 quota for flue-cured, which makes up most of the U.S. tobacco crop. He said in an interview the decision will probably be announced Friday because federal law requires the announcement by Dec. 1, which is Sunday.

Flue-cured marketing quotas were increased 10 percent for 1973 and another 10 percent for this year.

Duck hunt ban suit traded for environment impact study

PORTLAND - A lawsuit to halt migratory-bird hunting nationwide has been settled out of court by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and four private organizations.

As a result, waterfowl hunting will not be interrupted this year, and the Interior Department has agreed to prepare an "environmental impact statement (EIS) before next year's migratory bird hunting regulations are issued."

The suit was filed because an environmental impact statement was not prepared for the 1974-75 migratory bird hunting season. The National Environmental Policy Act requires that major Federal actions significantly affecting the quality of the human environment must be preceded

by publication of a detailed statement of the responsible official on the environmental impact of the proposed action.

The EIS will describe and evaluate the long established procedure for setting migratory bird hunting regulations in the United States and the extensive data gathering programs on which annual decisions about regulations are based.

Moreover, as part of the agreement the EIS will discuss and evaluate the points of concern expressed by the plaintiffs in the case, who are the Fund for Animals, Inc.; the Humane Society of the United States; New Jersey Branch, Wildlife Preservers, Inc.; and Deer Ecology Environment, and Resources, Inc.

The points to be considered in connection with the preparation of the EIS include: shooting hours; limits; bag limits; and special seasons; hunting of restricted species; the point system; and hunting of cranes, swans, and mergansers.

Other points of concern the plaintiffs were simplification of waterfowl hunting regulations to the extent possible; requiring a duck stamp for all waterfowl hunters regardless of age; encouraging more effective enforcement of migratory bird hunting regulations; and more direct participation by the plaintiffs in development of annual migratory bird hunting regulations.

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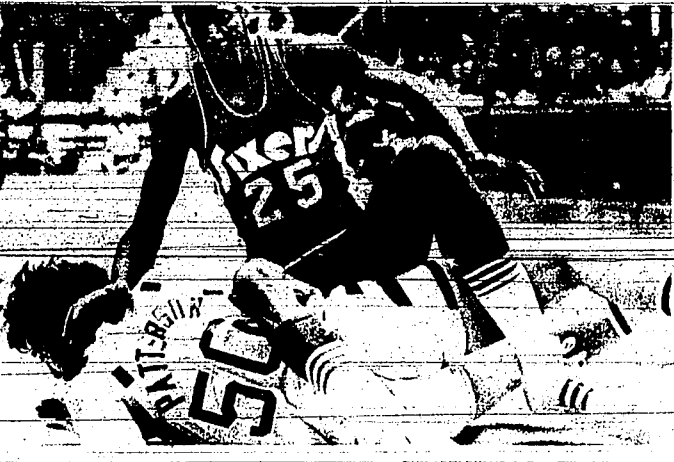

Memphis shoots for spot in title game

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (UPI) — The Memphis Southern take on the Florida Blazers tonight for the right to meet the Birmingham Americans in the World Football League's first World Bowl on Dec. 5.

Southern officials expect about 20,000 fans in the 50,000-seat Memphis Memorial Stadium for the final WFL playoff game which will be

televised nationally at 8 p.m. EST.

"Win or lose, the Blazers can expect to gain one thing from the matchup—their first paychecks since the middle of September.

After expenses are paid, 70 percent of the gate receipts from tonight's contest will go into a players' pool. The winners get 60 per cent of the

pool and the losers 40 per cent.

"The players hope to see a big crowd," Memphis Coach John McVay said. "But for the gate receipts and because they like to play in front of big home crowds. But if they had to, they'd play for nothing to win the championship."

Play for nothing is what the Blazers have done for more than two months. A deal that

was expected to give them their money this week fell through.

"We've had now," Florida quarterback Don Davis said. "The majority feel we're never going to get paid."

"We're going to take it out on Memphis," Blazers Coach Jack Pardee said.

The Southern, who haven't missed a paycheck in the league's inaugural season and finished with the best regular season record of 17-2, have the advantage of an extra week's rest going into the game.

South Carolina screening grid candidates for coaching job

COLUMBIA, S.C. (UPI) — Hitting head football coach Paul Dietzel says he and a screening committee have discussed several possibilities to replace him at South Carolina.

"They tried on some names with me for size," Dietzel said, adding that he only pointed out to the committee whether someone was honest and "a proven good coach."

"They might bring on a probation because of NCAA infractions," Dietzel said he wants to make sure the man who is finally chosen to replace him as head coach is not labeled "Paul Dietzel's man."

"There are people who don't care for Paul Dietzel and for that reason, and since we didn't exactly win the national championship this year, finishing 4-7 with much the same team that was 7-4 in 1971, whoever comes in, I want to make sure he's not Paul Dietzel's man."

"I don't want to select the coach, Dietzel said in a recent interview with UPI. "It's not my prerogative."

Dietzel, who led LSU to an 11-0 record in 1958 and the national championship, said the members of the university's board of trustees have assured him they want him to

remain as athletic director and will not offer the job to the new coach.

"I think they would like to have an established, proven head coach if they could possibly get one, and I think that's what they're shooting for," he said. "They're also considering some top assistants."

He said the premier athletic facilities the school has built during his nine-year tenure will help in attracting a top-notch coach and players.

Dietzel has a record of 42-53 at South Carolina and 109-93 overall.

Sutton says Arkansas isn't ready to play UCLA as yet

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (UPI) — Arkansas basketball coach Eddie Sutton said Thursday he felt the Razorbacks would be a pretty good team by the time Southwest Conference play begins in January. But the Razorbacks open their season Saturday night and Sutton said he is glad they aren't playing UCLA.

"I'm glad we're opening against Rockhurst instead of UCLA," Sutton said. "We're not ready for the Bruins."

Sutton makes his debut in Fayetteville against Rockhurst, a Jesuit College in Kansas City. He came to Arkansas from Creighton, which he coached to the NCAA playoffs last year with a 23-7 record.

Sutton said the Razorbacks would play a lot of man-to-man defense this year, will use the press and switch to a zone occasionally.

"We're putting a great deal of emphasis on defense," he said. "I don't know of any team sport that wins consistently over a period of time that doesn't play good defense."

On offense, he said the Razorbacks would fast break off missed shots and run any time the defense forces a turnover. "But it'll be a controlled fast break."

"We'll try to beat the other team down the court and get a

good shot, but if we don't have it, we'll try to gain a pattern and handle the ball until the offense makes a mistake."

Sutton said "We'll try to put a lot of emphasis on rebounding, and on the team concept because in order for a team to be successful you've got to make everyone understand there is no place for selfishness."

Sutton said the main problem with his team now was that the players hadn't adjusted completely to his system, but "overall, as far as talent, I think we've got some players."

The Razorbacks were 10-16 last season, but Sutton said in an interview he thinks "we'll improve on that this year."

"By the time we get to the conference, I think we'll be a pretty good basketball team," he said. "I think we'll be able to play with anybody in our league. That doesn't mean we'll beat them but we'll be respectable."

Sutton said the Razorbacks should beat Rockhurst, "but anytime you go to a basketball court, five players are capable of beating any other five. I've seen a lot of upsets and I have respect for anyone we play."

Bengals aim for Dolphins

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Cincinnati Bengals backfield coach Jack Donnadson said Miami's Sunday loss to the New York Jets won't catch his team off guard in Monday night's contest.

"They're every bit as good as last year. It's just that everyone is after them now, even more so this year than last year," Donnadson said. "They're targets for everybody, and it's only natural."

Bowl bids brighten usual 'traditional' grid games

Two traditional college football holiday trials will brighten up the television screen today, and for the first time in quite a spell both matchups will be inspired by something more than the "old rivalry" mystique.

The first contest of the afternoon pits Texas A&M against Texas for the first time, and the seventh-ranked Aggies, who have not fared very well against the Longhorns over the years, will be highly motivated this year because a victory would take them to the Cotton Bowl for the first time since 1961.

In recent years Texas usually has the Southwest Conference title clinched by this time, but Texas A&M currently leads the SWC and could wrap up the title with a victory. However, would enable Baylor to represent the SWC in the New Year's Day classic, Texas, which has gone to the Cotton Bowl the last six years, is out of the running but will be going to the Gator Bowl.

Not too surprisingly, Texas has been made an eight-point favorite. That's largely because the game is at Austin where the Aggies have beaten the Longhorns only four times in 41 previous visits. However, Texas Coach Darrell Royal

doesn't put much weight in past performances.

"I don't believe in all that past business," said Royal. "There are a number of people on the football team that haven't lost in Memorial Stadium, and it doesn't matter what happened back in eight-four. I don't believe in all that stuff. I don't think it's worth any points."

The other half of today's televised doublebill has sixth-ranked Auburn meeting unbeat and top-ranked Alabama at Birmingham. Both teams are already committed to postseason bowls—Alabama to the Orange and Auburn to the Gator—but the Tigers could gain a share of the Southeastern Conference title by beating the Crimson Tide Alabama, which has won the conference title the last three years, currently holds a one-game edge over Auburn, which has not finished on top in the conference since 1957.

The Tigers also will be out to spoil Alabama's perfect season just as they did two years ago when they turned a pair of blocked punts into scores to salvage a 17-16 victory. That is, the only regular season defeat for the Crimson Tide in its last 43 games.

Alabama has been made a 15-point favorite, but there are some, including Crimson assistant coach Bill Oliver, who feel this is the best Auburn, club in history.

"I think this is the finest Auburn team that I've ever seen as long as I can remember as a spectator, playing against, coaching for or coaching against," says Oliver. "Coach Shug Jordan has been at Auburn some 24 years and I think that possibly he thinks this is his best team, too."

The main reason that this is probably the best Auburn team ever to those high the line men they have.

This is the final weekend of college football for the regular season, and it began on Thursday night when ninth-ranked Penn State rallied in the second half to defeat Pitt for the ninth time in succession, 31-10.

The Nittany Lions, down 7-6 at the half, came from behind on two touchdown passes from Tom Shuman to Jim Eastie. Chris Blair kicked four field goals for the Lions.

The holiday package concludes Saturday with several other traditional matchups.

The most promising game on the Saturday schedule has fifth-ranked Notre Dame visiting fourth-ranked Southern California, in a
