

Suspension 'not equitable'

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls attorney suspended from practicing law for 90 days by the Idaho Supreme Court last week does not think the decision was equitable.

Day L. Depeu received the suspension for representing himself as both an attorney and a certified public accountant.

Kull told UPI. If you're going to be an attorney, you ought to stick to being an attorney, or if you're going to be a CPA, do that, but you can't do both, according to the supreme court order today.

But Depeu said the suspension by the supreme court was not, in his opinion, fair because he had never tried to develop a separate practice as a tax attorney.

"I never did have two practices," Depeu said in answer to the charge that he was using one practice to feed the other. "They looked at it as though it was two practices, which it was not." The two disciplines are so interrelated. When can you tell when you are practicing law and when you are a CPA?"

Despite his feelings that the supreme court ruling was unfair, Depeu did not avail himself of the opportunity to present arguments on his behalf.

"It's a matter more for legislation than for the bar association than it is for the courts," he said. "The general practitioners (among attorneys) do not practice. I don't think they can point to any one client that I look away from them. Most of them are so busy that they can't give timely service anyway."

According to Ron Kull, executive director of the Idaho State Bar Association, the fact that Depeu had listed himself on checks and letterheads as both an attorney and a CPA represented a violation of the bar association code of ethics.

"According to our code of professional responsibility you either have to hold yourself out as a CPA or an attorney but you can't do both," Kull told the UPI following the high court's suspension order.

Kull said Depeu had previously been reprimanded for using the joint listings in his letterheads.

The bar association had recommended to the supreme court that Depeu be given a six-month suspension.

"Basically, they take the attitude that you're soliciting business, trying to use one occupation to feed the other,"

Depeu said he had made his name their area of specialization.

"You are fighting a closed society," he added.

During his suspension, Depeu said he will act as a business consultant.

His present 15 or 20 clients will refer to other attorneys.

Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robert E. Bakes welcomed the new citizens, praised their enthusiasm and said they have demonstrated their interest in becoming good citizens.

Education team to train teachers

TWIN FALLS — More than 30 school teachers will be roughing it Saturday to learn about environmental education.

An 11-member environmental education team will train 33 Twin Falls teachers Saturday from 8:30 to 4:30 at Camp Rock, the Boy Scout camp in the Hagerman Valley, according to Stuart Murrell, chairman of the team.

Murrell said the team was set up three years ago to encourage environmental and conservation education in Magic Valley schools. After Saturday's session, over 400 teachers will have been trained to teach students what they learned in the workshop.

Participants will learn by inquiry, by running experiments and reaching their own conclusions, Murrell said.

The teaching team includes personnel from the Idaho Fish and Game Department, U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management Soil Conservation Service, College of Southern Idaho and Morningside school.

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WASHINGTON—A massive and controversial revision of the Federal Criminal Code, is approaching its first test in Congress, with a powerful coalition of sponsors determined to push the complex legislation through before the 1976 election.

The 750-page bill, more than four years in the drafting, would reinstate capital punishment, expand federal criminal jurisdiction, rewrite the law in such sensitive areas as insanity and obscenity and impose new limits on press access to government information that have aroused strong opposition.

Among the press limits are a provision that would subject a reporter to a fine up to \$100,000 and a seven-year jail sentence in penitentiary for making unclassified "national defense information" public if he knows that information "may be used to the prejudice of the safety or interest of the United States or to the advantage of a foreign power."

Critics of the bill charge that

this would eliminate virtually all reporting of activities of the state and defense departments other than official public positions of those agencies.

The chief backer of the measure, Sen. John L. McClellan, D-Ark., has reassembled a list of co-sponsors that includes both party floor leaders, Senators Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., and Hugh Scott, R-Pa., and conservatives like Senators James O. Eastland, D-Miss., and Roman L. Hruska, R-Neb., and liberals like Senators Birch Bayh, D-Ind., and Frank E. Moss, D-Utah.

The Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Criminal Laws held perfunctory final hearings on the bill two days last week, and the full committee, prodded by McClellan, is expected to process the new code in time to reach the Senate floor by July.

Even before the Senate acts, a House Judiciary subcommittee plans to begin its hearings. This timetable, unusually condensed by Congressional standards, is

regarded as necessary if the code is to have any chance of enactment before the legislators adjourn next year.

Apart from numerous controversial features, the McClellan bill is so long and complicated that getting an agreed version through both houses in 16 months presents a formidable practical problem for its sponsors. The fact that so many members are lawyers given to fly-specking is not likely to speed the process.

Federal criminal laws have never been codified but have simply accumulated over nearly 200 years as Congress added them to the code. A major purpose of the legislation is to replace this

patchwork collection of offenses, defenses and punishments with an ordered, logical and uniform statute.

In the process, however, Senate staff lawyers worked into the text a number of new

provisions, some of them revisions of existing law, others, interpretations of court decisions, and still others, fresh attempts to deal with events like the publication of the Pentagon papers.

Terrorist demand rejection proper

BONN (UPI)—Chancellor Helmut Schmidt said today the government did its rightful duty in rejecting demands made by terrorists who attacked and blew up the West German embassy in Stockholm.

"This was the most difficult challenge in the 26-year history of the Federal Republic of West Germany," Schmidt told a packed Parliament which applauded his statements.

The West German decision to stand firm against the terrorist demands was a complete aboutface. In the past, West Germany has given in to all demands by both Arab and West German anarchists.

"I have said that we intend to do our duty to defend the security of our state," Schmidt told the deputies and a nationwide television audience. "I am convinced that we did our rightful duty yesterday."

Schmidt said no comparison could be made between the soft line the government took when guerrillas kidnaped West Berlin mayor candidate Peter Lorenz two months ago and the Stockholm attack. Bonn allowed five imprisoned guerrillas to go free in return for Lorenz's life.

"In the Lorenz case we didn't know who or where the criminals were," he said. "In Stockholm we knew where they were and that there was a chance to save the hostages either through negotiation or police action."

As soon as the attack on the embassy began, Schmidt called together a crisis staff of cabinet ministers and leading opposition politicians to decide how to handle the matter.

"We were determined not to yield," he said.

"We would have faltered in our duty if we had released the 26 unscrupulous criminals," Schmidt said.

Part of the demands made by the Stockholm attackers called for the release of 26 suspected urban guerrillas detained in German jails, including gang leaders Ulrike Meinhof and Andreas Baader.

JFK slayer in solo act

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, but was "either under the influence or the orders of (Cuban premier Fidel) Castro," former President Lyndon Johnson told columnist Marianne Means.

The King Features Syndicate columnist wrote Thursday that Johnson confided the information to her at his Texas ranch about a year before he died.

Miss Means said that Johnson swore her to secrecy, but that she was breaking that confidence now "because Johnson's opinion appears to debunk the current speculation that the Central Intelligence Agency might somehow have been involved in the Kennedy assassination."

\$4 million in fuel dumped, Navy says

NORFOLK, Va. (UPI)—The U.S. Navy, which once said its ships only infrequently discarded fuel while at sea, now admits that more than 11 million gallons of bulk petroleum, valued at \$12 million was lost or dumped during 1974.

The Navy said 62 million gallons were dumped overboard last year and the balance of 4.8 million gallons was classified as inventory "losses."

The formal announcement by the Navy follows disclosures that the Norfolk-based carrier "Independence" dumped 2,500 gallons of aviation fuel off the South Carolina coast. At the time, the Navy said discarding the fuel into the ocean was cheaper, safer and more efficient than bringing it back to port for unloading.

Navy spokesmen said the fuel, which cost about \$1.3 million to replace, was contaminated.

The Virginia Pilot

newspaper, however, quoted a classified Navy audit as saying "the economics of reclaiming contaminated fuel now outweigh the practicalities of disposing of it."

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Housing finance measure facing veto

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republicans said a bill designed to help many Americans — particularly the unemployed — to buy homes or keep the ones they already have faces a veto.

Democrats say it will make homes affordable for many, revive the depressed construction industry and fight the recession cheaply.

bill's cost — at least \$2 billion over six years. He said the measure would "governmentalize" the housing industry.

But Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., called the bill a cheap shot by the government to fight the recession.

For an investment of \$1 billion in mortgage subsidies,

he said, the government will spur \$12 billion in economic activity, which would produce \$2 billion in additional tax revenues.

Under the bill, the government would:

- Pay the interest of up to \$300 a month for up to 36 months to unemployed homeowners who were two months behind in

mortgage payments and had received foreclosure notices. The loans would be interest free until after the final payment was made. Interest would then accrue at a maximum 5 per cent rate. The homeowner could repay on his own timetable or when he sold the house.

Make mortgage credit available at 8 per cent interest or less whenever the nation's annual rate of housing starts is below 1.6 million for four consecutive months. It is now well below 1 million.

Offer 6 per cent mortgage loans to middle-income families for three years with the in-

terest rate rising to the market rate over the next three years. These would be available to up to 400,000 families whenever the housing start level fell under 1.4 million.

As an alternative to the subsidized mortgage, a family could take a \$1,000 cash grant to help make a down payment. The program generally would apply only to houses costing \$48,000 or less.

It would be available to families whose income is no more than 20 per cent over the median for their community — generally families with incomes between \$10,000 and \$18,000.

Rail rebuilding measure proposed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — An agency of the Interstate Commerce Commission will recommend a \$12 billion railroad rebuilding plan financed through tax increases on gasoline and other transportation fuels.

The recommendation will come this weekend in a report by the ICC's Rail Services Planning Office. The report will be highly critical of the U.S. Railway Association's preliminary plan for restructuring bankrupt northeastern railroads.

According to knowledgeable sources, the report will accuse the USRA of vastly underestimating the cost of rehabilitating the bankrupt lines and of using accounting practices which vastly overestimate the potential profitability of the new corporation — called ConRail — set to take over operation of the best lines of all the bankrupt carriers next year.

The planning office was established by Congress to monitor and receive public comment on the USRA planning process.

"Despite the size of the plan and the vast amount of work which it entailed, it is in many respects a disappointing document," the planning office is reported to say of the USRA plan.

Instead, the planning office recommends a five-year \$12 billion plan to revitalize all the nation's railroads, not just those in the Northeast. The report will say that under current conditions no railroad can afford the massive but

necessary costs of rebuilding. Nationalization may be a last resort, the report says.

The rebuilding plan would be financed through a 2-cent per gallon tax on all fuel used in surface transportation except for buses. This presumably would include passenger cars. Also, there would be a 0.14-cent per kilowatt hour tax on energy used in transportation.

Under the U.S.R.A. preliminary system plan, the Penn Central and other bankrupt railroads in the Northeast and Midwest would be merged into a single system with many unprofitable branch lines either abandoned or subsidized by the federal and local governments.

The planning office challenges the accuracy of the data used by USRA and recommends a two-year moratorium on all abandonments pending further study.


The USRA plan placed rail rehabilitation costs for the Northeast at \$2.3 billion. The planning office said that cost would go above \$6 billion.

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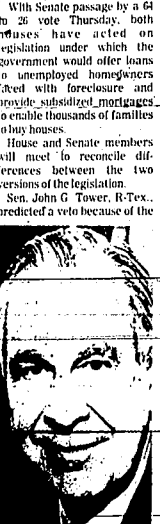

Military command merged

PARIS — Syria and Jordan have agreed to establish joint military commands for their land and air forces, according to official information reaching here from the Middle East.

The accord was said to have been reached under Soviet sponsorship.

Under the agreement, Jordan, which has previously relied on the United States for arms — old and new — taken a basically anti-Soviet stand, would move into the group of Middle Eastern countries that look toward Moscow for support.

In Washington, Ford administration officials familiar with Middle East and Syria developments expressed strong doubt that Jordan and Syria had agreed on joint commands. One official suggested that the report might be a Jordanian "trial balloon" to get more military equipment, particularly anti-aircraft missiles, during King Hussein's visit to Washington next week.

Levy quints gain faster than mother

CINCINNATI (UPI) — All five newborn "Levy quintuplets" progressed faster than their petite mother today.

The quints took milk from the bottle and were listed in "good" condition, while 106-pound Pamela Levy made a slow, but still satisfactory recovery.

"All five babies are now being fed by the bottle and their conditions remain good," reported Dr. Irwin Light.

Mrs. Levy's physician, Dr. Allen R. Shade, said the new mother's condition was "satisfactory," but noted her post-operative course is somewhat slower than the average caesarian section.

However, the doctor said Mrs. Levy's "excess fluid problem" was being treated.

The babies — three girls and two boys — were drinking a "routine milk formula" from the feeding bottles. They remained in incubators at General Hospital's premature nursery.

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Idahoans favor canyon guards

SANDPOINT, Idaho (UPI) — Gov. Cecil D. Andrus says the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry is wrong in thinking Idahoans do not want to protect the Middle Snake River from dam building.

"They are completely erroneous in their assumption that the people do not want the area protected from construction of the dams in the river," Andrus said in a telephone interview with the Sandpoint Daily Bee.

"There are an adequate number of polls, both political and non-political, that indicate the people strongly favor protection of the canyon in its free-flow state."

Andrus' statements came in response to an inquiry from the Bee concerning an IACI news release announcing its opposition to HB30, which would establish a 700,000-acre national park area on 703 miles of the river.

The IACI was formed Jan. 1 of this year when the State Chamber of Commerce and the Association of Idaho Industries merged. Since that time the IACI has been holding regional meetings throughout the state soliciting membership of the 85

local Idaho chambers of commerce.

Members of the IACI include such firms as Hecla Mines, Bunker Hill, Diamond International, the larger banks in the state, Pacific Forest Industries, Mountain Bell, Simplot, Boise Cascade and others.

L. E. Johnson, Boise, whose Johnson-Kersting Agency which issued the IACI statement, said virtually all "polls" processors belong to the association. Numerous other small and large companies also belong to it.

In his news release, IACI President Leo Bodine said the bill as presently written is "poorly conceived and unnecessarily restrictive in several respects."

"Especially, we are concerned that members of Congress may assume from presentations by officials of this state that there is a unanimous opinion among the people of Idaho in support of HB30," Bodine said.

Andrus said, "This special interest group is absolutely correct in their assumption that this bill is designed to prohibit further construction of dams on the river."



Program effective

BOISE (UPI) — Only 163 of the 5,114 persons who have been counseled in the state driver improvement program last year have since been cited for traffic violations, the department of law enforcement said Thursday.

Traffic violators are given the alternative of attending the counseling program rather than accept suspension or revocation of their licenses. The program is administered by Law Enforcement Driver Services Bureau.

It is designed to determine the most effective methods of improving driver skills at times and habits in order to reduce traffic violations and motor vehicle accidents and to place such determination to effective use for the benefit of the people of Idaho.

'76 meet set in Gem

BOISE (UPI) — The Rocky Mountain Oil and Gas Association will hold its 1976 spring meeting in Boise with the Idaho Petroleum Council as host, Ralph Waring, council chairman announced Thursday.

Several hundred oil and natural gas industry men and women from 17 other intermittent states will attend, Waring said.

Amtrak grants approved

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Thursday approved \$1.12 billion in grants to Amtrak, the national passenger train network.

The money includes \$873 million to make up deficits expected through Oct. 1, 1977, and \$245 million for new passenger train equipment and other improvements.

The bill passed 280 to 63 after the House defeated 198 to 155 a move to prevent a salary increase for Amtrak's new president, Paul Reistrup.

As passed, the bill would allow Reistrup's current \$60,000 salary ceiling to be increased to \$85,000. Reistrup was making \$82,000 as a vice president of the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad before he joined Amtrak on March 1.

Reistrup was praised repeatedly during the debate, even by those who wanted to maintain the \$60,000 salary ceiling and who said that the issue was not Reistrup but whether any salary should be raised.

Even Cabinet members made only \$60,000, they said.

The praise for Reistrup was in marked contrast to previous years. His predecessor Roger Lewis often was the subject of congressional criticism. Congress several years ago cut Lewis' original \$125,000 salary down to the \$60,000 ceiling.

The bill additionally prohibits Amtrak from discontinuing any train prior to March 1, 1977.

Within 120 days of enactment, however, Amtrak must present a comprehensive plan to Congress, the Interstate Commerce Commission, and the Transportation Department establishing procedures for discontinuing or adding routes and services within the basic Amtrak system plan.

The attorney general and the treasury secretary are ordered to work with Amtrak in establishing immigration procedures for international rail travelers. There have been complaints of slow and cumbersome procedures by customs officials at Canadian border points.

The bill now goes to the Senate where quick passage is expected.

Amtrak currently is undergoing a cash crunch, but officials have said the agency can continue passenger operations by delaying payments to the railroads which operate Amtrak trains.

Rock collection donated

MOSCOW, Idaho (UPI) — Two University of Idaho alumni, Mr. and Mrs. Frank H. Thomas of Idaho Falls, have donated their lifetime collection of rocks to the university geology department.

Half of the donation already has arrived at Moscow and the other half will be shipped at a later date.

The specimens include minerals and fossils from southern Idaho and Wyoming, said Dr. George Williams, geology department head. "Many are specimens of minerals we do not have."

Williams said the bulk of the collection is agate, jasper, petrified wood and some amethyst.

He said one of the unusual articles in the collection is a model of a church and rectory made of minerals by Oscar Sullivan, the Agate

King of Colorado. The model contains a light inside and when lit shows a vast spectrum of light.

Williams said credit for negotiating the donation should go to university alumni in the Idaho Falls area.

"Many articles are museum grade specimens. The goodies are very fine," he said.

He said there also are excellent quality fossil specimens of ammonites, squid-like creatures that lived almost 100 million years ago at the end of the age of dinosaurs.

"The specimens are unique in that some have portions of the shell preserved, showing the growth lines," Williams said.

The specimens will be displayed in the College of Mines department museum or used for classroom purposes, he said. Use of the materials will begin when cataloging and labeling are completed.

Employees OK strike

IDAHO FALLS, Idaho (UPI) — Bonneville county road and bridge employees voted to strike Tuesday and then made a surprise announcement urging the recall of County Commissioner Art Detrick.

Only about one-half of the union members showed up at the strike vote meeting but the tally was 21 in favor of a strike, said Darrel Miller, a union spokesman.

"He did not say, however, when the union might begin the strike."

The 21 members of the union at the meeting also made the recall announcement.

Although it was believed that the recall movement against Detrick was dead, union member Bill Pritchett indicated that was not the case.

Pritchett said, "We have several hundred signatures now and plan to get more than 6,000."

Commissioner Detrick was not in Idaho Thursday and not available for comment.

Here is a hand from her book that illustrates this convention at work. East assumes from the bidding that his partner holds some trick somewhere and that if he can get a diamond lead the slam will be set.

His double asks for an unusual lead. West thinks a while. He reasons that if East wanted a heart lead he could have doubled five hearts to ask for it. It is unlikely the suit is clubs because West himself is short in that. Therefore East is likely to be void of diamonds.

West dutifully opens a diamond. East ruffs and West's queen of trumps is left to defeat the well-bid slam.

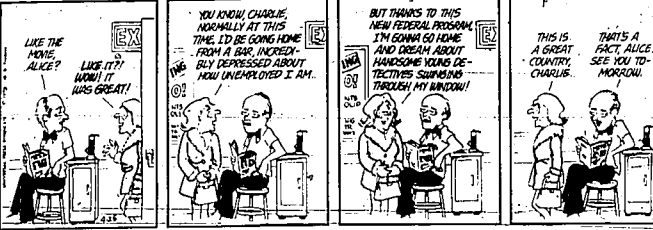

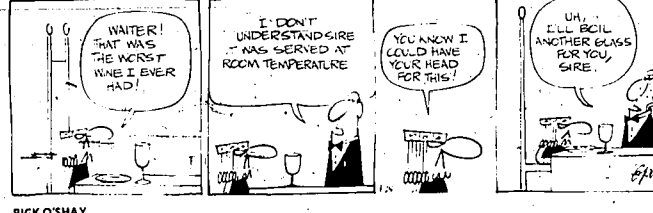

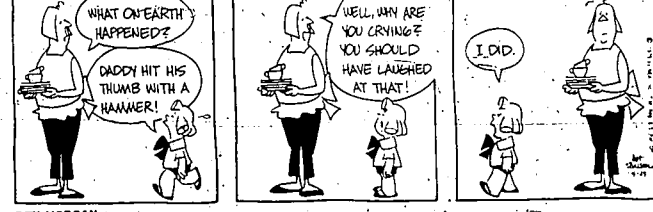

SAN DIEGO — To the Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of San Diego, Janet Gleason is a heretic guilty of "subliminal pro-abortion education" who has forfeited her ministerial role as a lady reader of the

church and the right to receive its sacraments.
But to elated members of the National Organization for Women and other women's libertarians across the country, the mother of three teenagers has suddenly become a symbol and rallying point for challenging the Catholic Church's stand against abortion.
"A modern Joan of Arc condemned by Catholicism's male chauvinistic hierarchy," said one of a pile of telegrams and letters spilling over from a table onto the floor in the Gleason home in La Jolla on the oceanfront slope of Mt. Solitary.
Slightly daunted by her sudden prominence nationally in the women's rights movement and not altogether pleased by the anger toward the Catholic Church on the part of some of her NOW colleagues, Mrs. Gleason said:

Even though I have been spiritually uncommunicated for openly supporting what is the law of the land, I still consider myself deep down in my conscience to be a good Catholic and a good Christian."
"I am not in favor of abortion, despite what the Bishop says, anyone that I am in favor of, cancer, nor is NOW crusading for abortion," she said. "We only demand a free choice and recognition of the fact that every woman is the master of her own body."

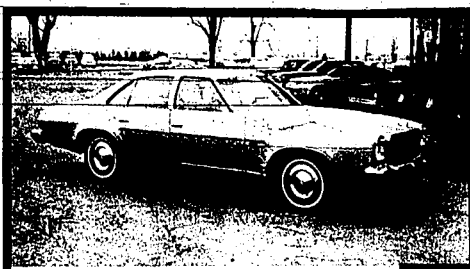

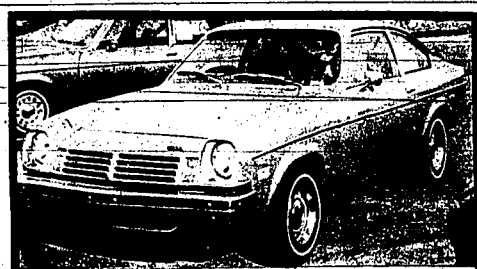

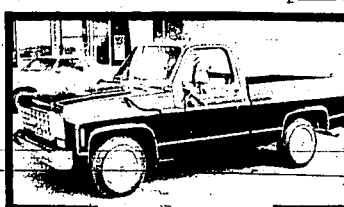
