

# Marines rescue ship, crew, pull out

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. helicopters, flying after dark in the face of heavy fire, today evacuated a Marine assault force from Koh Tang island to complete a successful rescue of the American merchant ship Mayaguez and its 45-man crew from their Cambodian captors.

At least one Marine, and maybe two, died and "many" were wounded in the 16-hour firefight between nearly 200 Marines and several hundred communist troops on the tiny island 20 miles from the Cambodian coast, the Pentagon said.

"It's all over," Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said when asked at a White House ceremony about the three-day international crisis that began Monday when Cambodian forces took over the Mayaguez.

President Ford, who ordered the military assault when diplomatic efforts failed, today indicated the action reaffirmed the United States' leadership in world affairs.

"The U.S. commitment to peace and progress for the world has remained firm," Ford said in a welcoming ceremony for the Shah of Iran at the White House.

Three helicopters were destroyed and at least two others damaged in the original assault at 5:20 p.m. MDT-Wednesday night (this morning, Asian time).

Fighting in Indochina for the first time in 28 months, the Marines boarded the Mayaguez and landed on the island today, bringing about the release of the 40 Americans and five Thai crewmen.

The evacuation, however, was held up until dark by heavy small arms fire from the Cambodians. The Pentagon said the risky removal of the troops to the aircraft carrier Coral Sea nearby was completed about 7 a.m. MDT.

Ford, emphasizing his promise to stand firm in the face of potential adversaries in the wake of recent U.S. setbacks in

Indochina, drew strong praise for the move from Congress and the public in telephone calls to the White House.

Pentagon spokesman Joseph Laitin said the first helicopter took off at 7:10 a.m. MDT from the little island and landed 10 minutes later on the deck of the carrier Coral Sea about 10 miles out in the Gulf of Siam.

Laitin said military officials believe that helicopter carried the last of approximately 200 Marines put on the island Wednesday night as part of a successful military effort to free the American merchant ship Mayaguez and its crew of 40 Americans from their Cambodian captors.

Laitin said the destroyers Holt and Wilson, both steaming less than 100 miles off the shore of the island, would continue a search for any Marines left behind until a count could prove that all had been rescued.

The successful night-time rescue — faster than the one the

Pentagon had hoped to carry out in the fading hours of the daylight — took place after initial attempts to send helicopters for the Marines were repulsed by heavy Communist gunfire from the island.

Some of the wounded were evacuated early, and indications were that at least eight wounded were among those Marines still on the island. But the Pentagon said the assault force was "not pinned down."

President Ford, carefully observing the 1973 War Powers Act which requires the chief executive to explain to Congress any military action, today officially sent to the Senate and the House his report of his successful order to rescue the Mayaguez.

Ford's two-page letter did not substantially go beyond his earlier public statements but summarized the use of force within 48 hours of the first action as required by the legislation.

MAYAGUEZ was boarded by the Mayaguez from an American destroyer at mid-morning Asia time (Wednesday night MDT) and others were landed on the island in two waves by helicopter. Three helicopters were lost and two damaged in the assault.

The Mayaguez crew — 40 Americans and five Thais — were later released by the Cambodians in a fishing boat under a white flag.

Defense Secretary James Schlesinger at an early morning news conference called the operation "eminently successful" and paid tribute to the "professional skill" of the Marines.

#### Laotians free US hostages

#### Thailand denounces America

BANGKOK (UPI) — Thousands of demonstrators denounced the United States today for sending Marines to Thailand as part of the recapture of a merchant vessel from the Cambodians, but Prime Minister Kriangsak Piboolong said he would not break diplomatic relations with Washington.

#### Wins suit



LONDON (UPI) — The British Broadcasting Corp. has agreed to pay damages and apologize to Frank Sinatra.

Sinatra sued BBC after a 1972 television program alleged he was given an academy-award winning role as Magglo in "From Here to Eternity" because of Mafia connections. A court ruling ordered BBC to pay \$2,300 damages, a like amount toward court costs, and to apologize.

#### Israelis tighten border patrols

#### Jobless benefit numbers decline

WASHINGTON (UPI) — For the first time in 10 weeks, less than 6.3 million persons are receiving unemployment insurance payments, the Labor Department said today.

It was the first time since the week ending Feb. 15 that the total was under 6.3 million.

The total dropped 60,800 from the week ended April 19 when payments were made to 6,352,600 persons through the various programs.

#### Alaska crash claims ex-Flier woman

FILER — Gayle Cobb Braden, 29, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jay Cobb Filer, was killed Monday night in a plane crash in the Sitka-Laurens islands of Alaska.

She was one of six persons in a small aircraft which crashed on take off near the village of Savongna. Members of the Cobb family, said Mrs. Braden, a school teacher, had flown to Savongna on school business along with another teacher. All six persons on the plane were killed.

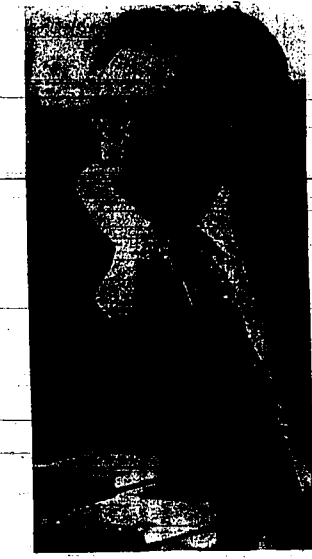

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## Asian aides worried by rescue move

A London newspaper said today the United States was justified in military action to rescue the SS Mayaguez and its crew from the Cambodians, but foreign ministers of five Southeast Asian nations were reported deeply concerned by the action.

"The Americans were justified in going to the limit to rescue their men and their ship," the Daily Mail of London said.

"But nothing can quite wipe out this final insult to American pride in Southeast Asia—before the defeat in Vietnam—a handful of Communist gunboats would never have dared to seize a ship belonging to the mighty United States."

"The Times of London said, "This time it would be difficult to blame the United States administration for what occurred."

"This was clearly an act of piracy—indeed, being carried out by the naval forces of another country, an act of war—which no government could ignore," the Times said.

The Guardian newspaper, however, said President Ford's decision to use force may have been hasty and reckless.

"Far from intimidating the Khmer Rouge, it may have pushed events bloodily out of control," the Guardian said.

In Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, however, an official attending the meeting of foreign ministers of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations said the diplomats viewed "with grave concern" the recapture of the Mayaguez and crew by U.S. Marines.

Thailand's foreign minister, Chatichai Choonhavan, briefed the diplomats on the Mayaguez affair, which strained Thai-U.S. relations, but refused to comment to newsmen.

Indonesian Foreign Minister Adam Malik told newsmen, "It is very unhappy over the developments and it is something which is causing us great concern."

Filipino delegation sources said Philippines Foreign Secretary Carlos P. Romulo was particularly concerned that the American military intervention had taken place at a time when the foreign ministers were discussing ways to maintain peace in the region.

### Heyburn approves N-power contract

HEYBURN — Heyburn Wednesday night approved an option contract as a first step toward buying into a large nuclear power development in Washington state to obtain future electrical power.

Rupert meanwhile is still considering whether to enter into a similar contract, after tentatively deciding against it.

Earlier, Burley had signed such an agreement.

However, in a reversal, the Burley City Council plans to reconsider the \$200,000 option contract because councilmen believe they were misinformed as to its cost.

Last week Burley agreed to sign an "option contract" obligating the city up to \$200,000 plus interest for preliminary planning for the construction of four nuclear power plants by WPPSS (Washington Public Power Supply System).

However, before approving the contract, the council was incorrectly informed that the city was obligated to only \$20,000 according to city clerk Bud Bringer.

Bringer said the error was caused by a misplaced decimal point.

The signed agreement would allow the city to later sign a "participant's agreement" costing the city about \$4.4 million for part ownership in the four nuclear reactor plants.

The city will reconsider the option contract at next Monday's regular city council meeting.

In the meantime, the City of Heyburn also approved the option contract Wednesday night.

Heyburn's contract could cost up to \$270,000 plus interest. If Heyburn later signs the participant's agreement the city will pay about \$5.9 million plus interest for its share of the power plants.

The total cost of the plants is now estimated at about \$2.2 billion.

Councilmen signing on for the building of the plants will not have to pay up the money in a single lump sum but will pay their shares by charging higher electric rates.

Earlier this week Rupert city officials had decided not to sign the contracts, but Rupert electric department head Elmer Schenk said today the city may have to reconsider in view of a request Wednesday for additional power from an industrial firm in the city.

### Ford sends report

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In formal compliance with the 1973 War Powers Act, President Ford today reported to Congress on his decision to use military force to retake the captured American freighter Mayaguez and rescue its 45 member crew.

In a letter to House Speaker Carl Albert and Sen. James O. Eastland, D-Miss., president pro tem of the Senate, Ford said "U.S. forces have begun the process of disengagement and withdrawal."

Ford's two page letter was required under the War Powers Act, which authorizes a president to use military forces for periods up to 90 days without permission of Congress.

The law required Ford to explain his actions within 48 hours of the first action.

Ford's letter did not go into detail much beyond the public announcement by the White House Wednesday night.

### House panel holds action on Hansen

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A House ethics committee has postponed indefinitely any action on petitions calling for removal of Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, from office.

Chairman John Flynt, D-Ga., said after a closed meeting at which the Committee on Standards of Official Conduct discussed the petitions his committee may not be the proper avenue to process such requests.

Under House rules, he said, a move to expel a member from Congress should be by resolution from another member. Such a motion is privileged, he said, and may be called up and decided without going into committee.

Flynt's committee received petitions from Mrs. Catherine Nelson, Idaho Falls, and a number of other persons in Idaho's Second District asking Hansen's removal from office.

Hansen recently pleaded guilty to two misdemeanor violations of the federal Campaign Practices Act and was fined \$2,000.

### Ford welcomes Shah to capital

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford, hours after completion of his gravest international crisis, welcomed the Shah of Iran today by saying, "The U.S. commitment to peace and progress for the world has remained firm."

Ford was unsmiling as he welcomed the Shah in an outdoor 21-gun salute ceremony on the south grounds of the White House.

### Another record

TWIN FALLS — Unsuspecting Magic Valley residents were struck by record-high temperatures Wednesday.

An all-time high of 81 degrees was recorded at Kimberly, about two weeks after another record was set — for the greatest amount of snow in May.

### Consumer agency draws arms bar

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate has decided it does not want the proposed consumer protection agency to try to ban guns or otherwise interfere with citizens' rights to possess firearms.

An amendment telling the agency to keep its hands off the guns issue was tacked onto the legislation Wednesday as the Senate moved toward final approval, which may come today.

Sen. James A. McClure, R-Idaho, said he proposed the provision to prevent another situation such as that which has arisen at the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

That agency has been told by a federal court that it must consider a petition from a Chicago-based group for a ban on bullets as "a hazardous substance." The agency has called for public comment on the petition and may eventually hold hearings on it.

McClure claimed it was never the intent of Congress for the Consumer Product Safety Commission to get involved in restricting handguns or any other firearms or ammunition — and he didn't intend to let something similar happen with the proposed new agency, designed to represent the consumer viewpoint before other federal agencies.

A move to defer action on McClure's amendment failed on a 67-27 roll call vote. The amendment-based group for a ban on voice votes, by the unusual senatorial procedure not recorded on how they voted.

Twice Wednesday, by votes of 64 to 28 and 70 to 22, the Senate refused to scrap the whole idea of a new agency in favor of substitute proposals reflecting President Ford's preferences.

# Senators praise US action

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senators from both parties today praised President Ford's handling of the Mayaguez incident, saying the action should strengthen the United States' image abroad.

Sen. Henry H. Jackson, D-Wash., said the President's "high marks" were "Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine said the outcome "should be satisfying to all of us." Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., said he was grateful that Ford showed enough "guts to do what he should have done."

The accolades came hours after Ford announced on nationwide television that the

American merchant ship Mayaguez, which along with its 45-man crew was seized by the Cambodians Monday, had been freed by Marines during a wide-scale military operation that involved airplanes, helicopters, ships and troops.

"I must say I give him high marks for the way in which he handled it," said Jackson who is seeking the Democratic presidential nomination in 1976. "The President deserves high marks and I would be the first to commend him. He did basically the right thing."

Goldwater said he "emphatically" approved of Ford's actions.

"It's the only thing he could have done. I'm glad he did it because this country needs an indication of strength and leadership in the President's office and he's finally come through with it."

"I think other nations are going to leave us alone and having not done what he did every little as I saw half-ass nations in the world would be kicking us at us. And I think now they're going to think twice before they try it."

"I thank God we have a President who has shown guts enough to do what he should have done," Jackson and Goldwater were

interviewed on the NBC Today show.

Muskie and Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, both said they were "gratified" by the outcome of the operation.

"I think that their (the crews) safety and recovery should have been and was our first objective and the outcome should be satisfying to all of us," Muskie said.

Church said he thought Ford "acted wisely under the circumstances and is to be commended for the direction he gave to the crisis."

Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield told reporters: "I'm just relieved it's turned

out as it has. It's over with apparently."

"I think that President Ford is very much against a re-involvement in Indochina, and I'm sure that, watching him last evening, this decision was a very hard one for him to make."

## Marines rescue Mayaguez, crew

Ford drew strong bipartisan praise from Congress for ordering the rescue after diplomatic efforts failed to get the ship, captured in international waters Monday.

President aides said the use of American warships, aircraft and Marines underscored his promise that the United States will not retreat from potential adversaries following debates in Cambodia and Vietnam.

More than 12 hours after the island assault, at 5:20 p.m. MDT Wednesday, the Pentagon reported that several attempts to remove a force of nearly 200 Marines by helicopter had been beaten back by communist ground fire from the island. But the Pentagon said the Marines were "not pinned down."

President Ford ordered the recapture of the Mayaguez Wednesday night after two days of diplomatic relations failed and the Khmer Rouge government in Cambodia refused to return the ship.

After air strafing sank three Cambodian gunboats Wednesday and drove others away, Marines boarded the Mayaguez near the tiny island of Koh Tang 38 miles off the Cambodian coastline. The vessel was unscathed but there was warm food still in the galley.

The Marines were landed on Koh Tang by helicopter and Navy fighters bombed an airfield on the Cambodian mainland in an effort to forestall any Cambodian air support to the island. Schlesinger said 17 Cambodian airplanes were destroyed, many of them small craft.

The attacks Wednesday night, Washington time, apparently convinced the captors to release the crewmen. A Thai fishing boat with a white flag flying approached the destroyer USS Wilson. The fishing boat carried the 40 American and five Thai crewmen.

The Mayaguez was towed out of the area and its boilers restarted to resume the voyage to Hong Kong.

"I have now received information that the vessel has been recovered intact and that the entire crew has been rescued," Ford said in personally announcing the results of the attack shortly after midnight. "The forces that have successfully accomplished this mission are still under hostile fire but are preparing to disengage."

Ford today was preparing a formal report to Congress on the operation as required under the 1973 War Powers Act. He informed congressional leaders before he took the action and generally has received strong backing from Congress.

The White House said public response to Ford's action was running about 10 to one in favor.

"It's the only thing he could have done," Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said today. "I'm glad he did it because this country needs an indication of strength and leadership in the President's office and he's finally come through with it."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Reps. Steve Symms and George Hansen, both R-Idaho, are in support of President Ford's decision to use military force to rescue the captured U.S. merchant ship.

But Sens. Frank Church, D-Idaho, and James A. McClure, R-Idaho, have declined comment until they feel they have all the facts. A spokesman for Church recalled that Congress has been "burned" before in not receiving complete information.

Symms said he felt the president did the only thing he could.

"It's too bad we didn't sink the gunboats that were not damaged," he said. "I feel the president should be decisive in this. They have to go to whatever they have to do to get that ship out of there."

"We can't take any compromise—otherwise, the high seas won't be safe for the U.S. or any other ship," he said.

Hansen also favored the president's decision, observing "what we don't need is another 'Pueblo' incident," referring to North Korea's seizure of the U.S.S. Pueblo in 1968.

In the past month Hansen twice has warned of the possibility of a just such an "incident"; as seizure of the merchant ship because of declining U.S. prestige abroad at the end of the Vietnam War.

# Tupperware has astonishing profit

JEROME — Tupperware's "astounding" yearly profits have made its parent company too dependent on it, according to an article in Business Week Magazine.

Tupperware "has more than doubled sales and tripled earnings in the last four years," for an "astounding operating profit" of \$100 million on sales of \$12 million, the business magazine said.

The magazine reported that Tupperware, which operates a plastic household ware manufacturing plant in Jerome, is shoring up its

Visiting in the hospital's intensive care unit will stay as it is, she said, with visitors restricted to immediate family members who may visit only one at a time and stay for only five minutes.

In the obstetrics department, visiting rules are being reviewed, she added, but fathers will continue to have a "much more liberal visiting privilege."

She also said exceptions to the new hours will be made where necessary for the patient's welfare and exceptions will continue in the pediatric department.

"We will be happy to have people ask for exceptions," she said. "We're not trying to keep people out who should be there for the good of the patient."

# Shoshone sets levy vote

# Nevada doctors threaten walkout

CARSON CITY, Nev. (UPI) — Dr. William K. Stephan, President of the Nevada State Medical Association, warned Wednesday doctors may walk out in 90 days when malpractice insurance rates are expected to jump nearly 50 percent.

Stephan, an anesthesiologist from Las Vegas, told the Assembly-Judiciary Committee the Insurance Service Organization recommended last week that malpractice fees be hiked 49.2 percent. He said he expected the companies in this state to follow suit.

He said there was a "new crisis" and predicted "a large number of doctors will walk out because of this seemingly unnecessary and unrealistic increase in rates."

Stephan said he would talk with State Insurance Commissioner Dick Rottman and representatives of malpractice insurance companies in an attempt to solve the problem.

He said insurance companies will lower their fees as much as one-third if three things happen: limit lawyers fees, provide for collateral funding and allow selling on credit.

Stephan said he represents 500 doctors in Nevada or about 90 percent of those practicing. Twenty years ago he said he paid \$32 for malpractice insurance and \$5.70 last year. This year he will pay more than \$10,000 and in 90 days it may jump to \$15,000.

He said a package of bills to

ease the malpractice crisis may not be enough to help the situation. The bill has already been approved and a quasistate agency has been established to provide malpractice insurance for doctors who cannot get it from private companies.

# Aide tells ties

WASHINGTON — Chicago Sun-Times WASHINGTON — Chicago lawyer John E. Robson, the new chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board, started official Washington Wednesday by "going public" in disclosing his business and financial ties.

Robson published in the Federal Register — a daily government publication given to official announcements — a notice which said the public could inspect "the prior professional relationship of the new chairman and the aviation industry."

# Basque area gunfights leave 4 dead

Dispatch of the Times, London MADRID — Gunfights between police and Basque activists left at least four persons dead Wednesday in the ancient Basque capital of Guernica.

The shootout began about 2 a.m. when, according to Spanish news agencies, a sentinel on duty at a civil guard police barracks in Guernica narrowly escaped being wounded by a burst of machinegun fire from a passing car. Forces of the paramilitary Civil Guard immediately began a search for the gunmen.

In a police assault about dawn on an apartment that was thought to be a hideout for Basque separatist guerrillas, a Civil

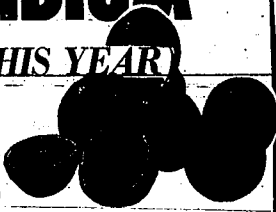
Guard officer called for the extremist to surrender; the reply was a machinegun burst that killed him. The 48-year-old officer was the seventh policeman killed by the Basque guerrillas in the last five months.

Balloons then moved into the apartment under a heavy curtain of gunfire. When they broke down the door, they found their suspects had escaped, but on the floor were the bodies of a couple who lived in the apartment and who had been caught in the crossfire. There was no immediate evidence that the two dead residents had any connection with the guerrillas.

Later, police surrounded a farmhouse outside Guernica where they killed one member of the outlawed ETA.

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# Chicago prisoners flee

**CHICAGO (UPI)** — Seventeen prisoners roused from their cells for a surprise inspection sneaked July 10 to the prison laundry room, climbed away a section of wall adjoining a window and escaped through a tiny hole into Wednesday night.

The escape occurred while guards assigned to keep watch over more than 100 prisoners placed in a corridor during the inspection were called away to break up a disturbance in another tier of the sprawling prison, which holds some 3,000 inmates.

By early today, police had recaptured six of the fugitives. Police helicopters, canine units and officers armed with shotguns and automatic weapons searched a wide area of the city for the remaining fugitives, who included four men facing trial for murder. All were described as dangerous.

Two persons were taken hostage by a group of three fugitives near the prison.

John Trent, 31, Chicago, had stopped at a taco stand a few blocks from the prison to pick up his nephew, Tim Collins, 14, when the escaped inmates grabbed Tim and forced their way into the car.

"The same day they came from Cook County Jail," Trent said. "My nephew asked if they just got released and they said 'No, we just busted through the wall.' After that I didn't say anything and I didn't look back."

"One said they'd have to kill him because he's not going back to that place," said Collins.

Trent said the escapees forced him to drive a circuitous route to a South Side high-rise building.

"Then they said 'Thanks for the ride, honkey,' and got out," Trent said.

Neither Trent nor his nephew was injured.

Prison officials said the prisoners were roused from their cells for a surprise cell inspection for contraband.

They were taken to a corridor and held.

While the prisoners were in the secured corridor, prison officials said, a fight broke out between two inmates in another tier of the prison and all but one guard was pulled away.

During that time, the escaping prisoners made their way into a utility room which apparently was left unlocked

and used their bars to break through some glass blocks and bricks surrounding the window. Using pillows found in the laundry to muffle the sound of breaking glass and brick, they exposed their way by the inch between the window bars and the wall and slipped through.

They then walked along the wall to the fence, peeled back a section of fencing and slipped into a construction area that was unwatched by tower guards.

The escape was not discovered until the remaining prisoners were brought from the corridor back to their cells.

Among the prisoners still at large was William Hardy, who is serving time in a Washington, D.C., prison and was returned to Chicago to stand trial for murder.

His record shows a previous arrest for murder but no conviction in that case. Police said he also "owes time" to the Illinois State Penitentiary at Joliet. Prison officials described Hardy as "the most desperate of the group."

## Bigger US deficit OK, experts claim

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — Congress' Joint Economic Committee says 20 of 28 experts it polled believe the financial markets can absorb a \$75 billion federal deficit without the ruinous consequences foreseen by Treasury Secretary William Simon.

That word came as both houses gave final approval Wednesday to a resolution committing Congress to a budget of \$367 billion and a deficit of \$68.8 billion in fiscal 1976, which starts July 1.

Backers of the resolution say the congressional budgetary targets carry a lot more economic stimulus than

President Ford's budget.

Republican Charles Whalen of Ohio, one of the few members of his party to support the resolution, says it will result in an unemployment rate in 1976 a full percentage point below the 8 per cent level the administration has forecast.

The congressional deficit exceeds the \$60 billion deficit which Simon claims is the outward boundary of prudence.

Simon and chairman Arthur Burns of the Federal Reserve say a bigger deficit would crowd private borrowers from the credit markets, pump up interest rates, abort recovery, rekindle inflation and ultimately lead to an even more severe recession.

Approval of the resolution by a voice vote in the Senate and a 230-193 roll call in the House marks the first time Congress has set spending guidelines instead of looking at the budget piecemeal.

The resolution, which is not binding, called for substantial cuts in defense and foreign military aid, and substantial increases in public works, public service jobs and help for the victims of recession.

## Ford balks NY bailout

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — President Ford has rejected an appeal by New York City for a billion-dollar line of credit to stave off a financial crisis.

Although the nation's largest city could be put in the unusual position of defaulting on some of its municipal bonds, Ford and Federal Reserve Board Chairman Arthur F. Burns both said the federal government would not play fairy godmother to New York's Cinderella.

A \$1 billion credit guarantee for 90 days "would provide no real solutions but would merely postpone... for that period, coming to grips with the problem," Ford wrote.

New York's problem boils down to one of cash flow. There is more money going out than coming in.

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## Cops grab 3 gunmen

**BUEENES AIRES (UPI)** — Police arrested three gunmen who sprayed machine gun fire at the home of the U.S. ambassador Wednesday, touching off a 15-minute gun battle in which two persons were wounded, an embassy spokesman said today.

The spokesman said a gunman and a policeman were wounded in the battle late Wednesday outside the home of Ambassador Robert G. Hill.

The attack, which his family watched through a bullet-proof window as police fought off the earload of gunmen who attempted to storm the palatial residence.

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# Airport aides study proposal

**TWIN FALLS** — The Twin Falls Airport Commission has "seriously considered" a Salt Lake City airline's proposal to offer commuter passenger service between Twin Falls, Boise, Pocatello, Idaho Falls and Salt Lake City, according to Twin Falls Airport Manager Jean Milner.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission (IPUC) approves the proposal. The airline would have one scheduled early-morning flight from Twin Falls each day, with a return flight each afternoon.

The firm's prop planes can carry nine passengers. The one-way air fare on the route would be about \$30 per person, compared to about \$40 currently charged by other airlines, according to Asher.

Interest has been operating as a charter service on the route, carrying canceled checks and cash letters for the Federal Reserve System, he said.

He said market surveys have indicated that many of the passengers would fly from Twin Falls to Boise, from Pocatello to Twin Falls and from Salt Lake City to Twin Falls and Pocatello.

## Breezes blow clouds into Valley

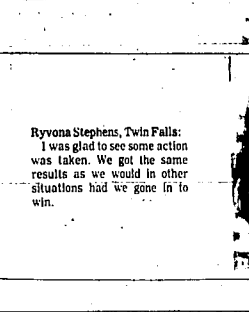
**Brian Jacobs, Twin Falls:**

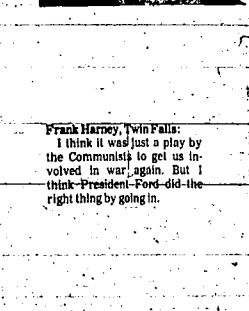
**Ray J. Holmes, Twin Falls:**

I think they needed to take some measure to get the ship back. I don't think you can sit here and let them run over you, push you around.

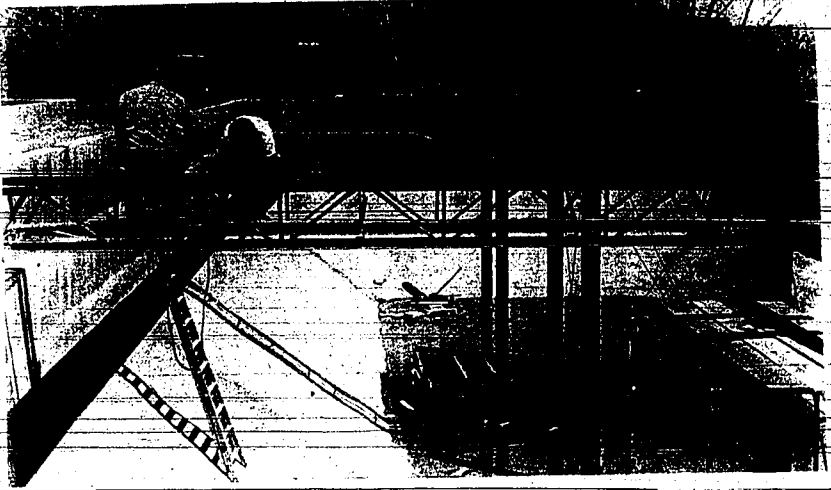


**Frank Harney, Twin Falls:**

**HAILEY** — McCulloch Properties, Inc., which has pressed for extensive developments here, has flown city officials to an Arizona resort free of charge.  
The development firm then picked up the tab for hotels, tours, meals and cocktails for the visitors.  
The Times-News also learned McCulloch has issued a standing invitation to city officials to visit the company's resort without charge.  
McCulloch Properties Woodside manager Jim Adams accompanied city councilman Charles Dunn Angell and Claude Porter to Lake Havasu on May 3 and 4.  
City attorney Stephen Bolter and Hailey Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Grant Patterson and commissioner BJH House also made the trip.  
Fred Melcher, Los Angeles based public relations director for McCulloch, said this morning the trip was "part of our normal operation."  
Melcher denied the expense-paid trip was a form of influence peddling. He said McCulloch Properties files the governor of Arizona into the Arizona resort of Lake Havasu "anytime he wants."  
The flights are part of a public relations system developed 11 years ago, Melcher said.  
According to the Wood River Journal, which broke the story today McCulloch flew some of the city fathers to Lake Havasu in the summer of 1974. McCulloch said the "subdivision was annexed into the city limits."  
Melcher told the Times-News this morning McCulloch Properties files public officials, interested buyers and the press into their property whenever the occasion warrants.  
He said recently McCulloch flew people from Los Angeles and Las Vegas into Lake Havasu to cover a sailing regatta. He offered to fly this reporter down to the resort to do a story.  
Melcher said McCulloch files only "sincere"

buyers into McCulloch resorts and subdivisions.  
"We don't sell property to anyone until the buyers have had a chance to see it," he said.  
City councilman Charles Dunn told the Times-News McCulloch had extended a standing invitation for a flight to the resort anytime council members wished.  
"I don't see what everybody is getting all shook up about," he said. "McCulloch was trying to point out what they were trying to accomplish there. It's a real well-planned city," Dunn said. "McCulloch built the hotels, and provided tours, lunches and cocktails while the group was there."  
Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Grant Patterson said there was no conflict of interest connected with the flight, according to the Wood River Journal.  
"This trip wasn't connected with the city," Patterson said. "In fact, this trip was beneficial to the city because it showed us what can be done with proper planning."

## TF sewage plant half completed

**TWIN FALLS** — The \$62 million Twin Falls sewage treatment plant project is 57 per cent complete, according to resident engineer Don Tulloch.  
The plant should be in operation, providing secondary treatment of sewage, by December of this year, he adds.  
Dettwiler Brothers, Inc., Twin Falls, which is doing the lion's share of construction at the Snake River Canyon site, is about 68 per cent done with its \$4.6 million portion of the job.  
Wiscomb-Weldner Co., Salt Lake City, has completed about 25 per cent of the instrumentation installations at the plant (costing \$157,000) and Envirotech Systems, Inc., Belmont, Calif., has finished more than 9 per cent of its \$1.1 million installation of a heat treatment system to control the plant's sludge.  
The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency will pay 75 per cent of the project bill (\$4.6 million), the state will pick up another 15 per cent (\$937,000) and local governments and industry will pay the remaining 10 per cent (\$621,000).

## Jerome city aides wait in vain

**JEROME** — An empty room greeted Jerome City Council members Tuesday night at a public hearing called to air proposed improvements to the city water system.  
Council members, the city works director and engineers waited for over an hour for someone to arrive for the hearing. When no one showed up the meeting was adjourned.  
Ed Evans, city works director, said the city has complied with the public hearing laws and now will submit a grant request to the Department of Housing and Urban Development for \$150,000 to help finance a portion of the project.  
Evans said it could be 45 days before they could be notified if the grant was approved or not.  
Evans said work on phase 1 of the improvement is set to begin July 1, and will be completed in two parts.  
The first part of phase 1 will begin with the installation of two 300,000-gallon ground level storage tanks at existing city wells located on East 10th Street. While we're at it, we'll do all the necessary piping for booster pumps which will be installed at a later date to be determined by the approval and availability of HUD funds," Evans said.  
According to Evans, the new facilities are needed because of the sloping terrain of Jerome and increased development on the east side of Fillmore, which has created the need for a bi-level system to equalize water pressure throughout town and provide adequate water to the new school under construction.  
Evans said phase 2, which will be started at an as yet undetermined date, will include the digging of a new well east of town, installation of a storage tank and considerable looping of the pipe system.  
According to Evans, in addition to the installation of two new booster pumps, step 2 will involve a new motorized water control valve and improved chlorine detention facilities.  
"The motorized control valve will hold water pressure on the high side of Fillmore but if more water is needed on the low side, it will automatically adjust," Evans said.  
He explained that the elevated tower presently standing on North Fillmore will be modified with a new standing pipe, piping and valving for chlorine detention.  
"The improved process will allow for more chlorine content time, thus eliminating the strong odors of chlorine city residents have noticed at times in their water," Evans said.  
The balance of the estimated \$255,550 cost of phase 1 will be paid for with existing city funds and revenue from recently increased water rates.  
The work is expected to be finished by the fall of 1976.

## Drilling stops on geothermal test well

**MALTA** — Drilling on a second geothermal well at the Raft River site near Malta has been temporarily stopped at the 4200-foot level for tests.  
In February the drilling rig sank a hole to the 507-foot level in a successful search for hot water that might be used for the generation of electricity.  
Two weeks ago the rig was moved about a half-a-mile as drillers prepared to punch a second hole 6000 feet below the desert floor.  
Eventually, the two wells are to be connected by a surface pipe. The hot water will be taken from one and reinjected into the other in order to study flow characteristics and obtain information on reinjecting geothermal water into the aquifers.  
Lowell Miller, field manager at the site for the Idaho National Engineering Lab, said drilling

has been halted at 4,231 feet from ground level. Miller said core tests, logging of the well and a drill stem test will run at this level. Then drillers will decide if the well should be made deeper, or if the casing should be set at the present depth, he said.  
Miller said the "drill stem test" will allow measurement of the temperature and pressure of the geothermal resource.  
"So far, Miller said, the highest temperature recorded at second-site is 228 degrees F. At the first site water temperatures hit 294 degrees.  
The cooler temperatures, so far encountered, were expected, Miller said. The explorers are drilling into a hot water reservoir further from the fault.  
The further away, the deeper the well must be sunk to find high temperature water, he said.  
Miller explained that the hot water or

geothermal resource occurs when cold water from mountain runoff seeps into the earth through "fractures" and "faults."  
At great depths, the seeping water hits hot rocks. When heated, the hot water begins rising through "fault" plains. The water, in effect, has its own circulation system, Miller said.  
Water in varying temperatures is found at all levels near where the tests are taking place, Miller said. The cold water table is just 20 to 35 feet below the surface, and moderately hot water can be located only 400 to 500 feet down.  
"U.S. Geological Survey drillers have hit 170-180 degree water at 1100 to 1800 feet in the same area, Miller said.  
The Malta drillers are attempting to hit the circulating water at its hottest. The hot water will then be sealed off from cooler water, that would otherwise mix with and cool the geothermal resource.  
The researchers at the Malta site hope to demonstrate that electricity can be generated from natural hot water that reaches a maximum temperature of 290 to 300 degrees. Elsewhere, much hotter geothermal water and steam have been used to generate electricity.

## New tests under way

**MALTA** — Several new tests are under way at the Raft River experimental geothermal test site near Malta.  
Drillers have already sunk two deep wells into hot water reservoirs that lie deep below the desert surface.  
Now, researchers are preparing tests to determine the effects of the hot water on electric power plant components.  
Eventually, the researchers want to demonstrate that the naturally hot water can be used to generate electricity.  
In the past few weeks, mobile labs for corrosion and component testing have been moved to the site. A "heat exchanger" test is already under way, according to Lowell Miller,

on-site field engineer for Idaho National Engineering Lab. INEL is one of several participants in the research project.  
Miller said the corrosion tests will measure the corrosive effects of the mineralized natural hot water on power plant components.  
Researchers also want to learn if the "scaling" effects of the deposits left by the hot water will seriously affect the heat exchanger components to be used if a power plant is built at the site.  
Plans now call for the naturally hot water to be circulated through a heat exchanger. The geothermal water will heat up a secondary, or binary fluid, which in turn will be used to turn turbines attached to generators.

**TWIN FALLS** — Investigation is still under way in the death Wednesday afternoon of Gregory Olsen, 27, Twin Falls.  
Coroner Cloyve Edwards said additional tests will be required to determine the cause of death as an autopsy held Wednesday afternoon failed to show a cause.  
Edwards said the young man was found dead at his home by his mother, Mrs. Carolyn Olsen, about 1:35 p.m. Wednesday. Edwards said there was no indication of foul play.



# 7 area teams shoot for 5 state titles

Seven Magic Valley high school teams will draw beads on five state track and field divisions championships Friday and Saturday in Idaho Falls.

None of them, however, appears to have a shoe-in. The way it shapes up, Twin Falls will be looking for two. Coach Jerry Kleinkopf's boys will be seeking to regain the crown the school held for four years, then gave up last year.

On Friday, Coach Bill Ingram's Bruins girls will make a strong run for the title. The class B girls should see Camas County and Filer battling with a couple of other teams. The Musers are defending champions but Filer showed good strength last week in winning the regionals.

On the A-2 scene, Jerome, two-time A-2 division finalist, will again be a prime contender but Coach Karl Kleinkopf doesn't have the "blow 'em over" power of last year. Buhl's Indians should be right in the thick of things while Bishop Kelly of Boise qualified a busload of people in just one week's district.

In the A-3 division, Camas County, which has sustained some crippling setbacks in district and regional eliminations — mostly due to illness — may still have enough left to take a charge at the only title that eluded the Musers last year.

On the individual scene, Shoshone senior Steve Sarnes should wind up a great school career by winning his third straight A-3 title. He also should have the best effort in any of the three divisions.

If the Twin Falls boys are to recapture their title, it appears it will have to come in second through fourth-place finishes. Only pole vaulter Gary Miller, who has yet to place in state despite visiting there two other times, and the Bruins mile relay team appear to have a favorable tag.

There is another event, however, that Twin Falls should mine a lot of points from. Probably junior Randy Barbour should be the favorite in the halfmile. He's lost only once this year — to teammate Doug Hillman. They've been split on a couple of occasions and could go one-two which would benefit the Bruins by 18 points.

The big one for potential is the pole vault where, due to a three-way tie in district for second, Twin Falls will have four vaulters who have cleared 13 feet. In one meet this year, those same four took 28 points out of the event.

Senior Jeff Wiseman could ease a three-year career in the shotput with a 100, having the best throw in last week's district finals. However, there are a lot of throwers qualified who have thrown in the 52-foot area.

A debit on the Bruin side is the continuing knee problem of junior distance man Rick Murray. He'll go into Friday night's finals without having run for four days.

Those are the highlights but the Bruins have a strong quarter-mile crew and should take points out of all the relays.

The major problems for Twin Falls are Skyline Capital and Borah.

The district results in A-2 throughout the state showed everyone just about even in all the events. Depth, therefore, will be the key. Jerome should do well in the distances and hurdles and Norm Cochrane gives them a strong punch in the shotput.

Buhl's forte will be on the track where Mark Tappan should get double distance points and sophomore Chris Bell should get points out of both sprints.

But Jerome split the relay entries and all four quartets appear to be in the running for first place.

Camas County's hopes to rebound from a third-place finish in regional to victory in state rest on the recuperative powers of sprinter George Elsner. He was ill during the district, just qualified for regional in the 100 yard, and then took to his bed for four days before regional. He just scribbled into state with two fourth-place finishes. But if he's healthy, he, halfmiler Larry Lee and the two Camas County relays teams should be considered near the top.

Twin Falls' girls absorbed a series of setbacks and poor performances in regional last week. Had they all approximated their best efforts, they would have to be odds-on favorites. Now they'll have to settle and Borah, headed by triple-sprint champ possibility, Miss Chase, may be the one to beat.

The Class B girls results from the regionals indicates it is going to be a barnburner with five or six schools about equal in representation.

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## Debusschere to become new ABA commissioner

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — Dave Debusschere, general manager of the New York Nets and former New York Knicks star, will be officially announced Thursday as the successor to American Basketball Association commissioner Tedd Marchant.

Debusschere received approval of at least three-quarters of the league governors currently in session here Wednesday, according to a reliable source.

The affable Debusschere, who completed his first season of a 10-year contract as the Nets GM this year, was on hand for the meeting, held in conjunction with the league championship playoff between the Indiana Pacers and the Kentucky Colonels.

The ABA called a news conference for 7 p.m. EDT Thursday in New York for the purpose of naming a new commissioner, said ABA publicist Jim Bukala.

The 34-year-old Debusschere, an all-pro with the Knicks and instrumental in that club winning NBA titles in 1970 and 1973, will receive a \$25,000 pay hike to bring his salary in a reported \$100,000 as ABA commissioner.

He played 9 1/2 years with the Knicks after being acquired from Detroit in 1968 for Walt Bellamy. Debusschere broke into the pro ranks in 1962 with the Pistons, but also flirted with a pro baseball career as a Chicago White Sox pitcher before deciding his talents were more suitable to the basketball court.

## Ten expected in Preakness

BALTIMORE (UPI) — A field of 10, headed by Kentucky Derby winner Foolish Pleasure, was expected to be entered today for Saturday's 100th and richest running of the Preakness Stakes at Pimlico.

If all in start, the centennial running of the second level of thoroughbred racing's Triple Crown will have a gross value of \$210,000 with \$150,100 of that total going to the winner.

John L. Greer's Foolish Pleasure, coming off his 13 1/2 length victory in the Kentucky Derby which swelled his lifetime earnings to \$672,515 and was his 11th win in 12 lifetime starts, figures to be facing six of the 14 horses he beat at Churchill Downs May 3, including Avator and

Diablo, the second and third place finishers, respectively.

Prior to the Derby, Avator and Diablo had done all their running in California and for the Preakness they will be joined by another California-bred colt, "Native Guest," the lightly raced son of Raise A Native who has won all four of his starts, including the El Dorado Handicap at Hollywood Park on the same day Foolish Pleasure was winning the Kentucky Derby.

Because he was not on the original list of horses nominated to the Preakness, Native Guest's owner, William A. Levin, will have to pay a supplementary fee of \$10,000 in order for his horse to start.

Another supplementary entry will be Master Derby,

## Andretti still seeking ride

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI) — Former champion auto driver Andrei Andretti returned to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Wednesday and immediately switched cars as he prepared to make a qualifying run this weekend for the Indianapolis 500-mile race May 25.

Andretti earlier this month got above 181 miles per hour in his original car, then left to compete in the Grand Prix of Monte Carlo last weekend. He missed the first round of "500" time trials that saw 28 of the 33 starting positions filled.

The Nazareth, Pa. driver who won here in 1969, returned to the 2 1/2-mile oval and happened into a car originally assigned to teammate Al Unser, Albuquerque, N.M., who switched cars last week and qualified at a speed of 185.452 miles per hour, good for the middle of the fourth row.

Andretti was running in the 180 m.p.h. range Wednesday in Unser's original car.

That's about as fast as any of the unqualified cars have been going this week in practice.

Rookie Billy Scott, San Bernardino, Calif., went 181-plus Tuesday.

Jan Opperman, Beaver Crossing, Neb., who started as a rookie here last year, turned a lap at just over 180 Wednesday.

Track officials quickly turned on the yellow light after they spotted a puff of smoke from Opperman's car in the No. 2 turn. Opperman then drove into the pit areas but didn't realize until he got there that the yellow caution light was for him. Apparently all was okay and he returned to the track.

Andretti is the only former champion in the field who hasn't qualified.

## Trudeau shuns feud

OTTAWA (UPI) — Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau said Wednesday he would not intervene to save the 1976 Montreal Olympic Games currently threatened by labor strife in Quebec which has halted construction of competition venues.

Trudeau said he fully supported Quebec Premier Robert Bourassa's stand that social peace in his province was more important than staging the Games.

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## Warriors to meet Washington in NBA title series

OAKLAND (UPI) — The general feeling around the National Basketball Association has been that the Golden State Warriors are a one-man team, and that's spelled Rick Barry.

Barry didn't disappoint his followers Wednesday night when he recovered from one of his poorest shooting nights ever for 14 final-period points that carried the Warriors to an 89-79 victory over the Chicago Bulls in the first game of the Washington in the NBA championship series.

However, rookie Keith Wilkes played almost as big a role as Barry, bagging 10 third-quarter points that rallied Golden State to within six points and set the stage for Barry's hot shooting in the final 12 minutes.

"I know people say we are a one-man team," Barry said, "but I think the fellows proved otherwise in this game."

"They could have folded up and gone home in the first half, but they didn't and that proves — at least to me — that it takes more than one man to win."

Wilkes, rookie of the year in the NBA, was so clated over

his performance and the Warriors who that he found it difficult to express himself.

"It's all inside of me," the first-year forward from UCLA said. "I'm so happy I can't express myself."

It was an incredible but well deserved victory for the Warriors, who won the best of seven Western Division series four games to three. Twice in the first half they trailed by as many as 15 points, but finally gave back and by the end of the third quarter had closed the deficit to six points at 65-59.

Then Barry, who scored only eight points in the first half — four of them on free throws, suddenly found the range and Golden State forged into the lead for the first time at 71-69 with 4:30 remaining.

In the early minutes of the fourth quarter, Barry scored four times but it was a layup by rookie Phil Smith that finally gave the Warriors the lead. Chet Walker, who finished with 21 points, tied the score for Chicago at 71-71. A shot from the side by Bob Love gave the Bulls a two-point edge with less than three minutes to go.

Smith stole the ball from Walker and then made good on a layup to re-tie the score and Keith Wilkes, whose shooting in the first three quarters kept the Warriors from being blown off the court, followed with another layup for a two-point lead and Golden State stayed in front the rest of the way.

Wilkes finished as the Warriors' leading scorer with 23 and Barry had 22, nearly 40 percent better than the Bulls, who came to a complete halt in the final quarter.

## Reid quits gridiron



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## Mets fine Jones



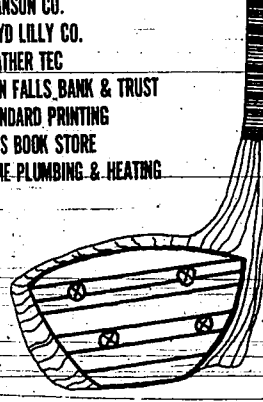

### Big 10 limits recruiting as budget aid

EAST LANSING, Mich. (UPI) — Big Ten officials have endorsed strict limitations on the recruitment of football and basketball prospects as one means of meeting the economic crisis faced by the nation's major universities. They also announced their support of reducing the number of athletic scholarships awarded.

At their annual spring meeting which concluded Wednesday, the conference's athletic directors and faculty representatives indicated they would favor virtually any financial cutbacks in intercollegiate athletic programs that are applied on a national scale and don't jeopardize secondary sports.

The officials drafted a package of belt-tightening proposals for consideration at a special mid-August meeting of top NCAA officials and said they would be willing to support "more restrictive proposals" that might be

advanced by other conferences for unilateral implementation. But they decided against taking a position, for the time being, on whether the Big Ten football should begin looking at possible participation in other post-season bowl games besides the Rose Bowl.

That matter will likely be taken up again in August after individual universities have been polled, said University of Michigan Professor Marcus Plant, secretary of the faculty representatives. Plant added that a final decision could be made in time for this season.

Big Ten Commissioner Wayne Duke emphasized that the Big Ten was not acting on any of the belt-tightening proposals, but simply announcing its support of any economies the NCAA may decide to implement in recognition of recessionary pressures being felt by all universities.

The conference officials endorsed a proposal limiting

football coaches to off-campus recruiting only between Dec. 1 and the national signing date. Basketball coaches could only make off-campus contacts from Feb. 1 to the national signing date.

In other sports programs, the coaches would not be permitted to do any off-campus recruiting.

And in football, only 80 prospects would be allowed to visit the campus—an expense generally paid for by the university or its athletic boosters—before signing their letter of intent.

Another proposal called for limitations on the size of coaching staffs in football and basketball. This would have an impact on recruiting because most schools have assistant coaches whose only job is recruiting, Plant said.

Football coaches would be limited to seven assistants and basketball coaches to one. Duke said the average Big Ten football coach has nine

assistants and the average basketball coach two or three.

The conference officials proposed reducing the number of football scholarships awarded by a school from 120 to 90 and the number of basketball scholarships permitted from 18 to 16. The football scholarship level already is slated for reduction to 105 in 1977.

In addition, a university would be permitted to grant a set number of scholarships for one other selected sport such as hockey or baseball and a total of 20 tuition grants to athletes.

**Hole-in-one**

### Holloway's value diminished in baseball

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI) — The Montreal Expos are still interested in University of Tennessee football baseball star Condredge Holloway, but not as much as they were when he was a high school senior and offered a \$90,000 bonus for his services.

Mal Diddler, director of player development for the National League team, said major league teams may not want to compete heavily for Holloway with the Canadian Football League, which already has made him an offer to play at Ottawa.

That deal also has been reported in the \$90,000 class, and the New England Patriots of the NFL have indicated they might give the former Tennessee quarterback a look if he's interested.

"We've had our people come and go quietly," said Diddler. "He's not the same Condredge Holloway he was four years ago, but we would still have an interest in him on down the line."

Diddler said he would be surprised if Holloway went in the first couple of rounds. His four years of football at Tennessee is seen as having taken away something from the young athlete, and his interest in football is another factor.

"Everybody knows Condredge is considering pro football and that baseball will have to beat the offer," Diddler said. "There's the big question of whether Condredge would give himself time to make it in baseball with football offers still dangling."

"A club could invest in him and lose the money if he switched to football."

Diddler said he figured Holloway might do well in Canadian football, where the emphasis is on the running quarterback. "Condredge would probably be a good one."

Holloway, himself, has said since the end of his football career at Tennessee that money will be a major factor in his decision. He said he would see what baseball had to offer before making a decision.

Holloway finished the college baseball season as a leading hitter in the Southeastern Conference with an average just over .400. But Diddler said Holloway has changed in a number of ways since he was a high school baseball player four years ago.

"Holloway's running speed does not appear to be as good. His arm is still excellent."
