### British miners asked to pare demands

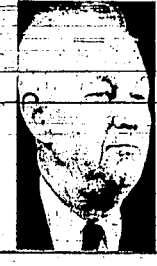
LONDON (UPI) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson appealed to Britain's coal miners today to slash their pay hike demands and save his Labor party government "at a critical hour in the nation's history."

"It is not a question whether that loyalty, that response, will be forthcoming, an insufficient measure to save this Labor government," Wilson said.

### France proposes summit at Helsinki

GENEVA (UPI) — France formally proposed today that a meeting at summit level be held in Helsinki at the end of July to conclude the SALT II European Security Conference.

France said this date could be confirmed at the end of this week depending on whether all remaining issues of substance have been agreed.



### Encouraged

COLORADO SPRINGS (UPI) — Robert Welch, founder and president of the John Birch Society, said Sunday he is more encouraged than ever about stopping the spread of Communism.

In the past, he said, the public replied to the society's warnings by saying the CIA and the Constitution would look after the nation. "But Watergate, Vietnam and other national crises have made exposition of a conspiracy a lot easier," he said.

### Eberline named to Gem energy panel

BOISE (UPI) — John Eberline of Burley was appointed by Gov. Cecil D. Andrus today to the Idaho Nuclear Energy Commission.

Eberline, currently managing editor of the South Idaho Press and a member of the governor's blue ribbon study commission on atomic wastes, will serve a four year term ending July 1, 1979.

### Mauna Loa eruption draws thousands

VOULCANO, Hawaii (UPI) — The Mauna Loa volcano, a sleeping giant for a quarter of a century, is spewing molten lava in a major eruption attracting thousands of spectators.

The world's largest volcano erupted Saturday night for the first time since 1950 on Hawaii's largest island. Two flows of molten lava cascaded down the slopes of the 13,680-foot summit, destroying everything in their path.

### Lashes out

BOSTON (UPI) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., lashed out today at President Ford for vetoing a number of programs passed by the Democratic controlled Congress.

Kennedy, deviating from his prepared text, told the U.S. Conference of Mayors that criticism of Congress, for falling to act in the face of the nation's problems was unfair.

"We're not back in the days of Harry Truman when we had an inactive Congress and an active President," Kennedy said.



### Shoshone BLM crews called to 7 blazes

SHOSHONE — Seven range fires, all man-caused, kept Shoshone Bureau of Land Management crews busy over the weekend.

District fire control officer Andy Payne said all the fires were under control this morning. Three were in the King Hill area and the rest within 15 miles of Shoshone. The largest of the fires was about 50 acres.

Payne said none of the fires had been determined to have stemmed directly from Fourth of July activities, but added that "more than likely" some of them started with fireworks.

### GM confirms price hikes on '76 models

DETROIT (UPI) — General Motors today confirmed it has notified dealers that price increases of up to 6 percent — an average \$300 a car — will be charged to fleet buyers of its 1976 model cars and trucks.

It was the clearest indication that Detroit's automakers plan substantial increases on the new models, when they debut this fall despite the fact that car buyers are balking at 1975 model prices.

### Senate resumes debate on NH election

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate resumed today its lengthy debate of the contested New Hampshire election and Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield expressed little hope of a compromise to end the legislative impasse.

Mansfield told reporters he knows of no acceptable compromise about closure to cut off debate on the election issue. The debate has delayed completion of a Rules Committee report in the disputed election between Democrat John A. Durkin or Republican Louis C. Wyman.

# Ford proposes road fund split

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford asked Congress today to give 25 percent of federal gasoline tax revenues directly to the states and to put 50 percent into the general treasury, splitting for the first time the Highway Trust Fund which built the interstate system.

The remaining 25 percent of gas taxes — 1 cent per gallon — would continue to flow into the trust fund, which would be redirected toward completion of major intercity links in the interstate system with states and cities given more responsibility for completing their sections.

A White House statement said Ford's plan which was expected to meet with great resistance in Congress, would give 1 cent of the federal government's 4-cent a gallon gasoline tax directly to any state that raises its own gas tax by at least 1 cent.

Two cents would go into general revenues and only 1 cent into the Highway Trust Fund, which now gets all 4 cents of the federal tax on each gallon of gasoline.

Ford said his plan would refocus the federal attention of the interstate system and provide flexible aid for highway construction "in a manner that fully respects state and local decision-making roles."

He said it was consistent with his general philosophy "that we should not at the federal level extend our law across into areas which other levels of government can better handle."

The proposed federal highway act of 1975 aims at finishing the 42,500 mile interstate highway system, which is now 85 percent completed, and allowing state and local governments more freedom in the ways they use federal highway aid.

The plan also would put greater emphasis on intercity routes of national importance, according to the White House statement.

Currently, all of the gasoline tax revenue goes into the Highway Trust Fund.

Under the President's proposal, only 1 cent of the tax on each gallon would go into a Highway Trust Fund. Two cents would go into the general treasury funds and 1 cent to any state that hikes its own gasoline tax by 1 or more cents a gallon.

To help state and local governments, Ford wants the number of highway spending programs — now totally about 30 — cut to four general categories. Aides said this would give state and local officials more choice in spending federal aid for highways.

## General strike cripples Argentina

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Argentine workers launched a crippling nationwide strike today despite a last minute cabinet resignation aimed at heading off the two-day walkout.

Thousands of workers began walking off their jobs around the country at midnight Sunday in a dramatic showdown with President Maria Estela Isabel Peron.

The General Labor Confederation, Argentina's AFL-CIO, ordered the general strike in spite of the mass resignation Sunday night of all eight cabinet ministers.

Mrs. Peron did not immediately accept the resignations, however, and the cabinet members stayed on the job for the time being.

By dawn the strike appeared totally effective in this capital city and throughout Argentina.

Private cars drove the streets but air, rail, bus and taxi service stopped. Stores, schools, offices, restaurants, and bars closed and postal services halted. Newspapers did not publish and the radio remained silent.

## CIA Chile coup plot went awry

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Central Intelligence Agency encouraged a 1970 scheme aimed at sparking a coup in Chile, but the plot unintentionally resulted in the assassination of Chilean army commander Rene Schneider, the Washington Post said today.

Schneider was fatally wounded Oct. 22, 1970, by assassins who had sought to kidnap him as he was being driven to his office in Santiago, the newspaper said. They shot him when he appeared to be trying to take a gun.

The Post said the kidnapping attempt, two days before the Chilean Congress ratified Salvador Allende's election as president, was staged in hopes it would lead to a military takeover that would prevent the Marxist from assuming office.

The newspaper quoted informed sources as saying Schneider had been "on what amounted to a worldwide CIA 'enemies list' of individuals considered inimical to U.S. interests. But the agency sources said, did not intend his assassination."

The Post said it could not be established whether the CIA provided any "material assistance," such as money, to persons behind the Schneider kidnap attempt.

"Sources indicated that the agency expressed its approval and encouragement of the idea," the newspaper said. "However, whether this encouragement amounted to an explicit directive to go ahead or whether the plotters acted on their own is not known."

## Hoover burglary order explanation demanded

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A House subcommittee chairman has demanded a Justice Department explanation of a statement by a former official that FBI counterintelligence activities under Hoover probably ordered burglaries to gather intelligence.

Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., a former FBI agent and chairman of the House Judiciary subcommittee that oversees the agency, also called on Attorney General Edward Levi to disavow statements by outgoing Assistant FBI Director William Sullivan defending Hoover's policies.

Sullivan, who resigned Saturday after 27 years in the FBI, said Sunday he assumed that burglaries were approved by the director during Hoover's years as head of the agency.

Edwards, who was "impressed" by Sullivan's defense of such counterintelligence activities, said he would ask the Justice Department to explain to his subcommittee why Congress had never been told about FBI-audited burglaries. He said the subject would be raised at hearings July 17 and 19.

## Israelis hit Lebanon bases

Israel planes, gunboats and artillery devastated Lebanese guerrilla bases in southern Lebanon today in retaliation for a guerrilla bombing that took 14 lives in Jerusalem last Friday. The attack was followed by the heaviest artillery duels along the border in months.

Reports from Beirut said initial casualty reports in today's attacks put the toll at 12 persons killed and 37 wounded, 20 of them seriously. Beirut said the dead included a woman and two children.

A Palestinian guerrilla spokesman said the guerrillas inflicted "heavy casualties" on the Israelis but Israel said all of its forces returned safely.

An Israeli spokesman said Israeli commandos landed just south of the coastal town of Rachidieh, blew up at least three houses suspected of harboring guerrillas and fired on a jeep with at least three men in it, destroying it and killing all inside.

Lebanese Premier Rashid Karami said the Lebanese army's action by the help of Palestinian guerrillas had prevented the Israelis from landing troops and forced them to retreat leaving a trail of blood.

The UN said it had instructed Lebanon's ambassador at the United Nations to file a complaint to the Security Council.

The new Israeli-Palestinian guerrilla clashes came at a time of intense diplomatic activity aimed at trying to reach an interim peace agreement on the Israeli-Egyptian front in the Sinai desert.

Israel said it had decided to wait at least another week on its decision whether to

## Grain shipping weights rigged, profits boosted

NEW ORLEANS — Witnesses have detailed to federal investigators here a simple trick with automatic weighing devices that has allegedly allowed several large grain companies to gain millions of dollars in illegal profits on their export shipments.

"They tell you it's a foolproof system, huh?" One witness said to a reporter. "Look, all you have to do is put these scales on hold, see. Then you reach under the keyboard and trip a lever, and you can punch any weight you want to on the tape."

He cited a case when \$60,000 was added in this way to the value of one shipment.

Testimony and data reportedly being accumulated here indicate that gains from the rigging of shipping weights represent a relatively small percentage of profits available from the false grading of grain, which can run into millions of extra dollars a year for any company with high export volume benefiting from the practice.

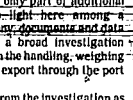
The weighing trick is only part of additional information coming to light here among a growing mass of testimony, documents and data reportedly gathered in a broad investigation into alleged corruption in the handling, weighing and grading of grain for export through the port of New Orleans.

Allegations resulting from the investigation as

well as complaints from abroad have raised growing concern about the vital U.S. export trade in grain, which has been running at over \$11-billion a year, about a third of it through the port of New Orleans.

The investigation has spread to Houston and reportedly to other major grain ports. Quiet progress reportedly is being made in the Houston area, but there has been little indication of results elsewhere. Fifteen individuals have been indicted thus far in the New Orleans area and five more in the Port of Houston.

More recently, part of the investigation has reportedly focused on three large grain companies — The Bunge Corp., Cook Industries, Inc., and Mississippi River Grain Elevator, Inc., an American affiliate of another international firm. A vice president of Cook's grain division has been suspended pending completion of an investigation by the company of its New Orleans operations.

## Proposed TF development hearing slated Thursday

TWIN FALLS — A proposed 79-acre development adjoining northeast Twin Falls will provide housing for more than 1,000 persons, according to an engineer for the project.

Development plans call for construction of 132 homes, 106 townhouse units and 64 apartments on property at the northwest corner of Falls Avenue East and Eastfield Drive North.

The Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Commission will conduct a public hearing Thursday night on the proposal.

The developer, Snake River Enterprises, is comprised of a group of individuals from Twin Falls and Oakley, according to Twin Falls engineer Dale Riedesel.

The firm has asked that the county approve the project as a planned unit development (PUD). A PUD, which is allowed in any zone, permits the county to set special requirements for the development.

Riedesel today said the project will include two park sites. Tennis courts will be constructed at one of the sites and ball fields will include playground facilities for children.

"The owners' feeling is that this is about a 10-year project," Riedesel said.

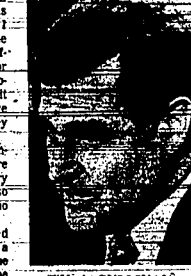
He said the home lots will be sold under a strict set of regulations. "We feel that as of today's market the homes will probably be in the \$55,000 to \$60,000 range."

"We will put a square footage requirement on the homes, and limit the style and color schemes to insure the quality that the owners want," Riedesel said.

Snake River Enterprises will not construct any of the housing units, he said, but will be "responsible to the county" to see that they conform to the PUD requirements.

Riedesel described the proposed townhouses as "privately owned dwellings, just like the traditional single family house. They differ in that they are usually clustered with more open area and are maintained by a joint home-owners group."

He said the planned 382 dwellings will average 4.8 units per acre.

## Tourist traffic compared

TWIN FALLS — Tourist traffic is about the same this year compared to last year, according to some motel owners and service station operators in Twin Falls.

Gas prices are also about the same, according to a Times-News survey of eight major brand-stations, which showed regular gas averaging \$7.8 cents a gallon and premium 61.6 cents last year. In spite of national announcements of price boosts, average pump prices at the eight stations were about the same this year. Some major stations not in the survey were a few pennies costlier than the average, evidently responding to national boosts.

Motel owners or managers contacted said their tourist business was about the same or even slightly better, although one cashier said she thought business, if not the same as last year, was "down a little."

Charlie Sieber, manager at the Blue Lakes Inn, said "It's hard to tell" whether tourist traffic has changed. The motel has been "completely full" for three weeks, with nearly all reservations in Twin Falls or even Canadian license plates.

Sieber said he didn't think business had changed much in the last seven or eight years. Commercial traffic sales people and other business travelers — the most during the week, with tourists staying through weekends.

The manager at the Deluxe Motor Lodge also said business was about the same, and much of the traffic was in-state. Twin Falls Travelodge's manager said tourist traffic had slowed down for the holidays but overall it was ahead of last year, with out-of-state traffic the bulk of the trade.

A spokesman at Idaho State Police offices in Twin Falls said he didn't think traffic had changed much at all since this time last year.

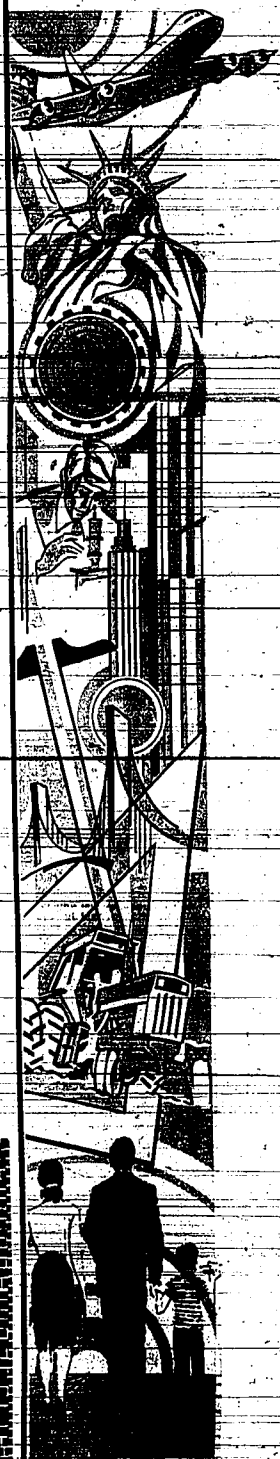
At Nampa, wind knocked out a line for more than a half hour, causing a power failure for KTVB television and some 500 residents.

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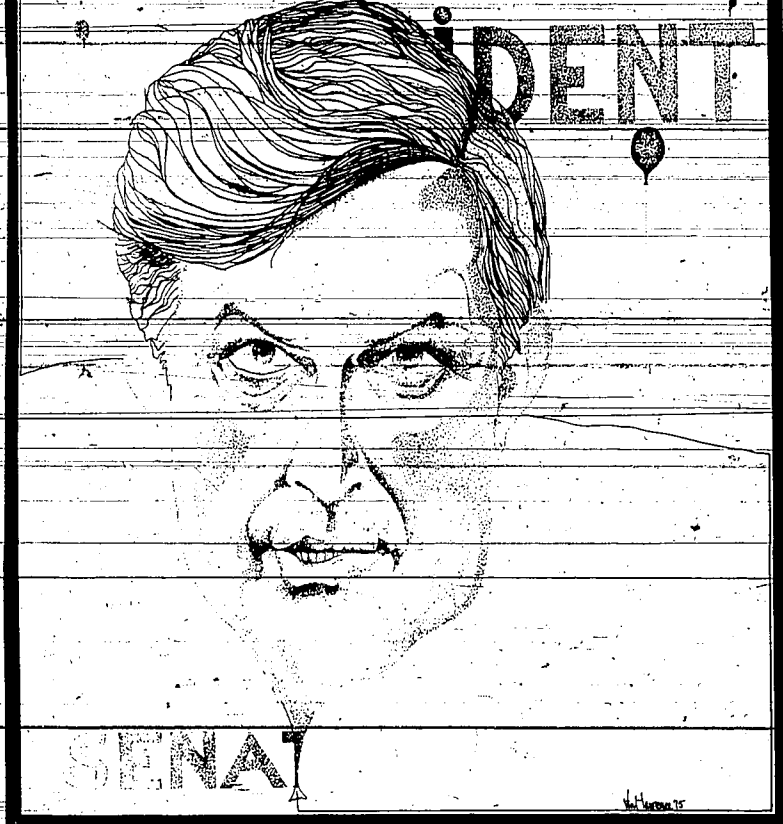

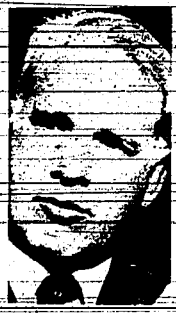

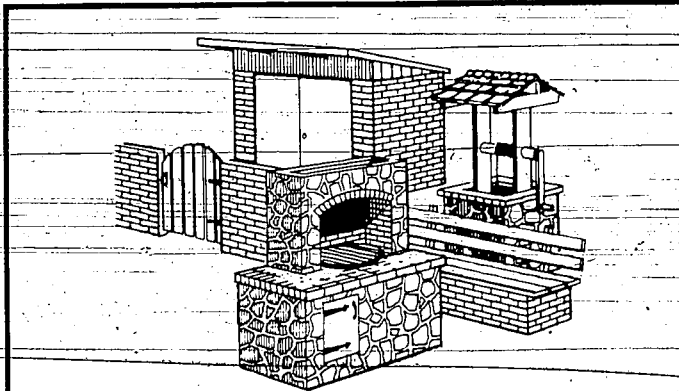

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# Fuel probe vowed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — White holiday vacationers were paying 3 cents a gallon more for gasoline. Two senators promised hearings within two weeks to find out why gas producers hiked prices just in time to catch the summer travel rush.

**Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., and John Stevenson, D-Ill., said Sunday:** "the public has a right to know" and the Congress has a responsibility to find out how this massive Fourth of July squeeze play on the consumer took place."

Stevenson is chairman of the Senate Investigations subcommittee. Stevenson heads an oil and gas production subcommittee. They said joint hearings would be held "within two weeks" on reasons behind the sudden jump in the price.

Stevenson charged that the public is being misled by oil industry and Ford administration explanations of the summer vacation time increases in the price of gasoline.

He asked Jackson and Rep. Hartley Staggers, D-W.V., chairman of the House Commerce Committee, to investigate.

"The oil companies said Ford's recent imposition of another 3-cent import tax on foreign oil caused the price increases. But Nader said the companies were taking advantage of the foreign hike to increase prices of domestic oil and work out increasing domestic production."

Stevenson said, "Clearly, the oil companies have manufactured a shortage through manipulation of refinery output so they could raise retail gasoline prices as a result of the summer vacation during the season when vacationing Americans buy more gasoline."

Stevenson and Jackson charged that when crude oil costs dropped this year because of plentiful supplies, refiners apparently cut back production to create an artificial shortage, justifying higher prices.

"It appears the gasoline inventory and pricing situation is a classic study in the power of the major oil companies to reverse the normal rules of supply and demand," Stevenson said.

**63 tourists injured in holiday train crash**

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI) — The trainload of tourists could see Mt. McKinley in all its glory around a bend in the track. One passenger looking back spotted a freight train approaching fast.

"I could see the freight coming behind us and thought at first it was on a side track," the passenger, who asked not to be identified, said. "But I'd ridden this train before and knew there was no side track, and I said to myself, 'That son-of-a-gun is going to plow right into us.'"

Sixty-three persons were injured, two seriously, in the collision between an Alaska Rail-Road passenger train and a freight train Friday 168 miles from Anchorage.

Arthur K. Williamson, of Hemet, Calif., was listed in very serious condition at the Elmendorf Air Force Base Hospital. Priscilla Atfield, whose home town was unavailable, was in serious but improving condition.

"Everybody helped out and there was no panic anywhere," said Mrs. Marjorie Lach, of Buffalo, N.Y., who was vacationing in Alaska with her husband.

The most serious injuries occurred in the dining car, where diners were knocked to the floor passengers said.

Six military helicopters ferried the injured out of the mountains after the crash. An Air Force pilot said one passenger car of the government-run train was crumpled.

Federal transportation safety officials were trying to explain one mystery from the crash.

D.L. Allen, assistant general manager of the Alaska Rail Road, said the freight left for Anchorage ahead of the passenger train, yet somehow the freight worked way behind the passenger train even though most of the right-of-way has only a single track.

# Children die in hot car

WICHITA, Kan. (UPI) — Two children shut in a car with temperatures nearing 160 degrees suffered heat convulsions Sunday and died from brain damage, a sheriff's official said.

The children were identified as 5-year-old Veronica Crockett and her 22-month-old brother Melvin. Doctors were able to save a third child, 3-year-old Stephanie.

"This is a tragedy and simply never should have occurred," said Sheriff Jim Carter said. "There's no reason why someone should leave their kids in the car in this weather."

The children's mother, Connie Crockett, 22, had left the children in the car while she went into the Sedgewick County Jail to visit a friend, Carter said.

Carter said sheriff's officials would meet with the district attorney to discuss the possibility of filing charges against Mrs. Crockett.

An autopsy showed the children had died of brain damage after their body temperatures reached 106 degrees, he said.

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# Solons face full agenda

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress returns Friday to a 10-day July 4th recess still facing a long list of unresolved issues ranging from the CIA investigation to taxes and truck weights.

But the Senate is still flailed in debate over whether Republican Louis Wyman or Democrat John Durkin should be seated as the junior senator from New Hampshire.

The Senate convenes today for more debate on the matter with yet another attempt to halt a Republican filibuster set for Tuesday.

The House returns to work Tuesday to consider transferring control of the Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve in California from the Navy to the Department of the Interior, paving the way for public access to the oil.

Between votes on the New Hampshire issue, the Select Senate Committee is investigating U.S. intelligence activities made apparent in a session Tuesday, still concentrating on alleged assassination plots hatched by the CIA.

Among the witnesses is retired Maj. Gen. Edward Lansdale, who has denied as "distortions" a report that former Attorney General Robert Kennedy ordered him in 1962 to have the CIA work out plans for "getting rid" of Cuban leader Fidel Castro.

Others scheduled to testify included former Secretary of State Dean Rusk, retired Gen. Maxwell Taylor, and McGee Bundy, special assistant for security affairs for Presidents John Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson.

The Senate is also investigating controversial House Rules Committee will consider a resolution aimed at dissolving a similar CIA committee which has been beset by differences among Democrats on the committee.

The proposal would lead to creation of a new committee. Treasury Secretary William Simon goes to the House Ways and Means Committee Tuesday to give his proposals for tax reform.

Reaching the floor this week are Department of Transportation proposals which will set off debate on whether maximum truck weights allowed on interstate highways should be reduced and whether British-French supersonic passenger aircraft should be allowed to land in the United States.

The flurry of congressional activity will be short-lived. A month later recess is scheduled to start Aug. 1. House Assistant Democratic Leader John McFall told members before their return this week they will face "a full working schedule for the entire month of July."

# Plant layoffs decline

DETROIT (UPI) — Detroit's problem of scheduling production in the face of changing consumer attitudes. While Chrysler recalls workers to build medium-size cars and light trucks and GM needs more workers to build full-size Chevrolets at Janesville, Small Car production at South Gate, Calif., is being cut back.

The plant, with 3,800 workers, was converted to production of GM's Chevrolet Monza, Buick Skyhawk and Oldsmobile Starfire during the winter. Some 2,800 workers will be off the job for two weeks and others will not return until sales pick up.

The production increases follow the industry's best sales month since last July. New car sales in June by domestic automakers were up 7 per cent over May, but still trailed the year-ago figure by 11 per cent.

Long-term layoffs, some dating back to the energy crisis in the winter of 1974, could drop below 100,000 by the end of August when the model production begins. Industry analysts say.

Chrysler cut 200,000 to 400,000 blue collar workers still off the job, plans to reduce that to 75,000 by the end of August. Layoffs at the company peaked at 137,500 during the winter.

Chrysler's indefinite layoffs stand at 26,500, down 4,100 from the previous week.

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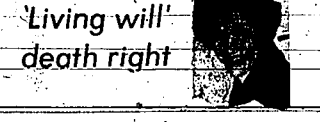

## 'Living will' death right

**DEAR S.S.:** *The Living Will* is simply a document that reads as follows:

To my family, my physician, my lawyer, my clergyman, To any medical facility in whose care I happen to be, To any individual who may become responsible for my health, **WISHES OF PATIENT:**

Death is as much a reality as birth, growth, maturity and old age—it is the one certainty of life. If the time comes when I can no longer take part in decisions for my own future, let this statement stand as an expression of my wishes while I am still of sound mind.

If the situation should arise in which there is no reasonable expectation of my recovery from physical or mental disability, I request that I be allowed to die and not be kept alive by artificial means or "heroic measures." I do not fear death itself as much as the indignities of deterioration, dependence and hopeless pain. I therefore ask that medication be mercifully administered to me to alleviate suffering even though this may hasten the moment of death.

This request is made after careful consideration. I hope you who care for me will feel morally bound to follow its mandate. I recognize that this appears to place a heavy responsibility upon you, but it is with the intention of relieving you of such responsibility and of placing it upon myself in accordance with my strong convictions that this statement is made.

It is not "against" anyone's religion. Pope Pius XII said in 1957: "The removal of pain and suffering by means of the action permitted by religion and morality for both doctor and patient, even if the use of drugs shortens life."

A California reader offered to donate \$1,000 to my favorite charity for acquainting him with *The Living Will*. And one Texan wrote: "I want to fill out a *Living Will* because when Gabriel blows his horn, no S.O.B. is going to keep me from going."

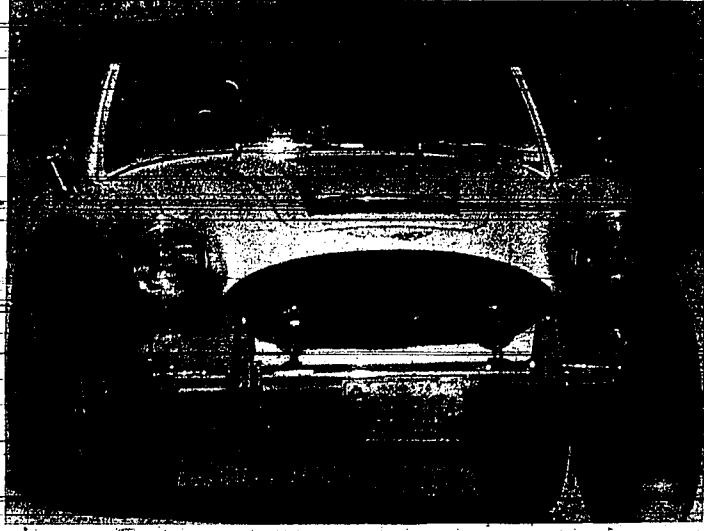
