Boston panel asks receivership delay

BOSTON (UPI)—The Boston School Committee has asked the U.S. Court of Appeals to delay, pending the outcome of an appeal, an order placing South Boston High School in receivership and stripping the committee of most of its powers. "Every day that passes without a delay is a prior restraint upon the School Committee's plan," says a committee counsel James J. Sullivan Jr. told the court Wednesday, the first day of the receivership.



Banker found?

DETROIT (UPI)—The FBI said today it has located the body of a man matching the description of a 25-year old Detroit assistant bank manager kidnapped a week ago. Three men charged in the case were arrested Wednesday. An FBI spokesman said the body was located in Newark, Ohio, the area where an intense search began late Wednesday. The victim, James J. Crawford Jr., was seized early last Friday outside his bank.

Offshore drilling threatens damage

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Offshore oil and gas production along the central U.S. East Coast will damage some coastal areas and pose a threat of ocean pollution from accidental or chronic oil spills, the Interior Department said today. Exploratory drilling could begin by 1977 under the present timetable, the department said, with production starting in 1981 and reaching a peak of up to 70,000 barrels of oil and 4.4 billion cubic feet of gas a year by about 1990.

Warsaw pact nations ask N-arms cut

VIENNA (UPI)—The Warsaw Pact nations today called on the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to reduce the number of nuclear weapons stationed in central Europe. East German Ambassador Ingo Oeser told the 8th plenary session of the East-West force cut talks in the Hofburg castle that any plan to cut troops and arms must include nuclear weapons, a Warsaw Pact spokesman reported.



Repeats stand

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI)—Retired Adm. Elmo Zumwalt said Wednesday that despite denials by Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, he is sticking with his claim Kissinger kept information about Soviet violations of the 1972 arms accord from President Ford. Zumwalt said Kissinger "knows he negotiated a secret agreement with the Russians in July, 1972." Zumwalt has been rumored as a possible U.S. Senate candidate from Virginia.

Canadian price index climbs again

OTTAWA (UPI)—Increased housing and transportation costs pushed the consumer price index in Canada up 0.9 per cent in November, Statistics Canada said today. The increase, registered one month after the federal anti-inflation program went into effect, set an annual inflation rate of 10.4 per cent. "The price changes pushed the value of a 1971 dollar down to 69 cents."

FBI accused

DETROIT (UPI)—Black activist Robert F. Williams, former head of the Separatist, Republic of New Africa, said Wednesday he will try to prove the FBI plotted "to get rid of me." Williams charged the FBI used forged documents and even murder attempts in its efforts, and said he will try to prove it when he goes on trial in North Carolina on 14-year old kidnap charges.

Bomb rocks Belfast thoroughfare

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI)—A powerful bomb exploded Thursday afternoon on Belfast's main thoroughfare, blowing out storefronts along a full block in a city center area crowded with Christmas shoppers. First reports said the bombing had been given in time for the street to be cleared and there were no casualties. The large bomb went off in Royal Avenue, opposite the main British army headquarters in the city, a building guarded with pillboxes and protected by antitank screens. The building had been a bomb target twice before.

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Food accepted

HAND-REACHES to accept a basket of soup, coffee, and cigarettes lowered by a policeman in London to the apartment where IRA members hold Mr. and Mrs. John Matthews hostage. The gunmen broke a 36-hour silence and resumed talks with police today, but refused to discuss the condition of their hostages. (UPI)

Church sets up campaign

TWIN FALLS—Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, plans to officially form his presidential campaign committee Friday, according to a spokesman for the senator.

But Church will not make a final decision about running for president until the turn of the year. Don Watkins, press aide to Church, told the Times-News this morning.

"He said that by officially forming the Church presidential campaign committee (CPC) will now be legal to raise money and draw up support of the Church office."

Church's final decision on whether to run will be based on what it looks like in the way of realistic money support for the campaign, Watkins said.

"Church is pretty pragmatic," he said, adding that if the necessary support does not develop, the senator is likely to not run. "I don't think he's going to do anything too rash ... but I think he's quite optimistic about these things," Watkins said. He said recently that the "visible signs" of support for a Church presidential race "keep building up."

"Initially I think this is going to be a very small (presidential campaign) committee," Watkins said. It will be chaired by Carl Burke, a Boise attorney and long-time personal friend of Church. The finance chairman, Watkins said, will be Henry Kinselman, who handles the finances for McGovern's presidential race four years ago.

Watkins said that the papers for Church's campaign committee will be filed about 9:30 a.m. EST Friday by Verda Barnes, Church's former administrative assistant.

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Irrigation water cut sought by Gem agency

TWIN FALLS—The Idaho Department of Water Resources wants to press for reduction of water use by Idaho irrigators who divert more water than their beneficial use.

Keith Higginson said the new proposed state water plan will call for action to reduce large per-acre diversions in order to obtain water for additional agricultural development in the state.

In addition, Higginson said the plan will recommend a new conservation of irrigation water rights.

He said water rights, in addition to meeting existing tests, would be required to be in the public interest.

Higginson said the state would continue to recognize users right to enough water to mature their crops.

However, he said the state will be to question water rights in existing irrigation systems where more water is diverted than used beneficially.

Such a policy could have important effect on irrigation districts in the Upper Snake River Valley where some of the nets divert as much as 16 1/2 acre feet per acre each year.

Those irrigation tracts in the Maule Valley which divert more water than they use could be affected also.

Higginson stressed that the proposed water plan would call for voluntary efforts by irrigators to reduce their water consumption, and would not seek power to take away existing rights.

He said his department is studying possible incentives to have farmers reduce their irrigation water flows in districts where too much water is diverted.

"We certainly would favor protection of existing water rights to the extent that water diverted is put to beneficial use with reasonable efficiency," Higginson said after his Twin Falls speech.

Higginson denied that the proposed state plan to reduce excessive water diversions would result in transfer of water from irrigation districts in the Upper Snake River Valley to new land developments down river.

He said it might transfer water from some Upper Valley users to new users elsewhere, however.

However, he said reduction of diversions in the Upper Valley is "likely and necessary if we are going to continue our economic growth in Southern Idaho. We need the water."

He said some "up-river" diversions have averaged 16.5 acre feet per acre. Part of that may be necessary because of the unusual condition of the canal—gravel. Part is excessive demand for water on the land.

Higginson said there were problems with reducing the size of some diversions. Current losses from some upriver diversions are "a major source of recharge of the Snake River aquifer." He said it might be difficult to reduce such flows without depleting the aquifer.

He said efficiencies such as sprinkler irrigation and cemented canals would be encouraged.

The state plan also would break new ground in recommending legislation to add a new condition to be met for water rights.

The plan will propose that water rights be in the "public interest" as well as meeting the beneficial use and other requirements now in effect.

He said the "public interest" will be determined by reference to the state water plan. "It

the only basis we have for determining what the public interest is," he said.

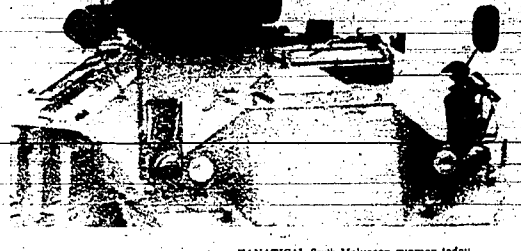
Higginson said the new water plan was a state recommendation to the Idaho Water Resources Board, which must then approve its provisions. Proposed legislative changes would have to be approved by the legislature.

He said the plan to be made public after the first of the year would call for:

- Allocation of enough water to provide a doubling of population.
- Maintaining in-stream flows on tributaries, but not on main streams.
- The state plans to pass a natural resource system law in order to supplant similar federal legislation. He said state rather than federal control should be sought.
- Establish state funding program to supplement private and federal funding on water resource development. The best programs, he said, are in states such as Texas where there are strong water resource funding programs.
- Permit diversions of water rights to put that water to a different use than previously.
- Require all water rights to be on record with the state by 1985, with possible forfeiture of rights for non-compliance.
- Refuse to allow diversion of Snake River water into other basins, and refuse transfer of Salmon and Bear River water into the Snake River.
- He said if current development rates continue, the state will be out of water by 2020.

Water users president Ted "Dip" Jerome commented on Higginson's proposal for irrigation efficiency.

House raises NY loan snag

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Some conservatives in the House said today they will attempt to reduce to \$1 billion a Senate-passed \$2.3 billion loan to keep New York City from going bankrupt.

A \$1.3 billion appropriations bill, which included \$2.3 billion for the loans, passed the Senate 72-23 Wednesday and went to the House, where it appeared final action would not be taken until Tuesday.

House conservatives diverged their objections to setting the bill up to a House-Senate conference committee, but said they would fight the measure that emerges from that session unless the money for New York is reduced.

The conference committee must work out the measure which will be sent to President Ford after final ratification by the House and Senate.

The bill authorizing the loans has been signed into law but it passed the House by a narrow vote of 218-203.

Rep. Robert E. Hannan, R-Md., said in formation reaching Congress after that vote indicated that New York City could get only \$1 billion in loans until next June 30 and that is the figure he will fight for when the bill actually appropriating the money comes to the House.

Rep. Robert H. Michel, R-Ill., said holding the amount of loans down would "keep their feet to the fire" and make New York City officials live up to their promises of fiscal reform.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Democratic and Republican leaders today said they thought the Senate would override a veto by President Ford of a tax cut extension.

Warning that if the cuts are not extended, it would cause a "severe" economic reversal, Democratic leader Mike Mansfield told reporters. "We've got the votes here to override a veto."

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Carter, Harris file first

 Today is officially the first day of the New Hampshire primary campaign.
 Supporters of Democrats Jimmy Carter and Fred Harris planned to be first to hand in their nominating petitions at Concord. Petitions for Republican Ronald Reagan also were expected.
 The deadline for filing is Dec. 26, and by that time the field will be crowded with most if not all of the 10 announced Democrats plus President Ford.

A spokesman for Indiana Sen. Birch Bayh, who said the race between Carter and Harris forces to be first to file is "political hogwash." He said Bayh would appear personally to submit his petitions next week. But Rep. Morris Udall of Arizona planned to be the first to file in person, doing so Friday.

The next primary comes March 2 in Massachusetts where Secretary of State Paul Guzzi said there would be "some surprise" when he discloses the list of candidates. Guzzi said the list would be long and maybe the longest ever in Massachusetts because "I have a responsibility to give voters the widest possible

choice, knowing full well candidates can withdraw."

After that comes the Florida primary March 9 and state Democratic Chairman Ann Cramer says Alabama Gov. George Wallace, despite some reported slippage, will probably beat Carter, the former Georgia governor who is making a strong effort for Florida delegates.

"There is a real possibility George Wallace's strength has weakened," she said Wednesday but, "I'd say Wallace would still probably come a little ahead." Wallace aide Charles Snider said his man is taking the Carter threat seriously. "Come January, you'll see George Wallace from one end of the state to the other. We'll kick off the campaign shortly after Jan. 15. We're not taking Carter for granted. I'll assure you we'll be getting around."

Campaigning in Florida Wednesday, Sen. Henry Jackson of Washington said the country needs "someone more than just a nice guy" as president. He said Ford's leadership is "incompetent" and the administration is "a bunch

of mush-mouths."
 Jackson also called for revival of the New Deal's Civilian Conservation Corps to get young people off the streets and to work.

In Chicago, Harris said he will run candidates committed to him—in 15 of Illinois' 21 congressional districts and will also enter the presidential preference contest, a popularity poll—that has no effect on makeup of the delegation.

The former Oklahoma Senator said he is not running candidates in some of the Chicago area districts because they are in firm control of Mayor Richard J. Daley and he does not have enough support.

In Albany, N.Y., state GOP chairman Richard M. Eisenbaum says the party's executive committee has called for an uncommitted delegate-to-the-national-convention, a contrast to the "informal" endorsement of President Ford by the state committee earlier this year before Vice President Nelson Rockefeller withdrew from the ticket.



Rosemary retires

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rosemary Woods, who served as secretary to President Richard M. Nixon, has retired from the government payroll. The General Services Administration confirmed Wednesday.

Miss Woods, who earned \$36,000 a year, remained on the GSA payroll after Nixon resigned Aug. 9, 1974 until her

own retirement in Nov. 22. She was paid during that period as part of a transition staff arranged for the former president by Congress. She reportedly will receive an annual pension of \$15,000.

New York waits for rescue loan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Today was to have been New York City's D-day—the day the nation's largest city defaulted on its financial obligations.

With haste and luck, the \$2.3 billion loan to rescue the city may reach President Ford for his signature before the day ends.

With help so close, the city has managed to avoid default even if the first loan — for \$140 million or \$150 million — is not made immediately. But Gov. Hugh Carey says two agencies of the state now face the prospect of defaulting on their bonds as early as Monday — and no help is in sight.

Carey made a hurried trip to Washington Wednesday, apparently to plead with Federal Reserve Chairman Arthur F. Burns for a short-term \$160 million loan to tide the state Dormitory Authority and the Housing Financing Agency through the emergency. Burns promised to study the matter but made no promises.

The Senate, meantime, passed, 72-23, a \$10.3 billion catch-all appropriations bill which includes the \$2.3 billion for loans and by a 79-2 vote, a bill to facilitate big city bankruptcies if the loan program fails. Sens. William Proxmire, D-Wis., and Charles M. Mathias, R-Md., voted against the bankruptcy law revisions.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., predicted a House-Senate conference committee would reach an accord on the appropriation bill today, permitting Congress to end the measure to Ford for his expected rapid approval.

The bankruptcy bill would enable the city to petition a court for permission to file for bankruptcy without first getting the approval of bondholders and other creditors, believed to number 250,000.

The House passed comparable legislation Tuesday. Senate and House differences are to be resolved and the final measure will be sent to Ford soon, probably next week. The new bankruptcy law will serve as a stopgap in case New York City defaults even with federal loans.

Carey, talking to reporters after meeting with Burns, said he told the chairman that by tapping every resource the state had been able to keep the two construction agencies from defaulting in October and November, but could not save them this month.

United cuts flights

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With strike negotiations broken off indefinitely—United Airlines has canceled all of its 1,300 daily scheduled flights through Christmas Eve.

The airline also said it had canceled all charter flights through Jan. 1. Negotiations with striking machinists were recessed Wednesday by federal mediators.

About 16,700 workers represented by the International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers, AFL-CIO, have been on strike since Saturday. As the picketing continued, United laid off 13,000 other workers, including all of its pilots and flight attendants.

The airline said Wednesday it would reduce work hours and pay by 50 percent for all of its 12,500 nonunion, nonmanagement employees, effective Saturday.

Bacon taint level dropping

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Government inspectors have found that the concentration of a preservative believed to pose a cancer threat is declining in bacon.

"Our intention certainly is to get rid of it altogether," Dr. Harry C. Musman, associate director of the animal plant health inspection service of the Department of Agriculture, said Wednesday.

Processors realize they do

not have to use as much sodium nitrite and sodium nitrate as they had been using to make bacon that will not spoil, Musman said. The two agents are used as preservatives but scientists fear that they form nitrosamines, a suspected cancer causing agent.

The government has given the meat processing industry a year to find a way to make products free of nitrosamines.

Arrested

TIPSTER who collected nearly \$10,000 from CBS by promoting information about the location of the body of the late James R. Hoffa of the Teamsters Union, Clarence N. Medina, was arrested in downtown New Orleans Wednesday. He was held as a fugitive from imprisonment. (UPI)

Crash data asked

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Ford has asked for a report about recent near collisions of jet airliners which endangered dozens of lives.

A spokesman said Wednesday that Ford spoke to Transportation Secretary William Coleman and expressed his concern about near collisions. The spokesman said the President "is very concerned about maintaining the U.S. excellent safety record."

The National Transportation Safety Board said that on Thanksgiving eve, over Lake Michigan an American Airline jumbo jet carrying 194 persons from Chicago to Newark, N.J., dived 2,000 feet — passing 20 to

100 feet from a TWA jumbo carrying 114 persons from Philadelphia to Los Angeles.

Twenty-four were injured in the American craft.

At Chicago's O'Hare International Airport last Friday, the Federal Aviation Administration said, a TWA flight landing with 70 passengers from Hartford, Conn., closed to within 300 feet of a United Air Lines flight landing from Providence, R.I., with 53 persons.

The FAA also told Monday of two other incidents Friday, involving planes intruding on each other's air space. It said it found the Air Traffic Control System at fault in one case and possible "pilot error" in the other.

U.S. farmers go flat out

The Department of Agriculture has issued some statistics which seem to fly in the face of the common view of food prices and farm income.

In general, the figures suggest the food-buying consumer is better off than he thinks. And so is the farmer, at least when compared with the statistical base year, 1967.

The "Agricultural Situation," a publication issued monthly by the Agriculture Department, provides the following information:

Food costs have risen at a pace only slightly faster than the general inflation. The consumer price index has risen about 63 per cent in the past eight years, while grocery prices have grown by 28 per cent.

The amount of the family's food budget which goes to the farmer, as opposed to the middle man or retailer, has grown much faster than inflation or retail food prices.

One of the most interesting items in the report is the change in per-acre crop production in the U.S. Farmers must have been doing their work well, for per-acre crop production has risen 13 per cent during the past eight years.

In addition, the number of acres used for cropland has grown by seven per cent during that period.

The combination of higher production per acre and more acres in production have led to a national crop increase of 21 per cent in the past eight years, a remarkable achievement.

Increasing production has helped keep prices at a reasonable level in America. It also has provided the new medium of foreign exchange needed to compensate for rising imports of oil and machinery.

Farm exports in 1974 rose to a total of \$22 billion, up from \$17.7 billion the year before. This year's exports should be higher.

All this demonstrates that America's farmers are on the job.

They are rapidly increasing production in a time of worldwide need and in the process they are keeping prices at a reasonable level.

The farmer at last is obtaining a larger portion of the food dollar, although that share remains a modest 43 cents.

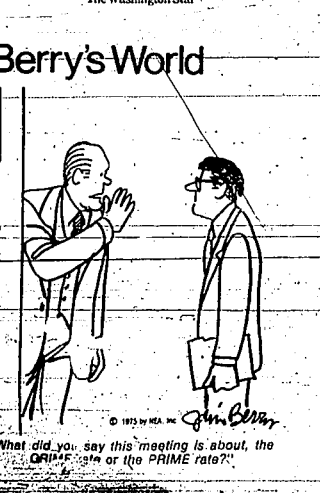

Sex bias charged in suit

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Until recently, Darlene Schmalzried prepared the daily news digest for the President. Now she's suing him and four aides.

According to Miss Schmalzried, James B. Shuman was listed as editor of the news summary and he got paid \$25,000. But when he went on to other tasks and she became "de facto" editor, she got \$11,064 in September, 1974 and when she quit, her pay was only \$13,531.

Miss Schmalzried said she was a victim of White House discrimination on the basis of sex.

Shuman said there was no basis for the charge. Philip Buchen, a White House counsel, said there was no sex discrimination in the White House. Buchen said four women are doing the job now and each is getting less than Miss Schmalzried got when she quit Sept. 30.

Knight death leads develop

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Telephone tappers have told police that composite drawings of the killers of newspaper heir John S. Knight III resemble several male prostitutes in the city.

"We have received up to 30 or better contacts, mostly phone calls from persons who said they knew someone who resembled the composites," Chief Inspector Joseph Golden said Wednesday.

Golden said some of the persons identified to police "are male hustlers," or male prostitutes who engage in homosexual acts for a fee.

Knight, 30, special projects editor of the Philadelphia Daily News and son of John S. Knight, editorial chairman of Knight-Ridder Newspapers, was stabbed to death in his lavish downtown apartment Sunday.

Mrs. Rosemary McKinnon, 27, who was staying in Knight's apartment "with her

husband, John, 29, a New Haven, Conn., psychiatrist, at the time of the murder, described three assailants who also stabbed her and ransacked the apartment in an apparent robbery attempt.

She told police that from conversation with the intruders she believed at least one was homosexual.

"The investigation so far indicates he (Knight) was bisexual," Golden said. "This was based on interviews that we have conducted."

McKinville, McKinnon's father, Dr. Kenneth L. McKinnon, said his son and daughter-in-law are in hiding.

"I don't want to know where he is," he said. "His life and security depend on trapping those three who killed his friend. This is nothing but a story, but to us it is a life and death situation."

House OK's conference fund

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House has voted 252-162 to authorize \$5 million for a conference on women that opponents declared will turn out to be a "national bash" and a subsidized lobby for the ERA.

The measure, approved Wednesday and sent to the Senate, would provide for state conferences and then a national conference of 50 delegates per state to promote, among other things, "equality between men and women in all aspects of life in the United States."

Rep. Sam Steiger, R-Ariz., denounced the measure as "a taxpayer supported meeting that

will end up in lobbying for the ERA (Equal Rights Amendment)."

Rep. Robert Bauman, R-Md., described the proposed conference as "a national lash."

"The money will be used for the expenses incurred by any other national conference, such as printing, rent, staff salaries," replied Rep. Bella Abzug, D-N.Y., manager of the bill.

Steiger sought to cut the proposed \$10 million authorization to \$1 million and limit the life of the authorization to one year. Rep. Patsy Mink, D-Hawaii, prime author of the bill, offered the compromise of \$5 million over a 10-year period.

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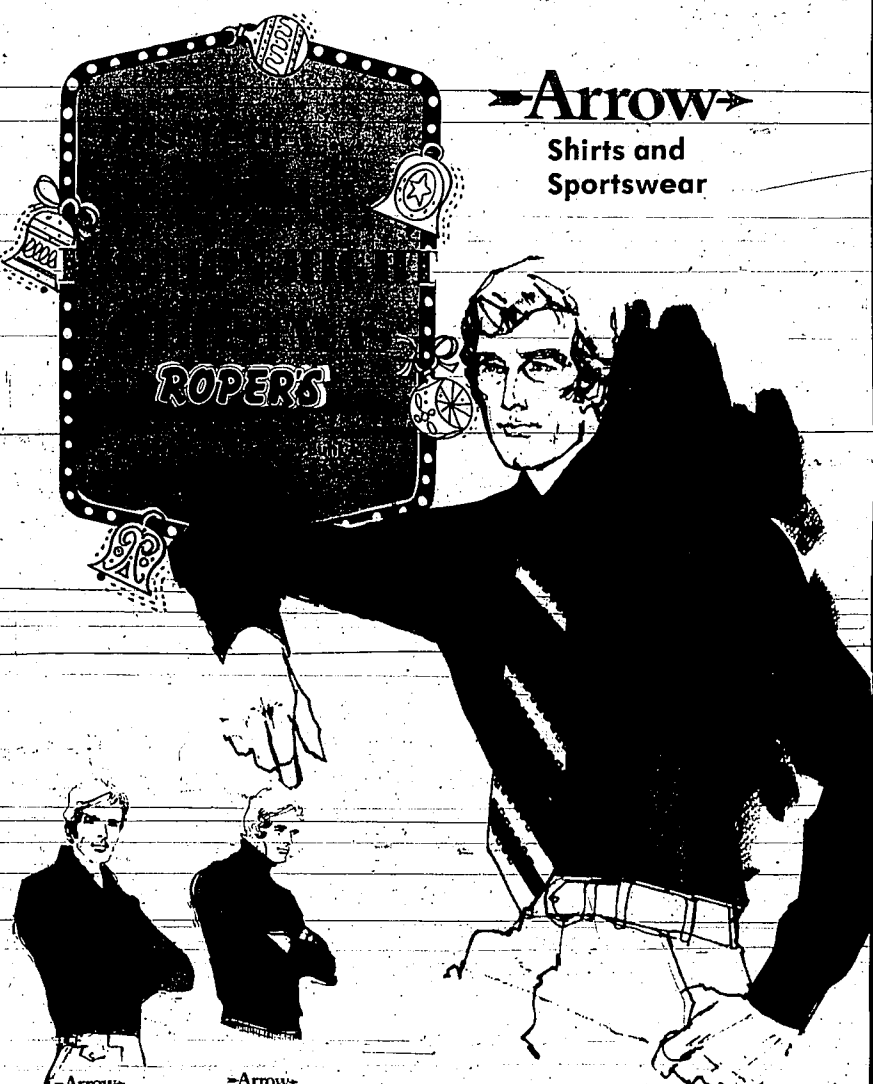

Thousands join strike in Spain

MADRID, Spain (UPI) — Prime Minister Carlos Arias Navarro today formed the first government of the post-Franco era, giving key posts to politicians committed to political reform.

But even as Arias prepared to announce the list of his new ministers, thousands of industrial workers struck in Madrid and Barcelona in support of political freedoms and a general amnesty. Mounted police chased demonstrators near Madrid's central campus.

Highly placed sources said Arias totally revamped the cabinet and gave the key ministries of Foreign Affairs, Interior and Justice to politicians who have gone on record favoring change toward a parliamentary democracy.

They said the new cabinet — scheduled to be announced officially later in the day — reflected the desires of King Juan Carlos for cautious but far-reaching change of the regime which he inherited 19 days ago from the late Generalissimo Francisco Franco.

Arias lined up the army behind his cabinet by naming Gen. Fernando de Sanjulián y Díaz Mendilichu first vice premier, the sources said. De Sanjulián is a widely respected career officer, a political moderate and the head of the army's prestigious Institute of Defense Studies.

The 19-man cabinet includes three more generals — the ministers of the army, navy and air force.

Manuel Fraga Iribarne, a former Information minister, was named second vice premier and given the Interior Ministry. Monarchist Jose Maria Arellaza, the Count of Mátiz, was named foreign minister and Antonio Garrigues Diaz-Caballero, a former ambassador to the Vatican, justice minister, the sources said.

Arellaza, 65, is a former ambassador to Paris and Washington. Fraga, 53, marked his tenure as Information minister by abolishing direct press censorship in the first liberalization move of the Franco regime in 1976.

Both have publicly urged a democratic change by way of a reform of the constitution, estimating it will take two years to do the job. But the question was whether Spain's increasingly active left will have that much patience.

Lebanese leftists seize Beirut hotels from army

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Leftist militiamen, shrouding off a newly arranged cease-fire, seized three strategic hotels today in a thundering assault on right-wing forces and Lebanese army troops.

Followed by the capture of two armored cars from the Lebanese army, the leftists shoved the rightists and commandos back along the Beirut seafont — scene of the worst fighting in Lebanon's eight-month civil war.

At least 250 persons have been killed and 600 wounded in three days of nonstop street fighting. The latest casualties brought the total death toll since April to nearly 5,000, with 11,000 persons injured.

The lightning assault by leftists gave them control of the Phoenix Hotel and consolidated their hold on the fire-gutted St. Georges Hotel and the Alcazar.

Right-wing Phalangists, only a few hundred yards away, clung to the 25-story Holiday Inn, a strategic building towering over the ambattled seafont.

There was no sign of Lebanese army commandos in either the Holiday Inn or the Phoenix Hotel — both held by army troops Wednesday.

The army had been sent into the war zone to try and separate the battling militias.

With daylight, a red flag waved above the Phoenix and firing around the Holiday Inn dropped to sporadic sniper and machine gun duels.

The cease-fire, which was to have taken effect at midnight Wednesday, was a sham.

"We will only stop fighting, when we want to stop," said Abu Adell, a leftist spokesman.

"Every time we have stopped in the past, the Phalangists and the army come sneaking in to reinforce their positions at the Holiday Inn."

"This is not going to happen again."

Premier Rashid Karami announced the surprise truce Wednesday, but the dealling passed with warring factions still battling from their seafont strongholds.

Karami's announcement followed a meeting of the Coordination Committee, composed of representatives of all political factions but boycotted by the main leftist parties.

The prime minister said all parties had agreed to the ceasefire and that suspects in a spate of killings last weekend would be handed over to the authorities.

The leftists refused to comment on the truce, saying they knew nothing about it "because we are boycotting the Coordination Committee meeting until the criminals are handed over."

The right-wing Christians said they would abide by the agreement, on condition it was obeyed by "the other side."

Leftists have accused the Christian-led army of joining the rightists in the war, and also blamed them for lobbing an incendiary bomb into the 46-year-old St. George Hotel.

Sniper fire sprayed the streets from the Holiday Inn and from the Hilton Hotel, about 500 yards to the north. In front of the St. Georges Hotel, a fleet of luxury pleasure craft still smoldered.

A teen-age youth, shouldering his Kalashnikov rifle in front of the St. George hotel, gringed and pointed at the burned speedboats.

BC election seen as crucial test

VANCOUVER, Canada (UPI) — British Columbia's provincial election today is viewed as a crucial test of socialism in economic hard times.

A close race was expected between Premier Dave Barrett's socialist New Democratic Party, in power for the past three years, and the Social Credit Party under Bill Bennett. The latter Liberal and Conservative parties are fighting for survival on the provincial level.

The election was Barrett's first test at the polls in Canada's westmost province since the NDP staged a dramatic upset win in 1972 and ended 20 years of Social Credit rule under Bennett's father, W. A. Bennett.

And it's Bill Bennett's, first bid for power since taking over the party leadership from his father only two years ago.

A total of 223 candidates are seeking the 55 legislative seats. Both the NDP and Social Credit have filed full slates. The Liberals have 49 candidates and the Conservatives, 29. There are 35 independents in the race.

Candidates swap blasts

SYDNEY, Australia (UPI) — Caretaker Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser and deposed Premier Gough Whitlam denounced each other today in the final stages of a violent campaign that culminates Saturday in one of Australia's most significant elections.

Fraser, the Liberal party leader who was hit on the head with a beer can and spat at in Melbourne Wednesday night, is a clear favorite in the polls to retain the top job.

The six-foot, six-inch conservative, a millionaire farmer, has vowed to cure Australia's economic ills and lead the country back to "the good old days."

Whitlam, leader of the Australian Labor Party, who was dismissed as prime minister on Nov. 11 after a budgetary deadlock in the Senate, claims his firing by Governor-General Sir John Kerr was illegal and that under his administration the nation was on the road to economic recovery.

UN skirting Angola fuss

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI) — The U.N. General Assembly has skirted the issue of foreign intervention in northern Angola. The United States has charged that Cuban troops are operating there at the behest of the Soviet Union.

U.S. Ambassador Daniel Moynihan told reporters that Soviet involvement in Angola is not the latest issue.

The reconization of Africa has begun at the hands of the Soviet empire.

Moynihan charged Cuban troops were active in at least six west African nations and "there are suggestions" they might be involved in two others.

At least 3,000 Cuban troops are reported in Angola, helping the Soviet-supplied Popular Movement for the Liberation of Angola in its fight against the National Front for the Liberation of Angola, which the United States has supported.

The Cuban and Soviet ambassadors both attacked Moynihan during the assembly debate and said they are merely helping a nationalist movement, not trying to colonize the former Portuguese territory.

Seven African nations, including three that allegedly have Cuban troops, had tried to win an assembly condemnation of the presence of South African troops in Angola.

Moynihan said such a "one-sided" resolution would be a "big lie." Zaire responded with an amendment condemning "all foreign intervention," which clearly would have meant the Soviet Union without saying "Africa."

Both amendments were later withdrawn.

Drive pressed

LISBON, Portugal (UPI) — The government pushed ahead today in its drive to consolidate power in the hands of non-Communists despite a split in the country's second largest political party.

Special Affairs Minister Jorge Sa Borges formally resigned from the left-of-center Popular Democratic party to protest the methods of party chief Francisco Sa Carneiro.

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Hanoi sending food to Laos

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI) — North Vietnam has begun shipping urgently needed food and fuel to Laos aboard trucks and captured American aircraft, the official Voice of the People newspaper announced today.

The newspaper said two U.S. built C130 transport planes, seized in the collapse of South Vietnam last April, arrived in Vientiane Saturday with the first shipment of "aid material."

Quoting an "official" announcement, the newspaper said that the airlift was scheduled to continue for at least 20 days.

Thailand closed the Mekong River border with Laos Nov. 16 following a shooting incident between Pathet Lao troops and a Thai patrol boat. The border closing created a shortage of food and gasoline in Vientiane.

The first truck convoy arrived Monday, passing through the Mu Gia pass in the mountains separating North Vietnam and Laos, according to a report by the North Vietnamese News agency.

An official North Vietnamese statement said the convoys would continue until next spring or early summer when the monsoon rains begin.

Prayer request saves man's life

BEILEN, The Netherlands (UPI). — H.G. de Groot walked into the baggage car of the hijacked train prepared to die. Could he say a final prayer, he asked his masked abductor. "The terrorist was deeply moved," said one Dutch government official.

The split-second pause gave de Groot time to leap from the car and frantically scramble down the train's embankment. The 34-year-old real estate broker outstepped the gunman's shots and fled to a nearby farmhouse.

Dutch officials described de Groot's ordeal as they pieced together a tale of terror aboard the stalled train. Three hostages have died since the gunmen seized the two-car, mustard-colored train last week to publicize demands for independence of the South Moluccan Islands from Indonesia. Another 29 captives are still aboard.

A South Moluccan source said that despite the killings, the terrorists were fervently religious men who read the Bible and prayed before and after each slaying.

"They know they are sinning," the source said. "They felt they had to do the killings to advance the Moluccan cause." Police who interviewed de Groot and other escaped hostages said Jan Hendrik Braan was the first to die.

The terrorists burst into the 30-year-old engineer's cabin and told him to speed nonstop to Amsterdam. Instead Braan slammed on the brakes. He was shot and his body was dumped into a ditch.

Les Butler was the second victim. Precisely why the 22-year-old recruit was slain remains unclear. The terrorists dragged him from his second class seat to the luggage compartment where he was shot.

Some 30 minutes later at least one more shot was fired into his body, lying by the track. "The coup de grace," one official conjectured.

Two days later F. J. Berling was killed. The terrorists had demanded a bus to Amsterdam's international airport for a flight with the hostages to an unidentified destination.

They also had demanded that a typed letter entitled "A Letter to the Dutch Nation" be distributed to the press. The government reply was conveyed over an army field telephone by a mediator. "No bus. The statement will be passed out only if the women, the elderly and the ill are released."

The baggage car was opened. Berling stood in the door. One shot later he, too, lay dead by the tracks.

The bodies lay on the tracks for days, stoned pecking at the faces. Doctors were finally allowed to remove them.

Ford wart removed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A small wart was removed from President Ford's left eyelid Tuesday.

Deputy press secretary William Greener said Wednesday the operation was not disclosed at the time because "it just wasn't that much." The wart, he said, was "totally benign."

Applications must be on Federal Form SF-171 which are available at any federal personnel office or the U.S. Civil Service Commission office. Envelopes should be marked "Seasonal Employment Application."

The jobs available in the region include park technician, park aid and laborers. McClure said there are often 100 applications for each job available.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My son has a canker sore almost all the time. Would you please comment on this problem? — F.W.
Cankers are small, painful ulcerations of the mucous membranes in the mouth. A list of all possible causes would occupy several columns, but I'll give you a few.
A food allergy or some irritation can be the cause, and the cure is of your son's condition seems to indicate this is the likely true. Foods such as citrus fruits, melons, tomatoes, vinegar, wine, chocolate and walnuts are prime offenders.
Emotions can also play a role in this. One study suggests that emotions combined with physical exhaustion can predispose a person to outbreaks. I might mention for the benefit of women readers that one study indicates some women have flareups during pregnancy, while others find the problem lessened during pregnancy. The incidence also appears high among women just before menstruation.
There's not much you can do about them except to avoid substances that seem to bring them on. There are several medications used to relieve the discomfort.
There is some evidence of inherited susceptibility to canker sores, especially where both parents have been subject to recurrent episodes. But any agent that can irritate the lining of the mouth can cause the sores.
Even with this limited list of possibilities it is not surprising to learn that as many as 20 per cent of the population may have canker sores at any given time.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My son, age 9, wets the bed. I've been told this is because he sleeps too soundly. I was also told years ago that he should outgrow it by the time he was nine. Well, he hasn't. Is there something you can tell me? I would like to help him if I know what to do. — Mrs. J.R.
He probably doesn't sleep any more soundly than other nine-year-old boys do. I would not give up on him.
The boy needs a complete urologic examination. Bedwetting is not a simple matter to deal with, from either a parent's or a physician's standpoint. The causes can be complex, ranging from allergies (always a possibility) to psychological problems.
There can also be structural malformation problems which might require surgical treatment.
If such methods don't sleep any more soundly to overcome the problem by himself. Since he hasn't you must now seek the appropriate medical help. After you've done that, then you might send for my booklet, "Bed-wetting: Ways To Stop It." It will fill in your knowledge on this important subject. Dear Dr. Thosteson: Could you please tell me the best way to remove a sty? I've had one for several months. — T.P.
A sty is an inflammation which occurs usually at the base of the eyelash. The goal in treatment is to promote drainage and to prevent spread of the infection. Hot compresses can assist drainage. A physician can prescribe antiseptic or antibiotic ointments for you to apply also.

If such methods don't help, then there is a simple procedure for lancing the sty to remove the pus. This is usually successful. But for heaven's sake, don't try to do this yourself. I shudder to think of the ugly problems that could result. Let a physician do it.

Meanwhile you should keep your hands away from your eyes and wash your face frequently. The offending organism in styes is usually the staphylococcus. After several months with this sty you are fortunate there has been no spread of the infection. Better get it looked at soon.

Firm to manage hospital

LOVELOCK, Nev. (UPI) — A contract has been signed with a Utah firm to manage the Pershing County Hospital in an effort to quiet the medical controversy that has split this city.

The Health Systems Research Institute of Salt Lake City and the Pershing County Hospital Board has reached agreement for the Institute to provide a hospital administrator within the next 90 days and to install a management system.

Vern Schoenfeld, vice chairman of the hospital board, said the contract will take the management of the hospital "completely out of the political and personality arena and puts its operation strictly on a business basis."

Robert Moss, former hospital administrator, resigned recently after the hospital ran into financial problems partly because of the controversy.

Dort Tikker, President of the Research Institute, said the policy of his organization is to retain existing staff, as much as possible and to hire local residents whenever possible. The new administrator will have complete authority over business and personnel management within the limits of the budget and the general policies set by the board of trustees.

The hospital board also approved reinstatement of Dr. Joseph Presti for hospital privileges. Presti was suspended by the board when he could not secure medical malpractice insurance.

Presti has been at the center of the controversy and has sent his patients out of town for hospitalization since he can not treat them at the hospital here. This has led in part to the financial problems of the hospital, where the occupancy rate has dipped at times to temper cent.

Presti said today he will wait to see if any changes are made at the hospital by the Salt Lake City firm before sending his patients to the hospital.

"Those people who tried to get me in trouble, I can't work with them," said Presti in referring to some employees at the hospital. He said they sent allegations about his medical ability to the State Attorney General, State Board of Medical Examiners and the Nevada Liability Insurance Association.

"I am not going to set foot in there (the hospital) because they are laying for me," Presti said.

Presti's medical practices are under investigation by the Attorney General's Office and the board of medical examiners. Although he was refused insurance by the quasistate association, the reason given was the controversy which has divided the community and not because of his professional competence.

When Presti was suspended, the Pershing County Commission refused to give any financial aid to the hospital, which then fell behind in its payments to suppliers. But since the new developments, the county commission has resumed its financial help to the hospital.

The county commission and the Utah firm are reviewing a possible agreement to put another doctor and medical backup team in the hospital. At present Dr. Henry Cryer is under a 15,000 a month contract to treat patients at the hospital. Cryer and Presti are the only two physicians here and there is a feud between them.

Legal pot

NEW YORK (UPI) — Gov. Hugh Carey has proposed a bill that would make New York the seventh state to decriminalize possession of small amounts of marijuana. Carey said Tuesday he would introduce a marijuana bill in the legislature so we can concentrate on hard crime, on violent crime. The proposal was one of several recommendations he made for the overhaul of New York's criminal justice system. While he did not specify the amount of his proposal, Carey said, "The statute will have a clear definition of the amount in possession. We certainly want to separate the one who's caught with the possession of a small amount from the one who is a vendor or pusher." "We're not legalizing marijuana," Carey said, adding he was disappointed the state is "spending so much time on something we can handle by education rather than by penalties." "The system is not working... We can't get to deal with the real criminals in society." New York law now lists sale of less than one-quarter ounce of marijuana a misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail. Possession of up to an ounce is a felony carrying a sentence of one to seven years.

Hospital deals with grief

CHICAGO — Death once was as taboo as dirt in a hospital. People went to the sterile place with an antiseptic smell to be healed, so they could go on living. Dying was something that frequently happened there. But the staff spoke about it in hushed tones, while patients waited for the end in a cold and lonely isolation.

Today, more hospitals are dealing with death — not as defeat, but as fact that must be faced with compassion.

"Our objective is to prepare patients for death with comfort and dignity," says June Werner, chairman of the nursing department at suburban Evanston Hospital.

More nurses, chaplains and social workers, as well as physicians, are manifesting a new sensitivity toward dying patients' needs. They are counseling them, assuaging their fears, sharing their grief and sometimes even shedding tears for them. And they are helping families of patients cope with the traumatic situation.

Many hospitals throughout the country have added special death counselors to their staffs or are sponsoring workshops on the subject to teach their personnel how to counsel the dying.

Psychiatrist Elisabeth Kubler-Ross, whose writings on death and dying during the last decade have spurred more concern for the dying in hospitals, wants to change the attitudes of our death-denying society.

"Everyone deserves to die in peace," she says. "So we need more physicians and hospital staff who practice the art of medicine — dealing with a dying patient openly, honestly and with love so they can be more comfortable with their fate."

Instead of evading or ignoring the subject of death because of their own fears or discomfort, she believes hospital staff members have a duty to ease the patient's burden by ministering to his

or her human needs. In her book "Death: The Final Stage of Growth," she cites the case of a dying student nurse who claimed that a dying patient is not seen "as a person, but as a symbol of what every human fears and what we each know that we must someday face."

Though there still are miles to go, Dr. Kubler-Ross believes progress has been made toward the humanizing of hospital care in the area of death counseling.

"Ten years ago, I was the only person counseling on death in hospitals," she said. "Today, courses on the subject are being taught in institutions all over the country. Hospitals obviously have realized the need."

Marge Lyons, a nurse with psychiatric training who has worked with Dr. Kubler-Ross, has been a death counselor at Highland Park Hospital since March. She thinks a job such as hers, though it can be emotionally draining, is vital for serving a patient's total needs.

What are the dying patient's needs? Most want someone with whom to share their experience. They want someone who will listen as they vent their feeling of fear, frustration and anger. They want a shoulder to cry on.

"In other words," says Mrs. Lyons, "they want emotional support from us, rather than a detached attitude. It's often difficult for dying patients to handle their own feelings, and they find it unpleasant to discuss it with family members because it may cause them more grief."

She believes a hospital can be a dehumanizing place for patients, and the service she and other members of the staff provide puts hospital care on a more personal level. Not a nurse who hurries in and out of a patient's room with a forced smile and an insoucious greeting like "You're looking good today," she takes the time to search for signals as to whether the patient wants to talk, and she takes time to listen.

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Fleas on wild rodents present plague danger

VALE, Ore. (UPI) — Representatives of three government agencies in Oregon are warning residents of Western States against handling wild rodents — especially chipmunks — because the animals and fleas carry bubonic plague.

"Of especial danger to humans and pets that come in contact with wild rodents are the 'coughing fleas' capable of transmitting plague to healthy organisms."

Oregon's first recorded case of a human having the dread "black death" disease was in 1935. Two of the three cases recorded in Oregon were fatal.

Chris Maser, Bureau of Land Management research zoologist, Sam Shaver, animal damage control specialist for the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and Bob Greshink, manager of the Vector Control Section, Health Division, Oregon Department of Human Resources, described plague as a naturally occurring disease of rodents and their fleas throughout the West.

"They said there is concern because of a recent outbreak of the plague in the Southwest last summer and because of limited research last winter in southern and eastern Oregon that uncovered new evidence of plague."

However, they said there is no need for alarm because the known incidence of plague is limited to small geographic areas.

This year Shaver and other Fish and Wildlife Service personnel will use specially treated blotter paper to take blood samples from coyotes, badgers and predators normally taken in the animal damage abatement program.

The blood samples are mailed to the U. S. Public Health Service Laboratory at Fort Collins, Colo., where they are tested for the plague antibody. Predators which feed on plague diseased rodents may suffer a mild case of the disease and develop antibodies to the disease much in the same way humans do when they are inoculated.

Blood sample tests can detect the antibodies and that evidence, coupled with the data collected at the time blood samples were taken, can be used to locate "active" plague areas.

When an "active" plague area is suspected, the next spring traps are set for Townsend ground squirrels and other rodents in an effort to closely locate the sick population. In the past, tests have found the geographical limits of an active plague area to be small, sometimes an acre or less.

Maser said the disease generally is spread by the fleas that infest rodents and feed on their blood. The blood contains the plague bacteria, which multiply in the flea's stomach and eventually may plug it.

The flea becomes starved and begins to feed ravenously, the blood fills its esophagus, dislodges some bacteria and then is "coughed back into the blood stream of the flea's host."

"So, if you hear a coughing flea, look out," said Maser.

Plague, if diagnosed early in humans, is treatable and most-treated persons soon recover. From 1908 to 1967 there were 110 recorded cases of plague with 66 fatalities.

Primary symptoms of plague are enlargement of the lymph nodes, fever, headache, general body ache and abdominal discomfort.

Dogs, coyotes and badgers appear to be highly resistant to the disease but cats and rodents are susceptible and generally die shortly after infection.

The researchers cautioned against handling sick, dying or dead rodents or predators.

"If there is a rodent die-off caused by plague, there are bound to be numerous fleas in the area looking for a new host. That's when it is dangerous for a man or his pets to be in the area," said Greshink.

"I always caution people to use all possible means to rid their pets of fleas — by spraying or use of treated beds or flea collars...."

Gem rodents carriers

BOISE (UPI) — An Idaho state health official said rodents in Idaho are known to carry bubonic plague and people should avoid handling them.

Studies in Oregon are determining the location of rodent populations that are infected with the plague. Studies so far have shown that there are active plague areas in Malheur County, across the Snake River from Idaho.

Dr. John D. Ther, epidemiologist for the Idaho Department of Health, said Idaho is not performing such studies and he does not feel they are necessary because

"we know that they have plague in Idaho, studies have been done in the past and showed they have it."

"It varies from time to time. It's here, the main thing is that we don't have human-cases occurring."

Mather said notices have been put out that people should not be handling rodents, catching them, bringing them home as pets, bringing home dead animals, because parasites on dead animals will leave them and may go to humans and may give them plague."

The plague is found in "picket pins" — ground squirrels that live in the desert and are a popular target for young marksmen.

"They usually don't bring them home after they're shot," he said.

While the plague usually infects only a small part of a rodent population, "there is no way to know which part that is."

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Anti-war conversations sent to Johnson, Nixon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Conversations by or about antiwar congressmen, overheard by FBI agents wiretapping foreign embassies, were sent on a regular basis to the White House during the Johnson and Nixon administrations, the Washington Post reported today.

From May, 1966, to January, 1969, President Lyndon Johnson was provided biweekly reports on the political hypocrisies of national security wiretaps on embassies, the newspaper said.

Johnson first asked the FBI in March, 1966, to provide any current material it could develop on senators, congressmen and prominent citizens who opposed the Vietnam war; the newspaper said.

Later in the month, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover noted for his files that the president was "very pleased with the material" that had been submitted — conversations overheard from July 1, 1964 to that time.

H.R. Haldeman, Richard Nixon's White House chief of staff, asked the FBI July 27, 1970, to furnish similar political information, according to a report furnished to the Senate Intelligence committee and obtained by the Post. Two days later, the bureau supplied summaries of 3 1/2 years of overheard, embassy conversations.

relating to senators and congressmen.

The Post said its story was based on information given to the Senate Intelligence panel by the Justice Department.

An FBI spokesman said the bureau's current policy is to supply the White House with details from national security embassy taps only if it "refers to a threat to the president or a very significant internal security aspect."

About 50 taps would be in operation at embassies and other foreign government buildings in Washington in a normal year under the national security program. After Johnson's request, the embassy wiretaps were screened for "political" material as well as "national security" information, the Post said.

The newspaper quoted a former presidential aide as saying Johnson often spoke of what he knew Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., then chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, had been saying to the Soviet ambassador.

The White House also asked the FBI to keep in mind Fulbright's televised hearings on the Vietnam war and prepare memos comparing the statements of Fulbright and Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., with positions of the Communist party, it said.

of price-fixing in the Boise-Caldwell area — along with Morrison-Knudsen Co., Idaho Concrete Pipe Co., Inc., Nampa; Consolidate Concrete Co., Boise; G&B Ready Mix, Nampa; Clements Concrete Co., Inc., Garden City, and A-Red-Mix, Nampa.

Monroe and Flynn Sand & Gravel are slated for trial Feb. 17 on charges of price fixing in the Ontario area — along with Idaho Concrete Pipe Co., Inc., doing business as Oregon Concrete Products Co., Nyssa.

Soviets cut speed limit

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet government, in reaction to increasing highway smash-ups that killed 20 persons in Moscow alone last week, has ordered speed limits cut sharply in cities and towns.

New drivers must post signs on their cars announcing their inexperience and the maximum speed limit at which they can drive.

The army newspaper the Krasnaya Zvezda said the speed limit in populated areas will be reduced to 35 miles per hour — beginning Jan. 1.

Previous speed limits were 50 m.p.h.

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Ski regulations sought

GENEVA (UPI) — Skiing has become so dangerous that the International Standardization Organization (ISO) wants to regulate equipment to reduce the accident rate.

In the United States alone, skiing causes 20,000 accidents every winter. In Switzerland 20,000 accidents cost some \$200 million each year in medical care.

Skiing can kill experts as well as amateurs. French skier Michel Dujon died Dec. 6 when testing new racing skis and Roland Collomb (Switzerland) ended a brilliant career after he suffered severe back injuries in a spectacular fall during the opening of the World Cup season at Val d'Isere.

The ISO plans to establish standards for technical skiing equipment. "It says 'it will concentrate where safety bindings are mounted on, permissible vibration and ski strength."

These technical standards will vary depending on the size, fitness, weight and experience of the individual skier.

A lot of progress has been made in recent years in the design of skis, bindings and boots, the ISO says.

In Switzerland the accident rate has dropped from one accident in 1000 descents in 1960 to one in 6000 in 1966. This improvement is due to better equipment, better preparation of slopes and fewer adult beginners — more people learn to ski earlier.

Dr. Eugene Bahnluk, professor at Case Western University in Cleveland, Ohio, says that "serious injuries, such as bone fractures, which the energy dissipated within the body of the falling skier, is something close to being hit with a bullet."

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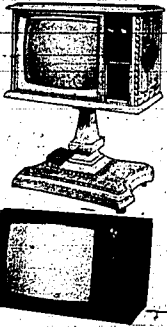
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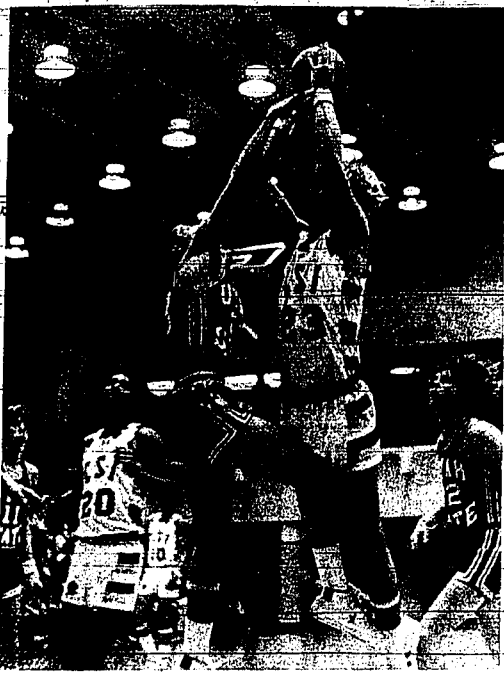

AL approves Veeck's bid on second ballot

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (UPI) — "Look for me under the arc lights, boys," Bill Veeck said upon leaving baseball 14 years ago. "I'll be back."

Today Veeck is back — and at the same address as when he left as chief operating officer of the Chicago White Sox in 1961. But the return of the "Burhead Barum" was not without plenty of pitfalls.

Stung by a temporary rebuff, a week ago from the American League owners in his bid to

buy the White Sox and prevent the team from passing to Seattle interests, Veeck arrived at the winter baseball meetings early Wednesday morning confident he could meet the financial demands imposed upon him.

He did, but in the first vote by the AL owners Veeck fell one short of the nine affirmative votes necessary for approval. The vote was 8-3, three against and one abstention. But Veeck was not finished yet.

Detroit Tigers' owner John Fetzer, admittedly no great fan of Veeck's, recognized the petty prejudices involved in the negative vote and made an impassioned plea to his fellow owners to suck up their pride and take Veeck back.

"A lot of soul-searching has gone into this," Fetzer told the owners. "We have left these people (Veeck's group) over a barrel. We let them to go out and do it (get the necessary financing) and they did it. This is no time to be crying

over spilled milk. We have to be men about this. I don't like the idea of letting a guy back in here who's called me a son of a bitch over and over again, but gentlemen, we've got to take another vote."

And so they did, this time voting approval of Veeck by a 10-2 margin — the only dissenters being Charlie Finley of the Oakland A's and Gene Autry of the California Angels.

"I don't really care about the first round vote," he elated

Veeck said after AL president Lee MacPhail officially announced the league approval. "All I care is how it turned out. It's not often that a 61-year-old, one-legged man gets a new start in life."

Although Veeck's success eliminated the problem of the near bankrupt White Sox, by no means ends the American League's woes. Still pending is a lawsuit from Seattle civic officials who were deserted by the AL in 1969 when the Pilots moved to Milwaukee.

"That's our next problem," said MacPhail.

Reports already were circulating that the AL would try to fend off the Seattle suit by shifting either the Minnesota Twins or Finley's A's to that northwest city.

Meanwhile, National League owners were wrestling with the dilemma of the financially strapped San Francisco Giants. The NL owners were expected to take over the club from owner Horace Stoneham today and operate it until new owners can be found.

"We can operate it indefinitely," said Los Angeles Dodgers' board chairman Walter O'Malley. He didn't mean the Dodgers could, but the National League.

At Wednesday's session, NL officials voted unanimously to alter the playoff system to a best four-of-seven basis instead of the present best-five. That change will be implemented next fall if the AL goes along with it in the joint-session today.

Veeck wasted no time in taking charge. Immediately after his confirmation, he and

his general manager, Roland Hemond, swung the first major player deal of the winter meetings, sending 20-game winner Jim Kaat and Minor League shortstop Mike Buskey to the Philadelphia Phillies in exchange for outfielder Alan Banister and right-handed pitchers Dick Ruthven and Roy Thomas.

Veeck pronounced his confidence in Hemond as his general manager but was noticeably restrained in support of manager Chuck Tanner, whose contract was negotiated under the previous White Sox owner, John Allyn, and runs through 1978.

"He's the manager and he has a contract," Veeck said tersely, thus fueling speculation that Tanner will be let out next week.

Veeck's group, which is made up of 40 investors, including Hall-of-Famer Hank Greenberg, former St. Louis Browns' owner Bill Devitt and ex-White Sox manager Paul Richards, purchased 10 percent of the Chicago club for \$10 million with Allyn retaining

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Veeck engineers first trade within first hour

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (UPI) — Bill Veeck liked the water just fine, so he jumped right in.

Within the hour after the American League owners approved his purchase of the Chicago White Sox Wednesday night, the club made a five-player deal with the Philadelphia Phillies that included the unloading of veteran left-hander Jim Kaat, a 20-game winner the past two seasons. The White Sox gave up the 37-year-old Kaat — and Minor League shortstop Mike Buskey for three young Phillies — right-handed pitchers Dick Ruthven and Roy Thomas, and infielder-outfielder Alan Banister.

Earlier in the day, another former 20-game winner was involved in a trade as the Texas Rangers got right-hander Bill Singer, from the California Angels for first baseman Jim Spencer and "a substantial sum of cash."

Kaat, who reportedly has been considering retiring, has 235 Major League victories,

more than any other active pitcher. He was 21-11 in 1974 and 20-4 last season. His best of 17 Major League seasons was in 1966 when he was 25-13 for Minnesota.

"We wanted Kaat because we feel he can help us win the Pennant next season," said Phillies manager Danny Ozark. "I'm not worried about any talk about his retiring. He's too good an athlete. After two straight 20-win seasons, he should be retiring for good."

White Sox general manager Roland Hemond said he was sorry to give up Kaat. "But we're on a youth movement and those young players we got will help us move over the long run."

All three of the new White Sox were No. 1 draft choices when they were signed by Philadelphia: Ruthven, 24, had a 17-24 record in two and a half seasons with the Phillies and while Thomas, 22, has yet to make a Major League appearance, he is rated a good prospect.

Banister, 24, won the

Phillies' starting-centerfield job in spring training but was sent back to the minors in early May when the Phils got Garry Maddox from San Francisco.

Singer, 31, was a 20-game winner with Los Angeles in 1969 and with the Angels in 1973. But last season, plagued by back and elbow problems, he was only 7-15 with a 4.88 earned run average.

"We are gambling that Singer will be the comeback player of the year," said Rangers manager Frank Lucchesi.

"We don't want to still in Texas," said California general manager Harry Dalton. "If it turns out he can't pitch next season, we'll have to work something out with the Rangers."

Spencer, a 256 hitter last year, was with the Angels from 1969 until they traded him to Texas in a five-player deal in May 1973.

"Spencer could be traded," said Dalton. "We've already had several offers for him. But

he also could play first base for us next season. His addition gives us greater depth and also opens up an opportunity to put together a package for another trade."

Wednesday's trades brought to the "winter of players" dealt since the annual baseball meetings began here last weekend and 45 since the 1975 season ended.

His "unavailable" for further contact Wednesday night said the Jets refused to comment on the story.

The Jets' now 3-6, fired Charley Winner last month. He was replaced strictly on an interim

basis by offensive coordinator Ken Shipp, who lost his first three games before beating New England 29-28 Sunday.

Parseghian announced he was leaving Notre Dame Dec. 15, 1974, but remained on to coach the Irish to a 13-11 upset of Alabama in the Orange Bowl.

"When I resigned last December I gave myself one full year to decide what I would do and I have programmed myself that I will review the whole thing over the weekend with my wife and I will decide whether I want to reenter the game," the News quoted him as saying. "It's not an interest I will initiate the discussion (with the Jets)."

Parseghian, also reportedly has been offered the head coaching job of the New Orleans Saints, who also fired their head coach — John North — early this season. Personnel director Ernie Hofferle is coaching the club, also on an interim basis.

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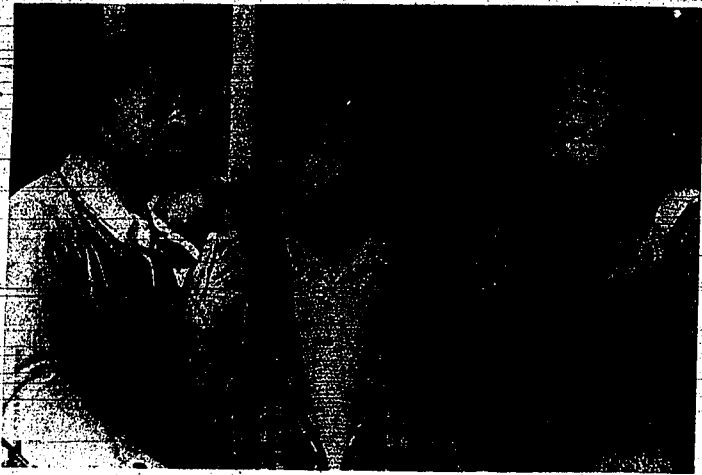

Foreman-Lyle bout signed

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (UPI) — George Foreman hasn't fought a major bout since he lost the heavyweight championship to Muhammad Ali in Zaire, Africa, in October, 1974. Since then he has weathered a state of near depression, fought some exhibition fights that have been roundly criticized and put together a new "fighting family."

What Foreman is trying to say is that he's back in town, wants another shot at Ali and wants to do it in America's

eight-round knockout at the hands of Ali in person.

"I offered him a few suggestions," said Brown. "I told him later on I would work with him and put a program together that would help him win the heavyweight championship back."

Others in Foreman's new camp include manager Gil Clancy and trainer Kid Rapidez, who also trains welterweight Jose Napoles.

"I have a tremendous amount of respect for my new team," said Foreman. "I think

Kid Rapidez and Gil Clancy are the most important ingredients in the picture."

Foreman, boasting a record of 40 wins with 37 KOs and one loss, reigned as world champion for nearly two years before his loss to Ali.

"I went through a little state of almost being depressed," Foreman said. "But then I did something that I had never done before in the profession — I lost a fight. The world loves a winner and I expect to get a lot of kisses, too."

"Africa is in the past. I was

champion before. I believe I can become champion again. All is a tremendous athletic and a tremendous fighter."

"I feel I lost the fight and the only way I'll become champion again is by getting into the ring and beating the world champion at the time. History will look at my loss (Zaire fight) as a whole and look at it fair and square. So why should I be different than history?"

Lyle, 34, of Denver, was champion by Ali last May 16 in 11th round TKO in Las Vegas.

"I think that 1976 is going to be the year of George Foreman," the 27-year-old baby-faced former champion said Wednesday. "I think with the bicentennial coming up, it's going to mean a lot to me. I feel I have a lot to do with the image of the United States and the image of young people, and if I can lose the title one year and win back in 1976 — it will inspire George Foreman Jr. a lot of other things."

Foreman's confident giggle sounds almost like a direct reference to his days as an amateur boxer on the U.S. Olympic team at the 1968 games at Mexico City. During those turbulent days of racial strife in America, a couple of Black track athletes refused to honor the American flag when they were awarded medals at the games, and instead hoisted Black power salutes.

Foreman recited bitterly and when his turn came to win, the gold medal for boxing, he raised a small American flag in a personal show of patriotism.

Foreman's attempted comeback as a pro comes Jan. 24 at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas, Nev., when he will meet No. 5 ranked heavyweight Ron Lyle in a 12-round bout on national television.

Both fighters have been victims of Ali and both regard victory as a must in their hopes for a rematch.

Foreman's new boxing family includes former pro football star and actor Jim Brown as his advisor. Brown said he witnessed Foreman's

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Indiana girls for invasion by Irish

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (UPI) — Coach Bobby Knight of No. 1-ranked Indiana serves notice his Hoosiers will have their guard up when eighth-ranked Notre Dame comes to town for Thursday night's top college basketball game in the nation.

All-America Scott May and his teammates remember well: just two years ago the Irish dealt Indiana one of two losses in the 48 games played over four years in Assembly Hall.

"Notre Dame is a good blend of experienced and young players," Knight warned. "They play well together in a number of different combinations. They play smart basketball."

Knight planned to stay with the same lineup that overwhelmed NCAA champion UCLA in the season opener and Florida State Monday night — 6-foot-11 junior Kent Benson in the pivot, 6-foot-7 May and Tom Abernethy at forward, and floor general Quinn Buckner and Bobby Wilkerson at guard.

All-America Adrian Danley, also a junior and last year the nation's No. 2 scorer, will lead the Irish. Notre Dame beat Kansas Monday night, 72-64, in its first road test for a 40 season record.

Irish Coach Digger Phelps expects a tough game.

"It's another tough game on a schedule that includes Kansas and UCLA on the road," he said. "Indiana is No. 1, of course, and they're awesome. It will do us good to play against that type of opposition."

We're got to mature, and you mature quick against a team like Indiana."

Both teams employ pressure defenses, mostly full-court.

Knight, a basketball perfectionist who preaches defense day and night, said Indiana has worked hard on defense "and will continue to do so."

"There are some things we have to do better, but I think we're progressing in that direction," he said. "I thought Benson's defense against Florida State was the best he has played thus far."

Benson will be opposed by 6-foot-9 Dave Batton and Phelps indicated his 6-foot-11 freshman prospect, Bill Lamberger, may also be considerable action.

Even more interesting will be whether the sticky Indiana defense will force Notre Dame to shoot from long range or whether the Irish have enough finesse to penetrate toward the basket, with Danley providing the scoring punch.

Women's golf tour said torn into factions by lesbianism

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The women touring golf pros are divided into two warring factions of lesbians and non-lesbians as the feud centers on the financial cost of the sport's homosexual image, the Washington Star said Wednesday.

In the second of a four-part series, Star sports writer Lynn Rossell wrote that members of the Ladies Professional Golf Association acknowledged that

the number of lesbians in the tour group "is well above the national average of 5 percent and includes some of the country's top women golfers."

"Several golfers," she reported, "said they have been told bluntly by tournament sponsors that the reason their prize money or renew tournaments is because the sport appears to be dominated by lesbians."

The article said "the straights criticized the lesbians' dress, mannerism and speech and they have urged them to adopt a straight lifestyle 'for the sake of everybody.'"

"The lesbians in turn said they resent having their sexual preferences criticized and being told how to live their lives."

The article quoted golfer Carol Mann, identified as non-lesbian, as saying: "It's been a cold war basically. The straights try to put down that lesbian image. They are afraid it hurts women's golf."

An unidentified golfer, described as "gay," told the Star: "We get blamed for everything. If the sponsors don't make enough publicity and then the gate isn't enough, they blame us."

According to the Star, Mann commented: "A lot of people whose clubs you go to—these people are the upper middle class and they don't go for this. They don't want to see stuff like that. It's not part of their lives and they won't accept it. And since it's their private club, they don't have to."

LPGA chief decries 'cheap shot' story

NEW YORK (UPI) — A Washington Star story which claims the touring women golf pros are divided into two warring factions of lesbians and non-lesbians is a cheap shot that hurts not only golf but the entire sporting scene, according to the executive director of the Ladies Professional Golf Association.

"I am bothered by these stereotyped statements," said Ray Volpe, who replaced Bud Erickson as head of the LPGA five months ago. "As a kid I was told 25 per cent of all Italians were involved in the Mafia. It bothered me. The same can be said about Jews, blacks and any minority group."

"Now it's vogue to talk about homosexuality," he added. "Sensationalism like this will pass, like all the other popular stereotypes have passed. What hurts is that a cheap shot like this will help the sports industry. It will hurt the supporters and fans of the sport."

Volpe said national averages, such as the five per cent lesbian figure the Star cited, are a "joke" because no true number can ever be developed.

"To charge that homosexuals will be more prevalent in sports is based on the logic that there are all males in male sports and all female in female sports," Volpe said. "But is that true of boarding schools, the military, day camps and the like?"

"Women's sports are prone to have more homosexuals because of the male chauvinist pig theory that 'little girls don't play sports, little boys do.'"

Volpe also denied that sponsors have cancelled tournaments because of a belief in a high lesbian rate.

"No sponsor has ever talked about homosexuality, even in private rooms, and gave it as a reason for cancellation," he said. "The LPGA tour will reach its biggest purses and will have its best year ever this year. The schedule has not been released yet, but I guarantee it."
