### Rioting erupts in Belfast

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Rioting crupted in Roman Catholic areas of Belfast today in a second day of violent reaction to the death of Irish Republican Army hunger-striker-

Trank Stage.

With the death foll at three since Stagg died Thursday, mobs of rampaging youths hijacked cars, barricaded streets, set fires and attacked one police pairol. Police warned motorists to stay away.

A Protestant gospel hall was set ablaze and destroyed as rioters stoned firemen in the Ardoyne district, one of the Catholic areas where support for Stagg, 34, was highest.

—The renewed violence came as British-officials met to decide how to counter if. They were reportedly concerned at how the IRA could mount such wideapread and simultaneous violence.

### Onake hits Manila

MANILA, The Philliplines (UPI) — A moderately strong earthquake struck the Manila area today, causing no apparent casualties or damage but creating mild panie in a movie theater showing the Hollywood film "Earthquake."

Some frightened office-workers fied into the streets when the quake hit but later returned to their offices. Fillipino geophysicists gaid the quake measured 5 on the Rossi-Forel scale of 9. It was felt as far away as the mountain resort city of Baguio, 160 miles north of Manila.

# Ford vetoes work measure

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Ford loday vetoed a 562 billion public works bill designed to create 600,000 jobs, claiming the measure amounts to an election year pork

The bill "has so many deficiencies and un-desirable provisions that it would do more harm than good," Ford sald in his veto message to

Congress.

Democratic—congressional—leaders—havepromised to make a strong attempt to override
Ford's action and a House vote has tentatively
been scheduled for Thursday. House
Democratic Leader Thomas P. O'Nelli
predicted earlier this week Ford's veto would be

Ford said he recognized "there is mert in the ragument that some areas of the country are suffering from exceptionally high rates of unemployment and that the federal government should provide assistance."

Ford said "the best and most effective way to create new jobs is to pursue balanced economic policies that encourage the growth of the private sector without risking a new round of inflation."

The President said his proposed economic policies are expected to generate up to 2.5 million new private sector jobs in 1787 and two million additional jobs in 1977. "These will be lasting—productive—jobs, not temporary-jobs—payrolled by the American taxpayer." lasting productive jobs, not tempor payrolled by the American taxpayer.



### **Collective bargaining** could help negotiations

Idaho school districts soon will begin the yearly scuffle over teacher contracts. Early indications suggest the negotiations will be a long tedious affair.

affair.

Armed with damning statistics which show Idaho teachers still get paid less than teachers in other western states, the Idaho Education Association has sounded a warning that teachers have not ruled out the possibility of a strike if the 1976-77 contracts aren't to their liking. Last spring and summer most school districts in Idaho sparred for months with teachers over contracts. Teacher strikes were threatened in most major cities including Idaho Falls, Pocatello and Meridian. Teachers in Oneida County went on strike last fall after months of negotiations ended

strike last fall after months of negotiations ended

istrike last fall after months of negotiations ended in a stalemate.

While salaries promise to be a major point of negotiation this year, a more fundamental road-block during this year's negotiations involves the actual form the negotiations take. In past years the talks between feachers and school trustees often have been held in secret, with neither side knowing exactly what the ground rules are for contract talks.

Contract talks.

Because the boundaries of the teacher negatifitions are so furzy, the talks in past-years often have bogged down on issues which actually have no bearing on the final contracts.

When these non-essential points of debate drag on and on, as they did in last year's Oneida County negotiations, both teachers and school trustees grow increasingly hostile on points that actually aren't worth a debate.

The bitter teacher's strike in Malad came after the school district-spent seven months haggling over the superficial aspects of the dispute. By the time teachers finally got around to asking for a wage hike and better conditions in the Malad schools, the two sides in the debate were so mad that they couldn't negotiate reasonably.

schools, the two sides in the denate were so that that they couldn't negotiate reasonably. Similar procedural problems over teacher negotiations have appeared in Magic Valley. Blatine County school trustees this year are facing as list of 43 points, which the toachers, want Braine county some trustees this year are rating as list of 48 points which the leachers want negotiated. Other districts are getting worked up over-whether-to conduct teacher negotiations in public orbehind closed doors.

As a result of these side issues, the real questions of teacher salaries and teacher rights won't get much attention in the early going of this year's dishoter.

Idaho needs to change the laws which govern

idaho needs to change the laws which govern teacher negotiations.

The most logical way to help both teachers and administrators negotiate would be implementation of a collective bargaining law for teachers.

Collective bargaining would set down standard procedures for the negotiations. Limiting the topics which can be discussed at the yearly contract meetings, and the legal rights of both sides would be spelled out.

Collective bargaining would mean that teachers would have the right to strike but only after a well-defined negotiating process-had been com-

would have the right to strike but only after a well-defined negotiating process had been completed and an impasse was clearly defined.

"Teachers and administrators would benefit from collective bargaining. Both sides would know what was required during the contract negotiations. While the legality of a teacher-strike would be established, the possibilities of a strike developing over a non-essential issue would be reduced.

Idaho's legislators have turned down a statewide-collective-bargaining-bill-for-all-state-employes, including teachers. But the Idaho Education Association plans to introduce another collective bargaining bill for teachers next week. To help avoid more bitter contract negotiations in Idaho, the revised collective bargaining bill should be endorsed and approved.



These alleged iliegal payments, were covered up, through "false entries," in the backe met econder learners. books and records of Boeing and its affiliates, the SEC said.

### NY deficit may exceed \$1 billion

NEW YORK (UP) — The exact amount of New York City's defleit may exceed at billion, at figure that could threw askew current plans to put-the financially shake city on sound economic footing.

Mayor Abratam Beame and Isscal experts spend the Lincoln's birthday holiday Thirsday trying to determine how much the city's fiscal condition had deteriorated since last fail when the original deflect restimate was formulated.

Sources said the new deficit figure was expected to surpass previous assumptions by about \$300 million and may reach \$1.024 billion.

The Mayor planned to brief the City Council leadership and Board of Estimate on the deficit situation today before the formal meeting of the Emergency Financial Control Board, which was created but year by the state\_to oversee New York's financial falling.

financial affairs.

The board is in the process of reviewing the city's financial state with the Idea of mapping out a new fiscal plan. In addition to the deficit calculations, Beame was expected to present the board details of his proposed cutbacks on capital projects

already under way.

Since October the city has operated on the assumption that its defect—the amount by which expenses exceeded revenues—was \$724 million, The official plan to balance the city budget within three years was predicted on that assumption.

But Beam disclosed last month that revenues had fallen short-of-his-expectations-and-such-expenses-us-welfare-and-Medicali had increased faster than anticipated. He said then that the 5724 million figure was no longer a valid measuring stick of the city's

fiscal ills.

A new estimated deficit of more than \$1 billion would mean even more severe city budget cuts in the remaining two fiscal years of the three-year plan, which already cults for spending cuts of \$200 million in each of the next two fiscal years.

Beame has estimated that the city could lose \$100 million is year if President Ford's proposed budget is adopted and another \$20.5 million if Gov. Hugh L. Carey's state budget becomes law.





In contrast, some mainline denominations, notably the Episcopal Church and the United Church of Christ, have experienced an oversupply of ministers in recent years. Not long ago, national leaders of the Episcopal Church announced the denomination was hiring a secular employment agency to help elergymen find secular jobs.

Also affected, but less actuely, have been such demoninations as the Lutheran Church in America, the United Methodst and the United Presbyterian Church whose memberships have been declining for the last several years. Despite the downward trend in membership, these demoninations have attracted reasonably large numbers of seminary students. Some seminary and demoninational placement difficults believe the tight job market may ease up in a few years when a higher percentage of active clergy will reach retirement ages. Those: who regard the luture of maintime churches, more pessinistically, however, believe the opportunities for the membership, how foreshadgowed in low church school enrollments and the inroads of secularism. As a result of the denominational and regional variations, it is hard to draw broad generalizations from present data.

Dear Dr. Thosteson:

Is there anything I can do to prevent illness at high altitude? I lived at over 5,000 fest for 19 years, and then moved to 2,000, where I have been for 20 years. Now, when I return to visit I become ill or about the second day.

I do not have a heart problem that 'I am aware of. I get checkups', awould like very much to be able to visit at a fastitude for a few days at a time, but I become, slek to my stomach and lose cobine of the become veak.—Mrs. D.S. Some persons take more time to adjust to high altitudes than do others. Symptoms of hypoxia (mountain sickness) become more noticeable (in those prenet of ti at about 5,000 feet.
You say you lived at the high altitude for years without any effect. Persons can adapt to it. It has been shown that those living long periods at high altitudes have a greater number of red blood cells, which are needed to capture as much oxygen out of the oxygen poor air as possible. However, you are older now, and age has a way of making us a little less efficient in matters such as breathing.

### Altitude problems



As you ascend there is the correspondingly increased need for more of the red corpuseles. If you are a bit anomic, there would be fewer of them of begin with and the adjustment would be that much more diffuelt. Too, if you have any of egree of employed in the loss of lung efficiency would add to your woes. Your heart and lungs might get a good rating at 2,000 feet, but the symptoms at 5,000 might indicate a problem.

What can you do about it? Not much except perhaps to experiment with your travel luning..! If it is at all practical, you could try taking an extra day to make the ascend, stopping part way along the ascending route. There is no medication or quick answer. You would be wiss to have a blood count to determine if you have become a bit anemic over the past 20 years or to see if any of the other factors are at work.

Dear Dr. Thosteson:
My daughter, age Si, has severe pain coming down her right leg; Her doctor told her the nerve endings are inflamed. She can't take vitamin B because she has diabeted.

What causes nerve endings to become inflamed, and what do you suggest be dono?—Mrs. A. M.—
Diabetic neuritis is another seen complication of that disease. It could affect the scialte nerve as well as others. Vitamin B is an accepted treatment for this and I cannot tell from your letter why this treatment would not be available to your daughter. Are you assuming this or has your daughter's physician told her?

It is also possible that this nerve problem is unrelated to her diabetes. Since she reports only the local symptom, one might appear a localized cause. The right leg involvement suggests change to the scialte nerve roots as they emerge from the spine. This would not be related to diabetes, but to such factors as bone changes in the lower spine. An X-ray would establish the

### Cook calls for salmon 'fish in'

SALMON, Idaho (UP1) — A Salmon city councilman has disclosed plans for a "lish-in" by Salmon area fishermen downriver from Salmon this spring to test the laws controlling the taking of anadromous fish.

Jack Cook said the fishermen in Idaho "feel like we're being discriminated against when it comes to equal fishing rights. What are they, what do they

All of a sudden a judge in Washington rules that the Indians can catch or net 50 per cent of the runs of salmon or steelhead no matter what state they belong to. This was confirmed by the U. S. Supreme Court recently.

"We all know the dams are at fault and we think everyone is working toward a solution but can this be done with the Indian fishery in the Columbia?"

"All concerned are U. S. taxpayers, state taxpayers and property taxpayers. But do we have any equal rights? You can see now why the people of Idaho are mad and are going to see if they have any equal rights as U. S. citizens."

He said the fishermen have come to the conclusion that the three states involved in the anadromous fisheries — Washington, Oregon and Idaho — "have never agreed to anything when it comes to the fish runs."

Cook said the fishery in the Columbia River system should be turned over to federal control and "then maybe everyone would be treated equally."

"We are going to push strongly for this federal control in Salmon."

"We all know what the dams have done to salmon and steelhead, and it is very critical, but with all the decisions about Indian fishing above Bonneville Dam it is still more critical."

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#### Players say SF fans must prove support

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The Glants baseball franchise may still be in San Francisco, but as far as the players are concerned the town still has to prove it can support them.
