

The tests were conducted at Sandla Laboratories in Albuquerque, N.M., as an outgrowth of the electrical cable fire that crippled the Browns Ferry nuclear plant Alabama in 1975. The Browns Ferry fire was one of the worst accidents in the history of the U.S. nuclear power program.

"We learned at Browns Ferry the direct condestry electrical cables that don't most current clearer if the protection standards." Pollard said in a statement. "What we learn from recent tests is that fire can also destroy cables that do meet current standards."

"As for amenities such as good food, entertainment and aesthetic pleasures, early hunters and plant collectors enjoyed luxuries that only the richest of today's Americans can afford."

And in the Stone Age, he says, everyone enjoyed a high-protein, low-starch diet, and the meat wasn't

for more field trips than office work. He continued
in the University's graduate school, presented a

profession, which in layman's language means that
cultures assume their characteristic forms in
response to available resources.
Thus the Stone Age people enjoyed a good life in
sparsely populated world of overflowing resources.
Looking at today's world, Harris agrees that

#### Drying up Snake River shouldn't be a goal

Two Twin Falls County legislators. Rep. Tom Stivers and Rep. Ralph Olmstead, have suggested the Bureau of Reclamation stop the Snake River from flowing past the American Falls Dam.
Their intentions aren't sinister. Stivers and Olmstead think the threat of another dry year in southern Idaho endangers the economy of Magic Valley and no water should be allowed to flow downstream which could be held back for irrigation next spring.
Such action by men, even legislators, shouldn't be endorsed automatically by farmers in Magic Valley, the Idaho Department of Water Resources. or the Bureau of Reclamation.
"Rep. Olmstead claims closing the American Falls dam gates now could save enough water this whiter-to-irrigate 20,000 acress next spring.
But the action could have some other, negative effects:

Dut the action could have some other, negative effects:

— fish and wildlife in a 50-mile stretch of the Shake River could be decimated by closing off all the river's flow.

— potato processing plants dumping waste into the river could severely pollute water for miles downstream, stinking up the Shake River canyon from Burley to Hagerman in the process.

In time, the fish could be replanted and the sewage flushed downstream might disperse. The river- probably could be brought back to a relatively stable flow.

But who is to say that drying up the river now might be a harbinger of even more frequent stoppages in future years?



# Sheriff's patrols: where are they?

We would like to bring a matter of urgent importance to the attention of all the rural residents of the West End of Twin Fallor. County-Circumstances have just-brought the facts to our attention and those with whom we have spoken were likewise unaware of the problem.

unaware of the problem.

Of the seventeen patrolling officers employed by the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office, only two are assigned to the West End. These officers work six days on and two day soff. For two days, we have two officers on eight hour shift, or coverage from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. After 2:00 a.m. there is only ONE officer on patrol for the entire county and the Buhl officer who went off duty at 2:00 a.m. is considered on call for the West End and is called out of bed in event of a problem. For the next two days, there is only one man on duty for eight hours and the remainder of the day and hight, there is no one-on-duty-in-the-West-End-when one officer green yn avention. Jie other-officer Linaddition. To serving his own shift, is on 24-hour call and must be by a telephone always.

to serving his own stiff, is on 24-hour call and must be by a telephone always.

The West End offigers are not compensated for their very very long hours. The Buhl police have been told by the Sheriff's Office to refer calls to Twin Falls and not to leave the etly limits except in extreme emergencies.

We in the West End pay identical taxes to the Sheriff's Office as the rest of the county and yet we are more often without one patrolling officer than with one. The West Enders are paying for what we do not get and the West End of officers do not get paid for what we do not get and the West End of Inflexed to AT LEAST one car on duty in the West End 24 hours a day. We actually should have twee aren of utilized to a day for the size of territory they are expected to cover.

We call for a more equitable distribution of manpower,

We call for a more equitable distribution of manpower, resulting in an IMMEDIATE increase of patrolling officers in the West End. There are enough officers of futury at any one-time to schedule at east one in the West End for signatures of other people who are as upset as we are over this situation and hope that Sheriff Corder and the County Commissioners will help correct this problem:

Upon death, Dr. Proctor wanted his brain donated for Parkinson's Disease research at UCLA. The coroner agreed to 'make dirangements.

On the evening of August 16th, Sibbett and Dr. Proctor watched a final sunset logether, enjoyed a good meal and said good-night. Dr. Proctor went upstairs and swallowed a lethal dose of Seconal.

No autopsy was performed after his death, because suicide is not considered a crime in Pennsylvania. Proctor's brain went to UCLA, his remains were cremated and scattered over the Sawtooth Mountains earlier this fail.

Yet 'Dr. Proctor's death did not end without questions.

On a chilly November night last week, 'Mrs. Proctor talked about the final, haund, ting questions she cannot answer about her tusband's planned death, 'Was it best for him or his family.' "He still had so much to give, 'she said." "He was wrong when he thought he was noner use for longer useful to his family 'n a way 'I feel.





# Spaceship suspect

MOSCOW (UP1) — A powerful and mysterious explosion that shook Siberia nearly 70 years ago — and was recorded as far away as Washington — may have been the crash of a spaceship from another world, a leading Soviet physicist says.

Scientist Alexel Zolotov tofd-the Moscow magazine Turtst. that, the Tungus explosion, of 1908 cannot be definitely identified as a meteorite or comet. "It cannot be excluded that the Tungus meteorite was an artificial body from other worlds of the universe," the magazine said.

Zolotov said the explosion was accompanied by nuclear reactions, which are reflected in the radioactivity of tree ring growth of that year. Soviet scientists have puzzled for deedes over the true origin of the Tungus explosion in central Siberia on the morning of June 29, 1909.

Theories have ranged from an earth collision with a meteorite or comet to the crash of a visiting spaceship or a collision with a black hole. A black hole is a giant start that has collopsed into a pippoint of almost infinite density and its gravity-is so intense that no light can scape.

What is known is that the sound of the explosion was heard over 740 miles away and the earth shuddered so violently that horses pulling plows 210 miles away were knocked to the ground.

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

Henry Harmon Spalding recognized the great buffalo herds were dwindling so he planted polatoes at Lapwal to give the Nez Perce Indians an alternate source of food. Later, certiv-day settlers planted atternate source of food. Later, early-day settlers planted tubers and sold them to

Traditionally, most farmers will gamble half their crop on

the open market and contract half. Some, and this is a point hotly in dispute in Idaho, play the futures market where one natures market where potatoes are contracted for sale at a specific price at a later date.

"A successful potato farmer now almost has to have a broker to conduct his business," said G.H. Chambers, fleid editor of the Idaho Farmer-Stockman magazine.

Advertising and the growth of potato processing have done much to boost the national consumption of spuds.

One of the big processors, J. R. Simplot of Boise, is a farmer turned industrialist whose personal wealth is estimated at \$500 million to \$600 million. Under a government-subsidy

at \$500 million to \$600 million. Under-a government-subsidy-he developed-a deyndration-process during World War II. Kids gave the industry a big push when they fell in love with french Irles. 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

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# Ruling creates jail dilemma

MAGIC VALLEY — A Canyon County court ruling implying Juveniles charged with crimes cannot be held in a county jail could change the detention procedures used in Mugic Valley Jails.

Third District Judge Jim Doolittle Thursday held

Third District Judge Jim Dooititle Thursday held that Iddalo law requires juventles awaiting hearings must be detained in a 'home-type atmosphere' râther than a jail atmosphere. Canyon County deputy prosecuting attorney Dennis Goff sald Friday: that Doolittle ruled separate facilities within county, jails for the detention of juveniles do not salisfy the law. Most Magic Valley counties presently detain juveniles in areas which are separate from adult facilities, but which are still within the county jail. "We have separate facilities within our county jail." (we have separate facilities within our county jail, and not a home."

The statute in question, 16-1812 of the idaho Code, reads in part: "The county commission shall provide a detention of children to be conducted by the court.

The county commission may arrange for private homes for detention of subject to court approval, or may arrange with any institution or agency to receive far temporary care and custody children

under the temporary jurisdiction of the court."
Doolittle said his decision could have an effect on other detention procedures in the state because only a handful of counties have the kind of juvenile home required by law for detailing youths awailing hearings on charges against them.
Twin Palls County Sheriff Paul Corder pointed out that Juveniles are jailed only at the direction of magistrates, but he said some juveniles are detained to the concentration of the Tables County, tall "We

that Juveniles are Jailed only at the direction of imagistrates, but he said some juveniles are detained in a separate area of the Twih Falls County Jail. "We don't hold juveniles very long here, but it is all controlled by the courts," he said.

Blaine County Jais holds juveniles in a separate area of the county jail. Sheriff Orville Drexter said the ruiling, if accepted as a state-wide-standard, would mean "more tax obliars."

He said often juveniles can be placed, by a magistrate, in foster homes while they away in the preliminary hearings or arraignment. But some juveniles need more "security precautions" than a foster home could provide.

Bill Crystal, undersheriff in Cassia County, agreed that It would be an expensive proposition if the law required separate juvenile detention, facilities to provide the home-type almosphere.

"If we were forced to do something else it would require us to build another portion of a jail and man

Cassia County also presently holds Juveniles in a separate section of the county Jail.

The three-day convention was highlighted by the presence of national PTA health and welfare chairmant Madelyn Wills, former Louislana State PTA president and a member of the national PTA hoard since 1971.

Wills spoke Priday on the need for aggressive action in educational issues, particularly in the area of school finance. She also participated in a panel on television violence which drew response from audience members who wanted to see violence curbed.

Friday's discussion of TV violence—provoked many of the 180 participants to call for a lessening of boating, battering and killing in television shows.

"I hate to think the networks can't come up with something decent," one-participant and indignantly.

Panel moderator Berniece Ricks told the gathering the PTA had no objection to

"realistic violence" such as that depicted in the recent "Roots" series, which was based on 'listorical evidence, "but when they (children) see maybe 16 murders pernight, when they'll probably never see a murder-in their life; maybe that would

murder in their life, maybe that would-cause them to read about one and to say. 'Well, that desart amount to much.'
Panel participants also outlined a pilot project. in. Rexburg. which. is. part. of. a, national PTA effort to collect response from parents, teachers and the public on those programs they find objectfortable and the changes they would like to see-made.

National board member Wills said after
the session the PTA had no current in the session the PTA had no current in-tention of boyeoting programs or their sponsors. She said no action would be taken until the results of the national PTA-pôll had been analyzed.

If networks were then asked to make changes and declined to do so, the PTA might take action, size said.

"If we can't-see some results then we may have to determine what to da—it has, never been the intent to boyeott."

State PTA president Mary Amende, Albion, said she thought networks had

"followed the line of least-resistance, and no one ever bothered to let them know what they thought."

She said programs depending on violence to attract viewers might be less-repensive "liam" other "sorts or or-tertainment to produce.

We're not saying no TV," Amende added, "there's a lot of good hat can come from t vishous."

Turning to the question of school-finance, Wills said school districts all over, the country would have to find-more money.

"Parents are going to have to face up to the fact that they'll have to put more money in the schools to have a good education." she said.

She said the schools had taken on too many functions once left-to parents and 'families,' such 'as discipline and the teaching of social behavior.

"We've just left the schools to do so many things," she said. "It think they're spread a bit thin."

She said many states face problems of inequities of funds in their vargust districts, such as the disparities in foliou districts, She said in her opinion, however,

organised for a countrywide effort at funding equalization.

Amende said an Idaho PTA declaration to pursue legal action forcing equalization in Idaho schools had been placed "in Ilmbo" until-state studes on the problem, are completed. "When we get those results, we'll do something," Amende, said. "We're. on record as (favoring) filing suit."

Still, the Times-News feels clubs often sponsor newsworthy events and have fund-raising-efforts which need to be reported.

So, the Times-News policy on reporting of club news is this:

— individual-speakers-who-offer-comments-on subjects of general interest may be developed into news stories at the discretion of the Times-News. Club presidents or publicity chairmen should contact the newspaper about these speakers in advance.

— Membership drives open to the public can be developed into small news stories.

Public service computens to educate the public on particular issues can be developed into news stories.

These guidelines will give renders the most interesting news from clubs and will not burden them with routine news which they may find uninteresting.



F. night temperature, you will get buds regardless of day length, or (2) At 69-65 degs. F. night temperature, flower buds will NOT form unless the plant gets 13 hours of aboutle darkness.

(3) Crab cactus buds seldom form at night temperatures

(3) Crab-cactus buds seldom-form at night temperatures above 70 degs. F. You can readily see that Christmas cactuses don't like a warm room temperature at hight and they need total darkness (nights only, from 8) m, to 8 m, next day). Do no keep the plant in the dark during the day!

We don't know why a crab cactus will bloom at Thanksgiving and again for Easter, but it does often. Flower buds of the Easter cactus will develop more slowly and bloom about midwinter. Failure to flower is due to too high a night temperature, roo long ad drop, a common complaint, is from too much water, too little water or exposure to edd drafts. Water these items once a week. Too much water causes shriveling of stems. CAN YOU BEATTHIS?

CATS AND HOUSE PLANTS

How do you keep cats from digging up house plant soil? One method consists of putting a circular protective wire mesh screen over the soil.

What's more difficult is preventing cals from eating leaves of spider plants (which cats are fond of), day plants and others. Some readers get good results by spraying some hat peoper on the leaves, make sure kids can't get near it.

Some people keep a loaded squirt gun on hand to keep cuts from nibbling on plants. There are commercial products available that work for a short time, but some may burn the plant.

WHITE FLIES ON HOUSE PLANTS

White files ("flying dandruf!) live mainly on the underside of leaves of plants and are often carried inside your home to inface other plants. They can multiply fast and often occur in large numbers, When disturbed, the adults flutter through the air like bits of ashes or tiny snowflakes.

Immature whitefly are oval, flattened and completely covered with a waxy coat of armor that gives them the appearance of tiny scales. White fly damages plants by sucking out Julces, causing leaves to have poor color and to drop.

The insects remove more julce than they can digest, excreting the excess as honeydew. This sickly substance attracts a black, sooty fungus that sursightly.

Control: Many spiders, ladybugs and other predators feed on

sooty langus that's unsightly.

Control: Many spiders, ladybugs and other predators feed on white fly but cannot be depended on to control an infestation.

A spray of detergient water (I leaspoon to 2 qls. will kill off many adults and immuture stages. They're attracted by yellow so try putting some fly paper on yellow cards and keep near your plants.

We're testing a material called Tack Trap on yellow cards and will give details about it shortly.

Quite often the dressing applied does more harm than good because, some break away from the wood, leaving a space for lissects, fung and bacteria to work on.

In most cases tree wounds will become closed by a natural-callusus, without any aid. Of course, that doesn't mean the tree healed coimpletely, because decay may have started and may its continue to grow into the sapwood and heartwood.

If you'll notice, apple growers who prune off huge limbs and small ones do not treat the wound. Exposure to air seems to favor callusing and they let it go at that.

Dr. A. L. Shigo of the USDA Forest Service and Dr. Cr. L. 
Wilson of Ohio Agricultural Research Center made a deep study of wound dressings. Their tests included more than 400 wounds deliberately made on shade trees, and after five years found that the wound dressing had no effect on the rate of healing, and the dressing failed to prevent infection by wood decay fungl. (The least decay occurred in hie-intricated wounds. These two men concluded that their tests: "point out the failacy that dressing protect against wood-inhabiting microorganisms."

Contemporary mission questionable

WESTPORT, Conn. —
(NEA) — The Contemporary Mission is not a garden variety religious services, it welcomes few sinners, it does not travel byways of despair searching for the weebegone flock. What's more, the mission, and the six Catholic priests who run it. are not recognized by their church.

For all of it, however, Contemporary Mission has at least one faithful believer: the Internal Revenue Service. Though even its operators admit C.M. is little more than a secular-oriented mail. order business (records, jewelry, etc), the LRS. says it's a charity and has granted\_it\_tax\_exemption status here since 1971.

Charity? Westport residents believe C.M.'s kind of charity begins at home. The mission is housed in a \$300,000 private residence alongside Long Island Sound. The place has a gate house, a boulevard-type driveway. and a \$15,000 cruiser moored at its dock: there are also three swanky cars about, one a \$17,000 Mer cedes coupe.

In all, observers believe C.M. and its priests are worth-more than half a million dollars, not a cent of it taxable. Besides tax exemption, C.M. is given a eral discount on its mail order postage, the priests do not pay sales tax on

and the operation is ex-'cluded from all state and community levees.

Not bad for a group whose religious motivation has included the postal peddling of a "weight reduction" liquid. C.M. also sells pendants, health books, and rock music through the mails. Then too, the mission has a tax exempt subsidiary, "Tax Research Center," same address, that hawks a citizen's guide to

"guaranteed" tax reduction Clearly, C.M. has some competence in the latter promotion. But for its own

tax matters, little com-petence is needed, I.R.S. code 501-C3 generously allows tax exemption to any religious or charitable organization operating on a non-prof. . basis. There are perhap 750,000 of these organizations existing in America today

Membership in the tax exempt club is not hard to come by. An I.R.S. officer in Washington, Charles Rumph, says that dozens of charity groups form every week in the U.S. are by law "automatically tax exempt," Rumph says groups must file for some occial privileges, but tax Exemption itself does not require any application.

Given this easy access to

tax exemption, Rumph concedes that frauds can be perpetrated. At least some tax free institutions are profit-making rackets. Mail order ministers, for purchased merchandise example, are now claiming. their homes as tax exempt parsonages. One untaxed charity in New York City was recently discovered to be a bordello

Despite the potential for abuse, however, Rumph says the I.R.S. does not vigorously investigate the qualifications of tax exempt charities. He says only occasional audits are held, usually prompted by public complaint; otherwise, particularly as regards religious groups, the separation of church wi<u>se</u>,

and state forbids widespread tax snooping.

So it is that the legitimacy of the Con-temporary Mission has never been federally questioned. Westport's tax collector says he believes a probe should be initiated. Neighbors near the C M mansion say investigation is long overdue. But the community is powerless to act by itself; it must abide by I.R.S. action or inaction.

Meanwhile, C.M. is not entirely in the clear. Acting on complaints from patrons, the Postal Service is keeping an eye on the mission's\_mail\_order procedures. Last year, in fact, postal authorities won a court order barring C.M. fron, selling its "weight reduction" liquid; the post office says the stuff is

bsolutely worthless,
Also, C.M. is receiving fire from financial interests. Two years ago a bank sued to collect a \$10,000 note from the mission. This year an auto company sued for \$7,000 in

rental fees. Four private companies have placed llens on C.M.'s properties for delinquent bills. At one time a sheriff was needed to get C.M. money owed a liquor store.

munity, .too. .Since. the Westport Fairpress published an expose article on C.M. in August, the tax collector says "everybody knows and everybody's mad as hell." Angriest of all, perhaps, are legitimate area priests and ministers say C:M.'s brazen operation gives a black eye to honest charity. #### **Imitation bands have** extensive possibilities

©Chicago Daily News-CHICAGO - Everybody knows about the small army of Elvis imitators touring the boundocks bringing tears to the eyes of the fatural.

But did you know there is an imitation Kiss band called Dressed to Kill playing the suburban rock bars? These imitations mark the beginning of what could become a revolutionary marketing phenomerion

Consider the possibilities: A panel of pop-music sociologists sits in a New York board room to choose rock and roll bands that will satisfy the varying but clearly designated tastes of the mass audience. These artists include the likes of Barry Manilow (pop-schlock), Led Zeppelin (crunch-rock) Fleetwood Mac (adult-

rock). Each act is then provided with a theater where it gives an intensive course in its music to bands selected from an extensive cross country search to fill its

At the conclusion of the study period, these bands are sent back to their respective geographic zones, where they will tour constantly under the logo of their—parent—band( Meanwhile, the former rock stars and present academics -sit-gratefullyback\_at\_home, collecting performing residuals and worrying about what songs to write now that they don't have to go on the road.

This would be the nightmarish ultimate in clone-rock-preprogrammed music for psyched-out tastes. And though this particular scenario is fiction, in the big-buck world of rock and roll, the clone theory is constantly in action.

Foreigner is a classic case in point. Before the band's last Chicago apcarance, I dropped in on Its soundcheck band-leader-guitarist-songwriter Mick Jones worrying about whether the lasers would work.

It-was its first-eve headlining date, which occurred just as its debut album and first hit single, 'Feels Like the First Time, was making waves on the charts.

Lasers on the first top billed date? What was going on here? Nothing more than the careful execution of a battle plan.

Foreigner programmed to succeed Combining two parts Bud Company (surely the most cloned clone-band in existence) with one part Zeppelin, Foreigner was overtly commercial

NEW YORK - (NEA) -In its wildest dreams which in the past have produced the tailfin, the ineffective wrap-around bumper, the gas guzzler, the spongy ride, the fabric-covered "hardtop" and other oddifies of engineering - Detroit's auto industry never envisioned the modern

#### Garbo biography awaits star's death

YORK biography of Greta Garbo by Antoni Gronowicz, "a New York novelist and playwright, will be published by Simon & Schuster - after her death: A clause in the contract

for the book specifies that it is not to appear during her lifetime. "We hope she will live for years and years because she's a wonderful lday," the spokesman for the publishing house observed.

The book is not an autobiography, according to the publisher, although the-title-of-the-book at tempts to leave the impression that it is. It is ambiguously called, "Garbo: A Biography in Her Own Words

While declining to divulge the advance received by Gronowicz, the publisher said it was a substantial" sum. Miss Garbo's participation in the book's proceeds has also not been revealed. Presumably, a share of the royalties would go to her estate after publication. At present, the blography

But don't expect any straight answer from these guys, and if they ever get around to touring again (someday, they promised), don't yell anything at the stage. "I don't know what stage. all these people out in the audience mean by Boogie! Boogie to me still isn't complete without woogle after it," says Becker. "It's strictly a lefthanded affair."

Maybe they should try oogle-Wookle?
