Hiding missiles

is Pentagon's

latest game

WASHINGTON (UP) — Perplexed Pentagon planners, puzzled over how to deal with a force of 5,000 Soviet missile wartends in the 1900s, have devised several schemes, Including a "shell game," to high CUS, strategic weapons from the Russlans.


The "shell game" approach includes hiding each U.S. intercontinental missile in one of as many as 20 holes in the ground, and a plan to move the ICBMs on tracks in 13-mile underground tunnels. But some of the plans could hit snaps during Strategic Arms Limitation Talks. Others that seem acceptable under SALT may not work.

Others that seem acceptable under SALT may not work. Such questions caused President Carter Inst year to put off deciding how to counteract the growing accuracy and numbers of Soviet warheads. By 1982 they will threaten U.S. Minuteman ICBMs, even in their blast-resistant underground sibs. The Soviets are expected to have around 6,000 warheads in the mid-1980s. A decision is now set for October, but defense sources say a final choice still may not be nossible then.

U.S. military planners say there's little likelihood such nuclear weapons as nuclear-armed ICBMs, with their power to wreak unimaginable destruction would ever be used. Their very existence is supposed to be a deterrent to war, but to do that the warheads themselves must be able to survive an attack without warning.

All the schemes now being considered would do that by using 'mobile' or moveable bases for missiles-in Pentogon Jargon It's called MAP, for



BOISE (UPI) — A tropical thunderstorm accompanied by high winds, heavy rain, and some of the hottest temperatures of the year lit the Bolse area early Saturday evening, causing minor damage throughout the city.

James Abourezk, D-S D, then asked the Justice Department to Investigate the langle of charges involving informant Gary Thomas Rowe Jr.

Carter, Schmidt optimistic on talks

BONN, West Germany (UPI) — President Carter and West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt Saturday predicted progress toward international economic cooperation would be made at the seven-nation summit conference beginning Sunday. Carter and Schmidt will be joined by the leaders of France, Britain, Japan, Canada and Bally for two days of talks aimed at coordinating plans for global economic growth. Carter, speaking in Wiesbaden, said Saturday the summit talks were "one tangible sign of our continuing search for solutions for the age-old problems of global inequity."
The United States and West Germany, he said, would "look beyond narrow self-interest to the broader interest of all nations."

nations."
Schmidt, echolng Carter's commitment to "the development of an international economic order," said he was convinced the summit would make progress toward that aim.
Schmidt particularly emphasized the need to tackle unemployment which is a problem in much of the industrialized west. The way to cut jobicsness is through stimulation of economic growth and international trade.
All the nations attending the summit agree on the need for such stimulation, but disagree of ways to achieve it without the danger of inflation.

The agenda for the conference consists of five basic topics:

Economic growth without oversimulation and inflation:

Currency stability and especially the pressure on the dollar.

Trade with and aid to the developing nations.

Fears of protectionist trade policies in some countries.

Fears of protectionist trade policies in some countries.

Energy, with special emphasis on the huge trade defletis the United States has incurred because of oil imports.

Carler hoped to have some good news for those who want the United States to curb its purchases of foreign petroleum. But the Senate Friday failed to pass a bill that would encourage utilities and industry away from gil and natural gas toward coal as a fuel-The bill was held in april next week by the threat of a fillmenter.

Carter will be able to report that U.S. oil imports have been cut by I million barrels a day since the beginning of the year, the difference made by the flow of oil from Alaska.
The summit may produce some movement on trade. Special trade talks in Geneva reached a critical stage this week and it is now up to the seven leaders to promote further progress.

At the September sessions the committee will consider renovation of the Cottonwood female detention facility and possible conversion of the Gooding hospital, which presently is costing the state about \$120,000 a year in upkeep. The last Legislature turned down a proposal to convert the hospital into the state's only institution for female limates.

While converting to an abbrevlated testing system, the division also cut its license handbook from 137 to 83 pages by ellminating photographs and unessential information.

In addition, the new manual costs 10 cents per copy to produce, compared to a 27-cent price for the old one. Chauffer's license information is now included in the handbook. A division spokesman said the revised examination system will save time and money for Idaho drivers.

Fewer questions for drivers

Most committee members agreed the Gooding facility would be east effective and beneficial to the welfare of female inmates, but also agreed that considerable community opposition would have to be overcome before the state could go ahead with renovation of the building and transfer of inmates from Gottawood.

Acting Corrections Director William Crowl said his department predicts there will be 65 females incarcerated in Idaho by 1985, which would outstrip the present capacity of the Cottonwood center.

In addition, Crowl said by his own experience as an idaho corrections officer, he predicts there will be 65 to 100 female prisoners in the state by 1985. He based his personal estimate on what he called changing trends toward tougher sentences for female criminal oftenders and the possible increase in severity of sentences—that might come with the the Equal Rights—Amendment should it be ratified.

Amendment should It be ratified.

Broadcasters told FCC is now too big

VAIL, Colo. (UPI) — The chairman of the House Subcommittee on Communications told broadcasters from the Rocky Mountain region Friday the Federal Communications Commission has grown too large and must be whitted down to a manageable size.

Rep. Lionel Van Deerlin, D-Callin, speaking to more than 400 persons attending the annual convention of the Rocky Mountain Broadcasters Association, urged media support for his plan to restrict both the power and the size of the FCC.

Van Deerlin said hearings would get under way shortly in Washington on legislation that he introduced last month to replace the 1934 Communications Act. He said the 14-year-old law was impossible to interpret.

"It is time to cut the FCC and its regulatory function down to size," Van Deerlin said.

Van Deerlin, who found a sympathetic audience, said radio and television stations in the United States are required to spend 18.5 million hours a year to meet the FCC's paperwork requirements, ite said except for the internal Revenue Service, the FCC imposes "the heaviest paper burden upon citizens of any agency of government."

The proposed haw would reduce the commission to an agency to regulate primarily only the technical aspects of broadcasting. The bill also would impose fees for operation of radio and television stations for the first time. That is expected to be the most controversial aspect of his legislation. Annual charges of from 1500 to \$700 have been suggested for smaller stations with higher fees being assessed to broadcast media in the large cities.

"If Amtrak continues operations on its present scale, it will need an operating subsidy of \$625 million in fiscal 1980 and almost \$1 billion a year by 1984," he sald.
It is time "blat Congress and the people of this nation recognize that the most economical and

efficient method of ground transportation is the intercity bus." In most places, he said, Amtrak "has been a costly failure."
Trailways is the nation's second integest intercity bus company, serving more than 5,000 cities and towns in 42 states over a route system of 713,000 miles.



Municipal strikes plagued Louisville and Philadeiphia Saturday, but police were back on the beat in
dissension-wracked Cleveland.
Louisville firmene, who haited a 14-hour strike
late Friday, returned to their picket lines early
Saturday atthough a seven-hour round of contract
talks failed to produce a contract settlement.
In Philadelphia, garbage was beginning to stack
up on the streets on the second day of a walkout by
20,000 non-uniformed city workers demanding a pay
raise.

In Louisville, more than 200 National Guard troops resumed fireflighting duties they performed for several hours Friday night after Gov. Julian M. Carroll ordered them to duty.

No major fires were reported in the city of 400,000. There was no immediate indication if the contract talks would resume.

The 600 members of Louisville Professional Firefighters Local 345 agreed to return to their

firehouses after Mayor William B. Stansbury offered to Join personally nepotlations in an effort to reach a settlement.

Both sides met in City Hall through the night before the falls broke off.
Granville Emils, the acting union president, sold the cily had refused to move from its stand that it could offer only a 55 percent pay raise for the frefighters, who currently chart \$3.09 and hours. He called for binding arbitration to end the dispute. In Cleveland, police union teaders called the 19-hour strike of the city's 2,000 police officers to demand reinstatement of 13 fired officers who had refused orders to patrol Cleveland's crime-ridden public housing projects alone and on foot.

During the walkout there were scattered reports of thievery and vandalism, but the city of 800,000 remained generally calm.
Cleveland police called off their strike after a Common Pleas Court Judge delayed the firings and intreatened heavy fines against the unions and officers for the illegal walkout.

Mayor Dennis Kucinich, who faces a recall election next month, declined to commend and we thought the strike would affect his chances.

"The Army has a plan entitled 'Graphic Hand' that is the result of coordination with the U.S. Postal Service, which began in 1970," the statement said.
"The plan will only be implemented if and when the postmaster general requests assistance and the president declares a national emergency."



Farmers given chance to speak out

TWIN FALLS - Is prime armland being eaten up by

farmland being eaten up by new subdivisions?

Are row crop Irrigation systems dangerously eroding valuable Magic Valley topsoil and washing it into the Snake River?

Are farmers too short of money to apply needed soil and washer conservation practices to save their land for

future generations?
The U.S. Soil Conservation
Service will be looking for answers to such questions this year as required by the Re-source Conservation Act passed in December, 1977, by

Congress.

And local people will get a chance to put in their two cents worth on conservation issues.

Rich Yankee of the Twin Falls SCS office says his agency has been charged with

appraising soil and water resources in the U.S. during the next six months as part of a nationylde check-up on conservation programs. He says the assessment will be the first careful look the SCS has taken at its programs since 1933 when the U.S. Department of Agriculture started the service. "We are trying to get as much public input as possible about how the general public feels about now the general public feels about our resources and

what they feel the major conservation problems," Yankee explains. "We want to uncover any concerns about soil and water problems." "Government agencies are often in the position of tolling people what their problems are and what to do about them," Yankee continues, "At this time we would like them to come forward and tell us what the problems are and how we can work with them to correct them."

ee says the Twin Falls s soliciting oral and comment from all led citizens in the

written comment from all concerned cilizens in the country. He has been visiting organizations, form groups, and public service clubs to spread the word.

On July-19 at the College of Southern Idaho, Yankee will hold an open public meeting in the mini-auditorium of the Vocational Agriculture Building at 8 p.m. to solicit more public comment and opinion.







TUSCALOOSA, Ala, (UP1) — A dazzling blue Alabama sky greets Jack Duke as he noses his chunky biplane skyward. Seconds later, with unerring accuracy, Duke skims over a 30-acre soybean field "dusting" the cryo. At the end of the field, just yards from a clump of pine trees, the 45-year-old Duke manilandies the whining plane into a climb that peaks at about 400 feet. Then it's another harrowing trip under utility lines and across the field.
"You lose more pilots in the turn than anywhere," sald Duke, a lean, soft-spoken veteran of 18 years of cropdusting. "You've got an overloaded airplame and you have to turn downwind."

Cropdusters often are portraved as barnstorming

Cropdusters often are portrayed as birnistorming daredevils who put on summer aerobatics through, much of the countryside where eropdusting is most prominent — an "1"-shapet region from Washing, lon state to Texas and cast to Florida.







Roar of engines music to racers

Goal of 210 in quarter mile could win big Winter national title for Murtaugh dragster

By DOUGLAS TULLIS Times News writer

MURTAUGH — Ron Baker's favorite ride involves sitting in a machine that shakes so violently he can hardly see where he is going, costs \$100 each time, and lasts about seven seconds and is so loud, he can't hear himself that

That ride is a part of his hobby or racing, his alcohol-powered drap racer, and as a result of that hobby, has hull up the name as the fastest man in Idaho.

The six-foot tall, 230 pound Baker looks more at home on his 480 acre farm between Murtaugh and Burley than he does stuffed into he cockpit of the 1800 horsepower drapster.

But when the doubte doors to the shop are opened revealing the sleek looking dragster, Baker's pride as a racer and appreciation of the machine come to the forefront, and he is ready to explain all about it.

"It's a 472-cubic-linch Chrysler heml engine that puts out around 1800 to 1900 horsepower," Baker says.

During the course of the conversation, Baker also mentioned that the paint Job was custom work that cost \$1,000.

While he spends a good deal of his time at home caring for the farm, every other weekend, he whist up at a drag stirp somewhere do the western U.S. racing the rear engine dragster.

"I have to stay home once in a while," he commented about his runs to various parts of the west. "Without the Tarin," I don't Tgo racing." The added.

A month ago, he was in Portland running his machine, Last weekend, he competed in a meet in Salt Lake Gity and in another two weeks, he will head south to St. George, Utah, for another

meet.
All that traveling is expensive but Baker says he just about breaks even when he races, "We

he just about breaks even when he races. "We take the plokup and camper so it doesn't cost so much for staying in places."

In events such as the St. George trip, the track owner is paying baker and other, high power dragsters to compede at the track as an incentive to gather the crowds.

Besides the costs of traveling to the different meets, it gets mighty expensive to built a dragster, and race It. "The motor, can, run anywhere from \$10,000, and the cost of the total

car can go as fligh as \$20,000 to \$35,000."
That expense is justified when he finishes "in the money." That ingens he places in the top 10 to 15 racers. depending on how many are accepted into the finals: "I did pretty good at the Winternationals in Bakersfield in February of "76. I finished '210 ha in 10 car field."
That finish ended up costing him a pretty penny, though. On one run, the transmission did not shift into second gear and the engine over erveed and blew a plece of the engine over erveed and block. You could see clear through the engine."
In terms of operating cost, it is still very in terms of operating cost, it is still very

In terms of operating cost, it is still very xpensive for Baker and his wife to keep at the

expensive for Baker and his wife to keep at the sport.

"It uses seven gallons of alcohol each time. It holds 10-12 quarts of oil, and we change it every other run," he explained about the minor things needed for racing. While it costs anywhere from \$1 to \$1.50 a gallon for the fuel, the oil usually is free from the Pennzull Co.

Another major expense is tires. The rear racing skifes cost about \$125 cach, and they last about 15-18 runs. If it takes five or six runs going lot the finals, the tires must be replaced every third race.

late the finals, the tires must be replaced every third race.

Those expenses are enough to hurt, but in didition, extra parts must be taken along to each race in case something must be replaced before or during a race. Those extra parts include pistons, bearings, valves and valve springs. The money is not all that is involved in getting—the machine ready for a race; Baker says it just takes a lot of time.

"Getting ready to go to Silt Lake, we spend most of the night, from six to three in the morning trying to get the thing ready. It's a little tough to work all day to get ready to go and then drive all night just to get to Seattle to start reacing the next morning," he said of one trip to the Northwest.

"I like to run around." he added summing up

His tee in a round, "he added summing up his feelings about taking the long trips.

Baker runs in one of the top three classes for dragsters. The top class, called the Top Fuel Class, includes most of the professional racers who do it for a living. The only difference between Baker's car and those in that class is the fuel used.

"They use nitro methane and we use alcohol," the said. "I think I'll stick with the pro-comp class for a while; it just costs a lot more to run a top fueler."

wer using alcohol, the same dragster using intro-methane as fuel would produce 2400 horsepower.

The second class is the funny car class which involves much of the same type of engine and equipment used in the other machines, but the engine and driver are encased in a therglass shell that resembles a took production car.

The third class, the one Baker runs in, is the procome class. In that class, there is a ratio between the weight of the vehicle and the procome class. In that class, there is a ratio between the weight of the vehicle and the horsepower. That allows the lighter, less powerful cars to compete with the more owerful machines and still come out winning at times.

The one reason it is so expensive to run in the higher classes is that there is much more of a chance to blow an engine apart with the more explosive fuel.

Since the alcohol and nitro-methane are much more volatile than gasoline, each car must be equipped with a fire extinguisher system which will spray the chemical into the driver, seat incase a fire occurs.

"I've only had to use It once," Baker said, but that added safety factor helps keep himself and other racers from getting injured.



I didn't take long and Baker was racing motorcycles and then cars. "I raced different cars: Super Stock cars, Modified Cars and then B dragsters. I won a few races close to here with that one," he said.

With the move up to a higher powered racer, Baker got interested in something better and three or four years ago, bought his present racer from Dawsen Engineering Company in Indiana. That move has resulted in his succeeding at being a competitive racer.







Survey shows women gaining confidence

Female TFHS grads lean toward going to college

TWIN FALLS — A survey of 1978 Twin Falls,
ligh School graduates shows more women than
men plan to continue their education.
It also shows that less women than men plan to
stay in Twin Falls.
Ten percent more women from the class than
men said they tolan to continue their education

men sald they plan to continue their education after graduation, while 11 percent more men than women said they would prefer to remain and live in the town where they were raised.

The survey also showed that a lack of job-opportunities and "excitement" in Twin Falls-are the major reasons that 39 percent of this year's seniors plan to live somewhere other than Twin Falls.

Twin Falls. With the help of school counselors and teachers, the Times-News in May distributed questionnaires and received answers from 231 of 40g graduating schors.

Of the 231 sentors responding, 169 (73 percent) said they plan to continue their education in-college, trade school, or in the military. Seventy-eight percent of the 114 women respondents said they plan to continue their education, and 68 percent of the 117 male respondents said they have further education plans.

Sixteen percent of the women and 21 percent of

Slightly more women (40 percent) than men (38 percent) also said they definitely plan to leave Twin Falls to live elsewhere.

However, among those who intend to continue their education, slightly more men than women (45 to 44 percent) plan to leave Twin Falls for greener pastures.

For many Twin Falls seniors, greener pastures means better job opportunities and more social, cultural and entertainment opportunities.

Of the 91 seniers (39 percent) who said theyplan to leave Twin Falls, 41 percent mentioned
better job opportunities elsewhere as one of their
reasons for leaving.

Fifty-two percent of departing seniors mentioned Twin Falls lack of social, cultural and
entertainment opportunities as one of their

reasons for leaving. Many of those who plan to stay in Twin Falls mentioned the same lack, as one of Twin Falls' major shortcomings. Numerous sentors commented that Twin Falls needs "good, clean fur places" where young adults can do something besides "cruise, go to the movies, or drink."

Specifically, seniors said the Twin Falls
intertainment scene needs an ice skating rink,
slaces, for young people to dance, a greater
artiety of movies, more concerts, and more
apportunities to view the orts and theatre.

Despite Twin Falls' shortcomings, 73 seniors (32 percent) plan to stay in Twin Falls. The most cummon reasons those students gave for wanting to remain in Twin Falls were the presence of family, the availability of employpresence of family, the availability of employment, a preference for communities the size of Twin Falls into too big), and a general liking for Twin Falls and the surrounding area.

Of the 169 sentiers planning to continue their education, 68 percent said they will attend schools in Idaho. Twenty-they percent said they will continue their education outside of Idaho. More men (33, or 29 percent) than women (19, or 21 percent) plan to attend schools outside of Idaho.



The most popular out-of-state school is Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, which attracted eight seniors (5 women and 3 men).

JEROME — Mark Walters lives to fly.
He breathes, each, siceps and dreams flying.

county airport, under a county contract which requires
them to operate airport controls, do the bookkeeping
and assume responsibility for maintenance. Besides
their Job for the county they also teach flying, rent
'their own airplane out, and self fuel.
The daily. Walters schedule is a combination of
ridiculous hours and unexpected interruptions.
Although both Mark and Marva normally get up at 6
a.m., they could easily be roused at 3 by a request for
landing information.
They try to get to bed by 11 p.m., but are often
awakened again by a call at midnight.

"It's hard on family life," she complained, "and, you're nover able to get completely away from it."
Affection, if not stability, seems to secure (family life for the Walters, a couple whose romance began six years ago in a Belleuve bar. It was not the Sands Club (later Kyle's, recently burned by arsonists) where Marva, then managing the bar, met Mark, who had come up from Jerome as the bahjo gultar and fidely player in a band called the Country Ramblers.
"He brought his truck up one day', loaded me up and brought me down to Jerome," Marva recalled.
Five years later she quit her job in newspaper advertsing, and he cut back working on his farm to enter into a contract with Jerome County to manage, the airport.

"In the summer I usually schedule my flying around farming," Mark explained.

At7, or sometimes as late as 10 p.m., he gives one final flying lesson.

It took Mark almost six years to convince her to take lessons from him. She finally got hey license in March. "I don't recommend a husband teaching his wile how to fly." she joked.

Although small planes like the Cherokees cost only \$6,500, engine replacement, done every 2,000 hours of flight time; costs about \$1,000.
Fuel costs \$8 be an hour.

To Mark, the chance to fly is worth whatever soriffices the job colls for.
When he said, "I always wanted to fly," somehow it didn't just sound like every other adult remembering a childhood dream.

At 22 he was back farming in Jerome and flying every day. Finally, in the fall of 1975 he goh his pilots ilecase. The next year he got his instructor's certificate, which requires 259 hours of flying and an instrument rating (44 hours of "hooded" flying, or navigating only on the basis of instrument ratings).

Mark usually has about 15 students who pay \$30 an hour for the 40 hours of flight instruction needed to get a license. Most of the fee goes toward fuel and upkeep

for the plane.
"I like the freedom of flying," Mark reflected, gazing at the valley receding below us. "And the challenge," the added.





I'm quite certain that once a really good cure for baldness becomes available that everyone will know it. So many people want something done for baldness that there would be no way you could keep such an archivement a secret more than about 24 hours.





Barry P. Bosworth, director of the federal government's Council on Wage and Price Stability, recently outlined a few of the new regulatory Items being considered by the government.

There are plans to establish a system for classifying potential cancer-causing agents in industry and issuance of regulations to protect workers from these.

industry and issuance of regulations to protect workers from these.

Then, there are plans to establish noise standards for industry and regulations to guide the installation of noise-reducing equipment.

The identification of cancer-causing agents in

industry may cost as much as \$47 billion.

The anti-noise equipment in industry could cost another \$10 in taxes, according to Bosworth's continuous.

This continued effort by the government to regulate the working space of American businesses springs from the most noble of intentions.

Young's dilemma

According to official sources travelling with the secretary, Vance told Young to be more careful about what he says in the future, that his free-wheeling style is hurting the administration and that the circumstances surrounding his intest gaffe were particularly troublesome.

Not only did Young's controversial remarks steal he spoilight from Carter's departure Thursday to Bonn for economic talks with Western leaders, but they also overshadowed Vance's SALT mission to Geneva.

Even worse, in the view of some administration officials and congressional leaders, Young gave Moscow a propaganda opening in the midst of the trials of Anatoly Shcharansky and Aleksand Cinzburg. The Kremlin quickly selred the ambassador's words as proof that the United States engages in political repression.

After meeting with Vance, Young, looking glum

and subdued, issued a statement to clarify his views, saying he never meant to 'equate the status of political freedom in the United States with that in the Soviet Union.

Editor, Times News: Thave learned that at least four plans for property tax reform in Idaho are being advanced.

• Plan one: The Homestead Exemption

• Plan This plan would establish a fair market value on taxable property. From thigt value, \$15,000 would be subtracted. (The \$15,000 figure could be increased or decreased by the legislature). To the amount left the assessed valuatin formula would be applied and the assessed value would be multiplied by the mill levy to establish the tax.

Plan two provides for three levels of • Plan two provides for three levels of property assessment rates. Level one-would levy 15 percent of market value for homes and farm. Level two: 20 percent of business and industrial property would be the assessed value. Level three would include utilities. The suggested rate for taxation is 25 to 30 percent.
• Plan three would repeal the eight mill district and county levy for school purposes.

purposes.

• Plan four would place a one percent ceiling on the fair market value of the property as the total tax that could be

levied on the property in one year. Plan four is being planned as an initiative and referendum.

four 4s being planned as an initiative and referendum.
Plans one, two and, four would need some formula for establishing a market value. I have discovered no attempt to develop such a formula.
Plan one only applies to homes and farms. Plan throw also would award invored treatment to homes and farms. Could plan one and plan two be declared unconstitutional by the courts on grounds of discrimination?
Plan three would cause the least confusion and disorder in government, but school districts need a dedicated financial base. The real estate tax through the years has served as that hase. The four mills repeated during last legislature-was the first attack on it.

Would plan there reduce or destroy the financial security of our schools?





Junkyards alter image

Lots now recycle vehicles and keep accurate inventory of available parts

MAGIC VALLEY — If Lady Bird
Inave to put Barger-Mattson Auto Salvage
on her list of "must shop" places.

It is 'Goubtful the wife of late President Lyndon Johnson would be interested in buying any car or truck parts, but the catalyst of the Highway Beautification Act unquestionably would be interested in seeing what manager-owner Norm Lancaster terms a "supermarket" for recycled whiche parts.

To Lancaster, the word "junkyard" is an anathema. It is easier to understand why he calls Barger-Mattson a "supermarket" after viewing the 15 acres of neatly stacked rows of parts stored on the lot just west of Twin Falls.

And across Highway 30 from Barger-

Mattson, competitor Charles Jansson is sprucing up his 13-acre yard to change the old "Junkyard" image once automatically associated with the auto parts industry.

A decade ago it wasn't uncommon to go into a "junkyard" anywhere in the country that literally was just that. Rusted hulks of vehicles were precarlously stacked 10 to 15 high with hobgoblin piles of parts piled everywhere.

If a customer needed a part, a greasecovered character in a ramshackle tarpaper shack greeted a request for a part by pointing out the general direction in which it might be found.

Today, the tarpaper shacks gradually are being replaced with spacious head-quarter buildings where the customer is greeted at counters holding inventory files telling neatly dressed employees where the necessary part is stockpiled.

Charles Jansson said one reason for the trend to neatness is more women shop for used vehicle parts today than they did a couple decades ago.

Before Lady Bird's Highway Beautification Act passed Congress in the late 1960s, the image of a junkyard limited the clients pretty much to males.

"Before that act, that's wint they called them but we're not that anymore," 'Annsson claims: "A junkyard to me is a scrapyard. I mean a scrap iron yard. Something that isn't saleable to the public."

Yards still contain wrecked and worn out hulks, but the vehicles often have been stripped of all usable parts in a dismantling shed when first hauled in the gates.

"The disassembly pad is really, a factory

"The disassembly pad is really a factory in reverse. The factory takes parts and puts them together and we take them apart," Lancaster said.

After being photographed and stripped to have sheet metal, the numbered skeletons of cars are earled outside and the locations marked on separate cards placed in a central filing system with the pictures. There they remain until bought or lugged off to a crusher for scrap metal.

Trucks are completely stripped down because there is more demand for body parts and they are more interchangeable than cars, he added, "There are more pickups and trucks registered in Idaho than cars."

Changing an unwanted finage isa't always easy, as Jansson relates: "(The change) is about like daylight and dark. We have more ways to dismantle our cars. And we used not to have an inventory but now we do. You've got to have a magazine before you know what you've got."

On top of the additional paperwork, there is the never-finished task of weed control. "We sprayed the yard this spring," the 20-year veteran of the recycling industry, said. "The weeds growed taster than the spray. Gotta spray this fall again. The weeds is growing so fast, it shard to see the cars any more."

Jansson said he has been gradually adding shelving for parts storage and estimated it will be another month before he has everything "in shape the way I want it to be. It takes a long time to do that unless you start out that way at first. I've been over here 20 years, and If you don't watch II, It gets worse and worse."

Starting off organized is just what Robert "Buzz" Miller has in mind. The recipient of his auto salvage business license from the Idaho Department, of Transportation only a month ago, Miller has 60 cars neatly lined up on his four-aiere salvage yard site next to Interstate 80 North.

Miller says, "There probably will be 300 to 400 on it when it's full. And I'm going to be putting up a 50-by-100 foot building for dismantling."

Miller believes the trend is to have everything available where it can be found reastly. "Some parts you have to leave on cars, like body parts, it's just as well to leave them on a car as stacked up somewhere. But we do want to recycle ours and, you know, keep it decent."

A used car dealer also, Miller said the freeway side of the yard is being screened with an elght-foot-high pinewood fence, to screen the wrecked vehicles from passing motorists. Only the used vehicles will be visible.

"I'm not going to do much on the freeway side, there's not much room. But the other end where people enter...! plan on putting a caretaker's house there with a nice yard. I want it to look nice, too."

Besides crediting Lady Bird Johnson with the positive change of image the automotive recycling industry is attaining Lancaster said the energy crisis, provided more of the Impetus.

"One of the theories behind the industry's national public relations effort is the energy 'erisis made people more aware of recycling, even though we were doing it 30 years before the word was put in the dictionary," he explained.

The 1,200 members of the national organization — the Automotive Dismantlers and Recyclers of America—felt Bargier-Mattson was a prime example of that change last year by naming it the winner of the ADRA's Improvement-Beautification Contest for salvage yards with elfolt to 14 employees.

Lancaster's beaming smile tells the viewer it was worth the money his company spent to spruce up the yard.

For example, to clear the property line bordering Rock Creek Canyon of cars that used to be piled to the edge cost 55,000 and the cooperation of Twin Falls park officials.

The old wrecks were lifted back 30 feet from the edge and that side of the yard fenced in and trees and shrubs planted so that in a few years they won't be visible from Highway 30.

Until the natural screen is high enough to do the job. Lancaster will be ready to remind the customer whose tongue inadvertently pronounced the place a "junkyard."

He'll just collar the individual and lend them to his nearby paneled office where a framed, felt placard proclaims: "I'm Okay. God Doesn't Make Junk."

'F.I.S.T.': Stallone loses this round

After hir much acclaimed success in Svivester Stallone must have "Rocky chosen his next film with great trepidation. "Rocky," a well-written screenplay with warmth and sensitivity, was a hard act to follow. When "F.I.S.T." opened, most critics were quick to point out that Stallone had indeed made a blunder. In all fairness, I must say that although Twin and Jerome Cinemas, does not hold a candle to "Rocky," Stallone still gives a charismatic performance.

As Johnny Kovak, a powerful labor leader, Stallone is earthy and passionate. Modeled on the late James Hoffa, Kovak is depicted as a fiercely dedicated man ruled more by his emotions than his intellect. The story of "F.I.S.T.," which stands for Federation of Interstate Truckers, traces the rise and fall of a young man from his early days as a union organizer to his unions in the United States.

The sage of Johnny Kovak is one which we have come to know so well, perhaps too well. A hard working young man, Johnny despises the conditions under which he and others are forced to labor. He makes vain attempts to negotiate with his employers. Finally, he begins to organize the men in carnest. At first, those in power merely mock his efforts, but as the union becomes more of a threat, they take drastic measures to squelch its progress. The result is brutal violence and bloodshed. Sickened by the death of his fellow workers and overwhelmed by the odds against him, Johnny allies himself withthe underworld, the only organization powerful enough to combat "legalized" crime. With his new-found associates, Johnny breaks the back of management, soars to power, and becomes one of the leading figures-in the labor movement. Johnny tries to minimize his contact with the underworld, but once he has sold out there is no way to extricate himself. What thought was a means to victory becomes a means to his final destruction

At a time when "Big Business" and "Big Labor" often appear as identical twins, it is refreshing to look back at the beginnings of unionism. It is also stimulating to contemplate the role of power in our society and the corruption it inevitably generates. Why then is "F.I.S.T." a rather mediocre enterprise? In the first place, the intricacles of the labor movement are skimmed over lightly. In the second place, the characters are more caricature than flesh-and-blood. And, in the third place, there really is no point of view. Instead of a carefully delinented study of a fascinating period in our country's history, we have a tepid, superficial TV mini-series. (At least, that's what I think will be the appropriate fate for this film.) A smattering of sex, violence and humor make it just bland enough for TV viewing.

All of this is rather sad for Sylvester Stallone, who seems to be a talented actor. Of course, I would like to see him in a role which requires an English dialect other than substandard New, Yorkese. Hopefully, he will expand his repertoire in the future. The most one can say right now is: Sorry, Champ - "F.I.S.T." just didn't pack the punch of your earlier triumph!

He comes across like plain folk. Maybe that's why the 34-year-old Oklahoma-born Talley is President and Mrs. Carter's favorite country singer.

He not only verbalizes the 9-to-5 and 7-to-3:30 lives with all their trials and struggles, but also the working man's spirit and contributions to this country.

"Look how they changed the whole youth culture ... It went from haircuts to clothes to philosophies of life. "And look what Bob Dylan did," says the robust, black-bearded and flercelooking singer who performed at the Inauguration of Jimmy Carter, starred at a White House Reception, and again, appeared at the Executive Mansion when the President honored country music

"I think it's possible to change the culture. But I don't think that you can immediately teach people with a song."

Talley recounts a recording session where Ken Nelson, producer of Merl Haggard albums and one of the mostrespected men in country music, told him

"I said, 'I don't think you can either. But

what I think you can do is give them something to think about." Then Talley adds: "If you can move them ... If you can

make them laugh ... If you can make them "If you can make them outraged ... If

you can make them angry ... If you can make them happy ...

"If you can move them ... which is the whole function of art - whether it be painting, sculpture, photograpy, writing, or singling - then you have given them something to think about.

"It sets their own wheels to turning you are not exactly teaching them. You are giving them food for thought.

"That's why I'm glad there's room for expression in a song.

James Talley is anything but a laid-back performer, compared to most country singers. The real key to his art is his pursuit of real emotions in simple working people - and his aching sensitivity to conditions of poverty.

Many of them are folks who used to be in

the mainstream of country - the outsiders, the poor, the jobless and homeless. These are the very people country musicians used to sing about - and country radio saw as its market in early

But though the working man songs are a big part of his life, there's also room for blues, women trouble, and slippin' around music.

"So many of us go out every day and put in a 9-to-5 or 7-to-3:30 work day — the sam place, same time, doing the same thing,

"It doesn't have to be. But it is. Remember 'She's the One' from my second album?" he asks. "She's the one who pulls me through all of this."

"I can't stand to see the morning come "While the evening rain's still falling; "Another day - they're all the same, "And so many, many more to follow."

"At this point, Conway Twitty could sing 'Peanut Butter and Milk,' and it would be at the top of the charts. It's nothing against him. Not that 'Hello Darling' wasn't a great song — 'cause it is, you'know. But it's that so much of it has to do with who's established, and that kind of thing.

"It takes work on the part of a radio programmer -- and on the part of DJs. It takes work to find the best music, and I have only found a handful of FM stations in the country that are really into that.

'You don't make a painting to stick in "You don't write a story to flie it in a

drawer 'You don't write a novel for no one to

ever read... "You want it shared - because you

want to move people. It's like this radio process. It's a shame we are faced with that kind of situation.

"I have nothing against capitalism. I feel we have the best country in the world. "I used to be a little bit more of a

socialist-leaning porson until I worked for the government for six years - and saw what a mess that was. "I realized that a concentration of power is as dangerous as the concentration of

capital — 'cause it is all one and the same.

"It's like I say in the song, 'Are They Genna Make Us Outlaws Again

"Did I tell you when I went to the Winter Garden one night?" Groucho Marx was asking his friend George Jessel. "I wasn't

wearing a mustache, and Houdini was doing a trick onstage. He took some needles and put them in his mouth, and put some thread in there, and he would thread the needles. So he asked for a volunteer

from the audience, and I went up on the stage. He didn't know who I was. He says, 'What do you see in there?' and I says, Pvorrhea.

Groucho Marx - a.k.a. Phineas T. Firefly, Hugo Z, Hackenbush, Jeffrey T. Spaulding, and Otis B. Driftwood, among others. He was the man who knew too much, who wore the ridiculous painted eyebrows and mustache and moved withthat unique loping stride, and who possessed a quickness and surety of wit unrivaled by any American comedian of

In "Hello, I Must Be Going," Charlotte Chandler presents an eyewitness portrait of Groucho the octogenarian.

Originally assigned by Playboy several years ago to interview Groucho, Chandler became a fas' friend of the late comedian, visiting him often and recording innumer able conversations with Groucho and his

As you follow Groucho's reminiscences, friends' testimonials, and Chandler's experiences with her subject, a colorful

portrait emerges.

Groucho is a man who, despite three divorces and a reputation as a lecher, is a falthful husband and family man. He is shown to be surprisingly generous in his support of other comedians, including Bill Cosby, Bob Hope, Steve Allen, Jack Benny, George Burns, and Woodý Allen

Yet he was a man blunt to the point of gratultous cruelty. Groucho's friend, novelist Sidney Sheldon, recalls a visit with Groucho to a restaurant, Jack's at-the Beach: "Jack was still alive then, and he was really thrilled to have Groucho there. making a tremendous fuss over him. Jack went on like that, and after a while; Groucho said, 'Jack, stop groveling.'

For the most part, though, the book is a love feast. The row between Groucho's companion Erin Fleming and his son Arthur over custody of the aging and sick Groucho is handled only briefly. The profanity so abundant in "The Marx Brothers Scrapbook" is at a minimum

Film fans looking for an analysis of Individual Marx brothers movies will be disappointed. That remains the task of the more objective, more critical biographer, But readers will get some rare glimpses of Groucho and the rest of the Marx troupe. On Harpo, Groucho tells Chandler: "Harpo was a beautiful man He was

always sitting down, playing the goddamn harp. And I hated the harp. I always walked out of the theater when the harp came on. I'd heard it for years, it drove me crazy."

Though the book duplicates information found in previous Marx brothers books and is also a bit long, Grouchophiles will love

Americans awoke Christmas morning 1977 to learn that Charlle Chaplin had died in the night. Shortly after, they learned that someone had stolen the corpse from his just-dug grave, demanding a ransom from the family. Chaplin's life was like his death - a tragic, heroic time, ironically mirroring the themes of so many of the films featuring Charlie the Tramp.

Raised in desperate poverty in London, Charile, at the age of 7, found himself in a home for destitute children, without friends, separated from family. There followed a traumatic series of reunions and separations from his beloved mother Hanna and brother Sidney.

Charile later found work with various acting companies and comedy troupes, finally landing his first solid lob with the company of master pantomimist Fred Karno. At the age of 21, Chaplin was sent with the company to America. On one tour, he was spotted by Mack Scnnett. "I was impressed, more than impressed," said

"Stunned might be a good word. I think I was so struck by him because he was everything I wasn't: a little fellow who could move like a ballet dancer. The next week I couldn't remember his name but I sure as hell never forgot that wonderful easy grace of movement. I had seen nothing like it. I've seen nothing like it, since, except in Chaplin films. And to think it was luck, pure chance that I saw Chaplin the first time! I had an appointment with a friend that night on Eighth Avenue. I walted, he didn't show up so I thought I'd kill time by wandering into the nearby music hall. Bless my friend for missing our engagement."

Sennett quickly hired Chaplin who soared from newcomer to star to director-star. During this two-year period (1913-1915), he progressed from virtual anonymity to unequaled fame. Darren McGavin pushes new movie

NEW YORK — Darren McGavin and his wife Kathle Browne are two very busy people, recently, they stopped over in New York on their walt to London.

They were promoting their new movie, "Zero to Sixty," Scomedy, which Kathie produced and Darren stars in. It will be released towards the beginning of August.

I met them in the Russian Tea Room, a venerable New York hang-out for ballet and stage greats.

Pipe in hand, the casually attired Darren settled in as raconteur. Kathie was pert in a straw hat and Jersey dress, her silvery blonde hair hanging straight to her shoulders. Yet, she deferred to her husband's account of his TV history.

Darren has a date pending in London with the ABC miniseries production of "IKE," a six-hour dramatization of General Eisenhower's WW II years, in which he plays General George C. Patton.

Asked how he felt about following in the Academy Award-winning foolsteps of George C. Scott, ("Patton"), Darren replied, "I'm delighted." He added that they'd had just finished shooting the North Africa scenes in Barstow, California; the rest of the miniseries would be wrapped up in London.

His second ABC miniseries, "The Users," will air over the upcoming season, too. In this tale of intrigue in a Hollywood social climber's life, Darren plays, "a combination Norman Maler-Ernest Hemingway womanizer. I'm the, last obstacle she has to climb over to reach her pinnacle, It's a roman a clef."

Darren is a theatrical actor who broke into television back in the 40s with "Studio 1," "Kraft Theater" and other shows, which were broadcast live from New York.

He's also done TV movies. "It's a funny business, built on friendship," he explained. "Old friends kept calling for pilot movies. We picked and chose. They were the thing to do at the time."

Now, he continued, "TV miniseries are en passant and around." Again, it's "old friends" who sign him on.

"I have a nice relationship with Walt Disney Productions. It's the most congenial place in the industry to work. They own totally what they do. They own the time, and they work a long time on scribts which are mostly superior."

scripts; which are mostly superior."
Two about-to-be-released Disney movies feature Darren McGavin: "Hot Lead and Cold Feet," which is scheduled for August release, and "Donavan's Kid," which will alt on TV during the 78-79 season.

Darren and his wife are trying to divorce themselves from making money for other people. They have formed their own production company, which includes three subsidaries. Entertainment Complex, KBCO, and McGavin —and are investing in scribts.

"Some people buy stocks, or real estate, or jewelry," said Kathie. "We buy scripts."

"An actor is only a small portion of a large mosale," Darren added, "Your own film is so total, so demanding." Kathle piped in, "We work very closely;

creatively we are a good counter balance for each other."
"Zero to Sixty" produced by KBCO,

Kathle's company, is comedy.

Darren explained: "It's very delicate. It's the Hudson Brothers' first film. They've always done a variety act. As performers, they're a cross between the Marx Brothers and the Sweathogs. Of course, Sylvia Miles is hysterical, too: Basically, it's about a divorced,

"We built scenes to make them work. The

farce — in one door and out the other —
when Denise catches me with Joan Collins.

The whole picture is high comedy."

I asked if they'd rather produce comedy or suspense films.

"It's more fun to make a comedy," Kathle said. "I'd rather work with the Hudson Brothers and Sylvia Miles than intorverted, suffering types. People so desperately want to laugh. It's fun. We get all our friends into a work situation."

"It's physical comedy," Darren interjected. "We shot the repossession of an entire used car lot in the worst rain storm in California's history."

'Paperback Writer' tours fun side of Beatlemania

©1978 Chicago Sun-Times Sometimes history seems to be the process by which we take things too seriously

Take the Beatles, Please! Almost 10 years after their breakup, the Fab Four have assumed the proportions of a minor religion. A Los Angeles promoter was taken seriously (by everyone except the Beatles, that is) when he offered John, Paul, George and Ringo \$35 million or so to get together for a single worldwide telecast. Teen-agers who could barely say, "Paul is dead," in kindergarten when the Beatles called it a day now pine for a reunion. The Monty Python and the National Lampoon people have spoofed the group; "Beatlemania," the multime-

dia stage show, celebrates it.

The only thing that makes Beatle worship healthier than the Elvis craze is that to date no pretty teen-aged girl has reported being visited in the night by a dead-but-passionate moptop. And the bigbudget Hollywood version of "Sgt. Pepper" may close even this gap.

Clearly, we need an antidote to all this cultism, and we may have one in a clever, just-published book called "Paperback Writer," written by a 28-year-old Los Angeles-based rock critic named mark Shipper. Though for many the terms "rock critie" and "writer" may be antithetical, Shipper's book is a ... sure. I'll say it ..maglcal mystery tour into the wacky side of Beatlemania

"Paperback Writer" is the Beatles and their entire career as seen through a funhouse mirror. The album "Sgt. Pepper" is about...pepper! Manager Brian Epstein's ace in the hole is his great skill as....a plumber. John Lennon joins sonny and Cher in a post-Beatles supergroup called the Plastic Bono Band.

"Writer" is also a pun-filled spoof of the record and rock -review business, filled with live-talking, rump-kissing executives and pompous reviewers and deepays.

Most important, the book shows grand event that features the Beatles recording a new album called "Get Back" and playing between the Sex Pistols and Peter Frampton - just how embarrassing a Beatles reunion could be. x x x

Shipper's book was a labor of fun and fandom, It's also an all-American success story, since he initially wrote, ilustrated, designed and published it himself.

"I spent about four years trying to write a book instead of a bunch of reviews." Shipper, who's also features editor at Radio & Records magazine, explained.
"But so many rock books have come out, and they're all so boring. I was just sitting around trying ideas, and I tried this

Beatles fiction, and it worked." Shipper had interviewed John and Ringo in the course of his magazine work, but his basic credential was that he'd been a Beatles fan from way back when (favorite "The Beatles' Second Album, favorite song - "Money," favorite Beatle the "audacious" John). It took him only

six weeks to finish "Paperback Writer," in May, 1977.

"I'd followed the Beatles, and it was all just stream of consciousness. I would either take a thing that actually happened and change it, or just move things out of their time frame. I was trying to establish a concept of rock fiction which would allow me to get really crazy. By the time you get to the reunion, you know you're reading an act of fiction, but you go with it.

"Actually, the game plan was gradually to cut down on the ludicrous level as it went further and further into their career I want to gradually bring it into reality, to make the ending more real.

To do that, though, Shipper had to decide on what his ending would be. He chose to have the Beatles reunite in concert, with as the accompanying last chapter we've excerpted shows - less-than-wondrous

"Being in the music business for five years, I've watched these artists get big and then disappr overnight, and you realize how fickle the public is." Ironically, the rock world turned out to be even more fickle than Shipper had imagined, since the Sex Pistols, who denounce the Beatles from the stage just before his climatic scene, broke up before his book

could get into print.
"It p---me off," Shipper said about the
Sex Pistols' misfiring, "but the book took
about a year to publish once Grosset & Dunlap picked it up. If I was going to do it now, I'd probably use the Bee Gees instead of Frampton, because they're just as big this year as Frampton was last and just as innocent. But it shows just how fast rock and roll moves

"Paperback Writer" is only out in some parts of the country, but Shipper reports that sales are brisk enough for him to consider another, book — "about real life instead of rock and roll." He hasn't gotten a reaction from any of the Beatles, but he has some final thoughts about them

"You have to be a real fan to write a book like this, but to delfy them would be superfluous. Basically, I want people to be entertained. I really have no illusions about rock and roll being a heavy art form. Rock is good when it doesn't take itself seriously

And, just for the record, he sincerely hopes that we will just let the Beatles be and not carry on about reunions.

"I seem to cure that desire in most people. The book is definitely an exaggeration of what would really happen. I tried to make it like a bad dream, where you wake up and you say. 'I'm glad that didn't happen.

"Every year there's a new audience for rock and roll, and they don't need stars from an earlier generation to go through the motions.

"The negative mall has been mostly from people 15 and 16, saying that they had no illusions to be shattered, and they just want to see the Beattles. I say, 'Go see Beatle-mania.' Don't force these guys to make fools of themselves."

Easy rose slipping tips offered

By GEORGE ABRAHAM HOW TO SLIP A ROSE

Many gardeners often want to start a rose from a plant growing in a neighbor's bed and wonder how to do it. The eastest way to start a rose is by taking a "slip" and rooting it. This type of propagation is done by cuttings of immature wood ("greenwood") taken in summer and "hardwood" taken in late summer or fall. A piece of cutting from 3 to 6 inches long with 3 buds makes a fine rooted rose. Make the cuts with a sharp knife, close below the lower bud. Remove the bottom leaflets, leaving two upper ones. Step No. 2 is to insert the cuttings into moist soil and cover with a glass fruit iar. Some gardeners dab some mud on the inside bottom of the far to cut down on the sun. This is better than painting the bottom with black paint, as you can use the jar again for canning purposes.

It takes months to root a rose under a jar, Frequent spraying under the jars is not needed, although it's often a good idea to lift the jar as the cuttings begin to absorb moisture. A little air should be admitted to prevent mold

and functierowth.

You can slip a rose right up to October or November. If rooted later, it's necessary to leave the glass jar on all winter and remove it in spring. As soon as the cuttings have formed a good set of roots, lift them out and transplant to a good soil and water well. Shade from hot sun until the plants are well established. By the way, fruit jars do not heat up inside and burn the plants, as you would suspect

You can also bud a rose during the summer months -June, July and August. To bud, you make a T-shaped cut in the bark of the cane you want for "nursing," insert the bud inside the two flaps formed by the T cut. Wrap a piece of rubber band around it until the bud unites. It's

TO FOIL ROOT LICE

Certain plants such as lupines, shasta dalsies, and others have root lice. An organic gardener tells us she saves leaves from tea and spreads them around the roots. They repel root lice (aphids) better than anything else, she says. If this doesn't work, chemical gardeners

drench the base with diazinon or malathlon, 1 tablespoon per gallon of water

CYCLAMEN MITES

The worst pest to bother house plants is the cyclamen mite. This invisible pest attacks the most common house plants, including African violets, begonia, mums, cyclamen, dahlia, geranium, gerbera, ivy, petunia, snapdragons and dozens of others. Mites have a sucking mouthpart and during the feeding process inject a toxic chemical into the plant. Symptoms: Light infestations may cause blasting (that is, shedding of small flower huds). Leaves will twist, curl and become brittle. Flower buds may fail to open and, if they do open, they may be undersized, deformed or streaked with darker

Also look for blackening of leaf and flower buds. Leaflets will appear excessively hairy and may soon die. Other symptoms include the twisting and curling of leaves, undersized blooms and streaking of flowers.
Twisting is the result of growth distorting chemicals injected into the plant by mites. Also, if the plant tip has been destroyed, there is a destruction of a hormone (auxin) found in young growing tissue. The destruction of auxin results in the production of ethylene, which in turn causes leaf curling

Control: Kelthane (also listed as dicofol) is a good miticide, sprayed on plants at rate of 1 teaspoon to 2 quarts of water. Insecticides such as malathian are not effective against mites.

SHADE LOVERS

Still time to hook up a hanging basket for the shady part of your porch or garden. A few thankful items include: bedding begonias, can take sun or shade, waxy-leafed, 4 to 18 inches tall. Good for borders, raised s, pots as well as hanging baskets. Impatiens (day plants) flowers scarlet, pink, rose, orange and white. Better for hanging baskets than begonias, but can be used with them. Lobelia, ideal for sun and light shade. Grows 4 to 6 inches tall. Sapphire is a deep blue trailing sort. Mrs. Clibran is a deep royal blue type with a white eye. Low growing plants with medium dark leaves. Of course, coleus work fine in shade and in some sun. Too much sun may cause the leaves to blanch out, although some varieties will tolerate direct sun.

F.E. of Burley: "This year we put in some gloriosa" dalsies and wonder if you can tell us something about them. Are they the same as the Black Eyed Susan wildflower that grows along the road?"

The gloriosa daisy is a tetraploid form of the native wildflower which has been improved by the use of colchicine. They are much better than the native plant and make excellent perennials for cut flowers. They include flowers in pure gold with brown centers, the green-centered types and mahogany and gold blcolor, some double and semi-double golden yellow. Some blooms average 5 inches across on 3-foot stems.

Gloriosa (Rudbeckia) will bloom from seed the first season if started early. We like this item because it stands heat, poor sandy soil, drought and competition from tree and shrub roots. They need full sun. They
make line cut flowers provided they are picked when
young — it's been our experience that the larger old flowers do not last long. Gloriosa daisies have no insects or disease pests to trouble them and are worth a place in your garden.

C.E.L. of Jerome: "We never had so many squash blossoms as last year. It was a shame to waste them, Is it true the vines produce more flowers than needed?"

Yes, they produce more male blossoms than female ones. Why not eat the extra blossoms (male ones, there are about 20 males to 1 female blossom on the vines.)
These false or male blooms can be distinguished from the female since the "she" blossom has a small nub at the base, and male flowers don't. Soak the blossoms in salt water to remove any insects, drain, and dip in batter made from 1 egg, 2 tablespoons flour, salt, pepper and finely chopped parsley. Fry in deep fat or oil until brown. Let drain on absorbent paper and serve.
Or you can make squash blossom soup. Use a good

beef stock, bring to boil and add the blossom petals whole or cut into pieces. Boll for 20 minutes. Blossoms keep their nice light-yellow color and are tasty.

Young: rebel image is his way of living

CountryStyle News Service NASHVILLE — With Steve Young — a performer with a mold of his own — the

rebel image is a way of life. He considers it social, political and historical — and has for a long time.

"I-still have rebellious streaks in me, although they may be more subdued than they were in Confederate Lt. John Pelham, a young artillery officer who was killed in 1863," declares the "new breed" entertainer who is one of the most-admired by his peers.

Mediums have told Young he has lived

"many, many lives," and he believes this has had its influence on his brand of music.

Those rebellious streaks are still there," he told CountryStyle in the office of Robert Bray, president of Celebrity Management, Inc., Nashville.

"But what's more, there's feeling - and intensity. Music is my release. It's my way of expressing (either by writing or singing) what's going on in life.

"What I write about most is the South — the Southern United States. Now I may write about other things. I'm not saying I'm gonna do that forever but this is one ofmy main things. It's my influence ... the way I play and sing is all Southern. It's based on gospel, blues, early rock — all this stuff came from the South.

Sometimes the South is a state of mind. As a kid, I was fascinated by Southern folk songs — John Henry, and things like that." But to really understand Steve Young —

whose voice travels from a clear falsetto whose voice travels from a clear insertion to a bluesy growl (and he uses it with a skill and intelligence) — you have to understand his studies of reincarnation. And what they mean to him.

Let's regress a few years with the man

who feels he was born to die a rebel:
Tuesday, March 17, 1863. Battle of
Kelly's Ford, Virginia. Moving with skill across the brush covered valley surround-ing Wheatley's Farm, the Confederates rush forward to beat back Federal calvary who have advanced across the Rappananock.

Dashing 24-year-old John Pelham, an uncanny cannonier who never lost a gun in 60 battles and felt a bullet was never meant for him, falls fatally wounded on the blood-soaked battlefield. One of Robert E. Lee's top lieutenants — a close pal and fighting companion of Jeb Stewart - was

fighting companion of Jeb Stewart — was mourned as a here throughout the South. Circa 1952. City Library, Gadsden, Alabama. A young, dark-haired boy — nearly 11 — pours over a faded old copy of 'Lee''s Lieutenant's, 'Vol. 2'. As ite gently fingers the eracked yellow pages, his eyes command "ST-O-P" as he reaches the somewhat faded portrait of John Pelhām. Again and again, he starses at the nane-

Again and again, he stares at the page as if he could see himself behind the lines

"When I came to this picture; something leaped out at me," Young told CountryStyle. He was silent for a moment, then added: "It almost took my breath

At the time he whispered to himself in awe: "There is something about this pleture that concerns me. I don't know what it is, or what it means. But it is like this man's face is a mask - and behind that mask there is something that is about me. It concerns me."

That's all he thought. He didn't know about the reincarnation theory, he was to

March 1, 1978, Interview at 1300 Division St. Nashville, Tenn. It's a breezy Wednes-day afternoon, and a cup of coffee took the chill out of his bones. The time was 4:10 p.m. Steve Young was recalling that he was born to die a rebel, and that that influence would guide his musical career

today. Calmly, he lighted a cigaret and watched patiently as a tape recorder was set up and a camera adjusted. Then proceeded to tell his story:

"I grew up in a backroads Baptist church in Gadsden, Ala.," he sald without hesitation. "I hadn't even heard of the

word reincarnation. I just had a feeling.
"Before that, when I was just a little child, I would have what you almost would call daydreams or visions of these Confederate troops. This was even before I went to school — or had read about the

"I remember getting in an argument once with my Grandfather who was sort of an illiterate man from the backwoods of Georgia. He called it the 'Silver War.

"I said, 'No. It was called the C-I-V-I-L He got in an argument, you know.

This little kid was telling him what something was called. He got mad at me. "In later years," he recounted, "I discovered that Pelham was, in fact, born and burled in a town about 20 miles from Gadsden - Jacksonville, Ala."

Shortly after he was 30, Young visited a 'medium" - "but not one of those who sits around with a crystal ball; she sits there and talks to you, just like we are talking now."

He identified the Nevada, Calif., medium as Betty Bethard, and said, "I observed her. They have to show me something for me to say, 'Yeah. I trust

She was most interested in my life in ancient Egypt," he said. "But I wanted to know about the Civil War life. She said that was the most recent — the brief life. It was a violent life. But she also talked about many, many lives during the four readings

many, many lives during the four readings.
I had with her over the years."
The medium, he recalled, advised him to "forget about the last life," because — she said — "the union was meant to be held together, and you were trying to change it by violence, and that was wrong."
"I said, 'It doesn't matter if it was right

or wrong, I want to know about it.'

or wrong, I want to know about it.

"Finally, she said 'O.K.' She must have
done a 15-minute rap on tape. She
described the age this man went into described the age this hard well in military, the state he was buried in, the age he died, his psychological makeup, and same of the people around him.

"So, being a Civil War buff, I got to wondering if I could find out just who she

was talking about, I moved to Tennessee later, and the old library in Franklin had a rare book on the life of John Pelham." He continued:

Of course, I knew about Pelham, but this book went into more details ... said he was 18 when he entered the military, and 24 when he died.

"Every detail she put down on her rap fit this man. I put it together with my knowledge. You see, she also talked about people—like—Jeb—Stewart, ...Stonowall Jackson.

"I asked her, 'What is my relationship to Jeb Stewart, historical character?' This medium knows nothing about the Civil

war.
""She said, 'Well, you were brothers.' I
thought to myself, 'That's not right.' But
she said, 'I don't mean blood brothers, I mean as 'brothers.'

"And that's exactly what the rela-tionship between Jeb Stewart was. I felt closer to Stewart than anybody. Stewart thought more of Pelham than anybody. Steve — who began as a street singer in Birmingham and Montgomery — is known

for both his singing and his songwriting. His songs have been recorded by such stars as Waylon Jennings, Joan Baez, Rita

Coolidge and Ian Matthews. He has played a variety of musical styles — folk, country, blues and even rock and roll, all shown to great advantage on his RCA albums "Renegade Picker" 'No Place To Fall." His latest single is "Don't Think Twice."
