

# Sen. Church: 'This is not a frivolous trip'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — China is unhappy over the form of the newly enacted Taiwan legislation but appears willing to get on with the business of solidifying the U.S.-China relationship, Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said Friday.

Church, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, heads a delegation that left Friday for a visit to China.

In an interview before leaving, Church said the legislation "which

creates an institute to carry on unofficial relations with the nationalist Chinese — and Peking's opposition to it — "is one of the questions we hope to discuss in Peking."

"I think we can demonstrate we did not break any pledge President Carter made during the negotiations," he said. "They are unhappy, but by inviting us they seem to want to get on with developing the relationship."

Church noted that Peking leaders

have invited a number of members of Congress and U.S. businessmen to visit the country — a fact suggesting China wants to pursue the new relationship.

Two other congressional delegations in addition to Church's foreign relations group are heading for Peking during the Easter recess.

One is led by Rep. Melvin Price, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, and the other is a House delegation that was in Beijing headed by House Democratic

leader Jim Wright of Texas before he withdrew from the trip Thursday.

Incidentally, former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, whom the Chinese respect as an early architect of the new American China policy, plans to be traveling in Asia and China in late April and early March.

President Carter earlier this week signed the Taiwan Relations Act, which Peking has denounced as "unacceptable" and said it would harm Sino-American relations.

The Chinese have three main

objections to the legislation:

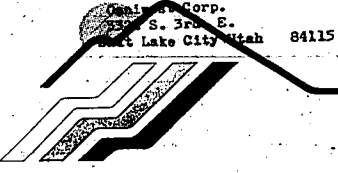
- Security safeguards for Taiwan which provide for continuing arms supplies and declare that any attack on the island would be "of grave concern" to the United States.
- Provision allowing Taiwan to retain control of its diplomatic buildings in Washington.
- A legal definition making clear Taiwan is the government which the United States once recognized as the "Kuff" of the Republic.

Church was pressed at a news

conference Thursday to justify the trip at a time when Carter has appealed for energy conservation.

"We never thought of questioning the propriety of the trip at the beginning of a broad new relationship with the giant of Asia. We believe the trip will be very useful and we have been encouraged by the government to make it," Church said.

"This is no frivolous trip, and the inclination of the press to place such a coloration on it has no justification whatever," he declared.

## First strike inside Lusaka by Rhodesians

LUSAKA, Zambia (UPI) — Rhodesian commandos, attacking in camouflage, kept under cover of darkness, Friday struck inside the Zambian capital of Lusaka for the first time, burning to the ground the home of black guerrilla leader Joshua Nkomo.

Hospital sources said the commandos killed 10 men guarding Nkomo's house and wounded at least 12 others.

A Rhodesian army communique also announced that black Rhodesian troops destroyed the ferry at Kazungula — the point where Rhodesia, Zambia, Botswana and South West Africa converge.

Zambia's radio broadcast orders for all men with military training to report for duty to the army.

A Rhodesian military spokesman refused to say whether the purpose of the Good Friday attack, the first time Rhodesian troops have struck openly at the capital of a neighboring country, was to kill Nkomo.

Nkomo, who apparently was not at home, later told a rally of supporters

in front of the still smoldering ruins of his spacious house that the Rhodesian raid had intended to kidnap him back to Salisbury.

"But it failed and the (Rhodesian) regime is going to pay very heavily for what it has done," he said, clenching his fist. "The Patriotic Front is going to punish those savages."

The raid opened with an explosion that blacked out most of the city's lights. The commandos rampaged through the city for about three hours before withdrawing shortly before dawn without suffering any apparent losses except for a Land Rover abandoned in flames in front of a Zambian cabinet minister's house.

## Manhunt continues

KAMPALA, Uganda (UPI) — Scholar Youssef Lule was sworn into office as president to replace Idi Amin Friday as undercover commando squads combed Uganda to seek out the deposed dictator for a trial sure to end at the gallows.

Cheers, applause and drum rolls greeted Lule's inauguration at Parliament Square, draped with Uganda's colors of black, white and yellow. But he pledged a return to the rule of law, there were a number of reports of bloody retribution carried out by Tanzania's troops against the remnants of Amin's army.

The Tanzanians who routed Amin's army and captured his capital to put Lule in office sent their out-of-uniform commando squads into eastern and northern Uganda in the search for Amin. Amin was last reported in the vicinity of Jinja, 40 miles east of Kampala, with about 500 loyal troops.

Kampala has been stripped bare by looters since it was captured at dawn Wednesday. The pillage of homes, shops and offices began to die out Friday. Tanzanian soldiers patrolled the city in armored personnel carriers to keep the peace.

Lule wore a blue safari suit and checked a two-foot-long bible as he took the oath of office from Uganda's chief justice, who was sweating in the hot tropical sun under his heavy British-style wig and robes.

## South Africa wants apology

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) — South Africa angrily said Friday that the United States should apologize for spying on the white regime, not retaliate by expelling Pretoria's diplomats in Washington.

"We find it incomprehensible that the government of a great nation could react in this particular way," said Foreign Minister R.E. Botha.

He was reacting to the news that the United States had ordered South Africa's two top-ranking military attaches to leave Washington within one week — a diplomatic slap paralleling the South Africans' expulsion of three Americans.

Relations between the two nations plummeted to a new low Friday as the "spy plane incident" caused shock waves in the diplomatic communities of both capitals.

Police kept a heavy guard around the U.S. Embassy plane that allegedly had been used for espionage.

## From Jerusalem to New Jersey . . .

Christian pilgrims crowded the narrow streets of old Jerusalem Friday on the path Jesus Christ took to his crucifixion 2,000 years ago. A U.S. procession followed a modern-day Way of the Cross — through a crime-blighted New Jersey community.

Christians the world over held Good Friday observances, mourning the crucifixion of Christ in preparation for Easter's celebration of his resurrection.

In Jerusalem, brown-robed monks led pilgrims from Antonia Fortress, site where Jesus was sentenced by Pontius Pilate, to the sprawling Crusader's Church of the Holy Sepulcher, which covers the traditional site of Christ's crucifixion and burial. Many pilgrims carried crosses along the route.

Thousands of pilgrims gathered before shrines in gloomy, candle-lit recesses of the church. Outside, police fought to control the crowds.

In Jersey City, N.J., parishioners of All Saints Church held a procession through their neighborhood, re-enacting the 14 Stations of the Cross at sites of violent crime.

About 200 people followed a man dressed as Christ as he walked barefoot through the city's Lafayette section. The 14 stops — coinciding with events in Christ's passion — included sites of recent murders and muggings. The station marking the crucifixion was the house of an 84-year-old woman who was bound, gagged, beaten and murdered in her home in February.

Pope John Paul II carried a cross around Rome's ancient Coliseum in a traditional Good Friday observance.

In the Philippines, a 29-year-old man was nailed to a cross in the town of San Pedro Cutud. Tourist mobs turned the bloody holy week rite into a rowdy carnival complete with colored balloons.

This was the first year that Easter and coincidental Jewish Passover holidays were celebrated with Israel at peace with Egypt.

In Jerusalem, men and women bore wooden crosses on their shoulders at the head of groups of Christians from around the world. They chanted prayers in Latin and in their native tongues as they halted at each of the 14 stations along the Via Dolorosa — the "street of sorrows" that marks the route believed followed by Christ with his cross.

Black-bereted Israeli artillery troops with M-16 rifles and khaki-clad Arab policemen with holstered pistols on their hips guarded the processions along the ancient pathway of the Bible leading to the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, the huge gray stone guardian of Golgotha on Calvary.

There was no violence. The tourist attractions of the Arab old city, annexed by Israel in 1967, have been a favorite target of Palestinian guerrillas.

"To have walked on the path that Christ walked when he was crucified on a Good Friday was a very moving experience," said Joanne Rogers, 26, a ballet dancer from San Francisco.

She was one of an estimated 60,000 Christians who came to the Holy Land to celebrate the Easter season.

The uphill path to the church — the final five Stations of the Cross are in the edifice — wound through a gaudy bazaar where shops displayed T-shirts, brass crucifixes, olive-wood camels and hand-painted saucers.

"Business is terrible. It's always this way on Good Friday," said Mahmoud Ramadan Arnele, the owner of the St. Simon's store near the third station.

A phalanx of 30 brown-robed Franciscan friars led the main procession from the Antonia Fortress, the traditional site of Christ's sentencing by Pontius Pilate, to the sprawling stone church. Arab ushers in flowing blue robes with gold embroidery and carrying wooden staffs preceded them in clear a path.

## Attorneys still investigating potato industry

TWIN FALLS — Once again a team of U.S. Justice Department attorneys has visited Idaho to gather information for their ongoing investigation into the potato industry.

Justice Department Anti-trust Division Chief Ken Anderson confirmed Friday four attorneys from his division conducted extensive interviews this week among growers, bargaining organization officials and others in the Idaho potato industry. Anderson said the interviews conducted on three days "were generally related to our investigations of testimony and pricing information from as far back as 1971, from 60 Idaho potato packers, shippers, nearly every processing firm and Potato Growers of Idaho, a bargaining organization that represents 1,000 growers."

Walker said "an immense cross-section" of potato growers, some shippers and former processing company employees were interviewed by Justice attorneys this week.

Justice Department attorneys also came to Idaho last June to question officials of the potato industry and grower organizations.

Walker, a bargaining expert who represented PGI in a recent bargaining lawsuit against Oro-Ida Co. of Boise and has helped draft bargaining legislation for the potato industry, said he was questioned by Justice Department attorney James Phillips in Twin Falls Wednesday.

Walker said Phillips asked him about "communications" and "how potatoes are marketed and what factors influence pricing."

Walker said the attorney also asked how important pre-season contracts are, how those contracts affect a grower's ability to get financing and how open market sales may affect prices.

Although Phillips didn't tell him how the information Walker provided will be used, Walker said, "One has to assume if the information is of value it will be used in the grand jury investigation."

Tom McClain, former vice president in charge of bargaining at PGI and a member of the Idaho Potato Commission and National Potato Board, said he was contacted by telephone by the attorneys. McClain said he was told there will be hearings in the future, and he would be contacted.

## Guardsmen claim control of Esteli

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — National Guardsmen Friday claimed to have restored government control of Esteli, but refugees streaming out of the beleaguered provincial capital said fighting raged for the sixth consecutive day.

"The big thing now is the flooding," said Fred Lueders, planning officer for the Alabama civil defense department. Elsewhere, the anti-Somoza newspaper La Prensa said guerrilla units in other parts of the country had been ordered to harass military patrols and installations. The order was apparently designed to spark a new nationwide offensive to overthrow Somoza, who is vacationing in the United States.

Hughes said the Pickens County town of Reform lost its water system Friday. The town's water supply was cut off by a flood that overtopped an embankment into the town's reservoir. He said National Guard trucks were hauling water in tanks to Reform residents.

Refugees said water and electricity were restored to some sectors of the city and communications also were established.

In the capital of Managua, the Guard placed all police on alert following a series of attacks against police stations and other government installations. The national radio called on all troops to "defend the capital and the national Guard" and be prepared to repel any aggression.

The Alabama Power Company said flood waters are rising in the upper Coosa River at Gadsden, Weiss, Henry and Logan Martin Reservoirs should take measures to protect their property.

"The fighting is from barricade to barricade," said a young guardsman as he stepped off a military jeep at a gas station in the village of La Trinidad, 10 miles from Esteli where

President Anastasio Somoza was in the United States on a family vacation. He planned to return to the country Monday, officials said.

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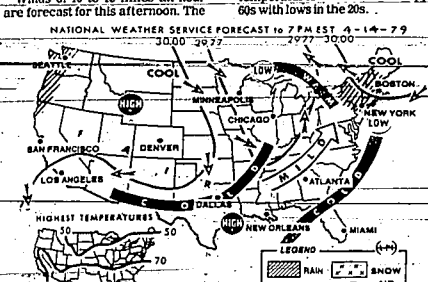

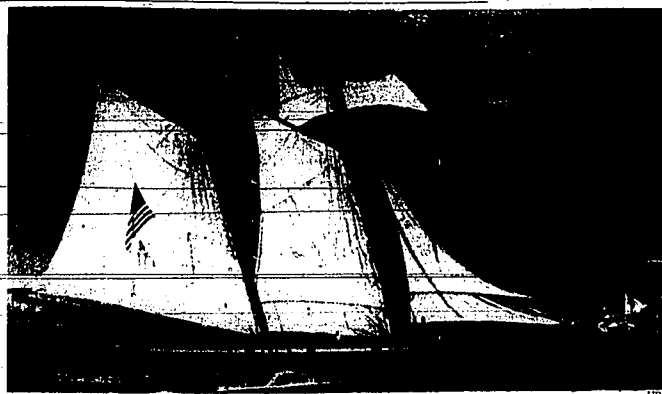

## All hands safe on schooner

BALTIMORE (UPI) — The Bicentennial schooner Pride of Baltimore, feared lost at sea, ran aground in Delaware Bay Friday but was reported anchored and pumping water from its hold from a small leak early this morning.

All 11 hands aboard the craft were reported safe. Shortly before 11 p.m., the clipper, which is the City of Baltimore's floating goodwill ambassador, reported it had struck a 14-foot bank shoal in the middle of the bay 125 miles from Cape May, N.J.

The ship was taking on water and Captain Charles Whitcomb feared it might start to break up, the Coast Guard said.

Coast Guard helicopters and vessels were dispatched to the scene shortly after the first distress call was received.

The vessel ran aground only seven hours after Whitcomb radioed the Cape May Coast Guard station to say the vessel had been blown 200 miles off course by two storms.

The radio message ended a three-day air search that began after the Pride was overdue docking at Norfolk, Va., on Tuesday.

Before its disappearance, the 136-foot wooden vessel was last heard from April 5 when it left Wilmington, N.C., for the 300-mile trip to Norfolk.

When there was no word from the vessel, the Coast Guard initiated an intensive air search Wednesday.

## TWA jet may not have rolled over completely

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A preliminary analysis of data from a TWA jet forced down in Detroit last week indicates the plane may not have made a barrel roll as previously thought, the Federal Aviation Agency said Friday.

FAA spokesman Fred Farrar said the Boeing 727 made up to two deep banks, but the aircraft's wings apparently never actually completed a full 360 degree sweep.

"So far, it looks like the plane took a couple of steep banks — one to left and then one to the right," he said.

He said the plane might have repeated another left-to-right action, but the preliminary analysis "suggests that it might not have rolled over."

The initial finding came from analysis of the Flight Data Recorder, which provides information about a plane's speed, altitude and direction. A second device — the cockpit voice recorder — was blank.

Capt. Harvey "Hoot" Gibson brought the New York-Minneapolis flight down in Detroit April 4 after the unexpected aerobatics over Flint, Mich. Only three of the 87 persons aboard received minor injuries.

A National Transportation Safety Board spokesman, meanwhile, said the plane will be flown in a day or two from Detroit to a TWA maintenance area in Kansas City.

Spokesman Brad Dunbar announced plans for a limited airborne test of the yaw damper, a device that helps control the aircraft's direction.

An alarm during the flight indicated a possible yaw damper malfunction.

He said the safety board, aided by manufacturer Boeing, also will use a computer to simulate "what the craft will do under the conditions at the time of the incident" when different things go wrong.

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## Final process of shutdown begins at Three Mile Island

By EDWARD ROBY HARRISBURG, Pa. (UPI) — The final process to bring the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant to a safe, cold shutdown was started Friday. Federal nuclear experts said they did not know how long it would take.

Until the final cooling process began at 10 a.m., scientists and engineers had implemented pre-cooling steps that involved removing potentially explosive gases from the nuclear reactor to prevent a dangerous release of radiation.

Victor Stello, director of the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission's Division of Operating Reactors, said

the NRC had authorized plant owner Metropolitan Edison Co. to use a steam generator to draw off heat from the water in the reactor's overheated cooling system.

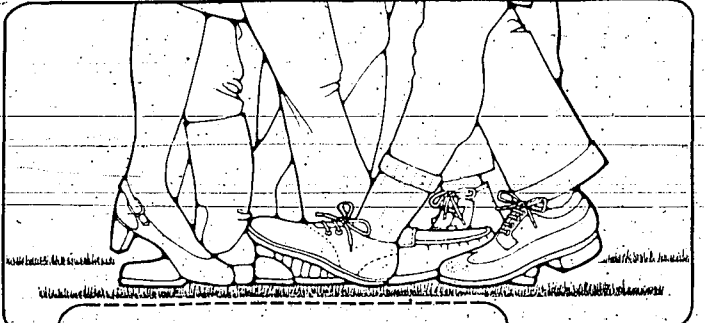
Meanwhile, still jittery south-central Pennsylvanians became alarmed Friday when an erroneous report aired on a Philadelphia television station (WKBS) said there was a danger of a catastrophic meltdown at Three Mile Island.

The ABC news bulletin was contained in a two-week delayed broadcast of the soap opera, "The Edge of Night," that was not edited from the program.

"It was an unfortunate mistake. I can do nothing but apologize," said station General Manager Kenneth MacDonald. Calls flooded the office of Gov. Dick Thornburgh and other officials, and the station made repeated corrections on the air.

At his Middletown briefing, Stello said the temperature in the reactor dropped 18 degrees to 282 degrees fahrenheit between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. Friday and was expected to be reduced about 10 degrees per hour.

The steam plan ultimately will drop the core temperature to about 230 degrees.

## Be Fair response Busy week for T-N's critics

A Times-News editorial on March 19 concerning a Jerome couple's attempt to avoid paying taxes by depleting their farm is such a case as a Be Fair question this week.

A reader took exception to a line in the editorial that said, "the clamor against paying taxes usually springs from the novel and false claim by some that taxation is unconstitutional."

The reader writes, "I'm not willing to take your word on that matter. . . . If not the Times-News' word, will the U.S. Constitution do?"

In Article 1 Section 8 of the Constitution says: "The Congress shall have the power to lay and collect taxes. . . ."

## How meaty is the beef issue?

It isn't exactly a boycott. It's more of a suggestion. But whether westerners will listen is questionable.

The suggestion comes in the form of the so-called beefless Wednesday, as declared by the New York City Department of Consumer Affairs recently. The thinking behind this campaign is to suggest to consumers that cutting down a bit on beef purchases will help keep the domestic food expenses down.

The specific plan is to get people to stay away from beef at least one day of the week, and Wednesday has been chosen as that day.

The declaration has some merit, but the fact that it has its roots in New York doesn't add any to its appeal to westerners. Some western officials have already shown overt hostility to the plan. For example, the governor of Montana already has asked for beef-producing states to stage their own boycott by encouraging firms not to schedule conventions for New York City.

One big question about the New York plan is what will be substituted if a person does refrain from eating beef. Many of the other meats are just as high in price. Can you expect a major part of the population to take up vegetarianism?

And then, one can always fast for a day. That would surely cut down on costs, not to mention waistlines. An honorable, rational alternative, but not too realistic in a country where apple pie is mentioned side by side with the flag in the same slogan.

We've been down the meat boycott road before, of course, and the effect hasn't been too overwhelming. The boycott paradox is such that the price usually goes up because of it, not down, and since there is increased demand for alternatives, the prices on those items usually

go up, too.

It has been suggested by many economists that bearing with the high beef prices now, and continuing to buy beef on a regular basis will eventually lead to a stabilization of the prices, or perhaps even a decline. The thinking here is that stocks will be built up because of the increased demand, and the resulting increased supply will keep the prices down.

That theory is not too easy to buy when shelling out the gold at the cash register, as any grocery buyer knows. The prices are expected to get much worse before they get better and perhaps it would be wise for many people to consider alternatives they can afford in the interim. One doesn't have to consider it as a dictate from New York City, but only as a better way to get along in these inflationary times.

Consider the Agriculture Department's forecast that the average price of hamburger could be around \$1.60 per pound this summer, well above the \$1.11 average price of 1978. In February of this year, hamburger prices averaged \$1.47 per pound.

Those prices are pretty hard to swallow, and we are expected to keep buying so that the prices will go down. The more we buy, they say, the more the chances that the prices will stabilize. It's supply-and-demand in reverse.

It all boils down to the individual's choice, of course, and at least the beefless Wednesday plan may get some other persons thinking along the lines of a diet with less of an emphasis on meat.

Whether beef producers like it or not, the fact remains that there are other worthy foods in the market, and Americans should be encouraged to consider them as additions to one's diet. A healthier attitude toward what one puts in one's mouth can only result.

## Did Fonda do it?

WASHINGTON — I am very unhappy to see that the nuclear accident in Harburg has turned into an ideological battle between the conservatives and the liberals in the United States. The conservative forces seem to be rallying their troops FOR nuclear energy while the liberals are ready to go into the streets to stop any more nuclear reactors from being built.

It seems to be boiling down to one question: Was Fonda responsible for everything that happened at the Three Mile Island plant?

As far as I can tell from reading conservative and liberal columnists, as well as talking to people across the American political spectrum, the conservatives insist we have to pay a price for cheap energy even if it means the danger of an accident that could irradiate a few hundred thousand people.

The liberals hate nuclear energy because they believe in their hearts that the people who are producing it don't know what the hell they're doing.

Of course, the main factor in the

argument is how far you are located from a nuclear reactor plant. There are many Americans who live near a plant and are selfish about this country's energy needs. They don't seem willing to sacrifice themselves so that other people, hundreds of miles away can be assured that their toasters and electric coffee makers will work.

The citizens who live near a nuclear plant are not necessarily conservatives or liberals. They just want to live on their lives like everybody else. Unfortunately, they can't appreciate that with any form of electricity there is a tradeoff, and it's impossible to have cheap nuclear power without a few noxious gases, an occasional hydrogen bubble, a meltdown, and possibly an explosion which could make one or two states uninhabitable for 50 or a hundred years.

But this country has thrived on the philosophy of the greatest good for the majority of its citizens. The people who live within irradiating distance of a nuclear plant are only spilling it for everybody else by griping about having their homes located so near an electrical power-producing system

which has brought so much happiness and convenience to their fellow Americans.

Several conservative columnists have been quick to point out that no energy system is entirely safe. They cite accident statistics in coal mines, automobile crashes on highways and gas explosions as the price we have to pay for living in the most modern of all industrial societies. They ask what the alternatives are to nuclear power, and then conclude there are none. If someone forgets to open a water-cooling valve, so be it—that's the way the nuclear reactor crumbles.

The liberals keep pointing toward the sun. They are not willing to accept the practicalities of the world we live in. They refuse to believe the "assurances" of other government "experts" or spokesmen from our great private power companies that nuclear energy is the safest, cheapest and most efficient form of power.

I can go further way on nuclear energy, depending how the wind is blowing.

## Northwest and TMI

WASHINGTON — The nuclear accident at Three Mile Island in Pennsylvania seems to have been one of those events so loaded with surprise that it has shifted public opinion and thus re-defined the parameters of certain public debates.

It appears the accident will have major impact on how the Northwest energy bill will be debated in Congress. Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., reintroduced the legislation last Thursday.

Sitting in front of the horseshow-shaded dais of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, of

which he is chairman, Jackson was asked whether the Three Mile Island accident would affect his bill, which contains a provision for the federal government to underwrite construction of nuclear plants in the Northwest.

"Not at all," Jackson said. "Nuclear power in the Northwest will be a matter for local legislation."

But the Pennsylvania accident has forced the nuclear power joker out of the Northwest energy deck of cards, and many will be intent upon moving it to the discard pile.

Listen to what these Washington

state congressmen said last week: "To the extent that the bill is perceived as a nuclear plant bill, it hurts the bill," said freshman Rep. Mike Lowry.

"Let's not kid ourselves," said Rep. Ned Dorn. "It's going to be a factor in discussion of that legislation. If opponents of the Northwest energy legislation can portray the bill as one to build nuclear power plants, it's to their advantage."

Jackson, at his press conference Thursday, dwelt on the aspects of the bill which encourage development of conservation programs and renewable energy resources within the region. Indeed, that is the bill's creative thrust.

## Now it's time to see "The China Syndrome"

There's a small stack of books on my desk which I haven't read. You probably haven't read them either. None has made the best-seller list or been turned into a movie.

One of them is called "We Almost Lost Detroit." The inside of the dust jacket says: "This is the documented, true account of what happened on the afternoon of October 5, 1968, when the control panel inside the Enrico Fermi atomic reactor near Detroit, Mich., suddenly registered high radiation levels, and the plant site by the police, is the blood chilling, minute by minute account of that near disaster."

Another is called "The Silent Bomb — a Guide to the Nuclear Energy Controversy." And the front of that dust jacket says: "A nuclear plant accident could kill 50,000 people, damage \$17 billion worth of property over a 600,000 square mile area, inflict

an untold number of injuries and genetic mutations — it could happen today!"

And still another is called "The Menace of Atomic Energy." And another is called "Never Mind, you get the idea."

One of the reasons I haven't read them is that, like most people, I didn't believe the danger existed. Or if it did exist, I assumed the alarmists were exaggerating it's potential.

When my TV brought me the protestors somewhere in New England being carried away from a nuclear power plant site by the police, I assumed they were just protest-addicts left over from the anti-war and civil rights movements, who were looking for something to wave a placard at.

And when a friend of mine, who sometimes fretted about nuclear plants, would begin preaching to me about their potential danger, I would

say: "If they're so dangerous, how come they're not blowing up?" That seemed like a reasonable response. The anti-war movement had made sense to me because I could see a peaceful, botched-up war going on. The civil rights movement was real because I could see the alums and knew about the lynchings. But I couldn't get swept up in a fear of nuclear power plants blowing up or splattering me with radiation, if they weren't blowing up or splattering. They were just sitting their quietly humming out their power, so why get excited?

Besides, I have a non-technical mind. Every time I began wading through a New York Times article on the subject, I'd become so bogged down in the nuclear jargon and the long federal titles of the people and agencies being quoted, that I'd decide it would be better to be a mutant than to read anymore of that stuff.

Then there were the nuclear power experts and proponents. They were so reassuring in the way they talked about the safeguards, the expertise, the brilliance and the reliability of their systems. Just recently, one of the experts said that a massive study had shown that the possibility of a "meltdown" were so remote, that it couldn't happen more than once in one million years. And only the other day, that super chrome-domed journalist, George Will, did a thoroughly devastating job of pointing out the inevitable silliness of a new Jane Fonda movie called, "The China Syndrome," which is about a nuclear power plant meltdown disaster of the most terrifying kind. When he finished explaining why it couldn't happen, I decided to skip the movie. Yes, I trusted my friendly, helpful, local nuclear power plant. And I admit that I wanted to trust it, especially with the Arabs goosing the

price of our oil-produced energy every time their mad minds twitched.

Because now the terrifying words aren't coming from the dust-jackets of worst-selling scare-books about what might happen. This time the thrilling plot hasn't been something that came out of the mind of a science fiction writer.

I'm embarrassed by my gullibility. I should have known that if there are pillars of society businessmen willing to kill off rivers and lakes for their own bottom line, and others willing to fill their employees' lungs and blood streams with strange industrial additives, then it was inevitable that someone could come along who would give us a berserk nuclear power plant.

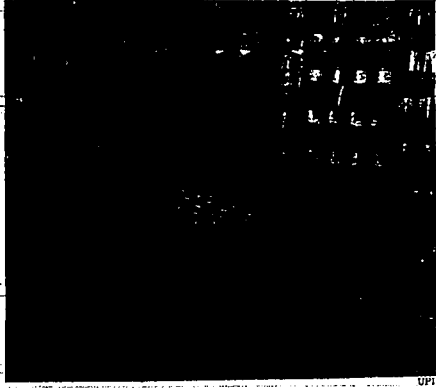
So if a cloud doesn't drift in from Pennsylvania and fry my brain first, I'm going to read all of these books I should have read a long time ago.

And I'm sorry, George Will, but I'm going to see that silly movie, too.

"I find advance purchase authority for nuclear plants an impossibility," he said. Weaver, incidentally, is the only Northwesterner sitting on the Water and Power Subcommittee of the House Interior Committee, which will work on the energy bill.

It is perhaps incorrect to portray Jackson and Weaver as being at opposite ends of the spectrum on this legislation, because Jackson and his aides emphasize that the Washington senator is only committed to getting a Northwest energy bill out of this session of Congress, not necessarily to an energy bill that contains provisions that would further enhance development of nuclear power in the region.

Barmaid Julia Gluesing and part of the stash

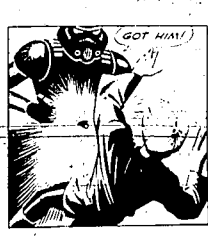
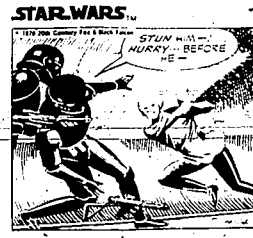
**MACKINAC ISLAND, Mich. (UPI)** — Barkeeper Dennis Brodeur has to get rid of his winter stash of 30,000 empty beer cans before the horses return to this resort island where automobiles are banned.

Brodeur began storing the cans in the island livery stable after he tired of hauling them across the lee to the mainland in his snowmobile — a 4-mile trip — to reclaim the deposits mandated by a new statewide ban on throwaway beverage containers.

In past years, he has simply dumped the beer cans from his Mustang-Lounge in the island garbage pit which generally fills up by the start of spring thaw.

The unclaimed cans are worth \$3,000, with a 10-cent deposit on each.

## Mondales arrive in Norway

**MUNDAL, Norway (UPI)** — Vice President Walter F. Mondale Friday arrived at his ancestral home, nestled at the end of the Fjaerland fjord, for an Easter weekend of fishing, hiking and visiting with relatives.

Norway is the second stop for Mondale and his wife Joan on their tour of Nordic countries and the Netherlands. It is his second trip to Norway, and for him a homecoming.

"I don't know many of you, but all of your faces are familiar," he said in a greeting ceremony on the dock at Mundal, where admirers and relatives from up and down the valley had gathered in the steady rain to welcome him.

"We love this place. In the White House, in my office, thirty feet from the president of the United States, you will see two beautiful pictures on the wall, both of Mundal," he said.

Five-year-old Brita Mauritzen, dressed in national costume with matching green shoes, presented the smiling vice president and Mrs. Mondale with a bouquet of flowers. A crowd of wellwishers who had waited more than an hour for the boat bringing the Mondales from Bergen applauded and cheered.

The child was the granddaughter of Mondale's relative, Mrs. Borghild Dahlie Orheim, the owner of the Mundal Hotel, where the Mondales will stay.

From the dock, the Mondales walked the few hundred yards to the hotel, surrounded by townspeople delighted at seeing their famous son at closehand.

Mondale last visited Mundal, the village his great grandfather Fredrik left to journey to the United States in 1856, as a Senator from Minnesota in 1975.

"I saw him when he last came," said an old woman smiling broadly. "I had to come this time. You see my name is Mundal too."

"Hi, Walter," a group of young girls shouted in English as the vice president and his wife climbed the steps of the jonquil-colored wooden hotel where they will stay in a turret room at the front with a view of the fjord.

Mondale arrived in Bergen, Norway earlier Friday, aboard Air Force Two from Reykjavik, Iceland. He was greeted at the airport by Foreign Minister Knut Sydenlund and U.S. Ambassador Louis A. Lerner and his wife. Also on hand was the Lord Mayor of Bergen.

Following a red carpet welcome, Mondale drove to the Naval Academy along a route crowded with hundreds of well-wishers.

## Dealer's lie saves gas

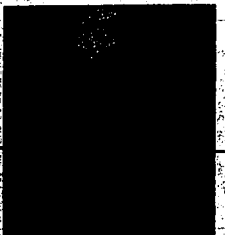

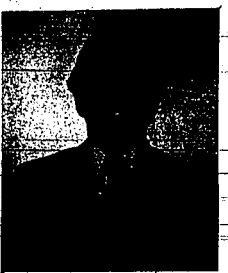

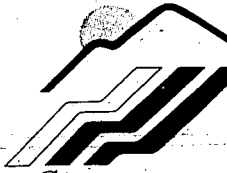

# Stadler, Sneed tied at top of Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — Craig Stadler, still seeking his first PGA victory, scorched the rain-soaked Augusta National for a 6-under-par 66 Friday that earned him a share of the second-round lead in the Masters at 135 with Ed Sneed.

Playing most of his round after a thunderstorm had caused a two-hour delay in play, Stadler birdied his first three holes and five of the first eight to reach the turn in 31, only one shot off the record set by Johnny Miller for the front nine. He then settled down with only one birdie on the back side at the 15th.

Sneed, an early morning starter, did it the other way with four birdies on the final six holes for a 67, and he then washed away the torrential thunderstorm that started minutes after he finished and which threatened to wash out his best round ever at Augusta.

Following an opening round when 10 players were bunched within two strokes, Stadler and Sneed enjoyed a three-shot margin over Ray Floyd, winner of last week's Greater Greensboro Open, and Leonard Thompson. Floyd, contending that any man on the leader board still had a good shot at the title, shot a 68 and Thompson a 70.

Both Tom Watson, the favorite, and Jack Nicklaus, a five-time Masters champion, were caught on the course by the thunderstorm and each turned in a score of 71 to remain in strong contention. Watson, who had an opening-round 68, was at 139 after 36 holes, leaving him in a tie with Joe Imman, also with a 71, and Nicklaus, who sank a 49-foot hole putt on the 14th.

Spauld Seve Ballesteros, aided by an eagle on the eighth hole, shot a 68 to stand at 140 along with Nicklaus, Lanny Wadkins, who had a 67, and Lou Graham, with a 71.

Watson, who said "I couldn't get my motor started again after the rain delay," had his only two bogeys of the day on the 14th and 17th holes. "I wasn't playing all that well before the rain and I didn't play well after it," Watson said. "I just hope this was my bad round of the tournament."

It was the other way around for Nicklaus, who had three bogeys on the front nine before giving himself a lecture. He then proceeded to birdie four of the last eight holes, and later commented, "I'm hitting the ball fine. I can find no fault with the way I'm hitting the ball. I just have to find a way to get the ball in the hole."

Only minutes after Sneed completed his second consecutive round without a bogey, he was soaked by the rain at the Augusta National, threatening to wash out all the scores that had been turned in. But following a two-hour delay, despite a continuing light rain, play was continued.

Editor Roy well may happen, but what can I do about it?" asked

Sneed when the day was darkest for him. "I've had some good rounds washed out and some bad ones, too."

Fortunately for Sneed, Friday the 13th turned out lucky for him, and his score stood.

With only a handful of players still on the course, play in the second round was suspended because of darkness shortly before 5 p.m. MST Saturday. This means the cut of the top 44 players won't be known till then.

The only player still on the course among the leaders was Miller Barber, who angled the 15th hole to be 7 under for the round at that point and 4 under for the tournament.

The third round will begin at about 9 a.m. today.

Stadler, who had five birdies on his closing seven holes Thursday, played in the Masters—twice before, both times as an amateur, and joked that his best previous finish "was in the gallery Saturday," meaning he failed to survive the cut.

He was on the eighth tee Friday when the storm hit, but said the wet course didn't bother him.

"Actually, I think I played almost better the last nine or 10 holes than I did the first eight," said Stadler, who missed only three greens all day and had a particularly hot putter working for him on the front nine.

Billy Kratzert, with a 68, and Fuzzy Zoeller, with a 71, were tied at 3-under 141, six shots off the pace.

Bruce Lietzke, the first-round leader at 67, blew up to a 75 and was at 142 along with Hale Irwin, Lanny Wadkins, Jerry Pate, Bob Byrum, Jim Simons and Australian Jack Newton.

Defending champion Gary Player, with a 72, was in a big group at 143 that also included Hubert Green, Leo Elder, Roy well may happen, Tom Kite, Andy Bean and Charles Coody.

## NBA playoffs

# 76ers, Hawks wrap up their series

By United Press International Philadelphia — Los Angeles and Atlanta scored wins Friday night to clinch their preliminary playoff series in National Basketball Association action.

Phoenix played Portland in its late game on the coast.

Cabell Callahan and Darryl Dawkins combined for 43 points and 37 rebounds to pace Philadelphia to a 110-101 victory over the New Jersey Nets.

John Drew and Eddie Johnson poured in 30 points and the Atlanta Hawks fired up by the election of Coach Hubie Brown, roared back in the second half to defeat Houston 100-91 for a two-game sweep.

In the Philadelphia game, Jones scored 24 points and grabbed 21 rebounds, while Dawkins added 19 points and 16 rebounds. Both rebound totals were career playoff highs.

The 76ers will open a best-of-seven series against Central Division champion San Antonio on the road beginning Sunday.

Joies and Dawkins, who usually divide the center position, were forced to play together due to Bobby Jones' bout with the flu and Steve Mix's ankle injury. The pair completely dominated the offensive and defensive boards, continuously slamming home offensive rebounds.

With a Nets' home-record crowd of 9,128 cheering, New Jersey repeatedly attempted to whittle a Philadelphia lead which reached a maximum of 14 points eight minutes into the third quarter, but the Nets could get no closer than eight—as Julius Erving — who missed his first 10 shots from the field and hit only 7-of-21 overall — connected on three straight field goals to keep Philadelphia comfortably ahead.

Caldwell Jones scored 24 points and grabbed 20 rebounds, while Dawkins added 19 points and 16 rebounds. Both rebound totals were career playoff highs.

Erving chipped in 19 points for the 76ers while Bernard King led the Nets with 27 points. Ed Jordan added 22 and John Williams, who shot a chilly 2-of-9 from the field, had 21 for New Jersey.

After the Nets had taken a 25-22 first-quarter lead behind King's 11 points, the 76ers used their considerable depth to grab a 51-45 halftime advantage.

The Nets were leading 37-35 with 5:32 remaining in the second quarter, before an 8-0 Philadelphia surge — including six straight by reserve guard Eric Honey — gave the 76ers a 43-37 lead. Dawkins, who came into the game in the final minute of the opening quarter, scored 11 points and grabbed seven of his eight first-half rebounds in the second quarter.

King led the first-half scorers with 17 and Caldwell Jones led Philadelphia with 16. New Jersey's George Johnson led all first-half rebounders with nine.

Erving missed nine straight field goals in the first quarter and finally hit on a twisting layup with 5:54 left in the second quarter. The Nets hit all five of their first-half free throws, all in the first 2:57 of the game, while Philadelphia was 9-for-9 from the foul line.

remaining with his second technical foul within 15 seconds.

Atlanta, which has now won 17 consecutive home games, battled back to tie the game 78-78 after three periods and then dominated the Rockets in the fourth quarter.

Houston, which lost the opener at home 109-106 Wednesday night, trailed only 85-83 with 8:35 to play, but the aggressive Hawk defense held the Rockets scoreless for the next 5 1/2 minutes while Atlanta scored 11 points for a 96-83 lead.

Drew and Johnson had 25 points each, with 17 of Johnson's coming in the first period. Terry Furrow chipped in 14 of the bench.

ROBERTO, which scored only 13 points in the fourth quarter, was led by center Moses Malone with 21 points. But Malone was shut out in the final period.

Brown was ejected by referee Earl Strom with the Hawks trailing 50-46. The Rockets immediately receded off seven unanswered points for their biggest lead of the night, 57-46, and carried a six-point lead into the dressing room.

The teams swapped the lead throughout the second half before Atlanta went ahead to stay, 63-41, on Furrow's 25-footer with 9:02 remaining in the game. The Hawks outscored the Rockets 15-2 during the next 6 1/2 minutes.

Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, playing most of the second half with five fouls, scored 32 points to lead the Los Angeles Lakers to a 121-109 victory over the Denver Nuggets, tying the best-of-three NBA playoff series at one game each.

The deciding game will be played Sunday in Denver where Los Angeles has never won. The winner meets Seattle in the Western Conference semifinals beginning next week.

Abdul-Jabbar scored 14 of his points in the final period and four more in the third quarter after being assessed his fifth foul less than two minutes into the second half.

Los Angeles forward Adrian Dantley came off the bench and scored 25 points, hitting 10 of 13 shots from the field, while Jamal Wilkes added 26 points, 17 in the second half.

Guard David Thompson led Denver with 29 points and forward Tom Boswell added 19.

The Nuggets made their first eight shots of the fourth period, all on layups, but they couldn't catch the hot-shooting Lakers, who made 7 of 11 field-goal attempts in the same span. Denver closed to within 10-10 with 3:32 left, but Abdul-Jabbar, who also had 12 rebounds, hit two free throws and a dunk shot in the next 31 seconds to tie the game for the Lakers.

### Minority vows to sell

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — The minority owners of the New Orleans Jazz, drawing the battle lines between principal owner Sam Battistone, Friday vowed to sell their 30 percent interest in the NBA club if the team moves out of town.

Real estate executive Lee Schlesinger, who heads a group of local investors in the Jazz, said he would try to persuade Battistone, a Santa Barbara, Calif., fast food magnate, to keep the team in New Orleans.

"Our group doesn't want the ball club to leave," Schlesinger told reporters from his 31st-floor office above the Mississippi River. "We'll do everything within reason to keep it here."

Battistone, who owns 65 percent of the Jazz stock, this week met with officials in Salt Lake City and said he wanted to move the team from New Orleans because of scheduling difficulties in the Louisiana Superdome.

Neither Battistone nor his representative, Larry Hatfield, the president of Invest-West Inc., has returned to New Orleans to discuss the problem with Superdome city officials.

Schlesinger said the only problem the team has is with a limited amount of home playing dates next February when the Superdome is committed to two conventions.

### Sox' Fisk not disabled . . .

BOSTON (UPI) — The Boston Red Sox Friday examined ailing catcher Carlton Fisk, but declined to heed the All-Star backstop's request to be placed on the disabled list to give his injured elbow time to heal.

Fisk, who caught only once in spring training and has made only one appearance this season (as a pinch hitter) was examined by Dr. Carlo DeLuca who said the first tests for muscle strength and fatigue stress were "within normal limits."

Results of further tests performed later in the day will not be available until Friday.

### . . . but Matlack joins list

ARLINGTON, Texas (UPI) — The Texas Rangers Friday placed pitching star Jon Matlack on the 21-day disabled list, retroactive to April 8 — the date he had originally been scheduled to pitch the club's season opener.

In the final week of spring training Matlack tossed a resin bag to the ground and felt a sharp pain surge through his left elbow.

X-rays were taken of the left hander's arm and bone chips were discovered in the elbow. Earlier this week x-rays failed to reveal the bone chips and swelling has subsided. Matlack began light workouts this week and although reports have been encouraging it was decided Friday that he could not pitch for the next few weeks.

### Navratilova, Austin win

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (UPI) — Top-seeded Martina Navratilova posted a 6-1, 6-2, victory over Yugoslavian clay-court specialist Mima Jausovec Friday at the \$150,000 women's tennis tournament at Sea Pines Racquet Club.

Navratilova, saying she felt "more comfortable" on the clay courts at Sea Pines than she has in the past, had little trouble defeating Jausovec despite gusting winds and weather reports of a possible tornado.

"I'm getting confident about playing on clay," Navratilova said. "Evonne Coolidge posted a 6-4, 6-4 win over Betty Stove, continuing her comeback to competitive play after a five-month absence because of a foot injury."

"I'm going to try to go all the way," Coolidge said.

Coolidge meets Tracy Austin in today's semifinals. The second-seeded Austin used her steady baseline game to defeat Laura DuFont, 6-3, 6-4.

Navratilova meets third-seeded Kerry Reid today.

### Communists to boycott

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — The Soviet Union and four other communist countries, will boycott the eighth World Women's Basketball Championships in Seoul, but the tournament will be held later this month as scheduled, the organizing committee said Friday.

Lee Byung-he, president of the South Korean Basketball Association, told a press conference that the Soviet Union, China, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and Yugoslavia will not participate in the Seoul championships to be held April 29-May 13.

### Celts, Bird don't agree

BOSTON (UPI) — Boston Celtics general manager Red Auerbach and Bob Woolf, their attorney for Larry Bird, met Friday for two hours in what was described as an amicable negotiation session.

No real progress was reported in bridging the \$500,000-a-year gap which separates the two sides. Woolf has asked for \$1 million a year over six years while Auerbach has responded with a \$3 million offer over six years.

Bird, the college player of the year from Indiana State, is Boston's property until the June 24 draft. Woolf, however, has indicated he will give the Celtics one more month in which to wrap up contract talks.

### Alydar suffers setback

Cummet Farm's Alydar, runner-up to Affirmed in last year's Triple Crown, suffered a setback on his comeback rail Friday when he was defeated by longest shot San Juan Hill in the \$150,000-added Oaklawn Handicap at Oaklawn Park.

San Juan Hill, carrying a light 112 pounds including jockey Don Brumfield, ran the 1 1/16-mile feature in 1:43 3/5 and returned a whopping \$24.40, \$5.20 and \$3.00.

Mayor Edward Koch said proceeds from the game, which will be played at Shea Stadium, will benefit sandlot baseball. . . The White Sox will receive a player to be named later.

# Rodgers heads marathon field

BOSTON (UPI) — The numbers keep increasing. The ranks keep swelling and a record 7,800 official entrants and 2,000 pretenders will again gather Monday for the running of the 83rd Boston Marathon.

The 26-mile, 385-yard race through eastern Massachusetts last year drew 4,674 official entrants, which was also a record and 1,000 more than the year before. And the numbers keep ballooning.

"We're going to have to sit down with the numbers and see how it goes this year," said Marathon director Will Cloney, who expects 10,000 runners and joggers and the usual multi-million spectators who watch the race from Hopkinton to downtown Boston.

"They say we're becoming elitist. Well how can

you be elitist with 7,800 runners," he said. "Every runner wants to run Boston. It's like the Masters Golf Tournament. Every golfer wants to play in that, but not every one does."

Defending champion Bill Rodgers, who set the course mark in 1975 and was 18 seconds off his record pace in winning last year, leads the star-studded field. Rodgers, 31, a former school teacher and now successful sportswear entrepreneur, is the 24 choice in the first-ever odds listed for the prestigious race.

Last year, there were 20 runners in the field who had run a marathon in 2:20 or less. This year there are 90, an unequalled assemblage of talent in the history of the event.

Cloney predicts Rodgers' 2:09:55 mark could fall if the weather conditions are right. Besides the

strong American contingent, 26 foreign countries are represented.

Seven of the top 10 finishers from 1978 are back, including Finland's Esa Tikkanen, New Zealand's Kevin Ryan, Don Kardong, a 1976 Olympian, and Randy Thomas of the Greater-Boston Track Club, a teammate and close friend of Rodgers.

Japan's Hoshihiro Seko, who won the Fukuoka Marathon in December to deprive Rodgers of road racing's Triple Crown (Boston, New York, Fukuoka), is rated by the defending champ as his toughest rival.

In addition, 1972 Olympic Gold Medalist Frank Shorter will again try to do what no man has ever done — win an Olympic Marathon and the Boston Marathon. He placed 23rd last year in his first try at Boston.

# NBC plans special to boost Olympics

NEW YORK (UPI) — Donna de Varona, an Olympic swimming gold medalist in 1964, is campaigning hard on behalf of a nationwide drive for United States Olympians April 14-21.

During Olympianath week, young people are planning special events in

many parts of the country to raise money as part of the U.S. Olympic Committee's overall drive to finance teams for this year's Pan-American Games and the Winter-Summer Olympics of 1980.

An NBC-TV special April 21 is expected to spur additional contribu-

tions. Other funds are received from contributions by private corporations.

"At the 1980 Olympics, the world is going to interpret our performances and in very political terms," says de Varona, now a television commentator. "That's why it's such a shame that we have the talent that we do and

it sometimes cannot find its way into our Olympic program."

The increase in women's sports opportunities in schools and colleges under the recent Title IX rule has made a great difference in developing talent, says de Varona, but public financial support still is needed.

## Rossman, Galindez to fight

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Mike Rossman's dad may be unsatisfied with the lack of American representation among ring officials for today's light heavyweight championship rematch with Argentinian braver Jim Galindez, but the "Jewish Bomber" says he will let his fists decide who wins the fight.

Jimmy DePiano, Rossman's father and trainer, Friday said he was unhappy the World Boxing Association designated a South African referee and two judges from Venezuela and Puerto Rico to work Saturday afternoon's nationally televised fight.

"There's nothing I can do about it," DePiano said. "I'd like to have American officials. I just hope they give us an even break."

A planned Feb. 24 Rossman-Galindez rematch in Las Vegas was aborted when the Nevada Boxing Commission tried to designate all American officials to work the fight. Galindez balked and refused to fight, leaving Rossman standing alone in an empty ring.

But Rossman, a powerful 22-year-old puncher who gained the light heavyweight title from Galindez last Sept. 15 in the Louisiana Superdome, said the referee and judges will make no difference if he does his job.

"You can't go in to a fight worrying about getting a fair shake from the officials," Rossman said. "I'll have enough trouble with Galindez. He's the guy with the gloves, but (the officials) have the pen and pads. They can steal a fight from you."

The rematch will be scored on a "10-point must" system, meaning the winner of each round is guaranteed 10 points. Last time the fight was scored on the round system, and Rossman stopped Galindez on cuts in 13.

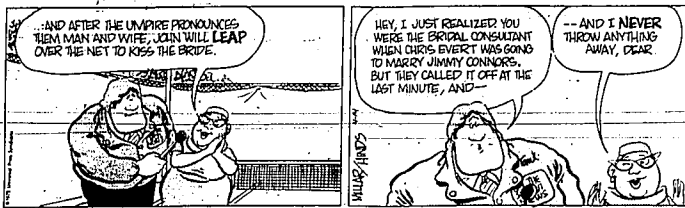

# Flyers to face surprising Canucks

The edge Philadelphia and Buffalo thought they had in the National Hockey League Stanley Cup playoffs has turned out to be the brink of disaster.

Both clubs have 1-1 records in the best-of-three preliminary round and you can't get much closer in the scoring.

The "A" Series moves back to Philadelphia today where the Flyers host the Vancouver Canucks. The Flyers, who won 4-1 Thursday night, have scored eight goals to seven for the Canucks, so there isn't much advantage in power for Philadelphia.

The Buffalo Sabres squared their series with Pittsburgh, 3-1, Thursday and entertain the Penguins in the deciding game today. Again, there's only one goal difference in the scoring with Buffalo holding a 6-5 edge.

Toronto and the New York Rangers swept their respective series 2-0. Waiting to make their 1978-79 playoff

debut are division winners Montreal, Boston, Chicago and the New York Islanders.

Philadelphia team captain Bobby Clarke fired up the Flyers in the final 54 seconds of their second game with Vancouver when he won a faceoff and passed off to Reggie Leach for the deciding goal. Clarke also was the tireless defender as he played on penalty killing shifts.

"I'm not tired," Clarke insisted after the game. "One goal can end it for you. Nobody's tired. If you win the game, it's such a big win, and when it's over, it feels as big as any we've ever won, even the ones that won the Cup."

Vancouver Coach Harry Neale urged his team not to be disappointed over the loss.

"That loss did us more good than any 50 league games," said Neale. "You have to remember a team has to win 12 or-14 games like that to win the Stanley Cup. We may be playing over our heads, but I think that's okay. I'll be very surprised if we don't give them a run Saturday."

## Record entries for Indy 500

**INDIANAPOLIS (UPI)** — The Indianapolis Motor Speedway Friday had a record 93 entries, one more than last year, and the final field of contenders for the 33 starting positions in the million-dollar "500" could reach or surpass 100.

Entries deadline prior to midnight April 15 will be accepted.

Ten additions were announced Friday, including a three-car team from Bob Wilke of Milwaukee.

More than 50 entries were received the day before, 44 of them from a group of dissident-car owners who formed their own racing group in a petty feud with the race-sanctioning United States Auto Club and threatened to run their own race in conflict with the May 27 Speedway event.

Championship Auto Racing Teams held-back all its entries for weeks, then decided to comply with the entry blank. However, CART officials said they would continue to press for rules changes — foremost, changes affecting the "boost" for the racing engines.

That falling, CART could go to court to force this and other issues, or could still decide to boycott the holiday race.

Speedway officials indicated the final field may not be determined until early next week.

# Soccer players set league strike today

WASHINGTON (UPI) — North American Soccer League teams set to play a full schedule of games tonight despite a strike called Friday by the players to pressure league owners to recognize their union.

The teams Friday began announcing plans to field "contingency" squads for tonight's games. Some players are planning to play Saturday, despite the strike, because of information they have been given by team officials.

An NASL spokesman said, "We intend to play the games — as scheduled. If it takes using contingency squads, we're prepared for that step."

NASLPA Staff Director Ed Garvey, who announced the strike Friday, said

that "to play the games is a sham on the public. These guys (the owners) will charge the full price of admission to games which are nothing more than pick-up games. I can't believe members of other labor unions will purchase tickets to watch 'scabs' play soccer."

"One team, for instance, has six players who will play but doesn't have a goalkeeper. Other teams have six or eight players. What kind of game is that? The losers probably will be asking if the games count in the league standings."

The players called the strike after their March 30 deadline for recognition of the union was ignored by league owners. The players voted, 252-113, to strike.

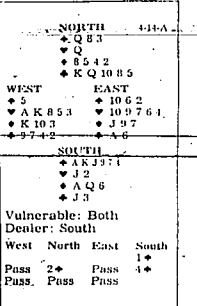
