

## Truck strike slowly making dent in market

Trucks ignoring independent truckers' demands for a shipping shutdown were targets of sniper fire Friday, the second day of a wildcat strike intended to halt commerce on the nation's highways.

Strikers blockaded truck stops and slowed or stalled highway traffic in a move to press demands for greater diesel fuel allocations, lower fuel prices and higher speed and load limits.

The shutdown, though lacking the immediate crippling effect anticipated by organizers, slowly began to make itself felt in the marketplace. Livestock industry officials in Nebraska blamed the strike for a decline in cattle prices, saying packing houses had become hesitant to make large purchases.

Truckers also won support of one farm group and gained at least one concession to their demands. A spokesman for the Nebraska chapter

of the American Agriculture Movement called on members to withhold farm products from the market to show support of the truckers' demands.

Iowa Gov. Robert D. Ray Friday endorsed a proposal that the state temporarily increase load limits on Iowa highways to alleviate "an emergency" fuel situation facing truckers.

"But I cannot change the price of fuel and that is probably the most critical problem they are facing," Ray said.

Shots were fired at a truck coming into Rapid City, S.D., Friday but no one was injured. Police said they found no direct evidence the shooting was linked to the shutdown. A spokesman for the area's Independent Truckers Association said the organization does not condone violence.

"I'll find out who fired the shots I'll turn him in myself," the spokesman said.

Two grain trucks were hit by gunfire along U.S. 12 near Lolo Hot Springs, Mont., police said. Neither driver was injured.

There were scattered reports of sabotage or vandalism.

The independent truckers shutdown showed signs of weakening in eastern South Dakota. Most truck stops in the area were open and reported a majority of drivers were still on the road.

In Sioux Falls, S.D., eight truckers from Sioux City, Iowa, blockaded a major truck stop in an attempt to halt sales of diesel fuel. An employee at the truck stop said, "We are not going to close our pumps because of eight trucks. We have 50 other drivers who really aren't interested in this strike."

The trucks eventually left that truckstop and headed for another. Police said they were keeping a "low profile but close watch" on the truckers.

Two leaders of the Minnesota Independent Truckers Association urged a meeting of independents to stop protest actions and lift truck-stop blockades. Many protesting truckers walked out of the meeting.

"We're shut down and we're not moving the trucks until we get some action," said one protester.

A spokesman for the California Trucking Association decried the shutdown, saying he sympathized with the strikers' goals "but not with their methods." He said the shutdown could cause major inconveniences, particularly on deliveries of perishable goods. Crops are now being harvested in California.

Independent truckers blocked off diesel pumps at major truck stops on two interstate highways in Colorado.

## More acres under study

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Nearly 113 million acres of public land in 11 western states that had been considered for designation as wilderness have been proposed for reclassification as multi-use lands, the Interior Department announced Friday.

Some 62 million acres administered by the Bureau of Land Management remain under consideration as wilderness lands, Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus said.

In Idaho 3.7 million acres are scheduled for further study and 8.26 million for multiple-use reclassification, following the recommendations of the state BLM office earlier this year.

Andrus said the 113 million acres "appear clearly and obviously to lack wilderness values." A final decision will be made by the end of the summer after considering public comments, Andrus said.

Of the approximately 62 million acres remaining under consideration, 56 million acres would undergo a second phase intensive inventory to determine whether wilderness characteristics exist and if they should become formal wilderness study areas.

## Shortage of fuel forecast for Idaho

BOISE (UPI) — Users of home heating oil and diesel fuel face a serious energy shortfall within the next year, the director of the state energy office said Friday.

Appearing on KTVB's "Viewpoint" program, Kirk Hall said Idaho got a late start protecting its energy interests. He said lack of preparation put the state in the position of not really knowing where it stood on its diesel and gasoline supplies.

"Until two months ago, when I asked the legislative Joint Finance Committee for some funds to handle this issue, the state had no role. The state had been out of this business since 1975. So part of that inability must rest as a state responsibility."

"We've not chosen to be there fighting for our share until just recently. I think we have suffered by that."

Hall predicted a fuel shortage for Idaho agriculture this fall and for heating oil users over the winter.

"I think we have suffered from the lack of a concentrated state effort and a commitment to keep from getting the short end of the stick."

I think we're doing a commendable job of catching up, but we should have been ahead, and that really takes a state commitment."

## Western governors usually seem to have a lot of better ideas

SUN VALLEY. The Western Governors' Conference is not the only regional association of governors.

State chief executives in most segments of the nation annually attack problems that spill across state boundaries. But when western political leaders gather, innovation somehow seems to follow.

Experience indicates the annual brainstorming by the West's governors, which begins Monday at Elkhorn in Sun Valley, is likely to spark unexpected and new ideas.

Many institutions and laws accepted casually today have come from the West.

Take, for instance, the California city of Los Angeles. At the turn of the century the only thing not for sale there was the low mottle. Irrate voters

finally threw the rascals out, but also tacked a page to the city charter known as the "recall law." This addition — the first of its kind in the nation — was, in effect, an impeachment process operated by voters rather than other elected officials.

The recall proved popular, at least in the west. Five years later Oregon made the idea state law. Idaho followed suit in 1913, and last used the law to recall two state legislators in 1974.

Close on the heels of the recall came the initiative and referendum, both born in Oregon in 1902.

The first allowed voters by petition to place a proposal on the ballot, thus circumventing reluctant or hesitant state legislators.

The referendum forced legislatively approved measures back on the ballot where voters approved or rejected the laws by direct vote.



The Idaho Legislature adopted the Initiative and referendum in 1933. The initiative was used just months ago, in the drive to secure passage of a property tax relief measure. The referendum last saw light in 1966, when voters approved a recently enacted sales tax.

Western states were also the first to seriously expand the franchise. Under national law women received the right to vote in 1919.

Wyoming granted the same right in 1893. Colorado followed suit in 1893. Idaho was third on the list in 1890.

Charges that political machines buy and sell local elections are found in every state, western or not. But it was in the west that one serious attempt was made to break the bosses' grip. In 1913, California adopted the first non-partisan primary.

Today those primaries are found in most states, especially in judicially elected and municipal

elections.

New year voters in 33 states will cast ballots in presidential primaries. Again, the demand was for greater individual participation in the political process. And again the idea was born in the West — in Oregon.

One of the sharper recent controversies focuses on government funding of political parties. Advocates of public financing of elections have introduced several measures into Congress, insisting special interests "not engage in the wholesale purchase of politicians."

But those arguments have been heard before. Colorado enacted the nation's first public campaign financing law in 1964. The act, later struck down by that state's conservative Supreme Court, appropriated public funds for the use of candidates.

## Rebels try to slip noose around Nicaragua capital

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — President Anastasio Somoza's troops were locked in a deadly series of battles Friday against Sandinista guerrillas trying to surround the capital city of Managua.

In Mexico City, a Sandinista guerrilla spokesman in Mexico City claimed the National Guard surrendered to rebels in the key southern city of Masaya.

"For us it is the first liberated territory of Nicaragua," he said. There was no immediate confirmation of the guerrilla claim.

out only one passenger — a journalist — and took off for Guatemala completely full.

A guard commune early Friday said it had killed at least 196 Sandinistas and wounded 80 more in the past 12 days of fighting and that its troops "control all population centers."

The 12-day rebel offensive to overthrow the government captured parts of the northern cities of Leon, Matagalpa and Chichigalpa, as well as Granada and Masaya to the south, and triggered clashes in a string of villages on the main road south of Managua.

A clandestine Radio Sandino broadcast said the rebels were also fighting guerrillas around several spots in the northern provinces of Nueva Segovia, Estelí, Madriz and Jinotega.

Military analysts said national guardsmen counterattacked at Matagalpa, 78 miles north of Managua, and that fighting was increasing along the southern border with Costa Rica, where rebels have been battling guardsmen for nearly two weeks.

The guerrilla attacks around Nicaragua led military analysts to conclude the rebels were trying to tighten a noose around Managua, perhaps for an assault on the city or in the hopes of sparking a civilian uprising.

Managua's Las Mercedes airport was choked with families trying to leave, including dozens of American families and people who did not flee even during the worst of last September's civil war, which killed at least 1,500 people.

The statement, which gave no guard casualty figures, was contradicted by Somoza himself, who admitted Thursday the guerrillas and their teen-aged allies controlled parts of the Central American nation of 2.5 million.

Somoza said in a telephone conversation with UPI that 200 government soldiers had been killed or wounded in the 12 days of fighting in what the rebels called their "final offensive" to oust him.

The 3,000 guerrillas taking part in the latest drive to end the Somoza family's 43-year-old rule over Nicaragua were gaining more ground than they did in the civil war last September, Somoza said.

"The fight will be more difficult and bloodier (because) with the weapons supplied by enemy countries to the insurgents, they are thus better armed, better trained and better supplied," Somoza said.

The president said his counter-attack strategy would be to lay siege to the rebel cities, cut off the rebels' supply routes, lure out the guerrillas and force them to run out of ammunition.

"No matter how much they want to fight, they will soon run out of ammunition unless a country decides to come in and resupply them," Somoza said.

The Nicaraguan president has accused Costa Rica, his neighbor to the south, as well as Cuba, Venezuela, Mexico and Panama of aiding the guerrillas he claims are part of an international Communist conspiracy.

## Oilwell explodes in Gulf

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — An oilwell that exploded like "an underwater volcano" spread a gigantic sheet of oil in the Gulf of Mexico Friday in what many feared would turn into an environmental catastrophe.

The government-owned Petroleos Mexicanos oil monopoly said it sent frogmen 150 feet deep in "near zero visibility" to check whether a damaged valve could be repaired to cap the well, but that it was too early to make a final decision.

PEMEX said that unless the divers managed to shut off the underwater gusher — "a remote possibility" — it would take more than three months to drill another well to intercept Ixtoc I and siphon off the petroleum.

Airplane pilots said PEMEX's Ixtoc I test well in the Bay of Campeche had spread an oil slick about 70 miles by 40 miles wide since an explosion and fire Sunday triggered by natural gas contacting hot drilling equipment. The well is 48 miles offshore from the city of Campeche.

But PEMEX officials would only say the slick was 2.4 miles long.

At the center of the slick, directly over the well, the thick petroleum boiled and caught fire, sending flames and a column of grey smoke high into the air "almost like an underwater volcano," witnesses said.

PEMEX said Ixtoc I was spilling 30,000 barrels of oil a day — nearly three times the average 11,000 barrels a day produced by the other 11 PEMEX wells in the area — Mexico's second richest after the southern Chiapas area.

Norwegian oil officials experienced in oil spills in the rough North Sea area were on their way to Mexico with floating booms to be used to gather the oil and chemicals to break it down, the company said.

Representatives of the 500 shrimp boats that earn \$100 million a year in Campeche Bay have already complained that pollution from PEMEX wells have cut their catch by 20 percent in recent months.

The latest accident at Ixtoc I, they said, posed "a grave risk to the marine ecology of the area," the richest shrimp and fishing basin in Mexico.

# Farming federation trying a direct oil-for-grain deal

CHICAGO — A swap of U.S. grain for Libyan oil is being negotiated by Allan Grant, president of the American Farm Bureau federation.

Grant said Thursday he met with Libyan oil and agriculture ministers and others in Tripoli in May. Grant said the deal eventually could bring 500,000 barrels of oil from Libya.

Grant rated the deal's chances at "better than 50-50" and said he'll return to Libya for more talks later this month. Such a swap of goods between a private dealer and a foreign government appears to be without precedent, although General Dynamics recently had a brief deal with Iran to get oil in exchange for planes.

Everything they've said is positive," Grant said of the Libyans.

"They want to do it, and we want to get it done. I have to go back to Libya and talk more with them."

"It's not a basket of wheat for a barrel of oil," he said. "We're talking about a number of possibilities. The Libyans are looking for a steady supply of wheat, feed grains and other farm commodities."

The federation, based in suburban Park Ridge, has some 3 million members, about two-thirds of them active farmers, Grant said, and represents about 85 percent of all U.S. farmers.

Several major farm co-operatives are capable of refining petroleum, Grant said. Libya's oil is among the most expensive and highest quality in the world.

The deal would bypass the U.S. government and U.S. oil companies.

Grant said an attractiveness of the deal for the U.S. is that it bypasses middlemen.

The State Department said such a direct commercial transaction is possible. Grant said he isn't negotiating on behalf of a government or attempting to change policies and has been told he's not violating any U.S. laws.

The deal is of interest to the federation because of the threat of gasoline- and diesel-fuel shortages. President Carter has made agricultural use a priority in getting fuel, but that still leaves others in the food distribution chain facing the threat of shortage.

"The allocation is working fairly well for farmers," Grant said, "but trucks can't get diesel fuel all the time to get the farm goods to the market."

## Church will try for an Amtrak amendment

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Frank Church said Friday he will attempt to push through the Senate later this month an amendment of Amtrak legislation that would save several Amtrak routes from elimination.

"We are on the brink of slashing the Amtrak system precisely when we will be needing it the most," the Idaho Democrat said. "In light of the current energy shortage, the Senate should be given an opportunity to restore the cuts in Amtrak ordered by the Department of Transportation."

The Amtrak Pioneer route, which runs through southern Idaho between Salt Lake City and Seattle, is scheduled for elimination Oct. 1 along with several other routes across the country.

Church said his amendment would do away with all scheduled cuts.

## Flutist recovering

NEW YORK (UPI) — A 17-year-old flutist and voice student who endured more than 15 hours of neurosurgery toreat a hand severed when she was pushed under a subway train was described as alert and in stable condition Friday.

"At this point it looks good that hand will stay attached," said Dr. William Shaw, chief of plastic surgery at Bellevue Hospital and head of the team of six doctors that performed the delicate operation to reattach Renee Katz' right hand.

## Sadat supported

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) — President Anwar Sadat's National Democratic Party surged way ahead of all other political groups Friday in partial returns from parliamentary elections, reflecting nationwide support for the Egyptian-Israeli peace treaty.

Leading candidates included at least seven who strongly opposed the treaty. Some belonged to the National Unionist Progressive Rally, an extreme leftist, pro-Soviet group led by Khaled Mohleddin, once known as the "red major."

## Rhodesian reaction

SALISBURY, Zimbabwe Rhodesia (UPI) — Prime Minister Abel Muzorewa Friday charged President Carter with "a blatant example of political expediency and of double standards" because of his decision to maintain sanctions against Zimbabwe Rhodesia.

Muzorewa, the United Methodist bishop who last week became this country's first black prime minister, said continued sanctions will deny his people the right to trade freely, with the parallel aim of limiting employment and educational opportunities.

## Winds fan fires

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Unseasonably gusty winds fanned hundreds of range fires in California Friday with the biggest one — which roared at 2,000 acres per hour — being contained after blackening 57,000 acres in the San Joaquin Valley.

About 340 firefighters and two air tankers, hampered by scorching summer temperatures, claimed victory over the Fresno County blaze near Mendota in the afternoon.

Stacking winds also enabled 250 firefighters to tame the 2,500-acre Little Antelope fire, which broke out Thursday in Tehama County.

## Job for Watkins

BOISE (UPI) — Veteran newsmen and public relations officer Don Watkins has been appointed press secretary to Gov. John V. Evans, effective July 1, Evans announced Friday.

Watkins, presently director of public information for the state Department of Education, will replace Steve Leroy, who is leaving to join President Carter's White House advance team.

## Dam funds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee has approved legislation to reimburse American Falls Dam irrigators for costs they incurred during reconstruction of the dam. Rep. Steve Symms and George Hansen said Friday.

The Idaho Republicans said the irrigators will be paid \$5 million this year, and Hansen said he has been assured by committee members that more funds will be released next year.

## Copter crash

MONTREAL (UPI) — A helicopter flying in dense fog on survey work for Hydro-Quebec crashed into a hill south of the James Bay development project Friday, killing four of the five men aboard, officials said.

Only the pilot of the Bell 206B Jet Ranger, owned by Heli Voyagers Inc., of Val d'Or, Quebec, survived. He was identified as Robert Raymond, 25, of Ottawa and was reported in critical condition with third-degree burns suffered from flames when the chopper exploded upon impact.

## Rabbit suspected

TECOLOTE, N.M. (UPI) — State health officials said Friday they believe a dead rabbit was the source of a fatal case of pneumonic plague and that the chances of the highly contagious disease spreading to other victims had lessened.

Fernando Montoya, 19, of Tecolote died late Thursday in an Albuquerque, N.M., hospital of the only form of "bubonic plague" that can be transmitted directly from person to person. He was the second person in New Mexico to die of the disease this year.

Oregon, a few years later, instituted a partial funding of official political

U.S. senators are today elected by direct popular vote, but this wasn't always the case. Until 1912, state Legislatures elected the members of the national Senate.

The change came after charges of corruption, and again the loudest shouts came from the west, starting in Oregon — where voters — to choose U.S. senators by direct vote.

The passage of years has failed to dull the west's appetite for governmental innovation. In just the last decade, western states have taken these less than orthodox actions:

Proposition 13. For better or worse, California's major export is now the tax revolution. Largely because of California's passage of Proposition 13, Idaho votes last year approved a carbon copy "1 percent initiative."

Gas rationing. The "odd-even" system of gas rationing, now advocated by Carter administration energy officials, first began in Oregon under Republican Gov. Tom McCall.

Bottle bill. This law yanked the tabs on Oregon's non-returnable bottles. By requiring all beverage containers to be redeemable, and banning entirely the "pop-tab," Oregon significantly reduced roadside litter.

More than 12 states are now considering similar legislation.

Marijuana. Alaska and Oregon stand alone here, in having reduced punishments for possession of marijuana. Advocates of the change insist enforcement of penalties for "victimless crimes" keeps law enforcement officials from more important duties.

Sunset Laws. Colorado idea, since considered by Idaho and other states. Sunset laws require government agencies to periodically line item their budgets and justify their existence.

Uniform Probate Code. Idaho led the way here, becoming the first state in the nation to adopt this simplified approach to wills and estates.

Strong arguments have been made both for and against most of the above measures. But their common bond is novelty and experimentation, the willingness to approach traditional problems from new angles.

It's anybody's guess whether this year's gathering of western governors will officially produce major new attacks on political problems. Conferences like this frequently do little more than plant seeds and trigger ideas. But if past trends are any indication voters should expect the unexpected from the west.

# Approval of the MX may help SALT vote

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House announced Friday that President Carter has decided to develop the MX mobile missile to protect America against any Russian nuclear attack — a move officials said should help persuade the Senate to ratify SALT II.

Deputy press secretary Rex Graman said Carter decided in favor of the huge MX — which will cost \$30 billion over 10 years — because "in his best judgment, we need to take this action to maintain our strategic security."

Officials said the MX will give the United States for the first time the ability to threaten large numbers of Soviet land-based missiles, and at the same time will protect the 1,054 American land-based missiles now in

underground silos in the Midwest from any attack Moscow might contemplate.

The new missiles will carry earth warheads capable of hitting 10 targets with enough explosive power to devastate an estimated 250 Hiroshimas.

The missiles — each weighing 190,000 pounds — are the largest the United States is allowed to develop under the new SALT II agreement and defense officials expect to build 200 of them.

Because the MX missiles will be moved around on giant, 750,000 pound transporters, Soviet military spies will never be absolutely sure of their location so they would be unable to knock them all out in a missile attack.

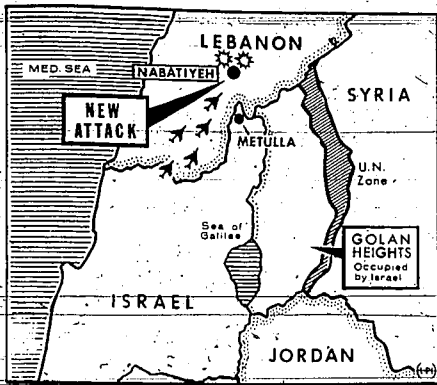

## Palestinian targets pounded in Lebanon

 Israeli warplanes and artillery pounded Palestinian targets in south Lebanon Friday as part of the government's new policy of keeping the guerrillas "on the run."  
 The airstrikes, the first in 16 days, involved "terrorist concentrations" at nine miles north of the Israeli frontier town of Metulla, the military command in Tel Aviv said.  
 The air-and-ground strikes came despite a Palestine Liberation Organization announcement that its troops will be moved out of south Lebanese towns to minimize the danger of attacks on civilians from Israeli attacks.  
 Beirut radio said the Israeli planes were U.S.-made Phantom and Skyhawk fighter-bombers and that the attack lasted half an hour.  
 The PLO news agency Wafa said the raiders struck at 4:35 a.m. at targets along a 5-mile crescent just north of Nabatiyeh that included Habbouch, Jarmag, Kfar Roummame, Al Wadi al Akhdar and surrounding hills.  
 Two hours later, Israeli gunners followed up by shelling Aishlyeh, some nine miles north of the border and four miles northeast of Nabatyeh, as well as the town of Arnoim and the nearby Chateau Beaufort crusader castle, a scant two miles from Israel. Wafa said the shelling lasted 8 hours.  
 "The air-attack caused material damage, injured three persons and destroyed the house of a citizen in Habbouch," Beirut radio said. Habbouch is near the inland market town of Nabatiyeh, about 9 miles north of the border.  
 Palestinian sources said the casualties were guerrillas of the pro-Soviet Democratic Front for the Liberation of Palestine led by Nayef Hawatmeh.

## Iranian government nationalizes banks

## Local news deserves page 1

Limiting page 1 to important international and national news was the request of one Times-News reader this week.

The reader was reacting to a story on last Saturday's front page, headlined "Cannibalism at crash site admitted." The story, according to the reader, was sensationalized and lacking in sensitivity towards the victims of the plane crash.

On Monday editorial, we explained our reasons for giving the article top play. It was an unusual climax to an Idaho story that had been reported and followed with much interest by Idahoans for the past three weeks.

And it was exactly because it happened locally, rather than

somewhere else in the nation or world, that the story went to the top of page 1.

The Times-News does not subscribe to the theory that page 1 stories should be limited only to national and international news. It is our belief that local stories usually have more impact on and interest to our readers.

Our readers benefit by having a community paper which provides local and regional news, and in many cases those stories belong on page 1.

Another reader wrote to point out some misleading information in a recent story on cutbacks at the Gooding School for the Deaf. The article said 40 school employees were

affected by the action, but did not tell how many were deaf. Many readers were given the false impression that all 40 employees had hearing handicaps. The actual number of handicapped Gooding School for the Deaf employees is seven.

Sports page readers will have noticed some changes during recent weeks. Two locally produced regular features have been added. These include columns by the sports department staffers running six days a week, plus a daily Sports Menu and On the Air. These last two features are intended to provide readers with comprehensive listings of local sports events and radio and television sports programs.

### Are the Weteyes really worth crying over?

Utah Sen. Jake Garn has a simple solution to the Weteye nerve gas bomb problem.

Just trust the U.S. Army, he says. The Army knows what is best.

Why, according to Senator Garn, the Army is taking all of these precautions to make sure there are no unfortunate accidents in moving the lethal bombs from Colorado to Utah. The Army folks, he says, are going out of their way in testing the bombs for leaks and conducting dummy tests prior to the planned move, so why not leave them alone and let them go about their business?

To hear Sen. Garn speak, you would think that it had been the Army's idea to conduct all of these recent tests in the first place. Wrong! If there hadn't been protests raised about the bomb's transfer, centered around the courageous stand by Utah Gov. Scott Matheson, the tests—more than likely—wouldn't have been made and the bombs would already have been moved to Utah, leakers and all... and, it follows, high risk factor and all.

A few weeks ago many of us were starting to tire of Matheson's pronouncements about the bombs. It just seemed he was turning into a Chicken Little screaming about the falling sky. But, as it turns out, he was correct in suspecting the safety of the transfer mission. Matheson's words were backed up by the Army's recent discovery of six leaking bombs at their current storage site at Rocky Mountain Arsenal north of Denver.

It wasn't until after Matheson's persistence and threatened lawsuits and numerous meetings with military officials that the bomb tests were made and the transfer mission to Utah's Tooele Army Depot was postponed.

But Senator Garn and fellow Utah Sen. Orrin Hatch continue to wonder why there's all this crying about the leakers. They claim they're also concerned about the leaking bombs—but they ask us to keep trusting the Army to do what is best about the situation.

Should we trust the Army that much? The Environmental Protection Agency has just recently given us some information that would tend to give us reason not to. Specifically, the EPA said the Army assured the agency last year that if more than two more leaking bombs were discovered, the planned move would be canceled.

So, here we are, with six leaking bombs, and the Army hasn't canceled. Postponed but not canceled. How do you like them apples, Senator Garn?

The EPA suggests that instead of the bomb transfer, the bombs should be detoxified in Colorado. The only other alternative, the EPA says, would be to carry out more studies on the planned move to Utah.

Few seem to be in a position to know what is more risky—moving the bombs to Utah or destroying them in Colorado—but it seems to be a good idea to bring such a risk comparison to the forefront of this issue and have the Army act accordingly. It appears obvious, however, that the army should not be the only group in on the final decision. Contrary to what Senators Garn and Hatch may think, the Army does not have all of the answers, at least not all of the ones to civilian questions.

In the continuing Weteye debate, "the safest possible course" should be the phrase to live by, and not "the most militarily expedient."

## Campaign '80 too soon

BOSTON — I don't know whether the Lone Star Twelve will ever stand trial for their delicious piece of civil disobedience but, if they do, I for one will contribute to their defense fund.

The Texas state senators, dubbed The Killer Bees, fled their Austin hive on May 18 and took to the range. They were fugitives from the legislature, in an effort to kill a bill that would have established yet another early-early presidential primary.

The odd dozen acted, no doubt, out of the sort of pure motives made famous by the state mentor, Lyndon B. Johnson. But I'll tip my ten-gallon hat to anyone who tries to stop the major growth industry of the past decade—presidential politics.

If small is beautiful, the presidential campaign has grown into a gargantuan of public disinterest.

The first time I saw the headline, "Campaign '80," I wanted to drive

right and register my voter's disapproval. Unfortunately, it was snowing. It was, you see, mid-winter of 1978, more than two years before the first primary.

By now, Phil Crane has been in New Hampshire 22 times, Lowell Welcker has already bowed in and out, and we now have all sorts of people out beating the Bushes, not to mention the Bakers, Connallys, and Doles.

According to the Associated Press, Crane now tells his eight children, "It's kind of like daddy's going off to war. It's a two-year war and I hope to get an occasional three-day pass."

That's more than the rest of us will get.

The only permanent legacy Jimmy Carter may leave us is the eternal, or should I say, interminable campaign.

Never mind that it took him longer to get from Plains to Washington than it took the U.S. Army to get from Normandy to Germany; he developed the Politics of Attrition and now it's the norm.

I don't know about the candidates or their kids, but I am convinced that the constituents aren't ready for the year 1980, let alone the campaign 1980. The politicians keep telling us we are becoming apathetic, but the truth is that they are asking us to care more and care longer. They're like lovers who insist on continual approval and attention. The more they ask; the more we want to be left alone.

Just because a dozen or two men lust in their hearts for the Oval Office doesn't mean that we should be expected to remain in a constant state of arousal. Seventeen months before election day, the only thing that seems longer and duller than the 1960 race is a gas line.

Of course, the Boys of the Endless

Summer blame the media. To a certain extent we are co-conspirators. Politics is the soap opera of the news junkies. Presidential campaigns are our "As the World Turns."

No story makes the blood run in journalism circles like the ins and outs, ups and downs, of their extended political families. The only saga as juicy as the Lee-Marvin case is the creative divorce of Jimmy and Jerry, who are both fighting for custody rights over the California constituency. The only estrangement as tempestuous as that of the Rideouts is that of President Carter and Senator—will he or won't he?—Kennedy.

Presidential campaigns have always been a great media story because they have a built-in plot, a cast of characters, and a winner and a loser. People tuned in to see what would happen next.

But what do we do when the story never ends? Turn to "Masterpiece Theater?"

One of the problems with the interminable campaign is that it becomes an endurance contest. The two candidates left standing are voted on by the people left caring. Is it any wonder that the Presidents who used to be photographed kissing babies are now shown joggling?

But, more importantly, if we are always in the middle of an election, our Presidents will always look like candidates instead of leaders. We suspect them of acting in their own self-interest instead of ours, and judging every move by the ballot.

If the only way to control this fever is by limiting the months, ending the plague of early primaries, and hiding from the Texas Rangers, well, this is our swarm of killer bees with a welcome sting.

## A look at next 'New-boy Network'

WASHINGTON — Eighteen months from now, a newly elected president will be going over recommendations to appoint a group of foreign and defense policy professionals who operate just below the top, who have grown up reading and writing in a helping each other, and who frame most of the far-reaching decisions made by the men in the limelight.

The "new-boy network" will write tomorrow's option papers, turn the spotlight for tomorrow's leaks, determine the parameters for the top leader's decisions. Like cartridges in a clip, when the order comes from the electorate to "lock and load," these men will naturally be inserted into our national security system.

They know who they are; the ones chosen first will bring in the others. One network would be called to arms by a soft-landing Kennedy presidency; a different set would be put in place by a Reagan, a Conally, or a Moynihan. Since they could determine our destiny, let's take a preliminary look at them.

In a Kennedy White House (haldemanned by David Burke), many soft-line apparatuses would remain: David Aaron, Tony Lake, Richard Holbrooke, David McGiffert, Richard Moose (there is PRM-10 again), and Lynn Davis of Geom-10 fame. The national security adviser could be Thomas Hughes of the Carnegie Foundation, John Steinbrunn of Brookings, Graham Allison of Harvard, or the present NSC's former Kennedy staffer, Robert Hunter. Jan Kalicki, who now heads foreign policy for the Kennedy shadow government, would be placed near, but not at, the

top.

This soft-line network would want an amenable hawk to be deputy secretary of defense—perhaps the Navy's James Woolsey, or non-Irish Philip Odeen. Jan Lodal would be a likely activist for the arms control agency, and Toni Chayes is destined to be the first Democratic woman service chief, as secretary of the Air Force.

If the next president is a hard-liner attuned to the Soviet global threat, five names spring to mind as potential National Security Advisers: Harvard Prof. Richard Pipes, deputy CIA director Frank Carlucci, and three heavyweight strategists—John Lehman, Edward Luttwak and Richard Allen.

Let's put Pipes in that slot, with Lehman as Navy Secretary (to save the nuclear carriers), Allen at the NSC to revamp our intelligence and African policies (assisted by Chester Cooper of the Georgetown Center), and the brilliant Luttwak as the NSC's freewheeling intellectual and unthinkable-thought man.

To add congressional and press savvy to the Special Coordinating Committee of Forty, we'll make Sen. Henry Jackson's aide, Richard Perle, deputy national security adviser, with congressional staffer William Schneider, and DSC's William Van Cleave to be the SALT-shakers.

That NSC staff, which should once again become an exciting place to be, would include Prof. Scott Thompson of Tufts's Fletcher School; Kenneth Adelman of Stanford; Michael Ledeen of the Georgetown Center; to handle Europe; Sven Kraemer, a Senate staffer, on global issues; RAND's

Richard ("A Revolution is not a Dinner Party") Solomon toughening our China policy; in tandem with Penn State Prof. Parris Chang. Sen. Sam Nunn's adviser, Jeff Record, would add congressional know-how and William Odom could be the holdover from the Brzezinski era, as the new man's military aide. Richard Whalen would take over for Jerrald Schieffer as strategic ombudsman.

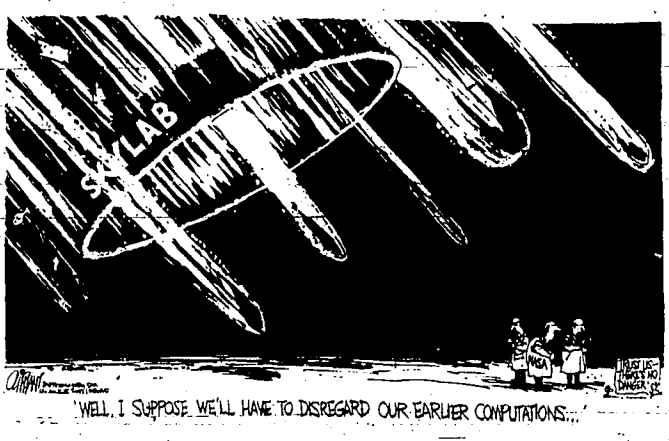
Outside the White House in a hard-line era, Cabinet officials like Don Rumsfeld, Paul Nitze, Laurence Silbermann, Robert Ellsworth and Thomas Reed would look below to find Martin Hoffman and Prof. Bing West at key posts in Defense, with Seymour Weiss—an old Kissinger adversary—as deputy secretary of state. John Connally's issues director, Sam Hoskinson, would be a likely choice for deputy director of central intelligence under CIA chief William J. Casey or Wiry Al Haig.

But what if a dark horse flashes by the finish line first? If it's Jerry Brown, the NSC job could go to Jane Fonda, unless he opts for newly hard-line Joan Baez.

If the ship of state comes in for George Bush or Howard Baker, the Kissingerian network stands a chance: Hal Sonnenfeldt is adamant about remaining in private life, but Winston Lord would be a natural for a key post at State in a centrist network, and Brent Scowcroft is available for the NSC call. William Hyland, who knows where the bodies are buried, would be useful in any administration, and help mop up the memos later.

Is the existence of these "new-boy

networks" sinister? Quite the contrary: after we decide on our president next year, there will be no long, indecisive groping about for a way to make and carry out policy. All that is needed is an articulated point of view, a definite mental set, and a trumpet that is not uncertain. With that long-missing clear direction from the top, the chosen-up teams will hit the ground running.

### Contraception and divorce attacked by pope in Poland

NOWY TARG, Poland (UPI) — Clasp his hands above his head, Pope John Paul II condemned contraception and divorce in a stern sermon to a mile-deep throng of brilliantly costumed Polish mountain folk Friday and led a prayer "to save our nation from the slavery of alcoholism."

"We swear to be teetotalers," the vast congregation roared in response. John Paul's finger-wagging lecture did nothing to dampen the soaring spirits of the crowd — the greatest multitude he has drawn in the first seven days of his nine-day trip.

So vast was the throng packed onto a 3 1/4 square-mile airport grounds on

a starkly beautiful plateau below the rugged Tatras mountains that it took the pope more than a half-hour to drive through it.

The congregation was comprised of mountain people from the whole southern fringe of Poland, as well as Czechoslovaks who crossed the border at the two nearby mountain passes to hear him.

The pontiff first cajoled the massive congregation with jokes about the clouds shrouding the mountains where he once skied, hiked, climbed and tobagganed. Then, shoulders squared, face serious, he turned solemn, saying, "So much for the warm-up."

### Red Brigades resume their knee attacks

TURIN, Italy (UPI) — The Red Brigades terrorist group kneecapped their first victim in eight days Friday, repeatedly shooting a Fiat car works supervisor in the legs as his screaming 13-year-old daughter watched in horror.

Together with the bomb attacks Thursday, it signaled the resumption of the leftists' terrorist campaign, which had been suspended under government pressure during the June 3-4 election.

Three men and a woman attacked Giovanni Farina, 49, as he left his home to go to the Fiat works. His daughter, Elisabetta, looked out of the front door after she heard shouting, and saw one of the unmasked assailants, a tall, thin young man, firing pistol bullets into her father's legs as he lay crumpled on the ground.

The attackers escaped. But later a man called a local newspaper to say: "This is the Red Brigades. We shot Farina."

He was pronounced out of danger by doctors despite 10 bullet holes in his legs.

It was the first Red Brigades shooting since May 31, when a terrorist burst into a packed Genoa university classroom and kneecapped a Christian Democratic university professor in front of his students.

## Inspection of DC-10s continues

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Aviation Administration Friday gave American Airlines permission to fly from San Francisco to Tulsa for further inspection of the two planes whose cracked engine mounts prompted the grounding of all DC-10s.

It was the first authorization granted under a federal judge's order Thursday allowing "ferry" and test flights of the DC-10 to help in investigation of the trouble-plagued craft.

Earlier in the day, the FAA announced that over a hundred other agency's experts have been assigned to help track down the trouble with the DC-10.

Each of the American Airlines planes at San Francisco was found to have a two-inch crack in one engine mount, and an FAA spokesman said the flights would be made with only partial power on those engines.

And he said, "The proposed route of flight must avoid heavily populated areas to the extent possible."

An American Airlines spokesman said he did not know when the two flights would be conducted — "Tomorrow, Sunday or Monday." He said it would be easy to plan a flight route from San Francisco to Tulsa avoiding heavily populated areas.

He said the plane would probably have a three-man crew and predicted "any one" of American's crews "would be willing to do it. They are all very pleased with the plane."

The airline asked permission to fly the planes to its maintenance facility in Tulsa for a "detailed examination" of the wing mounts — the defective ones that were cited in the FAA's order Wednesday grounding all DC-10s.

U.S. District Judge Aubrey Robinson, in granting the FAA's request to allow the special flights with only crews aboard, said he considered the action necessary to expedite inspections and testing on the plane.

Requests were coming in Friday from the eight airlines using the DC-10, and FAA spokesman Fred Farrar said:

## John Anderson in the GOP race

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. John Anderson of Illinois announced Friday he will seek the Republican presidential nomination, and will try to stake out a position in the center of the political spectrum.

Anderson, 57, has been in Congress since 1961 and holds the third-ranking GOP leadership post in the House.

He is the seventh candidate to announce for the GOP presidential nomination in a field dominated by conservatives, and which does not yet include two of the best known probable candidates — Ronald Reagan and Senate Republican leader Howard Baker.

Anderson, a Harvard Law School graduate, is regarded by conservatives in the GOP as a liberal. While he has a record of fiscal restraint, he also has a strong civil rights record, opposed the Vietnam War early and was the first Republican in the House to call for Richard Nixon's resignation.

He said he will try to rebuild the party by attracting blacks, ethnic groups and union members.

As for his liberal image within the party, he said, "I believe that the times have changed since Nelson Rockefeller (disliked by many GOP

(conservatives) unsuccessfully sought the nomination of the Republican Party" in 1964.

Anderson said if he is to make a good race for the nomination, he needs to win the Illinois primary, which probably will include Rep. Philip Crane of Illinois, who is already in the race, and Reagan, a native of the state.

## Union's poll shows Carter still falling

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Edward Kennedy holds a 10-1 popularity edge over President Carter among local United Auto Workers leaders and California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. has almost drawn even with the president, union President Douglas Fraser said Friday.

Nevertheless, the UAW is remaining neutral and could end up endorsing Carter, Fraser told reporters after a speech to the founding convention of the United Food and Commercial Workers Union.

Fraser said the UAW had been asked to join a labor-for-Carter group to build re-election support, "and we refused."

"We're neutral," he said. "It is a flexible position."

But Fraser said he "won't be involved in a draft Kennedy movement. That's a decision the candidate has to make."

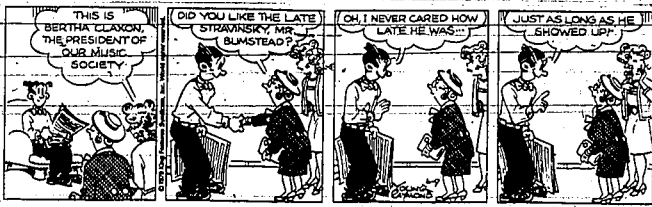

### Grains pace broad gains for futures

(Courtesy Sinclair & Co.) CHICAGO — With grains leading, most commodity futures advanced Friday.

Commodity News Service said July wheat topped 4.04 1/2, shattering barrier contract highs and gaining as much as 24 cents — the allowable limit. The close was 10 1/2 to 11 cents higher in heavy trading.

Speculation about poor spring wheat crops in the Soviet Union and Canada was a major factor, plus continuing export demand.

Corn gained 4 to 7 1/2 cents on possible heavy export demand from the Soviet Union. Soybeans followed corn and wheat, with gains closing 6 1/2 to 15 1/2 cents higher, meal up 1.50 to 4.00 and oil settling 25 to 58 points higher.

Rising carcass prices and anticipation of a constructive seven state cattle on feed report Tuesday pushed live cattle higher, from the low 150 points to 65 points. Volume was 28,792 contracts traded. Feeder cattle ended 47 to 115 points higher on a trade of 3,941 contracts.

Live hogs closed mixed, 42 points down to 67 higher, on a trade of 8,076 contracts. Stronger cash and ideas of stronger pork prices pushed early impetus but were offset by concern over the trucking slowdown.

Pork bellies gained 12 to 185 points with lightly traded deferred contracts showing the best gains. Volume was 6,702 contracts.

New York Comex gold settled 3.00 higher in all months on a light volume of 15,000 contracts including 5,165 switches. Comex silver posted sharp technical advances in thin conditions, settling 1,400 to 1,500 points higher on a volume of 17,000 lots including 6,018 in switches.

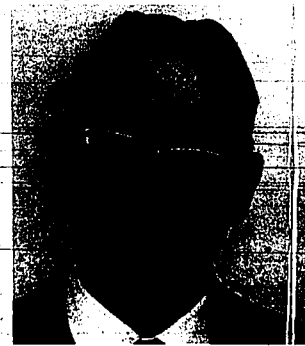

# Sludge to be dumped

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls must continue to dump sludge near the city-county airport until a new dump site is found, a process which could take at least 60 days.

That was the decision of the city council Thursday, despite threats from residents near the airport south of the city to file a suit to stop the dumping in their area. The dumping will continue until the Bureau of Land Management grants the city permission to unload the sludge on remote BLM land.

The council also decided to continue its verbal contract with the current sludge hauler until it can find a new dumping site, at which time it plans to offer a long-term hauling contract.

The council rejected a proposal that the city require its contract hauler to acquire costly injection equipment to handle the sludge.

The council began dumping at sites near the airport this spring after ponds at its dump site south of the airport — near the county landfill — became filled to capacity, city

manager Jean Milar explained. "The city must drain these ponds over the summer to provide a site suitable for dumping next winter, when direct application to frozen ground is not possible, Milar said."

The city began dumping on land it owns near the airport (and temporarily on the land of a farmer near the airport who wanted the sludge as fertilizer), and residents in the area don't like it.

To placate the residents, the city began a search for a new dump site. The city is looking at sites on private land and has filed an application to use BLM land. The city is looking at BLM land in the Hub, Buhl area and in the Berger-Lincoln Corral area.

But before the BLM can grant the city permission for such a use, an Environmental Assessment Report must be prepared and a public hearing must be held.

BLM Resource Area manager Scott Anderson said Friday the state of Idaho will prepare the report with help from the BLM and the city.

But Friday Dave Sanders, manager

of the Twin Falls region of the Division of Environment of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, said the DHEW is "still thinking about whether we have the manpower to go it (the report)."

Sanders said that decision will be made next week, and he added that completion of the report will take at least three weeks from the date it is started.

Once the report is completed, a public hearing must be advertised and held.

And BLM permission to use its land is far from assured. Anderson said the BLM showed city officials several possible sites because "we felt there's going to be some pretty strong input against sites they've asked for."

He said any objections will "have to be considered for sure," but he also said, "I think we can find an acceptable site," but it may not be the site the city wants.

In the meantime, residents near the dump site have asked the city to change its method of sludge application from spraying and discing to direct injection into the ground, a method requiring a capital outlay estimated at well over \$100,000.

# Some snow expected in the high country

TWIN FALLS — It is expected to be a cool weekend in the high country and light snow fell Thursday morning in some areas of the Sawtooth National Forest.

All campgrounds in the Wood River area and Ketchum Ranger District are open except Easley, Boulder and Germania Basin roads are closed by snow. Pole Creek road is open to Grand Price Gulch.

Backpackers and hikers should check with the Wilderness Ranger on current conditions of trails. The snowline is generally at 7,800 to 8,000 feet in the Stanley Basin. Many higher lakes still have ice.

There is a kayak rodeo planned for Saturday and Sunday at 11 a.m. eight miles below Stanley at the Rough Creek bridge. Events include salmon and white-water races and other kayaking skills. City Attorney Charles Brumbaugh summed up the city's fears: "If an injunction against dumping on city property near the airport were issued, we'd be in a world of hurt."

# Gasoline allocation to be cut for Idaho

SEATTLE (UPI) — The U.S. Department of Energy says Idaho will experience a sharper cut in gasoline allocations this month than the three other states in the DOE's Region 10.

Idaho's gasoline allocations will receive a total of 41 million gallons of gas this month, 77 percent of what was delivered in June 1978, according to the DOE.

Drivers in Washington state will have 161.1 million gallons, 81 percent of their June 1978 amount, while Oregon will get 109.7 million gallons, 82 percent, and Alaska 20.1 million gallons, 90 percent.

In May, Alaska had 102 percent of its 1978 May allocations, followed by Washington, 87 percent; Oregon, 86 percent; and Idaho, 81 percent.

"We are even lower in gasoline supplies compared to normal increases in summer demand, even though total gasoline supplies will increase slightly in June," says Jack B. Robertson, a regional DOE representative.

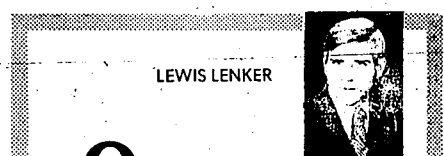

Social Security: The monthly benefit each child currently receives from Social Security is extended until his 22nd birthday, if he attends college.

Federal Compensation: Student children of federal employees, who died of injuries covered under this Act, are eligible for benefits up to age 23.

Civil Service and Railroad Retirement: Dependent students children of deceased eligible personnel are covered to age 21 under those programs.

# Rediker sets sights on national golf tourney

**JEROME** — When something becomes important, all else pales by comparison.

For Julie Rediker of Jerome, the immediate goal is attending the National High School All-Star Golf tournament in Orlando, Fla., later this month.

Since the tournament offers only honors and trophies, the wherewithal to participate in that competition is driving Julie to a couple-three jobs and even to the point of declaring she would forego college next year.

Julie won the right to play in nationals as the female medalist in the Idaho state prep championships at Jerome May 11. She is just one of 102 (including boys and British Columbia entries) to be awarded a berth.

"It is very important to me," the just graduated Rediker says. "It will give me a lot of experience. I may not personally have a good chance of winning but I think our district might."

Of a more important nature, however, is her yearning for a change to play collegiate golf and the opportunity the national tournament could give her.

She points out Idaho doesn't have a strong junior program and none of the Idaho colleges offers a women's golf program. She naturally would like to find something in the warmer climes, like California and Arizona, but the competition is more than keen.

Her efforts for securing a collegiate golf spot currently

are two pronged. Coupling her desire to get into the communications field, she has compiled a list — a long list — of schools that offer that major plus a golf program. That will serve as a background for her even if the other plan falls through.

That plan is to get to nationals and hopefully attract the eye of a college coach or two. In this way, Julie feels even if a scholarship is not immediately forthcoming, the exposure could be pivotal later.

"I already have plans to spend next (school) year looking for a school that has golf," she says with a positive one-track-mindedness.

If nothing comes up this summer, Julie will accept two scholarships at CSI and begin her education there. But no competition. She will save that year's eligibility for a hoped-for four-year career somewhere else.

The problem at hand is the \$1,200 travel out that must be cracked to get to Orlando. Julie is working part time in a Jerome lumber yard and other times is hauling sprinkler pipe for a neighbor — both the early morning and late evening shifts. "It's really hard work," she confides.

Additionally, "I think I have a new job lined up and will start working pretty soon," she says.

But for now her greatest hope lies in sponsor letters. "I've sent out quite a few and some have promised me they will help (with money)," she says. "The IGA (Idaho Golf Association) has promised me some help. But \$1,200 is

such a lot."

Julie's golf career started about 15 years ago when she was three. Her parents live across the street from the Jerome Country Club and Julie would toddle across the highway and wait for help. She said she would "sit under a bench until someone came along and offered me a ride in their cart." This ride would last three holes, after which she would leave her benefactors and return to the original spot to await another ride.

"I can remember hitting rocks off of tees with sticks when I was really young," she says.

Her perseverance has paid off in some good individual experiences, including a trip with the Idaho team to the Junior Americas Cup in Oregon last year. "The girls from California and Arizona really wiped us out," she says. "Of course, they get to play year-around and that has to help a lot."

It was that exposure that cemented in her mind the need to get into the four-season golf climate as she wouldn't mind at all qualifying some day for the women's professional tour.

And all that is based on good exposure to great competition and merely makes her more determined to go to the nationals in Orlando later this month.

"I'll go. I may not go to college next year, but I'll go to the tournament," she promises.



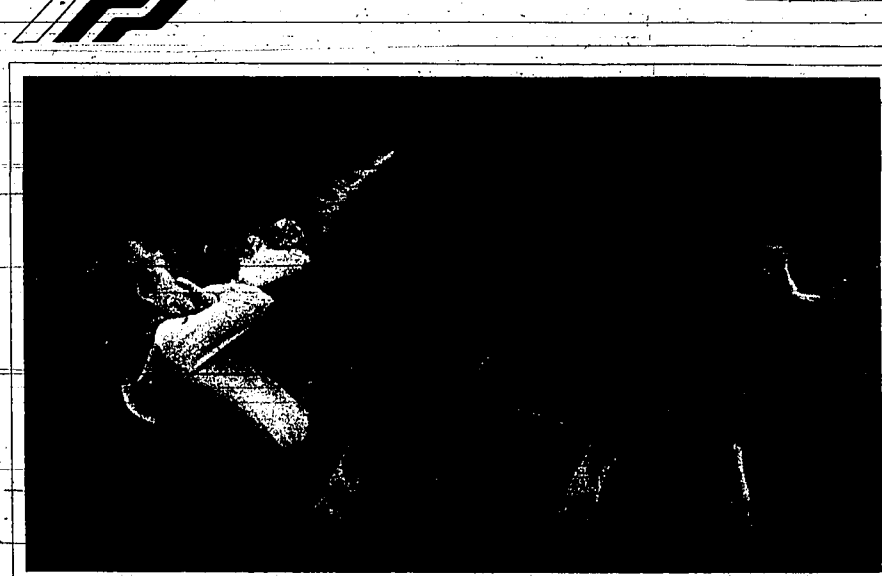

Flanagan allowed only two batters past first base and was aided by two double plays in posting his first shutout of the year.

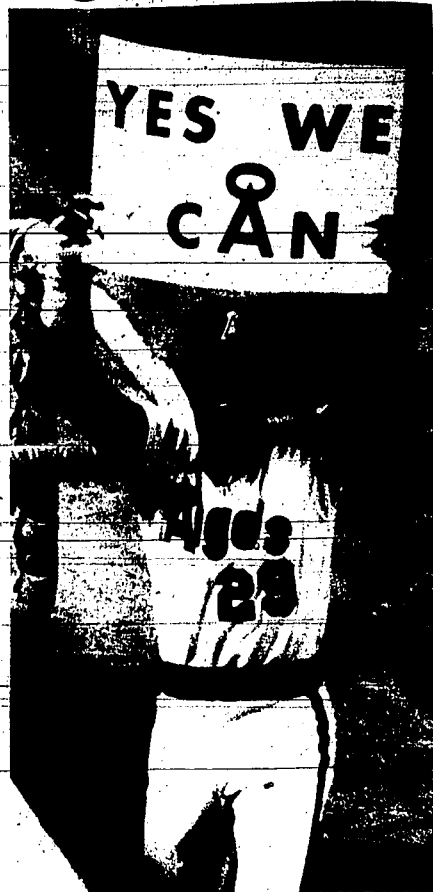

Inman's 8-under 64 nets lead at Atlanta

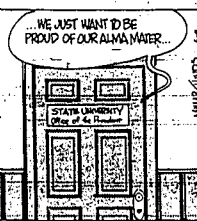

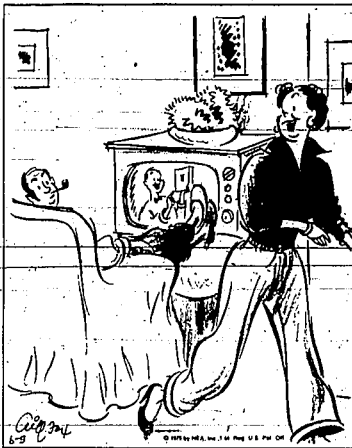
