

Sides square off over 1980 tax cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Although the economy has slid into the recession of 1979, the administration Friday told Congress it had no intention of "pushing the panic button" by cutting taxes or increasing spending.

"It would make no sense at this stage to rush in with a program to pump up the economy by either a new tax cut or spending programs, or by an easing of monetary restraint," said Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal.

As Blumenthal and other top officials were making this point on Capitol Hill, House Republicans called a new conference to outline an exactly opposite approach.

The GOP urged passage of a \$36 billion tax cut, \$28 billion of which would be earmarked for individuals, in

order to combat the "Democrat recession."

The conflicting advice on the deteriorating economy came one day after the White House acknowledged for the first time the United States is sliding into a mild recession.

The downturn could cost up to 1 million American jobs and inflation will probably soar to its second highest yearly level since the end of World War II, the White House forecast said.

"There is not a sufficient body of consistent evidence to justify pushing the panic button on macro-economic policies," Blumenthal told the Senate Budget Committee.

Blumenthal said the administration wants it understood "we are not wavering in our dedication to

the fight on inflation" despite negative economic growth.

"There could be no credibility — at home or abroad — in our declaration to combat inflation if we were to switch policies with each swing in the (economic) statistics," he added.

The Treasury boss said the nation must concentrate all its efforts on strict energy conservation, increasing "dismal" productivity in the work force, adhering to President Carter's wage-price guidelines and protecting the value of the dollar abroad.

Under questioning, Gramley said Carter is "not ready to propose a tax cut of any kind."

House Republican leader John Rhodes said the GOP believed recession was not "even necessary as a way to

cool off inflation."

He said "there are better ways to do that," mainly by slicing taxes.

The Republican plan urged:

- A permanent reduction in personal income tax rates of at least 10 percent, resulting in an individual tax reduction of \$28 billion.
- Adjusting personal income tax rates to offset inflation, which automatically pushes many taxpayers into higher tax brackets.
- Freezing Social Security taxes at their present levels.
- Stimulating capital investment and productivity by allowing a speed-up in depreciation rate for buildings, equipment and vehicles, saving \$3 billion in taxes.

Egypt's embassy stormed

ANKARA, Turkey (UPI) — Two Egyptian officials escaped early Saturday from the Egyptian embassy where four Palestinians had stormed the building in a blaze of gunfire, killed three policemen and seized the ambassador and his staff as hostages.

Two men, the embassy's commercial attaché, Ismail Mohammed Abdul Halli, and his assistant, Halil Asid Eld Ibrahim, escaped from the building — one through the embassy's front door and the other through the back.

One took shelter under a tree in the back garden of the embassy courtyard and the other made a run for a nearby police armored personnel carrier and got inside.

The car then maneuvered around and picked up the man hiding in the back. One of about 15 police sharpshooters stood where the car had been stationed.

Two shots rang out but it was not immediately clear who fired them. Reports from Cairo said that both the ambassador and the other hostages were "safe" inside the three-story embassy. But earlier, a hostage told police the terrorists massacred most of their captives and that only Ambassador Ahmed Kamel Utama and three others were still alive.

The Kuwaiti ambassador to Turkey contacted Utama in the embassy and was told that "all the Egyptians held hostage inside the embassy were 'safe' and that the Egyptian news agency reported. The embassy was surrounded by Turkish troops and armored cars.

The embassy was plunged into chaos by the Turkish woman in the envoy's orders as Turkish soldiers kept vigil on the lawn. Ambassador Ahmed Kamel Utama asked the commander of the Turkish troops ringing the area to switch off the floodlights trained on the building because the light made the gunmen nervous and might endanger the hostages lives.

The ambassador was being held at the embassy as he spoke, a Turkish official said.

Late Friday evening troops delivered food for the hostages — believed to number about 20 — and security officials said they understood the Turkish woman in the embassy would be going to the door to pick it up.

In Cairo, Khalil said earlier the Turkish ambassador to Egypt contacted him asking permission to use force to end the siege. Khalil said he "requested that the Turkish government exhaust all peaceful methods first and that it should not resort to force unless this was absolutely necessary to preserve the lives of Egyptian hostages."

In leaflets dropped from the embassy windows, the terrorists demanded that Turkey formally recognize the Palestine Liberation Organization and diplomatic relations with Egypt and Israel. They also demanded a bus to the airport and a plane to fly them and their remaining hostages to an undisclosed destination.

They set a series of deadlines threatening to blow up the embassy and kill their hostages unless their demands were met.

Church opposes text changes Panel readies SALT 'reservations'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee Friday worked to develop a series of reservations to the SALT treaty that might improve chances of Senate ratification without triggering a Soviet confrontation.

Chairman Frank Church told reporters there was "an emerging consensus" on a series of recommendations that could be unveiled next week.

But Church reiterated, "I would oppose any change in the text."

Before signing the treaty in Vienna last month, Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev warned that any attempt by the Senate to alter the terms of the treaty would be unacceptable and would lead to a breakdown in future arms talks.

Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Dele., has proposed a

series of eight reservations that include making Brezhnev's assurances on "restraining the Backfire bomber part of the treaty."

In addition, Sen. Charles Percy, R-Ill., introduced two understandings — one to assure the U.S. right to transfer advanced technology to NATO allies and the other to prevent extension of the treaty protocol without Senate consent.

The reservations and understandings — additions to the treaty package — would not change the treaty itself. The Soviets have rejected changes in the treaty but it was unclear whether they would accept additions to the package.

SALT critics consider the Backfire bomber a strategic weapon that should be subject to strategic arms treaty limitations. The administration has accepted the Soviet contention

that the Backfire is a medium bomber and not covered by SALT.

Senate Republican leader Howard Baker, a Republican presidential aspirant, Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., and other hardliners were expected to force the issue.

They probably will offer an amendment to the treaty that would reclassify the Backfire as a strategic bomber.

"If we are going to deal with it (Backfire), it ought to be done in a substantial way," Baker told reporters Friday. "We ought not to undertake an idle gesture."

If the critics rally 51 votes in favor of such a proposal — which seems possible — the Senate will have made a fundamental change in the

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Idaho gas hits \$1

BOISE (UPI) — Eleven full-service stations among those surveyed this week by the Idaho State Automobile Association are charging more than \$1 for a gallon of premium gasoline, with one station's pumps reading \$1.07.

Association Manager Ken Miller said one full-service station is asking 99.9 cents for a gallon of regular gasoline, while nine stations price unleaded fuel at 99.9.

Although prices remain on the climb, Miller said, the availability of gasoline appears to be leveling off after a weeks-long decline.

"There are spot shortages of the various grades, but they are not serious enough to prevent motorists from obtaining fuel," the manager said.

Various gasoline vendors continue to juggle operating hours so they can get through the month with some gas left in their tanks, Miller added.

He said some stations are working on split shifts, others staying open until 5 or 6 p.m., and still others not closing until 10 p.m.

The weekly survey covered 58 stations in eastern Oregon, northern Nevada, plus southern and eastern Idaho.

"There are enough 24-hour stations operating seven days a week on major highways so that Sunday and night driving is possible — providing motorists buy when their tank is half full," Miller said.

Association members are taking shorter trips this year, Miller said, and there are fewer families with children traveling. But, he noted, there has been a recent increase in the number of out-of-state cars traversing Idaho.

Average prices per gallon of gasoline, according to the survey, are: for full service, regular, 94 cents; premium, 99 cents; and unleaded, 97 cents. Average self-service prices are, regular, 91.2; premium, 96.8; and unleaded, 95.3.

U.S. industrial output declines

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's industrial output declined during June — the second time in three months — the Federal Reserve Board said Friday, lending support to arguments that a recession is under way in the United States.

Output of consumer goods, particularly automobiles, was the main contributor to the 0.3 percent drop in industrial production last month, the nation's central bank said.

Industrial production, which is the total output of the nation's mines, factories and utilities, slumped by 1.5 percent during April due to the Teamsters strike. It rebounded from the effects of that strike in May, rising 1.2 percent.

The June decline was attributed directly to a softening economy and was not influenced by any unusual outside occurrences.

For the entire second quarter, the Fed said, production was 0.3 percent below the first quarter.

Skylab pieces entice NASA

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The space agency said Friday it would like to borrow some of the Skylab pieces gathered by Australians, promising to return them with certificates of authenticity.

The agency said some debris "of potential scientific interest" may be among the chunks reported picked up by souvenir hunters in southwestern Australia's "Outback."

"If the holders desire to surrender selected objects for study purposes, the materials will be returned later along with

appropriate certification of their authenticity as well as an expression of appreciation from the U.S. government," an agency statement said.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said the Australian government "has been fully cooperative" and has reported no injuries or damage from Skylab spectacular disintegration Wednesday.

A team of Skylab specialists was due to arrive in Sydney Sunday at the invitation of the Australian government to survey the Skylab wreckage and its pattern of

"The main objective of the five-man team will be to identify Skylab debris and obtain facts and hardware that may have technical or scientific value in the future, and to interview eye witnesses," NASA said.

The engineers from the Marshall Space Flight Center at Huntsville, Ala., where the big space station was designed, will attempt to trace the location of pieces in Skylab to improve future predictions of how large spacecraft break up when they drop out of orbit.

The engineers also want to better estimate the size of the debris path produced when the 77-ton space station

Lethal injection a problem

BOISE (UPI) — Convicted killer David A. Osborn may die by lethal injection as mandated by Idaho's newest execution law, but prison officials say they are unsure how the sentence would be carried out.

Osborn, 39, Slaterville, Utah, was sentenced last month in 6th District Court for the "especially heinous, atrocious and cruel" multiple-gunsbot shooting of his Pocatello girlfriend.

Osborn at his sentencing became the third Utah killer in three years to tell a court he would accept his death, but his attorney, Hartwell Blake of Pocatello, since has appealed the sentence and the conviction.

Sixth District Court Judge Arthur Oliver will review Blake's motion to "reduce or correct" the death sentence, while the Idaho Supreme Court will hear the conviction appeal.

L.D. Smith, deputy warden at the Idaho State Penitentiary — where Osborn sits on death row — said Friday the state Corrections Department has not come up with a way to carry out the lethal injection statute.

The 1978 law says nothing about how a convict's death would be caused, said Deputy Attorney General Lynn Thomas.

"It is very short," Thomas said of the law. "It says death shall be administered by lethal injection. It leaves the choice of substance and administration up to the Corrections Department."

Possibilities include a firing-squad type method, where three persons would inject a murderer — but only one of the injections would be deadly and the use of a lifeline-like tube strung into the execution chamber from another room, activated by an unknown executioner.

A third, but remote, possibility would be a single, hooded executioner shooting a poisonous substance through a killer's veins, said Smith.

"We can't tell you how it would be done," Smith said. "We haven't executed anyone since 1957 and never executed anyone under the new law. We don't have the experience."

Smith said Corrections Director C.W. Crowl and other officials were "processing and developing a procedure to execute anyone under the new law."

Should they finalize their thoughts on the method, Smith said, there still would be a problem of recruiting an executioner or executioners.

"There are some questions regarding the involvement of medically-trained people," the deputy warden said. "They have a code and I think they're just not that anxious to get involved."

He thinks it's unlikely they would take someone off the street and let them do it. Putting an intravenous device into someone is not something we would want anyone to do. That probably means we would have to get a specially-trained, medical person to do it."

Osborn was convicted of the Halloween-night slaying of Charlotte Carl, whose body was found along a roadside. She had been shot five times with a single-action pistol.

Nixon says U.S. shouldn't grease its friends' skids

CUERNAVACA, Mexico (UPI) — Former President Richard Nixon, who says the United States should not "grease the skids" of friends such as the shah of Iran and Nicaragua's President Anastasio Somoza, visited the exiled shah Friday in a one-day journey to Mexico.

"One principle ... that I have followed ... is that whether it's in Vietnam or it's in Iran, you don't grease the skids for your friends," Nixon said.

Nicaraguan rebels plan to enter capital by Sunday

President Anastasio Somoza slipped out of Nicaragua for a few hours Friday and went to Guatemala for a meeting with foreign ministers of undisclosed countries, then returned to Managua, U.S. State Department officials said.

State Department officials said Somoza had gone to Guatemala and met with a number of foreign ministers and had since returned to Nicaragua. Earlier, the State Department appealed again for Somoza's resignation to make way for a provisional government.

The report on Somoza came from U.S. officials in Washington as Sandinista guerrillas sent patrols into Managua Friday in preparation for a showdown with the national guard unless Somoza accepts a Sandinista proposal to end the civil war.

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Hundreds of Pennsylvania and Delaware independent gasoline dealers kept their pumps locked Friday to protest the federal gas allocation system and low profits.

Planes return to air

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Federal Aviation Administrator Langhorne Bond Friday approved the return of the DC-10 to the nation's airways, with orders for frequent inspections and some modifications.

"Today, I am returning the DC-10 fleet to the air," said Bond. "We have resolved to my satisfaction the safety questions raised by the tragic crash of flight 191 in Chicago and we have worked out strict measures to assure that such a crash will not occur again."

Up to 90 percent of service stations were reported closed in the five-county Philadelphia area and the figure was about 75 percent in Pittsburgh, according to government figures. Statewide up to 30 percent of service stations were reported closed.

Sanctuary for whales

LONDON (UPI) — The 23-nation International Whaling Commission voted overwhelmingly Friday to make the Indian Ocean a "sanctuary for whales" for the next 10 years.

Space record near

MOSCOW (UPI) — While they are asleep before dawn Sunday, two Soviet cosmonauts orbiting 250 miles above Earth will set a new world-manned spaceflight endurance record.

Soyuz 3 cosmonauts Vladimir Lyakhov and Valery Ryumin, who were launched into space Feb. 25, will break the old space endurance record of 139 days, 14 hours, 48 minutes set by two other Russians last November.

Japan, South Korea and the Soviet Union voted no. Banned is all commercial whaling in the Indian Ocean as far south as 55 degrees latitude for the next decade.

Amtrak sale rapped

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Frank Church Friday charged that the Department of Transportation is guilty of duplicity in claiming a shortage of Amtrak passenger equipment, while advertising the sale of 63 passenger cars.

Earlier, the commission banned factory ship whaling — except for the small Minke whales, which are not endangered.

"Until two weeks ago, the department was publishing an offer to sell 63 rail passenger cars," Church said. "The department's announcement said the cars needed little or no repair."

Carter visits again

THURMONT, Md. (UPI) — President Carter Friday stole off to another back porch summit with "folks out in the boondocks."

"Yet... the department was justifying its scheduled termination of 43 percent of the Amtrak passenger network on grounds that there is insufficient equipment to run the present system."

Hours after Carter returned to Camp David from a quick, secretive trip to West Virginia, press secretary Jody Powell scoffed at rumors the president might announce his resignation, or a decision not to seek reelection when he addresses the nation on television Sunday night.

Church said the department withdrew the offer to sell the cars when it was noticed by members of Congress and complaints were lodged.

Marvin Porterfield, the Martinsburg, W.Va., cattle farmer, who received a surprise visit from Carter Friday morning, said "He was very relaxed and he had a lot of answers to his inquiries."

The Idaho Democrat said he also is investigating reports the department is withholding equipment from trains it wants to eliminate.

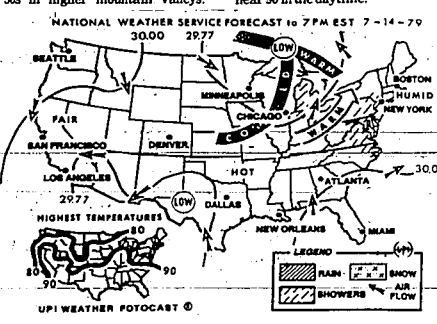
Elk City's 32 and McCall's 35 were the coolest.

Speculation over gangland war follows murder of Mafia leader

NEW YORK (UPI) — Organized crime experts differ on what might occur as the result of the execution of Mafia don Carmine Galante, but no one is forgetting that he gangland his fallowed the 1972 murder of Joseph "Crazy Joe" Gallo.

Authorities called the killing of the 69-year-old "godfather" of the Joseph Bonanno crime family one of the most significant mob hits since Albert Anastasia was gunned down before dozens of people on Oct. 25, 1957, as he sat in a barber shop in Manhattan's Park Sheraton Hotel.

But while some officials speculated that the slaying would touch off a full-scale mob war, others theorized that it was an intra-family hit ordered by Bonanno himself. Bonanno lives in Tucson, Ariz., but reputedly runs various gambling and narcotics rackets on the West Coast.

In a court appearance in U.S. District Court in San Jose, Calif., Friday, Bonanno declined comment on the killing.

An attorney who said, "Mr. Bonanno is not making statements at this time about anything."

He is charged with obstructing justice by concealing evidence from a federal grand jury investigating the possibility that legitimate businesses operated by Bonanno's two sons are laundering mob money.

Chief of Detectives James Sullivan, who is coordinating the murder investigation, "There are mixed impressions on that. If a hit was authorized by the appropriate people in the crime family, then perhaps there will not be repercussions. We'll have to see the tempo of things over the next few days."

Authorities were searching Friday for two men described as Galante henchmen who may have set the don up for his execution.

The two, Caesar Bonventre and Baldo Amato, both 28 and of Brooklyn, arrived at the restaurant about an hour after Galante and apparently were invited by the mob chief to join him at his table, according to Sullivan.

Hansen caught speeding

AMERICAN FALLS (UPI) — U.S. Rep. George Hansen was caught Thursday to appear before a Pocatello County magistrate to enter a plea on a citation he received July 2 for driving 79 mph on Interstate 86.

Idaho State Police Trooper Craig Peterson, who ticketed the Idaho Republican east of American Falls, said when he stopped Hansen's car, the congressman said he might have congressional immunity from receiving a speeding ticket.

The trooper said it was his understanding that congressional immunity only applied while a representative was traveling to and from Congress. He told Hansen the matter would have to be discussed before a judge.

Hansen, who voted for the 55 mph law, faces a possible fine of \$37 plus \$10 court costs.

State Law Enforcement officials said Friday the July 2 incident was the second time in a month Hansen had been flagged down for speeding on an interstate highway in Idaho.

Information officer John Rooney said Hansen's automobile was clocked at 81 mph May 18 on Interstate 15 near Pocatello. State Trooper Emery Webster immediately recognized Hansen as a congressman, Rooney said.

Webster's traffic report on his meeting with Hansen said, "Mr. Hansen stated he had several meetings he was late for."

Webster said Hansen promised to obey the speed limit in the future. Webster said in his report that he told Hansen, "under the circumstances I was not going to cite him."

No summer vacation for city council

It's going to be a long, hot summer for the Twin Falls City Council.

The council will make decisions in the next six weeks which will determine in many ways the city's future growth and character.

First, by early September the council must trim city expenditures by at least 10 percent because city revenues have been frozen at last year's level by legislation implementing the 1 percent initiative.

That means cutbacks in city staff and city services.

A city derives its character in large part from the amenities it offers its residents, and while people tend to take vital services for granted, they fight like crazy when their recreation is threatened.

The council already has indicated it will fund vital services fully, so it is the amenities which will have to go.

It's a no-win situation for the council because unlike vital services, non-essential services are not equally enjoyed by everyone.

Some participate in the recreation program. Some play golf. Some listen to the city band. Some enjoy seeing the Christmas lights on the downtown mall.

If the council decides to maintain one service, another must go.

The council perhaps can reduce the magnitude of its problem by following the advice of the city employees association and cut staff, not staff wages and benefits.

In theory, the staff members who will be cut will be the least productive, those near retirement or near quitting, or those judged least competent.

Thus a 10 percent cut in staff will not necessarily mean a 10 percent cut in services provided, and the city will be more able to keep its best employees by offering better wages and benefits.

Even with staff cutbacks, however, some of the amenities will have to go, and the council will have to ignore much weeping and gnashing of teeth in the process.

And if the city's budget problems are not bad enough, the council must also make the final decisions on a comprehensive plan which will govern the city's future growth.

To make matters worse, the council has inherited from the planning and zoning commission most of the really tough decisions on the comprehensive plan.

The commission largely ignored the protests of city developers and realtors in passing its version of the plan, and now the council, where the buck stops here in Twin Falls, must perform the tedious task of hammering out compromises on the proposed plan.

Though it is the council members who must sit through long, hot nights at City Hall and listen to unhappy constituents, all the residents of Twin Falls will have to live with whatever decisions the council makes.

The council needs all the help it can get this summer.

Majority wins

BEIJING — I went to China with our beloved and revered Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, who is referred to by his staff as Chairman Jo. Before the taxpayer gets too excited, I want to make it perfectly clear that I paid my own way including air fare, hotels and all meals, except for banquets given in honor of Chairman Jo, which the Chinese taxpayers picked up, though I'm not sure they were told about it.

When the history of normalization between the United States and China is written, three American names will be engraved in the Sino-American Hall of Fame — President Richard Nixon, Henry Kissinger and Joseph Califano, not necessarily in that order. What Nixon and Kissinger started, Califano finished. His health agreement, which he signed with Dr. Qian Zhisong, Minister of Public Health in the People's Republic, was a landmark document — in which we promised not to supply them with saccharin and Darvon, if they promised not to send us Asiatil.

This required a great deal of toasts and speeches. Every half-hour a Chinese deputy vice-minister would pledge eternal friendship between the People's Republic of China and the United States, and Califano in turn would pledge the eternal friendship of the American people for China. Then we'd go off to see another brain operation.

We arrived in Beijing — a party of health, education, and welfare experts, and a handful of press — to a tumultuous reception. On the drive from the airport into town, millions of Chinese people lined the streets. Most of them were on bikes pedaling in the opposite direction, and others were bent over hoeing their fields, but Secretary Califano's press secretary, Susan McBea, said we were permitted to include them in counting the crowd. Later I found out there is a tradition going back to the Ming Dynasty that everyone has to turn his or her back when a famous bureaucrat goes by, or it brings that person bad luck.

Phil Coyelin of The Washington Post, who was traveling with me in the motorcade, said he could only compare the reception Califano got in Peking with the one the secretary received a few months earlier when he drove from the airport through tobacco country in Durham, N.C.

Our beloved secretary not only signed a health treaty with the Chinese but also an agreement to discuss an education treaty. Therefore, we were entertained by health officials, education officials, welfare officials and deputy directors, vice-premiers, ministers and Bob Hope.

AT A banquet in Beijing, a high-level Chinese administrator asked me quietly what Secretary Califano REALLY did. I tried to explain it in terms he would understand. "The secretary is the most powerful man in America. He can make you take a swine-flu shot, bus your child to school, hold up your Social Security check, stop you from smoking in a public place, and decide whether or not you need an abortion."

"You could call him the American Mao Tse-tung. But instead of a little red book, the people wave HEW regulations at him when they parade in front of his building to show how much they love him."

"The Chinese official said, 'He's that powerful!'"

"Powerful isn't the word," I told him. "If you wanted to build the Great Wall in the United States you would first have to prove to Secretary Califano that you would hire as many women as men to drag up the stones or he would refuse to fund it."

"Who does he answer to?" "The President and Congress."

"How?" "Very carefully."

Califano ends China task

WASHINGTON — It was only yesterday, so to speak, that the Supreme Court was full of the self-righteous juices of self-restraint. Under our constitutional framework," wrote Justice Marshall, rolling his eyes to heaven, "federal courts do not sit as councils of revision, empowered to rewrite legislation in accord with their own conceptions of prudent public policy."

out the plain and unambiguous language of the Civil Rights Act and rewrite Title VII to suit the majority's will. The result is a sanction racial discrimination in private employment as blatant, as cruel and as indefensible as any of the impositions once visited by the white south upon its Negro people. The facts are not in dispute. In an effort to correct racial imbalance at its plant in Gramercy, La., the Kaiser Aluminum Company and the steelworkers union agreed upon a plan by which more blacks would be trained for skilled crafts. Selection of trainees was to be made on the basis of seniority, with the proviso that at least 50 percent of the new trainees were to be black.

Thirteen men were selected for the first class, six white, seven black. The most junior blacks had less seniority than several white workers

whose applications were rejected.

Among the rejected white applicants was Brian Weber. He brought a class action suit against the company and the union, alleging violation of the Civil Rights Act. The lower courts agreed that his rights had been violated. The Supreme Court last week reversed, finding nothing unfair in a racially conscious program such as this case.

The majority's hypocrisy begins to belie and invites contempt. As Chief Justice Burger said in dissent, "The applicable part of Title VII is a statute 'of extraordinary clarity.' This is what the act says:

"It shall be an unlawful employment practice for any employer, labor organization or joint labor-management committee controlling apprenticeship or other training programs to discriminate against

any individual because of his race, color, religion, sex or national origin in admission to, or employment in, any program established to provide apprenticeship or other training."

The act further makes it unlawful to discriminate against any individual with respect to "privileges of employment." The act positively forbids any racial classification which would adversely affect (any individual's) status as an "employee."

We could not be more clearly lifted together. In earlier cases, the Court has said as much. In a 1976 case the Court unanimously agreed that Title VII "prohibits racial discrimination against the white petitioners in this case upon the same standards as would be applicable were they Negroes." In a 1971 case, another unanimous court agreed that under the act, "discriminatory preference, for any group, minority or majority, is precisely and only what Congress has proscribed."

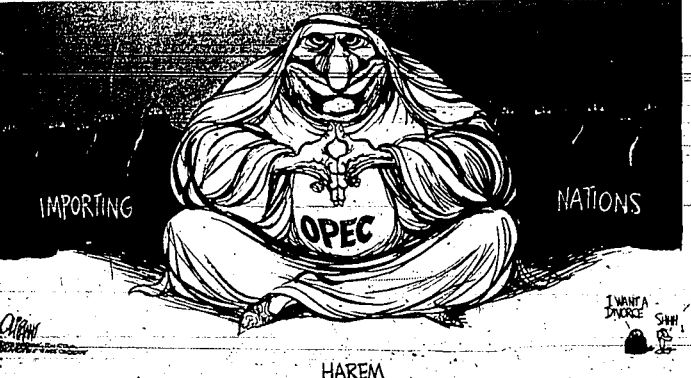
All of that now goes down the drain. The quota system created by Kaiser and the union unquestionably discriminates by reason of race. Brian Weber was barred from the training program for one reason and one reason only — the color of his skin. It is impossible to understand how such palpable, undisguised racial discrimination can survive within the law and the Constitution.

By this blind act of judicial legislation the Court turns the law of racial discrimination back to some point before Plessy vs. Ferguson. That was the 1896 case that created the scheme of "separate but equal." The Court's decision in the Weber case does not even reach for equality. Last week the Court hung up the same kind of racist sign once hoisted against Chinese in California and against Irish in New England. At the Kaiser plant, beyond a certain point, NO WHITES NEED APPLY.

Hazelton man dies in truck rollover

JEROME — A Hazelton man died instantly of massive head injuries after being thrown from his pickup truck in a one-vehicle rollover near Eden early Friday morning.

CSI museum could open in October

TWIN FALLS — The College of Southern Idaho is advertising for bids on heating and cooling equipment for the Norman Herrett Museum, now under construction.

The bids, to supply apparatus needed to keep the museum's delicate anthropology exhibits within a narrow temperature and humidity range, will be opened July 23, according to Robert McManaman,

physical plant director. McManaman's crew will install the equipment.

Hopeful for an October completion date, McManaman said construction material shipping delays make it impossible to predict exactly when the museum will open. The exterior of the building is done, with the exception of doors, windows, walkways, and the roof. On the

inside, electrical work is in progress, he said.

Meanwhile, the museum staff is preparing new permanent exhibits and adapting the old ones, which are still housed at Herrett's Jewellers on Kimberly Road. Many of the old displays must be rewired to conform to state electrical codes, according to museum director James Woods.

The staff is also constructing a

traveling exhibit on the prehistoric peoples of the Snake River Plain. Woods said eight Idaho anthropologists are consultants for the project, which is funded by a grant from the Association for the Humanities in Idaho.

The college will also publish a book this fall to further emphasize the museum's opening. Entitled "Archeology in Southern Idaho," it was written by Mark Flew, archeologist for the Idaho State Historical Society.

Local artist William Reed is providing all the art work for both the book and the traveling exhibit.

Uncertain stock market slides again

NEW YORK (UPI) — The stock market, reflecting investor uncertainty about President Carter's pending energy proposals, fell in heavy trading Friday for the fourth straight session although it recovered somewhat at the end.

The Dow Jones industrial average, down 7 points at the outset following a 7-point setback Thursday, fell 3.53 points to 833.83, bringing its four-day total to 19.46 points. The closely watched average dropped 12.63 points for the week.

The New York Stock Exchange index lost 0.21 to 38.17 and the price of a share shed 11 cents. Declines topped advances, 91 to 509, among the 1,380 issues traded at 4 p.m. EDT.

International Telephone & Telegraph, a 2 1/2-point loser the previous two sessions, rebounded 1/4 to 28 1/2 in active trading. The stock had been under pressure since Lyman Hamblin resigned as president late Thursday after serving only 18 months.

Since the firm has denied it is involved in merger discussions, many arbitrageurs and speculators have been up on the stock, according to the Wall Street Journal. Cessna, a major Beech competitor, dropped 10 to 19.

McDonnell Douglas gained 3/4 to 26 1/2. The Federal Aviation Administration Friday lifted its month-long ban on flights of McDonnell

Douglas' DC10 jumbo jet that had been grounded because of engine mount problems.

Wylain gained 4 3/4 to 17 1/2. TRE Corp. has bought 5.12 percent of the firm's stock and said it might try to take control of Wylain. Koching climbed 1 3/4 to 26. The company said it could not explain the strength in its stock.

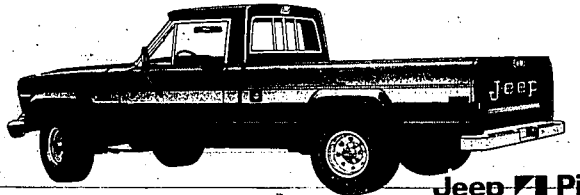

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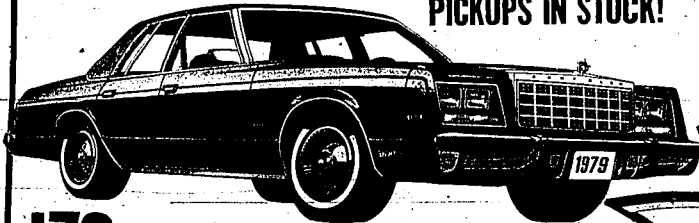

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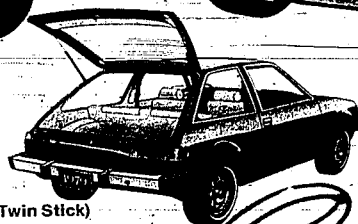
