

## Energy independence plan laid out

WASHINGTON — President Carter said Sunday night that the energy crisis offers the nation an opportunity to overcome a growing "crisis of confidence" in its spirit and, promising to act boldly, laid out a series of steps he said would move the country toward energy independence.

In an extraordinarily self-critical speech to a national television audience, Carter announced that he is immediately imposing quotas to hold the level of oil imported into the United States to its 1977 level of 8.5 million barrels a day — the highest in the nation's history.

The president announced other steps to deal with the energy shortage, including the "most massive peacetime commitment of funds" to develop alternative energy sources, a request to Congress to create an "Energy Security Corp." that would issue up to \$5 billion in bonds for the effort, and a proposal that Congress create an "Energy Mobilization Board" to cut through red tape in approving new energy projects.

None of the proposals came as a major surprise as Carter detailed his new energy plan, which was put together during his extraordinary 10-day "domestic summit conference" at Camp David, Md.

The speech from the Oval Office of the White House was the most politically critical of Carter's 2 1/2 year presidency. Almost two-thirds of the address amounted to something of a sermon as the president, his tone solemn and his manner far more animated than usual, detailed what he called an "erosion of our confidence in the future" that is "threatening to destroy the social and political fabric of America."

"Clearly trying to overcome his public image as a weak leader — an image that threatens his chances for reelection — the president declared: "I do not promise a quick way out" of our nation's problems — when the truth is that the only way out is an

all-out effort. What I do promise you is that I will lead our fight. I will enforce fairness in our struggle. I will ensure honesty and, above all, I will act."

The president enumerated a six-point program that he said is designed to meet the "clear and present danger to our nation" of the energy crisis.

Carter said he would:

- Restrict U.S. consumption of foreign oil to 1977 levels of 8.5 million barrels a day which were the highest in the nation's history. He called for a halving of oil imports by the end of the next decade at a savings he estimated to be 4.5 million barrels a day.

- Use of his presidential authority to impose oil import quotas to implement the limits starting in 1979 and 1980.
- Commit the United States to a "massive" program of developing coal, oil shale, geothermal and solar energy sources. The program would be financed by issuing \$5 billion in energy bonds — in small denominations. The president also proposed creation of a national solar bank to help achieve the goal of deriving 20 percent of all energy from the sun by the year 2000.
- Require through congressional action that the nation's utility companies cut consumption of oil by 50 percent in the next decade and

- shift to other fuels — principally coal.
- Establish, also by action of Congress, a national energy mobilization board comparable to the World War II War Production Board.
- Creation of a "bold conservation program" which would include stand-by gasoline rationing authority from Congress, mandatory conservation measures and an extra \$10 billion over the next decade to strengthen public transportation.

After the speech, Carter walked out of the Oval Office and across the corridor to the Roosevelt Room where he was greeted with applause from his cabinet and senior staff.

## Boy dies as plane crashes

BELLEVUE — A 16-year-old Ketchum boy died Saturday morning when the plane he was flying alone crashed four miles south of here.

Glenn P. Slemmon, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Slemmon, had been taking flying lessons for a year and soloing for a month. He was apparently attempting some manoeuvres when the crash occurred.

The plane, a Piper Tomahawk, was rented from the youth's flying school.

Reports indicate that Slemmon had taken off from the Friedman Memorial Airport at Hixley earlier that morning. Witnesses reported seeing the plane in a spin and hearing the motor stop and start. No one is reported to have seen the plane crash.

The Blaine County Sheriff's Department said two men who walked to the scene of the accident were unable to get a pulse from the victim.

Slemmon is survived by his parents; two brothers, Scott and Mark; a sister, Kelly; and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Laddie Mullard of Ketchum and Mrs. E. J. Slemmon Sr. of McHenry, Ill.

Slemmon was a honor student at Wood River High School with interests in science, fiction, ecology and conservation.

## Next lunar trips decade in future

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The first men to walk on the moon set out on their historic expedition 10 years ago today.

Space officials say it will be at least another decade before Americans return to the moon.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration doesn't even have plans to send automated spacecraft back to the moon to fill in some of the scientific gaps left after six Apollo landing expeditions.

"If you look at NASA's five year plan, you won't discover any lunar missions in there," said Dr. Thomas Hatch, the agency's new associate administrator in charge of space science.

Mutch said in an interview it is clear Americans won't be going to the moon in the 1980s, but he said this could change 10 years from now.

## Reaction Generally favorable but a few sharp digs

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The politicians who will make the final decisions on President Carter's energy program generally agreed Sunday night that the president gave the best speech of his presidency, but many, including some of the smattering of 1980 rivals — got in a few digs against specific proposals.

Former Texas Gov. John Connally, among the frontrunners for the GOP nomination, said Carter "was absolutely correct in setting forth a crisis in confidence," but he said Carter's ovation has caused the crisis.

"His speech tonight was almost a repeat of what he said in the spring of 1977," said Connally.

California Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. criticized Carter for not addressing the issue of nuclear power.

"I think he should have taken a very firm stand against the expansion of nuclear power. This is a serious problem for this country and he said nothing about it."

But for the most part, members of Congress and others who have the fate of Carter's programs in their hands said that he was impressive and they promised to work with him.

"It was one of the strongest speeches I have ever heard and the best speech he has made since said House Speaker Thomas O'Neill. "I am confident the American people will respond with the necessary sacrifices and that Congress will pull together in this time of crisis."

Sen. Russell Long, D-La., a key congressman on energy and tax matters, said he wished Carter had stressed increased production of conventional oil and gas as well as coal.

Sen. Harrison A. Williams, D-N.J., called the president's speech "a strong first step down the road to national recovery... This was a very convincing call to America to search for America."

House Republican leader John Rhodes, R-Ariz., said Carter "has finally heard what we Republicans have been trying to tell him, namely that energy supply is the name of the game, that we must stop depending on uncertain foreign sources and start developing our own sources of alternative energy."

"I was a great sounding speech," said Rhodes. "But his proposals will require a high level of follow-through with the Congress, and I want to see what the specifics will look like."

Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., and Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., respectively chairman and ranking GOP member of the Senate Energy Committee, said the main thrust of Carter's energy program is already embodied in legislation now before

their panel.

Jackson predicted the bill, which carries major provisions for solar and synthetic energy as well as the National Energy Mobilization Board, will pass the Senate by Aug. 3.

"I commend the president," Jackson said.

Hatfield said the speech was one of Carter's best and he "certainly was the president of all the people in that speech."

"I think it was his most forceful speech to date," said Hatfield, adding that Carter had "forced the issue" of the nation's dependence on foreign oil.

But Hatfield added, "I think the real test of Jimmy Carter is in the follow-through. I think the people want to see policy match the rhetoric."

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., a potential political rival for Carter, said he thought the president "set ambitious goals for a resolution of the energy problem" and vowed to work with him.

"I look forward to hearing the details of his program and I pledge to work with him to achieve the goals he has set," Kennedy said.

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## Crime study includes Twin Falls

# Few assailants end up behind bars

TWIN FALLS — Most cases of aggravated assault and rape are dismissed or result in light sentences, frequently because of a lack of cooperation from victims, a recent crime study found.

The study of aggravated assault and rape in five counties including Twin Falls was made by the Statistical Analysis Center for the Law Enforcement Planning Commission in Idaho.

Low conviction and low arrest rates for light sentences, the study said, might be partly because more than 50 percent of the victims were assaulted by someone they knew.

In 45 percent of aggravated assault and rape the perpetrators were identified but not arrested. The arrest rate for adult offenders is 40 percent and for juvenile offenders, 62 percent.

Of those arrested, only 12 percent subsequently had criminal charges filed against them. Another 25 percent of those were dismissed in court on motions from prosecuting attorneys.

Of the small number prosecuted, 48.5 percent of the males were convicted and 48 percent of the females.

The five county study reviewed 808 offenders, finding only 27, or 3 percent, went to prison.

It found white women students, 25 and younger, are the most likely victims of aggravated assault, and Saturdays between 11 p.m. and 1 a.m. in the month of July are the most likely times.

The study found about one of five assaults is committed from motive and not "in the heat of passion" or as a result of arguments. Disputes over money, feuds between relatives and non-relatives, vengeful assaults,

traffic related assaults and assaults related to domestic or romantic life were the most common.

The criminal justice system has not been able to impose action to discourage assault, the findings indicate. Base on court recorded orders for restitution, the study says offenders are rarely required to pay for injury or property damage.

Of 107 cases cleared by exception, 67 could not be prosecuted because of problems with victims. Fourteen of 70 cases dismissed were not prosecuted because of uncooperative victims.

There were 283 adults arrested, of whom only 8.8 percent were female. Of 67 juveniles arrested, 16.4 percent were female.

Of the cases brought to court, 70 percent were misdemeanors. Less than 10 percent of the offenders arrested on felony charges were convicted of felonies.

The statistics showed female juveniles had the highest conviction rate, 55 percent, compared to 41 percent for male offenders.

The study recommends more charges and convictions be made felonies and more restitution be ordered.

The report also shows August is the leading month for rapes. Monday is the day of least occurrence for both rape and aggravated assault.

About 54 percent of the rape cases end in an arrest, compared to 57 for aggravated assault.

The most frequently arrested age is 17 for rapists and 18 for assaultants. While 85 percent of those arrested for rape are under 25, only 63 percent of those arrested for assault are in that age category.

The probability that a rapist will go to prison is one out of 26, and one out of 30 for assaultants.

## Senate takes up nuclear power plant moratorium

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A proposed stiff moratorium on nuclear power plants comes before the Senate today. But the proposal's aim of improving safety plans for communities near reactors may already have been achieved.

The \$373.3 million Nuclear Regulatory Commission authorization bill includes a provision adopted by the Environment and Public Works Committee shutting down existing reactors unless host states adopt NRC-approved evacuation plans within six months. It also would bar operating licenses for new reactors until the state had an approved plan.

Meanwhile, the House is to take up the \$42.1 billion defense authorization bill for 1980, which will involve a debate on reintroducing the draft.

Before that, however, the \$7.8 billion foreign aid bill should reach the House floor Tuesday, a measure that includes a ban on military assistance to Panama.

The House also has on its agenda a showdown vote on Amtrak, which will lose 43 percent of its route miles unless Congress gives it more money. —A move will be made to freeze the system in place for a year. Barring that, enough money probably will be added to keep some of the trains running.

The Senate nuclear debate will focus on the 16 states, with 41 reactors, that do not have NRC-approved evacuation plans.

Pro-nuclear Sens. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La., and James McClure, R-Idaho, will try to kill the moratorium sponsored by Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., chairman of the nuclear regulation subcommittee.

A similar moratorium lost in the House earlier this year.

## India's Desai resigns

**NEW DELHI** — India's Prime Minister Morarji Desai resigned Sunday evening after a defection of more than 90 parliamentary members of his ruling Janata Party the past six days left him too weak to remain in power.

The 83-year-old leader submitted his resignation to the country's president, Neelam Sanjiva Reddy, when it became clear he would be unable to survive a no-confidence vote in the lower house of the Indian parliament, scheduled for today.

## Fugitive Corbett arrested

**REDWOOD CITY, Calif. (UPI)** — Joseph Corbett Jr., 51, who served 18 years in prison for the slaying of brewery executive Adolph Coors III, has been taken into custody as an AWOL parolee, the San Mateo County Sheriff's Department reported Sunday.

A department spokesman said he was arrested near Emerald Lake in the hills behind Redwood City. He said the fugitive offered no resistance.

Corbett was paroled from the Colorado State Prison last Tuesday and flew to Redwood City where he hoped to find a job as a X-ray technician. He was not to have left California but was seen in Denver on Wednesday, missing an appointment with his parole officer the next day.

The FBI in Denver issued a warrant for his arrest and said Corbett, who had maintained his innocence in Coors' kidnapping and slaying, should be considered armed and dangerous. Colorado and California issued similar warrants.

## Tribute paid Fiedler

**BOSTON (UPI)** — More than 7,000 music lovers lined the banks of the Charles River on a rainy Sunday night to pay tribute to the late Boston Pops conductor Arthur Fiedler, who died last of a heart attack Tuesday.

Metropolitan District Commission police had expected hundreds of thousands would gather to hear the Pops orchestra play in the Hatch Memorial Shell overlooking the river.

## Galante mass denied

**NEW YORK (UPI)** — The Roman Catholic archdiocese of New York refused Sunday to authorize a funeral mass for slain Mafia don Carmine Galante "because of the scandal that would ensue."

Rev. Felician Napoli of St. Anthony's Church in Greenwich Village said he would lead prayers Sunday night at a brief private service at the Provenzano-Lanza funeral home on the Lower East Side.

He said he would not attend a funeral which was to take place at 10:30 a.m. today at St. John's Cemetery in Queens.

## Kimball 'satisfactory'

**SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)** — Mormon Church President Spencer W. Kimball was in satisfactory condition Sunday at LDS Hospital following an attack of dizziness.

The 84-year-old church leader was admitted to the hospital Saturday afternoon and was kept in the hospital for observation.

Church spokesman Don LeFevre said he had not received word from doctors on when Kimball would be released.

Dr. Allan H. Barker said Kimball suffered "transient" symptoms of dizziness. "It is prudent to do some careful monitoring," Barker said.

Kimball walked into the hospital shortly after returning to Salt Lake City from a trip to California, which began last Thursday. Church officials said Kimball did not experience any illness during his stay in California.

## Iranians execute three

**TEHRAN, Iran (UPI)** — A revolutionary court Sunday night executed three men found guilty of bombing a crowded mosque earlier Sunday in which seven persons were killed and some 60 injured, the state radio reported.

The men were also found guilty of having fatally shot two guards in the troubled southern town of Khorramshahr Sunday, the radio said.



## Hang on tight

Thousands of people tried to form the world's longest human chain along Florida beaches Sunday to mark the 10th anniversary of the first lunar landing by American astronauts. Organizers of the Reach on the Beach at Cocoa Beach, Fla., said the idea was successful, but the 26 mile human chain was broken in some areas.

## Nixon host at party

**SAN CLEMENTE, Calif. (UPI)** — Former President Richard Nixon was host at a party for about 300 guests Sunday on the grounds of his Casa Pacifica estate to mark the 10th anniversary of the U.S. moon landing.

Fifteen astronauts and their families were on hand — plus a number of show-business figures, Republican politicians and friends of the Nixons.

The media was barred from covering the event inside the walls of the Nixon estate.

## Strike accord reported

**PITTSBURGH (UPI)** — Leaders of striking independent gasoline dealers in Pennsylvania and Delaware Sunday night announced tentative agreement on their allocation demands and an end to their brief shutdown.

"We have reached a tentative agreement with the White House on the problem we were having with allocation. I think we have the resolve on that now and were calling off the strike and urging dealers to go back to work," said Thomas Anderson, executive director of the Pennsylvania-Delaware Service Station Dealers Association.

## Terrorists surrender

**ANKARA, Turkey (UPI)** — The Palestinian Liberation Organization convinced four slugs-shooting terrorists to surrender, the Egyptian Embassy Sunday and release seven hostages they held for two days in return for a chance to publicize their views.

As the Palestinian gunmen were hustled off to a luxurious villa and later to police headquarters, Turkish Prime Minister Bulent Ecevit — who was on the verge of ordering an assault on the embassy as a last resort — vowed they "are not going to leave Turkey."

# Somoza resignation near, sources report

**MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI)** — Nicaraguan President Anastasio Somoza will resign and leave the country "very soon, within days, possibly hours," a source close to the American-sponsored peace talks said Sunday.

Sources close to the negotiations said Somoza would likely announce his resignation on a nationwide radio and television address and that he would most likely retire to his Miami mansion.

Somoza is said to have an American pledge not to permit his extradition.

Under the plan, the sources said, Somoza would turn power over to a constitutional successor who would in turn resign to allow the provisional junta to take over.

The Nicaragua congress has been standing by at the Intercontinental Hotel for three weeks for the purpose of sanctioning the constitutional succession.

U.S. Ambassador Lawrence A. Pezullo met with the president Sunday for the fourth time in four days.

Minister Miguel Ovando Bravo, archbishop of Managua and an important critic of Somoza, said Sunday he was flying to Caracas, Venezuela, to join the guerrilla-backed provisional government junta for talks with the foreign ministers of the Andean Bloc nations — Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador, Peru, and Bolivia.

The Caracas meeting was reportedly designed in part to blunt an orderly succession to follow Somoza's resignation.

Diplomatic sources in Managua

said that after the meeting, which was to open today, Venezuelan Foreign Minister Jose Alberto Zuanbono Velazco would fly to Managua with a position paper to present to Nicaraguan Foreign Minister Julio Quintana.

Earlier, a U.S. Embassy spokesman said the T-28 airplanes recently used by Nicaragua's national guard are of U.S. origin and may constitute violation of the U.S. Neutrality Act.

Fighting was generally light

across Nicaragua Sunday with most attention focused on finding a political solution to the country's civil war.

The heaviest fighting was at Matagalpa, where Sandinistas seemed on the verge of overwhelming the last guard holdout force at the Picado Lyceum, a hilltop schoolhouse outside of town.

National guard aircraft rocketed, bombed and strafed the area in support of the besieged schoolhouse garrison.

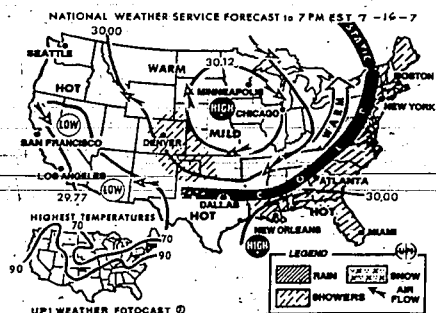
Synopsis:

The hazy outlook for the Magic Valley through Friday

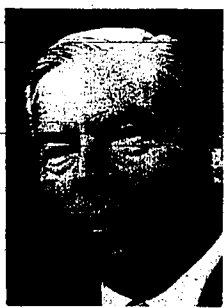

## U.S. need for energy paramount

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Republican leader John Rhodes, R-Ariz., Sunday said the United States must relax its environmental controls in order to ease the energy crunch.

Rhodes, in an interview on CBS's "Face the Nation" program, also said he was confident the Democrat-controlled Congress would pass a tax cut, but not until next year when President Carter is expected to seek a second term.

He said the United States must increase its use of coal. The nation is rich in coal, but burning certain types can pollute the air.

"It's very important to do something about negating or perhaps waiving in some selected cases some of the restrictions and regulations we've put in favor of the environment," Rhodes said.

Carter is said to oppose a tax cut now to stimulate the economy, which the White House conceded last week had now slipped into a recession.

But Rhodes said he thought Carter and Congress would wait until 1980 to pass a tax cut he said is needed now.

"I will bet you we will have a tax cut before the election," the Democrats are waiting to cut taxes until the election year," he said.

## Haig favors some SALT amendments

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gen. Alexander Haig, newly retired NATO commander, said Sunday he leans toward the idea that SALT II should be amended but has not made a final judgment yet.

"I am in the process now ... of steeping myself in the details of SALT II accords," Haig said in an interview on NBC's "Meet the Press" program.

"The details involve technical aspects of the accords ... those which would involve a judgment on my part that amendments would be necessary. I lean in that direction today but I would like to complete these assessments," he said.

Haig is due to testify soon before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, which is holding hearings on the new strategic arms limitation treaty. Supporters of SALT II hope he will counteract the lukewarm support given at last week's hearings by the joint chiefs of staff.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter and Vice President Mondale have agreed to spearhead a drive to defeat a proposed constitutional amendment that would bar forced school busing, according to Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif.

"They have told me they are ready, anxious and able," Edwards said.

Carter and Mondale probably will announce their participation this week, Edwards and Rep. Peter Rodino, D-N.J., decide how they can be most effective, Edwards said in an interview.

## Synthetic fuel program costly, slow

NEW YORK (UPI) — The expected proposal by President Carter of a huge synthetic fuels program will compel the most difficult decision of this century by Congress and the American people.

It will be a lot harder than the decisions involved in the two world wars because nearly all wartime decisions were forced upon the nation with little real choice.

But no similar threat against the supply of energy exists to compel Congress and the people to do the president's bidding.

All Americans are uneasy about the rapid growth of the country's dependence on foreign oil. A huge

synthetic fuels program seems the obvious answer. But it's a hard answer, incredibly expensive, enormously risky on both economic and environmental grounds. It is certain to result in bitter political strife.

The questions will be: "Can we afford to do it?" and "Can we afford not to do it?"

The second question, of course, is strategic. Can a great power like the United States be for long dependent in any degree on foreign energy supplies without being reduced to impotence and vulnerability to political and military blackmail?

Those in favor of a synthetic fuels program soon will be saying the nation's very survival depends on it.

Synthetic fuels are not the same as alternative fuels. Alternative fuels include nuclear energy, solar energy, geothermal energy and gasolene. There also are such sources as sea thermal energy and the dazzling new prospect of vast amounts of energy from chemical reactions triggered by light.

Synthetic fuels include oil or gas made from coal, shale rock or tar sands. The federal government already is spending about \$500 million a year on research in this field and several companies are spending large sums.

So far, however, little has been accomplished in proportion to a need for the equivalent of six to eight million barrels of crude oil a day.

The devastating thing about a synthetic fuels program is that no quick result is possible such as that obtained in the atomic bomb program in World War II.

The people will have to pay huge sums for years before they see any sure flow of adequate amounts of synthetic fuels, and the politicians who have to authorize the funds won't be able to give the voters any proof of success before their terms in office expire.

But some industrial and government experts and environmentalists say the nation could spend \$100 billion and not see any important flow of synthetic oil before 1988. It's all a matter of scale.

The technology of liquefying coal

and of extracting oil from shale rock or tar sands is well developed. But the yields of the biggest plants yet built are only a drop in the bucket compared to current U.S. oil imports.

The risks in building huge synthetic oil plants are so great that private industry is not willing to undertake the investment even with government incentive subsidies. The federal government would have to provide the money up front and bear most of the risks.

The environmental risks are so great there will be opposition in every community where it is desired to locate a synthetic fuel plant. The plants would give off vast amounts of carbon dioxide and other pollutants. Large shale oil plants pose the

threat of water contamination in the water-shy western states.

Officials of the Environmental Protection Agency shudder at the prospect of big synthetic oil plants. They say a Carter synthetic fuel program likely would have the effect of bypassing EPA and nullifying much of what it has been accomplished in the past.

But Business Week magazine, a leading advocate of a synthetic fuels program big enough to free the United States entirely from the hand of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, raised another important point. No matter how much synthetic oil costs, the money will be spent at home. Huge oil imports no longer would be piling up a balance of payments deficit.

### Ideals for Carter and the U.S.

President Carter's message Sunday night characterized America as a nation deep in crisis.

He pegged that crisis to much more than just energy.

The president said the government in Washington was paralyzed and isolated and the people had lost confidence in themselves and the nation.

Our democracy is in peril, he said. He pointed to a Congress buffeted by extreme special interests and a people caught up in self-indulgence.

As evidence, he noted declines in worker productivity, poor voter turnout and disrespect for established institutions. In turn, he said Washington was an island disconnected from the people.

A rebirth in spirit, values, freedom, even greatness, was assured, Carter indicated, through a combination of actions by him and sacrifice and patriotism by the American people.

The country can and must be rebuilt, he said.

Whether the president can rally the nation around him and whether it is too late for Jimmy Carter is yet to be seen.

In what may have been the greatest speech of his life, Carter played to Americans' puritan background and sense of lost greatness.

But certainly he gained points Sunday night and laid out an ambitious, far-reaching energy program. Implementation of much of that program will probably spill over into 1980 and become Carter's re-election platform.

Keeping that in mind, the president is already campaigning, trying to recapture the support of his first, miracle candidacy.

Immediate action Carter said he is taking definitely will call for sacrifice. He is cutting oil imports even more than he pledged in Tokyo.

If the country believes this action is necessary, likes the long range programs he outlined and therefore endures the inevitably worsening gas shortage, Carter may succeed.

But the question is not only whether the American people can behave according to the ideals set by Carter but also whether he can follow through on the ideals he also set for himself.

### The Finland syndrome

LONDON — "Europe" is still primarily a geographical, not a political or even cultural, expression. Finland and Turkey, for example, have little in common. Little, that is, except Finlandization.

That political expression denotes a kind of accommodation that non-Communist states make to Soviet desires. Japan showed signs of Finlandization in 1976, when it denied the United States full access to a MIG-25 landed in Japan by a Soviet defector. Today Turkey, a NATO member, shows signs of Finlandization in refusing to allow, without Soviet permission, overflights by U.S. aircraft needed for verifying SALT II.

The decoupling of Turkey from the West should be born in mind when considering Europe's attitudes about SALT II. Having recently spent several days with some European leaders considering SALT II, I am convinced that most want it ratified less because they admire the agreement than because they fear political consequences of rejection.

European leaders live in the shadow of the neutron weapons fiasco in which the United States encouraged European governments to prepare public opinion for those weapons, and then retreated. Soviet leaders surely were emboldened by

their success in manipulating European opinion and influencing Western behavior.

European leaders fear that rejection of SALT II might mean the United States will seek separate accommodations with the Soviet Union.

But to the extent that SALT II is considered the "centerpiece" of U.S.-Soviet relations, it is playing a role for which it is utterly unsuited. Indeed, to the extent that SALT has come to be considered "indispensable," it is imperative that Western nations promptly demonstrate that they can, if necessary, dispense with SALT.

To the extent that SALT II is considered the essence of co-existence, to that extent a democratic government is under the constant pressure of public opinion to conclude agreements. And to that extent there is deep-seated reluctance to give such agreements the kind of scrutiny that might lead to the inconvenient conclusion that the agreements are disadvantageous.

European leaders are clearly worried about the SALT II protocol,

which is supposed to expire at the end of 1981, four years before the treaty. They worry that the protocol will have a political afterlife; that weapons that were restricted by it will continue to be regarded as "problems"; and that the United States will be reluctant to proceed with those weapons.

Europeans are especially concerned in this regard, about the fate of ground-to-air and sea-to-air cruise missiles. The protocol limits those weapons to ranges of 600 kilometers, thereby rendering them virtually useless. Without such limits, those weapons would help address the alarming imbalance in continental strategic forces — an imbalance that grows as the Soviets race ahead with deployment of 4,000 kilometer range SS-20 missiles.

The Carter administration says that longer-range GLCMs and SLCMs will be ready for deployment before the protocol expires. But the administration slowed development of those weapons in anticipation of its concession that produced the range limits. Many Europeans wish the United States would underscore the temporary nature of the protocol limits by quickly indicating a decision to deploy, not merely test, long-range GLCMs and SLCMs.

# Trading regulations battle erupts again

**WASHINGTON** — A smoldering dispute between the Chicago Board of Trade and the Commodity Futures Trading Commission has erupted into a threat here by the exchange to sue the commission.  
 Technically, the issue is whether the exchange will adopt certain CFTC-mandated rules that govern the financial stability of commodity

brokers. But the real point behind the showdown is whether the CFTC and its new chairman, James Stone, has muscle to force the Board of Trade to adopt any rule the commission demands. The exchange has refused for more than a year to enact the rule, which has been adopted by 10 of the nation's 11 commodity exchanges.  
 If the Board of Trade eventually is required to adopt the rule, the exchange may elect to fight the commission in court. Board of Trade president Robert K. Wilmoth told the commission in a hearing requested by the exchange.

In his testimony, Wilmoth said the CFTC's decree that the Board of Trade use its staff and money to enforce rules written by the commission "amounts to a quiet confiscation of private property without due process."

He continued: "Self-regulation is simply not the same thing as using private funds and private staffs to carry out commission-controlled programs. We believe that the commission, as a government agency, should pursue the conventional routes of congressional appropriations if additional money or personnel are needed."

Wilmoth's stand visibly angered Stone and the other commissioners. Actually, the Board of Trade agrees with the intent, as well as the substance, of the financial requirement rule, said Wilmoth, noting that the exchange has offered to place all the disputed provisions of the rule into an appendix to the official rule.

As the CFTC rule now stands, said Wilmoth, the Board of Trade could find itself in a position where it is asked to grant an extension to a member firm that couldn't meet the minimum financial rule and then the exchange could have its ruling overturned by the CFTC.

# 'Barter kits' from two wars placed on auction block

**BATTLE CREEK, Mich.** — "Barter kits" put together for aircrewmembers and paratroopers down in unfriendly territory are being offered for sale.

The kits, held in war reserve stock since World War II and the Vietnam War, contain gold, jewelry and watches.

The Atlantic kit contains one 20 franc and one 10 franc gold coin of French mintage, one 1 pound sovereign and two half-pound sovereign gold coins of British or South African mintage, and three gold rings.

The Southeast Asia kit contains one gold link chain of four links 1 3/4 inches long, one gold embossed pendant, two gold embossed watches and a 21 Jewel Swiss calendar watch with a black cloth band.

Three hundred of the Atlantic kits and 50 Southeast Asia kits will be offered at minimum acceptable bids of about \$400 each, subject to

changes in the market price of gold. A second, larger offering of kits is planned later.  
 Bids will be accepted in quantities of one or more until the opening at

10 a.m. Aug. 1 at the Defense Property Disposal Service, Federal Center, Battle Creek, Mich., 49106. A deposit of 20 percent of the total must accompany the bid.

Interested bidders may receive a sales catalog by writing the service at that address and marking the request "Attn: Barter Kit Sale, DPDS-MMS-1."

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# Simple check led to arrest of wanted grain dealer

IDAHO FALLS (UPI) — A Bonneville County deputy said today a routine warrant check led to the arrest of indicted Texas grain dealer Bobby Johnson Saturday some 2 1/2 years after he apparently drowned in the Gulf of Mexico.

Deputy Wallace Rees said Johnson was stopped by officers after allegedly driving a Grover Trucking Co. truck through a stop sign. Officers ran a routine warrant check before Johnson, who had been working in Idaho under the alias of

Donald Dewayne Colter, revealed his identity. "It was apparently a truck he drives for work," Rees said, adding he is not aware what Johnson's reaction was when officers found out his identity.

Rees said Johnson faces extradition to Texas if he pleads innocent. "If trial is set, he would be

extradited," Rees said. "They're picking him up Monday (for arraignment by a U.S. Magistrate in Pocatello)." Johnson has been held in the Bonneville County jail since his arrest in Rexburg.

## Fire guts apartments

BOISE (UPI) — Fire swept through a Boise apartment complex late Sunday morning, sending residents fleeing in their night clothes and causing several hundred thousand dollars worth of damage. The fire broke out shortly before 11

at the Linden Arms Apartments on Broadway Ave., south of Interstate 80. Before firemen could extinguish it, 12 apartment units were destroyed and several cars were damaged.

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
