# U.S. smokers cut down

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Adverse publicity about cigarettes, beginning with the 1964 surgeon general's report, has resulted in a 45 percent reduction in levels of tar and nicotine smokers are inhaling, the government reported Friday.

The Federal Trade Commission report also said anti-smoking messages carried on radio and television in the late 1960s, just before broadcast tobacco commercials were banned, were not as big a factor as once believed in getting people to quit.

The staff report was published as part of the commission's continuing involvement with tobacco, which includes policing the health warning carried in print advertising and publishing tar and nicotine figures for each cigarette brand.

Reliance on per capita consumption figures to trace consumer behavior following the 1964 sur-

geon general's report, the agency said, "cannot chart the increasing popularity of low tar and nicotine cigarette brands."

"The per capita sales figures thus completely mask what may be one of the most important market responses to public concern over the health risks of smoking."

"The cigarette industry began reducing tar and nicotine in 1963 after Consumers Union published figures on the subject, the report said, and the reduction continued at a rate of about 0.09 percent until 1975.

"Thus, when considered in conjunction with the 1964-75 decline in per person cigarette sales, consumer and producer reactions to health publicity had lowered per capita intake of tar and nicotine 45 percent by 1975," it said.

"Our results indicate that consumers reacted very gradually to the (1964) report's findings and ensuing publicity."

"Compared to levels that would have been attained absent new public concern over cigarette health risks, per capita consumption fell at an annual rate of approximately 3.5 percent from 1964 to 1975.

"Contrary to prior findings and predictions, no evidence could be found that this decline intensified when anti-smoking commercials were aired from 1968-70 or moderated when the counter-commercials were withdrawn in 1971. Broadcast ads for cigarettes were banned in January 1971. The anti-smoking commercials which had been allowed under the fairness doctrine then were taken off the air.

## Beatle reunion given 60-40 chance

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Negotiations were reported underway Friday for the Beatles to perform a benefit concert for Indochinese boat people refugees, but it appeared doubtful the famed rock foursome would actually get together again after a decade.

United Nations spokesman Rudolf Stajduhar said the former members of the group — John Lennon, Paul McCartney, Ringo Starr and George Harrison — had been approached to perform the concert and they were "interested in considering it."

U.N. Secretary General Kurt Waldheim said he had asked George Harrison to discuss the possibilities. Stajduhar said, but he added the former Beatles had not yet agreed. Stajduhar stressed that the boat

people benefit, if it came about, would not be organized by the United Nations, but by Los Angeles producer Dirk Summers.

Summers, in an interview, said he had assurances from all of the Beatles except Lennon and claimed he was close to firming up an agreement for the group to do the benefit concert in Geneva, Switzerland.

But a spokesman for McCartney denied any concert was in the making, saying, "The answer is no. As far as we know, it is not happening."

"No comment," was the response from a spokesman for Lennon. Reliable sources in London said there would not be a Beatles reunion because it would take months to untangle contractual and artistic problems between the group mem-

bers.

But Summers gave the concert a "60-40" chance of coming off.

"In July George Harrison did commit to do the concert and contacted Paul, I'm told, and Ringo, and they said they would do it if he did," Summers said.

"So we had, through George, a commitment for three," Summers said. "Our next problem was to obtain John Lennon's agreement."

To do that, Summers said he sent a courier to Tokyo with messages for Lennon from himself and Waldheim, but Lennon and his wife, Yoko Ono, had left two days before the messenger arrived.

"This is now being corrected and we are awaiting John's response," Summers said. "I believe that if

Lennon agrees, the rest would fall in line quickly."

Summers estimated that \$250 to \$300 million could be raised for the boat people through proceeds from an album, a film, video cassettes, and a worldwide closed-circuit broadcast of the concert as well as television network rights.

"Tickets for the closed-circuit shows would cost \$100, he said.

## Squatters in basement of embassy gain freedom

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union has offered seven Pentecostals a chance to leave the Soviet Embassy quarters in the U.S. Embassy basement after 15 months, but the dissenters said Friday they fear retribution for trying to leave the country.

The Soviets, apparently exasperated and anxious to resolve the stalemate, have promised not to punish the Pentecostals, who stormed the embassy on June 27, 1978, vowing not to leave until they were permitted to go to the United States.

The Soviet offer was relayed to the

squatters by U.S. Ambassador Malcolm Toon, who received assurance from the Soviet Interior Ministry that their visa applications would "be given due inspection and consideration under generally applicable regulations."

But once the application is on file in Moscow, the seven would have to return to their home in Chernogorsk, a remote Siberian coal mining town, where they would have to attack the complex bureaucratic problems from the hometown end.

## Nixon condo sale hearing delayed

NEW YORK (UPI) — An adjudgment was granted Friday in a suit brought to prohibit millionaire garage builder, Hirschfeld from selling his Fifth Avenue condominium to former President Richard Nixon.

A number of the 15 residents of the building at 417 Fifth Ave. do not want Hirschfeld to sell his \$925,000 apartment to Nixon because of the presence of U.S. Secret Service agents. Those opposed to the deal have filed a petition in state Supreme Court in Manhattan to block the sale.

According to published reports, the Secret Service insists on having control of the roof, basement and lobby and would station one or two men

outside the 12-room apartment. Residents of the building objected to the planned tight security and said they do not want to be screened entering their lobby. Some also said they feared possible electronic surveillance by federal agents.

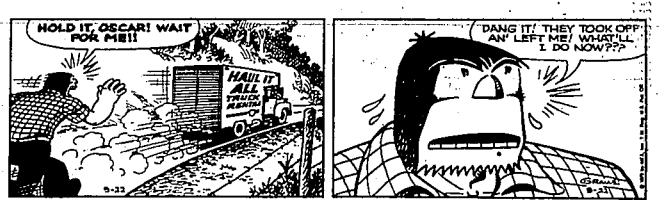

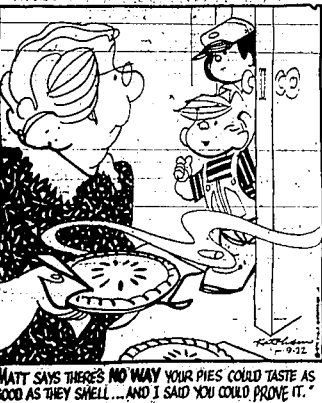

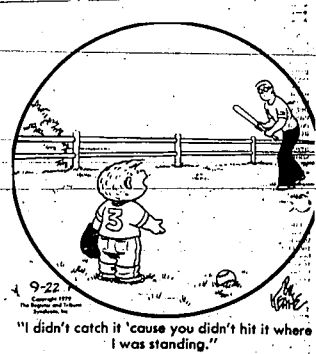

## Winter spells worry to some senior citizens

### Heating bills outrace social security incomes

TWIN FALLS — For Magic Valley's senior citizens, the winter brings tidings of discomfort and anxiety.

Many who rely on their monthly Social Security checks as their sole income are wondering how they will eat, heat their homes and pay medical expenses as temperatures drop and gas bills rise.

Of all Idaho's elderly, Magic Valley seniors will probably have the hardest time "making it" this winter, judging from facts gathered in a 1976 study by the Idaho Office on Aging.

The median income of those 60 and over in Region Four, which includes Twin Falls, Blaine, Camas, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln and Minidoka counties, was \$253.45, the lowest in Idaho's six regions, according to the study. (For comparison, the highest was Region Two in the north, \$428.73. Median income statewide for all ages is \$799.)

Yet average monthly housing costs in Region Four were the highest in the state at \$91.54 a month. (The next highest was \$77.21.) Thirty-two percent of Region Four respondents said they were unable to pay needed medical costs.

Phil Sampson, director of the area Office on Aging, warns that if this winter is severe, "we're going to lose some elderly people—needlessly."

Senior citizens are the big losers in the inflation race. Many live on fixed incomes, like pensions or Social Security. The majority of those receiving Social Security rely on that as their sole income, said James Fritzel, area S.S. director. Social Security, despite the largest increase ever (9.3 percent), runs behind inflation. Furthermore Social Security was never intended to be anything but supplemental income. The average Social Security check in this area, is \$365, the average disabled check is \$230 and the average widow's is \$240.

The biggest problem facing seniors trying to stretch their check is rising utility costs. "It'll be a choice whether they eat or keep their house warm," said Al Tolberg, executive director of the Idaho Citizens Coalition.

The "Heat or Eat" theme echoed through recent hearings in Boise held by the Public Utilities Commission, which is considering prohibiting utilities from disconnecting service during the winter months or when a customer's health could be endangered.

Mildred Howard, vice president of the Idaho Council of Senior Citizens, called such a moratorium essential for senior citizens' well-being.

N. Charles Hedemark, vice presi-

dent of Intermountain Gas and a spokesman for Idaho utilities, contends the elderly are protected by existing rates and a moratorium would lead to higher rates.

Under present laws, Intermountain Gas and Idaho Power may not disconnect services if money owed is less than \$25. Service may not be disconnected for up to 30 days if a licensed physician or public health official certifies that it would aggravate an existing health problem or create a medical emergency.

Hedemark also says the company investigates any pending termination, and payment schedules can be worked out with the consumer. "We don't want to disconnect people," he said. Mrs. Howard said many elderly are not aware of these stipulations. Nor are companies aware of which of their customers may be in real financial need and simply trying to get out of payment.

She's emphatic in asking for a ban on terminations for persons below a certain income level, although she feels the consumer has a responsibility to inform the company of their economic plight. "We will pay. We're not asking for free services. We don't want something for nothing," she said.

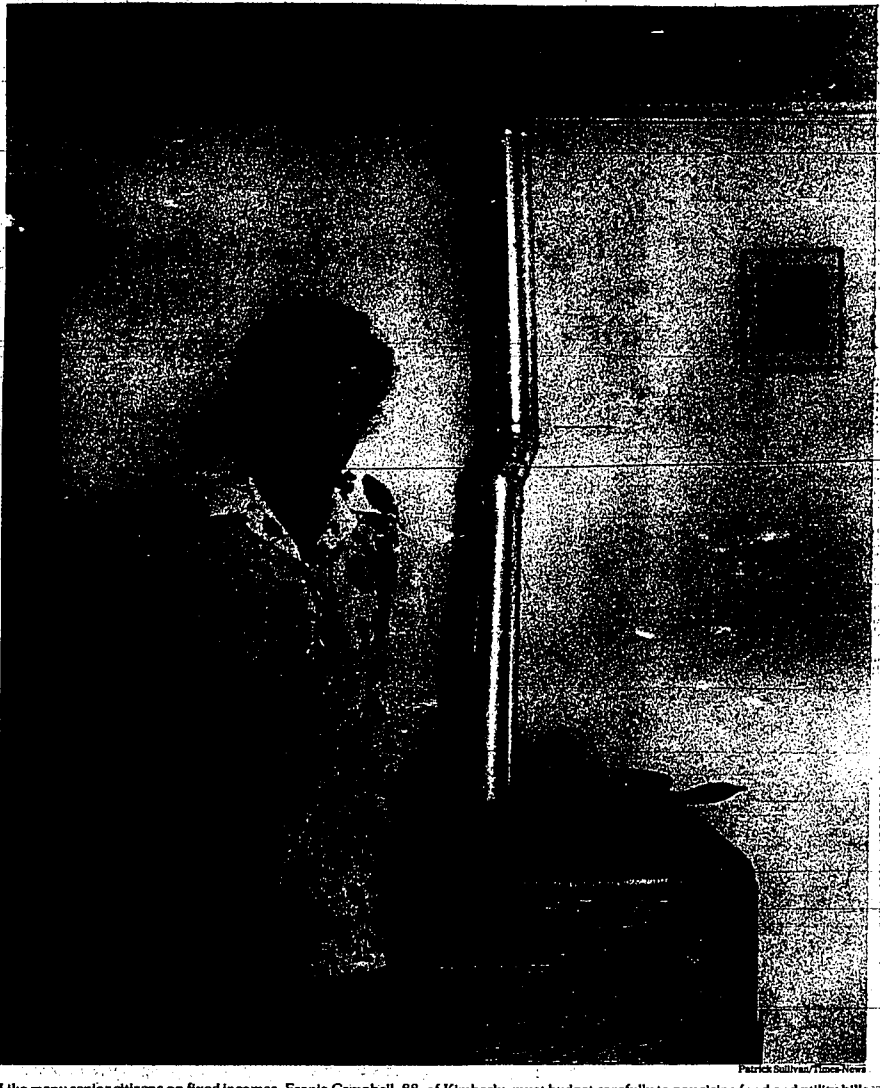
Although she's said area utilities have cooperated with the elderly, Mrs. Howard wants a moratorium's extra clout to ensure that elderly who are trying to avoid going to nursing homes can remain at home without fear of losing their heat.

Hedemark proposes several changes instead of an outright moratorium. They include stipulations that utility representatives go to the homes or call the persons involved when making payment arrangements and that termination notices contain alternatives for payment in "bold print."

Senior citizens are not complaining that utility companies stay in their homes, they aren't likely to run out on bills, according to Hedemark. "By granting a blanket moratorium, we are further burdening those consumers that in fact would like to help, by causing them to pay increased costs."

Hedemark testified in the hearings that other companies which have adopted moratoriums have seen their uncollectable bills double. Although he can't say for certain how Idaho would be affected, he feels that the uncollectables, presently 1 percent of the gross revenues, would double to 2 percent. He points out that if 2 percent of Idaho's \$100 million this year could represent \$2 million, then that is passed on directly to the consumers," he said.

## 65 growers file suit against Beans Inc.

TWIN FALLS — Sixty-five farmers, members of the National Farmers Organization of Idaho, have brought action against Beans Inc., in 5th District Court, Burley, the largest of five separate suits against the bean warehouse firm.

The NFO says 65 of its members want about 30,000 sacks of beans accounted for and paid. It says that prices for all of the beans that may have been "lost, missing or destroyed."

Included in the long list of plaintiffs are National Farmers Organization members: Magic Valley farmers and such farm businesses as Balanced Rock Farms Inc.; Capps Farms Inc.; Onedia Farms Inc.; Pickett Farms Inc. and Triple C Ranches Inc.

The suit states the NFO is an organization formed to serve as a bargaining agency for its farmer members. It says the NFO has been marketing products. The suit shows some plaintiffs with as few as 52 sacks of beans while others list several

thousand sacks.

The complaint says agreements with NFO and Beans Inc. covered the storage of beans from NFO members in the warehouses of the defendant firm for the years of 1975, 1976, 1977 and 1978. The beans were to have been stored and sold with payment to be made to the NFO members immediately upon sale of the commodities.

NFO charges no payments have been received by its members for beans listed in the suit. Several individual plaintiffs instructed Beans Inc. to sell their beans but these individuals were unable to collect payment, the suit alleges.

In the suit, the plaintiffs state they have reason to believe some beans

owned by the plaintiffs were sold without the knowledge of the growers and the revenue converted to the defendants' own use. They ask for a full accounting of all of the approximately 30,000 sacks of various types of beans as listed in the suit and owned by the various plaintiffs and for proper warehouse receipts for the beans as well as \$50,000 punitive damages on each of some seven counts in the first cause for action. There are three separate causes for action listed in the suit. The plaintiffs charge two insurance companies and the parent firm of Beans Inc., Commodity Marketing Corp., a California-based firm which is headed by James R. Woods, the mayor of Salinas, Calif. The firm

of May, May, Sudweeks and Shindlring represents the NFO and growers.

Four other individual farmers have filed damage suits against Beans Inc. in District Court here during the past several months. In all cases similar charges are made and other plaintiffs have also asked for accounting by Beans Inc. of their stored beans.

Beans Inc. has business operations in Filer, Burley and Mountain Home. The NFO suit states, with major storage facilities in Filer. The Idaho Agriculture Department last week closed the Filer warehouse pending further investigation of alleged illegal operations. An investigation of a July 31 fire there is

also under way by Twin Falls County officials.

A hearing has been set for Wednesday by the state agency to decide if the license of Beans Inc. should be permanently revoked. Until the hearing on Wednesday, the firm has been closed by a temporary revocation order to prevent disturbance of evidence. The Agriculture Department director, Wilson Kellogg, has ordered Woods to account for some 14,210 sacks of beans, said to be valued at about \$235,000. An audit and investigation of the warehouse at Filer by the state agency indicated the firm was obligated to store 14,210 more sacks of beans than it had on hand.

## Good bean news too

TWIN FALLS — Representatives from two Latin American governments were in the Magic Valley Thursday laying the groundwork for possible direct purchases of black and pinto beans grown here.

Fernando Noriega, a representative of the Mexican government's Canasupo company, and Juan Diaz and Adolfo De La Rosa of the Dominican Republic's company Inespre, spent Thursday here touring fields and meeting bean dealers.

The three met came to Twin Falls after a similar stop in Colorado and they left Friday morning for North Dakota, another important bean growing state.

"Beans are the main subsistence food in Mexico," Noriega said. "If a shortage should come we want to know who the right people are to contact." Mexico's winter bean crop, which accounts for about 80 percent of the country's bean production, has just been planted, Noriega said. Mexican officials will know, in about a month if they will need to import beans.

Paul Montgomery, a salesman for the Haney Seed Co., Twin Falls, said Noriega told bean dealers here that

Mexico would probably import beans this year.

The Dominican Republic is already beginning to import beans because of the damage from recent hurricanes. Storms destroyed some food and also left the ground unsuitable for planting in this year's crop. On Friday Haney made a bid to sell 80,000 bags of pinto beans to the Dominican Republic.

Bill Cook, vice president of the Haney Seed Co. said the company is interested in making direct purchases from growers and dealers because their state-run companies could probably save \$8 for each 100-pound bag bought direct instead of through a bean exporter. In an average year about 2 million bags of beans are exported from the United States, Cook said.

The export market looks bright, he said, for bean growers and dealers. "We export mostly domestically," Montgomery said. "The export industry is the real long arm we need for a healthy bean market."

Almost 10 percent of the U.S. bean crop (estimated at more than 900,000 tons for 1979) is grown by farmers in the Magic Valley.

## In the valley

### Buhl staffing decided

BUHL — Two city employees in Buhl, whose jobs were eliminated in the 1 percent crunch of the city's 1980 budgeting, have decided to accept the city's offer of alternate positions.

Denis Carroll, the city's dogcatcher or "canine officer" as he is called in Buhl, will transfer to the street department for a full time position. He has worked seven years for the city and was allowed to make the transfer on a basis of seniority. Rick Todd, employed in the street department only about nine months, will be terminated. Mayor Dale Christensen said.

Ray Mettsner, the city street cleaner, also accepted an offer to work on an eight-month basis only for about two-thirds of his former salary. Carroll also taking a salary cut to stay with the city.

The city set out to eliminate two and one-third employees in order to stay within the budget limits brought on by the 1 percent property tax limitation.

Christensen said John Moore of the street department retired and has not been replaced. The canine job has been eliminated and one-third of the street cleaner's job is now vacated.

Originally the city planned to eliminate two fulltime firemen, leaving only one paid fulltime fire department member — Chief Walter (Dub) Harnar.

Residents of Buhl protested cutting fire protection and the city agreed to leave all three positions on the payroll. One fireman resigned in the face of the proposed cut and applications are being taken for his replacement.

The mayor said there is a difference in salaries of firemen and street workers or the dogcatcher and the difference will have to be provided for in a budget amendment. He said the budget will have to be amended to take the needed money from the "water department reserves."

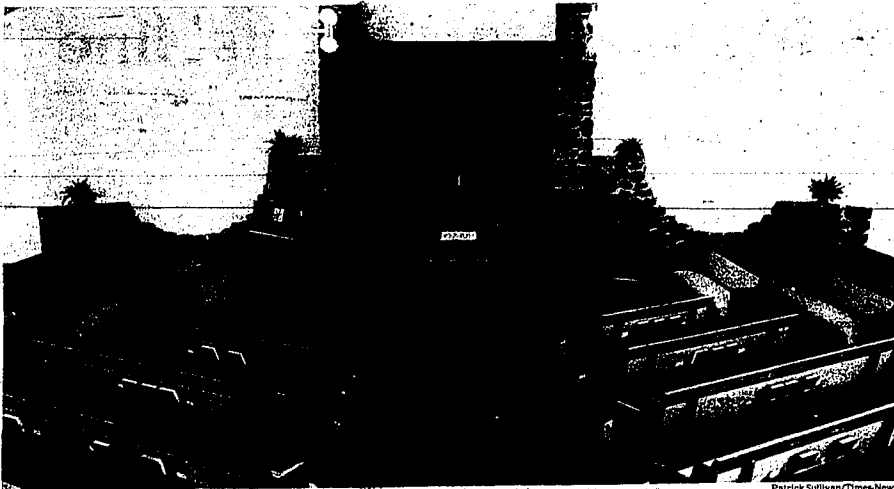
"I'm a Christian. I couldn't do that. I don't know, maybe it's my conscience or something."

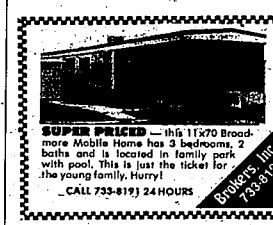
