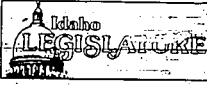


Measure paring oxygen content in Idaho water advances

BOISE — A measure which would paring oxygen content in water discharged from any Idaho dam, reservoir or hydroelectric facility came one step nearer to passage Monday.

On a 6-3 vote, the Senate Health, Education and Welfare Committee sent House Concurrent Resolution 44 to the Senate floor.

That measure, which has already passed the House, drops Idaho's dissolved oxygen water standard from six to five parts of oxygen per milliliter of water from May 15 to October 15.

The State Department of Health and Welfare, environmentalists and others opposed to lowering the standard resist the reduction could harm water quality and slow fish growth.

The Environmental Protection Agency has also said it may refuse to accept the change.

Representatives for the American Falls Irrigation District and others supporting the change argue the reduction will have no appreciable effect on either fish or water quality in Idaho.

Because the measure is drafted as a resolution, it will not be subject to a gubernatorial veto.

Following the committee meeting,

Vern Ravenscroft, a lobbyist for the American Falls Irrigation District, said his survey of the Senate indicated HCR 44 would likely be approved in that body by at least three votes.

But regardless of the Senate's final vote, which is likely to occur late this week, HCR 44 may face tough opposition in the near future.

Following the committee meeting, Steve Bryant, the Idaho State Planning Coordinator for EPA, told the Times-News HCR 44 as written violates federal water quality standards.

"Federal regulations specifically allow downgrading of (water quality) standards only if one of three criteria are met," Provant said.

Those criteria are, "that a designated use cannot be attained because of natural background conditions, that the use cannot be attained because of irretrievable man-induced conditions, and that the use cannot be attained because the level of treatment required would impose a substantial and widespread economic and social impact."

"They have not provided us yet with anything that leads us not to reject it," Provant said of HCR 44. EPA rejection could come within two to three months after Senate adoption of the measure, he added.

If the EPA rejects HCR 44, Ravenscroft said, a lawsuit will be the likely result.

Monday's vote is the latest skirmish in a several-year-old battle over water quality standards in Idaho generally and below the American Falls Reservoir specifically.

Throughout this legislative session and the last, debate centered largely on the American Falls Dam. At that structure, existing oxygen standards of six parts cannot be met without

construction of oxygen injection equipment to pump oxygen directly into the water, Ravenscroft told committee members Monday and at an earlier public hearing.

Two years earlier, the cost of that equipment was estimated at \$1.3 million.

Sen. John Barker, R-Buhl, chairman of the Senate Committee and also president of the American Falls Reservoir District, said those costs will be paid by the Idaho Power Company unless the oxygen standard is lowered.

An attempt to lower those standards last year failed because of improper parliamentary procedure used by the Legislature.

Legislation was also introduced this year to drop oxygen standards only on the portion of the Snake River from the American Falls Dam downstream to the backwaters of Lake Walcott behind Mindoka Dam. That legislation was killed in Barker's committee in order that HCR 44 could be sent to the Senate.

HCR 44 drew support from a majority of the committee members for several reasons.

While the measure does apply to all dam, reservoir and hydroelectric sites, Barker told committee members the change would have an actual effect only on four or five of those locations.

But lowering the state's dissolved oxygen content was criticized by Al Murray, Chief of the Water Quality Bureau of the State Department of Health and Welfare.

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House panel scraps fuel office shift

BOISE (UPI) — With two Republicans switching ranks to join the Democrats, the House State Administration Committee scuttled a bill that would move the Office of Energy's fuel allocation service to the Administration Department.

On a 22-17 vote to hold the bill in committee for further study, Republican Reps. Vard Chaburn of Albion and Herbert Filtz of New Meadows crossed over to aid the Democrats.

House Minority Leader Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, led objections to the bill, which was sponsored by House Majority Leader Walter Little, R-New Plymouth.

"The fuel allocation service functions most efficiently now," said Miss McDermott. "I don't really see any need to change it."

Little said the bill was merely a safety valve for the Legislature to fall back on to preserve the allocation service if the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee decides not to fund the Office of Energy.

Miss McDermott and Chris Smith, director of the fuel allocation service, argued the state would be forced to come up with thousands of dollars from the general fund if the service was moved to the Administration Department. They said most of the federal funds used to operate the service were not transferable from the Office of Energy.

Rep. Dwight Horsell, D-Aberdeen, said he was "dismayed that the Office of Energy has become a partisan issue."

He said the Republican leadership was "blowing it right out of the water" after Gov. John V. Evans had "worked hard" to make it a valuable agency.

Porn store site limit OK'd 59-10

BOISE — In less time than it takes to open a dirty book, the Idaho House Monday voted to restrict the location of stores selling pornography and obscene materials.

On a 59-10 vote, which came after less than three minutes of discussion, representatives approved Senate Bill 1253. That measure prevents the location of any store which sells or rents obscene materials within 2,500 feet of a school, church or place of worship.

The measure, which had already passed the Senate, now goes to the governor.

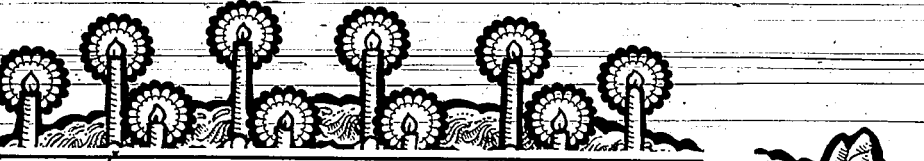

Patty Hearst out in public as patroness of good cause

SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO, Calif. (UPI) — Patricia Hearst made a rare public appearance Monday in a new role as patroness of good causes.

Ms. Hearst, 26, who has stayed in seclusion since her release from prison last year, returned to public life as co-chairman of a fund-raising committee for a child care center dedicated to the memory of the congressman killed in Guyana before the November 1978 Jonestown massacre.

"I really like this program," she told a news conference at a senior citizens center in South San Francisco.

She said she has been visiting an inter-generational day-care center where older people work with children, and she wants to help raise money for a new one in South San Francisco.

Ms. Hearst's committee will support the Leo J. Ryan, inter-generational Child Care Center, sponsored by the Elvira Lewis Foundation for Geriatric Health and Nutrition, and named after the congressman who was killed in Guyana during the Peoples Temple colony of Jonestown.

"Congressman Ryan believed in people helping people. He liked to say that if people were not part of the solution, they were part of the problem," Ms. Hearst told reporters.

In a blue suit and pink blouse, Ms. Hearst smiled graciously for photographers and chatted with people from the day-care center in Santa Cruz where she has been spending some time.

"I will not answer any questions except about this project," she abruptly told a reporter who asked about her own life.

She is now the wife of Bernard Shaw, a former policeman who was one of her bodyguards during her bank robbery trial. They live at Redwood Shores, a residential development on San Francisco Bay a few miles from the Hillsborough home where she grew up.

She chose to use her own family name, Ms. Patricia Campbell Hearst, in her work for the center. She said she will be organizing fund-raising projects and making appearances to support the new center, located in a public grammar school in South San Francisco.

Steve Brummel, director of the sponsoring foundation, said he asked Ms. Hearst to help. He said they were friends and that Ms. Hearst has been interested in the project since she was released from prison.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Marines discharged Sgt. Bambli Lin Finney of Chicago for being out of uniform — of any kind — for the April issue of Playboy, but in general the military reacted leniently to seven women who posed provocatively.

Marine Corps spokesman Lt. Col. Art Britt said Monday Sgt. Finney was discharged for bringing discredit to the Corps and to the country.

"Frankly, it's a matter of standards," Britt said.

"A Marine is a Marine 24 hours a day. While a Marine may hold outside employment, a Marine will be employed in activities which reflect credit on the Marine Corps and the country. You will not reflect discredit. We have high standards and we're just not going to tolerate this sort of thing."

The Coast Guard was most lenient. A spokesman said that seaman Kim Hemphill, who appears in uniform in one picture and in a see-through blouse in another, had done nothing to discredit the service.

Hemphill's pictures are among the least provocative of the feature "Women of the Armed Services."

"She did it on her own time and she did not pose with parts of her uniform," the spokesman said.

At Nellis AFB, Nevada, a spokesman said the Air Force still is considering the case of airman Cindy Lutz, who posed in a garter belt.

Lutz angered the brass by wearing her Air Force beret and her Air Force shirt fully unbuttoned. On the couch beside her is a copy of The Air Force Times.

The Navy charged seaman Susan Gage and Lisa Ann Woolf with failing to obey orders and Navy regulations.

Silence brings indictments for 8

NEW YORK (UPI) — Eight alleged Mafia members, apparently honoring a strict code of silence, were indicted on contempt charges Monday.

They refused to answer grand jury questions on the restaurant execution of reputed "godfather" Carmine Galante.

The eight suspects, who declined offers of immunity to testify, included a top Galante associate and the consigliere, or adviser, for the slain mob boss as well as the son of his main challenger for gangland leadership.

The indictments said police surveillance in Manhattan's Little Italy

section had resulted in tape recordings and videotapes of the suspect at least a month before the aging don was killed last July while eating salad and enjoying a cigar on the patio of a Brooklyn restaurant.

Police sources have said the investigation centered on the crime family formerly headed by the late Carlo Gambino and now led by DeLuca.

Among those charged with varying counts of first-degree criminal contempt were Galante's alleged advisor, Steven Cannone, 55; Armando DeLuca, 24, the son of Aniello DeLuca; and Nicholas Maranzello, 67, allegedly Galante's top associate.

Prosecutors said the electronic surveillance was designed only to get evidence on possible loansharking and drug deals allegedly planned in the Eastview Social Club, the storefront headquarters of Galante's rival, reputed Gambino crime family chief-tain Aniello "Mr. O'Neill" DeLuca.

But in the course of taping numerous meetings inside and outside the club, authorities said they learned "someone" was going to be killed.

"We had no idea it was going to be Galante," said Manhattan District Attorney Robert Morgenthau. "If we knew they were out to hit Carmine Galante we would have done something about it."

Garwood's case delayed by snow

CAMP LEJEUNE, N.C. (UPI) — The Marine Corps announced Monday the court-martial of Pfc. Robert Garwood, accused of desertion and collaboration with the North Vietnamese, would be delayed a week because of heavy snow.

The court-martial had been scheduled to begin today but 4 inches of snow last weekend caused transportation problems that forced the delay.

Garwood, 33, of Adams, Ind., returned to the United States last March after nearly 14 years in Vietnam. Fellow prisoners of war claim Garwood helped the communists and even carried a weapon on patrols with communist troops.

CHICAGO (UPI) — Wheat and corn were irregularly lower, oats mixed and soybeans firmer early in the close Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

The Environmental Action Foundation, an economist Charles Komanoff, said the Atomic Industrial Forum excluded 12 of the 14 costliest nuclear reactors as well as the two largest, most efficient, coal-burning utilities from its most recent cost comparison.

as asserted by the AIF," said Alden Meyer, foundation spokesman. "The basis shown by the AIF points up the nuclear industry's tendency to manipulate data to portray nuclear power in an unjustifiably favorable light."

The forum, the main nuclear industry trade group, in May released a widely publicized survey of 1976 utility power costs.

"We stand by the validity of our survey because that is what it is," said Carl Goldstein, forum spokesman. "If plans are not formed they are not, we did not get returns from those utility companies."

"Komanoff's study" — Power Propaganda — found the cost of only 39 of 60 commercial reactors. Among the 21 omitted were all but two of the 14 costing the most to build and six of the seven with the best 1976 performance records.

The average generating cost of the excluded reactors was 70 percent higher than surveyed units, it said.

Tough fight for windfall taxes ahead

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The compromise \$27.7 billion windfall profits tax faces a tough fight on the House floor — probably next week — from members who want to use more of its revenues for energy programs instead of tax cuts.

The compromise, reached after two months of negotiations to resolve differences between the House and Senate windfall profits tax bills, makes \$136 billion available for individual and corporate tax cuts this decade.

A group led by Reps. Joseph Fisher, D-Va., and Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., want House negotiators sent back to the job over directing them to use the revenues for energy programs.

"We are convinced that the conference committee is sending out the wrong signals: too little attention to energy and a very inflationary general tax reduction," Fisher and Gephardt said in a letter distributed to colleagues Monday.

"Many of us in the House are critical of the proposed conference agreement, not because of the windfall tax itself, but because of the way in which the revenue from the tax would be used," they said.

Skiers protest plan to open mine

ASHCROFT, Colo. (UPI) — Opponents to a proposed molybdenum mine near the Colorado ski resort town of Crested Butte took to cross country skis for the second straight year to make their protest known.

"Cross country skiing is real big in Crested Butte and people do a lot of it," explained spokeswoman Heather Noble. "If you're going to do a protest march in the wintertime, it's natural to do it on cross country skis."

A similar event was staged last year to protest plans by Amax Inc. to develop a molybdenum mine at Mount Emmons, a mountain on the edge of Crested Butte which is believed to contain one of the world's largest molybdenum deposits. Amax has operated the Climax molybdenum mine at nearby Leadville for several years.

EUREKA, CALIF. (UPI) — An earthquake occurred early today under the Pacific Ocean and was felt at some points along the Northern California coast.

Residents of Eureka reported feeling the quake at 6:17 a.m. The University of California seismicographic station at Berkeley said the quake was centered 60 miles southwest of Eureka, probably on the Mendocino Escarpment offshore.

It had a Richter magnitude of 5.2. A spokesman said it was not large enough to cause a tidal wave.

WWP asks dual rate hike

SPOKANE (UPI) — Washington Water Power President Wendell Satri announced today that WWP is seeking a 40 per cent increase in electricity rates and a four per cent hike in natural gas rates.

The electricity package would total \$25.2 million, according to Satri, who noted in a news conference that the utility was getting into a financial bind with double-digit inflation and the rising cost of doing business.

Satri said the proposed rate increase has a new wrinkle, designed to encourage new customers away from electricity and old electrical customers to conserve.

Those who use 600 kilowatt hours or less per month will experience an increase of 9.6 per cent or less. Those over that figure will have to pay between 9.5 per cent and 50 per cent more than the present cost.

The WWP says the average user will experience a 44 per cent increase, however, from an estimated \$18.96 to \$27.26 per month.

The WWP also asked for interim relief from the Washington Utilities Commission on the request, meaning the utility would like a partial increase now.

The commission has eleven months to act on the increase request.

Randy Jackson injured

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Randy Jackson, a member of the singing group "The Jacksons," suffered injuries early today in an accident that left him trapped inside his sports car.

Jackson was removed from his Mercedes-Benz after approximately 35 minutes by firefighters who used a metal-cutting tool, witnesses said.

He was treated at St. Joseph's Hospital in Burbank for internal and leg injuries.

Witnesses said Jackson apparently lost control of the car, which hit several light poles on a street near the Hollywood Bowl. No further details were immediately available.

Train suicide a failure

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A man hurled himself in front of a Bay Area Rapid Transit District train, but he suffered only minor injuries because he landed between the rails.

Police said Sunday that the cars rolled over him without striking him Saturday. They said the man was trying to kill himself.

The 32-year-old man, not identified, was taken to a hospital.

Mission Emergency Hospital where authorities said he suffered only lacerations on his head. Firemen said he was unconscious when they found him.

The train operator hit the brakes on his four-car train but it was not able to stop in time.

Plane search called off

TAOS, N.M. (UPI) — A spokesman for the Air Force Rescue Coordinator Center said Monday a search for a plane missing in northern New Mexico with five persons on board would not be resumed unless there are new leads.

"We exhausted all resources and all leads in the search," said Maj. Ronald Siebold. "If we get a new lead we will reopen the search."

The search for the missing plane was suspended Sunday.

The single-engine Beechcraft Bonanza was piloted by Dr. Robert Russell, a physician and head of the Mesquite, Texas, school board. Aboard were his wife, Bertha, and three of the couple's four children.

Authorities said if the plane had crashed, chances of anyone surviving were slim.

"We no longer consider this a rescue mission," said Siebold. "We feel in this case it would be a body recovery operation now."

Air Force officials said more than 600 persons were involved in the search. Search aircraft flew 425 flights for a total of 960 hours during the operation.

The plane was on a flight from Amarillo, Texas, to Durango, Colo., when it disappeared. Radar showed the plane's last known location was over the Sangre de Cristo mountains just northeast of Taos.

The search operation concentrated in that area. At one point during the operation, one of the planes involved in the search crashed, but both men aboard survived.

Reasoner visits Silver Valley

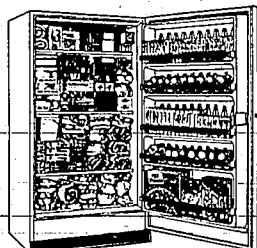

Demons top final poll

NEW YORK (UPI) — Despite DePaul's first loss of the season last week, a double overtime setback at the hands of Notre Dame, it was no surprise the Blue Demons easily held onto first place in the final United Press International Board of Coaches basketball ratings.

DePaul, 26-1, took over the No. 1 spot from Duke in the 8th week of the season and its perch atop the standings has been unchallenged for the past six weeks. The Blue Demons, who head into the NCAA tournament as the top seed in the West and receive a first-round bye, received 30 first-place votes Monday for 568 points, far outstripping the No. 2 team, Louisiana State.

But with upsets and overtime games the rule last week, the scramble for the next nine slots resembled a game of musical chairs. Louisiana State, which defeated Florida, Alabama and Kentucky, moved up from the No. 6 spot to gain the No. 2 rating with 421 points, barely edging Kentucky with 420 points. Kentucky, which defeated Auburn and Mississippi but lost to LSU, held the No. 3 rating with one first-place vote. Louisville, which won both its games, also received a first-place vote and remained No. 4 with 413 points while Oregon State stayed at No. 5 on the strength of its victories over California and Oregon.

Syracuse, like St. John's and Seton Hall a victim of Georgetown, slid from the No. 2 spot to No. 6 with 353 points. Big Ten championship winner Indiana, with 347 points, moved into the top 10 from No. 12, gaining the No. 7 perch with a 76-73 overtime victory over Ohio State.
