

# Men in crisis, determined women favored Oscar roles

**HOLLYWOOD (UPI)** — The men and women who make American movies gather tonight to confer the Academy Awards.

Films of men in crisis and determined women in transition are favored to win top honors.

The betting — informally in Hollywood circles and by posted odds in Las Vegas casinos — is on "Kramer vs. Kramer," the popular story pitting a single father's developing love for his son against a mother determined to both build a new life outside of marriage and reclaim her child.

"Kramer" is expected to get the Oscar for best picture and win a best actor statuette for its star, Dustin Hoffman, nominated three times in the past 13 years ("The Graduate," "Midnight Cowboy" and "Lenny").

The top competition comes from "All That Jazz," the open heart musical based on the flirtations with women and death of its director, choreographer Bob Fosse, played by Roy Scheider, for best actor.

Sally Fields, a long flight from her days as TV's "Flying Nun," is

the leading contender for the best actress Oscar for her portrayal in "Norma Rae" of a Southern textile mill worker, stubbornly trying to mother her family and an infant labor union.

The other top picture contenders are "Norma Rae," Francis Ford Coppola's Vietnam epic "Apocalypse Now," and "Breaking Away," a dark horse hit about non-college youths coping with life after high school in an Indiana university town.

The ceremony, which has grown from a private party into the

nation's highest rated TV program and is seen by millions in other countries, will be telecast by ABC-TV beginning at 7 p.m. MST, with Johnny Carson as master of ceremonies.

Although "Kramer" has been heaped with critical praise and honors, Hoffman commented last week that he thinks the film was "a good movie, decent and honest," but "it could have been better."

Co-star Meryl Streep is a top contender for best supporting actress.

Justin Henry, at 8 the youngest performer ever nominated for a regular Oscar, is up for best supporting actor for his winning portrayal of their son, but two Hollywood veterans — Melvyn Douglas, 78, and Mickey Rooney, 60 — make the category top heavy with sentimental favorites.

Douglas, who won a supporting actor Oscar in 1963 for "Jud," was nominated for his portrayal of a dying presidential caddy in "Being There" and Rooney for his performance as a crusty horse trainer in "The Black Stallion."

Other contenders for best actor are Al Pacino — his fifth nomination — for "And Justice for All," Jack Lemmon and Peter Sellers, for his portrayal of a dimwitted innocent who knows the world only through the eye of television in "Being There."

Other nominees for best actress are Jill Clayburgh, for "Starting Over," Jane Fonda for "China Syndrome," Marsha Mason for "Chapter Two" and Bette Midler for her performance in "The Rose" as an affection-craving rock star.

## Egypt quits games

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. (UPI)** — Government officials predicted Sunday that America's boycott of the summer games in Moscow would receive widespread support from the free world.

Egyptian athletes were the first to board the boycott barge. In addition, Canada, West Germany, and Australia appeared ready to join the United States.

Aides to President Carter said they felt more nations would follow now that the United States Olympic Committee has officially agreed to stay away from the games.

"We are confident that other leading nations of the free world will join in this demonstration that no nation is entitled to serve as host for an Olympic festival of peace while it persists in invading and subjugating another nation," said Carter's chief counsel, Laurence H. Tisch.

In an ABC interview in Washington, Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher predicted the Olympics will be "only a shadow of what was expected before the brutal Soviet invasion of Afghanistan."

Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, also said America's allies "may be willing, many of them, to join with us in boycotting the Olympics."

The USOC voted by a margin of 1,604-797 Saturday to support Carter's demands for a boycott because of the Soviet Union's invasion of Afghanistan.

At the urging of President Anwar Sadat's directives, all Egyptian sports unions decided Sunday to boycott the Moscow games as a protest against Soviet "crimes of genocide" in Moslem Afghanistan.

West German chancellor Helmut Schmidt, on hearing of the American decision, said in a speech that "conditions for participation are not present."

The Prime Minister of Australia, Malcolm Fraser, also encouraged a full-scale boycott.

"I believe very strongly that an effective boycott will emerge," Fraser said.

The president of Japan's Olympic committee said the USOC's action would probably have an effect on his country's boycott decision next month.

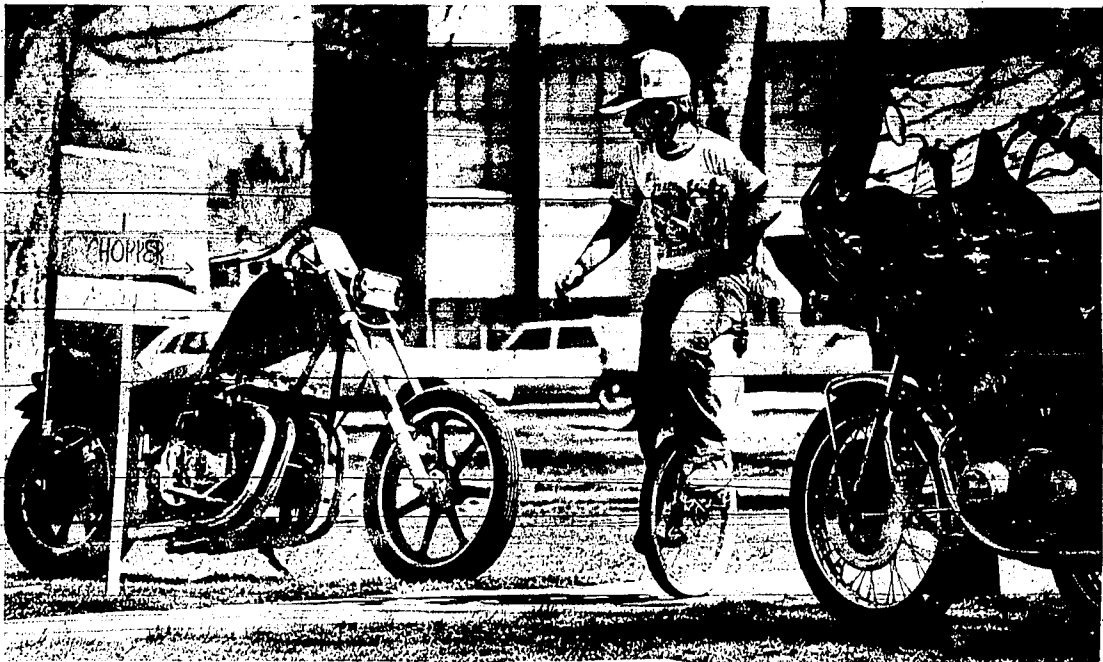
With most of the free world's major sporting powers missing from Moscow, the Games will turn into chiefly a Communist show featuring the Soviet Union, East Germany and Cuba.

It will continue a string of often tragic mixes of sport and politics that have been a part of the Olympics since Adolf Hitler's propaganda show at the 1936 Games in Berlin.

Athletes opposing the boycott indicated, however, that politics was not so much to blame for the USOC's action, but something even more basic — money.

There had been veiled threats from the Carter administration that government funds the USOC would be cut off if a team was sent to Moscow and the Olympic committee had already fallen \$1.2 million behind on its 1980 budget.

At the same time, negotiations were under way between the USOC and the White House for government aid.

## Ready or not, tax deadline's here

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — Benjamin Franklin once said, "In this world, nothing is certain but death and taxes."

Tuesday, Uncle Sam expects you to square up on the latter.

Nearly 93 million American taxpayers are expected to have mailed in their returns to the Internal Revenue Service or requested an extension by midnight Tuesday.

Two out of every three already have done their duty, and the reward has been handsome in many cases with refunds averaging \$300.53 — up \$100 from a year ago.

Most people who get refunds tend to file early returns, however, and the chances are that those who have waited this long to file know they may have to pay Uncle Sam.

"People who owe money generally file later," said IRS spokesman Larry Batdorf.

He also said there are some interesting trends this year, judging from the approximately 60 million forms that had been filed by April 4.

"More Americans appear to be using the short form."

"The average refund is up 20.5 percent, probably because inflation has pushed up mortgage interest rates, medical costs and other allowable deductions."

"More taxpayers seem to be turning to IRS analysts for help in filling out the forms rather than using outside tax preparation firms."

The audit — claims relatively few victims.

"We'll probably audit about 2 percent of the returns," Batdorf said. But he warned that those in the higher income brackets, say \$50,000 and over, have the greatest chance of being called in.

The decision is left up to the agency's computer, which screens all returns. Last year, there were 2.3 million audits. Of those, 133,000 taxpayers found out they had cheated themselves, and not Uncle Sam.

IRS Commissioner Jerome Kurtz, in an interview appearing in the New Issue of U.S. News and World Report, said taxpayers fail to report about 10 percent of their income — costing the government \$2 billion to \$7 billion.

He said the IRS will conduct additional audits this year of returns from persons who are self-employed — people he described as the tax agency's primary compliance problem.

Taxpayers caught off guard by the April 15 deadline will be granted a 60-day extension "simply for the asking," the IRS said.

The mailing of some refund checks that were to have been sent out Friday was delayed by the Treasury Department until Monday, because the agency wanted to make sure it had enough money to cover them.

## Former Liberian officials face treason trials

**MONROVIA, Liberia (UPI)** — Former officials in the government toppled by a 23-year-old army sergeant were stripped naked in front of a crowd of several thousand cheering Liberians Sunday.

They were told they could be sentenced to death on charges of "high treason."

President Samuel Kanyon Doe, who staged the first coup in the history of the west African nation, founded by former American slaves, said in a

radio broadcast the treason trials would begin today before a military tribunal.

Doe, who said "rampant corruption" prompted the coup, also formed a new Cabinet and moved to restore law and order to the capital following the overthrow Saturday in which President William Tolbert was killed.

The maximum penalty for high treason is death and the government would not put anyone on trial without sufficient evidence to convict them."

He said the nation's new information minister, Gabriel Nimly.

But Nimly, a former announcer on the government-operated radio station, said a lesser penalty of life imprisonment could be imposed.

Informed Liberian sources said Tolbert died of gunshot wounds to the head in the executive mansion when enlisted men took over the nation of 1.7 million people during the post-midnight hours Saturday morning.

Two military officials were reported killed and Tolbert's son-in-law was reported wounded.

Former Justice Minister Joseph F. Chesson, who at first was reported to have been killed, escaped from his home before it was riddled with bullets and ransacked, the sources said.

They said Chesson went into hiding but surrendered Sunday and was dragged to the executive mansion by soldiers who took him before new Foreign Minister Gabriel Bacchus Matthews, the one-time protégé of Tolbert.

### Dental charges follow silver prices

**CHICAGO (UPI)** — Fighting tooth decay?

Then be ready to pay premium prices.

The wildly fluctuating silver market and higher interest rates have increased the costs of teeth filling materials up to 60 percent in the past year.

To deal with the huge increase in the prices of dental amalgam, which is used to fill cavities, dental societies in California, Hawaii, Illinois and other states have sought rate increases in public assistance programs, the American Dental Association News reported in this week's edition.

"In December 1978, the cost of silver alloy purchased from a dental supply house was within the area of \$9

to \$9.50 per ounce," Robert A. Rechner, executive director of the Illinois State Dental Society said in the petition for rate increases.

"In a quote that I personally received on Jan. 17, 1980, the price was \$31.67 per ounce — an approximate 1,000 percent increase."

The Illinois society is seeking "an emergency fee increase" of \$2 per amalgam surface with the Illinois Department of Public Aid.

Manufacturers contend the culprit is the amalgam price increases is the cost of silver — about \$6.25 per troy ounce a year ago, climbing to a peak of \$18 in January, and tumbling to a \$10 to \$15 range late last month.

Some dentists, however, cited increases of more than 1,000 percent in the cost of amalgam even when silver prices have been computed out of the prices. Silver comprises about two-thirds of typical amalgam material.

"It appears that the price rise of silver was used as an excuse for everyone who has some activity in the manufacture, distribution and sales of amalgam to tack on an additional percentage," Dr. Ellis J. Neiburger of Waukegan, Ill., told the dental association publication.

Dr. Murry Hellman of Rochester, N.Y., said he paid \$590 for 25 troy ounces of a brand of amalgam in January last year, and that the price quoted him in February this year was \$2,300.

"The figures represent an obscene example of inflation," he said. "I can understand price increases to compensate for the cost of doing business."

However, a 300-percent increase in manufacturing costs is not justified."

Manufacturers are defensive about the price increases and justify them because of conditions not under their control — the silver market itself and skyrocketing interest rates which finance the purchases.

"Alloy sales have always operated on a low profit margin, and this continues to be the case," said the president of one firm.

"The manufacturers have no control over the price of silver, and I would like to know who is going to protect the manufacturer if we must pay \$40,000 for a 1,000-ounce lot of silver and then have the price of silver fall so that we are then operating at a loss."

# Tornadoes join floods in ravaging Louisiana, Mississippi

A string of tornadoes swooped out of rain-swollen skies and ravaged parts of Mississippi and Louisiana Sunday.

Torrential downpours sent scores of families in the Mississippi Delta fleeing to higher ground.

Weekend storms that dumped more than 9 inches of rain on some areas were blamed on at least three deaths and two traffic fatalities in Louisiana and a drowning in Mississippi.

Four people were injured and a number of homes and businesses damaged in Gulfport, Miss., and

about 100 families fled their homes because of flooding caused by two days of rain. Twisters also touched down in counties on both sides of the southern Mississippi city.

Knee-deep water coursed through downtown New Orleans, where high water ruptured a gasoline tank at a service station under construction, spewing fuel into the floodwaters and forcing the evacuation of scores of residents from a three-block area.

Flood watches were posted from Louisiana to Georgia.

A tornado crashed through a trailer

park in St. Charles Parish about 35 miles west of New Orleans, injuring three people and damaging up to 15 trailers. Marble-sized hail pounded the Alexandria, La., area.

Mississippi civil defense officials said the Biloxi River, bloated by an estimated 9 inches of rainfall during the night and early morning, was running "about 10 feet above normal and continuing to rise at about 6 inches an hour."

They said the flooding was compounded by a high tide that helped keep rivers and streams backed up.

Residents in low-lying areas of Jackson, Miss., along the Pearl River were warned to begin preparing for some "very serious" flooding because of the heavy rains.

In a special broadcast, Jackson Mayor Dale Danks said the discharge of water from the Ross Barnett Reservoir would be increased, raising the Pearl River to a projected 37 feet by late Monday. The National Weather Service predicted the Pearl River at Jackson would crest at between 37 and 38 feet late Tuesday. Flood stage is 28 feet.

The mercury plunged into the single digits in the central Rockies, with 9 degree readings reported in the Colorado towns of Gunnison, Aspen and Alamosa.

Temperatures were in the 20s in North Dakota, northern Minnesota and Upper Michigan, and in the 30s in

western Texas where snow fell during the early morning. Light snow also dusted Northern Michigan.

Ducks and small canoes paddled throughout New Orleans, where 5 1/2 inches of rain in a day's span transformed Canal Street into an unplanned canal.

## Body's defenses used System of immunity turned against cancer

HOUSTON (UPI) — In a promising new approach to cancer treatment, a Baylor scientist has developed a way to modify the body's system of immunity and direct natural defenses against marauding cancer cells.

The blood-processing technique so far has produced dramatic results in killing cancer cells and shrinking mammary tumors in two-thirds of the dogs in which it was tried.

Still ahead, however, are critical experiments to see if similar results occur in human breast cancer.

"The step from dog to human is a giant step, and must be taken with great caution," said Dr. David S. Terman, associate professor of medicine at the Baylor College of Medicine.

"From the intensive studies now ongoing in dogs, we should be able to identify the mechanism of this tumor-killing effect," he said in an interview. "With these findings, as well as with adequate demonstration of safety, we could then begin to conceive of an effective way of introducing this to humans."

Of major importance is the fact that Terman's results in dogs, reported to the scientific community in the February issue of the *Journal of Immunology*, have just been duplicated by originally skeptical researchers at the government's National Cancer Institute outside of Washington.

"We've confirmed his findings of this phenomenon," said Dr. Albert Delsersoth of the cancer institute. "I've looked at this question scientifically and I believe that the observation of tumor regressions induced by the treatment is valid."

Dr. Subhash Bansal, who originated the concept when he was at the Medical College of Pennsylvania, reported two years ago that similar treatment reduced tumor size in a single human patient with colon cancer. But the patient later died of the disease.

Terman collaborated with Bansal, who now is in India, then refined the technique and followed up with detailed studies to determine why it works, its safety and the best ways to use the treatment.

Even if the complicated technical process worked in human, researchers emphasize considerable work must be done before the treatment can be considered a new weapon in the war against cancer.

The technique involves running an animal's blood through a centrifuge to separate cells from plasma, and then passing the plasma through a special chamber after which it is mixed with the separated blood cells and returned to the body.

The chamber contains a special strain of "heat-killed" bacteria, *Staphylococcus aureus* Cowans I, embedded in biological filter paper.

Immunoglobulin, a protein also known as an antibody, sticks to that strain of bacteria. Antibodies are key members of the body's defenses against foreign substances.

Some scientists believe the body recognizes that tumor cells, at least for some kinds of cancers, are foreign to the body and that the immune system produces antibodies to attack specific tumors.

But, the theory goes, the proteins serving as the tumor identification markers — the ones the antibodies recognize — are released in large numbers into the blood stream by the tumor cells. The antibodies then are swamped by this influx of marker proteins, called antigens, and never make it to the tumor.

It is believed that these cancer antigens, the tumor identification proteins, also have the same effect on another weapon the body has against foreign invaders — white blood cells called lymphocytes.

In addition, the complexes of antibody and tumor antigen are believed to inactivate the lymphocyte killer cells.

That is why, according to the reasoning behind this system, the body's natural defenses do not knock out the cancer cells.

The immune complexes — the antibody-antigen combination — stick to the bacteria in the chamber and are removed from the blood. It may be that antibodies are produced or freed in this process to go ahead and attack the tumor cell itself.

## Doctor surplus looms for nation in decade

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's supply of doctors could exceed the demand by nearly 50,000 at the end of this decade, a government survey reported Sunday.

The result could be more doctors turning to general practice instead of specialties, and perhaps a better geographic balance of physicians in rural areas and inner cities, it added.

The report from HEW's Health Resources Administration also foresees a slight oversupply of dentists by 1990, an adequate number of optometrists, a continued shortage of podiatrists or foot specialists, and perhaps a shortage of pharmacists.

HEW Secretary Patricia Harris said in an interview it was impossible to say whether the physician surplus situation would keep health care costs from rising as much as they would otherwise.

But she noted the government has

been encouraging advertising by professionals and "the real key is whether the advertising brings competition into this area."

By 1990, the report said, there will be about 600,000 physicians, compared to requirements that will range from 553,000 to 596,000. One result, these studies said, is that there will be less reliance on foreign-trained doctors.

However, "the adequacy of the current and projected total supply also masks the problem of specialty maldistribution," the report said.

"There are too few primary care physicians and related primary care providers, while there continues to be a surplus of other specialists."

At the current rate, the study said, primary care doctors will constitute only 40 percent of practicing physicians by 1990, but that balance may shift because of the surplus.



# Reagan becomes more antagonistic to press

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Ronald Reagan has maintained an adversarial relationship with the press — even with reporters who travel with him regularly — ever since he entered public life.

But last week was notable in that respect.

A flurry of articles contradicting statistics he uses and statements he makes prompted him to chastise the news media for what he called "journalistic ineptness."

The man who has knocked out challenger after challenger in this year's Republican presidential race argued that "one person" reads another person's story and then it is accepted as gospel.

"What I think we're seeing, and what's going on, is a little journalistic ineptness," he said.

In the case of a CBS-TV report questioning Reagan's factual accuracy, the candidate said his critics were "doing what they have accused me of doing."

"Finding some source who would give them a different answer and then taking that source as an absolute guarantee."

The articles put Reagan under the microscopic scrutiny of a potential president and quote experts with challenges for everything from his claim that he saved taxpayers \$2 billion in reduced welfare costs in California, to his story that the government threatened to cut off funds from a Dellingham, Wash., school because teachers were spanking boys and girls in unequal numbers.

He acknowledged that he has collected statistics and anecdotes for more than 20 years without keeping a

file on the sources. But he also questioned the origins of some of the rebuttals.

Reagan scolded the media for the reporting on his inability last month in Wichita, Kan., to define "parity," a formula that pegs the price of some agricultural products to the purchasing power of farm dollars in 1914.

In response to a question about parity, he said: "I wish I could answer the question for you. I know it's a technical question ... I have to confess to you that I'm not as familiar with that as some things."

A few minutes later he told reporters, "I know more about it than I indicated there." And last week in Lubbock, Texas, he said: "Don't you believe all that press since Wichita. I know what partly is."

Reagan also accused the media of

"journalistic ineptness" in reporting his stand on the Olympics boycott.

He was charged with being "wistful-washy" by GOP rival George Bush, but Reagan said reports he had changed his mind on the boycott were incorrect.

Reagan was one of the first candidates to support the boycott, but said later he was rethinking his support because it appeared few other countries would join.

"I haven't really sat down and made up my mind about it," Reagan said then. "You just have to let me stew about it for a while."

A few days later, Reagan reaffirmed his support but said actions of U.S. allies would be crucial. If the United States is the only country not to compete, he said, the Russian peo-

ple "would have no inkling what it was about."

Last week, he said he has been consistent: "I support the boycott today. I supported it yesterday. And I supported it when the president first called for it."

But he said the athletes should be persuaded, not forbidden, saying: "I am against Soviet-style coercion to prevent our citizens from traveling abroad."

Reagan also showed some irritation when pressed last week for details of proposals to eliminate estate and gift taxes, provide tax credit for tuition at private schools and enact a 30 percent income tax cut over three years.

The questioner said a Senate committee had estimated seven Reagan tax proposals would cost \$105 billion in 1981.

# Kennedy captures Arizona

The only surprise in delegate selection processes in six states over the weekend was in Arizona.

There, Sen. Edward Kennedy won an upset that inspired him to "grip Sunday" that the president had found a "little cactus" in the Rose Garden.

South Carolina Democrats reaffirmed at a state convention Saturday the overwhelming preference for President Carter they had indicated at first-round caucuses last month.

The president won 34 of the state's delegates; Kennedy won one, and there were two uncommitted.

The Republican state convention in Kentucky was so overwhelmingly vocal for Ronald Reagan that it not only awarded him all 27 delegates to the national convention but changed the rules so he would be assured of the votes on all ballots — not just the first.

There also were delegate selections in intermediate stages Saturday in Florida, Virginia and Washington state.

Final returns from Arizona precinct caucuses are not expected until today. But Kennedy was long with approximately 55 percent to Carter's 45 percent in a near-complete count early Sunday, and Democratic officials predicted the Massachusetts Democrat will end up with 16 delegates to Carter's 13.

Carter had been considered the favorite in a close race there. The main surprise was the strength Kennedy demonstrated in conservative areas — even carrying Sen. Barry Goldwater's home district of Paradise Valley.

"Jimmy Carter found there's a little cactus growing in the Rose Garden," Kennedy grinned Sunday when addressing a cheering labor union audience in Philadelphia.

Carter spokesman Joe Eddie Lopez, however, said Carter's workers are "very happy with the results," and have "nothing to be ashamed of."

The Kentucky Republicans completed their entire process in one week, winding up three days of caucuses with a state convention Saturday in which a straw ballot gave Reagan 345 votes to 70 for George Bush, 55 for Benjamin Fernandez, 23 for John Anderson and 3 for Harold Stassen.

Reagan backers pushing through a new party rule requiring nominees for the national convention to specify their presidential preference in advance — ensuring the entire delegation will support Reagan even if the process goes beyond the first ballot.

Also on Saturday, Washington's caucuses were not final, but indicated there may have been some movement of uncommitted caucus delegates to Kennedy. The projection after the first round last month gave Carter 34, Kennedy 12 and uncommitted 12.

Second-stage district conventions in Virginia reaffirmed earlier caucus preferences which are expected to produce 59 delegates for Carter to five for Kennedy.

Florida Democrats chose nine state officials to fill delegates slots already pledged to candidates by results of the March 11 primary. Seven of the newly chosen district delegates for Carter and two for Kennedy, with 28 at-large delegates to be named later this month.

South Carolina Republicans held a convention, but it had no impact on the delegate race since all 25 are bound to Reagan because of his win in the March 8 primary.

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Sen. Edward Kennedy, basking in his Arizona caucus victory, thundered out a short address on health care Sunday to a wildly enthusiastic audience of government union officials.

Kennedy spoke to the Pennsylvania convention of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees. In an appearance scheduled before he announced his Democratic presidential candidacy.

It was Kennedy's third Philadelphia appearance in a week in his campaign for the crucial April 22 Pennsylvania primary.

Waving "AFSCME for Kennedy" banners and Kennedy hats, the delegates leaped to their feet when the senator shouted: "When the price of gasoline and home heating oil has doubled, when the price of hamburger has risen 75 cents, I say enough is enough."

## Low-profile in-law

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — "Almost every imaginable Carter surrogate has campaigned in Pennsylvania this month, but the president's brother-in-law has been relatively invisible.

Jerry Smith, 50, of suburban Bethel Park is Rosalynn Carter's brother, but he has remained out of the political arena. His only activity was greeting nephew Chip at Pittsburgh campaign headquarters and a visit the day of the office opened.

Smith, a coordinating engineer with Jones & Laughlin Steel Corp., did a small amount of campaigning for Carter in 1976 when he lived in Chicago.

But this year, he's decided he isn't a politician and doesn't pretend to be. "I'm not a great orator," Smith said. "I'm not in Washington, so I don't know a lot of things that go on there."

"Folks are complaining that Jimmy should get out of the Rose Garden. But if he hit the campaign trail, they'd be wondering why he wasn't back in Washington," he said. "It's a no-win situation."

Smith and his wife, Aino, say being related to the president puts pressure on them.

"My wife deals with it very well," Smith said. "At times, if somebody bothers her, she says, 'I'm not in it, I just married into them. Talk to Jerry.'"

The Smiths said when they first moved to the Pittsburgh area, they were avoided by the neighbors.

"No one came to see us for the first three weeks," Smith said. "Then, one night, we took a walk and one couple, then another came up to us. It seems word had gotten around who we were and people were afraid to talk to us."

Smith said the family has visited the White House, so there are some benefits to being the president's brother-in-law, but he hates being introduced that way.

"A lot of people tell me I look more like Jimmy than Rosalynn," he said.

## Love-boat cruise aground

**SYDNEY, Australia (UPI)** — A South Pacific cruise billed as for "uninhibited adults only" appeared to have run aground before casting off Sunday because the Communist Chinese liner involved suddenly withdrew from the plan.

The nine-day cruise to the New Hebrides, about 1,500 miles northeast of Sydney, has been advertised for "uninhibited" people to join the "sophisticated, romantic, adults-only cruise" with "crated movies, nude-sun-bathing and free alcohol."

A spokeswoman for port Royale Charters, organizers of the cruise, said the ship, the 14,000-ton Minghua, has been withdrawn from the cruise by its agents, Burns Philip and Co. The organizers are now left with a cruise but no ship.

"This has placed our company in a difficult situation because if the Minghua is not available, then we will have to bring a vessel from overseas at vastly increased costs," she said.

"To honor the advertising, the company is doing everything in its power to make sure the cruise goes off smoothly."

She said about 100 people have already booked for the cruise with prices ranging from \$500 to \$1,100 and hundreds of others have made inquiries.

The Sydney Sun-Herald newspaper said a reporter last week phoned Port Royale Charters to ask about the cruise.

The newspaper said he spoke to a woman who stressed the cruise was for "uninhibited couples" and told the reporter he and his lady friend should try to book as soon as possible.

Asked if he could bring an unaccompanied male friend, the woman replied this was okay, then she said she should book early because "we want to make it even numbers ... it would be silly to have one or two too many."

The Sun-Herald said a spokesman for Burns Philip would not comment on suggestions it had also counseled the cruise for moral reasons.

## 'Baby sale' trial slated

**HACKENSACK, N.J. (UPI)** — With 3 1/2 years of legal challenges exhausted, a 73-year-old lawyer has been ordered into court today to face charges he arranged 10 illegal adoptions on a baby black market.

The trial, before Bergen County Superior Court Judge Alfred D. Schiavo, is expected to last about two weeks.

Edward Turner, a lawyer for 53 years, and five other attorneys from around the country were indicted in 1978 for their alleged roles in the "baby selling" scheme.

Authorities charged the lawyers arranged illegal placements for couples who were unable — or not qualified — to obtain babies through legitimate adoption agencies.

Couples paid as much as \$50,000 for a baby, prosecutors said.

Turner, who unsuccessfully sought to have the charges dismissed, is accused of arranging 10 illegal adoptions over a four-year period. Prosecutors said he also counseled couples to lie in court about the money they paid for the infants.

He was also indicted on charges of conspiring with out-of-state attorneys, who allegedly collected as much as \$3,000 per infant to violate New Jersey adoption laws.

# Foreign language classes need if U.S. to remain leader

CHICAGO—The United States will not be able to provide world business and diplomatic leadership or maintain domestic harmony in the '80s unless it changes its attitude toward the teaching of languages other than English, says ethnic specialist Irving Levine.

Levine said the people of the United States are "badly educated in the need for international discourse." He said "there is a tragic lack of understanding of other cultures in the United States, which is hindering relations with allies and enemies alike."

Levine and other speakers said the lack of proficiency in foreign languages in this country is hurting it diplomatically, particularly in the current Iran crisis.

U.S. balance of trade is increasing in part because the people do not speak foreign languages well enough to persuade other peoples to buy U.S. goods and services.

Foreign language studies in the United States peaked at 38 percent of high school students just before World War II. # Israel withdraws from south Lebanon

BIJNT J'BAIL, Lebanon (UPI) — Israel completed the withdrawal of its forces from south Lebanon Sunday. It left behind a tense region simmering from a grim clash between Israeli-backed Christian militias and Irish U.N. troops. The Christian militias and U.N. peacekeeping forces traded prisoners earlier in a peaceful sequel to Saturday's deadly clash, the worst such encounter in two years. "Our military forces have completed their task in south Lebanon and have left the area," a military command announcement in Tel Aviv said. The news came after Israel's northern commander, Maj. Gen.

Avigdor Ben-Gal, went to south Lebanon to meet with U.N. commander Emmanuel Erskine and renegade Lebanese army Maj. Saad Haddad, military sources said. The withdrawal of Israeli troops after five days in southern Lebanon began Friday when they vacated U.N.-controlled areas and moved into the Christian enclave ruled by Haddad.

The Israeli deployment in Lebanon ended on the eve of Prime Minister Menachem Begin's trip to Washington for talks with President Carter. In New York, the U.N. Security Council was called into urgent session

to discuss the situation in south Lebanon. Spokesmen for the 6,000-man multi-national U.N. force said field commanders were assessing damage to installations — mainly to U.N. field headquarters in the southern coastal town of Naqoura, 2½ miles north of the Lebanese-Israeli border. Also pending was the controversy over Israeli troops and tanks which crossed into Lebanon five days ago following a Palestinian guerrilla attack on a border kibbutz in which three Israelis, including a 2-year-old, were killed. Some of the units pulled out of the U.N. buffer zone to take up positions in the rightist Christian

enclave on the frontier, but still on Lebanese soil. "We have no reports of violence and the region is quiet but very tense," a U.N. spokesman said. "Top level contacts are under way to consolidate the undeclared truce." The peacekeeping forces, sent to Lebanon two years ago by the United Nations after Israel's March 1978 invasion, fell back on diplomacy only after a fierce gun battle with Haddad's Christian militiamen in which both sides suffered casualties. One U.N. Fijian soldier and a militiaman were killed and six peacekeepers and three militiamen wounded in clashes Saturday.

## Afghan leaders escape attacks

Afghanistan's Soviet-installed President Babrak Karmal and its deputy prime minister were targets of assassination attempts, the Press Trust of India reported Sunday. No details of the alleged assassination attempts were given but PTI correspondent H.N. Kaul, in a dispatch to New Delhi from the Afghan capital, said: "According to authentic reports current in Kabul, an attempt was made on the life of Deputy Prime Minister

Sultan Ali Khistmand. President Karmal himself was shot at, sometime last February." The dispatch did not say if Karmal was injured, nor identify the assailants. Nor did the news agency provide any details about the reported attempt on Khistmand. Kaul mentioned the reported attacks on Karmal and Khistmand deep in a long dispatch from Kabul analyzing the situation in Afghanistan.

# Brazilian jetliner crashes in storm; 4 survive

FLORIANOPOLIS, Brazil (UPI) — A Brazilian jetliner preparing to land in a tropical rainstorm crashed into a hill and exploded in flames late Saturday, killing all but four of the 58 people on board in the country's worst air disaster in 20 years. A spokesman for Transbrasil Airlines said the Boeing 727 was approaching the airfield at Florianopolis, a seaport city of 170,000 in southern Brazil, and crashed two

minutes from the airport, slamming into a wooded hillside. The air force said four passengers survived and the airline confirmed the downed plane carried 50 passengers and eight crewmen on a domestic flight. An airline spokesman said the figure of 54 dead was not yet official, but added: "It is most likely that it will be." The hospital treating the crash victims confirmed there were four

survivors, two of whom were listed in serious condition. Residents of the Florianopolis suburb of Ratonas said the plane pounded into the hill and burned amid several explosions. Although the crash occurred at 8:35 p.m., the survivors were not rescued until early Sunday because the accident site was difficult to reach. The cause of the crash, about 450 miles southwest of Rio de Janeiro,

was not immediately determined. Firemen were searching the area for a "black box" and other flight data recorders to help in their investigation. It was determined, however, that the jet crashed during a electrical storm. One of the survivors, Flavio Barreto, was quoted by radio news reports as saying a bolt of lightning hit the plane immediately before the crash.

## Pope decries violence

TURIN, Italy (UPI) — Pope John Paul II, in the first visit by a Roman Catholic pontiff to terrorist-plagued Turin in 165 years, said Sunday violence has become "a system" because of man's extreme consumerism and superficiality. As part of the extraordinary security precautions for the pope, more than 2,000 army troops and special police were sent to the Communist stronghold in northern Italy. But Vatican sources said John Paul rejected a bulletproof limousine and opted instead for his usual open jeep. "Men kill in homes, in offices, in universities," John Paul said in a

clear reference to the almost daily terrorism in Turin during the past years. "If it is necessary to kill other men to change and better man and society ... than we have arrived at the point of canceling out man himself." "Countries of great technical progress and well-being foster what is usually called consumerism," the pope said. "Man was made for happiness. But man's happiness is not identified at all with (consumer) pleasure. The consumerism-oriented man loses, in this pleasure, the full dimension of his humanity," John Paul said.

## Shaky 'Seve' by 2

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — With nine holes to play, it seemed that all Seve Ballesteros had to worry about was signing the contest scorecard.

At that point on the final day of the Masters, the young Spaniard owned an incredible 10-stroke lead over the field, and was on his merry way to setting all kinds of records.

Then, in the midst of the overcast skies that had threatened rain all day, Ballesteros crumbled. In little more than a half hour, he blew eight shots of his lead, and with five holes left to play, his margin amounted to only two strokes.

"My good friend, Jack Newton, was playing very good," Ballesteros said. "In the 12th I got in trouble and put the ball in the water, he gets a two and picks up three shots. On the next hole I get a bogey and he gets a birdie, and that's two more shots."

"I told myself, 'Hey, you're going to lose a tournament because he's playing good and I play bad.' Finally, I start to play better at the end."

Ballesteros played well enough at the end to shoot an even-par 72, leaving him at 13-under 275 for the four days. This was good enough for a shaky four-shot victory over Newton, who closed with a 68, and Gibby Gilbert, who had a 67, and earned him a Masters record purse of \$55,000.

"In my heart I'm very grateful," said Ballesteros, who now has won two major championships in less than a year. "This week I take a very big amount of pressure."

"He did a little backing up on the back nine, but it was too late for us," said Gilbert, who made it tight with birdies on the 13th, 14th, 15th and 16th holes to bring him within two shots of Ballesteros at that point.

"I never really thought about winning the tournament, he was so far ahead."

Ballesteros, winner of the British Open last year, thus became the youngest player ever to capture the illustrious Masters and only the second foreigner. Jack Nicklaus took his first five Masters in 1965 when he was 23 years and three months, while Ballesteros turned 23 last Wednesday.

With nine holes to play, Ballesteros led Newton, his playing partner, by 10 shots, and it seemed all he had to concern himself about was finishing his round before a threatened thunderstorm. At that point Ballesteros was 18-under-par, on course to break the championship record of 61, which would have earned him, a \$50,000 bonus from a magazine.

But in the space of four holes Ballesteros led seven shots of his lead, leaving him only two strokes in front of Gilbert and the third of Newton with five holes to play. He started the slide with his first bogey of the day on the 10th hole, then got a double bogey on the troublesome 12th and another bogey on the 13th when his second shot landed in the water and an 8-foot putt flipped the cup.

The ominous setting brought to memory the failure of Ed Sneed last year when he blew a three-stroke lead on the final three holes. But Ballesteros steadied with a birdie on the 15th hole, the third consecutive time he has beaten par at that hole, and he parred home.

Ballesteros had started the day with a seven-shot lead over Ed Flori and quickly stretched it to 10 when he birdied the first and third holes with short putts and the fifth with a 25-footer. He didn't make his first bogey until the 10th hole.

Indicative of the erratic nature of his game, Ballesteros had 23 birdies, one eagle, 10 bogeys and a double bogey for the tournament.

Hubert Green, whose chances were destroyed with a second round 74, closed with a 67 to move into fourth place at 280 and David Graham, with a 70, was at 281.

"I started off like everyone on Thursday, I just went in the wrong direction on Friday," Green said. "I put on a backward mask."

Gary Player, the only other foreigner to win the Masters, achieving the feat three times, closed with a 70 to stand at 283 along with Jerry Pate, who had a 67, and Ben Crenshaw, Tom Kite and Larry Nelson, all with 69.

The crowd at Augusta National, lacking any real race for the championship, was treated to a sentimental journey to the past when Jack Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer, who between them own nine Masters championships, played together in an early pairing.

Palmer won their personal duel with a 69-228 to Nicklaus' 73-281. They were followed by a gallery of several thousand people who cheered almost every move.

"Both Jack and I are proud that the gallery was out in force," Palmer said. "It's a tribute to the game, a tribute to the fact that we've played a long time and that we made a few friends. But it is a tribute to the game."

Palmer said he always had a special feeling playing with Nicklaus, adding, "I'll always enjoy competing with Jack — until he gets too old."

## This pitcher swings a mean bat, too

TWIN FALLS — It's sound advice. "Don't let the pitcher psych you out when you're hitting. Like the coach says, come out and spit at the pitcher," said Greg Habel.

"Twelve games into the 1980 baseball season," Habel has followed the advice of his coach, Ron Watson, to the letter. Figuratively, that is.

The Twin Falls High School first baseman and pitcher takes a team-leading .429 batting average into the Bruins' western Southern Idaho Conference doubleheader Tuesday at Meridian.

The Bruins, who Friday swept a non-conference twinbill on the road from Mountain Home to even their record at 6-6, will try Tuesday to raise their record above the 500 level for the first time this season.

Habel, a senior, has fashioned his team-leading average on 15 hits (including five

doubles) in 35 at-bats and leads the Bruins in RBIs, with 12.

"I never really got to hit before this year. I've always pitched, for the last six years at least. And always had a control problem. I tried to overpower hitters and threw too hard," Habel said last week, after he and his teammates had finished an afternoon practice at Jaycee Park.

Habel, 18, didn't fare much better as a hitter in Little League and Pony League.

"I went for the fences and I didn't have too much success. I had a .601 average after one year of Pony League," said the 5-10, 180-pound right-handed batter and thrower with a laugh.

Despite his less-than-glorious past, Habel didn't approach this season with a negative attitude.

"I was thinking all positive. I thought I'd be used mainly as a pitcher. But I asked the

coach if I could try first base, and he said sure. At the first of the year, I was hitting as well as anybody, and he was looking for hitters.

"I'm just trying to connect and push them into the holes," he said of his success at the plate this season. "Before I was seeing the ball about half way to the plate. This year, I'm seeing it all the way (from the time it leaves an opposing pitcher's hand). And I'm studying pitchers more, from the on-deck circle and during their warmups. I've been really relaxed, that's why I'm hitting. I just don't think when I'm tense."

Watson thinks Habel is one of his most underrated players.

"He's the biggest surprise we've had out here. He's converted from pitching (Habel's now a reliever) to a solid, hard-hitting first baseman. And he's doing a tremendous job for us."

"Greg's been basically a pretty fair pitcher all along, but I kind of think deep down he always wanted to be a hitter. He's a strong kid and more or less a pull hitter. He hits everything on a line."

"He's got a great attitude towards hitting. He loves to hit; to swing the bat and make contact. He's not looking for the fence, he's looking for a base hit," the coach said.

Asked what he wants out of the remainder of his final season with the Bruins, Habel said: "I'd like us to finish with a winning record, at least. I just want to contribute to the team, is all."

"I think we can go to the state tournament. Especially after what we did to Minico and Burley," he said, referring to the Bruins' recent 11-7 and 13-0 victories over their district rivals. "Those are our best two victories of the year. The team was up for both of them."

## The latest Superstar of golf

Seve Ballesteros is on his way to fame, fortune

AUGUSTA, Ga. (UPI) — For years and years, everybody waited around patiently for one of those blond, blue-eyed, All American kids to come along and fill the vacuum created by the decline of Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus.

And now that such a fantastic phenomenon finally has materialized, what do you think he turns out to be?

A black-haired, brown-eyed high school dropout from Spain, who not only ran off with the Masters championship, but also is unquestionably the hottest commodity in all of golf right now.

Severiano Ballesteros, according to such expert judges as former Masters champions Palmer, Gary Player and Art Wall, has all the ability it takes to become "the greatest golfer in the world."

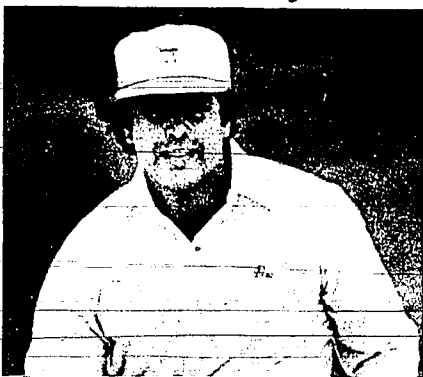
If the stocky 23-year-old native of Santander, Spain fulfills those expectations, and he's certainly on the right track with 21 victories around the world already, including the British Open title last year, then he will lend added weight to the age-old belief that one-time caddies eventually make the best golfers.

Ballesteros comes from a golfing family. His uncle, Ramon Sota, was an international player, and one of his brothers is a club pro back in Spain.

But he wasn't even allowed to play on the golf course bordering that home in which he still lives until he was 14.

"I was a caddy," he explains. "They don't let the caddies play. They didn't give me permission until I was 14."

Was it a public course, one newsman asked him.

Ballesteros was 16 when he won his first organized tournament and 17 when he competed in the Spanish Open for the first time.

"I won 2,500 pesetas in my first tournament," he recalled. "That's about 40 dollars American money."

For his Masters victory, Ballesteros collected around \$50,000.

"That's a lot of dollars or pesetas," someone said to Ballesteros.

He shrugged.

"I don't think of the money," he answered.

"What do you think of, girls?" came another question.

That one produced the biggest laugh of all. Ballesteros is darkly handsome, good looking enough to interest movie makers, and that fact hasn't escaped the attention of many U.S. females. He already is being referred to as "a sex symbol."

"I concentrate on my golf," he said.

"You have girl friends, don't you?" he was asked.

"Many," he said, laughing some more.

Ballesteros isn't built in the classic mold of a professional golfer. He is huskier than most of them, at six feet, and is rather heavy-limbed. He is long of the leg, occasionally erratic with his drives, but he's an excellent putter.

The son of a retired farmer, Ballesteros shows a marked preference to play golf in Europe rather than in this country.

"I have said he has felt 'lonely' in the U.S. although he never seems to lack for any company. The rest of the golfers on the tour all like him."

"When I play over there," he said, meaning Europe, "I have eight or nine more Spanish players I can talk to. Over here, I don't have many at all. London is like my second home to me. I don't say I don't like it playing over here, but I enjoy playing in Europe, too. Over there, they know me. Over here, not so much."

They are getting to know Severiano Ballesteros more and more everywhere. And quicker and quicker, too.

## Celtics go 3-0 in series

Houston was led by Robert Reid, who kept the Rockets close in the first half with 17 of his 23 points. The Celtics played the last quarter without center Dave Cowens, who was being treated for an aching back.

The fourth game is in Houston tonight. Games 5 and 6, if necessary, will be played in Boston.

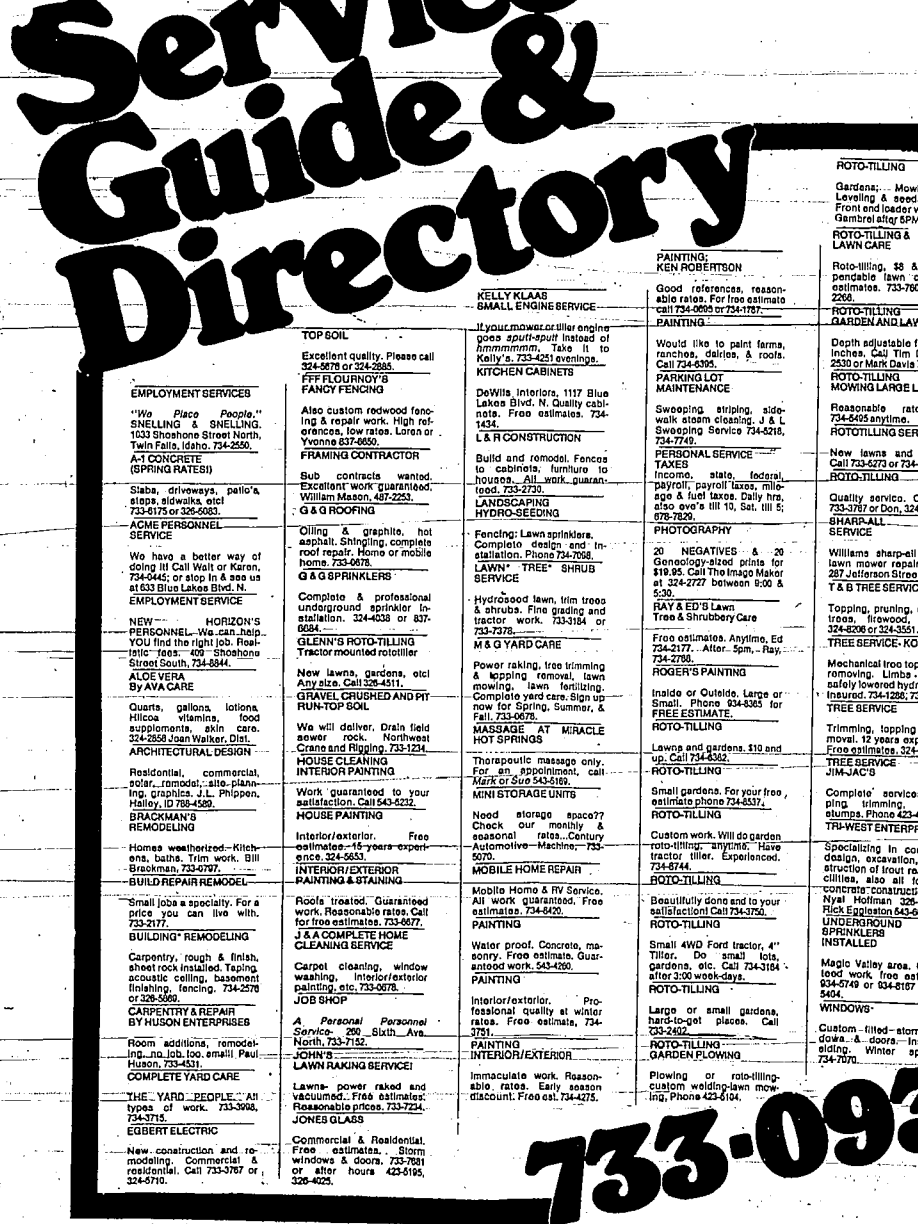
