

## Secretary Vance quits in protest

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Secretary of State Cyrus Vance resigned Sunday from the Cabinet.

The resignation was in protest against the American hostage rescue mission, administration officials disclosed.

Vance had vigorously opposed the rescue raid into Iran last Thursday which was aborted after a series of mechanical mishaps.

It was learned that Vance told Carter that he was opposed to the mission and that they had discussed it for the past two weeks, and "disagreed," officials said.

The quiet diplomat then told the president that he would resign after the rescue raid "no matter what the outcome," officials said.

Officials said that "Cy told the president before the operation actually was ordered that he thought he should resign after it was over," and "no matter how it came out."

"He felt strongly about it," officials said. "He talked to the president several times over the past two weeks and he and the president agreed that they simply differed" on the feasibility of the mission which failed.

"Cy felt he had no choice despite the warm personal relationship with the president," officials said.

Carter also, it appeared, was determined to go through with the plans which he first initiated on Nov. 8 and put under active consideration on April 11, when Vance was on a brief vacation in Florida.

National security affairs adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski has strongly indicated he supported the mission and had "no regrets" that it took place, despite its lack of success and the loss of the lives of eight Americans.

Defense Secretary Harold Brown, under whose office the mission was executed, has strongly expressed similar sentiments and did so again Sunday night through a spokesman.

Officials said Vance made clear throughout the top secret debate on the mission that he was against it, but Carter felt as strongly that he should "go ahead."

"The secretary felt he could not support it but did not want to resign until it was over," they said.

Vance, they said, wanted to make sure that his quitting would not be in the context of the success or failure of the mission.

Officials said they expect him to leave his post fairly quickly. Deputy Secretary of State Warren Christopher was expected to take over as "acting secretary."

Brzezinski recently cited Christopher as a good and likely successor to Vance who had previously indicated that he would leave at the end of the year and would not serve a second term even if the president is reelected.

## Western European leaders close ranks behind Carter

LUXEMBOURG (UPI) — Western European leaders agreed Sunday night to "actively" help President Carter in his attempts to free the American hostages in Iran.

Despite previous reports that the European countries had been dismayed by the aborted attempt to rescue the hostages in Iran and about the failure of the U.S. administration to consult them, there was no hint of criticism of Carter during a summit meeting of the European Economic Community.

Dutch Prime Minister Dries Van Agt told reporters it would have been absurd to demand consultation beforehand on so secret an operation.

The summit leaders also agreed that while Iran was the most pressing problem of the moment, the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan is more

serious in the long run, Dutch foreign Minister Chris Van Der Klauw said.

He said the nine-EEC countries would again insist on a Soviet withdrawal from Afghanistan in the communique of their meeting, scheduled to end today.

The government leaders reaffirmed the decision by EEC foreign ministers last week to limit diplomatic and economic sanctions on Iran, maintaining a near-total trade blockade if there is no "positive progress" in the hostage crisis by May 17.

An EEC official said there would be no hint in the final communique of any European displeasure over Carter's action.

While the European leaders stressed the value of close consulta-

tion with the United States, the official added, no conclusions were reached about a possible summit between themselves and Carter.

"When you are getting advice from your friends, it's better to do it in private," he said.

Other conference sources said a successor was made—the Italian Prime Minister Francesco Cossiga, the current chairman of the EEC, visit Washington soon on behalf of the community.

British Foreign Secretary Lord Carrington is scheduled to visit Washington on May 2.

Belgian Foreign Minister Henri Simonet said the leaders agreed on the need to have a dialogue with the United States about the application of measures against Iran along similar lines.

## 'No body buying,' advisers tell Iran during interviews

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Presidential security adviser Zbigniew Brzezinski said Sunday America is "not in the body-buying business."

The nation will refuse to pay if Iran demands money for remains of eight Americans who died in the rescue mission, he said.

Defense Secretary Harold Brown also indicated disappointment to reports the Iranians may not return the bodies without asking something in return.

"We now have a suggestion that there will be a barter for those bodies," he said, noting Iranian President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr had promised a day earlier that the bodies would be returned without precondition.

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"It is a long tradition, even among enemies — and we are not enemies of the Iranian people — that the bodies of fallen soldiers are returned," Brown said.

There were reports Sunday that Ayatollah Beheshti, a member of the Revolutionary Council, has called for concessions or payments by the United States in return for bodies of eight servicemen killed in an air crash in the Taramar desert during the unsuccessful rescue attempt last week.

Brzezinski discussed the issue on ABC's "Issues and Answers" pro-

gram and Brown appeared on CBS' "Face the Nation" program.

In a related development late Sunday, President Carter announced he would go to Texas today to visit the five soldiers wounded in the rescue mission. They are at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio. The trip will be Carter's first outside Washington since the hostages were seized Nov. 4.

"We are not in the body-buying business," Brzezinski said. A spokesman for his office said later the White House had no official confirmation that the bodies would be bartered.

In addition to the barter reports, Islamic Judge Ayatollah Sadeh

## How's her garden grow? Sponges, out of a gourd

TWIN FALLS — Beside the tomatoes and peas in her cramped backyard garden, Barbara LaBrie of Buhl is growing sponges.

Not sponges from the sea but sponges from a gourd. This spring, LaBrie is planting the luffa, also called the dishcloth gourd.

The gourd's thick, plant inner fiber, when cleaned and dried, has a texture like a scouring pad, absorbs water like a sponge and lasts as long as a dishcloth. Some are even soft enough to use as washcloths.

The luffa is just one of the unusual shoots peeping up in Magie Valley backyard gardens this spring.

In addition to the cabbage and beans found in many local vegetable patches, Jerusalem artichokes, lettuce, blue Indian corn, peanuts and jicama (a root vegetable) are being grown.

LaBrie is planting luffa for the second time this spring. Last year she successfully cultivated six of the plants, which grow like squashes and produce bright yellow flowers. The immature gourds of the plant can be eaten, tasting like okra.

The luffa "just grew all over the place," and each plant produced about 25 zucchini-shaped gourds, the largest about two feet long, LaBrie said. But hungry

chickens left her with only 25 "sponges" and she didn't harvest them early enough, so cold temperatures froze them on the vines.

But after she peeled the skins and washed the pulp and seeds out of the fibers, she had enough sponges for presents and for her own dishwashing supply. A few were even soft enough for cleaning the skin.

"You get a nice massaging feeling when you use it," LaBrie said. She thinks her gourds might have been softer had they matured longer.

So this year she's started the plants in her greenhouse to give them a longer growing season. The seeds are ordered from Nichols' Garden Nursery in Albany, Ore., four packets of seeds cost \$2.50. They are easy to grow in this area; they just require a lot of ground like other squashes, she said, adding "they're indigestible, practically."

Many of the other unusual vegetables and plants grown in local gardens do not require extraordinary attention. But some seeds may be expensive. And some require a long growing season, so there's a chance an early frost might kill them off. Some just refuse to grow for reasons known only to Mother Nature. But a few gardeners like the challenge of a new crop.

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## American envoy back home 20 pounds lighter



Ambassador Diego Aencio welcomed by wife Nancy in Florida

HOMESTEAD AIR FORCE BASE, Fla. (UPI) — U.S. Ambassador Diego C. Aencio returned to freedom and his family Sunday.

Bearded and 20 pounds lighter, he ended 61 days of captivity in Bogota, Colombia, by letting guerrillas who used him and 11 other diplomats for safe passage to Cuba.

Aencio, wearing suede shoes, jeans and a sport shirt, stepped off a charter plane from Havana, where he and his fellow captives were released by members of the April 19th movement, also known as M-19.

He was greeted by his wife, Nancy, some of his five children, a senior State Department official and his private physician.

Aencio, who was appointed ambassador to Colombia last Nov. 8, was among nearly 60 people taken hostage Feb. 27 when armed members of the M-19 stormed a diplomatic reception at the Dominican Republic embassy in Bogota.

State Department spokesman David Passage, who accompanied Aencio on the flight from Havana,

said the 48-year-old diplomat "was in excellent condition."

"He hasn't shaved in 61 days and he's lost 20 pounds, but he looked very, very good," Passage said.

"He said that basically the hostages were well treated, but they suffered from the seclusion itself. He said the most difficult thing about captivity was being totally cut off. They only had local radio and television programs."

Aencio made no comment to reporters who gathered in a light rain at Homestead Air Force Base to meet the balding diplomat.

Aencio and his family were whisked away under tight security to a base hospital, where State Department officials said the ambassador would undergo a physical examination to determine any effects of his long captivity.

After the medical examination by his private physician, Dr. Fergus Reid of Washington, Aencio and his family will remain in seclusion at the base for 24 to 48 hours "to unwind and decompress."

Aencio will be flown to Washington later this week for an official greeting.

Passage said Aencio asked him during the 45-minute flight to Florida from Havana about his family and current world events, including the status of the Olympic boycott movement.

The ordeal for Aencio and the other hostage diplomats drew near a close Saturday night in Bogota following seven weeks of intensive negotiations. The M-19 guerrillas were given at least \$2 million from private donations and free passage to Cuba aboard a Cubana Airlines jet.

That jet arrived in Havana Sunday morning, Passage said at least 1,000 Cubans were at the Jose Marti Airport and "they greeted them (guerrillas) as heroes."

"As we understand it," Passage said of the M-19 guerrillas, "they are en route to an ultimate destination of asylum."

"He said he did not know what the final destination was."

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# Tribute paid to airmen who died

NICEVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — President Carter Sunday praised five airmen killed in their attempt to free the American hostages in Iran for "their daring spirit" and 2,500 of their countrymen paid tribute at a special memorial service near their home base.

Carter's telephone message was read at a special eulogy service at the Niceville High School football stadium for five of the eight men who died when a helicopter crashed into a transport plane after the rescue mission was scrubbed. The five were attached to the 8th Special Operations Squadron at nearby Hurlburt Field.

The families of the five airmen did

not attend the outdoor ceremony, but one of the victim's wives sent a message thanking the community for its support.

Carter's message, read by Maj. Gen. Robert Bond, the commander of the sprawling Eglin Air Force Base complex that includes Hurlburt Field, said prayer for the freedom of the American hostages would be a great tribute to the eight dead soldiers.

"I pray with you, in memory of them, for the freedom of 53 other Americans in Iran, for the freedom our eight brothers lived to defend and died to try to win. I pledge myself, in their memory and for all of us, to the other cause worthy of their daring

spirit — the cause of a lasting peace for a free America," Carter said.

"I grieve with you for eight fine men who died in the service of America." You have as consolation in your sorrow the memory of their lives.

"To me and to their country, they have left an equal gift — the legacy of their daring spirit," the president said.

The airmen who died in the rescue mission were Capt. Harold Lewis, 35, a pilot from Mansfield, Conn.; Capt. Lynn McIntosh, 33, a pilot from Valdosta, Ga.; Capt. Richard Bakke, 33, a navigator from Long Beach, Calif.; Capt. Charles McMillan, 29, a

navigator from Boise, Idaho; and Technical Sgt. Joel Mayo, 34, a flight engineer from Bonifay, Fla.

Three of the five other Americans injured in the rescue attempt also attached to the 8th Special Operations Squadron at Hurlburt Field.

McMillan's wife, Janice Ann McMillan, sent a statement to the ceremony.

"I am very grateful for the thoughtfulness and support of this community for my husband and myself," she said.

Mayo was an assistant scoutmaster of a Boy Scout troop in nearby Mary Esther, Fla., and some 25 Scouts from his unit showed up.

# Doctors expect injured servicemen to survive

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (UPI) — Five U.S. servicemen injured in the aborted attempt to free American hostages in Iran and flown home for special treatment are expected to survive, doctors said Sunday.

While the four most seriously injured were under armed guard on the fourth floor of the huge Brooke Army Medical Center, Col. Basil Pruitt told reporters at a mid-afternoon news conference: "I feel very strongly that all of them will survive."

The fifth was hospitalized at nearby Lackland Air Force Base with a knee injury. Pruitt, the doctor in charge of treating the members of the crack hostage-rescue team at the world's

best burn treatment center, was the first to give official word on the men's conditions.

However, he spoke in generalities and said the Privacy Act prohibited discussing the cases by name.

"Dealing with the age group we are, survival is anticipated in all four cases," he told reporters.

Pruitt said the men's burns ranged in extent from 2 to 44 percent of their bodies, some had suffered second-degree and others third-degree and the burns ranged in location from only the face to all extremities.

"They seem to be coping well. They're all conscious and aware of what's going on," he said.

Pruitt said three of the men were

able to walk and watch television Sunday morning while the fourth, believed to be Air Force Staff Sgt. Joseph B. Beyers III, 37, of Charleston, S.C., had better than a "50-50 chance" of survival.

Beyers' wife and five children visited him Sunday at the Fort Sam Houston medical facility, where four suites were reserved for the comfort of the families of the injured men.

The other men at Brooke were identified as Marine Maj. Leslie B. Petty, 34, of Jacksonville, N.C., who was in serious condition; Marine Maj. James H. Schaefer Jr., 36, Los Angeles, and Air Force 1st Lt. Jeffrey B. Harrison, 26, Warren, Ohio, both listed in satisfactory condition.

The fifth man, Airman 1st Class William B. Tootle of Fort Walton Beach, Fla., suffered a knee injury and was being treated at Lackland's Wilford Hall — where the deposed shah of Iran was treated last December. A hospital spokesman said Tootle had talked with his family by telephone.

The injured members of the crack hostage rescue team arrived in San Antonio Saturday afternoon.

Pruitt said the two lesser injured men may be released from the hospital in eight to 10 days but the other two will have to remain longer. He said some of the burn victims may require skin-grafts but declined to predict whether any would be disfigured.

# Father says transfer may enhance escapes

HOUSTON (UPI) — The transfer of the 50 American hostages from the U.S. Embassy in Tehran could present an opportunity for escape in some cases, the father of one of the captives says.

Families of the 13 of the hostages, though disappointed over the failure of last week's rescue mission, found a glimmer of hope at a weekend briefing by the State Department for the safe return of their loved ones.

Ernest Cooke, a professor at Memphis State University whose hostage son is Vice-Consul Donald Cooke, said the transfer could mean the terrorists will lose some control and also increase opportunities for escape.

"I think it will be easier for the hostages to escape," he said. "Knowing human nature, some of those people want to go home. Many have friends in Iran. If our son escaped, I think he could go into hiding very easily."

Others also expressed renewed hope.

Johnny McKeel of Balch Springs, Tex., father of hostage Marine Sgt. Johnny McKeel Jr., said it could lead "to something better," noting it could ease the way for the Iranian government to take control of the captives.

Lewis Hohman of Sacramento, Calif., whose brother, Marine Sgt. Donald Hohman is a hostage, said he saw the move as a "security" action by the terrorists that would not mean harm to any of the Americans.

"We feel at this point they'd have to be crazy to harm anybody," he said. "We think everything will work out in the end."

A joint statement issued by the families of hostages from Tennessee, Arkansas, Texas, Arizona, Colorado, California and Oregon said the United States should not apologize to Iran for the aborted rescue.

"We not only support the president's decision in this attempt, but feel that every effort should continue to be made to secure the release of our unjustly held relatives."

# Life may turn harsh

LONDON (UPI) — Mrs. Barbara Timm, returning from a visit to her hostage son in Tehran, said Sunday life for the 50 American captives will be made worse because of the aborted attempt to rescue them from the U.S. Embassy.

Flanked by her husband, Kenneth, and attorney Carl McAtee, Mrs. Timm arrived at London's Heathrow airport after a week-long visit to Tehran, during which she was allowed inside the embassy to visit her son, Kevin Hermering, a 20-year-old U.S. Marine.

The three were in Tehran at the

time of the unsuccessful rescue mission, and she later appeared on Iranian television with President Abolhassan Bani-Sadr at her side to "apologize" for the U.S. action.

"I apologized on our behalf, to let the Iranian people know how badly we felt as individuals that any kind of military action was taken," she said. "I don't have to say that I'm proud to be an American and that I love my country — but I cannot feel proud that there would be a desire to have military action taken at this time — or at any time."

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# Pregnant woman protests visa lifting with hunger strike

MOSCOW (UPI) — A pregnant Soviet woman whose exit visa was revoked less than 24 hours before she and her husband were to leave the country said Sunday she would go on a hunger strike to protest the action.

Nadezhda Zakharova, 27, who is eight months pregnant, said she was "going out" of desperation because Soviet officials "are going on torturing us, trying to keep us here for no reason."

"Starting tomorrow I will drink

only water, and eat nothing," Miss Zakharova said. "Today is my last normal day. People may say I am crazy for trying this, but I don't want my baby to be a slave here. It is better to die than to live here in such a situation."

Miss Zakharova and her husband, Andrei Temnitskiy, were already in Sheremetyevo Airport clearing their baggage through customs on March 13 in preparation for a flight the next day when they were turned back.

Authorities informed the expectant mother they had received a note from her sister claiming she is owed 8,000 rubles — more than \$12,000.

Miss Zakharova, who uses her maiden name, says the demand is false and unsupported by any evidence, but officials of the Soviet visa agency, OVIR, said they will not reconsider her departure permit until she proves her innocence.

Officials at OVIR refused to discuss the case. So has Miss Zakharova's

sister, a highly paid engineer who lives in Norilsk, in Siberia. A third woman who was identified as an intermediary in Miss Zakharova's sister's letter to OVIR told UPI Sunday that she knows both women, and often relayed messages from Norilsk to Moscow, but never delivered 8,000 rubles to anyone.

Miss Zakharova said she and her husband have appealed repeatedly to OVIR, have tried to tell their story to Communist Party officials and have

tried to tell their story to Soviet President Leonid Brezhnev, but every attempt has been unavailing.

She has lost her job as an Intourist translator and her husband has been dismissed from his position as a commercial artist. They have been evicted from their apartment, and militia men impounded the few possessions they left there.

Reznitskiy, a Jew, and his wife, who is not both surrendered their Soviet citizenship before originally receiving

their exit visas, so they have no passports—or identity documents—of any kind. They spent all but \$277 of their money on plane tickets to Vienna.

Without a visa, they cannot leave. Without Soviet documents, they cannot get medical care for Nadezhda, or an apartment. Without money, they cannot hope to pay even a portion of the 8,000-ruble claim, even though they contend the claim is false.

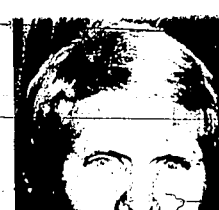

# Quitting smoking 'cold turkey' best way

NEW YORK (UPI) — Quitting cigarettes "cold turkey" is better than cutting down a little at a time — a process that stretches out agonies of withdrawal, scientists reported Saturday in an American Cancer Society journal.

The most acute withdrawal problem, identified by about 90 percent of the ex-smokers in the study funded by the Veterans Administration and the ACS, comes in the first two weeks, and hits hardest around 7 p.m.

The craving is so powerful that among the partially abstinent smokers it induces relapse and virtually assures failure of further tries at quitting, the scientists said in the

journal "World Smoking & Health."

But among those who quit "cold turkey" there is an easing of withdrawal symptoms during the first few days and this makes it easier to hold out until withdrawal troubles run their course, the scientists said.

...Inability to concentrate — plus increased irritability, aggression and anxiety, are other withdrawal symptoms documented in the report by Saul M. Schiffman and Dr. Murray E. Jarvik of the University of California at Los Angeles School of Medicine.

Other researchers have documented these changes in withdrawal symptoms: changes in metabolism,

weight, brainwave characteristics and excretion of hormone-like substances.

"Probably continued smoking of partially abstinent smokers maintains their withdrawal symptoms," the California researchers said.

"Thus, craving leads to smoking, to craving, in a cycle of dependence."

# Flu leaves unwanted legacy

ATLANTA (UPI) — The worst epidemic of influenza-B in 18 years has subsided in the United States, leaving behind an unwanted legacy.

It is expected to be a record case load of Rey's syndrome, the deadly children's disease.

With the influenza season barely over, 419 cases of Rey's syndrome have been reported to the national Center for Disease Control.

Medical researchers say when the final count is made in November, they expect the number of cases to exceed the 454 reported in 1977—the last epidemic year for influenza-B.

So far, Ohio with 137 and Michigan with 56 have reported the greatest number of cases. Other states listing 10 or more cases were New York with 16, Massachusetts 13 and Illinois 10.

"In the 252 cases where the outcome was known, there were 52 deaths, a mortality rate of 22 percent," said Dr. Eugene Hurwitz, epidemiologist in

# Teens celebrate after saving trees on street

FAMPA, Texas (UPI) — With a budget of \$50, two teen-agers are proud they helped win a battle to save a tree-lined boulevard from a \$4.8 million street "improvement" program.

Steve Mills, 17, and Chad Ward, 19, Sunday were celebrating the 1,754-6877 defeat of a bond issue that would have meant the destruction of scores of Chinese elm trees lining Somerville Street, one of the prettier streets in this town of 30,000.

"I expected it to be closer than it was," said Mills. "It dispelled a lot of what I'd always heard people say about how you can't fight city hall."

The youths' campaign began over a month ago when they read about a bond issue in the local newspaper and began collecting donations from concerned citizens.

They collected \$150 and the rest of their budget came out of their own pockets.

"We didn't do any paid advertising until last Wednesday," Mills said. "We had two 60-second spots on radio every hour and a newspaper ad everyday. We also printed up 2,000 flyers and passed them out."

Mills and Ward got about 900 people to sign petitions to save the trees, and the boys spent alot of time on the streets, talking directly to the electorate.

When city commissioners were presented with the petition, Mills said.

# Teens celebrate after saving trees on street

Recent studies also revealed that twentyies were susceptible to the ailment, in addition to children in the 5-11 age group.

Hurwitz made the prediction of a record year for Rey's syndrome if the rate of surveillance and reporting continues as it has in the past winter.

"We expected to see a large number of cases this year in connection with influenza-B," Hurwitz said. "It appears that this was the case."

The cause of Rey's syndrome still is pretty much a medical mystery, according to Hurwitz. The disease follows a viral infection, such as influenza-B or chicken pox, but it is not known whether a virus itself causes the ailment. The disease attacks the brain and liver.

For Marple detective Fred Blanck, who worked on the case with partner Charles Linde, the ending was especially happy. One of the recovered rings belonged to his daughter Karen.

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# Soviets add nuclear missiles to arsenal in Afghanistan

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — The Soviet Union has put ballistic missiles carrying nuclear warheads in Afghanistan and has four to five army divisions poised along the Iranian border, the Press Trust of India said Sunday.

Quoting highly placed sources in Kabul, Press Trust correspondent H.N. Kaul said the Soviets also have 25-mile range surface-to-surface missiles. The missiles, known as "Frogs" and usually used as tactical weapons, have been spotted in Kabul. It is believed the ballistic missiles carry nuclear warheads as well as high explosive warheads," Kaul wrote from the Afghan capital.

He said well-informed observers believe there are some 5,000 Soviet armored personnel carriers in Afghanistan, a large number for a country which is three-fourths mountainous terrain. The only parts of Afghanistan

where armored personnel carriers can move about with ease are in the eastern and southern sectors, particularly by Pakistan's troubled Baluchistan province and neighboring strife-torn Iran.

"Highly placed sources estimate four to five Russian divisions are poised along the Iranian border," Kaul said. A Soviet division generally numbers 10,000 men at full strength.

U.S. officials estimate 80,000 Soviet troops in Afghanistan, with another 20,000 to 30,000 along the Soviet-Afghan border poised to join their comrades.

U.S. officials previously have reported surface-to-surface missiles in Afghanistan but not ballistic missiles.

Kaul speculated that the medium-range ballistic missiles would not be useful in the Afghan situation, but could be a means of keeping the Americans on the defensive in Iran and the Persian Gulf area, including the strategic straits of Hormuz.

In Islamabad, rebels said they had killed several Soviet troops along the highway between Kabul and Kunduz, the main town in northeastern Kunduz province bordering the Muslim republics of the Soviet Union.

## U.S. back in Shanghai

SHANGHAI, China (UPI) — Uncle Sam returns to Shanghai today to raise the Stars and Stripes over a new consulate, 30 years after being chased out of China by the Communist takeover.

U.S. Ambassador Leonard Woodcock will host the flag and exchange champagne toasts with Chinese officials at a reception symbolizing Chinese-American reconciliation after the long years of Cold War.

The Americans are taking over a 12-room mansion in a 3 1/2 acre garden once owned by a wealthy Chinese merchant who left hurriedly when Shanghai fell to Communist troops in 1949.

any more," said Donald M. Anderson, the newly appointed consul-general. "Nobody can afford to."

Anderson said he still does not know the name of the mansion's original owner. Switzerland's consulate general was there during World War II and for several years after the revolution. It housed the Shanghai branch of the Communist Party's Organization for Women.

The house, apparently erected around 1900, has parquet wood floor, and wood panel interior walls. The garden has two spacious lawns, an orchard of orange trees, a lily pond, and a three-room greenhouse.

## Pope set to leave on tour of Africa

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope John Paul II said Sunday he is going on a six-nation tour of Africa Friday to share in the joy of Africans who have accepted the Christian message and gained national sovereignty.

John Paul told a crowd of 50,000, people in St. Peter's Square that the trip also would be a sign of unity among peoples and nations.

John Paul's travel plan is to visit Zaire for 4 1/2 days, ending May 6; spend an afternoon in the Congo, two days in Kenya, two days in Ghana, an afternoon in Upper Volta and two days in the Ivory Coast. He returns to the Vatican May 12.

It will be the second papal trip to Africa. The first was made by the late Pope Paul VI who visited Uganda for three days 11 years ago.

## Supplies sent up to craft

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union launched an unmanned Progress 9 spaceship Sunday to provide supplies to the two orbiting cosmonauts aboard the Salyut 6 space station, the Tass news agency reported.

Cosmonauts Valery Ryumin and Leonid Popov were launched into space April 9 aboard Soyuz 35 and entered the space station the following day.

Progress 8, another supply ship, already was docked with the station when they arrived. The cosmonauts filled it with waste material, then dumped it into space on Friday, leaving the docking port free to take on the new Progress 9 ship.

Tass said the ferry supply ship was launched at 9:24 a.m. Moscow time (12:24 a.m. MDT) Sunday.

The unmanned supply ships are a major factor in the Soviet Union's ability to keep cosmonauts in space for extended periods.

Ryumin, 40, spent 175 days in space last year aboard Salyut 6 to set a world record. Popov, 34, is commander of the latest flight, although he is a space rookie.

The use of extended flights is part of the Soviet Union's emphasis on near earth studies instead of manned flights to the moon or beyond.

The launch of Progress 9 also may be a prelude to a second manned flight to the space station.

## New clashes in Zimbabwe

SALISBURY, Rhodesia — At least five persons died in a racial of instant "justice" marked by brutal clashes, political gang wars and guerrilla in newly independent Zimbabwe, police said Sunday.

In the Runde tribal reserve in the midlands, a woman died after being beaten severely by the organizers of a kangaroo court who found her guilty of being a witch, a police spokesman said.

The "trial" was staged by the local branch of Prime Minister Robert Mugabe's Zimbabwe African National Union-Front, he said, and five men were later arrested.

In another rural area, two former members of the auxiliary force loyal to Mugabe rival Abel Muzorewa were sentenced to death by a kangaroo court for having had sexual relationships with local women.

A police spokesman said a white policeman was killed in the midlands city of Gwelo Saturday while answering a complaint about presence of an armed and guerrilla in a predominantly white apartment building.

## Iraq denies coup, death of leader

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Iraq Sunday denied reports originating in neighboring Iran that Iraqi President Saddam Hussein had been assassinated in a military coup.

"The reports are baseless and false," the Iraqi news agency said, adding that 12 hours after he was reported dead, Hussein hosted a dinner party for the president of the Seychelles Islands.

Reports of a coup in Baghdad and the death of Hussein came initially from an Iranian cabinet spokesman in Tehran and later were carried by several international news organizations (not UPI).

Relations between Baghdad and Tehran have deteriorated steadily since Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Islamic revolutionaries overthrew Iran's Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi and Iran and Iraq came close to war along their border earlier this month.

## Crash claims 40

BANGKOK, Thailand (UPI) — A bolt of lightning struck a Thai airliner as it approached Don Muang International Airport Sunday and the plane crashed less than a mile from a runway, killing at least 40 people and injuring 11 others.

Officials of Thai Airways said 17 people survived, among them four Americans who were among the injured.

## Worst time since '30s

Not since the depths of the catastrophic depression of the 1930s have you and I been in the grip of such "economic miseries" as we are now.

During all the previous downs of the post-World War II era there has been nothing as bad as this. And when I go back to the early 1930s for a comparison, I am willing about an entirely different kind of misery.

For while that era of almost incredibly high unemployment, multiple business bankruptcies, skyrocketing bank failures, etc., left an indelible mark on all who survived it, those who did survive came out believing even more strongly in our own capacity to remodel the system so a collapse of that nature never could happen again.

And out of that determination came the succession of laws that to date have moderated "normal" recessions by creating economic "cushions" under our economy: Federal Deposit Bank Insurance, for instance, unemployment insurance, Social Security, minimum wages.

A measure of our misery can be shown by the "discomfort index"

invented by the late Arthur M. Okun, a brilliant economist with an irrepressible sense of whimsy that made him a beloved figure when he was President Johnson's chief economist and later, when he was a member of the Brookings Institution.

The index is so simple that it is, of course, suspect. What's more, it is based on statistics that are, in themselves, condemned as not accurately reflecting the facts, and therefore, are suspect, too. Nevertheless, the very simplicity of the index makes it far more revealing to you than is generally admitted.

The index consists of: the current rate of rise in the Consumer Price Index (inflation rate) plus the current rate of unemployment (business distress).

What better gauge of our economic misery in this spring of 1980—as the business downturn deepens and inflation continues to roar on—than the murderous squeeze on us resulting from a simultaneous rise in joblessness and soaring living costs?

Here's the record, from the slump of 1973-75 (worst of post-World War II to that time) to today when a new

slump has emerged of unpredictable duration, depth and breath.

The misery index will get worse before it gets better.

(1) Unemployment finally is rising, with the extent of the rise still unforeseeable. To forecast a low peak on the rate—as many in the Rose Garden gang are now doing—is to imply that the White House will bow under political pressures for re-stimulation to try to hold this downturn to another mild recession.

If this is the result, nothing will have been achieved by our economic misery! The American consumer will shrug off President Carter's anti-inflation pledges as mere fluff, inflation psychology will revive and roar on, and the end result will be a cataclysmic collapse.

## GE lab to produce 'hybrid' cars

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. (UPI) — General Electric Co. said the Department of Energy has named its research and development center a prime contractor for an \$8 million project to produce two experimental "hybrid" automobiles.

GE said a team of leading U.S., West German and Japanese automotive and development firms will work on the 30-month project to produce two four-door sedans that will have both a gasoline engine and electric motor.

The firm said the contract for the hybrid vehicles is part of an overall DOE program to popularize such automobiles and electric vehicles as a

means of reducing U.S. gasoline consumption.

GE's hybrid, for example, is expected to consume 40 percent to 55 percent less petroleum than a conventional automobile of similar size. Its 40-horsepower electric motor and 80-horsepower gasoline engine will operate separately or at the same time. The electric motor is meant for lower speeds and the gasoline engine for most highway driving.

"Thanks to its dual drive system, the hybrid automobile is a promising approach to helping the U.S. meet its transportation requirements in the potentially fuel-short years that lie ahead," said Dr. Roland W. Schmitt,

GE vice president for corporate research and development.

Major subcontractors in the project are Volkswagenwerk AG, Wolfsburg, West Germany, whose research division will design and build the special gasoline engine; Globe-Union Inc., Milwaukee, a subsidiary of Johnson Controls Inc., to develop advanced lead-acid batteries for the electric motor; and Triad Services, Inc., Madison Heights, Mich., which will design and make the body and chassis.

Daihatsu Motor Co. Ltd., Japan's leading maker of battery-powered vehicles, will serve as consultant on the project.

## Coors earnings, sales set marks

GOLDEN, Colo. (UPI) — The Adolph Coors Co., the nation's fifth-largest brewer, Friday reported record sales and earnings for the 12-week first quarter ending March 23, after the same period a year ago.

Joseph Coors, company president, said net income for the first quarter was \$12.6 million, or 36 cents a share, up 13.4 percent from \$11 million or 32 cents a year ago.

Coors attributed the increase in sales to a "positive reaction" to the brewery's Coors Light Beer throughout the company's marketing region. He said Coors Light was the No. 1 selling light beer in a number of markets, including Oklahoma City, San Diego and Dallas.

Coors also said net sales for the first quarter were \$176,428,000, up 19 percent when compared with \$148,225,000 during the same period in 1979.

The brewery executive said the company's shipments for the first quarter were 2,761,000 barrels, up 1.8 percent from 2,712,000 barrels sold during the first quarter a year earlier.

"We are pleased with the record first quarter sales and are optimistic

about continued sales improvement throughout 1980," Coors said.

He said although net income increased during the first quarter, con-

tinually increasing costs were being encountered. The company recently announced price increases to help offset rising costs.

## Fuel cost blamed for Pan Am loss

NEW YORK (UPI) — Pan American World Airways reported a loss of \$74.9 million for the first quarter and blamed it mainly on increased fuel costs.

The loss compares with a \$12.1 million pro forma combined loss of Pan Am and the former National Airlines a year earlier. Pan Am acquired Nation at the end of 1979.

Of the total loss, \$62.2 million was operating loss. The company said the fuel increase was up 103 percent from a year ago with the average cost per gallon of jet fuel climbing to 91.5 cents from 44.6 cents.

## Continental Life earnings advance

BOISE — First quarter earnings for Continental Life and Accident Co. were slightly higher than a year ago. Chairman W.H. Langroise said the annual shareholders' meeting will be May 12 in the corporate offices in Boise.

Unconsolidated, unaudited figures for the first quarter include net income after taxes of \$461,000, up from \$442,000 a year ago. Two wholly owned subsidiaries, Continental Financial, Inc., of Boise, and Cosmopolitan Life Insurance Co., Los Angeles, are not included.

## Chevron drilling first well in Fiji

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Chevron Oil Co. of Fiji Friday announced it has begun drilling the first well ever undertaken in the Fiji Islands.

The Standard Oil Co. of California subsidiary said the Bligh Water No. 1 well was being drilled in 120 feet of water by the Danwood lee drillship. The well is located about 10 miles north of Viti Levu in the Bligh Water region.

Chevron is the operator for a group in a 2-million acre exploration license area.

## Aetna lists level quarter earnings

HARTFORD (UPI) — Aetna Life & Casualty Co. had virtually level earnings in the first quarter with last year at \$1.58 cents a share against \$1.54, in spite of a rise in total revenues to \$3,466 billion from \$2,616 billion.

Net income was \$127.92 million, against \$124 million a year ago. Chairman John H. Filer said improved earnings in the life divisions were offset by poorer results on property and casualty insurance operations. The percent gain in total revenues, he said, came largely from bigger sales of pension plans.

## Pay Less increases quarterly dividend

WILSONVILLE, Ore. — Shareholders of Pay Less Drug Stores Northwest, Inc., will begin receiving regular cash dividends of 17 cents a share quarterly on July 15.

That is an increase of 33.3 percent from the previous 15 cent dividend.

## Congress faces budget votes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress faces guns and butter issues this week. It begins votes that may determine which factions win and which lose under the proposed balanced federal budget for fiscal 1981. Republicans will get one more chance to derail the House Budget Committee's \$611.8 billion spending plan and the Senate will begin debate on a \$612.9 package approved by its budget panel. Although the House and Senate versions are close in dollar amounts, the Senate version includes about \$9 billion more for defense. The budget action will be the main event on Capitol Hill, with votes on 10 amendments scheduled to begin in the House Tuesday. Representatives already have completed general debate on the amendments. GOP House members hope to make the House

budget proposal more conservative by cutting additional funds from domestic programs and adding them to defense spending. A proposal by Reps. Marjorie Holt, R-Md., and Phil Gramm, D-Texas, to add \$5.1 billion for defense is given the best chance of passage among the 10 amendments. The Carter administration supports an amendment by Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., to add \$1.1 billion mostly to the domestic budget, including \$300 million which could be used to help ailing cities. But House leaders say the Obey plan has little chance of being approved. In the Senate, a liberal attempt to restore funds to domestic programs, led by Assistant Democratic leader Alan Cranston of California, is not expected to get far.

## Nation may need 400 reactors

WASHINGTON (UPI) — About 400 nuclear reactors — almost six times as many as are in operation today — may be required to meet America's energy needs by the year 2000, a top Energy Department official told Congress. That nuclear expansion scenario, provided to a House Appropriations energy subcommittee by Assistant Energy Secretary George Cunningham last week, lends perspective to President Carter's December statement that nuclear power is "an energy source of last resort." If depressed construction rates continue, Cunningham said, the nuclear industry — now operating 72 reactors — will increase the number to about 200 reactors by the turn of the century.

That forecast would leave the country with "an energy gap" of about the equivalent of 200 reactors, he said. "Considering both overall electrical demand and an optimistic, but not unrealistic, evaluation of the contribution of other resources, a goal of 400 gigawatts for nuclear in the year 2000 appears realistic," Cunningham said in a statement entitled "Goals for Nuclear Power and Coal."

Commenting on the 400-reactor figure, Jim McKenzie of the Council on Environmental Quality scoffed "if that's a goal, I don't know whose goal it is. I'd say if they get 150 units by the turn of the century, they'll be doing very well." About 100 new reactors are either awaiting full licensing or under construction, and McKenzie said the more sober turn-of-the-century projections now range from 125 to 165 additional units.

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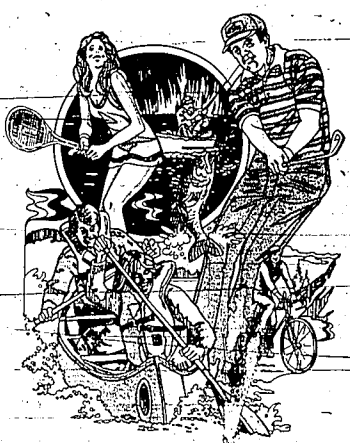
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# Decision put off on gold dredging below King Hill

GLENN'S FERRY — A decision on whether or not to allow dredging for gold on a Snake River gravel bar near King Hill has been postponed indefinitely.

"It was decided to limit a decision by the Department of Water Resources concurrently with a decision by the State Land Board," said DWR case worker Glen Saxton.

The State Land Board next meets May 20, but according to Saxton, it's not known if the gold

dredging request will be discussed at that time or held until a later date.

Hammitt residents Douglas Stewart and Sidney Horman have applied for a stream channel alteration permit for a site immediately below Bancroft Springs in Elmore County. The two hope to dredge out a 1,320-foot gravel bar in search for gold.

The two prospectors need permission to mine the gravel bar from both the DWR and the Idaho Department of Lands.

Earlier this month the DWR regional office in Twin

Falls forwarded a proposed limited approval of the project to the state office for final examination. If approved, this limited permit would only allow excavation of the gravel bar above the river's water level.

This stipulation was made in response to about 60 letters from Glenn Perry residents concerned that dredging the river bottom would break loose moss and plant life that could clog and damage irrigation pumps in the King Hill Irrigation system.

Department of Lands representative Bill Scribner of Boise said a decision on the dredging request is

being held up by a question concerning what agency has jurisdiction on stream beds. The jurisdiction question was raised last year by the Fish and Game Department and has not been resolved.

"In addition to the Horman-Stewart request, there are about 25 pending leases of gravel bars on rivers around Idaho being held in limbo by this titling question," Scribner said.

"I really don't have any idea if the Horman-Stewart case will be settled at the May 20th meeting or not," Scribner continued. "It may be, but it also may be continued for quite some time."

## Buhl youth killed

BUHL — Sheriff's officers are investigating the possibility an act of petty vandalism led to a highway accident which cost a Buhl High School student his life early Sunday morning.

Killed near Buhl in a one-vehicle accident about 4 a.m. was passenger Diamond Dwayne Gamble, 16, of Route 2, Buhl, according to Twin Falls County Sheriff James Munn. The driver, Kurtis Oster, also 16, of Buhl, suffered facial injuries and was listed in stable condition at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital in Twin Falls.

Twin Falls County Coroner-Gloves Edwards said Gamble died instantly of head injuries.

Vandals apparently had flattened two of the vehicle's tires earlier in Twin Falls, Munn said. He said officers are investigating whether the vandalism had anything to do with the accident.

"As far as we know now, there weren't any wounds to the tires, but we are checking that out real close," Munn said.

Both teen-agers were thrown from the west-bound Ford Bronco as it left the right side of Highway 20, hit a lateral waterway embankment and rolled over several times between two-and-a-half miles east of Buhl.

Following about half a mile behind was the driver's father, Leiland Oster, who did not see the accident because a hill blocked his sight, Munn said. Another passerby notified authorities.

The two youths had been in Twin Falls visiting friends. Munn said the father had been called to Twin Falls to help fill the tires, which were flattened outside the place the youths were visiting.

The father told officers he then followed the Bronco headed for Buhl and that he was traveling within the highway's speed limit.

Officers have not been able yet to interview the younger Oster, who suffered a crushed nose. But he reportedly told his father the Bronco pulled suddenly to the side when the accident occurred.

The section of road was straight and officers could not determine if the vehicle had skidded, Munn said.

If the investigation shows "something out of the ordinary" led to Gamble's death, Munn said he will confer with the coroner about holding an inquest.

## Session conducted in home

JEROME — Thirty-eight persons gathered here Sunday to hear that white supremacy and anti-Semitism are the laws of God.

Uninformed members of the Aryan Nations organization and their supporters met at a rural Jerome home, underneath a towering Aryan Nations flag, to hear an address by Richard Butler.

Butler, 62, of Hayden Lake, in addition to being a leader of the Aryan Nations group, is a pastor in the California-based Church of Jesus Christ, Christian. Both organizations restrict their membership to whites, believe in white supremacy, and are anti-Semitic.

The group was scheduled to meet in

the Jerome American Legion Hall, but local legion officials, canceled fearing the public might think the legion endorsed the group's beliefs.

Butler and eight of his organization's members, most from northern Idaho, were clad in identical uniforms, consisting of light blue shirts with matching dark blue ties and slacks. Each member wore a red, silver and gold Aryan Nations patch on his left shoulder and right breast pocket, with a matching silver belt buckle over a black belt.

None of the uninformed men was armed, although one carried a canister of mace on his belt. One Aryan Nations member at a Boise meeting Friday was arrested wearing a pistol holstered to his side.

At the beginning and end of Butler's

Jerome speech, the organization's members prayed aloud as they extended their right arms in a straight arm salute. The gesture wasn't a Nazi salute, Butler said, but a salute of the white race, older than Germany or the Nazis.

The meeting was part of a state-wide membership drive by the group, which says it now has some 350 Idaho adherents. Most of the persons attending the gathering at the home of Jerome resident John E. Miller, were from the Magic Valley.

Butler, who spoke for more than an hour, told his all-white audience which included men, women and children of all ages, that the white race had a holy mission. That task was to conquer the earth "in completeness and in sovereignty, and that is your mission as Christian soldiers."

That mission would be accomplished only if the white race followed the law of God, Butler said. That law, as expressed in the Bible, can be called "white supremacy, or white power or Aryan power or the law of God," Butler said.

"The problems of the world can be cured if this law is accepted, he added.

"If we want to cure the ills of Asia, if we want to cure the ills of Africa, there is only one way to do it and it is by the law of God," Butler said.

During his speech, Butler also attacked interracial marriage, and criticized the abolition of laws in the United States that once had prohibited such marriages.

"At the beginning of this nation there were laws in every state

forbidding the adulteration between the white and the black races."

Interracial marriage was the "very embodiment of the most evil thing that a white man could do or the black man could do, for it was genocide of both races."

Butler, who was arrested in Boise Friday for refusing to leave the lobby of a downtown motel, claimed he had been prevented from speaking there by a "surging, raging, howling mob of Jews."

Butler said he and his supporters were being persecuted for preaching the truth contained in the Bible.

His organization may have only a few members now, he added, but Jesus started with just a few supporters who later "grew into a multitude."

# Involved parents add 56 teachers for class

TWIN FALLS — The fourth grade at one elementary school in southwest Idaho enjoyed 56 extra teachers one month this year.

This feat was accomplished through a parental involvement program developed and tested at Middleton Elementary School by a former Twin Falls woman. The parents taught a series of "mini-classes" once a week for four weeks.

Terry Latham, who taught second grade at Middleton for two years after starting teaching at Normanside Elementary School in Twin Falls, executed the program as part of her master's degree work. She has taken

a year's leave of absence from teaching to obtain an advanced degree at Brigham Young University.

Latham is now at home in Twin Falls awaiting the start of summer school at BYU and says she is willing to share her experience and materials with teachers here. The concept of parent-taught mini-classes is in use in some Utah schools.

"A better rapport develops between parents, students and teachers when parents can actively take part in their children's education," she said.

"Also, I found the children benefit greatly when the parents become directly involved in the schools."

Latham started in January by placing posters announcing the pro-

gram around the community of Middleton and informing faculty and administration about the details.

"In order to have a successful program, you have to really sell it to people and make them aware of it," she said.

Next she talked to all 135 fourth graders to raise their enthusiasm. The students' excitement helped make the parents want to participate.

Questionnaires were sent home with the children asking what hobbies, skills or experiences they would be willing to share with the fourth graders. Latham planned on holding seven to eight mini-classes, but a third of the parents and even a few relatives and friends were willing to

take part.

Twelve to 13 one-hour classes were set up and held each Friday for four weeks. Students chose their preferences from a list of catchy course titles thought up by the newly-recruited teachers.

The diverse curriculum included cooking, leatherwork, horse racing, travelogues, painting, "The Life of a Policeman," beeping and "Soap-making, Grandma's Way." Even the mayor of Middleton participated by reading his early education in a one-room school house.

The students were very well behaved, Latham said, because they had selected their areas of interest and were excited.

"There's so much outside talent parents have to offer," Latham said, "it's a chance to make students aware of what is outside the classroom."

She said the mini-classes actually "use basic subjects," but in a different way. For example, the students had to learn how to read recipes and use fractions in order to cook.

Response to the mini-classes was mostly positive from students, parents and the school.

Principal Charles Holton said, "In some ways we need more of this because it's opened communication between parents and the school. I'm tickled to death about the ways it's come about."

"The program gives parents a chance to be in the teachers' shoes for a change," one parent said in an evaluation questionnaire. A father said he enjoyed getting directly involved in his child's education. Most of them requested to come back.

Students said: "It's fun learning stuff that you never learned before, or 'I enjoyed them more than classes,' or 'When are we going to have more mini-classes.'"

Latham said parents "want to come into the schools, but they don't know how" and find it hard to take the time to become involved.

Now at Middleton, many parents feel the communication between home and school has been improved.

# Gervin balks at Spurs' offer

**SAN ANTONIO (UPI)** — NBA scoring star George Gervin says he's worth more than the \$3.1 million, five-year guaranteed contract offered him by the San Antonio Spurs.

"I don't feel the Spurs really have offered me what I know I'm worth," he told a Sunday news conference. Gervin has three years left on his current contract paying him about \$300,000 a year.

Last week, Spurs President Angelo Drossos broke with a previous policy against discussing contract terms in public and revealed the club's offer to Gervin, who has demanded "security for life."

Drossos said he was upset San Antonio was being portrayed as "poor-buying it" and being unable or unwilling to make Gervin a competitive offer. He denied making the offer public was an attempt to pressure Gervin, but the player's agent revealed Saturday the renegotiation with Drossos was at a

standstill.

In addition to the \$3.1 million guaranteed portion of the contract, the Spurs offered Gervin another \$3.6 million if he would play a second five years on "make good" yearly contracts that would escalate to \$500,000 in 1989-90, at which time the lanky guard would be 37 years old and near retirement age. By playing 10 more years with the Spurs, the seven-year veteran could collect a total of \$8.7 million.

"That offer would net only \$570,000 average for the next five years," Gervin said of the Spurs' guaranteed offer, which included a \$100,000 signing bonus, \$400,000 cash each of the first five years, then \$3 million spread over the next five years in \$100,000 annual payments.

"Ten or more NBA players now earn in excess of this figure, in cash, each year."

A prepared statement issued by Gervin and his agent, Tacoma, Wash., attorney Pat Healy, con-

cluded, "The effective worth of this second offer averages \$452,000 per year, not \$1,020,000 as reported."

"I just feel that for both parties, it would be best to get this matter straightened out," said Gervin, who tossed in 33 points a game last season while earning about one-third of what some of the other superstars collect.

The Spurs, at Gervin's insistence before the 1978-79 season, reopened his contract, and doubled his salary to the present level in another five-year pact.

Asked whether he would ask to be traded if the situation were not resolved, Gervin said, "That's not really the issue of me rejecting or turning down a \$7 million contract. The statement speaks for what the Spurs have offered me and I don't feel that offer is enough."

# Borg extends mastery of Solomon in tennis

**LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)** — Bjorn Borg continued his near perfect year of tennis Sunday, scoring an easy 6-3, 6-1 victory over Harold Solomon in the finals of the \$300,000 Grand Prix tennis tournament.

The world's top-ranked player needed just 1-16 to dispose of Solomon, who he has now beaten 14 times without a loss, and collect the first prize of \$60,000. Solomon received \$30,000.

Borg, who has won all six tournaments he has entered in 1980, captured all but one of his five matches in the event at Caesar's Palace hotel in straight sets. In Saturday's semifinals, he started slow and took three sets to beat Vitas Gerulaitis.

The 23-year-old Swede started out slowly again Sunday, falling behind 1-3 in the first set after Solomon broke through on his second serve. Borg

made several forehand errors, while Solomon came in quickly on his opponent's groundstrokes.

"The balls were very heavy in the beginning of the match," Borg said afterwards. "I was trying to go for good shots but in the beginning it just wasn't happening."

"You have to be patient when you play Solly. You just have to wait to get the right balls at the right times."

Borg broke back in the fifth game as he sharpened the angles on his baseline shots, and he broke Solomon again in the seventh and ninth games to take the first set.

"I started out playing the way I wanted to," Solomon said later. "I was coming in every time I got a short ball to hit and he was making more mistakes than usual."

"But he was too tough for me today. He was just too tough."
