

Utah fire rages as firefighters battle blazes in West

A bomber dropped a total of 10,800 gallons of fire-retardant chemicals on the blaze Monday, he said, as ground crews struggled against 30-40 mile per hour winds. The flames have not consumed any private land, Wirth added, but might reach a tract-owned-by-Hill-Air-Force-Base.

"It's obvious that our self-imposed grain embargo has had only marginal effects on the Soviet Union," McClure said. "It's a question of who's being harmed the most—the Soviets or the American farmer."



The easiest thing in the world for the West is to declare its independence from foreign oil.

After all, nobody likes being put over a

barrel.

But we suspect all the OPEC cartel ministers did when they heard the latest declaration from the economic summit in Venice was to stroke their chins and chuckle.

It is ironic that the seven Western nations would agree to an energy stance almost precisely-as-President-Jimmy Carter wanted it. Ironic because Carter is having little success in withing together as a feetiless energy. success in putting together an effective energy policy here at home. True, the U.S. has met its

policy here at home. True, the U.S. has met us 1979 goal of reducing foreign imports, but not as a result of government action.

Nonetheless there is solace in the fact the West came together arm could at least present a unified front on the global energy crisis as well as stand up to the Soviet invasion of Afshanistan.

Aignanistan.

It may also be a measure of personal diplomatic success for Carter, if for no other reason than nothing went wrong, i.e., he didn't cause his own embarrassment. It is a sign of a man growing into the presidency; recalling some earlier trips abroad that did not fare so

well.

The formidable challenge facing the West is The formidable challenge facing the West is to Indeed throw off the shackles of foreign oil within 10 years as the declaration promises. It will take a discipline of the highest order to achieve that success. Possible yes, but not probable.

Such a switch can't, of course, happen overnight. But there still is the impression of foot-dragging, of 'let's not take this too fast.' The longer it takes, the better for the cartel.

The alternatives are available — coal, nuclear, oil shale, solar, gastification, synthetics — and the technology is coming into its own. Only when governments place a higher-priority on this development, will the real breakthroughs occur.

The dilemma is to resolve the social and economic choices such decisions force us to make. But we would rather face and make those-decisions-than-to-continue to wear the yoke of the oil barons.





Services held for shooting victims

DAINCERFIELD, Texas (UPI) — Funeral services were held Tuesday for three of live victims of a shooting rampage in the same small brick church —still marked by bullet holes where they were shot down by a former—math—teactier whose—ec-centricities were still coming to light.

King 45 facing—five—murder—charges and 12 counts of attempted murder, was in critical condition in John Sealy Hospital in Galveston after surgery on his self-inflicted wound. His physician said King would survive.

King, who once taught geometry at Daingerfield High School, was being held under \$3.75 million bond. He was to have gone on trial Monday for a 1977 lincest incident involving his daughter, who was 18 at the time. King had asked members of the church to testify on his behalf.

"I think a lot people think the man ought not to be on the streets but there has been no real bitterness," said First Baptist Pastor Norman Crisp, "There seemed to be a lot of calcula-

tion in everything he did. We just feel like he let the devil use him."

The search of. King's home near Hughes Springs indicated he "was planning something for sure." Deputy Sheriff Emil Kennedy said.

Along with the documents relating to the Swiss bank account and Soviet citizenship application was found a picture of the Rev. Donald Sinclair and his late son, Stanley.

It was Stanley who had convinced King's daughter, Cindy, to file the incest charge against her father. Young Sinclair was stabbed to death in Houston two months after King was inclicted in a case that remains unsolved.

"You're always looking over your shoulder," he said, "because you know if you wind up in a situation that's controversial that this man isgoing to throw you to the wolves."

Hines noted that Capt. Ernest Coats has been shifted to night detail, while-newly-promoted Sgt. Low occupies his desk during the day.

"Usually, you put sergeants on night patrol," he sald, "but you have a situation here in which the chief puts all his trust in officer Low."

Low, however, said that many departments including the Twin Falls City Police schedule the second-

ranking officer at night to provide continuity of leadership.
