

# Freed hostage— 'America's faith keeps us going'

ZURICH, Switzerland (UPI) — Richard Queen, 28, the sick American hostage released after 251 days of captivity in Iran, said Friday the thing that was keeping the U.S. hostages going was "the knowledge that the whole country was supporting us."

"The most important thing for us was the support of 100 percent of Americans," said Queen in a tele-

phone interview with ABC's "Good Morning, America."

Queen's parents arrived in Zurich late Friday to meet their son. Queen, long-haired and bushy-bearded, was taken by stretcher from the plane that brought him from Tehran and whisked by ambulance to Zurich's modern University Hospital. "I'm very, very glad to be going home," he said. "Especially so much sooner than I expected."

Queen underwent hospital tests Friday and doctors said he had "neurological problems" but was in good shape psychologically. His anxious parents flew to his bedside. "We're tremendously excited — but worried," Queen's father, Harold, told reporters before leaving Secaucus, N.Y., for Europe with his wife Jeanne.

He said the decision by Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to release Queen

was "a gracious and humanitarian gesture" and he hoped there would be 52 other such gestures for the remaining hostages.

Queen said from what doctors had told him, "I haven't got a brain tumor. I really can't say what I do have. I'm undergoing tests still. I really can't say what might be wrong."

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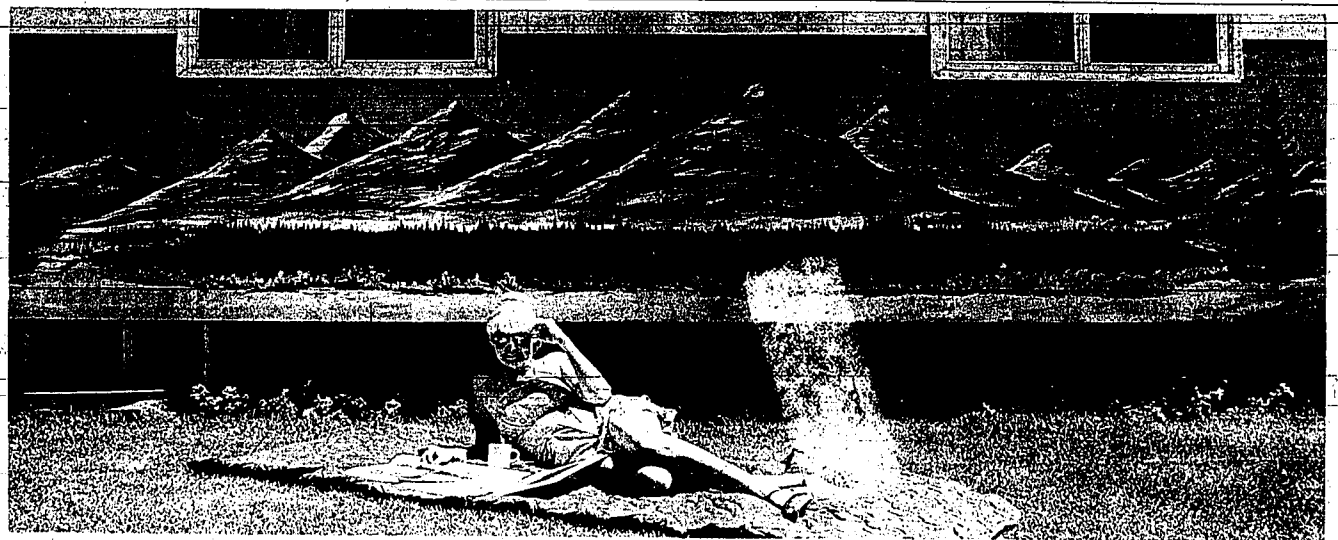

## Western AG's cool to Sagebrush Rebellion

SUN VALLEY — The Western Attorneys General Friday refused to endorse the main goal of the Sagebrush Rebellion — the transfer of public lands to state ownership.

The 14 state legal officers gathered here for the annual Western Attorneys General Conference agreed that federal management of public lands has frequently been unwise and often has caused problems for western states.

But the attorneys general said additional study was needed before they could agree on a solution to those problems.

The officials approved a report from their public lands subcommittee which detailed many specific problems western states have had with federal land management agencies. But that report, scheduled to be formally released in a week, concluded that numerous unresolved legal questions remain concerning the conflicting claims

between states and federal agencies over public land issues.

"To what extent is the police power of the states applicable in governing and managing federal lands, that's the question," said Larry Struve, a Nevada deputy attorney general and chairman of the subcommittee.

"The law in its present state has not addressed some basic legal questions. It is time to seek some clarification."

The attorney's general adopted the subcommittee's recommendation that additional study was needed to clarify conflicting state and federal legal claims. The legal officials also adopted the subcommittee's recommendation that western states work more closely together in coordinating lawsuits and actions designed to obtain answers to public lands questions.

After approving the subcommittee report, the attorneys general adopted a resolution calling on Congress to fund a study "on the ownership and management of the public lands in the western states and as to the impact thereof on the economic and sovereignty of the states."

Also approved was a resolution asking Congress to pass a law specifically allowing western states to sue the federal government on Sagebrush Rebellion issues. The doctrine of sovereign immunity now appears to prevent states from initiating lawsuits against the federal government without the federal government's approval.

Idaho's Attorney General David Leroy joined with the majority in approving both the subcommittee report and the resolutions.

Leroy said the actions of the conference would help provide needed answers to important questions.

The Sagebrush Rebellion is the name given to the actions, recently started by the Nevada Legislature, to claim unappropriated Bureau of Land Management lands with western state boundaries. Most western states have large segments of public lands within their boundaries.

To date, four other state legislatures, in New Mexico, Wyoming, Utah, and Arizona, have passed similar legislation laying claim to unappropriated BLM acres within their state boundaries.

Among the issues discussed in the unreleased subcommittee report were:

- The effects of state ownership on unappropriated federal lands.
- The economic and political impact of federal land ownership in the West.
- The problem of physical access to state lands surrounded by federal wilderness lands.
- In-lieu school land grants.
- Western water rights.

The subcommittee examined each problem but made no recommendation other than calling for additional study, Struve said. At the conference, the attorneys general extended the life of the subcommittee by one year.

The Western Attorneys General Conference represents Alaska, Arizona, California, Colorado, Hawaii, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, American Samoa and Guam.

### Unemployed defecting to GOP?

## Republicans woo big labor

DETROIT (UPI) — Republican leaders, in a bold move to win labor support, met with the head of the United Auto Workers Friday and claimed the start of "a new relationship and dialogue" that could break the Democrats' historical grip on union workers.

But Douglas Fraser, president of the UAW, said he saw no sign of Republican "repentance" and added "we didn't take any steps this morning... we just danced around."

Fraser, however, told a news conference there was a substantial shift among rank and file UAW members to Ronald Reagan, a movement he said grows in direct relationship to increasing unemployment.

"I don't know if the members know

who Ronald Reagan is," Fraser said. "That's why this movement to Reagan may not be permanent."

"And I don't know how many will say a plague on both your houses and vote for John Anderson," he added.

"But there is a noticeable movement to Reagan as unemployment goes up."

Fraser said there was only a "remote" possibility that the UAW executive council would endorse Reagan, and added, "we have to look at the overall record and the past."

The two sides held back to back news conferences after the breakfast session and the Republicans were noticeably more enthusiastic.

"It is a good start, but only a start," Rep. Mickey Edwards of Oklahoma

said. "The dialogue will continue."

Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., conceded, "I didn't see anybody grabbing for elephants as we left" but added there were "many more areas of agreement than disagreement."

Fraser said the group talked about the auto workers proposals and commented "I wouldn't say they were receptive but they listened attentively."

Among the proposals discussed to help the auto industry on a short and long term basis were tax credits for fuel-efficient cars, a subsidy for cars 10 years or older taken off the road, tax incentives for location of industries in high unemployment areas, an overall tax reduction and limitations on Japanese imports.

### Hijacker aboard 727 in Seattle

SEATTLE (UPI) — A young man saying he had a bomb in his briefcase and wanted to escape from a boss he feared hijacked a Northwest Airlines 727 at Seattle-Tacoma airport Friday and demanded a \$100,000 ransom and two parachutes.

He later allowed all 52 passengers and 2 members of the crew to leave the plane. Five crewmembers stayed aboard the plane parked near a runway as the hijacker and an FBI negotiator identified only as "Ron" talked via radio communications.

The reason for the hijacking was unclear, but the young man believed to be in his 20s referred several times to "a buddy of mine" who was killed three years ago in "a big city back East" by another man.

"I'm gonna get him (the man who killed his buddy) and nobody's going to stop me," the hijacker said in a nervous drawl. "I want him dead and I'm gonna get him dead. Then I'll turn myself and the money in. You might think I'm crazy, but I'm not that crazy."

He repeatedly referred to the man he wants killed as "my boss" but wouldn't elaborate.

The hijacker agreed to meet "Ron" face-to-face if the FBI agent stripped to swimming trunks.

The hijacker also claimed to be armed with an M-1 rifle.

The discussion as to the possible motivation for his act came after he gave up the idea of parachuting from the rear exit ramp of the 727 in the manner of J.D. Cooper, who staged the first hijack for cash on Thanksgiving Eve 1971.

Instead, he demanded a small plane be brought alongside to fly him from the airport. He said he would walk to the small plane with two people on either side of him to protect him from snipers.

The hijacker switched to the small plane idea when he was told the 727 has been modified since the saga of

## Watchers say eruption possible

MENLO PARK, Calif. (UPI) — The U.S. Geological Survey Friday issued a "hazard watch" warning for the state of Oregon, saying Mt. Hood, a dormant volcano 50 miles southeast of Portland, is showing signs it may be preparing to erupt.

Scientists have recorded more than 50 earthquakes under and near the mountain this week, the USGS said. The activity is similar to that recorded at Mt. St. Helens before its devastating May 18 explosion.

The government scientists "emphasized that no immediate conclusions should be drawn about the possibilities of an eruption" because of the earthquake activity, the announcement said.

However, they added that the quakes could mean that molten rock is flowing into the mountain.

The trembling under Mt. Hood, located in the Cascades about 50 miles southeast of Mt. St. Helens, began Sunday evening with an earthquake that measured 3.3 on the Richter scale.

The first quake, located near Mt. Hood, was followed by other quakes near the volcano and along a line between Mt. St. Helens and Mt. Hood.

The scientists said three other quakes of magnitude 3 have occurred in the area since Sunday and there have been numerous smaller tremors.

Mt. Hood has glaciers near its peak, and an eruption would create the potential for mudflows and debris flow-induced flooding. In addition to hazards from ash fallout, the USGS said.

"The earthquake activity in itself cannot be interpreted as a definite precursor to an immediate eruption."

The announcement said a special monitoring program is being established at the 11,235-foot volcano.

The last major eruption of Mt. Hood occurred about 2,000 years ago, the scientists said, and a minor eruption occurred in 1865.

## Peasants storm embassy

**SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (UPI)** — Some 100 peasants stormed the Costa Rican Embassy Friday in search of political asylum and shot to death a policeman who tried to prevent the takeover, witnesses said.

Police posted sharpshooters on nearby roofs and sent six plainclothes agents to seek the mission's permission to evict the peasants. The agents were turned back. Ambassador Alvarado Piza told reporters in a phone conversation shortly after the takeover that he had 30 children, 25 women, 35 elderly people and 1000-acre agave fields they wanted political asylum and were not holding the embassy staff hostage.

The ambassador said the peasants, all from eastern El Salvador, were fleeing from army sweeps against alleged leftist guerrillas by troops who burn their crops, kill their cattle and set fire to their adobe huts.

## U.S. to ban Mexican tuna

**MAZATLAN, Mexico (UPI)** — The Mexican Navy seized two U.S. tuna boats Friday, bringing to three the number of American craft captured in a "tuna war" between the nations, said the Mexican-based broker who represents the ships.

The Star Crest and Carol S., 500-ton tuna boats owned by the Pan Pacific Co. from California, were seized early Friday for allegedly fishing in Mexican waters without the government's permission, said Mike Ruiz, broker for the company.

The Mexican government announced Monday that it would begin enforcing a law requiring U.S. tuna fishermen to buy a permit and pay a levy on every ton of fish taken from Mexican waters. Every claims a 200-mile commercial sea zone.

A U.S. Embassy source said the United States has decided to ban all imports of Mexican tuna, which earned Mexico about \$20 million in 1979, escalating the four-day war.

"There's nothing we could do about it if we wanted to," the source said. "The law says we cannot buy tuna from a country that won't allow us to fish in their waters."

## Iraq to receive uranium

**PARIS (UPI)** — France has shipped the first consignment of uranium to Iraq in defiance of appeals from the United States and other countries to delay the shipment, diplomatic sources said Friday.

In London, the British news magazine Now reported that Israel is waging "a ruthless underground war involving murder and sabotage" to "prevent Iraq making the atomic bomb."

The sources in Paris asserted that by delivering the fuel now, the French have heightened the risk of its diversion for military purposes because the Iraqi research reactor being built with French help will not be ready before early next year.

The United States and other allied governments as well as Israel have been known to be opposed to the French technical help for Iraq's effort to own a

reactor fueled by highly-enriched uranium for fear it would give the Moslem nation the capability to make a nuclear weapon.

## Shrimp project abandoned

**PHOENIX, Ariz. (UPI)** — University of Arizona President John F. Schaefer said Friday the school's 18-year-old joint shrimp farm operation with the University of Sonora would be terminated because of differences with Mexican officials who had naval cadets seize the facility last month.

Schaefer told the state Board of Regents, meeting at Northern Arizona University, that he and the rector of the Sonora Institution, Alfonso Castellano, could not iron out the problems.

The lab at Puerto Penasco, 60 miles south of Arizona, was founded in 1962 as a pilot desalinization plant operated by the two schools. Research began on breeding shrimp in an "enclosed, catted-off lot" on the main campus, Hodges said.

The research center was seized by Mexican naval cadets last month after U.S. researchers routinely shipped shrimp larvae from the station to another facility at Hilo, Hawaii. U.S. officials at the time said the shipment was a pretext used by Mexican researchers to close the station.

## SWAT team kills gunman

**ATLANTA (UPI)** — A man armed with at least two guns barricaded himself inside a northwest Atlanta house Friday and stood off police until a special SWAT team stormed the building, killing the man with a flurry of shots.

One policeman was wounded in the head, hands and shoulder during the gunfire but he was reported in satisfactory condition at Grady Hospital.

The unidentified man had reportedly been involved in an earlier shooting and was traced to the house. Police Chief George Napper said an officer sought to bring the man out of the house but he refused and the SWAT unit was called in.

## Gunmen loot wealthy home

**LOS ANGELES (UPI)** — Three masked gunmen invaded the hillside estate of a wealthy real estate investor and his wife, pistol-whipped and threatened to kill the couple and looted the home of \$2 million worth of jewelry, police disclosed Friday.

By Hunter suffered head injuries and his wife, Gisela, was bruised on her back, but their three children, aged 17, 16 and 11, an unidentified house guest and a caretaker all survived the Thursday night attack without injury.

Officers said the unidentified gunman gained entry to the home in the Granada Hills district by pointing their guns at a servant. Once inside they tied up the seven people inside, made them all lie down on the floor and ordered them to show them where their safe was.

## Has threatened to kill Carter

# Police hunt for Palestinian

**DALLAS (UPI)** — Authorities Friday sought an armed Jordanian who claimed to be a captain in the Palestine Liberation Organization and threatened to kill President Carter.

Police in suburban Irving also wanted the man, identified as Majid Ahmed, for the October 1978 slayings of two Lebanese students.

A warrant charging Ahmed with threatening the life of the president was issued Thursday by a federal magistrate. Assistant U.S. Attorney Mark Elliston said the suspect was considered armed and dangerous.

"We're trying to find this gentleman," said Secret Service agent Ronald Downs. "We honestly don't know if he's left the country or what. We're in the process of talking to a whole lot of people about him."

The charge was based on information from two Arab students who said Ahmed threatened the president and then told them he was a member of the PLO who had killed more than 100 people.

The Secret Service said the witnesses quoted Ahmed as saying he would "get the order from the PLO and ... will kill the new president or Carter or Kennedy or whichever one is the president-elect."

The witnesses said Ahmed also took them to his apartment and showed them two rifles, two pistols, two grenades, a sack of ammunition and a poster of Carter with a bull's eye that he claimed to use for knife-throwing practice.

Carter is scheduled to appear in Dallas July 21.

A Secret Service spokesman said Ahmed claimed that among his 100 victims were two Lebanese students found shot to death outside a shopping mall in October 1978.

Irving police Capt. Joe Lowe said officers searched Ahmed's Irving apartment Monday and said Ahmed apparently had hastily departed.

Acting on a tip Tuesday, police seized a rifle, a shotgun, two pistols and two hand grenades thought to be Ahmed's in a Dallas apartment. Two

Jordanians who live at the apartment were arrested and two more Jordanians who showed up at the apartment Wednesday were arrested.

One of the Jordanians has been released and the other three are in custody of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

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# Heat wave death toll climbs past 350 mark

The South, Southwest and Midwest counted more than 350 deaths Friday in an unremitting heat wave torturing 12 states.

The onslaught-of-searing weather, which has hovered over the Southwest for almost three weeks, showed no signs of breaking up during the weekend, forecasters said.

In Oklahoma City, Ricky Henson arrived for work at a service station and found the place had been burglarized although the tires and tools were all in place and the gasoline pumps and cash register were un-molested.

The bandit probably could have sold them in Dallas, one of the cities hit hardest by the heat, where swimming pool owners were using ice to cool their pools.

Widnell Murray of Whitten's Ice Service was still talking about the dozen 900-pound loads of ice — \$80 per load — that he delivered last week for

D.B. Cooper, to make it impossible to open the rear exit while the plane is in flight.

He then demanded that the front passenger door be removed and the pilot instructed to maneuver the plane so that he could jump from the front.

"There's a great chance you will get sucked into the engine," Ron said.

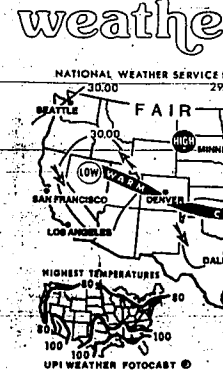
The hijacker said he was sure the pilot could fly the plane so that a safe jump could be made.

"That may look good on television," Ron answered, "but in reality it

doesn't work that way. The plane will be going too fast for that to happen. The odds are you are going to get sucked into the engine, no matter how good a pilot there is."

The hijacker, who began the drama at 1:45 p.m., first agreed to allow women and children among the passengers to leave the plane, flight 303 destined for Portland, Ore.

The hijacker also said he would allow a medic to come aboard, provided he was stripped to the waist, to attend to a sick man.

# Anti-family rentals growing

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The White House Conference on Families was told Friday that landlords' rental policies prohibiting children were widespread, growing, and damaging to families.

The report came as the conference moved into its first full day of writing recommendations amid political dissent and factionalism.

The highlight of the day was release of the study on restrictive housing by Deputy Assistant Secretary of Housing and Urban Development Elizabeth Rolstacher at a news briefing.

The conference was called by President Carter to "examine the circumstances, the difficulties they face, and the ways in which family life is affected by public policies."

In releasing the voluminous survey, Mrs. Rolstacher said restrictive rental policies affect

white, black and Hispanic households all in the same way, but added that such policies were more common in all-white neighborhoods.

She said HUD has made no decisions yet based on the recently-completed study, "but we are trying to determine what the appropriate federal role is, if indeed there is one."

Laws currently protect women and minorities, she said, but she said the survey found the practice on the increase with 26 percent of all rental units having "no-children" policies.

The recommendations of the conference, along with those that resulted from two earlier conferences in Minneapolis and Baltimore, were to be incorporated into a final report for presentation to President Carter and Congress later in the year.

# Attempts suicide in cell

# Trucker charged in 3rd death

ADEL, Ga. (UPI) — An Alabama truck driver tried to commit suicide in his cell Friday, a few hours before he was charged with a third murder along Interstate 75.

Lowndes County Sheriff Robert Carter said William Howard Putnam, 37, of Talladega, Ala., was charged with the murder of William G. Hodges, 49, a Jasper, Fla., school teacher.

On Thursday, Putnam, a driver for Tararie Tank Southern Inc. of Talladega, was charged in the slaying of Christine Back, 23, and David Hard, 22, both of Bardslow, Ky. They were killed in an Adel rest area while four children slept in the car. The children were unharmed.

Cook County Sheriff D.J. Connell said Putnam, who is being held without bond in the Cook County jail, attempted to commit suicide in his cell about 3 a.m. Friday.

Connell said, "He got him an old piece of metal that came off the top of a (soft drink) can and cut his wrist. We took him to the hospital and he's all right."

Carter said witnesses had seen the Kentucky couple and Putnam's tractor-trailer rig at the Valdosta truck stop where Hodges was killed during the early morning hours Thursday.

That information, plus evidence found in the cab of Putnam's truck when he was arrested in Dooly County, led authorities to file the murder charges, according to Carter.

No motive has been established as yet in the slayings, but Sheriff Connell said Ms. Back had once rented a trailer at a park managed by the suspect, just outside Bardslow. He said he knew nothing more about the relationship between the two.

Authorities said they believe the killings started Thursday, a couple hours after midnight, at a rest stop in Lowndes County. Sheriff Robert Carter said he believed Putnam killed Hodges then apparently followed the couple into Cook County.

Carter said a witness told him the

couple's car left the first rest area shortly after Hodges was shot to death, leading to speculation Ms. Back and Hard were killed to keep them from identifying the suspect.

"But we just don't know," Carter said.

Sheriff's men said Putnam refused to talk with them and they did not know what prompted the killing.

Connell said the couple, along with the four children, had pulled into a rest stop and were asleep when they were killed.

"They went to sleep. A man shot them," Connell said. "She screamed and made some racket. He was trying to pull her out of the car and some of the people in the rest area heard it."

# Detroit strike talks near end?

DETROIT (UPI) — Bargainers for the city and 9,000 striking employees met Friday amid hope they were in the "home stretch" toward settlement of an 11-day strike threatening to mar next week's Republican National Convention.

Marathon talks between the two sides intensified early in the day with an exchange of contract proposals, and city bargainers said at the time tentative agreement in the dispute could be just "hours" away.

Negotiators remained huddled

around the main bargaining table into the afternoon, however, discussing various supplemental issues, sources said.

Although expectations remained high, a settlement was still being baggled over minor issues could cause the talks to drag on — perhaps into the evening, mediators said.

"I think we're in the home stretch," said Robert Pisarski of the Michigan Employment Relations Commission. "I'm fairly confident, but I've had

these things blow up in my face at the last minute."

The continuation of face-to-face talks indicated the two sides were close enough for a major breakthrough in the dispute that has halted trash pickups and idled city buses.

## KGB after Soviet Adventists

MOSCOW (UPI)—The leader of the Seventh Day Adventist sect in the Soviet Union, wanted by the KGB for more than five years, has been arrested in Leningrad, dissident sources said Wednesday.

Rostislav N. Galetsky, 31, was seized July 1 at a railway station in Leningrad, the sources said. No details of his fate or the charges against him were known.

Galetsky is called "pastor" by his flock of fundamentalist Christians,

scattered in small congregations across the U.S.S.R. They are the True and Free Seventh Day Adventists, an illegal, underground group that refuses to accept any state control over religion.

The young minister, a native of the Ukraine, became leader of the illegal Adventists following the death in January of Vladimir Shelkov, the 84-year-old patriarch of the sect, a veteran of 23 years in camps and prisons, died in a Siberian labor

camp. Galetsky reportedly has been sought by the KGB, the Soviet intelligence agency, for more than five years throughout the nation. He has been working as an itinerant preacher during that time, traveling throughout the Soviet Union to visit and advise groups of Adventists in scattered locations.

No firm estimates of the Adventists numbers in the U.S.S.R. are available, although members of the sect

claim they are the most numerous Protestant group within the country. Because of the unyielding opposition to the rules that strictly govern religious activities within the Soviet Union, they have frequently been the object of KGB harassment.

Religious sources estimate more than 30 Adventists have been taken into custody during the past two years, and another 170 have been the targets of intensive searches and surveillance.

## 'Non-sexist' Bible not in near future

Recommendations of a task force of the National Council of Churches that it take the lead in making large portions of the Bible available in "non-sexist" language still have a long way to go before any such Bible may be available to the general public.

But the task force's report and recommendations could have some effect, even if not official, on the work of the Revised Standard Version Bible Committee of the National Council.

The RSV Bible is the most widely used alternate translation of the still popular King James Version of the Bible, and the NCC's RSV Bible Committee is currently working on an updated version for publication sometime in the mid-1980s.

In its current work, the RSV committee is attempting to change some "masculine-biased" language about

people—some uses of "man" or "mankind" for "humanity" or "people," for example—who the bias crept in through later translations but does not exist in the original Greek or Hebrew texts.

However, the RSV committee is staying away from any changes in language about God and will more than likely retain such images of God as Father.

The task force report, which will be voted on at a November meeting of the council's Division of Education and Ministry, recognized that the RSV Bible Committee was in no way bound to accept any of the recommendations. At the same time, it also spoke of a fundamental dilemma in regard to the RSV.

"On the one hand," it said, "the Revised Standard Version has become standard and normative to the extent no other English translation has since the King James

Version. "This, of all translations, must not lend aid and comfort to sexist attitudes and interpretations," the task force said.

"On the other hand," the report said, "many of us hesitate when it comes to such revisions of the RSV which could make it lose its character of being the standard translation by which our churches, seminaries, colleges, universities—and our total culture do have reasonable access to the language and conceptually of the ages in which the biblical texts took place."

In an effort to resolve the dilemma, the task force recommended a separate, non-sexist rendering of the lectionary—those agreed portions of the Bible that are read during public worship each week in most Roman Catholic churches and mainline Protestant denominations.

"We believe that the lectionary

approach can by its very nature provide the period of trial use required if a new and common language is to be developed," the task force said.

Currently, the lectionary is designed around a three-year cycle, with assigned readings from the Old Testament, the New Testament Epistles and the New Testament Gospels.

The task force recommended that a non-sexist rendering of the lectionary be available for use in Advent, 1980, Advent, which begins four Sundays before Christmas, is the beginning of the church year.

Faced with a variety of intensely held feelings on the language issue, the Division of Education and Ministry asked the task force to come up with more specific guidelines for the lectionary translation before it votes on the recommendations in November.

## EPA considers dropping sewer plant suit

TWIN FALLS — Federal officials will drop their multi-million-dollar lawsuit against the city if city officials agree to complete sewer plant repairs by April 1, 1982.

Environmental Protection Agency has submitted a proposed consent decree which sets deadlines for completion of certain repairs and imposes fines for not meeting those deadlines.

If the document is accepted by the City Council, EPA will dismiss its lawsuit against the city, which was filed because the sewage treatment plant did not meet federal discharge limits. EPA had fined the city \$10,000 per day for violating the limits, and the fines have amounted to a total of several million dollars.

Council approval would also free federal funds for the \$7 million worth of repairs the plant needs. EPA is providing 75 percent of the project

funding, but will not do until the city approves the compliance schedule, obtains funding for its share of the cost, about \$700,000, and contracts a new sewer operator.

The council is considering raising sewer system user fees for an 18-month period to raise the money.

Both the fee issue and the acceptance of the consent decree are scheduled for a final vote on July 21.

So far, city officials say they are still studying the proposal and are

reserving public comment. City Attorney Charles Brumbach said he wants to determine whether the deadline can be met, adding he has some reservations about the amount of the fines that will be imposed if the city fails to meet the new deadlines.

Under the proposal the city would be subject to an initial \$5,000 penalty if construction is not complete by April 9, 1982, and a subsequent \$500 per day penalty.

Should the plant fail to meet federal

discharge limits from July 1, 1982, through Sept. 30, 1982, the city would be subject to a \$500 per day fine. A \$7,000 fine would be levied if the plant's monthly discharge level violates federal limits.

The fines would double on Oct. 1, 1982. Those fines would be waived if EPA determined delays in construction or violation of discharge limits are not the city's fault, however.

Several of the deadlines in the consent decree have already been

met. Those are an April 18, 1980, deadline for submitting a sewage treatment and disposal plan, a June 8 deadline for submitting specifications of sludge and solid wastes handling facilities, and a June 22 deadline for submitting specifications for the bulk of the plant improvements.

Other deadlines include opening of bids by Oct. 12, 1980, initiation of construction by Dec. 1, 1980, and completion of sludge and solids handling facilities by Nov. 11, 1981.

## Taxes Amalgamated queries figures

TWIN FALLS — Amalgamated Sugar Co. of Twin Falls will probably go to court to appeal the reappraisal of its property even though its taxes will probably drop more than 30 percent.

The company's property south of the city of Twin Falls was reappraised along with all other property in the county because of the legislation implementing the 1 percent initiative.

But Amalgamated was one of only three taxpayers to appeal the reappraisal.

County Assessor G. William Clark said the firm, a major taxpayer in the county, is appealing because its property has been reappraised at about \$10 to \$11 million, or about triple its previous appraised value. Its actual taxes, however, will probably drop from about \$85,000 to somewhere in the \$20,000 range, Clark added.

Clark met early this week with company officials and said while the firm is pleased with the tax reduction it is protesting the nearly triple value placed on the property by the state Tax Commission. The commission made reappraisals on some of the larger commercial and industrial properties in the county, Clark said.

Robert C. Lang, vice president of the Ogden-based sugar manufacturing firm, and Lee Phillips, of an ad valorem tax service firm, met first with county commissioners and equalization board members and then with Clark. The equalization board upheld the reappraisal to allow the sugar company to go ahead with the appeal.

Clark said the firm does not feel the reappraisal is in line with values established through sale of other manufacturing facilities of the same type in the intermountain area.

Amalgamated representatives indicated they plan to make a court case in an attempt to establish a more reasonable tax base for future taxation.

The other appeals before the equalization board and the assessor, came from the J.C. Penney Co. and from Nolan Victor, local realtor and owner of a number of pieces of property in the county, Clark said.

Penney's appeal was filed by the owners of the Ernest store building and the J.C. Penney building inquired but did not appeal.

## County values top \$1 billion

TWIN FALLS — Property values in Twin Falls County now exceed the \$1 billion mark.

Robert Clark G. William Clark said the reappraisal in Twin Falls County brought the total valuation of real and personal property in the county to just slightly over \$1 billion, up from about \$850 million. This does not include the subsequent tax roll or all the utilities. He said he expects the final figure to be about \$1.1 billion.

Because of the time limit, some of the reappraisal was on an estimated basis in Twin Falls County and every effort was made to hold valuation figures at a "reasonable" level, he added.

Some outside counties are to re-evaluate all property on the basis of 100 percent of market value. The 1 percent tax will then be applied on this basis.

Because of the time limit set for completing the reappraisal, Clark said, it was impossible to have the appraisal crews visit each home and farm in the county and make a new appraisal. An appraisal number was determined from previous reappraisals. Those with new improvements or major changes were given on site reappraisals.

Commissioner Merl E. Leonard said property in Twin Falls is probably still being taxed at about 80 percent of what it would bring on the real estate market because the county has attempted to make as gradual changes as possible in reaching the market value. It is all assessed on the same basis, however, so one taxpayer is not paying an unfairly high or low amount of taxes.

Taxpayers have only until Tuesday to complete their home ownership exemption tax relief forms and get them to the county assessors. This will guarantee a lower tax than if the forms are not filed, Clark said.

The display features the brilliant cubic zirconium, the manmade stone which is the nearest thing to the genuine diamond.

Ray Moon, a local gem shop owner and operator, is one of 150 dealers and exhibitors taking part in the three-day show at the Filer Carson City-Nev. The former owner, who had discovered an azurite vein in Nevada, at the age of 95 told Ulrey where to find the inventory of his old shop. Ulrey said the man who bought it had done nothing with it and it was just gathering dust in Modesto, Calif. Ulrey says it is extremely high quality and the only azurite of its kind in the country. He also displays some azurite from Chile which sells at precious stone prices.

Anthis has made and exhibits a mock-up of Mount St. Helen's volcano which erupts and spits fire and smoke. The model, standing about four to five feet high, closely resembles the genuine mountain. Anthis said he will donate it to some worthy group or institute such as the Herrett Museum at the College of Southern Idaho if someone wants it.

The show opened Friday morning and will continue through Sunday. It is open today from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Sunday from 9:30 a.m. to 6 p.m.

This year's show, again sponsored by Gene Anthis, who owns and operates the famed Bruneau Jasper mine near Bruneau, features some special attractions.

An iron wood display by Bill Martin from Arizona is also drawing interest from spectators. The wood must be searched out in the Arizona desert, he said, it has been dead for 75 years and is scarce and hard to find. He uses it to carve figures of the native Arizona grouse and roadrunner. These are mounted on a piece of the original grooved and gnarled wood.

## Kimberly rations its water

KIMBERLY — Mayor Resalea Whitehead declared a state of emergency here Friday after water supplies ran dangerously low, and called for a mandatory water conservation policy.

Water supplies have not been able to meet the growing demand of the city which has experienced a 55 percent population growth and a 44 percent increase in housing since 1970. The city has three wells and a 250,000-gallon storage tank.

Demand, which reaches 20,000 gallons per minute during peak usage hours, outstrips the system's capacity of 16,000 gallons per minute. A fourth well is now under construction on the north side of the city.

Public Works Supervisor Bill Malone said the water supply usually runs low in the evening hours. Friday, the system ran out at noon.

"This is the first time that it's happened this early," Malone said. "Usually, we're out by 8 o'clock in the evening."

Malone said he immediately alerted residents to discontinue non-essential water usage.

"I told them if we had a fire, we wouldn't have any water to fight a fire, and they cooperated all the way," he said.

By 6:30 p.m. water supplies had returned to a safe level, Malone said. Whitehead's proclamation came after she talked with City Council members. The mandate, which will be in effect through Sept. 30, calls for the following:

- No vacations on lawn watering.
- Houses with odd-numbered addresses may water only on odd-numbered calendar days. Houses with even-numbered addresses may water only on even-numbered calendar days. The city has been under voluntary odd/even day watering policy for two years. Whitehead's action adds the threat of a \$50 fine and/or 30-day jail sentence.
- A prohibition against using water in any way that would allow water to run onto streets.
- The policy does not restrict using water in this residential or commercial buildings, Whitehead said.

Whitehead said the action was an "absolute necessity." It's either that or do without water. We don't like to have to do it, but we just had no alternative, she said.

Kimberly's five police officers and four public works employees will patrol the city and enforce the mandate, Whitehead said.

The City Council is not set to meet until next month, and no further special action is anticipated, she said.

City officials hope the fourth well will alleviate the water shortage. But the city must still obtain funding to construct distribution lines from the new well to the water users, Whitehead said.

## BLM declares range fires out

SHOSHONE — Two range fires which Thursday consumed more than 6,000 acres of public and private land were declared out by Friday afternoon.

No injuries were reported and no livestock were harmed as a result of the fire, firefighters said.

No new fires were reported Friday, but Bureau of Land Management officials said the potential for new fires remains high as vegetation continues to dry out.

The largest fire, all of it on BLM land about 15 miles north of Minidoka, burned 5,600 acres of sagebrush and grass. BLM officials said the fire was the largest in the Shoshone district so far this year.

The fire, which was spotted around noon, was battled by firefighters before it was contained at about 7:30 p.m. The fire was declared controlled at 11:25 p.m. Firefighters believe lightning ignited the fire.

A second fire, located 15 miles northwest of Buhl near Baldy Rock, Thursday burned about 720 acres of sagebrush and grass, Boise BLM district officials said. The fire was declared out at 11:30 p.m.

Most of the area, about 630 acres, belonged to Chet McClain of Castleford, said BLM dispatcher Peter Jensen. Earlier BLM reports said the fire was confined to public lands.

## Circuit court says state federal judges must see Carey Act follows new ruling

BOISE (UPI) — The 9th Circuit Court of Appeals has ordered Idaho federal judges to rewrap their ruling on Idaho's Carey Act lawsuit so it will conform with a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision.

In a notice received in U.S. District Court for Idaho Friday, the appeals court judges said a 1978 decision issued by former District Judge Blaine Anderson must be altered to comply with the nation's high court ruling last month.

The five-year-old lawsuit, identified by Bureau of Land Management officials as the case that brought the state and federal government into a working relationship in the Gem State, centered on Idaho's right to reclaim desert land for agricultural purposes.

In 1975, then-Idaho Gov. Cecil D. Andrus and the state Water Resources Department filed suit against then-Interior Secretary Rogers C.B. Morton, claiming Idaho had the right to assume 3 million acres of Bureau of Land Management land within the state. Attorneys for Idaho also said the state had the right to locate the parcels.

Anderson ruled in 1976 that Idaho had the right to "no more than" 3 million acres. He said the Interior Department had to turn over specific parcels requested by the state if Idaho officials complied with the terms of the Carey Act.

The recent Supreme Court decision, however,

gives the Interior Secretary the sole right to decide which parcels Idaho may receive. BLM Lands, Minerals and Reclamation Branch Chief Dave Brunner said Friday.

Previously, he said, the Interior Secretary now could decide Idaho is not entitled even to one acre. Realistically, he said, the secretary would not deny Idaho the right to any Carey Act land because such a decision probably would result in "many more years battling the issue in courtrooms."

But, deciding which parcels of arid BLM land in Idaho should be turned over for reclamation purposes "isn't going to be easy," he said. Researchers who recently wrote an environmental statement concerning BLM holdings had hoped to determine which parcels could be developed economically, he said.

"But it didn't work," he said. "There are too many circumstances that play into the decision."

Brunner said some parcels, for example, would not be deemed proper sites for reclamation by a new party because a new irrigation system would have to be developed, perhaps lifting pumping water from the Snake River Canyon 500 feet below. The same parcel, however, could be developed economically by a neighboring land owner by extending existing irrigation pipelines on the land, he said.

"That's the crux of the issue — economics," he said. "There are quite a few people proposing

projects and they really feel they can make it work."

"But, when we wrote the environmental statement, we didn't feel the economics were there. The idea, of course, is not to have someone go out, turn up the land and then pull out, leaving the area disturbed."

Brunner said the Idaho Water Resources Department recently has agreed to review the almost 30 Carey Act applications pending before the BLM. The state officials, he said, will check the list to weed out those proposals that have either become outdated or are not deemed economic.

The state, he said, has not been granted land under the Carey Act since the 1940s. Complicating the situation, he said, is the fact that the BLM in 1972 abolished its regulations governing the Carey Act because no one had applied for land in years.

Then, he said, a rash of applications poured in and federal officials had no methods for processing them until about two months ago when new regulations were initiated.

For years, he said, Idaho and the BLM have been battling in the courts and working without the regulations that are needed to set ground rules. The Supreme Court decision and a new set of rules, he said, the war is over.

"We're finding a new sense of cooperation now," he said. "We're finding a way together; with the state and we're getting a positive response from them."

## Vocational arts building being considered

KIMBERLY — The Kimberly School Board is taking initial steps to spend the last of its bond issue for a vocational arts building.

Board members agreed to have architect Jim Smallwood pursue plans for a 2,800- to 3,000-square-foot cement block and brick veneer structure. The cost, including furnishings, will probably be \$100,000, Chairman J.H. Smith estimated.

The rest of the bond issue is paying for a \$1 million elementary school addition and part of the renovation of the secondary school athletic field.

After taking this action, newly elected trustee Keith Fullmer and re-elected trustee George Nauman Jr. were sworn in.

Next, on a 3-2 vote by secret ballot, Smith was re-elected chairman for the fourth year. Nauman had nominated board member Keith Jensen for the position and William Lyda nominated Smith.

Jensen was then unanimously elected vice chairman. Before nominations, Smith said he was willing to serve

additional time "for the sake of continuity." He mentioned the district's building project.

After the meeting, board members said they have a good relationship and work well together.

Nauman joked about the head job. "You give the chairmanship to somebody who doesn't like you."

In discussing the vocational building, Smallwood gave the board cost estimates for comparative purposes of different types of construction for a "basic building."

Trustees felt the brick veneer, block building, although the most expensive, would better match the appearance of other buildings and have low maintenance.

Industrial arts is now housed in converted World War II barracks.

Smith said \$1,050,000 would be spent for the elementary addition and approximately \$70,000 for the athletic field renovation, leaving \$90,000 in the fund to spend on the vocational building.

The Kimberly vocational program has one teacher. The new building would be one-third storage and would allow room for some growth in enrollment in the program.

## Elementary school addition behind schedule

KIMBERLY — Kimberly Elementary School students may be "brown-bagging it" a little longer than planned this coming school year.

Construction of a new addition to the school is behind schedule because of "problems with the installation of the concrete masonry work," architect Jim Smallwood told the Kimberly School Board Wednesday.

"A lot of work has had to be removed and redone," Smallwood said. Any excess is borne by the contractors.

Part of the \$1 million project, due to be completed in February 1981, is a new cafeteria and kitchen, which trustees hoped would be completed by mid-September.

Smallwood asked the board to designate him their agent

with the authority to stop work if necessary, pursuant to the construction contract. The board agreed.

He said he would act "in their behalf to either have subcontractors or workmen who are falling to meet the standards and requirements removed from the project."

Smallwood was to meet with the general contractor, Blaine Wadman Construction, "to discuss the conflicts and concerns with him."

The architect said it is difficult to say how far behind the project is but that it was in the ballpark of a month. It is possible, he said, the contractor could make up the time.

"We are insisting upon a quality job," Smallwood said, "and we will not accept anything less than that."

# Snake calls trade best thing ever happened

MARION, Ala. (UPI) — Kenny Stabler, whose off-the-field reputation as a carouser rivals that of his heroics on the field, hopes his trade to the Houston Oilers will breathe new life into his checkered career.

Stabler, who at 34 had considered retiring if he wasn't traded from the Oakland Raiders, says joining the Oilers is "the best thing that could happen to me at this point."

"It gets me closer to home," said the former University of Alabama star, who hails from Foley, a small Alabama coastal town.

"Besides, it gives me an opportunity to get back to a championship team. I'm also looking forward to playing for Coach (Bum) Phillips. The players admire him

because he's just a cowboy who coaches football, I think the players go out and bust themselves for him."

Stabler claims Oakland General Manager Al Davis made him and his coach, John Madden, scapegoats for the Raiders' last two mediocre seasons.

Stabler, who led Oakland to victory in the Super Bowl following the 1976 season, asked his attorney to look for a trade in March, 1979.

"He told me several times he felt like hanging it up," said Henry Pitts, a Selma attorney who represents Stabler. "Kenny got stale and said he had to get out of Oakland, California is a stale place."

He said the trade is "the greatest thing since mom's

apple pie on the Fourth of July. He's with a Super Bowl contender and he's just like a rookie again."

Stabler claims he has lost some weight and says he'll be in top condition when the season begins this fall.

"I'm getting in shape," Stabler said at his youth football camp here. "I've been working my arm out and I'm getting my mind in shape. This is my 11th year and I know what it takes to get me in shape."

Stabler claims the press goes out of its way reporting his off-the-field reputation.

"I agree, I run hard as hell. I go out and drink beer, raise hell and don't sleep. There are some people that don't like me and I don't give a damn."

Stabler notes he has led the National Football League in passing, been to the Pro Bowl five consecutive years and was voted the Most Valuable Player in Super Bowl XI.

"But I wish somebody would write about me on the field. I wish they would write about what I do between these lines. People want to read about drinking and carousing or racing cars or racing boats. It sells copy."

Stabler also says the press portrays him as a "high roller" only as "ammunition for the times I have a bad game."

"If you go out and play bad, they say you're out of shape, the night life affected you and you don't take care of yourself. I just live the way I want to live and I don't let it affect my game."

## American 'Olympics' begin

STUTTGART — West Germany (UPI) — Rainfall prevented world-class results on the opening day Friday of a track and field meet billed as an alternate Olympic event, but U.S. hurdler Edwin Moses defied the rain-heavy tracks to clock solid 48.62 seconds over 400 meters.

Appearing to slow down on the last 10 yards after a quick glance at the electronic time keeper, the Montreal Olympic champion was modestly itself after his win.

"We Americans have to come to Europe to experience where we stand with our performance," said Moses, who ran the distance faster than any other athlete has done so far this season.

He was tallied over the finish line by teammates James Walker (49.15 seconds) and David Lee (49.60).

U.S. Olympic champ Mac Wilkins buried his discus 68.42 meters to beat fellow American Ben Plucknett, who achieved 68.18.

Some 4,000 track and field lovers braved the pouring rain to see the "Euro-meeting" with Olympic boycotters United States and Canada competing with some British athletes and boycotting hosts West Germany.

The crowd cheered wildly as home favorite Willi Wuebelbeck came out ahead in the last bend of the 800-meter race, edging away from U.S. world season best performer Steve Scott. Wuebelbeck's poor winning time, 1:44.96, did not dampen their enthusiasm.

Christian Haas, a young West German sprinter, looked poised for a major upset when he grabbed a four-pace lead in the 100 meter dash. But American Harvey Glance fourth at Montreal — drew up alongside and passed Haas to beat him by 0.09 seconds on 10.24.

Larry Myricks trumped in the long-jump with a 0.45-meter margin over Hungarian Laszlo Szalma, when the American hung in the air for a 8.30-meter mark.

Despite her average 1.87 meters in the high jump, West Germany's Ulrike Meyfarth visibly enjoyed beating Canadian world class jumper Debbie Brill, who stayed at 1.80. But for the boycott, Brill would have been a gold medalist at Moscow.

Shirley Strong of Britain won the women's 100 meter hurdles on 13.06, ahead of American — Stephanie Hightower, who clocked 13.12.

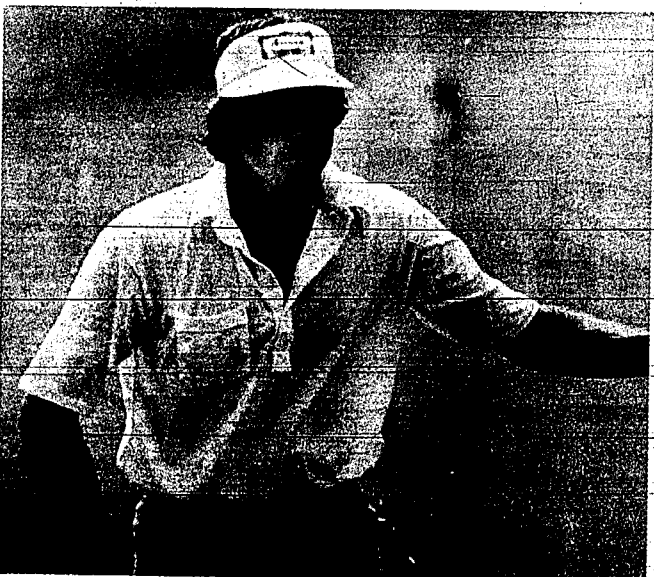

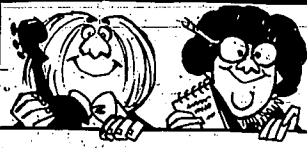

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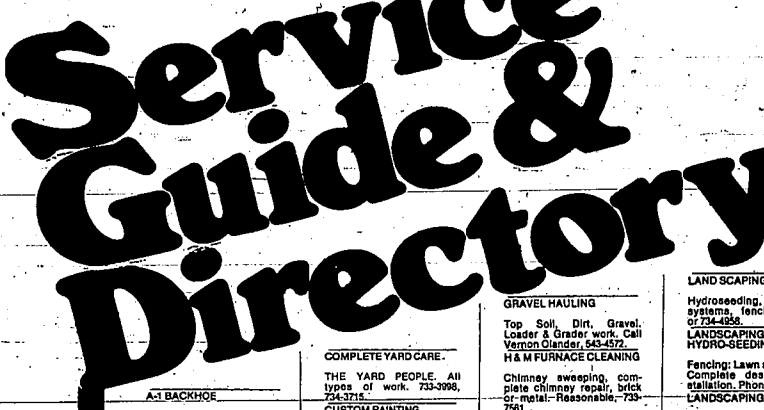

### Jump shift response bids

By Oswald Jacoby and Alan Sontag

The jump shift response should tell partner that you have slam interest, but that you may want to stop at game if his opening is in a minimum. If you intend to get to a slam, you don't need a jump shift. All you have to do is to make sure that you use forcing bids all the way.

Suppose your partner opens one spade and you hold: S-K Q 4 5 4 H-A 2 D-7 3 C-K K 6 2. This is a perfect three club response. If partner rebids three spades (interference strength) or three notrump (balanced minimum) you simply go to four spades. You are not invited a slam, but you haven't gone past game. If he rebids three diamonds or hearts you bid three spades and await his next bid.

Your partner opens one heart. You hold: S-A K Q J 10 8 7 6 H-A D-5 4 C-K 2. This is a perfect three club to two spades and plan to bid four spades at your next turn. High-card points have a lot to do with the jump shift response. With distributional hands we recommend that you have at least 14 (possibly 15) and that your well-balanced hands you need at least 18 or 19.

Thus, there is no good reason to respond three clubs to a one-spade opening with: S-3 2 H-A K 7 D-K Q 5 C-A J 8 7 6. Just respond two clubs and plan to bid three notrump next. Partner should then play you for 18 or more high-card points. (NEWSPAPER ENTERPRISE ASSN.)
