Carter did not provide details of his proposed economic plan, which he said would be directed wward "putting people back to work in distressed area."



Allen loses steam, but still deadly

KINGSTON, Jamifica (UPI) — Hurricane Allen flooded coastal villages in Haiti and Jamaica Wednesday, slapped the Cayman Islands and bore down on Cuba and Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula with winds up to 435 mph.

As the storm churned northwestward toward the Gulf of Mexico, it raked the Florida Keys with gales and triggered hurricane preparations from Alabama's barrier islands to Louisana's offshore oil ries.

Hurricane-force winds, and six-foot, waves began pounding Cuba's southern costs tweenesday afternoon and the government, ordered 110,000 residents in "dangerous" coastal areas, to evacuate to higher ground.

Mexico's tourist-jammed resorts of Cozumel, Isla Muleres and Cancun, on the Yucatan Peninsula were urged-to-batten-down-and-forecasters-said-the-area could expect hurricane-force winds by Thursday morning.





Report says feds hid effects of A-bomb tests

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A congressional report on ranchers who lost sheep bereits to Nevnada atom bomb lesting in the 1950s and 1950s concluded Wechsestry the government "fistally servise lost of the public and covered up the scandal."

"The greatest-irony-of-our-atmospheric-nuclear-testing program is that the only victims of U.S. nuclear arms since World War II have been our own people," noted the report by the House oversight and investigation subcommittee.

The 68-page report said the "government totally failed to provide adequate protection" because the Atomic Energy Commission was more concerned with—its—wapons development mission than with public safety.

It recommended legislation to compensate ranchers who suffered financially from 121-bomb tests at the Nevada test site near Beatty from 1951, to 1961. And it said any agency handling health and safety natters should have no responsibilities in the area of nuclear energy.



Other forms of execution pose no such problem. Commanding—a firing—squad, activating a gallows trap door or throwing a switch to set in operation an electric chair or gas chamber does not require medical assistance, beyond declaring a prisoner dead. Lethal injection is different.

BALTIMOS (UPI) — Doctors at Sinal and Johns Hopkins hospitals said. Wednesday they have successfully tested a device that could save the lives of thousands of people who die annually from rapid contractions of the heart. The device, which is implanted in the abdomen and attached to the heart by electrodes, senses the onset of a seizure and automatically delivers electric shocks to the heart to restore normal rhythm, the doctors said. "Our preliminary results were ex-citing," he said. "These are very good results for device that is entirely new in concept and technology." He said one patient died, but doctors do not know. If the death was caused by a seizure. The other five persons, who are being tested at Johns Hopkins Medical School, are doing well, he said.

New heart device may save thousands of victims a year

Mirowski said persons who suffer rapid heart contractions usually die within seconds because there is not enough time to get them to the hospi-tal to receive electric shock treatlivers electric shocks to the heart to restore normal rhythm, the doctors said.

An estimated 300,000 Americans, most with a history of heart attacks, die each year from fluttering of the heart caused by disturbances of cardiac electrical activity.

Dr. Michel Mirowski, director of Coronary Care al Sinal and inventor of the device, said it was planted in six persons susceptible to heart arrhythmias and averted death nine times.

"This device performs a number of functions that are otherwise only available in the coronary care unit," he sald. "Patlents can now have protection outside the hospital while they are living a relatively normal live."

Soviets end Afghan offensive

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — The Soviet Indian appears to have ended a two-pronged offensive just west and south of the Afghan capital and Moslem guerrillas have killed a second Soviet official in Kabul; a Western diplomatic source said Wednesday.—The diplomatic source said columns of Soviet armor retirmed to Kabul Sunday from "Afghanistan's Wardak province, apparently signaling an end to a bloody offensive in which the Russians reportedly used MIG jet fighters and helicopter gunships to reduce to rubble villages suspected of harboring Moslem rebels.

"The Wardak province offense appears now to have-ended," the source said.

In Kabul itself, rebels killed a Soviet doctor — the second Russian official to be gunned down by rebels in the Afghan capital in 10 days, the source reported.

The first victim, a brigadier general-said to have

been involved in Kremiin intelligence operations in Afghanistan, was shot and killed on a Kabul street July 29.

The second prong of the Soviet offensive to wipe out guerrillas within striking distance of Kabul centered in Logar province south of the capital and "in and around the city of Gardes" in Paktia province further south, The diplomatic source said he believed that operation also "may have ended."

Assassin may have fled to Iran, FBI says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Unconfirmed information indicates pro-Rhomeini zealot Daoud Salahuddin — accused of assassinating an Iranian extle leader in suburban Washington — may have flown to Iran within three days of the murder, the FBI said Wednesday. "We have information that would tend to indicate that he's out of the country," said FBI spokesman Roger Young: "We can't confirm that he's in Iran." Young said the bureau has had the data "for at least a week," but he did not elaborate on press accounts

that said the suspect quickly fied the United States after the July 22 killing of All Tabatabal, the former press attache at the frantari embassy.

The Washington Post reported officials think Salabuddin, 29, took an airline shuttle flight to New York within hours of the killing. The newspaper quoted sources saying Salabuddin, a Muslim convert who was born David Belifeld, flew from New York to Switzerland and arrived in Iran three days after the killing. who was some Switzerland and arrived in Iran base killing. Young stressed the FBI has been unable to confirm

the information and said, "No one has seen him out of the country."

If Sainhuddin — identified by Betheada, Md., police as a suspect — was able to fice, it is doubtful he would ever be returned to the United States to face criminal prosecution for the assassination.

The United States cut its diplomatic ties with Iran in April and with no extradition treaty between the two hattons, there is little hope Ayatolian Ruboliah Rhomeln's revolutionary government would turn over Sainhuddin for trial.



Having a fly-fishing friend helps

Not everyone knows someone who owns a tackle shop and spends his extra time taking his friends fishing. Glen Allen, owner of Rocky Mountain Fly Shop in Boise, and his wife, Debby, are friends of mine from years back. We spent last week floating the South Fork of the Boise River from Anderson Ranch Dam down to Indian Rock. We used a liberglass boat — similar to the McKeratle with knee holes in front and a high castling seat in back. While Glen rowed, Debby and I cast from opposite ends of the boat floward the shoreline. The current took is rather guickly downstream and Glen maneuvered the craft loward fish-holding eddies and away from the whitewaters to the property of the control of the

craft foward fish-holding eddies and away from the whitewater. There were numerous hatches throughout the day which we tried to match. At every break in our drift, Glen would pull another fly box from his well-stocked vest and pick a few for us to sample. The most popular patters were the Royal Wulff, grasshopper and — best of all — a light-covered Cahill with a pink body. "Come on pretty darling. That's it sweetheart. You have it now, baby, "pleaded Debby's husband. These and other endearments were directed not at us but to coach the flish toward the fly. Even if the fly was perfectly cast and the flish refused the offer, the next comment loudly given was, "you dumpi!" And so the day went. Lots of sunshine, flishing, good food and very nosty capoling. Walleve catch-made near Salmon Dan

Leo and Dorothy Graham of Filer fished the Salmon Dam area last weekend and caught what some anglers claim do not even exist there — a large number of

claim do not even exist there — a large number of walleyes. They started above Gray's Landing toward Crapple Polint, Along the sand bars from there to Norton Bay and around. China Greek. They, caught, many, bass, perchitout, crapple and nine walleye. The average walleye was 1½ pounds and 16 inches long. Using a yellow crapple gig with a rubber skirt and a white tail, they filled their creek in record time.

Madison River drawing attention

The Madison River has drawn quite a bit of attention lately — not only from Magic Valley fishermen and the local fish and game department — but from angiers and conservation officers from all over the country.

The Upper Madison (extending from Quake Lake to Ennis, Mon L. is Si miles in length and carpeted with some of the allekets round rocks I've ever experienced.

Both the salmonfly and stonefly hatches are events you don't want to miss. The large adult insects flutter on the river surface during the early summer, attracting some of the biggest trout you've ever seen.

Caddis nymphs and small caddis dry.flies, as well as the larger salmonly and stonelly patters, are good daytine producers. As the summer wanes, the hopper patters are the best. Muddlers, Marabou muddlers, dark Matuka streamers and Blitch Creek Specials do well in the evenings and during brief periods of bad weather.

Because of the miles of trout habitat along the Upper Madison are so similar, the river has become an ideal laboratory for fish biologists.

A few years ago, a five-year study was made comparing a section of the river heavily slocked with catchable-sized hatchery trout with an adjoining section managed as a wild-trout-only stretch. Those who felt that slocking more matchery fish was the best cure for an alling and declining trout fishery were in for a big shock.

The study proved that stocking the Madison not only did nothing to improve the fishing, but it had a detrimental effect on both the number and the size of trout in that section.

section.

"The end result of the experiment was important to the management of rivers able to sustain a wild trout population. In Montana, stocking of such rivers with catchable-sized hatchery trout has virtually stopped. A further breakdown of the study revealing some interesting facts will be presented in next week's column.




