## Water quality rule adds to problems for gold miners

**CHALLIS** — Five Louisiana families come to Idaho in search of gold this spring.

But, with the summer slipping away, their search still hasn't begun. Equipment problems, stymied the miners through much of the spring.

The equipment works now, but when used they violate state water quality standards.

They are unable to prevent sediment from running into the creek running through their claim. The creek eventually drains into the Yankee Fork of the Salmon River.

To compound matters, if the miners start full production without solving the runoff problem, the Forest Service or the state could step in and shut down the operation, according to Becky Roemer, the Forest Service minerals technician who monitors

mining activity in the Yankee Fork drainage.

Local Forest Service personnel call the group and their mining operation the "Louisiana Purchase," Roemer said. The five families brought \$50,000 worth of heavy equipment to Montana Gulch this spring. Montana Creek runs through the gulch, then into Jordan Creek and the Yankee Fork.

Miner John Mays, who says the mine is in the frustrating pre-production phase of development, expects to resolve the problems soon and begin full production. But so far, he says they have spent a lot of time and money without producing the gold they came to Idaho to get.

Three years of exploration work on the claim site convinced them there was gold in their hills. So, last winter they went back to Louisiana, signed up new partners and came back with more money and equipment.

# Misleading data shows 0% inflation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — For the first time in 13 years, inflation took a vacation between June and July, according to government figures released Friday showing no overall increase in the cost of living.

The Labor Department report said that, thanks to a dramatic drop in mortgage rates, the Consumer Price Index remained last month exactly where it was in June after seasonal adjustments.

A whopping 5.7 percent decline in mortgage rates canceled out higher prices for food, clothing, medical care and transportation, the department said.

It was the first time the index — designed to measure the cost of living for a typical American city dweller — has failed to rise since March 1967.

The announcement drew mixed reactions. It pleased the administration, moved Ronald Reagan's camp to sharp words and left private economists skeptical.

Nobody said the price relief is here to stay.

Several private economists called July's overall figure a statistical mirage, because the index relies so heavily on mortgage rates.

"It's a temporary aberration," said Lawrence Chimerine, chief economist for Chase Economies in Philadelphia. "For any given person who didn't buy a house, this doesn't mean anything."

Martin Anderson, a senior economic adviser to GOP presidential candidate Reagan, said "For anyone to get the impression from today's CPI numbers that inflation is coming down would be as dangerous and tragic as somebody who is in the calm

eye of the hurricane thinking the worst is over," he said.

Alfred Kahn, the administration's chief inflation fighter, told a congressional committee he was pleased with the report, but conceded it did not accurately reflect the "core" rate of inflation — running at an annual rate of about 9 to 10 percent.

"Inflation still is a clear and present danger," he said, expressing concern that tax cuts being considered by Congress could send consumer prices soaring again.

"It's fairly obvious the distortion caused by the mortgage interest rates have made the July index and, also incidentally will make the August index, not very useful in judging the underlying inflation rate in the United States," added New York economist Alan Greenspan.

Howard Hjort, the Agriculture Department's chief economist, estimated food inflation for the year at 8.9 percent, and attributed 0.1 percent of this to the summer drought.

The index now stands at 247.8, meaning goods that cost \$100 in 1967 now cost \$247.80. Stated another way, the 1967 dollar is now worth only 40.4 cents.

Excluding the impact of mortgage rates, the CPI actually rose 0.7 percent in July, or at a compound annual rate of about 9 percent.

The Labor Department said the purchasing power of the typical U.S. city dweller fell 1.8 percent in July, or at a compound annual rate of about 9 percent.

"Meat prices are virtually certain to rise," he told a news briefing.

# Reagan hails tax cut plan as 'on mark'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican presidential candidate Ronald Reagan said Friday the Senate Finance Committee hit the mark with its \$39 billion tax cut plan and he accused President Carter of being "out of step" with America's needs.

The 19-16 bipartisan vote Thursday, the committee approved a package of individual and business tax cuts designed to offset inflation and Social Security tax increases scheduled for 1981.

Both Carter and the House oppose the plan, but Reagan and the Senate is more in tune with the American people on this issue.

The package includes about \$22 billion in personal income tax reductions and a little something for almost everyone.

The individual tax cut provisions are designed to offset the anticipated effects of inflation and increased Social Security withholdings set for 1981 while \$17 billion in benefits for business are geared to increasing investment incentives and spurring productivity that will create new jobs.

Both Democratic and Republican members of the committee expressed confidence the Senate will approve

the plan, and Sen. Russell Long, D-La., the panel chairman, said, "Once it is passed by the Senate, the chances for success in the House will increase 100 percent."

But some officials think the bill's chance of passing the Senate is dubious because of objections it would create too large a budget deficit.

Rep. Barber Conable, R-N.Y., ranking Republican on the tax-writing House Ways and Means Committee, said the battle in the House will not be easily won.

Long has attached his tax package to a measure already approved by the House, thereby complying he contends, with the constitutional requirement that all tax bills start there.

The taxcut is attached to a non-controversial bill waiving the import tariffs on six bronze bells for the United Methodist Church of Washington.

"In this case, the rider will be bigger than the horse," he admitted. Such a tactic is common in the U.S. Congress.

If approved by the Senate, the bill will go back to the House. And if the House wants the church bells, it will have to take the tax cuts too.

## Old ash threatens river towns

# Crews hurry work as volcano rumbles

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UPI) — Mount St. Helens gave indications Friday it might be getting ready to erupt again.

Meanwhile construction crews worked feverishly on the volcano's slopes and rivers downstream to prevent further devastation from mud and ash.

U.S. Geological Survey scientist Bill Rose said emissions of sulphur dioxide and carbon dioxide from the volcano appeared to be the same as they were just prior to previous eruptions.

The gas emissions indicate there is still a "live beast" in the volcano, Rose said, explaining the gas is related to magma in the mountain.

However, he said, "the most probable scenario" for future activity would be one of a small eruption, similar to recent activity.

Meanwhile, construction crews are working 22 hours a day down the mountainside in the Toutle River Valley, building retaining dams and settling ponds to prevent tons of mud and ash from pouring into towns below when the rainy fall season begins.

Four contractors hired by the Army Corps of Engineers have been given less than three months to build projects which normally would take a year or longer to plan, then, only after two years of planning. Only 35 days remain before the deadline.

"We'll do it," Capt. John Hart, the corps' project director on the North Toutle River, said Thursday. At stake is the fate of towns on the Cowlitz River: Castle Rock, population 1,700; Kelso, population, 10,300; and Longview, population 28,400.

When Mount St. Helens erupted May 18, mud and debris swept down the Toutle River and inundated portions of the towns along the Cowlitz. More than 20 million yards of debris are being removed from the Cowlitz.

USGS geologist Jane Buchanan-Banks said Friday the mountain was seismically quiet. A U.S. Forest spatter plane noted a steam plume rising to 14,000 feet above sea level from the crater, she said.

Poor visibility prevented fire fighting crews from

going into the mountain's area to work Friday, she said.

The geologist said officials also were concerned over an estimated 250 acre-foot of water sent downstream of Marett Creek about 10 miles northwest of the mountain when a natural barrier of volcanic debris burst Tuesday evening.

The water came to rest against another natural barrier only eight miles upstream from where the construction crews were building a restraining dam on the north fork of the Toutle River, she said.

Huge rock-and-wire-mesh-sieves, called gabions by engineers, are being constructed in the river bed to filter out the hundreds of thousands of tons of ash silt laid down by Mt. St. Helens in the Toutle River watershed. Officials fear that once the fall rains begin, the silt will be carried into the river, clogging channels. After the May 18 eruption, ash silt flowing from the river entered the Columbia River, closing that major inland waterway to shipping for several weeks.

## Judge accepts sealed boxes

# KBCI agrees to deal, turns over riot tapes

BOISE (UPI) — KBCI-Television Friday agreed to turn over all originals and copies of video tapes taken at the Idaho State Penitentiary riot into the protective custody of 4th District Judge Robert Rowlett.

Station attorney Peter Boyd said the video tapes would be placed in a "sealed box," and surrendered to the court.

A spokesman at KBCI, meanwhile, said turning over the tapes ended the station's search for a newswoman. The search would not be conducted by the Ada County Prosecuting Attorneys office, which seeks the original tapes as evidence in bringing charges against teachers of the prison riot.

Earlier Friday Rowlett said the Boise television station could submit the video tapes to the court, and he would order them sealed until he issues a final ruling in the case. Or, he said, News Director Paul Riese and station attorney William Russell could have surrendered the tapes when their depositions are taken.

If the station had chosen to turn over the tapes when the men were deposed, Rowlett said, disclosing contents of the films would not preclude KBCI's lawsuit against Ada County and the State of Idaho.

Boyd, however, said the station chose to submit the tapes to the court. "Our point is that they (the Ada County Prosecuting Attorney's office

and the Idaho Attorney General's office) are not entitled to them," Boyd said.

KBCI has filed suit against Ada County Prosecuting Attorney Jim Harris, Ada County and the state, contending the July 26 search of the station newroom for the tapes violated the U.S. Constitution and a U.S. Supreme Court ruling concerning newswoman searches.

Harris at that time said the original video tapes were needed as unique evidence in bringing charges against rioting inmates.

Noting the "tension if not outright conflict between counsel" evident in court, Russell urged Rowlett to

carefully weigh the demand for the tapes, saying "we have two significant public rights involved in this case and those rights should be balanced in front of a court" not during more informal deposition proceedings.

Idaho Deputy Attorney General Lynn Thomas said the station had committed a misdemeanor by refusing to turn over the tapes.

But the state did not have "carte blanche" to obtain the tapes just because a criminal case may be involved, Russell countered.

"I might just as unreasonably assert that we are a 1st Amendment protected entity as a new-gathering entity and we have carte blanche protection," he said.

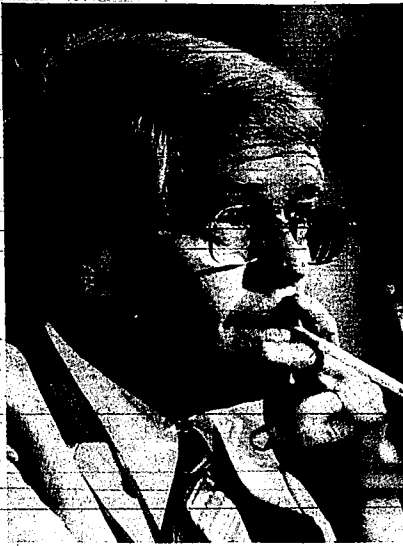

# Senators blast Billy deals



Carter reacted quietly to the strong criticism UPI

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Members of a special Senate subcommittee finished questioning Billy Carter Friday by accusing him of harming the United States in his quest for money and being "totally unrepentant" for his misdeeds.

Carter, a somber-looking and chain-smoking "throughout the hearing," offered no resistance to the barrage of criticism and did not raise his own voice in anger.

Throughout his two days of testimony, the president's brother said he never asked the White House for any favors on behalf of Libya and his friends in Tripoli expected nothing in return for the \$200,000 they loaned him.

The special Senate Judiciary subcommittee headed by Sen. Birch Bayh, D-Ind., is investigating the \$200,000 loan Billy Carter sought and received from Libya, and an aborted oil deal for an American oil company that would have earned him millions in commissions.

It also is investigating whether his deal influenced Washington-Tripoli relations, and if he should have been punished for failing to register as a foreign agent for Libya until urged by the president to make the move.

In the final session, Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., berated Billy Carter for negotiating commercial deals with a Libyan government that was actively trying to undermine President Carter's peace accord between Egypt and Israel.

"You are totally unrepentant, as far as I can see," Lugar said.

He asked if Carter would accept the balance of the \$200,000 loan he sought

if Libya now offered it.

"I would discuss it with my lawyers," Billy Carter replied.

"That's all that you can say?" Lugar asked.

In another development, Billy Carter said he may not remember correctly just what he told a Justice Department investigator in interviews this January and June.

Carter raised eyebrows on the panel Thursday by directly contradicting the investigator — Joel Lisker — on several key points.

Earlier, Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., told Billy Carter that by seeking "commercial gain" from Libya, "damage, whether intentional or inadvertent, has been caused to the president of the United States and to the country itself."

Leahy said he sympathized with Billy's loss of privacy and medical problems — a bout with heavy drinking — suffered after Jimmy Carter became president.

"But a lot of it you brought upon yourself" by encouraging "commercial exploitation" for personal profit, Leahy said. "A lot of people were out to use you. Quite frankly, you could have stopped it, and didn't."

Billy Carter did not reply and the hearing room was hushed.

Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., asked Billy what proof existed that \$20,000 he received from Libya last December was an advance on a promised \$50,000 loan instead of a gift to gain Libyan influence over U.S. policy.

"Right now, just my word," Billy Carter replied. "I have no written agreement — no written anything."

# Banks hike prime rate

NEW YORK (UPI) — Most of the country's largest banks raised the interest rate for prime business loans to 11 1/2 percent from 11 percent Friday.

New York's huge Citibank set off the Friday wave by following the lead of its big rival, Chase Manhattan Bank, on Tuesday. Chase Manhattan said market conditions forced the move.

Prime business loans are those

made in the most credit-worthy corporations. A change in the prime interest rate usually affects all other interest rates, although not always quickly because many lending markets, such as personal loans, generate a lot of their funds through monthly collections.

The Federal Reserve System's managers can exercise considerable influence on federal funds interest rates and in recent weeks they have allowed these rates to rise from around 8 to around 10 percent.

# Navy gets own zip codes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Postal Service said Friday it is assigning zip codes to ships at sea.

The USS Nimitz is now 09542, the USS Eisenhower 09532.

In all there are 188 new zip codes for 638 Navy, Naval Reserve, Coast Guard, Military Sealift Command and

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration ships.

The service said the codes will speed mail on its way faster, particularly in the case of large vessels such as aircraft carriers which sometimes have more crew members on board than small towns have people.

# Strikers threaten LA with blackout

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Negotiations between the city and striking electrical workers broke off Friday with a union leader saying workers would shut down more of Los Angeles generators and "it's going to hurt them."

City officials warned the shutdowns could cause "rolling blackouts" if they continue, though there had been no blackouts by Friday.

"Everything has broken down," union leader Ray Taylor said Friday as he walked out of the main offices of The Department of Water and Power,

the largest municipally owned utility in the United States.

"I'm pulling some more generation. It's not enough to cripple them, but it's going to hurt them."

The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers struck at some, but not all — power plants Wednesday in defiance of a court order. Strikers shut down half the generating units at the four steam plants supplying 60 percent of the city's power.

Taylor, the union's business manager, said Friday he would order workers to close down two more

power plants.

Taylor said the union, which at one point lowered its pay raise demand to 15 percent, was returning to the original 18 percent — twice the 9 percent ceiling the city is trying to hold in talks with municipal employees.

Taylor, who had been avoiding process-servers trying to present him with the court restraining order, told reporters he had accepted notice — but defied the city to enforce the order.

If the city obtains a contempt of court order and "they put me in jail,

you won't have one person working," he said. Such a total strike would bring on partial blackouts, department officials said.

Taylor said there would be no settlement if Mayor Thomas Bradley or City Attorney Burt Finer prosecute the 350 strikers for violating a state law against strikes by municipal workers.

"They know there is not going to be any settlement unless there is, amnesty for our workers," Taylor said.

# 'Spirit of '76' will be auctioned

PORTLAND, Maine (UPI) — Bids from around the world are expected when a version of "The Spirit of '76" is auctioned in November.

"Surely, it is priceless," said Annette Elowitch, co-owner of Baridolf

Galleries where the auction will be held Nov. 22.

Archibald M. Willard immortalized his many paintings of the classic Revolutionary War scene in which he depicted a rifle and drum corps leading an army of militiamen.

Willard F. Gordon, in his 1976 book,

called the work "America's best-known painting."

Elowitch said the 24-by-18 inch painting — originally titled "Yankee Doodle" circa 1875 — is Willard's earliest version. No one is certain how many others Willard completed.



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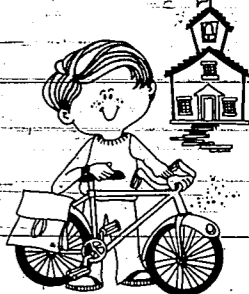
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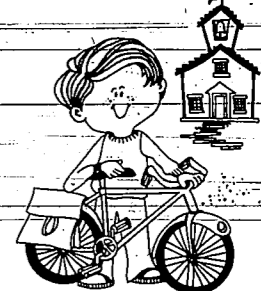

LONDON (UPI) — The man who fooled millions of Americans by mimicking Winston Churchill's "We shall never surrender" speech collapsed on a subway platform and died Friday. Actor Norman Shelley was 77. 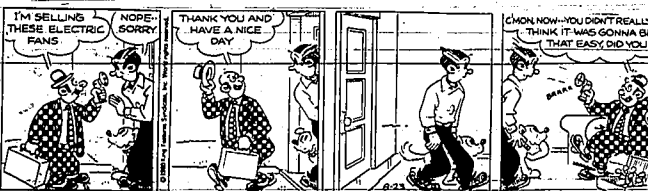

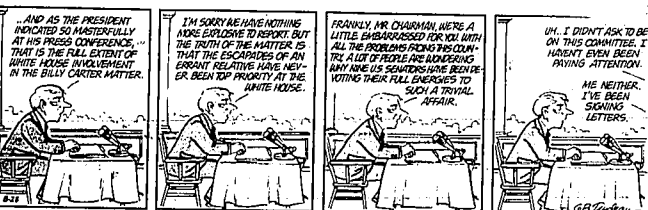

Takes a certain eye to build a church bell tower. In some towns, the bells are hung from steel beams, which transmit the sound straight down through the building's core, grounding it out. You can hardly hear the music a block away. In other towns, the bells are hung from wooden timbers, which reject the sound. The music from these can be heard for up to a mile maybe. And if the outer tower itself is a proper acoustical shell, it becomes part of the great instrument.

For about \$75 in Nairobi, you can buy a telephone book cover made of zebra skin.

# Abscam tapes show Myers bragging about his power

NEW YORK (UPI) — Rep. Michael Myers, D-Pa., a defendant in the Abscam bribery trial, was shown on videotape Friday gulping bourbon and demanding \$35,000 from undercover agents while boasting of his political and underworld influence.

On the videotape of the Jan. 24 meeting at the Barclay Hotel in Philadelphia, Myers told FBI agents posing as representatives of a phony Arab sheik that he was cheated out of his share of a \$50,000 payoff the agents gave him six months earlier to help the sheik enter the United States.

Myers, whose speech was stirred after three drinks of bourbon, also boasted he controlled four

Philadelphia City Council members, was close friends with several key public officials and held sway with organized crime figures.

The tape was played in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn, where Myers, Philadelphia city Councilman Louis Johanson, Philadelphia lawyer Howard Criden, and Angelo Errichetti, the mayor of Camden, N.J., are on trial.

The four are charged with accepting \$50,000 from FBI agents after promising a bill would be introduced in Congress to help the sheik enter the country. A tape shown last week showed Myers accepting the money Aug. 24, 1979, at a hotel at Kennedy Airport.

The defense admits the four took the money but claims they never intended to help the sheik, and claims the defendants were entrapped by undercover agents.

The defendants were supposed to get another \$50,000 after the immigration bill passed Congress. On the tape, Myers complained his codefendants gave him only \$15,000 instead of the \$50,000 he was promised.

One of the agents, Michael Wald, told Myers he would get the \$35,000 and promised another \$50,000 if Myers could help with both the hotel project, which would require City Council cooperation, and with development of

the Port of Philadelphia to aid the phony sheik's plan to export coal.

"The City Council we can handle. Those we can't handle we can buy," said Myers. "I will use my influence, my office and my personal friendship with these guys."

Regarding the port, Myers said Fred DeBona, executive director of the Port Commission, "is one of my closest friends. I played a key role in getting him his job."

Asked about dealing with organized crime, Myers mentioned the names of the late Philadelphia mob boss Angelo Bruno's alleged successors, Anthony Testa and Chickie Narducci.

"You can handle them through me if the problem comes up. I don't see them socially, but they're my friends from the old days." At another point

he adds, "If you get involved with any type of Mafia, I can handle that."

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## Differences ironed out in concert dispute

**HAILEY** — Blaine County officials have agreed to allow Sunday's outdoor rock concert near Bellevue to proceed as planned.

Blaine County Prosecuting Attorney Keith Roark, who had threatened to seek an injunction blocking

the concert, was out of town Friday and unavailable for comment.

However, Ketchum Concerts promoter Dave Simon said an agreement had been reached to hold the Sunday afternoon concert, and no injunction had been sought by closing time Friday afternoon.

County planning administrator Gary Slette said the county received assurances on several fronts before agreeing not to seek the injunction.

Slette said the promoters agreed not to take legal action beyond an appeal to the Blaine County Commission regarding their request that the so-called Sun Valley Bowl be designated a permanent concert site. The county planning and zoning commission has recommended denying that request.

In addition, the promoters agreed to purchase \$500,000 in liability insurance to guard against damage to neighboring property, to pay the

Blaine County Rural Fire District \$1,000 for fire protection, to remove the sound stage and other improvements after the concert, and to pay \$1,000 for cleanup after the event.

Slette said the promoters provided proof Friday that monetary conditions have been met.

Simon said advance ticket sales for the concert had picked up somewhat since news began circulating Thursday that the concert would take place.

He said he expects a large number of ticket sales at the gate, which opens at 11 a.m.

The concert lineup lists Vance and Friends at 1 p.m., Midnight Angel at 2 p.m., harmonica player Norton Bufalo at 4 p.m. and the Rhythm Aces about 6 p.m.

Simon also said civic groups and organizations are still needed to provide food concessions for the au-

dience. He urged interested groups to contact the promoters at 726-4649 or 726-7275.

He said John Anderson Jr., son of the presidential candidate, and campaign workers for the Illinois congressman will handle the hot dog concession for the concert.

Simon said signs will direct concert-goers to the access-road-south-of-Bellevue on state Highway 75.

Madsen said she makes more than half of the clothes she wears, and has participated in 4-H sewing projects for seven years.

Janet Nellis, who claimed runner-up in the division, said after the contest she has sewn six

dresses this summer and makes most of the outfits she wears for school and dressier occasions.

"I buy jeans, but that's about it," said the Jerome High School junior. Nellis modeled a Gurnee Sax pattern party dress, which she said she will wear to church and school.

Another Jerome High student, Julie Hosman, modeled a blue and white warmup suit for her blue ribbon placing. Hosman has played center for the past two seasons on the Tigers' girls basketball team.

Hosman said she still gets slightly nervous before walking on stage, despite nine years of experience modeling garments in 4-H. Using a basketball as a prop made this year's fair appearance seem more familiar, she added.

Seven-year-old Jana Worthington didn't win a trophy, but she stole the audience's favor in the junior division, winning one of two blue ribbons for her blue-and-red print halter top trimmed with red rick-rack.

## Twin Falls thieves stealing property that is worth more

**TWIN FALLS** — Burglars are going for the higher quality merchandise this year, says Twin Falls Police Chief Tim Qualls.

Qualls said a review of the first six months of 1980 shows slightly fewer burglaries but an immense increase in loss to victims. He said there were more thefts of silver service, jewelry, stereo equipment and other costly items this year than last.

In the first six months of 1979, there were 253 burglaries investigated by Twin Falls police, with stolen items totaling \$33,038. Through June 30 this year, there were only 249 burglaries but the stolen goods were worth \$216,000.

Qualls said his staff has been kept busy this year with an average of 8.5 more calls per eight-hour shift this year than a year ago. In the first six months of 1979, the department handled 11,129 calls and contacts in the uniform and detective divisions.

This year the amount increased 4,665 to 15,794 contacts. He said this is 25.6 more contacts per day than in the previous year with the same number of police department employees, he said.

Other statistics in Qualls' report include 1,530 crime reports in the first half of 1979 compared to 1,638 for the same time in 1980.

A breakdown of the crimes includes arson, 3 last year and 6 this year; willful concealment of merchandise, 22 last year and 15 this year; petty larceny, 158 last year and 225 this year; destruction of property, 288 last year and 325 this year; assaults, 99 last year and 120 this year; and sex crimes, 11 last year and 15 this year.

There were also 111 grand larceny cases last year and 137 this year; 12 embezzlement last year and 16 this year; four robberies last year, 8 this year, and 9 drug cases last year and 34 this year.

Qualls said officers concentrated heavily on drug activities last year, which may have allowed increases in other crime areas.

## Idaho sales fall behind inflation in fiscal year

**TWIN FALLS** — Retail sales in Idaho didn't keep pace with inflation during the fiscal year that ended in June.

Sales were better in Twin Falls than in the state as a whole, but they still trailed the rate of inflation. From sales tax figures released this week by the Idaho Tax Commission, it appears that people scrimped on new household appliances and stayed home instead of going to the movies so they could continue to buy retail dry goods.

According to the report released by the commission this week, total retail sales in the state were nearly \$1.6 billion dollars for the fiscal year ending June 30. That figure was only 7.6 percent above the \$1.07 billion in sales during the previous fiscal year. During that time the consumer price index leaped by more than 14 percent.

In Twin Falls County, total sales of

\$422 million showed an 11 percent increase over the previous fiscal year, without adjusting for inflation. Retail dry goods sales were up 12 percent while sales at household appliance stores dropped 6 percent.

People either went to the movies less last year or ate \$100.00 less candy while they were there, according to the tax report. Total sales, which include admission and concessions, at movie theaters in Twin Falls were estimated at \$1.4 million, which is a 4.5 percent drop from the nearly \$1.5 million spent at the movies in the previous fiscal year.

The sales tax report indicates people spend more eating out than at home. Restaurant sales of about \$1.8 million were up 6 percent from the previous year. Sales at Twin Falls County "eating places" of \$19.5 million were up just over 5 percent from the previous year.

## EPA may draft new water quality standards for Idaho

**SEATTLE** — The Environmental Protection Agency may draft new water quality standards for Idaho.

An EPA official said Friday if state water standards do not conform to provisions in the federal Clean Water Act, the EPA may draft its own standards for Idaho and force the state to accept them.

But one key Idaho legislator called the EPA's warning "nothing more than illegal blackmail" and threatened a court suit to block the EPA move.

"The two statements come following this week's decision by the Seattle EPA office to overturn two water quality standards set this year by the Idaho Legislature.

The Legislature lowered the dissolved oxygen content below Idaho dams from six to five parts per million parts

of water, and increased the allowable amount of un-ionized ammonia in Canyon County's Indian Creek.

The new dissolved oxygen standard primarily affects waters below the American Falls Dam and Reservoir.

According to Robert Burd, director of EPA's District 10 water programs, "Idaho has 90 days to enact new regulations, conforming with the federal Clean Water Act. If Idaho does not conform to the act's provisions, then the EPA will begin the process to establish new standards, he said.

But Sen. Reed Budge, R-Soda Springs, the senate pro tem, lashed out at the federal agency for what he said was "a serious violation of state's rights."

"I think the Legislature, to retain its autonomy, has no alternative but to resist this," Budge said.

"This gets back to the basic question of state's rights. We're darned tired of having the federal government telling us what to do. It's nothing more than illegal

blackmail. I'll be talking to the Attorney General about this. If it's possible to fight this in the courts, I will recommend the Legislature do that. I'll make every effort I can do fight this in the courts."

Attorney General David Leroy told the Times-News that at Budge's request he will meet with legislative leaders within the next two weeks to discuss possible courses of legal action. Traditionally, states are prohibited from instituting suits against the federal government, but there are numerous exceptions to that general rule, Leroy said.

State Sen. John Barker, R-Buhl, president of the American Falls Reservoir District, said little EPA action would begin until the end of the 90-day period. The Legislature would meet soon after that, he said, and would consider whether to respond to the EPA action.

According to Burd, if Idaho takes no action in 90 days, the EPA would then publish proposed new standards in the Federal Register. Public meetings would

then be held on those standards, and public input would be considered in drafting the final version of the new rules.

If Idaho should still resist the new standards, Burd said, EPA would use two methods to enforce compliance.

All Indian Creek water discharge permits are required from the EPA, Burd said. The ammonia allowed to be discharged under those permits would be geared to federal, not state, standards, he said.

While the EPA doesn't license the American Falls Dam, that dam does have a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license, Burd said. "We would expect that other arm of the federal government, another federal agency would enforce the rule."

The oxygen level at the American Falls site could be increased by installing oxygen injection equipment or releasing additional water at the dam. The cost of the injection equipment has been estimated between \$1.1 and \$1.3 million.

## Only 1 man arraigned in shooting

**GOODING** — One man was arraigned in 5th District Magistrate Court Friday in connection with a Wednesday night shooting in Bliss.

Another man is being held as a material witness in the case.

Wayne W. Hatch, 46, of Gordon, Neb., was in the Gooding County Jail Friday night in lieu of \$25,000 bond. He was arraigned before Judge Philip Decker on a charge of assault with intent to commit murder. He requested the services of the public defender and a preliminary hearing is tentatively set for 9:30 a.m. Sept. 4.

Hatch was arrested with Cecil T. Redding, 41, of Wevoka, Okla., shortly after Cecil Nelson, 43, of Little Rock, Ark., was pushed from a van on Interstate Highway 84 two miles east of Bliss.

Nelson had five bullet wounds in the chest and arm and was taken to St. Benedict's Hospital in Jerome. Hospital officials said Friday evening his condition was stable, and that he has improved. He remained in the hospital critical care unit.

Gooding County Prosecutor Severd Swanson Jr. said the only formal charge made in Gooding County is against

Hatch. He said officers investigating the case apparently determined Redding was not responsible for the shooting and should not be charged. Redding is being held in Gooding County Jail under \$3,000 bond as a material witness in the case, according to a prepared release issued Friday by Sheriff Robert Aja.

The two men were arrested about an hour after Nelson was left on the highway along with three hitchhikers who were not harmed. Gooding County officers were notified about 6:20 p.m. Wednesday by a truck driver who was flagged down by the hitchhikers and used his CB radio to call for assistance.

Hatch also faces charges of driving while intoxicated. State police said Hatch, Redding and Nelson were traveling together. No motives have been given in the shooting.

## All-Texas tilt spices slate

Now that Tony Dorsett has renegotiated a contract with Dallas that places him among the top salaried players in the NFL, the Cowboys can concentrate on winning their third Super Bowl title.

Dallas relinquished almost as many points on defense (30) as it picked up on the scoreboard (36) in its first two exhibition games, but Coach Tom Landry expects more potency on offense now that he has a satisfied Dorsett.

The unofficial pro football exhibition tilts of Texas is at stake Saturday night when Dallas takes on the Houston Oilers in one of 12 NFL games scheduled that evening. The Cowboys are 2-0 in pre-season play while the Oilers have a 1-1 mark.

Dallas is plagued by defensive injuries and Landry may have to juggle his lineup to stop an Oiler rush. Free safety Randy Hughes has a dislocated shoulder. Another safety star, Charlie Waters, is trying to make it back after missing last year with a knee problem. On offense, guard Herb Scott injured his right knee and ankle last week and won't be available for the Houston game.

Most of the remaining weekend action takes place in the 11 other night games Saturday. Atlanta is at San Diego, Cincinnati at Tampa Bay, Cleveland at Chicago, Green Bay at Buffalo, Kansas City at St. Louis, Los Angeles at Denver, Minnesota at Miami, New Orleans at Detroit, New York Jets at Pittsburgh, Oakland at Washington and Seattle at San Francisco.

Seven of the league's 28 teams have perfect 2-0 records, with the most strength concentrated in the NFC's Eastern Division where Dallas, Philadelphia and Washington boast unblemished slates. Others are Miami, Pittsburgh, Kansas City and San Francisco.

The San Francisco 49ers, 8-6 in regular season play last year, could be the surprise of the NFC West. Their two young quarterbacks, Steve DeBerg and Joe Montana, steered the club to victories over West Coast opponents Oakland and San Diego this month. Coach Bill Walsh is pleased with their output.

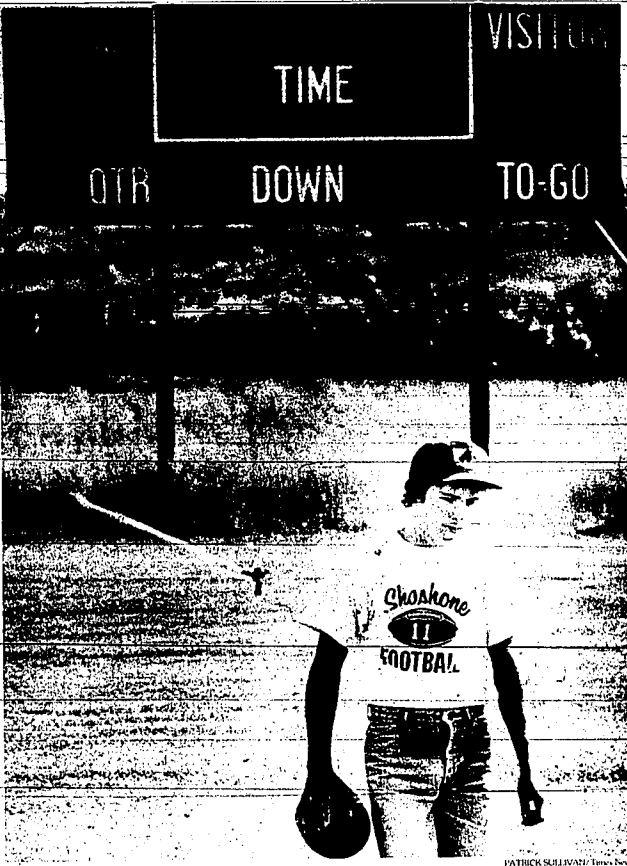
"DeBerg is still the team's No. 1 quarterback, but Montana is a definite factor in our plans for the 1980 season," says Walsh. "Now we are a competitive team, which is what we are hoping for this year. A year ago we were not."

Miami has a potent offense for its game with Minnesota as running back Devin Williams goes into high gear and rookie quarterback David Woodley, out of LSU, continues to impress coach Don Shula.

Williams rushed for 703 yards last year, a huge drop from the 1,258 he amassed in 1978, but won't apologize for this shortcoming.

"You've got to look at things as a whole," Williams says candidly. "I was productive in 1978 because our offense was productive. As the offense goes, I go. I'm no better than the offense. It's different than on defense where one man can make the play."

Woodley is only the Dolphins' No. 4 quarterback, yet his eight for 10 passing against Detroit found extreme favor with Shula.

## Shoshone drops football

SHOSHONE — A dozen Shoshone High football players charged into the locker room with vigor the opposition any minute.

Less than an hour after practice ended the Shoshone School Board, understandably, took the 1980 season away from the would-be team.

"I played six-man football, 11-man football and college football and I never ever thought I'd make a motion to drop football," board member Lynn Williams said before making a motion to drop the varsity program.

Shoshone Coach Larry Bond had 20 players report for their first practice last week but dropouts and injuries whittled the number actually practicing to as few as eight Wednesday night. Friday's drills attracted 12 but the school board had scheduled a special meeting to discuss the situation.

"We have two choices," Superintendent Ken Crothers said late in the hour-long meeting. "We can break our contracts for the (time) games and hope the schools don't collect the fines (a possible \$500 per game) or we can drop football for the season."

The Idaho Interscholastic Activities Association bylaws say a team breaking a contract with another school for a varsity game can be fined three times that school's annual membership fee to the association. If the opposing schools decided to collect, the Shoshone School Board could have faced a \$5,400 loss or, if it decided not to pay, a two-year suspension from the association.

The board members were considering some options, one of which included not playing the schedule of 11-man games and trying to obtain a few eight-man games.

While money was a problem, the main concern of

the board appeared to be the physical health of the 16-17 players who were still out for the team Friday.

"I want you to play and I love the game, but I have to look at it realistically," Bond said. "We can't even scrimmage ourselves when we have 10 to 12 players at that situation. Fifty percent of those kids do not have any game experience and kids could get hurt in that situation."

The board approved a motion to drop its nine scheduled games but continue with a full junior high program and allow any and all senior high players to practice.

Bond, his voice cracking with emotion, told the players in the locker room 10 minutes after the board meeting.

"Life is not one big jet ride," he said. "You guys are old enough to know what is going on. Let's not fool ourselves, we have to live in reality."

Tears came from the players even before he could say, "we're not going to play."

The team, visibly shook by their hopes going sour, talked of recruiting some other students by Monday in order to play. Bond told them that the board had gone through a list of each boy in high school and tried to determine if any would come out and stay on the squad. The most they figured might do that was two and they didn't consider it enough to go ahead with the schedule.

"At least there is some chance," Rusty Warbis, a big junior fullback said. "Maybe this will shock some of the kids into coming out."

Bond said he felt the biggest question would be how the students react to having football wiped out.

"I think the team will react well," the coach from Oklahoma said. "I sure hope they do and hope they will come, stick to the training rules and stay out of trouble."

"It's pretty rough, especially on the seniors," Warbis said. "It sure is a heck-of-a-way-to-start-the-year. What is homecoming going to be like?"

School starts Monday.

## DeBartolo buys Sox, eyes move

BOSSIER CITY, La. (UPI) — The man in charge of the DeBartolo sports empire said Friday immediate plans call for Edward DeBartolo Sr. to keep the White Sox in Chicago — but a future move to the Superdome in New Orleans cannot be ruled out.

"The DeBartolo Corp. is buying the thing, lock, stock and barrel," said Vincent Bartimo. "They anticipate keeping it in Chicago and they plan on keeping it in Chicago, but all the options are open to them."

Bartimo refused to divulge the price paid by DeBartolo and his daughter, Marie-Denise, but he said there were "no restrictions on the purchase."

### A sale imminent?

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — Charles O. Finley, owner of the Oakland A's, has scheduled a news conference for Saturday at 10 a.m. at the Coliseum.

The Oakland Tribune, in Friday's editions, speculated that a sale of the baseball team may be announced. The newspaper said Oakland businessman Cornell Maier and American League President Lee MacPhail were expected to attend the news conference.

DeBartolo Sr. also owns the NHL Pittsburgh Penguins and Louisiana Downs racetrack in Bossier City. The Louisiana track will be the site of a \$300-million "Superdome" Oct. 1, which is expected to include Genuine Risk and Temperance Hill. Edward DeBartolo Jr. is the owner of the NFL San Francisco 49ers.

Bartimo is president of Louisiana Downs and the overall supervisor of the DeBartolo sports holdings. He and DeBartolo Sr. and his daughter would take ownership of the White Sox Nov. 1, after the close of the 1980 season, if the American League team's 47 stockholders approve the purchase in the next 10 days. Asked whether the team would remain in Chicago for 1981, he said discussions were held with Trean's commissioner of administration, E.L. "Bubba" Henry, but the administration made no response.

Superdome manager Deniz Skinner was not available, but one of his assistants said he was surprised to hear the White Sox had been sold to DeBartolo.

## Stadler grabs tourney lead

AKRON, Ohio (UPI) — Craig Stadler shot a 2-under-par 69 Friday on the water-logged Flossmoor Country Club course to grab the second round lead in the \$400,000 World Series of Golf.

Stadler, who was three shots off the pace of first round leader Tom Watson when the second round began, has a 36-hole score of 135 for a one-stroke margin over Ben Crenshaw and Jerry Pate, who tied a World Series of Golf one-round record with a 6-under-par 64 to go with his opening round 72. Crenshaw had a 69 on Friday.

Defending champion Lon Hinkle, who also had a second round 69, and Ray Floyd, who came in with a 68, were tied for fourth place at Flossmoor with Lee Trevino and Mike Reid at 138 and four players, Howard Twitty, Bruce Lietzke, Gary Player and Bob Glider, at 139.

Stadler, a former U.S. Amateur champion who qualified for this year's WSG as a multiple winner by finishing third in the Hope Desert and the Greater Greensboro Open, his only two wins since turning professional in 1976, birdied the second and ninth holes on the front side of the 1,173-yard Flossmoor Course and then struck nine straight pars on the back side.

Because of heavy rainfall the last several days which made the course extremely soggy and muddy, tournament officials put the preferred lie rule into effect for the second round, giving the players the opportunity to both clean mud from their golf balls and drop away from any casual water in the fairway.

"It turns us to play under those rules," said Clyde Mangum, deputy commissioner of the PGA, "but we felt it was the only equitable thing to do. A decision on what we do tomorrow will be made in the morning after we have a look at the golf course."

Pate, who was seven shots off the pace when the day began, had seven birdies on the day in putting together a pair of 32s to shoot himself into contention. He had only one bogey during the round, coming when he missed the 24-yard, par-3 fifth hole to the right of the green.

"After a 72 yesterday," said Pate, "I was either short a good round or go home. I've had some good rounds here, including a 65 last year, but I've had mostly bad rounds. It's a tough golf course."

## Gomez retains boxing crown

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — World Boxing Council super bantamweight champion Wilfredo Gomez successfully defended his title for the 12th time Friday night, pounding his way to a technical knockout over Derrick Holmes at 2:29 of the fifth round.

Gomez put Holmes on the canvas eight times in running his record to a remarkable 30-0-1, all the victories coming by knockout.

The champion sent Holmes down five times in the fourth round and opened the fifth with a flurry of rights and combinations, finally putting the challenger down for good with a stinging right cross.

Holmes, from New Carrollton, Md., won the second round, scoring well with right hands. Holmes also opened well in the third round, scoring again with right hands, but Gomez slugged the challenger to the canvas with a vicious body attack and Holmes took a count of seven.

In the fourth, Gomez scored with left leads and landed virtually all with left jabbing punches five times to set up the fifth and final round of the scheduled 15-rounder at Caesars Palace.

Holmes, who retired from boxing after he lost in the finals of the 1976 Olympic Trials and turned pro partly on Gomez's advice, went into the bout with a record of 14-0-1, 10 by knockout.

Gomez, of Santurce, P.R., said after the fight he is eyeing WBC featherweight champion Salvador Sanchez of Mexico for a possible title shot later this year.

## Ovett misses mile record

BRUSSELS (UPI) — Steve Ovett of Britain failed in his announced bid to improve his one-mile world record Friday, but still came home a winner in 3:16 and received a standing ovation from a crowd of 50,000 for his performance in adverse weather conditions.

Ovett's time was almost three seconds slower than his world mark of 3:48.8. John Walby of New Zealand and Steve Scott of the United States finished neck and neck behind him in 3:52.7.
