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## Mt. St. Helens puffs on eve of eruption anniversary

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UPI) — Clouds obscured a short steam burst above Mount St. Helens Sunday on the eve of the first anniversary of the volcano's deadly eruption.

At 8:32 a.m. on May 18, 1980, the reawakened but silent volcano exploded with two violent earthquakes that ruptured the summit and set off a huge landslide from its bulging north flank.

Lateral and vertical blasts exploded with the force 500 times the power of the bomb that leveled Hiroshima, decimating a cubic mile of mountain, flattening hundreds of square miles of forests and sending gritty white ash circling the globe.

A hot pyroclastic flow spilled out of the volcano's

new 1.5-mile-wide, half-mile-deep crater down the north flank into Spirit Lake, burying at least two scientists on the volcano's slopes and Harry R. Truman, 83, the cantankerous lodge owner who refused to leave "my mountain."

A wall of mud, trees and volcanic debris cascaded down the north flank, wiping out a logging camp, home to 100 workers, flooding towns and clogging a major water channel in the Columbia River.

Choking ashfall blanketed a swath to the east extending 100 miles, stranding travelers for days and grinding up cars and farm machinery.

A year later wind still kicks up ash in eastern Washington and steam rises almost daily from the

mountain, which has been scarred by five additional explosive eruptions and altered by weather and several "lava dome" growth periods in its crater that eventually may build a new summit.

A short, 13-minute seismic signal detected at 5:50 a.m. Sunday at the University of Washington in Seattle indicated a steam plume was apparently rising from the peak, but otherwise geologists said Mount St. Helens was "very quiet."

Forest Service pilots were unable to get a clear view of the peak as a storm brought clouds from the Pacific Ocean.

A weekend-of-celebration took place in several towns in southwest Washington. There was a carnival

in Toutle and Castle Rock. On Saturday, parades, "fogathons", Western bands and fairs highlighted anniversary celebration of the big blow.

In Toutle, 20 miles west of Spirit Lake, things began at the edge of a road washed away a year ago when floodwaters rushed down on the town. There, in front of a backdrop of devastation, floats assembled for the Volcano Daze Festival parade.

Across Interstate 5 at Castle Rock, where several homes were buried in mud a year ago, the day went much the same. Hundreds of people lined the streets for Volcano Days to watch dozens of bands, floats, clowns and horses glide by shops.

## Talk wins cheers

### Reagan takes upbeat stand

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI) — President Reagan addressed a wildly cheering crowd at commencement exercises Sunday at Notre Dame University, calling communism a sad chapter of history and promising graduates "opportunities beyond anything we've ever known."

Security was heavy throughout the president's first working trip since he was shot by a would-be assassin seven weeks ago. Several hundred protesters and demonstrators were kept at a distance. Even the traveling White House reporters were required to use a separate entrance and were kept too far away for shouted questions.

The president was warmly welcomed by crowds at the airport and at the Notre Dame Athletic and Convocation Center Arena where some 12,500 graduating students and their families roared lustily in a standing ovation.

It was a day filled with nostalgia for Reagan, who once created for the movies the role of Notre Dame football immortal George Gipp.

Also on hand to lighten the memories was actor Pat O'Brien, who played the indomitable football coach of "The Fighting Irish" in that same 1940 film, "Kathie Rocks — All American."

Police said security was double that given Jimmy Carter when he made a similar appearance in 1977, also making a commencement address and like Reagan, receiving an honorary doctor of laws degree.

Reagan, defending American values and making a time-honored call for leadership from the nearly 2,000 graduates in the university's 136th commencement, declared:

"It is time the world knew that our intellectual and spiritual values are rooted in the source of all real strength — a belief in a Supreme Being, a law higher than our own," said Reagan.

# Israel gives U.S. diplomat more time to work

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Israel's Cabinet unanimously agreed Sunday to give U.S. presidential envoy Philip Habib as much time as necessary to reach a "peaceful solution" to the missile crisis with Syria.

In Riyadh, Saudi Arabian officials met with Habib and later dispatched a special envoy to Damascus reportedly to urge restraint on the Syrians and to offer economic aid as an added inducement for peace.

"As long as there is a spark of hope to solve the crisis by diplomatic means, Israel will pursue that spark — and it still exists," Deputy Defense

Minister Mordechai Zippori said after the Cabinet vote.

In Alexandria, Egyptian President Anwar Sadat gave the first official indication his country would be neutral in the event of a war over the missile crisis, saying "whatever may happen between Syria and Israel, peace between Egypt and the Jewish state is a firm reality."

The Saudis announced their full support for the presence of Syrian troops in Lebanon and denounced "Israeli provocations," according to the state-run Damascus radio, an allusion to Israeli threats to destroy the Syrian anti-aircraft SAM missiles

if they are not removed from Lebanon's Bekaa valley.

Israel contends the missiles constitute a threat to its aircraft, which frequently fly over Lebanon, Syria says the Israelis have no right to overfly Lebanese airspace.

Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin, sounding more dovish than he has in days, said the Cabinet in its unanimous vote had "set no time limit whatsoever" on Habib's efforts.

"We just enabled him to continue the diplomatic efforts because we don't want war," he said. "We want a peaceful solution."

Begin said Habib's plan was to fly to

Damascus today and return to Israel either tonight or Tuesday.

Saudi officials met with Habib Saturday and Sunday, and unexpectedly sent the deputy commander of the Saudi national guard, Sheikh Abdel Aziz Tuwejary, to Damascus with a special message for President Hafez Assad from King Khalid, the official Saudi Press Agency said.

The contents of the message were not divulged. However, analysis said Saudi Arabia was thought to be urging the Syrians to use restraint in dealing with Israel on the missile question.

They suggested Saudi Arabia may be considering an offer of some sort of

financial aid to Syria, which is in serious economic difficulty, as part of an overall solution to the present problem.

"The kingdom wishes to reiterate its full support for the legitimate Lebanese government and the Syrian troops in Lebanon against the Zionists expansionist and occupationist schemes," the Saudi Foreign Ministry said in a statement.

In the Lebanese capital of Beirut, the worst fighting in a week erupted, with shells showering on both Christian east and Muslim west sections of the city through Saturday night and continuing through Sunday morning.

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## Western severance tax may bring next fight

DENVER (UPI) — The Western Governors' Policy Organization has named a steering committee to find the best way to keep Congress from trying to wipe out state authority to tax mineral development.

Governors meeting here said education programs and lobbying of Congress could cost several hundred thousand dollars.

The governors have been concerned about legislation introduced in the current and previous session of Congress limiting the authority of states to levy taxes on extraction of minerals.

"Those bills take away prerogatives of the states," said WESPO's chairman, Wyoming Gov. Ed Herschler. "Secondly, what we're concerned with is the impact of

industrial development in our states. We need this revenue for public services."

Wyoming's tax on coal totals 17 percent. If property taxes are included along with the severance tax levy of 10.5 percent, Montana's severance tax is 30 percent, and it is now undergoing a legal test before the U.S. Supreme Court. Colorado taxes mineral development at 3.9 percent.

Herschler and Gov. Richard Lamm of Colorado were joined by Govs. Jay Hammond of Alaska, Charles Thone of Nebraska, Scott Matheson of Utah and Bruce King of New Mexico. Gov. Ted Schwinden of Montana joined by telephone.

The other WESPO member states are Idaho, Arizona, Nevada and the Dakotas.

## Evans ponders kidnap attempt

### Politics vs. dangers to family

BURLEY (UPI) — The son of Gov. John Evans saved from an attempted kidnaping by his wife's heroics, said Sunday he wonders if a political career is compensation enough for the possible danger to one's family.

"I wonder if politics are really worth it," said John Evans Jr., 25. "It could affect a lot of good people, maybe keep them from getting into politics for concern for the safety of their families."

His wife, Karen, who scrambled out a bedroom window and called police after she heard the alleged kidnapers talking in the living room, was scheduled for another medical examination today. There was concern that Friday's events threatened her pregnancy, now in its sixth month.

Three young men suspected in the Friday confrontation face as much as two weeks of solitary confinement in the Cassia County Jail before a preliminary hearing.

Bryan O. Spurgeon, 22, Charles T. Lopez, 21, and Russell M. Piper, 19, each were held in lieu of \$100,000

bond, charged with first-degree kidnaping, first-degree burglary, aggravated assault and using a firearm while committing a felony.

The governor's son said tension was subsiding in his home and he planned to return to work today at the bank he manages.

Although investigators declined to speculate about the motive for the attempted abduction, Evans said he was nagged by thoughts that he may have been targeted because he is the governor's son.

He said his father, who continued his regular schedule Saturday by speaking at graduation ceremonies around the state, shared his concern.

"I know it's put pressure on him," the son said. "He's concerned for his family. He's like I am — I wish we knew what the motive was behind it."

"I know he's concerned, I've seen him on TV and I can see the concern in his eyes and his concern for my children. He wonders if that (his political status) had anything to do with the confrontation."

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# Poles rally against terror; cardinal remains near death

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — Thousands of Poles rallied Sunday against terrorism, marching through the streets of the city where Pope John Paul II once served as cardinal.

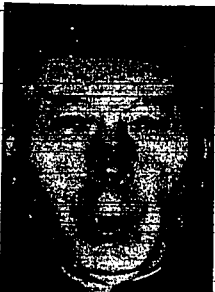
There were prayers nationwide for the pope and for ailing Polish primate Cardinal Stefan Wysyzinski, who received the last rites Saturday. The Polish Episcopate issued a medical bulletin saying the 79-year-old cardinal's condition had shown "no major changes" in the past few days.

But the officiating priest on the nationally broadcast mass told the faithful not to pray for Wysyzinski's recovery but for the easing of his suffering.

Referring to the grave condition of the cardinal and the ailing pope, Solidarity union leader Lech Walesa told reporters as he returned from a week-long visit to Japan. "Everything is in God's hands."

For the second day, a mass demonstration was staged to protest terrorism in the wake of Wednesday's shooting of John Paul.

Thousands of people in Krakow, the southern city where the pope was cardinal before being elected to the papacy, joined in a student-organized "White March" through the city beginning at the spot where the pope

celebrated mass for Krakow citizens two years ago.

"This march is a protest against pain and violence. It is a demonstration of support for peace and humane ideas," the official news agency PAP said.

The march culminated with an open air mass for Wysyzinski, celebrated by

Cardinal Franciszek Macharski. Other mass student rallies were also held in the cities of Lodz and Rzeszow.

On Saturday, scores of thousands in Gdansk took part in anti-terrorist ceremonies. Among those participating were the city's mayor, the director of Lenin Shipyard, Solidarity officials and priests.

Reflecting the sense of national unity felt after the attack on the pope, the crowd laid wreaths at the three crucifix monument marking the deaths of scores of workers shot by police and soldiers during bloody food-price riots on the coast in 1970.

The medical bulletin on the cardinal said, "There have been no major changes in the health condition of the primate in the past few days." It said he "was affected by a heart disorder" on Thursday but that was easily treated.

"The primate is being treated at home, by his own request, by a team of specialists. Conditions of intensive therapy for the monitoring of the cardinal's condition, and permanent physician duty have been established," it said.

Solidarity sources said Walesa, who was in Gdansk, directly from Warsaw airport, sent a personal note to Wysyzinski.

# Japan's new foreign minister lashes U.S.

TOKYO (UPI) — Newly appointed Foreign Minister Sunao Sonoda criticized the U.S. Navy Sunday for its involvement in accidents with Japanese ships and said the incidents would not be settled by "simply paying compensation."

Sonoda made his remarks a day after he took over Japan's top foreign relations post from Masayoshi Ito, who unexpectedly resigned Saturday over the degree of U.S.-Japanese military cooperation.

The resignation sparked a public uproar in which politicians within the ruling party and the mass media questioned the leadership of Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki, who took office last July.

The nation's largest daily newspaper, Yomiuri Shimbun, said a "major cause" of the dispute was because Suzuki "lacked understanding of international diplomacy."

Stunned by the sudden departure of Ito, Suzuki appointed Sonoda, who had served as foreign minister in two previous Cabinets, in a bid to carry on Japan's diplomatic initiatives as smoothly as possible.

But in his first news conference Sonoda again raised sensitive U.S.-Japanese defense matters and particularly denounced maritime accidents involving the U.S. Navy in Japanese waters.

But the new foreign minister stopped short of criticizing the scheduled 12-day joint exercises by the U.S. 7th fleet and Japanese self-defense forces.

# British defense cuts beach navy

LONDON (UPI) — Britain has drawn up drastic plans to slash defense spending to the point where its navy will have only 15 surface ships.

In addition, British NATO forces in West Germany will be cut by 10,000 men, defense sources said Sunday.

The \$21 billion proposed defense cuts might go even further than those widely leaked in British newspapers Sunday, the sources said. They would mean Britain would scrap four out of every five of its 56-ship surface navy which has been the bulwark of its defense since the defeat of the Spanish Armada in 1588.

The proposals, part of the government's attack on public spending, were expected to run into fierce opposition from many of Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's own Conservative Party members as well as NATO planners.

The cuts would undermine at least two of NATO's principal defense planks — the defense of West Germany and protection of Atlantic sea lanes for the resupply of Europe in case of war.

Defense sources said the cuts called for a quarter of Britain's 55,000-strong army in West Germany to be recalled

and perhaps disbanded — a breach of Britain's North Atlantic Treaty Organization commitment.

"But the navy will bear the brunt of the cuts," one well-placed source in the Ministry of Defense said. "Almost half of all the navy's officers and men would be retired and its surface ships reduced to 15 — all to finance the Trident missile submarine deterrent."

The American-made Trident — a new submarine-launched missile to replace the aging Polaris — will cost Britain about \$12.6 billion.

# American priests, nuns may return

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (UPI) — Acting Archbishop of San Salvador Arturo Rivera y Damas said Sunday six U.S. Maryknoll priests and nuns who fled El Salvador expect to return in June if the government will insure their "physical integrity."

The Ossinger, N.Y.-based Maryknoll order has been the focus of controversy since Roy Bourgeois, 42, a Maryknoll priest from Chicago, disappeared April 25 for 10 days to meet Salvadoran rebels, prompting concerns he had been killed by a right death squad.

The six remaining members of the Maryknoll order left El Salvador immediately after Bourgeois' disappearance.

Rivera y Damas said the Maryknolls, who according to their superiors have left El Salvador "to reflect on their role in the country," also want government guarantees they can continue missionary work without interference.

The archbishop said the six priests and nuns would return June 9 or 10, but only if the government promised to insure their "physical integrity."

A newspaper ad published over the weekend, however, urged the government to expel the order "in the face of repeated interventions by ... Maryknolls in support of (leftist) groups that are causing so much pain, death, and destruction."

The order first grabbed headlines in

El Salvador when two Maryknoll nuns were shot and killed along with two other American churchwomen Dec. 2. Six Salvadoran soldiers are jailed in connection with the case.

At least 20 leftist guerrilla fighters pinned down government forces with gunfire from hills outside Chalatenango, a provincial capital 45 miles north of San Salvador, a local military commander said.

The morning attack came just 12 hours after an underarmed number of rebels launched a two-hour gun-battle against a combined force of regular army and National Guard troops at the city's military garrison, the commander said.

There was no word on casualties.

PEKING (UPI) — China claimed Sunday to have killed more than 150 Vietnamese troops and repulsed the biggest border invasion since the 1979 war but Vietnam charged the Chinese with trying to "sharpen tension" in Southeast Asia.

The Chinese battle report also claimed the defeated Vietnamese were regrouping "for an even bigger invasion" against Paksakan, a heavily guarded mountain outpost in Guangxi's Ningming county.

# Launch set Friday

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — Scientists geared up Sunday to take India's space program out of the experimental stage for the first time with the launching of a rocket carrying a sophisticated camera-equipped satellite.

"All the ground checks were successful and we are keeping our fingers crossed" for a Friday blast off, said vehicle director M. Dev.

The 72-foot, four-stage solid-fueled "SLV-3" rocket will shoot a "Rohini" satellite into orbit for 300 days.

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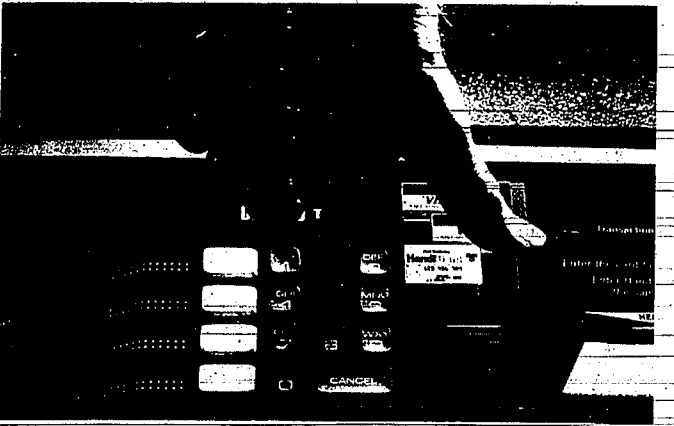
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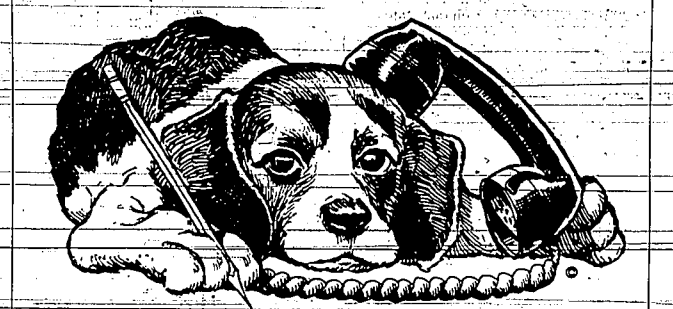

## Goal eludes man in Illinois prison

CHICAGO (UPI) — James Pangburn, inmate N-11447 at the Joliet Correctional Center, had a modest goal which he explained in a note to his fiancée in the final hours of his life: "to get out of this place alive."

He failed to achieve the goal.

A short time after writing the letter, Pangburn, 21, who had been sentenced to the maximum security prison for burglary and parole-violation, was found hanged from the bunk in his prescriptive custody cell.

Officials said Pangburn, a ninth grade dropout and divorced, apparently was a suicide victim. His mother, Helen, believes otherwise.

"We all felt he was murdered," she said.

Pangburn left no suicide notes in the stark century-old cell. But doctors, cutting open his stomach in an autopsy, recovered his last message on two notes he swallowed just before his death.

The tall, fair-haired inmate from Rockford, Ill., spent just seven days in the prison. He blamed insensitive guards and The Disciples, a Chicago street gang, for his death.

"Disciples (sic) had keys to doors... police guards killed me," he said.

Officials in the State Department of Corrections in Chicago refused to comment on the death, saying only an investigation was in progress.

But family members, friends and fellow inmates described him as a desperate man, who had no business being in the prison and who fell victim to repeated sexual assaults.

"I'll kill myself before I let them kill me," the coroner's report quoted him saying to one inmate.

On April 28, the day of his death, Pangburn wrote a letter to his 19-year-old fiancée, Colleen Morgan, which said in part:

"All I want is you and to get out of this place alive. I hope I can get out of here before they kill me."

"I have eight galleries (tiers) after me in this place because I told the guards that some people in here were going to shank (stab) me... they moved me three times... there's a contract on me."

Members of his family believe he was murdered.

"Jimmy just wasn't the type to give up on life," said his sister, Vickie.

Said his older brother, Richard, "I was just like a young kid. And he had a heart of gold."

Pangburn was sentenced in April, 1979, to 30 months probation for burglary. He later spent 90 days in a work-release program for violating probation by possessing marijuana.

Last Dec. 7, he was charged with violating probation a second time by attempting to steal welding equipment. He was sentenced to one year in prison and arrived at Joliet April 21.

## Response touches tormented teacher

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — A blind math teacher who was tormented by her students and now faces dismissal said Sunday she is touched by the overwhelming public response.

"I'm stunned," said Ceinwen King-Smith, 35, who has been blind since birth. "Why should anyone else (care?) I am having a problem keeping my job, so what?"

Mrs. King-Smith has received a flood of sympathetic letters and phone calls from around the nation since Sunday's story — last week of students pelting her with paper balls, stealing from her purse and tying her shoe laces together in class.

"Because of the disciplinary problems," Mrs. King-Smith was suspended with pay last month, pending a June 4 hearing on her dismissal.

"I went into tears reading about her," said a Tallahassee, Fla., former teacher for the handicapped who phoned a local newspaper. "I can't believe a school district would evict a teacher in a suburb of Dallas after the students' treatment."

An aide to Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., who heads the Senate subcommittee for the handicapped, said his office is concerned about the case of the Phi Beta Kappa graduate of

Stanford University, who also has a master's in education from Harvard.

Mrs. King-Smith said she has agreed to talk on radio call-in shows in Philadelphia, Chicago and Washington.

School officials, for their part, are outraged over the flap.

"The whole student body and staff is upset because they have been unfairly attacked," said Eugene Khorey, principal of Brashear High School where Mrs. King-Smith taught.

"Sure we have a few bad eggs, like anywhere else, but she made all the students sound like animals. There isn't anyone in this building who didn't try to help her."

Mrs. King-Smith's attorney said the school district should provide a full-time aide to help her with disciplinary problems.

The school district's attorneys have declined comment because of the impending hearing, except to say the law does not require it to take such measures to help the handicapped teacher.

Mrs. King-Smith had to fight the district in and out of court for 12 years to secure her teaching position. She said she is hardly surprised by the district's desire to remove her.

"The board's position hasn't been supportive of me," she said.

## Urban 'goat roper,' girl seek wedding OK

IRVING, Texas (UPI) — It's a Texas love story of an 18-year-old "goat roper" urban cowboy and his 17-year-old girlfriend who live together but cannot marry even though their baby is due in July.

Faust Crouch and Robin Corallo have lived together in a suburb of Dallas since November. But Miss Corallo's father will not give his 17-year-old daughter permission to marry.

Miss Corallo filed suit last week in state district court, asking a judge to waive the parental consent statute required for minors so she can marry Crouch.

Although the two could marry when Miss Corallo becomes 18 in September, their baby is due in July and Miss Corallo would like to be Mrs. Crouch by then.

Crouch's mother has given her full blessing to the marriage.

"They're trying their hardest to do the right thing," she said. "He's got a full-time job."

She said Crouch's father, an aerospace engineer, "doesn't like my son because he's a goat roper. He wears Western clothes all the time and dips snuff. He's just a normal teenage goat roper."

Miss Corallo's father: "We're more of Texas than different classes. I'm not really a redneck. I lived in semi-upper middle-class and I guess

Paul lived in lower middle-class. I guess that's one of the main deals."

But they say it's true love, regardless of the class distinctions.

Miss Corallo's father, Sam, says his objection is one of age, nothing else.

"It doesn't matter if it was President Reagan's son," he said. "I wouldn't sign (the consent form) until she's 18."

## Cocaine shipment seized in Miami

MIAMI (UPI) — A shipment of 239 1/2 pounds of cocaine worth about \$38 million was spotted and seized Saturday night by a customs officer at Miami International Airport, but no arrests were made.

A customs spokesman said the cocaine was contained in 108 packages in two crates which were being unloaded from a plane that just arrived from Ecuador.

"Our officers observing a plane being unloaded became suspicious of how two large boxes were being handled," said customs spokesman Jim Dingleider. "He ordered the boxes put aside and when they were opened later, the cocaine wrapped in kilo packages was discovered inside."

## Michigan Indians face sale of buffalo herd

L'ANSE, Mich. (UPI) — Broken promise from Washington is again forcing the Upper Peninsula tribe to make a disappointing decision about its tiny but thriving buffalo herd.

And the chief of the Upper Peninsula tribe fears that the buffalo will no longer roam, but will all be reduced to steaks and chops.

The 23 buffalo are falling victim to federal budget cuts, which have forced the firing of seven buffalo herders who were paid by the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

"It's simple economics," said Fred Dakota, who heads the Keweenaw Bay Chippewa Tribal Council in L'Anse, explaining the CETA workers

are needed to make hay and keep an eye on the buffalo.

The herd began when a Stanwood, Mich., physician gave the tribe 12 buffalo in 1971. Although Chippewas have no historical connection to buffalo — the animals are not native to the Upper Peninsula — the herd has indeed thrived.

The tribe hoped to breed a larger herd to produce meat that would be sold at a campground-reservation complex near L'Anse. But federal aid

was refused and the project fizzled before it really began.

Last week, the 12-member tribal council placed ads in newspapers offering the buffalo for sale. A buyer has not yet been found. But Dakota fears the entire herd may be sold and slaughtered.

"We would prefer to be able to control their destiny," he said. "But with the economy so tight, you just can't keep up with the trilly things like a herd of buffalo."

## Bess Truman holds own, battles back

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Former first lady Bess Truman, 83, came back from lung, heart and kidney problems that struck following hip surgery, was lifted from her bed and placed in a wheelchair Sunday for the first time, doctors said.

Mrs. Truman, 86-year-old wife of late President S. Truman, was being moved to help fluids from collecting in her lungs, hospital officials said. A spokesman said she was placed in the wheelchair "two or three times" Sunday.

Her personal physician, Dr. Wallace Graham, said Mrs. Truman experienced her second straight restful night since a blood transfusion Friday. Graham credited the transfusion for the turnaround.

But Graham cautioned her condition was "still seriously, basically unchanged" on Saturday.

Graham reported Saturday that Mrs. Truman's lungs had cleared;

her temperature had returned to normal, and other vital signs had stabilized.

Mrs. Truman has been in the intensive care unit of Medical Research Center since she developed pneumonia in both lungs, reduced kidney registry May 7.

"We are still giving her diuretics to help her kidney output," Graham said Sunday.

Antibiotics to dispel the pneumonia and diuretics to combat her kidney problem were being administered through two tubes inserted into veins near her two shoulders because Mrs. Truman's arm veins were too fragile.

After examining Mrs. Truman to determine whether her fractured right hip was mending properly, Dr. Howard Ellefseth said the new hip ball fashioned of metal and glue is presenting no new problems.

Mrs. Truman fractured her hip in a fall from bed in her Independence home May 6.

## Big engine couldn't make it all way home

HEMATH FALLS, Ore. (UPI) — The steam engine that pulled the Freedom Train around the country during the bicentennial celebration couldn't puff or huff its way back to Portland, Ore., with its 450 passengers.

A diesel engine was pressed into service to complete the homeward journey Sunday.

A Southern Pacific representative said Engine 4449 developed a leak that was extinguishing the flames in the fire box and it would take a day to cool down the engine and six hours to make the repairs.

She said it was decided to use a diesel engine to complete the journey for the 15-passenger, steam-heating railroad buffs back to Portland from the California State Railroad Museum grand opening in Sacramento, Calif.

The Pacific Northwest chapter of the National Railway Historical Society and SP had joined in the run for the steam engine, which now features

bright orange and red sweeping stripes to replace the red, white and blue colors it had heading the Freedom Train.

Three hundred of those aboard paid fares to the society for the ride while the others were SP guests.

The steam engine, following its 10-day showing at the museum, was destined for the Brooklyn roundhouse in Portland for storage. The engine is owned by the City of Portland.

## Estate added up

LONDON (UPI) — The widow of Winston Churchill, Mrs. Clementine, said Sunday she had an estate in Britain valued at 289,709 pounds (\$607,120) gross, according to her will published Saturday.

Sonia Orwell died in December in Paris, where she moved four years ago. Her husband died in 1950.

# Stress, spastic colon linked

DEAR DR. LAMB — I saw your column about spastic colon in our paper. I have coped with a spastic colon for years and am still searching for a cure. My emotional state is stable, but it appears to have a direct influence on my bowel condition.

I read to have constipation for three days and then when I have a moment it is loose. I am a college student with academic pressures. I think my colon trouble is a response to internal tension rather than my having nervous shaking.

Could you send me your Health Letter on the spastic colon? I know my horrendous eating habits are the root of the problem, and a concerted effort to improve my bowel training and habit is essential in my situation.

DEAR READER — I am glad you realize that tension can be a part of the problem. Many people who have a spastic colon do very well except during periods of stress. The colon is very sensitive to our emotions. It flushes and pales and is a better indicator than our faces of our true emotions.

You can train the colon functions to a degree. Our bodies respond to training or regular habits. That is one reason we get hungry at specific times, not because we need food just then. In the same way, the rhythmic contractions of the colon can be trained. This is discussed more in The Health Letter No. 16-4, Spastic Colon, Irregularity and Constipation, that I am sending in response to your request. Others who want this issue can send 75 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it to me, in care of this newspaper, P.O. Box 1551, Radio City Station, New York, N.Y.

Many people don't realize that a spastic colon can cause loose movements, or what they call diarrhea, as well as hard, dry stools and constipation. Frequently people have both. The spasm that shuts off the colon and

stops movements is just another form of overactive muscular contractions that can also cause diarrhea.

Improving your eating habits may help a lot. Coffee and colas that contain caffeine, or tea, are hard on a sensitive colon. Caffeine makes nervous tension worse.

DEAR DR. LAMB — My husband and I have been happily married for several years but we have one problem. He falls to believe that I was a virgin when he married me because I didn't bleed when we first had sex. Every time we fight he brings this up. Is it possible to have sex for the first time without bleeding?

DEAR READER — Yes. Your husband's attitude reminds me of a tribal ritual. It was the custom in the village for the villagers to wait outside the bridal chamber until a bloody cloth was tossed from the window to prove the girl's virginity. When bleeding occurs it is because the hymen membrane tears. Sometimes this is unpleasant and a more

enlightened person might wonder if this is the best way to begin one of life's more important relationships. Sex, after all, should be a pleasurable experience for the female as well as the male.

Many active girls rupture the hymen early in life without any sexual experience. Others are born with a rudimentary hymen. In view of all the interest in tampons and toxic shock syndrome, it should also be mentioned that tampons may relax the vagina and result in less difficulty at the beginning of sexual activity. And inserts always pose the opportunity to rupture the hymen.

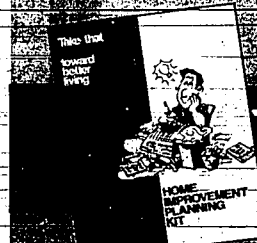

## No one applies for post

JEROME — A replacement has not been found for retiring 5th District Magistrate Court Judge Russell Shaud of Jerome.

"No one applied for the job," 5th District Magistrate Court Administrator Phillip Becker said Sunday.

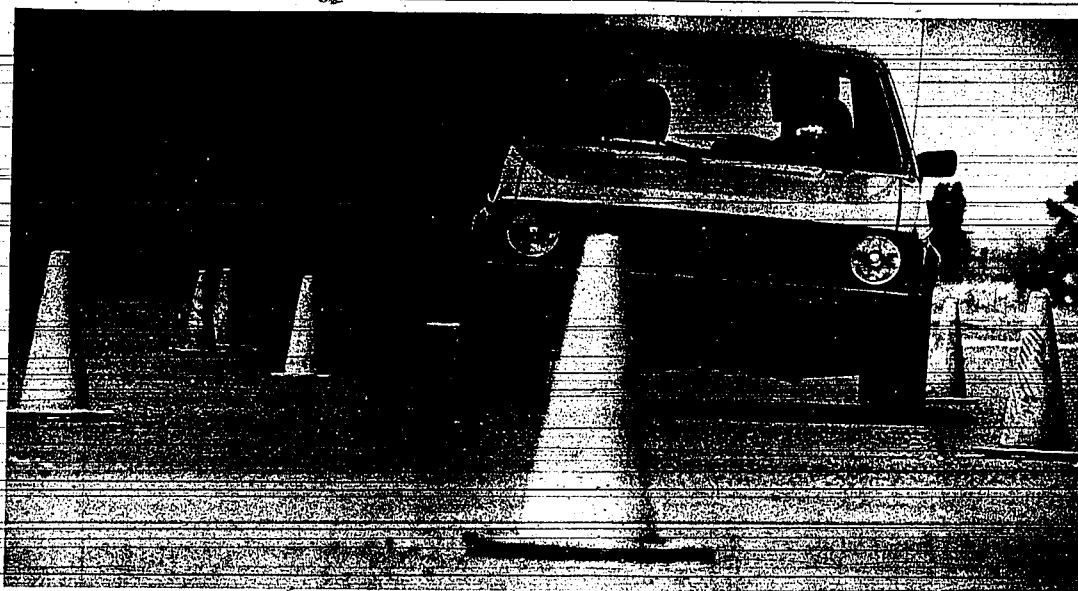
A replacement for Shaud, who retires June 1 after 20 years on the bench, was to have been named by the 5th District Magistrate Court Commission at least by the end of last week.

"Because there were no applicants for the widely advertised position, however, Becker said the position will have to be readvertised. The magistrate court commission is now scheduled to select a new judge July 23, Becker said."

When asked why he believes no one sought Shaud's position, Becker replied, "All the attorneys I talked to about the position told me, and quite frankly, that it didn't offer enough money."

The Jerome magistrate seat was advertised at an annual salary of \$30,000. Becker said it would be readvertised at \$32,500 with a salary hike possible the second year of service. Becker said, however, this salary offers little incentive for lawyers to leave higher paying private practices.

Meanwhile, Shaud's retirement will occur as scheduled next month, leaving the 5th District Magistrate Court somewhat short-handed, Becker said.

# 'Goodbye' coming soon for 4-party lines

TWIN FALLS—Proponents say a proposal to eliminate four-party telephone lines in the Mountain Bell service area would cost all phone users but improve the system.

The predominantly rural audience that attended a Public Utilities Commission hearing in Gooding last week unanimously favored the move. The only complaints came from party-line customers who had hoped to receive improved service earlier.

Responding to a PUC request, Mountain Bell wrote a proposal to extend private line coverage to all parts of its system by 1986, said company Vice President Frank Bromley. At the present rate of installing new cable, the task would not be completed until around the year 2000.

All customers would pay for speeding up the program because the utility would need to greatly increase its capital and manpower expenses during the five-year period, Bromley said.

Private-line customers presumably would benefit by reaching fewer busy signals when they dial friends and relatives on party lines, he noted.

A complicated rate schedule presented by the company would charge customers between 15 cents and \$1.50 a month more for the improvements by 1986. Customers in

remote areas would pay a larger share, while Boise metropolitan customers would pay the least.

Several Magic Valley communities, including Rupert, Filer, Hollister and Fairfield, are served by private telephone companies. Service in those areas would not be affected by the proposal.

New charges for Mountain Bell customers would be phased in over the five-year conversion period. Rates for business phone customers would remain roughly 2 1/2 times those for residential customers.

Martin Jensen, Mountain Bell manager of rates and tariffs, said the company probably would also request other rate increases to account for inflation in normal system costs. The increases listed apply only to system improvement costs.

Jensen said the utility would spend an additional \$16.6 million on cable and equipment installation during the five-year period.

According to a timetable presented by the company, rural customers in the Buhl area would have access to

new service in 1982. Work in the Jerome, Wendell and Glenns Ferry areas would be done in 1983; Burley, Gooding, Hagerman and Twin Falls by 1984; Bliss, Castleford, Eden-Hazelton, Ketchum and Shoshone by 1985; and Halley, Kimberly, Murtaugh, Oakley and Stanley by 1986.

The company would have preferred to work first in areas where demand for private lines has been greatest, said chief engineer Morgan Edwards. Jerome is one such area, he said, but the need for more equipment space there will delay the project a year.

When new service is completed to Jerome, customers there will have the option of purchasing additional services, said Ken Mann, Mountain Bell area district manager.

Options include a beep that signals a new call while another call is on the line; three-party conference calls and automatic call forwarding to an alternate number. Ketchum now has such a system, Mann said.

PUC Commissioner Conley Ward said he heard no opposition to the proposal during three previous hearings held in southern Idaho. Written comments on the proposal should be addressed to the Idaho Public Utilities Commission, Statehouse, Boise, Idaho 83722.

A PUC staff member said Thursday the commission will hold technical hearings in Boise and may rule on the proposal in June or July.

# Even magicians require practice

TWIN FALLS—At least once during every magician's performance, someone asks how the art of magic is done.

How the three different lengths of rope are made even with a wave of the hand.

Or how the coins disappear and then reappear where one would least expect.

Or how the rabbit comes out of the hat.

Magicians usually guard such knowledge as professional secrets.

But even magicians need to trade information, practice techniques and receive feedback.

That's where James E. Miller comes in.

A 63-year-old retired welder from Salt Lake City, Miller is vice president of the Northwest States region of the 6,000-member Society of American Magicians.

Besides visiting his son, James E. Miller, and grandson, Chad Miller, in Twin Falls, Miller also busied himself this weekend with setting up a local magicians organization here.

If he succeeds, the local group, called an assembly, would be the first of its kind in Idaho.

"I like to do magic and I like to help others in magic. That's why I'm here today because there's a lot of young people who are interested. It's a good trade. It's a good hobby for kids," he says. "It keeps their minds occupied. It keeps them thinking. I think it helps them

magic when, at the age of 14, he received several devices from his father, who sold such items to magicians.

From first learning to manipulate a half-dollar across his fingers, Miller has developed an act that includes producing a U.S. flag by placing three separate pieces of red, white and blue fabric in a box and retrieving a string of needles from his mouth. Usually that act has been used to benefit community organizations, hospitals and youthful magicians.

A demonstration of his talents went virtually unnoticed by Twin Falls magicians Saturday, something Miller believes was due to a last-minute series of newspaper classified advertisements.

But the meeting started momentum towards building a Twin Falls area assembly, says Paul Kevin Ives, a psychologist with the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare in Twin Falls.

Ives has apprenticed under Miller for about a year and has reached a point in his studies where meeting regularly with other magicians would be valuable.

Ives says he's studying magic in order to better understand how the human mind works and how it can be tricked, something magicians have known for years. In comparison, human perception is a relatively new area of study for psychologists, he said.

But the age-old magicians' code of retaining the tricks of the conjuring trade is something he already subscribes to.

"My feeling is not so much to reveal the tricks as to add to my knowledge," he said.

## Blackfoot man, 62, dies from injuries

HAILEY — A 62-year-old Blackfoot man died at Blaine County Hospital Sunday morning from injuries received in a Saturday-night car accident.

Paul Thompson died about 10:15 a.m. Sunday from multiple injuries received when he was thrown from a car in which he was a passenger which crashed off State Highway 75 south of Bellevue.

According to an Idaho State Police report, the driver of the late-model luxury car, Kay Arlene Monson, 30, also of Blackfoot, apparently overcorrected the vehicle after driving onto the road's gravel shoulder and then crashed head-on into an embankment.

The accident occurred just north of Timmerman Hill about 7:30 p.m. Saturday, police said. Monson was also transported to Blaine County Hospital where she was treated and released.

No other vehicles were involved in the accident and no citation has been issued.

# 'Trailside killer' suspect to be arraigned today

SANTA CRUZ, Calif. (UPI) — An ex-convict suspected of being the "trailside killer" of eight hikers and joggers in remote recreation areas will be arraigned today.

He will face one count of murder in the slaying of a University of California-Davis coed.

Daryl Gardner, 31, with a history of violent crimes and sex offenses dating back to 1947, was taken into custody at his parents' home in San Francisco Friday after being under surveillance for a week.

Gardner, an instructor at a Hayward, Calif., trade school, will appear before Judge Richard McAdams to be charged formally with the March 26 slaying of Ellen Hanson, 20, at Henry-Cowell-Recreation State Park.

## Deaths probe widens

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (UPI) — The body of a man who died at a Chino, Calif., hospital, a "high" will be exhumed today for autopsy.

That will bring still another hospital into a widening investigation of mysterious deaths earlier this year.

The body of Estel Lee Jones, who died at the age of 21 at Chino Community Hospital, will be exhumed from Forest Lawn Cemetery in Covina.

Authorities said he exhibited terminal symptoms similar to those of 27 patients who died in two Riverside County hospitals earlier.

As many as 10 Los Angeles area hospitals have been brought into the investigation because a male nurse who was questioned in the Riverside County deaths also worked at the facilities.

A Chino hospital official said the nurse, Robert Diaz, worked there as well.

Diaz, who has not been named as a suspect in any death, was the subject of an investigation and his home was searched by authorities.

He has filed a lawsuit against Riverside County officials seeking \$100 million for damaging his career. He has denied any responsibility for the deaths.

About a dozen bodies of persons who died at two rural hospitals near Riverside were exhumed and toxicological tests were being performed.

The coroner said the investigation spread to San Bernardino County and the Chino facility when a woman who worked at the community hospital called Riverside authorities about Jones' symptoms before he died.

San Bernardino County Coroner Bill Hill said tissue samples were to be taken today and an attempt will be made to find high concentrations of drugs, including Lidocaine, a medication used to control heart beat.

The investigation into the deaths was launched in Riverside County when more than two dozen elderly patients died suspiciously at Community Hospital of the Valleys in Perris and two more patients died at nearby San Geronimo Pass Hospital in Manning.

Community Hospital of the Valleys has since been closed pending results of autopsies on the bodies.

Point Reyes National Wilderness Area in Marin County just north of San Francisco. The first victim's body was found in August, 1979.

Authorities were led to Carpenter as a result of tips to a special Marin County sheriff's telephone hotline and Haertle's description as well as other sources.

As a result of Carpenter's arrest, police agencies in Daly City, San Francisco and San Jose intensified their investigations into the cases of two missing young women and the slaying of a third.

The Daly City police case involved high-school student and part-time bank teller Anna Menjivar, 17, who disappeared in December. Miss Men-

divar was acquainted with Carpenter who a week before she vanished took her to a warehouse where he gave her key chains and three ceramic dolls.

Homicide inspectors in San Francisco said they were investigating to determine whether Carpenter might have been involved in the October, 1979, slaying of Mary Bennett, 23, stabbed two times and buried in a shallow grave near the Legion of Honor.

Police in San Jose, about 25 miles east of Santa Cruz, were seeking to find out whether the suspect was involved in the May 2 disappearance of Heather Skaggs, 20, a coworker of Carpenter at the California Trade School.

Miss Skaggs disappeared the same day she had planned to meet Carpenter at a convenience market near her San Jose home.

Carpenter was placed in a four-hour lineup at the Santa Cruz County Jail Saturday. Deputies refused to discuss results of the procedure.

Carpenter's criminal record dates back to 1947 when, as a San Francisco high school student, he was arrested for sex offenses involving a 5-year-old child.

In 1950 he was arrested on a rape charge but was acquitted. Ten years later he was sent to a federal correctional facility for an attack on a woman in the Army's Presidio in San Francisco.

A short time after his release he was arrested for sexual assaults on women in Santa Cruz County, 75 miles south of San Francisco, and on kidnap and robbery charges in Calaveras County in the Sierra foothills.

Carpenter was married in 1955 and fathered three children.

A psychiatric profile, drawn up by prison officials, noted that, whenever Carpenter felt "hemmed in, with no way out, his sexual urge climbs and he only way he can think straight to make plans and act on them is to rape the nearest female."

It also noted he had a stuttering problem dating back to when he was 7 years old.

## Tot drowns in Boise ditch

BOISE (UPI) — Ada County authorities said an 18-month-old boy fell into an irrigation ditch and drowned Saturday evening.

The incident occurred about 7 p.m. near an Ada County residential suburb, deputies said. Rescue personnel attempted to revive Leaf Valentin, but he was pronounced dead at 8:30 p.m.

Investigators said the boy apparently stumbled into a ditch running behind his parents' home.

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## Boise dealership rebound forecast

BOISE (UPI) — The doors are reopening in Courtesie Chrysler-Plymouth, but owner Chuck Anderson predicts the troubled automaker will make a comeback in Boise.

Anderson said at the liquidation sale of his dealership Saturday that he expects to leave the building and sell Chrysler-Plymouth franchises to another dealer. He said believes a new dealer will take over within a few months.

Anderson attributed the demise of his dealership not to Chrysler Corp.'s change of product line. He said high interest rates made it difficult to carry a large inventory.
