#### Researchers probe black dropout rate

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — Researchers at six universities will take part in a five-year study to find out why black students are two to three times more likely to times more likely to drop out as white students — and what can be done about it.

University of Michigan sociologist Walter R. Allen, who is coordinating the study, said Monday the project will get under way next month at Arizona \_State, \_UCLA, \_Michigan, North Carolina, Memphis State and New York-Stony Brook.

Allen said previous studies of blacks enrolled in mostly white colleges have attempted to link the high dropout rate with such factors as the student's family background and nigh school grades or Scholastic Aptitude Test scores.

"The current study is much more comprehensive," he said. "We are not only -looking at individual student characteristics but the programs and support systems within the institution that may influence the students' ad-

The first phase of the study was completed last winter with the malling of 15-page questionnaires to a random sample of 1,100 black undergraduate, graduate and professional students, at each of the six universities.


#### Court halts Alabama prisoner release

That would be the worst possible scenario, for not only Israel but for the future stability of the entire Middle East.

The alligator, once the symbol of good breeding, status, and affluence, is dead. It has been laughed away in recent "propie" satires, by young people who have no respect for tradition or the establishment which has made this country what it establishment which has made this country what it was a boy, the one thing I always dreamed of was wearing an alligator on my tennis shirt. In those days you couldn't just go into a store and buy one—you had to be born to it.

The best and brightest wore alligators. It was an unspoken badge of honor reserved for the finest famillies in America.

The thirts, imported from France, could only be found in the most exclusive stores in the United States, and you had to produce references from three people who wore alligators on their shirts before the salesman was permitted to sell you one. When you saw a man with an alligator on the left side of his chest (women were forbidden to wear them before World War II), you knew he was somebody. He walked with assurance, ignoring the clarges of lesser mortals. On the tennis court he always got his first serve in; his backhand was impeccable. He hit his forehand and ground strokes with the confidence of a person who knew who he was, and what his class stood for.

He was considered by parents as the most eligible catch for their daughter. A young man entitled to wear an alligator would be a winner all his life — and if he wasn't, he would always have a trust fund from his grandfather to get him through the tough time.

This never stopped me from having fantasies about it. Hand me a green alligator and whisper, "You are now one of us."

It nover happened, of course, because in those days people had standards.

No one knows exactly when the symbol of the alligator went downhill. Some blame the French who got greedy and started making more alligator shirts than there were people worthy of wearing them. Other say it came about when the Isotocompany decided to make them for women.

Still others maintain it happened when the better

country clubs relaxed the rules and allowed people to play tennis and golf without wearing an alligator on their shirts.

But one cannot ignore the anti-Victnam war protests when the affluent youths turned against their parents, and replaced the alligator with a clerabed (id.

their parents, and replaced the alligator with a clenched list which will the anything the alligator tennis shirt, they wanted nothing more to do with the symbol.

Whatever the reason, the alligator is now being sold not only on tennis shirts, but nightgowns, haby blankets, underwear and T-shirts. It is being worn by students who go to community colleges, and even kids who didn't finish high school.

executives and employees of Idaho Power Co.
Sen. Afwell Parry, Rehleb, one of the critics of
the PUC, received \$2,000 for his campaign from
United for Idaho, and another \$200 from Idaho's
Energy Resources. He was one of 30 GOP
legislative candidates to receive contributions
from the Idaho Power political action fund.
If you're a utility which sometimes feels you
aren't treated well enough by the PUC, the Idaho
Republican party organization is a handy tool to

have.

In 1980, all 19 Republican senators voted not to confirm Robert Lenaghen for another term on the PUC. Lenaghen she had upset Idaho Power Co, particularly by his participation in the decision denying the application for a 1,000 megawatt coal plant near Bolse.

Republicans Senate Majority Leader James Risch-procelaimed on the floor of the Senate that "ta consumer advocate about dot serve us the PUC." In the previous three years, Risch's raw firm had received a total of \$47,000 in fees for services to Idaho Power Co. Risch, of course, felt that this was not a conflict of interest and his leadership of the movement to get Lenaghes was perfectly proper. When Idaho Power Co, wanted the water quality standard in Idaho rivers watered down, 17 of the 18 Republican senatura cheerfully agreed, as did most of the GOP House members. This allowed Idaho Power to renege on its contract commitment to relate the the casting state standard in the river below American Falls dam.

The finding has forced project officials to wait at least another week before setting a firm date for the Columbia's third test flight. The launch remains tentatively largeted for the week of March 22.



DETROIT (UPI) — Layoffs and benefit curs "aren't too much fun," especially around the holidays, but are necessary to preserve jobs on a long-term basis, General Motors Chairman Roger Smith said Monday.

GM Friday siliced vacation, cost of living, medical and other benefits for its 138,000 salaried employees, saving an esimated \$500 million. Earlier in the week, GM began laying off about 13,000 of its 190,000 worldwide white collar workforce.

The moves were viewed by some as an effort to establish a cost cutting pattern in advance of upcoming negotiations with the United Auto Workers union, GM, which is expected to make a \$300 million profit this year, is almost certain to be the UAW's target.

Smith said gaining a tochold in the talks was "not the major reason" for the benefit siashes, lie said GM is trying to preserve remaining jobs. "Some of them (cuts) aren't to much fun. Nobody likes to have to cut employment and payrolls, at this time of year parficularly," Smith said "At the same time, it's the long-term jobs we're trying to save heef.



# Who buzzed rabbit roundup in copter?

BOISE—The Federal Aviation Administration said Monday it is investigating a charge that conservationists in a helicopter buzzed fields in eastern Idaho last weekend in an effort to thwart the wording and slaughter of housands of rabbits. PAI Inspector Mike Stockhill confirmed he was investigating the inclient near Mud Lake in which farmers claimed a helicopter five low over a pen of harded rabbits, causing thousands of the captured animals to boil to freedom.

Meanwhile, conservationists met with state officials and representatives of the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation Monday to discuss alternatives to the drives, where rabbits are herded into pens and clubbed to death.

An estimated 20,000 rabbits were slaughtered saturday in the second roundup in as many weeks, while thousands more escaped from farmers who were externianting the mammals because of more than \$5 million in crop losses this year.

"We're conducting an investigation at this time, but we haven't been able to ascertain whose alternatif was," Stockhill said. He said the probe would focus on whether the aircraft flew low enough to endanger life or property.

W.F. "Bill" Whittom, a spokesman for the afarmers, said rabbit-drive organizer or vivin Twitchell of Mud Lake filled the verbal allegation, which the PAA inspector said was expected to be followed by a written complaint.

Twitchell refused to comment on the matter, but "Writtom quoted the farmer as saying he believed pand two colleagues; might—have—been in, the "Palling Conference of the pand of the property."

Meantime, state and federal officials — alarmed at the escalating controversy over the rabbit drives — formed an informal task force Monday to try out three alternatives to the clubbing of the crop eating rabbits.

The meeting in the office of Gov. John Evans was prefaced by an ultimatum\_from a farmers spokesman to government officials and animal-protection groups that opponents of the drives "put up or shut up."

Andy Anderson bethe farm bureau said farmers might agree to postyone the next drive if it could be demonstrated that the alternatives would work.

"They feel like their backs are to the wall and everybody's throwing rocks at them," Anderson said. "They think it's time that all you people put up or shut up. But we'll talk to them and see if they are willing to back off for a week."

Pat Costello, Evans' altorney, outlined a strategy designed to back off for a week."

Pat Costello, Evans' altorney, outlined a strategy designed to the off the next rabbit drive, which the farmers plan to hold the day after Christimas. Anderson said the immediate goal was to keep the rabbits out of haystacks durine next sevence and the control of the next growing season. Under the task force plan, the state Fish and

Game Department later this week will set up a demonstration of electrical fencing that may be used to shock hungry rabbits to keep them away from the haystacks.

U.S.—Fish and Wildlife Service representatives said they would test strychnine bait, and the animal-protection groups said they would work with the farmers to set up enclosures in which the rabbits would be gassed to death with carbon monoxide.

"I don't think there's any sense to go out there Saturday and beat the hell out of a whole lot of rabbits," said Idaho Humane Society Director Max Finch, who has led the fight against rabbit clubbings over the last two weekends, and who called Monday's meeting. Finch urged the farmers to use the gassing method if they decided to go ahead with more rabbit roundings.

Balley said his group would not continue its threat to call for a boycott of Idaho products while alternatives were being tried, and he said the Fund for Animals would agree to help financially in the effort to find a more humane method.

Steve Seward, an assistant to the governor, said the governor's emergency fund might be tapped to help finance the demonstration projects. Another meeting to coordinate the task force's activities was scheduled for Wednesday.

One discarded idea was a suggestion by Dick Norell of the Fish and Game Department that perhaps hundreds of rabbits hunters could be attacted to the Mud Lake area for a mass hunt. He said the department headquarters had been deluged with calls from people as far away as Illinois, New York and Florida wanting to know about rabbit hunting in Idaho.







# Court fines 3 officers for shooting

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Three police officers acted with "callous disregard" for the life of a 14-year-old car theft uspect in a 1973 shooting and must pay \$200,000 to his mother, a federal judge ruled Monday.

U.S. District Court Judge Marilyn Hall Patel awarded the damages to Mattle Shepherd, of West okakland, the mother of Tyrone Guyton, who was killed by three Emeryville police officers on Nov. 1, 1973.

1973.
Mrs. Shepherd had sued officers Thomas Mierkey, William Matthews and Dale Phillips for depriving her son of "his life wilhout due process of any by shooling the unarmed youth in the back and killing him."
Although Judge Patel rejected the etaim that the officers had conspired to kill the youth, she ruled that the officers had deprived Guyton of his

excessive forced used to subdue him was neces-sary.

Judge Patel said the officers "showed a callous disregard for the obligations of their office and of the regulations by which they were governed" leading to "the inescapable conclusion. .that the conduct of the officers in firing upon Guyton was excessive, unreasonable, and unjustified."

The shooting occurred after the officers pursued what turned out to be a stolen ear driven by Guyton. During the chase, Phillips fired one shot into Guyton's back, the court opinion said.

While Mierkey subdued Guyton on the ground with handcuffs, Matthews approached and shot the youth in the upper back neek. Matthews contended the boy was rising from the ground in a attempt to shoot him.

Tests taken of Guyton's hands by federal Alcohol, obacco and Firearms experts showed no residual f gun powder which would be expected if the youth ad recently fired a weapon and no gun was found

had recently fired a weapon and no gun was found at the scene.

Both Milerkey and another Oakiland police officer who had arrived on the scene in time to see the last who had arrived on the scene in time to see the last shot fired said they were surprised at the shot being fired, Judge Patel's opinion said.

The slaying sparked heated protests by black from the slaying sparked heated protests by black community leaders in the Bay Area, but three different grand juries later cleared the officers, who were while, of any wrongdoing.

Of the three defendants, Mierkey and Matthews are still members of the Emeryville Police Department and Phillips resigned from the department two years later for unrelated reasons, according to attorney Patrick Becherer.

NEW YORK - Shoppers across the country prong department stores festooned with holi-

day glitter.

But they do more looking than buying, despite sharp bargains, as the worst Christmas selling season since 1974 rolls on.

The recession — and an 8.4 percent unemployment rate expected to climb higher — have made consumers impervious to tinselled stopping displays and Christmas carols ricocheting down store asiles.

Retail analysts say Christmas season sales, which began Nov. 27, the Friday after Thanks-giving, are littlechanged from November — the worst sales month this year.

"We have every evidence that the rate of gain in sales in the first part of December is not

# Good eating hints for elderly

If you're among America's exploding population of SS and older, you're a sucker for a costly vitamin or mineral you think you need but actually could be harmful for you. You're almost surely not drinking enough milk or eating enough milk or eating enough milk products (which you need at this age to help prevent bone fractures). And it's a virtual certainty you waste money because you don't know how to shop wisely for nutrition.

There is an extraordinary gap in information on the nutrition needs of the SS and-over age group.

The five bottom-line rules for proper eating as you grow older are: 1) match your calories to your activities so that your weight is close to idea; 2) eat a pullanged diet; 31 avoid salurated fats and cholesterol; 4) get plenty of fiber, calcium and iron; 5) know if any foods interact with the medicines you are taking.

And to belp you shop for economy and good nutrition, here are the main tips suggested by "Good Eating: An Older Consumer's Guide to a Healthful Diet on a Low Budget." prepared by Blue Cross/Blue Shield. — Plan your main dish first; you may want to prepare enough for a second meal, to save work in preparation. Check newspaper ads for specials.

paration. Offer newspaper are for specials.

— Always shop with a list and keep a memo pad in the kitchen so that you can write down things as they get low. To make shopping easier, group your Items (meat, dairy, canned goods). Avoid all tendencies toward "impulse buying."

— Buy the store's own brands or generic (plain-label) brands. These have equally good nutrition and often—are least costly.

— Use dry milk in cooking and for—

are least costly.

— Use dry milk in cooking and for drinking to increase nutrition and keep milk costs down. If you don't like the flavor, try mixing the re-

constituted (mixed with water) dry milk with some fresh milk, and then day by day, change the proportions. — Check out the lower cost meats such as shoulder cuts. Cook less tender cuts of meat by braising or in a pressure cooker. You also can tenderize lower cost meats by soaking overnight in a marinade.

— Buy bulk or store-siliced cheese, which usually costs less than that which is individually packed or shredded.

— Extend main dishes with staples such as macaron, rice and noodles, or add milk, dried milk powder or cheese sauce, to take care of another important food group.


— Always buy foods in season, when they are at their best quality and cheapest price. Canned goods will be cheaper at the end of a current season, when new packs are coming in. This is a good time to stock up if you have storage space. (But don't ever buy dented or buiging cans.)

Buy the package size best for you. Compare package sizes in relation to your needs and how quickly you will use the contents. A large package is not a bargain if you have to throw part of it away.

— Consider inexpensive sources of protein. Protein foods can make up the most expensive part of your food budget and if you eat more than you need, you also often take in an excess of animal fat. If you're, normally healthy, you need about a 2-ounce serving of meat a day for other foods from the protein group, plus the protein in the equivalent of-two cups of milk and about four servings of breads, cereals and pasta.

— Check out the lower cost sources
of prolein. Any of these will provide
the protein of a counce serving of lean
meat: 2 ounces of cheese; 2 eggs; one
cup cooked dried peas, beans or

lentilis; or 4 tablespons of peanut
butter. A nice change — and cheap!



The problem with risk, the reason why taking

better. "No one can do it without other strengths 
to fortify them," Sheehy said. "When they're 
haifway across the stream and they start to 
panic, that enables them to resist that urge." 
Sheehy, a spare and tiny woman who chooses 
her words with the same discipline that someone 
so thin applies to a dinner menu, tells the story of 
Trisha and Gary Worby, a couple who were

dissatisited with their marriage and took some relatively unconventional risks to improve it. Sheehy described them as a young professional couple, committed to splitting things 50-50 and thoroughly engrossed in their jobs. They lacked the time to love each other and could not pinpoint what was troubling them. They just knew that they were happiest on camping trips. "Gary wanted a better way and dreamed of being an artist, working at home, said Sheehy. "The something more they wanted was a mutual love."

Casting about for solutions, Sheehy recalled, they first moved jo San Francisco. That changed the scenery buff not the dissatisfaction, so they hought-a-wan and drove around-the couptry in a yearlong vecation from work and responsibility. Mrs. Worby at first was panicky. She had spentyears creating a professional ideptity and told Sheehy her first thoughts were "Swell, I'll bake bread in the wilderness:

"Most people would have taken the well-traveled path and said no. That seems safer but it could have ended the marriage," said Sheehy of the couple. "Her husband was saying i'd on't know how to do it but I want to try. Trust me. And she did.

"They find a teacher, a bold coustin, a coach, and the experience of reaching out and finding what you need becomes a habit later on," she said. Sheethy also did extensive interviews with those who came to crossroads and either backed off or made destructive decisions, One accountant told her of a double life he led as first a husband and father of three adolescents and later as a during pilot of a small plane with a young gittfriend who practiced yoga and was relising his julguitimate, son, Because he, was unable to face the problems within his marriage or acknowledge his second family, said Sheethy-

raising his illegitimate son. Because he was nable to face the problems within his marriage or acknowledge his second family, said Sheeby, he eventually tost both.

She also profiled a couple who were matrie-to ake advantage of opportunities because they were frightened. The man she called Joe Novak was a fireman who dropped out of college, drank too much for many years, refused to run for president of his union local because he was afraid of winning.

He refused to take civil service tests for, supervisory jobs and made fun of his wife when she was forced to take civil service tests for, supervisory jobs and made fun of his wife when she want for the college, when she was offered a job running a child-care center, he kept telling her she couldn't do it because she lacked the college, credentials. Still not too sure of herself, she turned the job down.

At one point, she said, he turned things halfway around by quitting drinking, shedding excess weight and getting into shape. But there it stopped. Now, she said, his only goal is to earn enough to keep his youngest son in a good private-shool so that he could escape a dead-end life like the one he had fashioned for himself.

"He had a habit of learning poor coping strategies, He did something 'more bad.' He drank too much," she said.

#### Knowing self a good first step

"Some people deny. The game phenomenon is an escape phenomenon. Someone might spend all weekend in a game place but a pathilinder would get in a boat and go off to be alone with his thoughts."

To do that, she said, is not self-indulgence, but necessary. Introspection is the first stop out of a bind. "You can't do a creditable job of shaping our life without being honest with yourself," she said.

Novak's wife, on the other hand, tried to make

"She went back to school and went from a girl who always felt-lucky to get through high school to being dazzled by exposure to the pure nectaor of knowledge,"—said Sheehy, who writes and talks in much the same way. "He teased her, but she kept all it."

Sheehy said that another common way to avoid taking the risks that might improve one's life is to seek a scapegoat. In Novak's case, it was college boys who took the good jobs, then minorities who were given a leg up on civil service exams by tederal policies or legal action.

Parents, observe your children. If they show signs of industriousness, compelence and personal accountability, fortune has smiled on you.

Those qualities, some behavior experts contend, are strong signals that your youngster will become what most purents thearn of "my son, or my daughter; the successful adult."

Pay close attention to your brightern's attitudes and actions because they can priedle; the paths your youngsters may tate as they nature. A recent Haryard Medical School study shows that individuals who are industrious and competent in early childhood are inclined, to become mentally healthy, adults with satisfying personal relationships and rewarding jobs.

The cannelity to work in childhood is a more significant determinant of success in later life than 10, social class or economic level, say the study's authors, psychiatrist Dr. George E. Vaillant and social worker Caroline O, Vaillant.

Success, in their view, is not merely measured in terms of money earned but in positive mental attitude and in the capacity to work and to love well. Success also is equated with the personal satisfaction that comes from using one's abilities, talents and skills in

comes from using one's abilities, talents and skills in a meaningful way. Developmental psychologist Gerald E. Gruen says that the makings for success are rooted in a person's ability to acquire a sense of "personal agency" as a

aonity to acquire a sense oi "personal agency" as a child:

He defines personal agency as the feeling of having control over what-you-do as opposed to believing that what happens to you is a matter of chance or fate.

In his research in child development, he found that the youngsters with a sense of personal agency tended to believe that rewards and punishment were caused by their actions rather than external forces.

John Feldhibsen, a gifted child specialist and professor of education at Purdue University, said there are several clues that may indicate whether your children are veering in the direction of success.

\*They show perseverance—being able to pursue a particular goal or project of interest at length and sticking with it.

\*Early and enhusiantic reading is an indication of interest and endustation.

sticking with it.

• Raviu and enhuciastic reading is an indication of long-range potential. Highly successful individuals, Feidhusen said, itend to have watched very little television or none at all.

• Mastery of basic skills such as those needed to

play a musical instrument or to excel in sports or other activities.

Feldhusen urged parents to seek out good educational opportunities for their children. "Motivation and stimulation are vital to the gifted as well as to average students," he said. "Make sure children are exposed to reading, to cultural activities to the arts. Early exposure to a field that interests a child is critical to his later success."

Can a sense of personal agency be acquired? "Yesdefinitely." Gruen said. "Let your child accept the consequences for his actions, If he spills milk, make him clean it up."

Here are his suggestions for what parents can do tomotivate and stimulate their children.

Provide an example as an individual who makes things happen in your life instead of waiting for something to happen to you.

Ba responsive to your children from infancy. Children need feedback from parents. They need to know that someone will respond to their actions. Without that, they may feel they have no control over these these them clients. They need to these these them clients.

DEAR READER — There is a fish tapeworm and it can infect salmon and pike, but tapeworms are flat, like noodles. The only way to Identify them is from stool examinations. They may not cause symptoms except anemia from their use of vitamin B-12 and folic acid.

If you have a fish tapeworm it can be treated with medicines taken by the mouth. Your story is another example of the importance of adequate cooking one's foot, fish frozen at minus 10 C for 48 hours will also be free of any such tapeworms.

# Alcoholics can remain sober

ATLANTA (UPI) — Alcoholics who can stay away from liquor for a year stand an excellent chance for con-tinued sobriety, a leading researcher sald Sunday.

Dr. Leclair Bissell, president of the American Medical Society on Alcohoffsm, said the conclusion was reached in the first longerm study ever made of a large group of alcoho-les.

ever made of a large group of alcoholics.

She said the study, financed out of her own pocket, proves that a year's abstention from alcohol and membership in Alcoholics Anonymous leads to sobriety for the ensuing five to seven years in virtually all cases.

Abstention also apparently helped alcoholics kick the cigarette habit, decreased suicidal behavior, reduced encounters with police and drastically cut down on hospital admissions for all reasons.

The researcher criticized psychologists "who believe they can return their patients to social drinking. It think they re killing a lot of people by encouraging them to return to drinking." "The goal of treatment should be Jotal abstention from all other mood-changing drugs of addiction," she said. "I think most physicians habital way.

Dr. Bissell said the study "was the only one I know of where a group of AA people have been looked at two points in time."

It involved 439 alcoholics who were interviewed "face to face and breath to breath" over a period of five to seven years, she said.

The researcher revealed preliminary data from the study in an interview while in Atlanta to attend the Sixth Southeastern Conference on Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

The subjects all were members of AA and had abstalmed from alcohol a minimum of one year at the time of initial interviews. More than 90 percent were re-interviewed five to seven years, said Dr. Blasell, a specialist who works with alcoholics at Edgehill Newport, a treatment center in the Annual Carlon and La percent of the women and 14.7 percent of the momen and 14.7 percent of the women and 14.7 percent of the

uentists, 55 male and five female attorneys, 20 male and 30 female social workers, 55 professional women in non-medical fields, 100 female registered nurses and 32 les-bians.

"A lot of the negative things that go

sobriety," Dr. Bissell said. "The ar-rests went away almost completely. The reported admissions to bospitals

went away."

Of the 203 medical people in the study, 25 percent stopped smoking clgarettes. Of the 128 non-medical people, 49 percent quit smoking, "I don't know what that means, but there it is," Dr. Bissell said.

Sho seid 32 percent of the women

and 18 percent of the men had made overt suicide attempts prior to the initial interview. In the ensuing 5-7 years, only 1.8 and 0.5 percent made such attempts.

"This suggests that the suicidal behavior of alcoholic people is more related to the pain and confusion of the drinking situation than to chronic depression," she said.





#### The second second second Author explores condition of childlessness

Why did she write "Marriage without Children." Diana Burgwyn was asked. What was so riveting about being childless by chance or choice that would require book-length (234 pages) treatment?

But Out There, milling around the subject. of childlessness, are such people as the "pronatalists," various feminists, some quite confused men, and doubtless some very spolled animals.

All this confuses some men, says Burgwyn. These men would like families, but the women they are attracted to don't want children. "Frustration all around," says Burgwyn.

And then there are the people who can't have children and desperately want them. Meddiers can't leave them alone. "You're trying too hard," the meddiers tell the infertile. "On you're not trying enough, or you should go to Europé, or your should see my doctor." Should these childless couples adopt a child? Is a pet enough of a substitute?

There aren't any answers, or, taher, as Burgwyn suggests, only the passage of time provides one definite answer. As for the militantly childless, they can join an organization, "NON or the National Organization," NON or the National Organization for Non-Parents, —which promotes—the—point of view that the childless lifestyle is a socially acceptable and realistic option.

Gardeners and would-be gardeners always enjoy books as Christmas gifts. This year three books stand out as particularly valuable. One is "Your Biblical Garden—Plants of the Bible and How to Grow Them" by Allen Swenson (Doubleday, \$13.95). Before this volume, gardeners could only refer to "Plants of the Bible" by Moldenke. Although a very thorough, neademic reference, it makes no attempt to describe the culture of these plants. Swenson, a thoroughly practical person, gives some interesting suggestions. Frankincense, for example, which was one of the gifts of the Wise Men to

baby Jesus, is impossible to grow outside of its native Arabian desert habitat. Therefore, Swenson suggests growing the mountain ash in a

# Tobacco spray effective in fighting mildew on African violets (Codlaeum), Oleander (Nerium), Oleander (Neri

If you have mildew on your African Violets and other house plants, try using a tobacco spray on them.

Dr. Alvin Shultz gives us experience in the African Violet Magazine. "My wife was having some problems with her roses so she took a few leaves to a rosarrian who recommended tobacco dust spray. I decided to try it on African Violets. I purchased some WM Peen cigars that sold for five to 35 cents. Using an old pan. Torbke up three cigars into four cups of water. Boiled it for five minutes and then simmered for five minutes to help-concentrate the liquid, which should be dark brown. The bolling I felt was needed to destroy any bug, egg and especially the lobacco mosaic virus. The liquid was filtered through filter paper to remove fine particles that might clog the sprayer. Cotton or towelling, or coffee filter paper make a good filter. Just plants in three different large of the mixture of four tablespoons to a quart of warm water. Spraying a was done at different intervals and they all worked. You water. Another reader writes: "I soak used cigarette butts in water and strain the liquid. Then I swist plants in a bucket of it. DON'T FEED SICK FLANTS

This time of the year many house plants took a bit off color and produce few blossoms and little growth. When this happens the first impulse is to give the plant "as shot of fertilizer." It's a myth to think that plant food is a cure-ail.

I-t-won't-do any more for a sick person. When a plant isn't doing too well chan-a-thlek-steak-or-a-stack of pancakes would for a sick person. When a plant isn't doing too well check the soil first. 

While no figures were revealed, it is believed the contract is worth close to \$1 million per year, making Schmidt one of the highest-paid players in beach of

At a Veterans Stadium news conference, Schmidt said he and leam president Bill Glies agreed to keep the details of the contract as confidential as possible.

Later, however, when asked if he was or was close to being one of the highest paid players in basebail, Schmidt replied, "If you say close to it,—the answer is probably yes."

"You can't always accurately interpret a contract," Glies said. "This is a complicated contract, whether he's the highest paid, I can't say. When you compare what we're paying him to what is being paid Noian Ryan or Dave Winfield, it's a very fair contract."

Winfield, the New York Yankees outfleider, signed a 10-year contract worth \$22 million last year that included inflation adjustments. Ryan, the

ace of the Houston astros pitching staff, signed a three-year contract worth \$1 million a year in November 1979. Giles said the contract was guaranteed and contained a no-trade clause for the first three-years.

of the pact.

Schmidt, 32, led the National League in six offensive categories last year, including home runs (31) and RBI (91). He also hit a career high, 316 and picked up his sixth Gold Glove for fielding excellence. He has led the league in home runs five times and has 314 for his career.

Schmidt was about to enter the final year of a six-year contract he signed for an annual salary of \$50,000 in 1977. However, he first expressed his desire to rengotiate the contract after winning the 1980 MVP award.

Later, he stated he wanted to sign a new contract before the 1882 season began. He said he used "the threat of free agency" in negotiations with the Phillies, although he admitted all along he wanted to stay in Phillidelphia.

"There are a lot of reasons," he said of wanting to remain with the Phillies. "There are the friendships I've had on the Phillies. I'm happy with the community I live in. I'm at ease with the Philadelphia fans and that's important to me.

"The game of baseball has enabled me to achieve financially what I wanted to achieve. I'm going to be financially secure the rest of my life. I could have gotten a really big contract and possibly have become a free agent. But the Phillies gave me what I needed to retire from baseball six, seven or eight years from now and not have to get a job when I finish."

Schmidt said his agent and legal counsel worked out details of the contract, and joked that it left him "nowhere" as compared to his previous financial

"I can't spend a dime more than what L have been spending," he said. "I guess I've been spending too much. By the time you pay your laxes and look away some money for the future after you've flished playing; there last' much left fler you've flished playing; there last' much left." Giles said the money involved kept the contract but he added that he

Giles said the money involved kept the contract from being agreed to sooner. But he added that his plan is to have Schmidt finish his career in Philadelphia.
