Calif. (UPI) - President Reagar giving the space shuttle Columbi astronauts a rousing Fourth of Jul coine back to earth on a "truly gnificent day," Sunday unveiled a national space policy with a vyemphasis on national security.

"The pioneer spirit still flourishes in America," said Reagan, with astronauts Thomas "Ken" Mattingly and Henry Hartsfield at his side after their flawless landing from their week-long mission.



#### Non-registrants may escape

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The director of the Scientive Service System said in an interview published Sunday the government does not expect to prosecute all of the estimated 500,000 men who have not registered for the draft.

Maj. Gen. Thomas Turnage told U.S. News & World Report the start of prosecutions for refusing to register should spur the pacce of sign-ups.

"We don't anticipate: there will be a need to prosecute all who haven't registered so far;" Turnagesid." "When the first cases are tried, we expect that a great many who have not registered will come in and sign up."

Turnage said there are about 160 young men who initially face prosecution. No one is singled out for prosecution by the Justice Department just because he is weed about the redistration process he said.

Sépala Ekanayake, 33, a Sri Lankan who lived in grand style for two days with the \$400,000 ransom paid for 259 hostages he held on a hijacked talian airliner, was interrogated for nine hours overnight and then ordered held without ball, police sources said.

#### Madrid leads in Mexico vote



## Idaho should lead in water changes

There are few areas of American law where the federal government has not poked its nose, but until now, the regulation of ground-water-was-relatively. Tree of federal regulation.

That was because ground water traditionally has been considered under the control of the separate states, to be regulated at the state and local level. States-like idaho and Nebraska-have-passed-laws-prohibiting the transfer of ground water to other states unders those other states granted similar rights. The ILS Supreme Court swent aside Nebraska's

to move water into Idaho and Nebraska: The U.S. Supreme Court swept aside Nebraska's so-called "reciprocity requirement" in a ruling this past week, in effect declaring that ground water was an article of interstate commerce and thus could be

past week, in effect declaring that ground water was an article of interstate commerce and thus could be regulated by the federal government.

We doubt the framers of the Constitution had ground water in mind—when—they—included—the interstate commerce clause, giving the federal government\_general\_power\_over\_such—matters\_More—likely, they were thinking of commercial goods, like grain, durable goods and rolling stock.

But as Justice John Paul Stevens noted in his-majority opinion, the scarcity\_of\_ground water\_is becoming a national problem. The Ogaliala adulfer, which underlies much of the Midwest, is being depleted at a frightening rate, and no one state, such as Nebraska, can pre-empt regulation of the supplies.

Local\_and\_state\_regulation of ground water, he wrote, is still desirable, but only as far as conservation and preservation. In those areas, state authority still may be dominant.

But the court's ruling opens the door for federal regulation of ground water, and with that, can federal legislation be far behind?

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



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

coma at a Boise hospital. Lawrencehas emerged from the coma and is

Convention Center, Miller cited the fatal shootings of San Francisco civic leaders, the execution of two Idaho Department of Fish and Game of-Igers and the attempted assessination of President Rengan.

"All three of these cases should have come to mind" when Lawrence was fired upon, Miller told holliday observers in Jackpot, where rain curtailed a slate of outdoor activities scheduled for Sunday. He did not elaborate on the series of violent incidents, Instead, he simply urged his listeners to commit themselves to the goal of "peace in the land."

Miller thanked emergency medical personnel who stabilized Lawrence's condition, pending hospital treatment. The sherit also asked that acquaintances of Lawrence remember "the concern he had for the well being of each of us."

In an interview after his sneech and

In an interview after his speech and prayer, Miller said it will be at least

two weeks before Lawrence can start a program of rehabilitation. The extent of the possible paralysis won't be known until Lawrence can undergo [cgis\_Millersaid.

He said Lawrence has been able to move his right leg, and that is considered an encouraging sign in terms of the deputy's ultimate mobility. The sheriff said Lawrence recognizes familiar faces.



The sources said Hall has nearly completed work on a new Chaparral and would have it ready for either the Tony Bettenhausen 20 in Milwaukoe on April 1 or the California 500 in Riverside, Calif., Aug. 20.
