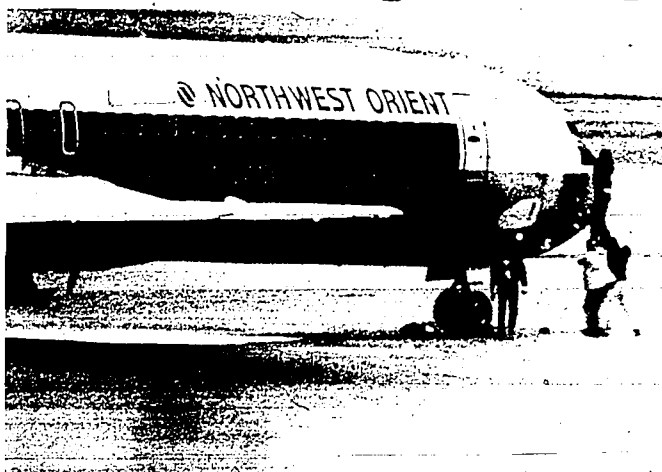

Agents slip into plane, kill hijacker



FBI agents enter through the jetliner's cockpit

PORTLAND, Ore. — A man claiming to have a bomb tried to hijack a jetliner to Afghanistan Thursday and was shot to death by one of two FBI agents who sneaked aboard when it landed at Portland. All 41 people aboard escaped unhurt and no bomb was found.

Officials identified the hijacker as Glenn Curt Tripp, 20, of Arlington, Wash. and said he tried to hijack a plane at Seattle-Tacoma International Airport in 1980.

FBI agents climbed into the cockpit of the plane on a remote runway of Portland International Airport at 5:30 p.m. MST, three hours after Northwest Flight 688 arrived from Seattle with six crew members and 35 passengers.

"Shortly after takeoff, a gentleman stood up and said, 'We're going to Afghanistan.' He said it in a low voice and no one took him seriously," said shaken passenger Chuck Goodman, 40, of Boca Raton, Fla.

"It was very unattractive with Americans. Evidently for some reason, he had a lot of hatred for Americans," said another passenger, Larry Larson, 43, a log scaler from Hood River, Ore. "He said we are not

helping his people in Afghanistan enough."

The hijacker, who wore a flannel suit and combat boots, stood most of the time in the area between the first class and coach sections, holding the shoe box, Larson said.

"At times, he was very excited because his demands were not being met. He was screaming," Larson recalled.

The FBI said the hijacker was a white male from Washington state, in his early 20s, 5 feet 8 inches to 5 feet 10 inches tall. White, the box did not contain any explosives. Baker said he did not know the actual contents.

In negotiations with the FBI, the hijacker agreed to release half of the passengers, said William M. Baker, federal agent-in-charge of the FBI's Portland office.

As a blue and white bus neared the plane to pick up the passengers, two FBI agents were hoisted through the open cockpit window.

At the same time, passengers began leaving by the rear stairs and three people were seen leaving the cockpit by escape chutes.

"At that time, the captain allowed for the security door to the cabin to be opened. Immediately, an agent appeared and confronted the subject,

who at that time approached the door holding a box," Baker said.

"The agent immediately yelled, 'Freeze, FBI!' At that time, the subject made a sudden motion," as if to throw the box, he said. "The agent fired one shot" from his revolver, killing the suspect, Baker added.

One passenger, Roy Gronquist, a Beaverton, Ore., businessman, said the hijacker's head landed near him as he fell.

"As he was going down, he said, 'I give, I give...' The last time he said it, he was fading," Gronquist recalled.

In his negotiations with the FBI, the hijacker had demanded to go to San Diego. Later, he agreed to release half of the passengers if the plane would be refueled for a flight to San Diego.

Baker said the agent apparently made sure before shooting that none of the passengers or crew were in his line of fire.

He said negotiations were aimed at a peaceful end to the hijack attempt and would not say what had led to the decision to storm the plane while the man's attention was diverted to the passengers. However, he noted agents followed a standard plan of action for hijackings.

After the shooting, a bomb squad searched the plane. — See HIJACK on Page A2

Reagan says he's done well Offers midterm assessment

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, giving himself high marks with much fanfare at midterm, said Thursday he has set the nation on the right course.

Reagan, in a relaxed, jovial mood, made a surprise appearance in the White House press room to give reporters an upbeat assessment of his first two years in office.

"For all our troubles, midterm finds this administration and this country entering a season of hope," the 71-year-old president said. "I see an American economy and an America on the mend."

Later, Reagan told political appointees at a political pep rally featuring the Marine Band with the entire Cabinet lined up behind him. "Keep your chin up. We're on our way."

He conceded the administration faces "awesome problems." But he added: "Don't be swayed by Washington's whining voices with crying towels. I know it's true that sometimes you don't get fair shake."

"The pieces of the puzzle are falling in place," Reagan said, urging "loyal members of the team" not to be dismayed by critics.

The crowd at Constitution Hall went

wild at one point when Interior Secretary James Watt, noting the criticism leveled at the administration, said, only half in jest, "Let Reagan be Reagan."

Reagan was asked in the White House press room about New Right criticism of his policies.

"You must be doing something right when you're getting rocks thrown at you from both sides," he replied with a grin.

He said problems still plague his administration, although he did not address the nation's record 10.8 percent unemployment rate specifically.

"My biggest regret is that because the accumulated damages piled up so high for so long, putting America's house in order has been a tough and painful task," the president said.

"And it's a real human tragedy that so many of our people today are still suffering for the political mistakes of the past that we've finally started to correct."

"Looking back, I guess my greatest satisfaction is the conviction that a country that was skidding dangerously in the wrong direction, losing the respect of friends and foes alike in the world, and even worse, losing faith in its own future, has been set on the right course," Reagan said.

"We've begun to undo the damage

State panel eyes 'windfall bucks'

BOISE — A special House-Senate committee unveiled a grab-bag of budget-balancing choices Thursday and immediately disbanded, declining to recommend specific solutions to the state's fiscal crisis.

Two alternative lists of possible revenue-raising and budget-cutting measures compiled by the 14-member panel were sent to the legislative leadership and the party caucuses for a new round of negotiations.

House and Senate Republican leaders said they wanted actual legislation to begin surfacing within the next few days so the Legislature could have enough time to cover an estimated \$60 million revenue shortfall in fiscal year 1983.

"I see no sense in waiting around if we're not going to vote on anything," said Sen. Ron Beltespacher, D-Grangeville, who wanted to propose his own list of alternatives.

Committee co-chairman Sen. Mark Ricks, R-Rosburg, told Beltespacher the GOP chairman would submit the Democrats' proposals to legislative leaders even though nothing was to

come to a vote in the special committee.

"We'd lock ourselves in on some things if we voted," Ricks said. "We've spent enough time on these, so let's submit them to the leadership and caucuses and let them 'em around."

Sen. Israel Merrill, D-Blackfoot, agreed with Ricks, saying members of some of the Legislature's standing committees feared their authority was being usurped by the special budget panel.

"I heard some very derogatory remarks this morning," Merrill said.

"The 'shopping lists' shown by the committee Thursday comprised collections of choices mentioned in earlier meetings — mostly a mixture of budget cuts, tax increases and funding transfers.

A key source of possible revenue cited by Ricks and leading Republicans was about \$6 million in "windfall bucks" that the state's school districts are scheduled to receive in early fiscal year 1984.

The funds are non-general account dollars that, if lost by the districts, would not spark a property-tax in-

Gunmen silence Dorfman

LINCOLNWOOD, Ill. — Allen Dorfman, a Teamsters Union consultant facing life in prison for trying to bribe a U.S. senator, died Thursday in a hail of bullets in a hotel parking lot.

Law enforcement officials said the bushy-browed insurance man, linked to the crime-syndicate for four decades, probably died on the orders of underworld associates to "shut him up."

Lincolnwood Police Chief Daniel Martin said Dorfman, 59, and associate Irwin Wypiner drove into the parking lot of the Hyatt Lincolnwood Hotel in a late-model Cadillac and were walking to the front of the lot when two men came up behind them, announced a robbery, "and began shooting immediately."

Dorfman, shot in the head, slumped dead between the parked cars, leaving a wide, red stain on the pavement. Police eventually found eight .22-caliber cartridges were retrieved at the scene. The .22 is a favorite of mob assassins.

An autopsy will determine how many times Dorfman was shot. He was pronounced dead at Skokie Valley Hospital in the suburbs north of Chicago.

The FBI put out a nationwide alert for the murder suspects, described as two white men. The gunman was described as a large man, 6 feet 2

inches tall, and 240 to 260 pounds, bearded, about 40. The other man was about 30, 150 pounds and 5 feet 10 inches tall. The FBI said they fled in a car described as either a dark blue or green Chevrolet or Dodge sedan with smoked windows and two antennas on the trunk.

Speculation immediately arose that Dorfman was killed to prevent him from giving evidence to prosecutors about his many associates.

"This was not a robbery," said Edward Hegarty, head of the Chicago FBI office. "This was a murder — premeditated."

U.S. Attorney Dan K. Webb said Dorfman had not agreed to turn over any evidence and had not even been asked to do so.

Patrick Healy of the Chicago Crime Commission said in his opinion the purpose of the killing was "to keep him quiet."

"I firmly believe that, if he wanted to, he could hand-up to prosecutors... politicians and businessmen who have had illegal dealings with him," Healy said.

The Teamsters Union national headquarters in Washington said it would have "no comment" on the

slaying. A spokesman said Teamsters President Roy L. Williams, convicted along with Dorfman in the bribery case, was aware of the slaying and would have no comment.

Dorfman's attorney, Jeffrey Cole, initially charged Dorfman's prosecution and conviction put him in a position where his death was virtually inevitable.

"I think the government killed him... That's my opinion," Cole told UPI. "That's exactly what I think. I think what they did with the way they conducted the indictments, with the pressure that was exerted on him, to try and take over his company, with everything he had done, had the inevitable result of killing him. I am humiliated for the government. I think it is shameful. They should blush with shame for what they've done."

Cole later said his comments were "misconstructed" and praised the U.S. attorney's office.

Dorfman survived one assassination attempt in 1967. He was driving to a golf course with a friend when two hit men fired four shotgun blasts into the friend's car.

McClure against Social Security plan

TWIN FALLS — Midway through his address Thursday to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club, the lights went out on Sen. James McClure.

A power failure left Idaho's senior senator responding by candlelight to a series of questions many of them concerning the economy.

"When he was finished, McClure detected the symbolism at hand."

"I suppose it's appropriate that at the end of a member of Congress's comments, you're all left in the dark," he said.

Here, as elsewhere during McClure's trip through Idaho, the major issue was the ailing Social Security system. And McClure repeated for his Twin Falls audience his opposition to the compromise solution proposed late last week by the presidential commission appointed to devise a plan to save the system.

McClure criticized the proposal as relying too heavily on increased taxes. He has suggested cutting back on areas of Social Security that have been added to the program in recent years.

But he said that the "Social Security system is a promise that's been made ... That is a promise that must be kept, and it is a promise that can be kept."

The plan proposed by the bipartisan Social Security Commission would raise an additional \$169 billion in revenue for the program. The recommendations include delaying a cost-of-living benefit increase sched-

uled for this July until January 1984, increasing payroll taxes and taxing the benefits of retired persons who are in middle-income or higher brackets.

McClure said he considers the proposal typical of the compromises reached between liberal congressmen, who would balance the budget through tax increases, and conservative members, who would rather rely on spending cuts.

In the case of the Social Security plan, McClure says the liberals got more of what they wanted than the conservatives.

He said that Congress will have to face up to curtailing the rate of growth in the federal "entitlement" programs, such as Social Security, or face economic disaster.

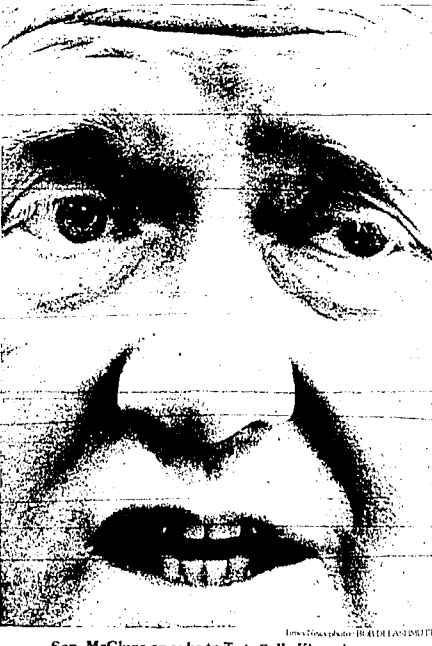
If the growth in spending is not curtailed, social welfare programs could end up consuming 93 percent of the federal budget by the end of the decade, he said. Those programs now account for 54 percent of federal expenditures, compared to 30 percent for defense and 16 percent for general fund accounts, he said.

"You know and I know we can't do that. The Congress must face up to the hard choices."

The picture is not without hope, however, McClure said.

"That program is not beyond salvage. It requires modest changes to make it sound." And putting together a majority in the House and Senate to implement such spending cuts will be politically difficult but not impossible, McClure said.

"I am confident that we could do it. I am not so confident that we will."

Brooks under fire for revenue forecast

BOISE — A state representative from Gooding came under attack Thursday in the House, as he successfully defended his committee's revenue projection for next year.

"We're presenting you a projection of \$393.99 million (in state revenue) for fiscal year 1984," said Rep. John Brooks, R-Gooding, the chairman of the special Revenue Projections Committee. "We believe it's a conservative figure, and it was unanimously agreed to by our committee."

But three House Democrats opposed the figure, calling it "too high," and warning that use of the \$394 million figure could lead to another year of overly optimistic state appropriations and revenue shortages, the same thing that is being experienced this year.

Earlier, the House passed, without debate, a \$371 million revenue pro-



Legislature to gather testimony from Johnston for the remainder of the current fiscal year, which ends June 30. After the dissent by the Democrats, the 1984 revenue projection also passed the House, by a vote of 64-3.

Both revenue bills then were forwarded to the Senate, where they also received easy approval Thursday. The projections ultimately are used by the Legislature to set state budgets.

Brooks' committee, composed of both senators and representatives, developed the two forecasts after meeting one week ahead of the

various Idaho businesses, economists and taxpayer groups.

Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, asked Brooks what evidence he had "to show that this economy is going to turn around."

"In all the economic forecasts I've seen, there has not been an indication that things are going to improve very soon to help ease this recession," she said. "How is it possible to justify increasing the revenue projection from this year to next by \$23 million?"

"It would be much safer to use a lower projection, so that we never have to again face the terrible problems we're having with balancing the state budget this year," McDermott said.

The Revenue Projection Committee's income estimate for this year predicts that state government will have a \$69 million deficit when the 1983 fiscal year ends in June. "With interest rates so fragile, and

our Congress apparently unable to stop our growing national deficit, which undoubtedly will increase the problems, any increase in state revenue next year seems very unlikely," McDermott said.

Brooks' committee also was questioned on its 1984 projection for state sales-tax revenue.

"I see here that you're predicting sales-tax income will increase from \$97 million this year to \$112 million next year," said Rep. Ray Infanger, R-Salmon.

"That seems awfully high," he said. "Is there a mistake here?"

Brooks defended the increased sales-tax revenue estimate "because of some of the upturns businessmen were telling us they are beginning to see," he said.

"We were also told that there would be a mild increase in new-housing starts," Brooks said. Infanger ultimately voted in favor of the revenue projection.

Governor orders probe of dam's effect

BOISE — Gov. John Evans has called on the Idaho Water Resources Board to immediately review the impact of relicensing the Idaho Power Co.'s Swan Falls power plant in southwestern Idaho.

Thursday, he also requested that the board prepare recommendations on that license, which tentatively was issued to Idaho Power last month by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

"The question of whether the Swan Falls project should be subordinated to upstream development (on the Snake River) must be addressed," Evans said.

Earlier, the governor had requested that the FERC grant the state 90 days to submit a recommendation on the relicensing. That response period ends March 23.

The debate, which also is being addressed by the state Legislature, grew out of a November state Supreme Court ruling, which said that Idaho Power has a right to an 8,400-cubic-foot-per-second flow of water at Swan Falls, even though the average summer flows amount to only between 5,400 and 7,500 cubic feet per second.

On Wednesday, the state Department of Water Resources director warned that he may have to stop some agricultural pumping upstream from Swan Falls unless the court's ruling is softened.

That could affect up to 250,000 acres, including the high-lift pumping development at Bell Rapids. DWR director Kenneth Dunn said. He also said he could not approve any new water rights — including wells used for drinking water — within the Snake River Plain until the issue is resolved.

"This issue of whether the agricultural development should have some precedence over the

Swan Falls right is even more important to us in the Magic Valley, because it also applies to Bliss Dam and the existing agriculture development associated with it," said Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, the chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee.

Idaho holds a 1947 water right at Bliss Dam of 15,000 cubic feet per second for power generation. Power-generating water rights generally have a "life" of 50 years.

Evans said the importance of the Swan Falls project relicensing is heightened by the Supreme Court decision, and that the court's ruling raises questions about the availability of water for existing and future irrigation development.

"If the FERC relicensing can be done to show that Swan Falls is subordinate to the upstream agricultural development, then some of this huge problem may be solved," said Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey.

Drunk driving bills pop up at staggering pace

BOISE — A fourth drunken-driving bill was introduced Thursday in the House, but the sponsor acknowledged that it probably would get joined with others into a single, composite draft.

Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, presented his plan to the House Transportation and Defense Committee, which he chairs.

"It seems to me that giving the drunken driver a little jail time, tapping their pocketbooks, taking away their licenses and making them provide some public service is a

pretty darn good deterrent," Sessions told the committee.

His bill would start out with a relatively stiff minimum sentence for first convictions, including two days in jail, up to a \$500 fine, a 180-day revocation of the driver's license and from 24 to 48 hours of public service.

"That public service could include things like custodial service in county or city buildings, or in parks, or along highways," Sessions said. "It could also call for lecturing to other people or attending Alcoholics Anonymous meetings."

The penalties outlined in Sessions' bill would increase with additional

convictions:

- A second offense within five years would carry a minimum of five days in jail, up to a \$1,000 fine, and 48 to 96 hours of public service.
- Third-time convictions would call for at least 10 days in jail, up to a \$1,500 fine and 52 to 104 hours of public service.

The bill differs from the other three drunken-driving proposals in that it does not change the definition of drunkenness.

Other plans use a .1 percent blood-alcohol level and allow no out for the person tested. The measures are written so that it is simply illegal to

drive if a person has that much alcohol in his system.

But Sessions' proposal retains the existing state provision, which presumes drunkenness if a person's blood-alcohol level is .08 percent or higher.

Don't hide crime from the people

A newspaper is in the business of reporting facts, not rumors, but in some cases, our job is made more difficult by the tendency on the part of some public officials to withhold important information people have a right to know.

Take the blurry area of crime. Police sometimes have a legitimate right to pursue crime leads without the intense light of publicity; discretion is an important part of law enforcement's ability to sift information and weed out the extraneous material.

But when rumors of a crime, or crimes, are abroad on the land, we think law-enforcement officials should balance their need for investigative discretion with an equally legitimate right of people to know what's going on and where danger lurks.

We raise these concerns because of rumors that apparently have circulated broadly in Gooding and Jerome counties in the past few weeks, alleging that several rapes have occurred in the area.

The sheriff's offices have said nothing publicly about the incidents, and this silence has allowed the rumors to multiply. In fact, as The Times-News reported Thursday, there have been three reported rapes in the past 18 months and a fourth attempted rape last fall.

We think law-enforcement officials should recognize that the rumor-creation process is insidious and that public officials like themselves have a responsibility to provide factual information in such cases. That would quiet the rumors and at least inform citizens of what is going on.

We do not subscribe to the philosophy that law officers should keep investigations wholly quiet, telling the public what it wants to, when and if they get a break in the case.

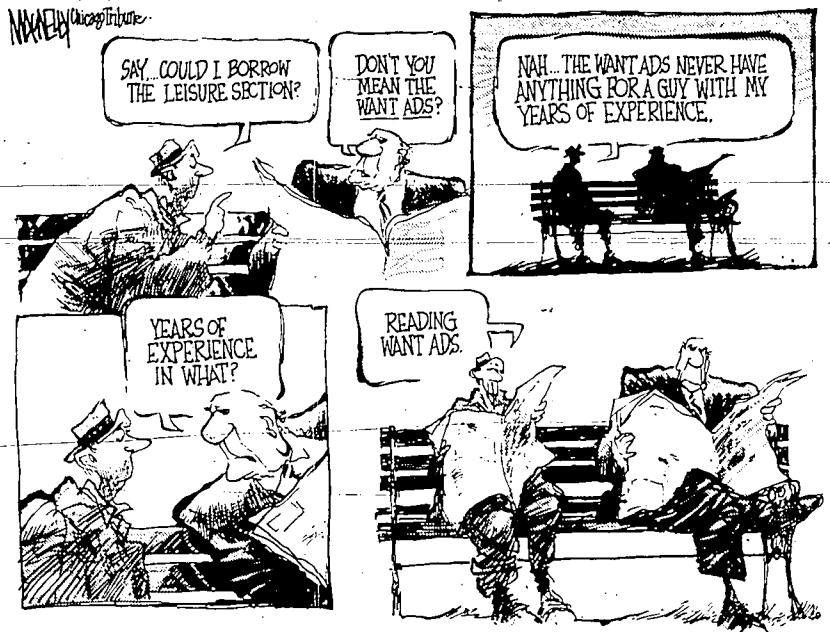
What are they waiting for? Another incident to occur on which they can make the case? In effect, that allows another person unwittingly to become another victim.

We saw some of this a few years ago in Boise in which a young man terrorized women on the north side of town for several months. He was finally caught and sent to prison — and was recently killed during an escape attempt — but not before every woman in the city was fearful.

In such a circumstance, we think the police and the press have a responsibility to work together, providing accurate information that will quiet fear and quell rumors, without endangering the law's pursuit of a suspect.

Public confidence in law-enforcement agencies depends on their successful pursuit of criminals, but it also depends on the public perception that the law officers are acting consistently in the public interest.

If there are crimes going on in a community, we think citizens have a right to know it. That's what it comes down to.

Reagan needs compromise to survive

WASHINGTON—President Reagan will be a man in search of many compromises in the next two years if he wants his presidency to work.

At midpoint in his White House career, Reagan has had to reassess his own hard and fast positions as he watches his supply-side economic policies founder on the shoals of failure.

Reagan would be the last to say his three-year tax cut combined with his monetary policy is not working.

Although, he was warned that it was not the way to go if he planned a trillion dollar defense buildup, his economic advisers had convinced him that the tax slash would wipe out the recession.

Today, the nation is still in a slump and Reagan has approved a three-year 999 billion tax increase and a four-year \$20 billion gas tax hike, wiping out all the advantages of the tax cut. And that's not all. Social Security taxes will be accelerated under the reform plan and Treasury Secretary Donald Regan has let the cat out of the bag that the president will propose a whole new package of tax hikes in the forthcoming 1984 fiscal year budget.

Some past presidents who have now been sidelined may be smiling at all this, particularly as one remembers Reagan's campaign battle cry against those who "tax and tax and spend and spend."

The president came into office promising a balanced budget and a job for everyone who wanted to work. In his two years as president, the deficit looms at around \$200 billion and unemployment has spiraled from around 7.5 million to close to 12 million.

Confronted with the facts and a continuing sluggish economy, it appears that he can no longer hang tough.



His top GOP lieutenants in Capitol Hill are telling him that is not enough, but he passed the word that his bottom line. Reagan is enough of a politician to know that he

has to make concessions if he expects his programs to pass. It is difficult for him to bend, particularly when it involves his political convictions. But he also sees the handwriting on the wall and what is being called the "paralysis of confrontation" if he chooses to do battle with Congress on the major issues.

In the area of nuclear arms control, Reagan is being reluctantly pushed to change tactics and positions.

Although he is sticking with his "zero option" in the nuclear arms field — meaning no intermediate range missiles on the European continent or aimed at its capitals — the president and his advisers realize they are losing ground in the field of public opinion as Soviet President Yuri Andropov drops new proposals for cuts in nuclear weaponry.

For some, the changes and concessions Reagan is making may be too little and too late. As in the case of activist women's groups who claim he is making only token gestures to women. But it is a mark of a resilient open minded president when he can move with the times. In the case of Reagan, it is a necessity born of the need to survive.

We need new vocabulary on volatile abortion issue

BOSTON— I don't know what you give a legal decision for its tenth anniversary. I don't know the proper etiquette. But it's been a decade now since Jan. 22, 1973, when a young woman who had been raped and impregnated in Texas won the right for any woman to have an abortion in the United States. Surely some notice is due.

I suppose that those who regard Roe v. Wade as a tombstone would like to offer funeral wreaths. Others who regard it as a landmark would weave and wave banners. But maybe we ought to produce something more functional for this anniversary: a new vocabulary.

It seems that we've been stuck for a decade in a verbal war of attrition. Two groups have settled into bunkers labeled "right to life" and "right to choice." They have lobbed names and accusations at each other across the public terrain in an endless debate through

courts and legislatures. The public argument has been cast permanently into a series of confrontations, one side against another, one set of rights against another.

The reasons for this deadlocked debate are understandable enough. In court we are only allowed to argue in the restricted language of the Constitution. The complex moral dilemmas of abortion end up straitjacketed by constitutional speak. In the end, we can only talk about individual rights, right to life and rights to privacy.

The irony is that the argument that goes on in the legal system is so removed from the argument that goes on in the mind of a woman faced with an unwanted pregnancy.

The private struggle is less over rights than over responsibilities. It is less about conflicts with others than connections to them. It has less to do with the ability to carry a pregnancy for nine months than to care for a child for 18

years. Carol Gilligan, whose work on women's development, "A Different Voice," was based in part on her research with pregnant women facing this decision, never found one who fit the callous stereotype implied by the phrase "abortion on demand." Her women did not boast about exercising their "right" to an abortion.

They asked themselves, rather, questions about caretaking and responsibility: "Am I prepared to take care of his life? Is it irresponsible to have a child I cannot take care of?" She heard these questions from teen-agers who initially wanted a baby "because I'm lonely" and she heard it from older women trying to imagine the impact of a new baby on families that were barely holding together. "Labeling abortion as a selfish choice," she says, "didn't always hold up."

At the same time, these women did not engage in metaphysical arguments about "life." In the courts and Congress, we hear one group insist that the fetus is a life and abortion is murder. We hear another group counter with philosophical and biological arguments: What is a human life? But in private, in the lives of women, the crucial fact is not the existence of life in the womb but in the world.

As Gilligan describes it, "It's because they know it's a life they're talking about that the issues of choice and responsibility are so key. Women are trying to say that to bring a life into the world means to take care of it."

I suspect that we intrinsically understand that this is not an argument about abstract principles but about human responsibilities. In poll after poll, most of us want to leave this decision up to the pregnant woman. We know instinctively that unless we're willing to take care of every unwanted child from birth

to adulthood, we have to leave the decision to the woman. We have to give the right to one who carries the responsibilities. But it is unsettling that there is, literally, no way to come into the legal system discussing this complex moral view. The language of law has few words in common with the language of personal decisions.

In court, we speak in the strident words of individual rights, insisting that one is more important than the other. Out of court, we speak about the interlocking web of responsibilities for each other.

I wish there were a new vocabulary to offer up for this anniversary, but I cannot find one that can be understood in both places. We are stuck now as we were on the day in January, 1973, when the story of a woman's life was first translated into a matter of rights.

How can we teach children the importance of keeping abreast of worldwide current events when the school budgets cannot afford to provide newspapers or Weekly Readers?

How can we prepare children for computer technology when the schools can't provide us with computers? How can we build our strong teaching staff when Idaho salaries are 20 percent lower than salaries in the surrounding states?

If we want — expect — our children to be able to change and improve their world, we have to give them the means now that they need. Cutting funding to education, even in the worst of times, is cutting our hopes for the future.

We need strong public schools for a strong, thinking future in Idaho. Please, contact your legislators today, and urge them to give

Dallas case is tragedy

Britain ready for invasion

LONDON (UPI) — Britain is ready to repulse any fresh Argentine invasion of the Falkland Islands, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said Thursday, but some soldiers are complaining that life in the South Atlantic is miserable.

Mrs. Thatcher was responding to reports from Washington of an Argentine naval build-up that could signal a campaign of harassment against the islands Britain recaptured from Argentina after a 74-day war last year.

"Bearing in mind that Argentina has not agreed to the permanent cessation of hostilities, let alone renounced the use of force, the possibility of further attacks has been one that is ever present with us and one for which the troops are alert," Mrs. Thatcher told Parliament.

"I hope if there were other attacks they would be firmly repulsed," she said. "If there are such attacks, we should have to consider our position about what to do, apart from repulsing them, very carefully."

Royal Air Force Phantom jets have stepped up their round-the-clock surveillance around the Falklands, guarded by a garrison of about 4,000 British troops.

But not all of them are happy on the bleak and desolate South Atlantic islands. One soldier wrote to The Sun newspaper painting a miserable picture of army life in the Falklands — no fresh water, no free beer, no free phone calls home, no sanitation, no laundry and no Christmas entertainment.

Troops were using sleeping bags that would not get cleaned in five months, the anonymous soldier said. There were numerous cases of food poisoning "due to poor food and lack of refrigeration," he said. "The eggs we eat are 7 months old."

The soldiers celebrated the new year with four small cans of beer while officers feted the Falkland islanders with barbecues and a party fortified with the troops rations, he said.

"The public are being misled about the facts of life out here," he said.

Celebrities in Salvador protest rights violations

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Celebrities and congressmen opposing military aid for El Salvador toured the country Thursday, the eve of President Reagan's expected certification that the government's human rights policy is improving.

Leftist guerrillas at the same time claimed to have killed or captured 388 government forces since Jan. 7 and also said 63 civilians were killed

in an army bombardment Thursday. The guerrilla charge came as a U.S. Embassy spokesman said the mission had recommended Reagan "certify" El Salvador is making sufficient progress in respecting human rights to keep up the flow of \$60 million in military aid. The presidential certification, required every six months by Congress, is expected Friday. A host of congressmen and personalities, including folk singer Mary Travers of the Peter, Paul and Mary group and actor Mike Farrell of the "M.A.S.H." television series, are touring El

Salvador on a crusade against certification. In a visit Wednesday to two San Salvador jails holding political prisoners, Miss Travers and Farrell led inmates in singing protest songs supporting the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front, El Salvador's guerrilla coalition. Richard White, whose brother Robert is a former U.S. ambassador to El Salvador and a critic of Reagan Administration policy, "crashed" a private dinner for a 16-member human rights delegation and U.S. Embassy

staffers. "The government of El Salvador should talk with the guerrillas as the only way to find peace in the country and the region," White told the dinner Wednesday night. In other developments, Rep. Robert Torricelli, D-N.J., arrived in San Salvador to retrieve a boy thought to be that of freelance journalist John Sullivan, 28, Bogota, N.J., who disappeared from his hotel on Dec. 29, 1980, just hours after arriving in El Salvador.

Congressman sees Central America war clouds

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., said Thursday he sees "war clouds on the horizon" in Central America, urging Nicaragua and Washington to open talks "while there is a possibility of peace."

In a news conference in Managua's Sandino International airport at the end of a three-day visit to Nicaragua, Solarz and James Leach, R-Iowa, agreed the Central American political

situation is deteriorating. The House members, who met Nicaraguan government officials, political opponents of the Marxist-led regime, private businessmen and church officials, left Managua for Panama and Venezuela.

Earlier they visited Mexico and El Salvador. "There are war clouds on the horizon, and it's essential that we deal with this problem now, while the

possibility of peace still exists," Solarz said. "An accord could be reached between the United States and Nicaragua, and at the same time with other countries of the region. In which all promise not to interfere in internal matters of other countries," he said. Nevertheless, Solarz said, "there are no guarantees that a dialogue between the United States and Nicaragua will be successful. Both

sides have suspicions and worries." "I personally see no sign of a change in the policy" of the Reagan administration, which blames Nicaragua's Sandinista leadership for fomenting political rebellion in El Salvador and elsewhere, Solarz said. "The situation in Central America could drastically deteriorate" if a solution is not found, Leach said. Solarz said Sandinistas "explained the military situation" during a trip

to the U.S. lawmakers made to Nueva Segovia, a province on the Nicaraguan-Honduran border that has seen several incursions by exiled Nicaraguan rightists. "I have no doubts that the Nicaraguan government has been giving significant assistance to the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front," said Solarz, referring to the coalition of leftist Salvadoran guerrilla groups.



Youth opens fire, kills student, self

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — An 8th grader armed with two handguns opened fire in a junior high school study hall Thursday, then shot himself to death. Two other students were struck by the shots, including one who died later at a hospital.

"This is a junior high right out of the '50s," said Don Sentl, principal of Parkway South Junior High School. "This is unbelievable. Our kids don't even carry cigarettes."

"It was a typical classroom with a supposedly typical bunch of kids and a typical Phys. Ed. teacher watching them study."

The St. Louis County Police Department, which sent 17 cars to the scene, said the shooting erupted at 10:45 a.m. MST, shortly before the 25 students in the study hall were to break for lunch.

The student with the guns was identified as David F. Lawler, 14, of Manchester. Police said an undetermined number of shots were fired from a .22-caliber automatic and a .22-caliber revolver.

Randell A. Koger, 15, of Ballwin was wounded and taken to St. John's Mercy Medical Center, where he died in the emergency room. Greg Palmer, 15, of St. Louis was wounded in the chest and in serious condition at St. Joseph Hospital in Kirkwood.

All three were in the 8th grade. Det. Richard Seymour said Lawler and Koger had argued Wednesday after a pen. He said the two were looking at a yearbook Thursday when

Koger apparently made derogatory comments about Lawler's brother.

"Lawler walked over to his gym bag, pulled out a revolver and emptied it at him," said Seymour. "The teacher (Sherry McWhorter) thought it was a cap gun and they were just playing."

"She tried to get it away from him, not realizing he had shot the kids behind her. He dropped the gun, walked to the gym bag and pulled out a second gun. He then walked toward the door, shot himself in the head and dropped dead."

Seymour said a bag of ammunition and a large knife were found in the bag.

"The kids were running all over the place crying," he said.

Sentl said Lawler had no record of violence at the school and he knew of no "long-standing feud" between Lawler and Koger.

"Good attendance, above average grades — one outstanding in citizenship," Sentl said while looking through his records on Lawler. "Almost perfect attendance."

Although school was not canceled, the students who witnessed the shooting were taken to a small gymnasium and met with a counselor and a minister.

"They're in very bad shape," said Sentl. "They're responding differently as junior high kids do, but all were grief stricken. Physical violence isn't something that had happened here, and nobody was suspecting it."

New jobless claims on the rise again

WASHINGTON (UPI) — New claims for unemployment benefits rose for the second straight week, the Labor Department reported Thursday, and business and labor economists forecast a rise in the nation's 10.8 percent jobless rate.

"I would expect the 10.8 percent to go up," said AFL-CIO economist Rudy Oswald.

The department said data for the week ended Jan. 8, adjusted for seasonal factors, showed 550,000 persons filing new claims for benefits, 10,000 more than the previous week.

In a two-week period, the number of weekly claims jumped by 53,000 from the 515,000 level during the week ended Dec. 25. That had been the lowest in six months.

Initial claims are often regarded by economists as a barometer of the job

market. The January unemployment rate will be released Feb. 4.

Oswald said, "The continual growth ... of initial claims shows that the unemployment situation is continuing to worsen as more and more are laid off." He also noted a growing problem of workers exhausting unemployment benefits.

Jerry Jasinoski, economist for the National Association of Manufacturers, said the latest report "shows some businesses are still cutting their work force."

"There hasn't been any real pickup in the economy," Jasinoski said. "I think unemployment will go above 11 percent ... quite possibly in January."

The department said that while the number of applicants since the new year rose, there was a decline in the number of persons receiving jobless benefits.

Watt defends position on Indian reservations

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Interior Secretary James Watt called Thursday for the liberation of Indians from domination by federal bureaucrats: "Get Washington off their backs. That's the problem, Washington."

Watt, fending off demands for his resignation from Indian leaders, argued, "The American Indian needs help. They have too much unemployment. All these social problems are symptoms of the basic cause."

"Let's address causes instead of just addressing the symptoms."

Appearing on ABC's "Good Morning America," Watt said he was not surprised by the outrage expressed over his recent remarks that widespread alcohol and drug abuse, unemployment, divorce and venereal disease among Indians are examples of "the failure of socialism" in the federal reservation system. A number of Indian leaders called for his resignation Wednesday.

"Any day of the week you can go and get some of those people to call for my resignation," the secretary said.

"I think that's healthy," added Watt, who has never shied from controversy during his tumultuous tenure. "We need to have this issue debated."

Noting the Indian problem has persisted for a century, Watt said, "I've tried for two years to focus attention on this terrible plight ... and hopefully we'll get some attention and coverage soon."

While Indian leaders did not dispute Watt's assessment of the woes confronting the 1.4 million Indians living on government-run reservations, some branded his comments as "racial slurs." They suggested his anti-reservation remarks may be part of an effort to pry Indian lands — some rich in minerals and energy reserves — away from tribal control.

Satellite to crash next week

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government alerted emergency teams Thursday against the slender possibility that radioactive debris from Russia's spy satellite, expected to plunge from orbit Sunday or Monday, might hit the United States.

Concerns which surfaced just such a strike from a Soviet spaceship in 1978, took similar action.

With Cosmos 1402 drifting ever closer on its inexorable but unpredictable path toward Earth, the Federal Emergency Management Agency in Washington ordered special teams on the ready "for

possible deployment to the scene of any U.S. impacted area."

A Pentagon spokesman said the crash is expected anytime between 11 p.m. MST Saturday and 1 p.m. MST Monday. But there is "no way" to put the satellite's precise course, or predict just where it will hit, until it begins its searing return through the atmosphere.

The spacecraft dropped another five miles in a 24-hour period, the spokesman said, coming within 109.2 miles of Earth at its lowest point and 114.6 miles at its highest, "as of 4 a.m. MST Thursday."

Clark's birthday is today

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI) — University of Utah Medical Center doctors, nurses and staff will gather around artificial heart recipient Barney Clark today to help him eat chocolate cake and celebrate a birthday he never thought he'd see.

The hospital's bakers were busily preparing the large birthday cake Thursday, to be presented to Dr. Clark and his wife Una Loy in the hospital's surgical intensive care unit, which has been Clark's home for 51 days.

Clark will greet his 62nd birthday still recovering from an emergency — although minor — surgery Tuesday to stop a gushing nosebleed caused by the anticoagulate he will take for the rest of his life, and by irritation from a feeding tube he had in his nose until recently.



Police drag away protesters at University Hall

Berkeley protest produces arrest of at least 79

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — Police in riot gear made scores of arrests Thursday during a student protest of the University of California's involvement in nuclear weapons and war-related research.

At least 79 people were arrested during the blockade of entrances to University Hall, which houses administrative offices including UC President David Saxon.

The protest was observed by Berkeley Mayor Gus Newport, a longtime civil rights activist who said he supported the anti-nuclear stance.

The non-violent "sit-in" blockade by 300 persons was to protest the

training of scientists in war-related activities and to show opposition for the nuclear weapons research programs at the university-run Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory.

Those arrested were handcuffed and put in prison buses for transportation to Santa Rita Rehabilitation Center for processing, on misdemeanor charges of blocking a public entrance.

The demonstrators formed small "human chains" at the administrative building entrances and police moved in on the students several times to break up the blockades. At one point, officers

forceably dispersed 400 people who were blocking a driveway being used by the prison buses.

"Education — not — radiation," chanted one protester as she was being carried away.

"Police, as they became used to the situation, were more careful in the use of force," said Jonathan Simon, a legal consultant for the protesters, adding, "There was some roughness."

The blockade was organized by the Livermore Action Group, which led protests last year outside the gates of the Livermore, Calif., weapons research lab.

Social Security report in

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Social Security commission, tossing its hot potato to the politicians, Thursday delivered a \$168 billion package of tax and benefit changes to President Reagan and congressional leaders.

In its formal report, the panel proposes wiping out the system's immediate cash shortage over seven years with increased payroll taxes, a six-month benefits freeze, a tax on checks of upper-income pensioners and requiring new federal workers to join. An incorrect calculation of the cost of improved widow's benefits reduced savings from the originally announced \$169 billion.

Under the proposal, a \$20,000-a-year worker would pay \$63 more in payroll taxes in 1991. Social Security's 35 million beneficiaries would wait until next January for cost-of-living hikes, with single pensioners losing an estimated \$132 and couples \$222.

The package only erases two-thirds of the system's 75-year debt, however, leaving the rest up to Congress. It was adopted Saturday on a 12-3 vote by the National Commission on Social Security Reform after more than a year of meetings.

The report, with 23 pages of formal recommendations, also contains 11 chapters of dissenting "and supplemental views — reflecting the unsavory choices forced on the bipartisan panel in its drive to forge a compromise."

"While no one member is happy with every specific recommendation, the important fact is that a consensus was reached on how to save the system," Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., and Rep. Barber Conable, R-N.Y., said.

Rupert won't make WPPSS payment

RUPERT — The first payments on two abandoned WPPSS nuclear-power plants are due next Tuesday, but the city of Rupert will not send any money until a court orders it to do so.

Rupert City Council has approved a motion that states the city will not pay any billings from the Washington Public Power Supply System until a "conclusive decision" has been reached by the judicial system concerning the city's liability, said

Don Chisholm, the city's attorney.

The city's action was taken Tuesday night in response to a recent ruling of a King County, Wash., judge, who is presiding over the complex litigation. It involves the 88 utilities and municipalities that sponsored the two plants and the trustee for the investors who bought the bonds sold to finance the projects.

Judge H. Joseph Coleman said the 88 participants, which include Rupert, should begin paying their share of the termination costs when the payments become due Tuesday.

However, Coleman also ruled that WPPSS officials could not force the participants to start repaying the bond debt on the two projects, which were "mothballed" due to decreased power demands and financing difficulties.

The entire debt is predicted to hit \$7 billion over a 30-year period. In the current, ongoing court case, The Chemical Bank of New York, the trustee for the bondholders, is seeking repayment of the bonds by the participants.

Rupert's "bill" from WPPSS is \$54,591 per month.

Health department listed as 'stable'

TWIN FALLS — The South Central District Health Department board was told Wednesday that the department is in stable financial condition, despite decreases in state appropriations.

Health department director Gerald Hurst said the department is operating on an austere budget but is in fairly good shape to start the year.

The governor's 10.5 percent holdback in state funds has left the department at a funding level below what it had in 1979, he said.

However, Hurst said increased fees charged for services and a reduction in personnel have helped stem the flow of "red" ink. The department is working with five fewer staff members than it did last year, he said.

Although Hurst said there might be an additional holdback this year, he is hopeful that the state will

come up with enough money to set up a laboratory in Twin Falls in 1984. Health department labs in Pocatello and Bostie just can't serve the Twin Falls area well enough, he said.

In other business, board members said they would seek to inform county coroners better about sudden infant-death syndrome.

Sudden infant-death syndrome, or "crib" death, is the leading cause of death among infants in Idaho, said Martha Ewer, a public-health nurse. About 85 percent of all children who die between the ages of 1-week and 1 year will die from crib death, she said.

The syndrome involves the sudden death of a well-cared-for and apparently healthy baby. Doctors have not pinpointed a cause yet, but they stress that the parents are not to blame.

Despite its frequency, Ewer said "crib" deaths is often misdiagnosed. An autopsy is required to confirm it. Area coroners are sometimes reluctant

to perform an autopsy because of parental objections, or the cost, she said.

Ewer, however, said parents feel better when they know their child died from crib death and not from pneumonia or suffocation. Therefore, she is urging coroners to conduct autopsies in the case of infant deaths.

When parents can't afford an autopsy, the state will contribute up to \$250 toward its cost, Ewer said. The coroners also have funds available, she said.

And "counseling is important in reducing for parents the stress and guilt associated with crib death," Ewer said.

The Circle of Compassionate Friends provides such counseling in the Mini-Cassia area, and other group meets at the College of Southern Idaho in Twin Falls. For more information on either crib death or the support groups, contact Ewer at the health department.

FBI enters the case

Jerome man arrested in farm scam

JEROME — David Randall, 30, of Jerome was in the Jerome County Jail on Thursday night, charged with "grand theft by deception" in connection with alleged fraud in the purchase of a dairy-farm operation.

Jerome County Prosecutor Dennis Adamson said the charge brought against Randall involves the business methods he used to buy a 300-cow dairy farm in Jerome County on about Dec. 22.

Randall, formerly a partner in the bankrupt Randall Farms Ltd. of Jerome, purchased the Robert Niles dairy of Jerome last month. In making the purchase, Randall set up a new corporation, Golden Eagle Farms Inc.

The complaint against Randall states that he illegally obtained \$12,000 in escrow funds, which were being held for the purchase of the Niles farm, pending the clearance of certificates of deposit Randall had given for the property and livestock. Randall is scheduled to be arraigned this after-

noon in Fifth District Magistrate Court in Jerome. Adamson said Randall was arrested at his home in Jerome about 5:30 p.m. Thursday. He said bond is expected to be set during today's arraignment.

Adamson said Thursday night that the investigation is continuing, with both local officials and the FBI working on the case.

In addition, information from law-enforcement officials indicates the Jerome County investigation resulted in the arrest Thursday of another individual in Los Angeles.

Known as a "Mr. Pedley," the individual reportedly has been under federal indictment for the past several years and allegedly was involved in Randall's financial backing for Golden Eagle Farms.

Sources in Jerome County indicate that Randall filed for bankruptcy in September when Randall Farms Ltd., in which he had been a partner and business manager, filed for bankruptcy.

Since Dec. 22, Randall had operated the Golden Eagle Farms, an Idaho corporation doing business in Jerome County. It was through this corporation

that Randall had purchased the Niles dairy, and reportedly, Randall was in the process of buying another dairy farm in Gooding County.

It also was reported that through financial backers in Mexico City, Randall allegedly used certificates of deposit for the dairy purchase, and was writing bank drafts for feed and other operational costs on the Merchants Bank and Trust Co. Ltd. of Salpan. Some certificates of deposit also were issued through the Salpan bank, according to local sources.

Jerome banks reportedly attempted to cash these bank drafts, only to learn that while there is a bank in Salpan by that name, it does not have sufficient assets to cover the drafts or certificates of deposit.

One such draft reportedly amounted to \$42,000, to cover the cost of feed for the dairy cattle.

Reportedly, Randall acquired the Niles Dairy for \$1.2 million in certificates of deposit, which were to mature between March and December of this year. One estimate indicates that about \$400,000 in certificates of deposit and bank drafts have been negotiated in Jerome County through the Salpan bank by Golden Eagle Farms since late last month.

McClure meets with Magic Valley farmers

TWIN FALLS — Sen. James McClure met with representatives of a farm protest group Thursday and offered to help individuals treated unfairly by federal agricultural lenders.

McClure met with representatives from the Magic Valley Borrowers Association at his office in Twin Falls.

"They're representative of a large group of farmers that are in serious economic trouble," McClure said after the meeting. "They're groping for answers, as are the rest of us. How do you weather the economic storms until 'conditions improve?'"

He said he asked for "specific information and facts upon which we can attempt to take action. In some instances, changes in government policy has been a major contributor to their problems."

Galen Guthrie, the Shoshone dairyman who helped found the protest organization with an attempt earlier this month to block a farm sale in Wendell, said after the meeting that McClure "told it like it was."

Tony Linsay, a Jerome County farmer and a director of the protest group, said McClure told the farmers that he may be able to help individuals who have problems with the Farmers Home Administration.

The senator told them that action would be more effective than trying to find solutions that could be imposed from the top, Linsay said.

Farmers who have a realistic chance of paying off their debts should be given continued support from the FmHA and the opportunity to repay their debt, McClure said.

"There is a judgment factor that needs to be applied," he said. McClure said he sees no conflict

between helping farmers by extending additional credit at the same time that Congress, in his view, must cut the federal budget deficit.

McClure sees cutting the deficit as the key to recovery for all sectors of the economy.

"The real problem lies not in these (farm) programs," he said. "The real problem lies in these entitlement programs."

The budget deficit cannot be lowered until Congress controls the growth in welfare payments, unemployment compensation and other similar programs, he said.

After the meeting between the farmers and McClure, Guthrie said, "We feel that we are accomplishing much more and having a greater impact than we at first thought we'd be able to do."

But the group has to move quickly, he said.

"If we're going to actually accomplish something, we've got to move and move fast," he said, because once the planting season begins, the protest season will be over.

The group has scheduled a meeting at 11 a.m. today at the Canon Springs Inn in Twin Falls to meet with a representative of the Farmers and Ranchers Protective League. The league can provide legal assistance to farmers, Guthrie said.

Any farmer who is interested in meeting with the group's representative should bring documentation of his problems to the meeting today, Guthrie said.

The group also has scheduled a meeting for 8 p.m. Tuesday at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Shoshone. That will be a general information meeting for farmers, Guthrie said.

Meetings also are scheduled next week in Malad, Blackfoot and Rexburg to help farm Borrowers Association chapters in eastern Idaho, Guthrie said.

Bankers tell growers to watch their budgets

BURLEY — Farm foreclosures, and fears among many farmers that a lender may force them out of business, have made lenders the butt of many jokes recently, a Burley banker says.

"But kidding aside, we are your partners. We're not the enemy," says Jay Nielson, the president of the D.I. Evans Bank in Burley and Albion.

"We've got a lot of money involved. You've got a lot of money involved. All we want is to see you succeed," he says.

Nielson was one of a panel of speakers Thursday at a "farmer's economic survival seminar" in Burley.

About 50 farmers attended the one-day seminar, which was sponsored by the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service, the Idaho Wheat Commission and the Minidoka and Cassia chapters of the Idaho Wheat Growers Association.

Nielson spoke on a panel about how farmers could improve their credit worthiness in a lender's eyes.

Bankers have a problem that people often forget, he said. "That isn't our money we're loaning you."

When a farmer who has deposited money comes into a bank to withdraw a portion of it, the bank must have it ready. "Conversely, when that loan comes due, we need you to come in and pay," Nielson said.

In this year of low commodity prices, that has been difficult for some farmers.

"We're under a terrific strain in agriculture," he said. "I'm not telling you anything you don't know. But I see it every day. I see grown men sitting at my desk crying."

One of the biggest things that might have helped some of these people avoid losing their farms would have been better financial records, Nielson said. Month by month, a farmer needs to know where he stands.

He needs a realistic budget at the start of the year, Nielson said, and every day throughout the year, he needs to be able to find out if he is over budget, or under budget. If he is over budget, he must be able to find out why, so he can correct the problem.

"It takes a pretty good-sized individual, to my way of thinking, to discipline himself to a budget," said Ron Osterhout, a Burley accountant who spoke on the panel.

"I just completed a financial statement for a sizable farming operation that paid \$1.3 million in interest last year." Another agricultural accountant he has worked with is \$3.5 million behind in its interest payments.

"Both of these operations have acted against a lot of good advice over the years," Osterhout said. They made purchases above and beyond what they planned for in their budgets, and thus, built up their debt.

"I can almost promise you that if you don't stick to a budget, you're going to get further behind," he said.

"We're looking at cash flow more than ever," said Rick Archibald, an assistant manager at the First Security Bank branch in Burley.

Farmers need to be aware of their cash flow, hold their debt to a level that they can afford to pay with this cash flow and try to build up a cash reserve for those inevitable bad years when they need a little extra cushion.

"The squeeze won't always be here," Archibald said. "When it is here, you need something to fall back on."

Horner's weight part of pact

ATLANTA -- The Atlanta Braves, with Bob Horner's consent, have added a whopping \$100,000 weight clause to his new four-year, \$5.5 million contract.

The third baseman will be paid an additional

\$100,000 per season if he maintains a weight of 215 pounds or less.

The agreement requires Horner to weigh in before all Friday home games, and the 1983 season includes 13 Friday home games. If Horner tips the scales at more than 215, he won't be penalized. But each time he weighs 215 pounds or less, he will receive nearly \$7,700.

Horner's agent, Bucky Woy of Dallas, Thursday confirmed the existence of the weight clause, which was negotiated separately from the rest of Horner's contract. Other Braves are not required to weigh-in on a regular basis.

Horner stresses the weight clause was the Braves' idea, and he doesn't believe he has a "weight problem." Horner insists his weight has fluctuated by "only a few pounds" since he joined the Braves in 1978.

When Horner reported to spring training last year, he weighed about 215 pounds. By the end of the season, he was thought to weigh around 235.

Herzog gets crystal trophy

ST. LOUIS (UPI) -- Whitey Herzog, the manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, Thursday was presented with a \$15,000 crystal trophy as *The Sporting News'* 1982 Man of the Year.

"I hope I don't drop it," Herzog said as he received the trophy.

Masters: McEnroe, Vilas win

NEW YORK (UPI) -- John McEnroe, single-handedly taking on the Argentine Davis Cup team, disposed of Jose-Luis Clerc 6-3, 6-4 Thursday night to set up a semifinal meeting with Guillermo Vilas in the \$400,000 Masters Championship.

Earlier in the day, Vilas won his quarterfinal match from Andres Gomez of Ecuador 7-5, 6-4, winning five games in a row after coming within two points of dropping the opening set.

The tournament is known as the Volvo Masters.

The United States will begin defense of its Davis Cup title in Buenos Aires the first week of March when McEnroe might have to face both Clerc and Vilas although it is still not certain if both Argentine stars will compete.

As usual, controversy was a constant companion to McEnroe, who once again antagonized the hometown Madison Square Garden crowd into a loud jeering chorus because of his shouts and protests. At one point in the eighth game of the second set, when McEnroe was given back a fault because of an error by chair umpire Frank Hammond, the crowd whistled every time McEnroe attempted to serve, causing him to scream out, "Act like a human being."

Clerc took advantage of the situation to break service in that game and even the set 4-4. But McEnroe retaliated with the decisive break in the ninth game on his fifth break point when Clerc netted his sharp forehand.

"I was brought up in this area and I would hope people will think of that," McEnroe said. "It wasn't my mistake and it was frustrating to hear them."

Although he wasn't too happy with his serve, McEnroe controlled most of the match. He achieved the only break of the opening set in the fourth game and on his first six service games the left-hander conceded only eight points.

But a double-fault cost McEnroe his serve in the fourth game of the second set. He came back to break in the fifth and seventh games before the controversial eighth game.

Vilas, although not particularly pleased with his game, managed to come up with the extra effort on big points that enabled him to rally from a 5-3 deficit in the first set.

"One thing is for sure," he said, "I have to play better than today to win any other matches."

Vilas, the 1974 Masters champion and fourth-ranked player in the world, struggled through most of the first set in this heavy-hitting battle of South American left-hitters. He fell behind 0-40 in the first game, recovering to hold with the help of two aces, but then was broken at love in the fifth game.

Meanwhile, the 22-year-old Gomez, ranked 15th, yielded only three points in his first four service games as he moved to a 5-3 edge. But Vilas, becoming more aggressive on Gomez's serve, saved the set with a break in the 10th game on a forehand cross-court, then held service at love to go up 6-5.

Vilas followed with the decisive break, winning the set with a net cord on his fourth break point. Gomez contributed to his downfall with a double-fault, his only one of the set.

Vilas, with breaks in the fourth and sixth games sandwiched around a Gomez break, appeared to have the match well in hand by jumping to a 5-2 lead in the second set. But Gomez held in an eighth game that went to deuce four times, and broke in the ninth game after Vilas squandered two match points.

Vilas then broke right back in the 10th game on a forehand pass to end the match.

White Sox get May as compensation

CHICAGO (UPI) — The Chicago White Sox Thursday selected veteran southpaw pitcher Rudy May of the New York Yankees as compensation for the loss of free agent outfielder Steve Kemp to the Yankees.

May, 38, was 6-6 with a 2.80 earned run average with New York last year. The veteran pitcher has a lifetime 151-151 record since breaking into major league baseball in 1965 with the California Angels.

The pitching-rich White Sox, who signed free agent pitcher Floyd Banister from Seattle earlier this winter, decided to select May to be a spot starter and reliever, according to General Manager Roland Hemond.

"He's a Jack of all trades. We're a proven club that can win it all next year and as contenders, we feel a veteran like Rudy May can help us right away," Hemond explained.

For the second straight year, the White Sox were awarded a player in the compensation selection process because of the loss of a Type A free agent. Last year they lost reliever Ed Farmer to the Philadelphia Phillies and selected 21-year-old catcher Joel Skinner, son of former Pittsburgh Pirate outfielder Bob Skinner, of the Pirates roster.

"We took a young player then but we feel we needed to go with a veteran now," Hemond said.

The White Sox were not obligated to choose a player from the Yankees, even though May was not protected by New York.

The selection of May was actually delayed 90 minutes as White Sox owners Jerry Reinsdorf and Ed Ewing along with Hemond talked to several other clubs about possible deals. None were forthcoming.

Ted Williams heads Bosox dream team

BOSTON (UPI) — Hall of Famer Ted Williams was named the greatest Boston Red Sox player of all time Thursday by a landslide in balloting for Boston's "Dream Team."

Williams was joined in the outfield by current Red Sox stars Dwight Evans and Carl Yastrzemski.

"This is a hell of a team. It's an honor and I think the people of New England, their heart is closer to this team," Williams said. "I think the fans might have voted with their hearts instead of their eyes and the facts."

"I don't know how some of the players (on the list) could have been left off that team."

The infield consisted of Jimmie Pox with first base; Bobby Doerr at second base; Rick Burleson at shortstop and Rleo Petrocelli at third base. Carlton Fisk was the catcher.

Dick Williams, who guided the Red Sox to their "Impossible Dream" American League pennant in 1967, was a wide choice for all time manager.

Babe Ruth also made the team as the left-handed pitcher while Cy Young was the right-handed pitcher and Dick Radatz was the relief pitcher.

The balloting, conducted by the Gillette Co., was done last summer and more than 83,000 votes were cast. Among those just failing to make the team were third baseman Frank Malzone, pitcher Lefty Grove and reliever Sparky Lyle.

Billman creates a subtly shaded world

TWIN FALLS — Black and white and shades of gray illuminate the world of Twin Falls artist Blaine Billman.

It is a world filled with glowering timber wolves and startled mallards, bleak peaks and vigilant eagles.

Using the tools of pen and ink, Billman takes onlookers into a realm of wildlife, a land he discovered when he moved to Idaho from the Midwest.

While wildlife pictures, like many Western subjects, are popular in places like Idaho, Billman says he is at a disadvantage because he works exclusively in pen and ink.

Most buyers are drawn to bright hues of watercolors and oils, he says. Although rich in detail, his pieces are barren of color; and

most serious art buyers select paintings as investments, according to Billman.

"If I was looking for a successful business, I was a fool to get into pen and ink. I feel I've chosen a very difficult medium to become successful in the art world."

Yet, his medium does not limit his imagination, as demonstrated by his most recent piece: an intimate look at two pheasants rising from a field. Bright glows like dark pearls in their eyes; each patterned feather stands out in astonishment. Behind them, a corn field stands ripe with embellishments.

If details in Billman's drawings seem infinitely minute, Billman's outward confidence in himself is boundless.

He shows no embarrassment uttering phrases like, "I really believe I can do things with pen and ink that no one else can do." Or, "I'm extremely good at what I do, and no one

does it better. No one does it like I do."

Above his workbench, among the photos of elk, ducks and other wildlife, hangs Billman's words of encouragement to himself.

"So this is the path I've chosen. I'll walk it well and never lose sight of my goals. For I have a gift to share and my strength will see me through. Though it seems all uphill, I will never take no for an answer. The world will remember."

Clearly, Billman, 29, does not suffer from faint-heartedness.

Moreover, the path the young artist has chosen may be difficult because it has been trampled by others less disciplined than him.

Wildlife pictures can be the most overdone and insipid of the dime-store art trade. From cuddly wolf cubs to overbearing elks to plaintive baby seals, cute animals are the

raw materials for mass-market schmaltz factories.

It's not Billman's intention to draw "cute" animals.

"I don't try to idealize the picture at all. I want to get away from wildlife portraits."

He says he tries to capture what the animal is seeing or smelling or feeling.

"I'm not drawing an animal but a personal relationship I have with it."

"I'm not going to be a gift-shop artist," he adds, with a slightly disdainful air.

The statement harks back to a time three years ago when an elementary school teacher decided he wanted to become a "serious" artist.

The teacher took some of his drawings to galleries in Jackson, Wyo., and received polite rejections. One of the turn-downs was less than polite. The teacher was told he had

"nothing but a skill" and that his pieces were not "art."

"When I left there, I was mad and I wasn't discouraged. I came home and drew all night. The guy really put a burr in my saddle," Billman says.

Billman continued to draw and started to market his work through Twin Falls outlets, art fairs and shows. He quit his teaching job and worked as a waiter to devote more time to his craft. His images have become familiar sights in local art stores, bookstores and College of Southern Idaho bulletin boards.

His work now is exhibited at galleries in Ketchum, Seattle, Portland and Jackson. His entry in the national duck-stamp contest was one of those selected for a special exhibition. He was also one of the 120 Idaho artists chosen out of 400 for possible inclusion in an

Dancer takes step to organize troupe

TWIN FALLS — For many aspiring Twin Falls dancers, the annual recital before adoring relatives may be their only opportunity for performance in front of an audience.

Yet, the Magic Valley supports a variety of dance classes, filled with would-be dancers who probably would like to test their practice in an on-stage experience.

Aside from the musicals staged by various theatrical groups, this area has few opportunities for either dancers or those who enjoy watching dances.

But Sherri Carpenter, a Gooding dance teacher, hopes to increase the opportunities for dance in the Magic Valley soon. Specifically, she is organizing a professional dance troupe, under the auspices of the Renaissance Academy of the Arts, at 502 Second Ave. E. in Twin Falls.

Carpenter aims to attract three to six "good" dancers, interested in either jazz, ballet or tap dancing, who would put on dance concerts at the academy, at schools or for other community groups.

While Ketchum has a small dance company, Carpenter knows of no other such company in the southern part of Magic Valley.

Carpenter will hold tryouts for the company next Saturday, Jan. 29, at the academy, starting at 11 a.m. She invites interested dancers to come out to learn more about her proposed company. She's especially interested in drawing male dancers, a rare commodity in Idaho.

Carpenter has been teaching dance in Gooding for the last four years. Previously, she studied dance at the University of Utah in Salt Lake City and worked with the Gus Giordano Jazz Dance Company, based in Chicago.

She has performed with the San Francisco Conservatory of Ballet and was a guest teacher for the Chicago National Association of Dance Masters.

She has assisted in the choreography of local productions of "Annie Get Your Gun," and "LJ! Abner," and choreographed a number of high-school productions.

In addition, she has studied jazz, ballet and modern and tap dancing with teachers in Omaha, Chicago, Salt Lake City, San Francisco and Seattle.

Carpenter wants her company to work with a variety of dance styles, rather than be locked into any one form. She envisions small productions, rather than lavish extravaganzas.

"I'd like to have a company that's entertaining, that would appeal to general audiences," she says.

However, she acknowledges that this area may not have an eager, ready-made dance audience.

"I think we'll have to build the interest (in dance) a little bit at a time."

Still, "People are seeing a lot of dance on television. There usually is a pretty good turnout when they bring in ballet companies," she says.

In the upcoming audition, Carpenter says she's looking for "people with good technique; it may come from ballet, it may come from modern."

"If we have only three people who are good, we'll start with that," she says.

Carpenter also plans to start teaching a jazz and a tap-dance class at the Renaissance Academy, but she emphasizes that the company is open to dancers in all other area classes.

She hopes to be organized soon enough to put on a dance concert at area high schools before summer vacation.

Actors and their flaks push for Oscars

HOLLYWOOD — The Oscar race is off and running with studios and production companies shamelessly bidding for movie academy votes.

Principal campaign arenas are the Hollywood trade papers, Daily Variety and the Hollywood Reporter, and billboards along the Sunset Strip.

Another play is special screenings for films released earlier in the year and which may have been forgotten.

Some ads are taken without the consent of actors, writers and directors who may be in the running.

Others openly seek the golden statuette by hiring press agents for a few months to get a campaign rolling. Some stars merely flail flaks, already in their employ, to get cracking.

Many a star or director is not above harassing the studio to spend more bucks on ads to bring greater attention to their work.

Possibly the most effective campaign this year is Paul Newman's for best actor in the role of the



washed-up, gin-soaked attorney in "The Verdict."

Newman made the covers of Time magazine and Rolling Stone. He also came out with his own brand of salad oil. Note is taken that he has been nominated five times, but has never won the coveted Oscar.

Long a believer in a low publicity profile, Newman has generated attention but objects to ad-taking. He asked 20th Century-Fox not to campaign on his behalf.

There are no outright ads suggesting Newman for the Oscar, but his photograph does appear in ads for "The Verdict" as best picture and in a full-page ad for James Mason for best supporting actor in the film.

The greatest wave of Oscar advertising is for Meryl Streep for her performance as the Polish concentration camp victim in "Sophie's Choice."

The money is squandered simply because Streep, justifiably, is an absolute shoo-in, dead clinch look to win the award for best actress. She is sensational.

On the other hand, the producers of "Frances" are convinced Jessica Lange, who does a splendid job in the title role, has a chance. Their ad reminds voters she was nominated for a Golden Globe earlier this month.

The Globes nominations, determined by a handful of Hollywood Foreign Press Association members, encouraged studios to buy clumps of ads heralding these dubious distinctions.

Twentieth Century-Fox bought

centerfolds in both trades thanking the foreign press for nominating Sally Field for "Kiss Me Goodbye." Al Pacino for "Author, Author," Newman and Mason for "The Verdict" and "Quest for Fire" as the best foreign film.

Columbia did the same thing for its four big pictures -- "Gandhi," "Annie," "Tempest" and "Tootsie" -- and the individuals also nominated.

So far, Ben Kingsley, who stars as "Gandhi" and who is an outstanding candidate for a nomination, has not been seen among the ads.

For some reason there appears to be more advertising for supporting roles this year, including Cher for "Come Back to the 5 and Dime Jimmy Dean, Jimmy Dean," Robert Preston in "Victor-Victoria," Gena Rowlands in "Tempest" and Mason.

Among others starring in ads are Richard Gere for best actor in "An Officer and a Gentleman," Nick Nolte in "48 Hours," Diane Keaton in "Shoot The Moon" and Harrison Ford in "Blade Runner."

Directed by the talented Walter Hill, who makes gunfite seem more lively than it has in recent years. R. 3 1/2 stars.

FRIDAY THE 13TH, PART III: Twelve people are horribly murdered in the third episode of this abysmal summer slash-and-gore series. BUT, they're murdered in superb 3-D! The scene where one victim's eyeballs pop out to the tops of the audience is a real milestone. One star for the movie, three for the dimensions. R for the grisly violence.

HONKY-TONK MAN: Clint Eastwood and his son Kyle star in an offbeat, dusky drama about an alcoholic country singer who with his

dying days provides his innocent nephew with enough life experiences to last a lifetime. PG. 2 1/2 stars.

KISS ME GOODBYE: A mixed up movie that wants to be both a screwball comedy and a sober treatise on grief. That's too much territory. Sally Field stars as a young widow who still has not gotten over the loss of her show business husband (James Caan, who reappears as a ghost) even as she is about to marry a shy archeologist (Jeff Bridges). PG. 2 stars.

SIX WEEKS: Mary Tyler Moore and Dudley Moore star in an effective tearjerker about a little girl with a fatal illness. What makes the film work beyond its maudlin angle is that Dudley Moore creates a charming, witty and upbeat character who makes us smile before the sadness. PG. 3 stars.

STILL-OF-THE-NIGHT: Meryl Streep and Roy Scheider star in a dull Hitchcock-influenced psychological thriller about a psychiatrist who is dazzled by the image of an ice-cool blond. A murder lurks around the corner of the mind. For all of the tension, the characters remain deadheaded; so one is more afraid of being scared by the movie than because of any identification with the characters. R. 2 stars.

TOOTSIE: More than the year's funniest film, "Tootsie" also is a celebration of the actor's life and a sly comment on sexual role-playing with Dustin Hoffman in a brilliant double role as an actor so desperate for work he takes a job as actress without anyone on the soap opera knowing he's a man. Of all of the holiday pictures, this is the one to see first. PG. 4 stars.

Utah Symphony trying out conductor

SALT LAKE CITY — Boston Symphony assistant conductor Joseph Silverstein was chosen this week to conduct the Utah Symphony — on an interim basis to see how everyone likes the arrangement.

Silverstein, 50, was named the symphony's artistic director, rather than music director. And his tenure with the organization will be reviewed after five concerts, said symphony board president Wendell J. Ashton.

"We expect our relationship with Mr. Silverstein to be a long and happy one," Ashton said. "But we want to give everyone an opinion in a year, so we can be sure we're happy with him and he's happy with us."

Steve Swanner, symphony executive director, said the only reason for Silverstein's unusual title is that artistic director "connotes a temporary arrangement and music director is more permanent."

Ashton admitted the board was "moving with caution" despite high

praise music experts nationwide had for Silverstein, who has been with the Boston Symphony for 27 years and is also its concertmaster.

"Andre Previn, the eminent music director of the Pittsburgh Symphony, told us Silverstein is the greatest concertmaster alive," Ashton said.

He said nearly 200 musicians had applied for the position, "indicating the stature the Utah Symphony has achieved in the music world."

Silverstein was chosen over runner-up Gerard Schwarz, conductor of the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, mainly because of Silverstein's "maturity and experience," said Donald Lloyd, search committee chairman.

Silverstein replaces Varujan Kojan, whose contract was not renewed after three years as Utah Symphony music director.

Kojan's demise led to a minor scandal after he said publicly his lifestyle was the reason board members fired him.

He said he lived out of wedlock with his girlfriend when he first

moved to Utah, and he admitted having a brief affair with a woman who turned out to be a Mormon missionary.

The Armenian-born Kojan said Ashton wanted him to sign a "code of conduct" that would have prevented him from associating with female orchestra members — or having women visitors in his apartment for more than two hours.

But symphony officials said the decision had more to do with Kojan's inability to relate well with his musicians.

Lloyd said the issue of Kojan never came up in the negotiations with Silverstein, and the new artistic director did not seem concerned about adjusting to life in Utah.

But Lloyd admitted Silverstein's lifestyle was investigated and that the search committee was impressed with him as a man as well as a musician.

"He was also an adjunct professor at Boston and Yale universities, is active in his religion — the Jewish faith — and is a respected member of his community," Lloyd said.

Silverstein was tentatively scheduled to join the symphony Aug. 29 while it is on tour in Italy. As artistic director, the new conductor will have the same powers and authority as music director.

"If everyone is satisfied with the arrangement in a year," Swanner said, "Mr. Silverstein will become music director."

Kojan's 3-year tenure began with the retirement of Maurice Abravanel, the symphony's music director for 32 years. Abravanel was credited with building the organization from an obscure civic orchestra into one of the most respected symphonies in the country.

Known as "The Maestro," Abravanel had become an institution in Utah, another factor Kojan cited as leading to his ultimate demise.

"We decided unanimously to offer Silverstein the job," Ashton said. "And we also unanimously approved a resolution thanking Mr. Kojan for his enormous contribution to the symphony, and wishing him well in his future endeavors."

exhibit of Idaho art at the National Museum of American Arts in Washington, D.C.

After the original of his pheasant drawing sold for a pleasant four-figure sum, Billman quit his waterlog job to devote himself full-time to his drawing.

He spends weeks in the field, taking photos of wild animals to use as models for his drawings.

"If someone is going to portray wildlife, you'd better know it," he asserts.

He has stalked elk in Yellowstone, spied on eagles in the Sawtooths and concealed in a camouflaged tube — mingled with ducks and geese on streams.

He points to a photo of a bugling elk.

saying, "That elk there knocked me in the creek. I've been chased (by elk) twice."

"Maybe I'm looking at wildlife through a child's eye. I still get a thrill anytime I see a wild thing move."

"The last time I ever hunted was in a corn field in Jerome. I shot a duck; it survived but couldn't fly. I tracked it by the trail of blood. I followed that duck at least a half-mile when I finally caught up with her. She was lying on the ground, and she slowly lifted her head and seemed to look right through me. She uttered this little cry. I had my doubts that hunting was right for me."

Because of the painstaking detail he insists on, Billman completes only three to four major pieces a year.

"You make a mistake and the

drawing is ruined."

He put 424 hours into the pheasant drawing; prints from the original now are being made by a Salt Lake City firm.

Billman does not hesitate to criticize the work of some other pen-and-ink wildlife artists; he expresses distaste at what he considers a slap-dash manner of pressing pen to paper.

He doesn't see his work in that same class, and he has no qualms about charging more, although the contrast in prices for pen-and-ink work at art shows doesn't help his sales.

Raised in an Air Force family, Billman lived throughout the United States before his family settled in Oklahoma. He attended Oklahoma State University in Stillwater, where he first majored in commercial art and then in education.

In "the spirit of adventure," he came out to Idaho to teach about four years ago. He had never before seen animals in the wild, and his artistic perspective took a new turn.

"First deer I ever saw in my life was when I was driving through eastern Idaho. Now, I'm like a kid in a candy store."

Winning tricks with speed is not always synonymous with profit. Often it pays to give a little first to assure taking a lot later.

Dealer ruffed the second club and saw no reason not to play trumps. Intuitively, he played his trump king to West's ace and with that play, the game was gone. East later scored two more trump tricks and the defense posted a plus score.

"I ran into a nasty trump break," complained South. "I would have made the game against any 3-2 trump break."
"You're right about that," countered North. "But you overlooked an important point. If trumps are 4-1, you cannot make the game unless the singleton is the ace. In that case, it costs nothing to play a low trump instead of the king when you first lead the suit."

North was right of course. The play of a low trump loses only two trump tricks whenever the trumps are 3-2. The defense wins a cheap trick first, later the king drives out the ace. In the next lead, the queen picks up the suit and declarer scores his game.

Against a singleton ace, the defense captures nothing on the first lead and declarer can draw two more rounds with his king and

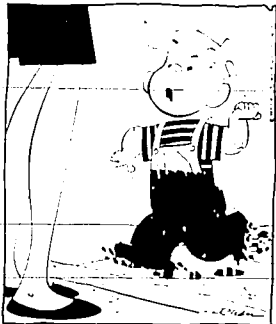

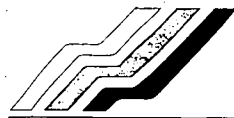
