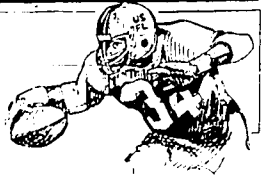

State to regulate own water rights

BOISE — State legislators announced Wednesday that they may have solved a water-supply problem along the Snake River...

That ruling held that Idaho Power's water right at Swan Falls is not subordinate to, or restricted by, any upstream agricultural development...

Also, Idaho Power officials had ordered that

no new electrical hook-ups would be installed for consumptive water uses, except for drinking water...

"But we believe the legislation we introduced today (Wednesday) clears up all these problems," said Rep. Vard Chaburn...

To that end, Chaburn called an emergency meeting of his committee early in the morning to introduce three measures relating to the Swan Falls case.

A bill, based on a 1927 constitutional amendment, that would subordinate Idaho

Power's water right to upstream water diversions.

A resolution to be sent to the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, asking the FERC to subordinate Idaho Power's 50-year power license at Swan Falls...

A bill that would assess a 5-cent-per-acre-foot-of-water fee on irrigators — or about \$2 a year for an average farmer — to help fund research along the Snake River and the adjacent aquifer...

The sudden-session was called Wednesday morning because it was the committee's last opportunity to introduce legislation on its own this session...

public hearings were held across the state last week.

"In the Idaho Code, there is an overlooked measure that says the state has the authority to regulate and limit the use of water for power purposes...

"Added with the general policing power of the state, the Legislature does have the means to quickly and clearly subordinate the power right at Swan Falls," he said.

"Otherwise, the DWR is faced with having to decide how and when to start shutting off other people's water consumption in order to ensure that flow to Swan Falls."

Idaho Power officials said Wednesday afternoon they are withholding judgment on the

House action, pending study of the legislation.

"I'm afraid the legislation has too many far-reaching implications that will take us several days to analyze," said Idaho Power spokesman Larry Taylor.

"Needless to say, this whole issue is the biggest water issue to come up, perhaps ever," he said. "We probably won't have much to say until sometime next week."

Idaho Power has a right to 8,400 cubic feet of water per second at the Swan Falls power plant. But the average flow there is only 5,400 to 7,500 cubic feet per second...

Skull-drilling surgery: Contractor said he wasn't brave, he just wanted to live

TORONTO — Donald Wright said Wednesday that resisting a power drill to pull three inches of steel out of his skull had nothing to do with courage. He just wanted to stay alive.

Wright, a 34-year-old Toronto contractor, was working on a ladder last Wednesday when he tapped onto a 3/4-inch drill bit that was pointing upwards.

He passed out, but regained consciousness and realized the drill bit was stuck in his skull.

Instead of phoning for an ambulance, Wright decided he would attempt to remove the bit himself and get out of the locked apartment so someone could find him in case he passed out again.

"I passed out, then when I came to, I felt like I was having seizures. I was feeling icy cold all over and I just couldn't move myself," Wright said from his hospital bed.

"When I was trying to move it was like my head was nailed to the floor and it was because the drill was holding me down."

He got up after six attempts and, holding the five-pound drill, level with the angle that the drill

entered the right side of his skull around the hairline, he went to the bathroom with the extension cord dragging behind him.

"I was worried about my brain because I had this drill sticking in my head," Wright said. "There was no pain but my body was numb and I was frightened my bodily senses had been killed."

"I tried to pull it out but it wouldn't come out. So I knew the only way to get it out was by restarting it."

"I looked into the mirror and I restarted drill and pulled it out of my head," he said. Blood spurted from the wound. "I thought my brains were pouring out with the blood. But I felt no pain."

Wright was in the apartment, four floors below his own in downtown Toronto, to install a sliding door. Fearing he might pass out again, he left the apartment, locked the door behind him and took the elevator to his own apartment.

He was leaving for the hospital when his wife returned home, called an ambulance and rushed him to nearby Wellesley Hospital.

At the moment he turned the drill on in front of the mirror, Wright said he thought he was dying.

"I was worried about my brain and I thought I was dying. I wanted to stay alive. It had nothing to do with courage. Somebody up there must like me."

Jones says governor overstepped powers

BOISE — Attorney General Jim Jones said Wednesday it appears Gov. John Evans violated the Idaho Constitution in his use of a line-item veto on a budget-balancing bill.

Fortified by that informal opinion, House Speaker T.W. Silvers, R-Twin Falls, said GOP leaders may ask the Idaho Supreme Court to rule on whether the chief executive overstepped his constitutional powers.

However, Jones and Silvers said there's little chance a court decision could be rendered in time to overturn the veto — which invalidated \$10 million in state spending cuts included in the \$69.2 million fiscal 1983 budget-balancing bill.

"I think the governor has an effective veto in force," Silvers said at a news conference. "But we think we will probably ask for a Supreme Court ruling on it to clear the air and have something on the record."

Silvers said legislators would like to have the veto question ironed out by

the courts so there will be no room for dispute in the event a similar situation cropped up in future years.

In a prepared statement later Wednesday, Evans said, "I am confident that if presented with the question, the courts would uphold my action on this bill."

The governor said he agreed with what he said was "the main point of the attorney general's" guideline, which was that the item vetoes were presumed effective, and if sustained by the Legislature can only be overturned through judicial action.

Evans employed his seldom-used line-item veto power Friday to strike four parts from the omnibus bill passed to eliminate the fiscal year 1983 revenue shortfall.

But Republican Jones, in an informal legal guideline to GOP lawmakers, said Wednesday the line-item veto was proper on only one of four items invalidated by Evans.

The attorney general said the governor went outside the constitutional mandate that the line-item veto be used only on legislation strictly adhering to appropriations.

Jones said there was no question Evans had authority to line out the \$7.7 million reduction in state support for public schools. Meanwhile, though, he said it appeared the Constitution was broken when the governor axed sections dealing with legislative intent, plus legislative orders to the Board of Examiners to slash state spending by 1.5 percent and mandating a cap on transfers of funds from certain school accounts.

"I guess everybody's stuck with it (the veto)," Jones said. "The only utility I can see in proceeding with a

court suit would be if the Legislature wanted to decide whether to have a precedent to set the ground rules (for future line-item vetoes)."

At the same time, Jones said there also was some question about the constitutionality of the entire budget-balancing bill.

Jones said he had not looked into the matter extensively, but he acknowledged there was concern that lumping budget cuts and tax increases into one bill might not be allowed under the Idaho Constitution.

Idahoans not in favor of paying more for higher education

BOISE — Idahoans are reluctant to increase their tax support of higher education, according to a poll conducted by Idaho's daily newspapers.

In addition, the solid majority of the 1,010 residents surveyed oppose the charging of tuition by Idaho universities and believe the policy of open admissions to colleges should be continued.

All 12 of the state's daily newspapers participated in the survey, which organizers called a first in polling cooperation among the publications.

The telephone inquiries, conducted last week, were broken down according to the population size of a metropolitan area, with 294 calls made in the Boise region, for example, and 13 made in Sandpoint.

In the Magic Valley, 80 persons were surveyed; and, in general, their answers corresponded to those from across the state.

In this area, 47 of the participants felt that state funding is "about right," while 21 said it is too little. Of this number, 14 said they would support additional statewide taxes. The other 12 participants felt that state support is too much, or they "weren't sure."

On the question of charging tuition and open admissions, 55 persons were opposed, and 23 were in favor. On the admissions issue, all but nine of those surveyed said they support open access to the state's universities.

Statewide, only 39 percent of those polled said tax support for higher education — currently amounting to about 16 cents of every dollar in state taxes — was insufficient.

Another 57 percent said the tax burden was about right, and 12 percent said it was too much. Of the minority urging more state support for its universities, 72 percent suggested an increase in taxes and 28 percent wanted cuts in other programs to free more funds for higher education.

The results showed 63 percent of those questioned oppose an amendment to the Idaho Constitution that would allow the charging of tuition by universities. Students currently pay for their instruction and materials.

Seventy-four percent said the policy of admitting all graduates of Idaho high schools to state colleges should be continued.

If access were to be limited, 80 percent said admittance should be based on the results of high-school grades and aptitude tests. Only 12 percent supported a first-come, first-served enrollment program, and 8 percent said students should be assigned to one of the four public institutions.

Sixty-nine percent said students should not be charged more for attending college in Idaho, while 21 percent recommended higher fees and 10 percent supported a lowering of student costs.

**LOS ANGELES (UPI)** — John Cougar, Pat Benatar, Melissa Manchester, Joe Cochran and Jennifer Warnes swept to awards Wednesday at the 25th annual Grammy ceremony for recording stars, dominated by four studios for the group Toto.

 Miss Manchester won the pop female vocal award for "You Should Hear How She Talks About You," beating out Miss Ronstadt's "Get Closer."

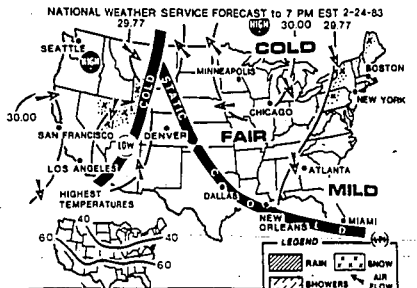
**Oil price cut 'inevitable'**  
 Five Persian Gulf members of OPEC threatened Wednesday to slash oil prices and undercut competitors if the 13-nation oil group failed to agree on a unified price reduction at an emergency summit next week, the Kuwaiti news agency reported.  
 Gulf officials said Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Kuwait, Qatar and Iraq decided OPEC's \$34-a-barrel base oil price should be lowered to around \$30 a barrel. Each \$1-a-barrel drop in world oil prices theoretically translates into a 2.3 cent-a-gallon saving at U.S. gas pumps.  
 "A price cut is inevitable," Saudi Oil Minister Sheikh Ahmed Zaki Yamani said after concluding a two-day meeting in the Saudi capital of Riyadh with the other Gulf ministers on measures to head off a looming price battle that could split OPEC and jolt the world economy. But there was no official announcement on pricing.

**Arens replaces Sharon**  
**JERUSALEM (UPI)** — The Israeli Parliament Wednesday approved Moshe Arens as defense minister to replace Ariel Sharon, forced to step down from the post over the massacre of Palestinians in Israeli-occupied Beirut.

**Synopsis:**  
 More weak frontal systems are approaching Idaho from the west but only a few scattered showers and continued mild temperatures appear in prospect.  
 The westerly upper air flow off the Pacific Ocean is splitting, with one part moving over southern California and the other off the British Columbia coast. A cold front moved inland over Canada Wednesday but weakened considerably. It will produce only a few showers over the mountains of the Idaho panhandle.  
 Another front is following that system but it will weaken after moving inland, with only a chance of precipitation over northern Idaho Friday.  
 Ahead of those fronts, variable high clouds will warm air sweep over Idaho. At Boise, the freezing level was above 10,000 feet and afternoon temperatures were unseasonably mild. Readings were in the middle and upper 50s in the west and in the upper 50s and 40s in eastern Idaho. The state's warmest reading was 60 degrees at Hagerman.

**Salvador amnesty in sight**  
**SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (UPI)** — El Salvador's president acted Tuesday to end the 3-year-old state of siege and restore "all political parties" under an amnesty designed to let exiled leftist politicians return safely.  
 Provisional President Alvaro Magana, in a nationwide broadcast from his office, named a special "political commission" to "create the conditions for social and political justice and a program for peace as soon as possible."  
 The panel was formed to propose an "amnesty law" that would, in effect, lift a state of siege imposed at the start of the civil war that has claimed 30,000 lives in the last three years, he said.  
 The state of siege outlawed constitutional guarantees of freedom of expression and the right to assemble in public.

**India massacres continue**  
**NEELJE, India (UPI)** — New clashes broke out Wednesday near the site of a weekend massacre that witnesses said claimed more than 2,000 lives, spreading alarm among the bloodied and terrified survivors.  
 The latest clashes killed five people, pushing the unofficial death toll to about 3,500 in 23 straight days of ethnic violence between Assamese and Bengalis in the north eastern state of Assam.  
 The killings mark the bloodiest spree of ethnic violence since India gained its independence in 1947.  
 Home Minister P. C. Sethi estimated the death toll from the weekend massacre at 1,217, but interviews conducted with survivors and government sources since his remarks to parliament on Tuesday indicated the estimate was too low.  
 Survivors from the weekend massacre said tribesmen Friday and Saturday massacred more than 2,000 Bengali immigrants — mostly women and children — at the village of Neelje and 14 surrounding hamlets.

students taking the courses should pay their costs. Thirty-nine percent said the current policy of granting the instruction as part of the normal curricula should be continued, and 13 percent said the courses should be eliminated.

Sixty-six percent said the funding emphasis on intercollegiate athletics is about right, while 14 percent urged lower tax support and 9 percent said

funding should be increased. Eleven percent believed no public funds should be used for the sports programs.

When asked if Idaho has too many or too few universities and colleges, 20 percent said too many, 6 percent too few and 74 percent the right number.

Only 38 percent of the respondents said they attended college in Idaho, but 58 percent said their children are attending or plan to enroll in a Gem State university.

The source said Mrs. Burford, who was in Arizona giving a speech Wednesday, was "fully consulted" about the changes, which he said were made as "part of an effort to strengthen the middle-level management at EPA, particularly in Superfund (for toxic waste cleanup), and were intended to give a fresh start" to the agency's managerial team.

"This will be helping Anne by giving her stronger managerial personnel," the source said.

One White House official hotly disputed a suggestion Novick — the EPA's chief watchdog — was let go for trying to clean up the agency. "That's just really outrageous," he said.

Novick, who could not be reached for comment, was the first inspector general fired by the Reagan administration.

Scheuer, who is leading one of several congressional probes of the EPA, told reporters earlier: "I get the vibrations that this afternoon may be known as the Wednesday afternoon

massacre. A mass firing, a massacre." Questioned about the possible fate of Mrs. Burford, Scheuer said: "There are rumors around that she will be looking for new employment opportunities in the near future."

In her appearance, Ms. Lavelle waded through a mob of photographers to shake hands with every member of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee before beginning her testimony.

During a 4 1/2 hours of questioning under oath, she delicately criticized her former boss, EPA Administrator Anne Burford, denounced her firing by President Reagan.

### State has the right to set school norms

We're not big on government involvement in religion, but in the case of the Idaho Senate Health and Welfare Committee, we think the group acted correctly in asserting the state's continuing interest in the education of children in parochial schools.

Tuesday, the committee tabled a bill that would have exempted parochial schools from all state controls, asserting, in effect, the right of the state to enforce minimum education standards.

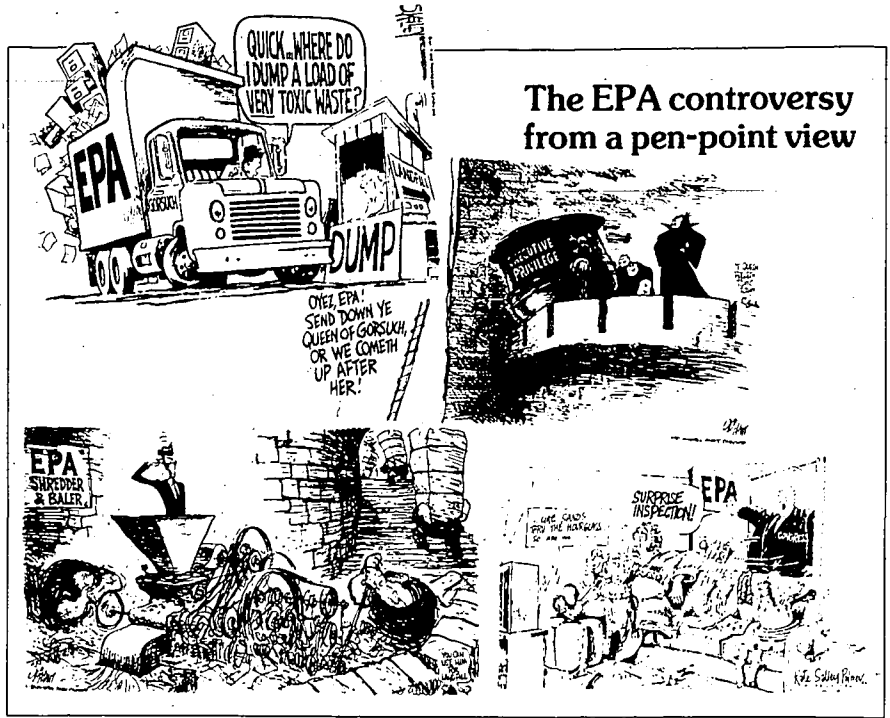
We think the move was a wise one. In the past two decades, American education has seen the sprouting of a wide variety of private schools, many of them sponsored by various faiths.

Some offer quality education, to go with the heavy doses of religious instruction. But more than a few are deficient in providing the basic education skills we have all come to expect in American public education.

It is established that states have the right to ensure that the basic core of education is provided, and to that extent, the states can regulate the activities of church schools.

The bill before the Legislature would have removed that power. Its proponents argued that God alone should control Christian schools, but opponents noted that under the proposal, any group could declare itself a "school" and escape the scrutiny of state standards. Rightly, we think, the committee went along with the opponents nearly unanimously.

The issue is not the same as the prayer-in-the-schools issue, which we think the state has no business getting into. It is one thing for a state to establish educational standards and quite another for it to compel a prayer or to set guidelines for how people should pray.

### Another right for those governed by their glands

WASHINGTON -- America the prolific may be about to invent yet another right.

It is the right to be told in a timely manner if one's sexual partner of an idle hour has herpes.

Susan Liptrot is using the man with whom she says she slept once, after a brief acquaintance. She says she noticed it. Sorry, this is a family newspaper, but these are not family times' sores on his genitals. But she says "He said he didn't know what it was, I didn't think anything about it."

After moral reflection, she thinks the law should compel him to give her more than \$100,000. "Hey, you know, why should this person not have any responsibility for what his actions were?"

Hey, why do so many people develop such convenient theories of jurisprudence? She "didn't think anything about it," but now is out to develop a new law of sexual responsibility.

The law has recently, through "pallimony,"

sanctioned the idea that persons who reject the legal responsibilities of marriage can nonetheless use the law to impose responsibilities on others when that becomes convenient.

One does wish that today's free spirits, who are too emancipated to conform to the law's codification of social values regarding marriage, would at least have the consistency not to come running to court seeking the help of a society whose codified values they reject.

When Liptrot called to tell her partner he had infected her, he said: "Oh, I'm sorry."

You thought love meant never having to say that? But who said anything about love? Well, actually the Washington Post did. Its headlines spoke of a "lover's right to be told of herpes." Its story spoke of putting "before a court a question facing a large number of unmarried Americans: whether and when to tell potential lovers about herpes."

Hold it: We are supposed to be unflinchingly candid about sex, and Liptrot's suit is about

making candor compulsory, so let's not use language that can fog judges' minds. If courts are going to start refereeing such grievances as will arise between persons who choose to be governed by their glands, judges should at least understand that they often will be dealing with persons who are not "lovers" as any sensible person understands that term.

Liptrot, who became litigious when the man asked her not to tell his girlfriend, says, "It's just like if a guy got a woman pregnant and just walked out."

But, for the record, women can give herpes to men. And herpes is a well-publicized epidemic. Persons who get it should spare us the argument that they have a right to claim the cherished status of victim. Victim of what? Presumably of society's failure to make life, however foolishly lived, risk-free.

Emancipated persons say that sex is a private matter -- none of the law's business. They say that freedom is the absence of restraint -- "the silence of the law." But in the

cultural climate that comes with such thinking, millions of persons are passing around an infectious and, at this point, incurable disease.

Law and life would be well served by allowing the sanctions inherent in the situation to function: People are free to disdain society's old morality, but society should not foot the bill for arbitrating disputes arising from the epidemic associated with the new morality. Unfortunately, free spirits, male and female, are going to come to court, talking about (other persons') "responsibilities" and wanting to apply the law as a pollice to the hurts that life attaches to the way they choose to live.

Liberalism teaches that society is an abstraction, that the law should take cognizance only of individuals' desires.

Liberal jurisprudence teaches that law has no business attempting to shape society's moral climate, least of all concerning a private

matter like sex. But in the resulting dissolution of social mores and other restraints, liberal jurisprudence attempts to translate every unhappiness into an justifiable conflict of individual rights. So some judge is apt to pioneer a law concerning herpes.

Let's see: Are there privacy rights of the infectious to be weighed against the information rights of the infected? And distinctions must be drawn: The rights of short-term partners may differ from those of a married person whose spouse contracts herpes in an extramarital affair. (Three wives have sued their husbands.)

Where will it end? It won't. The lesson, constantly taught and never learned, is that society gets a drizzle of dumb, little laws when it abandons the wise, big laws of life.

# Lawmakers consider lump budget bill

-BOISE (UPI) — Republican legislative leaders are considering a plan to lump all fiscal year 1984 appropriations into one giant bill — a procedure apparently never tried before by Idaho lawmakers.

Meantime, the Republican majority in the Legislature's two chambers have tentatively agreed on a "bottom-line" budget of \$413.6 million for the year. House Speaker T.W. Silvers, R-Twin Falls, said Wednesday.

Silvers said lawmakers were toying with the idea of running an omnibus budget bill or breaking down the appropriations measures into several packages as an alternative to the traditional process of drafting separate measures for the dozens of individual programs.

"We're looking at expediting the budget process a little bit," he said at an afternoon news conference — adding, however, no final decision has been made on which procedural course will be taken.

Responding to assertions that grouping proposed budgets in one measure would make it difficult for specific appropriations to be amended



— particularly by the Democratic minority — Silvers said the bill could be put up for changes on the floor.

"What's wrong with that?" he asked reporters inquiring about the one-bill budget idea. "It's not been done in Idaho, but several other states have done it."

"It's been suggested it would give the governor another opportunity to use his veto a little more — he seemed to like it the other day," Silvers said in reference to line-item vetoes Gov. John Evans made Friday on a GOP-drafted budget-balancing bill for fiscal 1983.

# Video game tax gets zapped

BOISE (UPI) — An Idaho House committee has zapped a proposal to tax video games — but the senator who launched the measure has been given a second chance in her attempt to require licensing of the electronic amusements.

Sen. Norma Dobler, D-Moscow, confessing she's never set foot in a

video arcade, told the House Revenue and Taxation Committee the state could help ease its fiscal crunch by assessing taxes on the popular coin-devouring machines.

Her proposal, however, ran into an asteroid belt of criticism in the committee Wednesday and she was told to rewrite it.

# Finance committee tangled up in budget cuts

-BOISE (UPI) — The Legislature's budget-setting committee adjourned abruptly Wednesday to informally discuss procedural matters after members deadlocked on one of their first funding decisions for fiscal year 1984.

Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee members spent most of their session informally debating how to allocate budget cuts they will be forced to make because of reduced revenues, with several lawmakers claiming the task will be impossible.

Rep. Lawrence Knigge, R-Filer, suggested legislative leaders be invited to the committee, so members could "inform them of our dilemma."

The committee must set a total \$413 million state budget for fiscal year 1984, which begins in July, compared to a current spending level of about \$482 million.

But nearly \$6 billion of the expected general account dollars must be used to fund an additional year period during the next fiscal year, budget analysts told the committee.

Some members said they did not want to begin setting budgets including the additional pay until they further discuss the issue.

And members also debated at length whether agencies' dedicated funds, comprising user fees, should be cut the same amount as general funds.

JFAC Co-Chairman David Little,

R-Fimmet, said personnel costs in all agencies should suffer similar cuts, regardless of where the money comes from.

But Sen. Norma Dobler, D-Moscow, said the real problem is that lawmakers need to raise taxes or find other revenues so the committee has enough money to adequately fund state agencies.

# Black leaders praise Washington's victory

CHICAGO (UPI) — Black leaders nationwide hailed Harold Washington's victory in the Chicago Democratic primary Wednesday as another milestone in their struggle for equality.

"It's not only good for Chicago but for the entire country to see a black mayor win in a city that is a hot seat in the country," said Mayor Lionel Wilson of Oakland, Calif.

"He didn't win with just black votes," Wilson said. "You have to go into the other communities and garner a large amount of votes."

Mayor Eugene "Gus" Newport of Berkeley, Calif., said Washington's win "shows a real coalition victory." He called it a "real opposition to Reaganomics" that "will give the black community hope."

"As mayor of the second largest city, Washington will have input for municipal programs, to fast-track programs," Newport said. "He will be able to deal directly with problems."

Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley sent a telegram of congratulations to Washington, saying "I look forward to working with you in the future as we deal with the many common issues facing our two cities."

Washington, who faces nominal Republican opposition in the April 12 general election, parlayed a 50 percent turnout of the city's black voters to defeat Mayor Jane Byrne and challenger Richard Daley, son of the city's longtime "boss," in Tuesday's primary.

Approximately 40 percent of Chicago's 3 million residents are black.

# Police, firefighters stage sickout over pay dispute

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI) — Police and firemen engaged in a sickout Wednesday in a pay dispute, leaving Columbus, a city with a population of 600,000, with one policeman on duty for every 15,000 residents.

A spokesman for the fire department said he hoped firemen would continue to make emergency runs in Ohio's capital city but he could not guarantee they would.

Fire Chief Raymond Fadley said the department was "at the union's mercy."

Oct. 1. The city is offering a 4 percent boost to all city employees, including 4,000 non-uniformed workers.

Officials said 117 of the 120 policemen and all of the 200 firefighters on the first shift called in sick Wednesday.

# Panel votes to curb benefits, up taxes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Democratic-led House panel voted Wednesday to curb Social Security benefits for new retirees and hike payroll taxes next century, then voted approval for a \$165 billion retirement system rescue package.

The bill, approved 74 over Republican objections by the House Social Security subcommittee, would raise payroll taxes, delay this year's cost-of-living hike six months, tax benefits, and force new federal workers — including the president — to join Social Security.

It would let Social Security dip into general Treasury funds in emergencies. The subcommittee bill is closely

patterned after the report of the National Commission on Social Security Reform, the bipartisan presidential panel, that hammered out a compromise last month.

"This is just the first step in a long process," subcommittee chairman J.J. Pickle, D-Texas, said after the vote. "I believe the public will feel we have advanced the bill and it will relieve their fears and anxiety."

Repeatedly rejecting conservative amendments to raise the 65-year retirement age or cut benefits in other ways, the subcommittee agreed on a long-range change that depends 60 percent on curbing payment checks and 40 percent on raising taxes next century.

It includes a 5 percent cut in the benefit formula for new retirees in 2008, so the average worker will get back 40 percent of his last paycheck instead of 42 percent, and a payroll tax hike of 0.24 percent each for employers and employees beginning in 2015.

Together, the proposals would raise exactly the amount of cash the system's actuaries say Social Security needs over 75 years. House Speaker Thomas O'Neill, Rules Speaker Claude Pepper, D-Fla., and other House leaders were consulted on the package.

But Rep. Willis Gradison, R-Ohio, said, "Something is going to be done about the retirement age, however

reluctant the majority is to talk about it today."

Gradison said of the public's reaction to the measure, "They're fed up with higher taxes and this bill is full of them."

Rep. James Shannon, D-Mass., said after the subcommittee vote leaders will allow separate House floor votes on raising payroll taxes and the retirement age. Each has violent opposition — the payroll tax hikes from Republicans and the retirement age change from liberal Democrats and labor groups.

The Senate, however, may approve a retirement age change. Senate Finance Committee chairman Robert Dole, R-Kan., said again Wednesday it has "strong support" in his panel.

# Jobs bill package near \$5 billion

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Democrats worked on drafting a jobs package late Wednesday, with Speaker Thomas O'Neill predicting an eventual compromise with the White House will be written in a conference committee next month.

O'Neill told reporters the emergency jobs bill the House Democratic leadership will submit to the White House by Thursday will cost "somewhere in the vicinity of \$5 billion."

The administration plan, agreed to in principle two weeks ago by House Democratic leaders, proposes \$4.3 billion to be spent on jobs and humanitarian aid.

O'Neill said the House Appropriations Committee will begin writing its version Friday after assistant Democratic leader Thomas Foley presents the plan to White House chief of staff James Baker.

"We'll pass ours and they'll pass theirs in the Senate," O'Neill said, with the final compromise written in conference between the two houses.

He said the differences between the two probably will be "not that bad."

O'Neill suggested House Democrats have enough leverage to force an increase in spending over Reagan's proposal because of the "sensitivity" the president will have to show to the 19 Senate Republicans up for re-election next year.

Referring to the White House, O'Neill said, "They play a hard game of politics over there. It's easy to play a hard game of politics when 80 percent of the American people want to give you a chance," he said, adding that now Reagan is being seen as "a complete failure" who will have to yield somewhat.

A draft bill written by appropriations Chairman Jamie Whitten, D-Miss., was going to O'Neill for his approval late Wednesday, but there were indications it needed more work.

# Warm Pacific causes storm

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The great snowstorm that hit the East Coast earlier this month and killer floods in Ecuador appear to be linked to a tongue of warm water along the Pacific coast of South America, a government researcher said Wednesday.

Dr. Ned A. Osteno, an assistant National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration administrator, said the peculiar warming of eastern Pacific waters also seems associated with a severe drought in Australia.

Osteno said the Pacific warming, known as El Nino, is linked to climate fluctuations around the world.

"It changes atmospheric conditions by mechanisms which aren't precisely understood," he said in an interview. "We're beginning to better understand on a global scale the

energetic coupling between the atmosphere and the oceans."

There is evidence that the eastern Pacific warming caused the jet stream, which normally flows far to the north, to divert southward along the West Coast, across the Gulf of Mexico and back up the East Coast, he said.

This, NOAA scientists said, caused warmer and wetter-than-normal weather in the South and East. The February snowstorm occurred when Gulf moisture, driven by the jet stream, combined with cold northern air.

The warm waters along the northwest coast of South America produced torrential rains that flooded a third of Ecuador early this month. And NOAA scientists said the

eastward shift of climate patterns pushed moisture-laden clouds away from Australia and caused drought there.

NOAA scientists believe the weather pattern started about a year ago with wind changes in the Indonesia area. Westerly winds across the Pacific raise sea levels in the west, causing an upwelling of cold, nutrient-laden water in the eastern Pacific.

Osteno said when the winds slowed, the water sloshed back to the east, capping the upwelling. This allows surface water to warm more than usual, producing El Nino, which is Spanish for "the child," referring to the Christ Child because when it occurs, it usually happens around Christmas time.

# NCPAC pledges Reagan support

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A conservative group that spent millions attacking liberals in 1980 and 1982 announced Wednesday it will put up \$5 million to boost President Reagan for 1984 in "a shameless appeal" to heroism.

John Dolan, chairman of the National Conservative Political Action Committee, announced the "American Heroes for Reagan campaign" at a meeting of his backers and reporters.

"We intend to emphasize the major accomplishments of the Reagan ad-

ministration to date," Dolan said. "But a second element of this campaign will be a shameless appeal to American patriotism and heroism that President Reagan not only represents, but understands better than any president in recent history."

Dolan showed a half-hour television documentary depicting Reagan as a modern American hero who has restored the country's faith in itself. He emphasized that NCPAC had no inside information about Reagan's political plans but expects him to seek a second term.

The committee, which is independent of both political parties and candidates and has no legal spending limits, has targeted long lists of liberal candidates and spent as much as \$9.7 million in recent campaigns on what has been called "negative" or "attack" advertising against them.

Dolan said his group will have its target candidates again in 1984, "but the priority will be on the presidential campaign" and on counteracting what he called "the hatchet job" being done on Reagan by "the liberal media."

# Askew joins presidential candidates

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — Predicting he would do better in the White House than fellow Southerner Jimmy Carter, former Gov. Reubin Askew of Florida entered the rapidly growing race Wednesday for the 1984 Democratic nomination.

At news conferences in Washington and then in the state capital where he served two terms, Askew pledged to reconcile the nation's competing special interests to form a "new union."

"Together we can prove to ourselves and all the world that America can work again," Askew said.

Asked if he thinks the Carter legacy will hurt him, Askew said the nation is above stereotyping Southern politicians. He said he would take a different approach.

"I'm not defensive about Jimmy Carter," Askew said. "I believe history will show Jimmy Carter was a much stronger president than he was perceived in 1980." Askew served in the Georgian's administration as U.S. trade ambassador.

He added: "Quite modestly, I think I can be a better president than Jimmy Carter. He helped make that possible by the experience he gave me."

Earlier, in a packed room at the National Press Club in Washington, the silver-haired candidate said: "Our ability to pursue our often competing individual interests has been one of our strengths as a nation."

# Libyan hijackers surrender

VALLETTA, Malta (UPI) — Two renegade Libyan army officers opposed to the regime of Moammar Khadafy Wednesday released the 158 hostages they held aboard a hijacked Boeing 727 for nearly three days and surrendered to Maltese authorities.

"(The hijackers) were pretty calm, but they said they would blow up the plane if we didn't get fuel," said hostage Giuseppe Gandolfi, a 41-year-old Italian engineer who was one of the few non-Libyan aboard.

"The two hijackers were carrying shotguns and bombs (hand grenades)," said Sankung Touray, a Libyan student passenger.

"We had to stay in our seats the whole time. One of the

hijackers told me that if I didn't sit down he would kill me."

The hijackers took over the Libyan Arab Airways jet during a domestic flight and forced it to land on the Mediterranean island of Malta Sunday evening. They held their hostages and Maltese authorities at bay for over 63 hours before giving up.

"We do not belong to extremist or terrorist organization," the hijackers said in a statement released by Maltese authorities nearly five hours after the surrender.

"We have never taken part in any political activity in Libya or in any other country. We hijacked the plane because we wanted political asylum in a country that would accept us."

# Begin rejects Reagan plan for Mideast

On the eve of the 18th round of talks over troop withdrawals from Lebanon, Israel Wednesday reaffirmed its determination to man early warning stations in south Lebanon, saying "only Jews will fight for the Jewish State."

Speaking to Jewish war veterans in Jerusalem, Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin flatly rejected President Reagan's offer to guarantee Israel's security along its northern border with Lebanon.

"We don't want so-called security guarantees, we don't want guarantees," Begin said, emphasizing his rejection Tuesday night of the Reagan offer.

The Israeli rejection of Reagan's attempt to settle a sticking point in the troop withdrawal talks came as the Israeli parliament ratified the appointment of Moshe Arens, a hawk, as defense minister to replace Ariel Sharon.

In Lebanon, U.S. envoy Philip Habib arrived in Beirut from Tel Aviv and was expected to meet later with Lebanese President Amin Gemayel and government officials in an effort to untangle the snag over Israel's security demands.

Christian Phalangist radio, meanwhile, said Jordanian Foreign Minister Marwan al Qassem would arrive in Beirut Thursday carrying a message from Jordan's King Hussein for Gemayel.

Quoting unnamed diplomatic sources, the radio described the visit of Qassem as implicit Jordanian support for Lebanon, and said Jordan's participation in Middle East peace talks is pending on the success of the U.S.-led Lebanese-Israeli negotiations.

## Airline to provide weekly ski flight

TWIN FALLS — Western Airlines will not provide daily flights in and out of Twin Falls, a company official announced Wednesday.

But the carrier has committed itself to providing a weekly flight in and out of Twin Falls during the skiing season.

The flight would begin in November and conclude in April. While the Twin Falls flight schedule has not been established, the weekly flight will be similar to the weekly "snowbird" charter flights the airline now operates from Los Angeles, San Francisco and Salt Lake

City to Twin Falls.

The airline's decision will provide a permanent, regularly scheduled seasonal flight for skiers and tourists, something travel promoters say will help their tourist promotion efforts.

"The 'ski birds' from two major markets — from Los Angeles and San Francisco — were trial planes for this winter. Now, what they're doing is committing to every single winter, which is great news," said Deborah George, the executive director of the Ketchum-Sun Valley Chamber of Commerce. "That's solid service from two major markets into Twin Falls, throughout the length of our winter

season on a regularly scheduled basis."

The move also means that Western is keeping open its option of establishing daily service at Twin Falls at a later date. But that decision falls considerably short of the goal sought by Twin Falls officials, who want to fill the upcoming void that will be left by the departure of Republic Airlines.

Republic will cease operations to Twin Falls and six other Western cities, including Boise and Spokane, effective April 24. That will leave Twin Falls dependent on commuter airlines for air transportation to Boise and Salt Lake City.

"Naturally, we had hoped for a more

positive service commitment to Twin Falls, but they made the decision based on what they could provide for a basement commitment, a bottom-line commitment," Mayor Chris Talkington said later Wednesday. "I'm not happy, but one scheduled flight a week is certainly better than nothing."

Two key factors played into the airline's decision. The most prominent was the airline's lack of aircraft, says Craig Beneditti, Western's vice president in charge of marketing. Beneditti met with local officials in Sun Valley earlier this month concerning Western's plans for the local market.

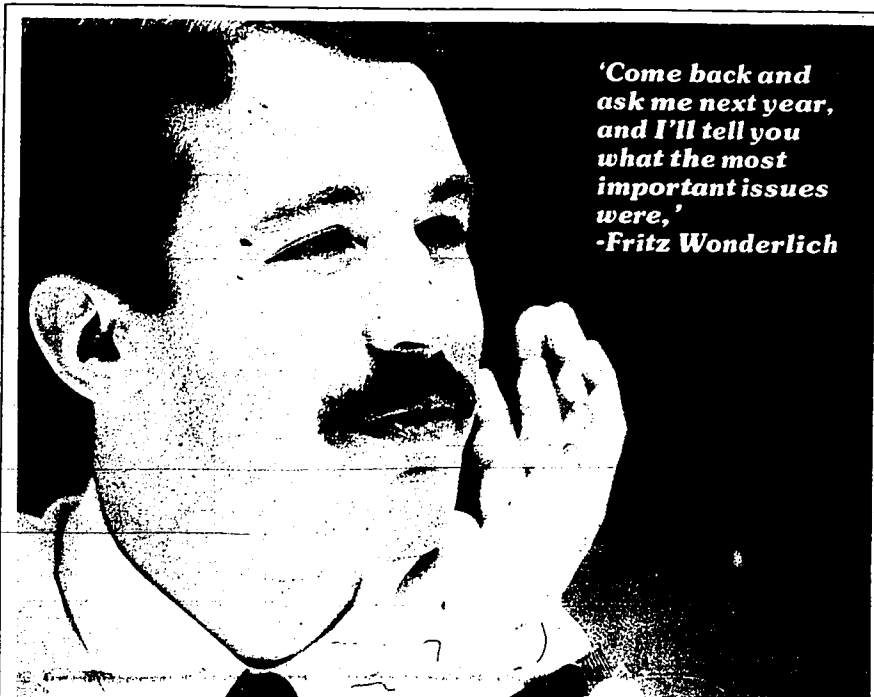
"If we had had the available aircraft-time,

we might have gambled with it," Beneditti says. "I know the community would have been behind it in terms of support. If we had the aircraft, we might have gambled on it."

The airline plans to add four 737s to its 72-jet fleet in April. And the resources required to provide expanded service to Twin Falls might be available during the fourth quarter of this year, Beneditti says.

But whether the airline makes that type-of commitment hinges largely on whether local officials can increase tourist trade during the spring, summer and fall, the airline executive said.

## Home town boy returns

### He always felt he would return, but not as city attorney

TWIN FALLS — Growing up in Twin Falls, Fritz Wonderlich always felt in the back of his mind he would be returning some day.

But he never thought he would be returning as the Twin Falls city attorney. In fact, until he enrolled as a graduate student at the University of Idaho in 1977, he had no idea he would be an attorney at all.

The son of Lyle Wonderlich, a physician here for almost 30 years and who is on the staff of Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, Wonderlich originally set out to study science. He majored in biology at the University of Utah, then enrolled in the UI master's program in biochemistry.

It didn't take long to reach the conclusion that he was headed toward a "dead end," however. As he explains it now, he liked science for the theory, but when he thought about how he could apply it, he realized he didn't want to teach, and he wasn't thrilled by the research he was doing.

His roommate was a law student, so one day "on a lark," he decided to take the law school aptitude test. When he saw how he did on that, he realized law offered more options. If he didn't become an attorney, at least the schooling would open a variety of doors.

The following year, he enrolled in the University of Idaho Law School. Then after serving as executive editor of the Idaho Law Review and vice president of the student bar association, he graduated in the top third of his class in 1980. A clerkship with a judge in Boise followed. And after passing the bar exam in the summer of 1980, he became a deputy prosecutor for Ada County.

Recently, Wonderlich's life took another turn.

In late January, he was selected from a field of 15 candidates to replace Susan Swanberg as Twin Falls city attorney. Now, as the city's chief lawyer, he will prosecute those arrested by city police, represent the city in civil cases and advise City Council on day-to-day legal policy matters.

Conservative in appearance and manner, Wonderlich has a boyish quality about him. But he speaks easily about his philosophy of law.

"I am disposed to prosecute," he says.

Unlike some attorneys who enjoy working for the defense or entering specialized private practice, he likes the idea of representing the people of the state. That has its advantages, he says.

"You are not really a hired gun like some private attorneys. You are required to represent the interests of the client whether you agree or disagree.

"But representing the people of the state doesn't mean that you prosecute the guy no matter what, whether he's innocent or guilty. You have a lot of discretion to do what's best in the interests of justice. You can't really do that in private practice."

In his two years as deputy prosecutor in Ada County, Wonderlich worked his way up the ladder until he was handling cases involving grand theft, burglary and drugs. He feels especially qualified to represent the city of Twin Falls as a prosecutor, which he expects will consume two-thirds of his time.

One of the most important aspects of that job is working with city police officers.

"It is really important for the officers to understand that you are supporting them, so when they go out and make arrests or give citations, it's not for nothing."

So far, he says, he has found the Twin Falls

police "very competent, very honest and very good to work with."

He has been over at the police station almost every day since he began work Feb. 8.

"Some prosecutors feel they have final discretion when it comes to what they do," he says. "I will go with the officer on any case where there is probable cause (for prosecution)."

Even though he may think the city might lose, "I am not going to interpose my judgment," he says. "Who knows what a jury will do?"

Wonderlich admits the civil cases, defending the city against private lawsuits or suing on behalf of the city are tasks with which he has not had much experience.

And he admits some of those lawsuits are complex. On his desk Wednesday morning was a stack of briefs a foot-and-a-half high, concerning the municipal water treatment plant. He had just finished talking with a U.S. attorney on that one, he says.

"Come back and ask me next year, and I'll tell you what the most important issues were," he says, jokingly.

Other than law, Wonderlich likes to fish and camp. Lean of stature, he enjoys running, and in 1979 he competed in the Seattle Marathon.

But after living in Boise for several years, both Wonderlich and his wife, Jackie Wakefield, a North Dakota native whom he met in law school, wanted to find a small town in the West in which to settle.

She is a lawyer too, and for a while they both wanted to live in Boise "to get some experience you couldn't get in a smaller town."

But after looking around the states of Idaho, Montana and North Dakota for a town in which to raise a family, they decided "Twin Falls still looked the best," he says.

## City Council looks ahead to summer golfing activities

TWIN FALLS — It may be only the end of February, but Twin Falls City Council already is thinking about summer.

For golfers, the pre-season deliberations bring good tidings, as they will for these new members of a city advisory board.

Council members voted Tuesday night to hold municipal golf course fees to last year's levels.

And they named Virgil Tinker, Donna Brizee and Tom Condie to fill vacancies on the city's Parks and Recreation Board.

Council agreed with the city golf advisory board's December recommendation that fees not be raised at the municipal golf course this year. The board had reported revenues in excess of expenditures in 1982, after a 10 percent increase in the fees over 1981. And the board predicted that any increase in costs this year would be offset by an anticipated increase in the amount of play.

It currently costs \$5 to play 18 holes at the municipal golf course on a weekday, \$6 on weekends. An adult season pass is \$150. There are a variety of other rates for students, senior citizens, couples and children.

In naming three new members to the Parks and Recreation Board, council gave priority to residents of

the city. Two of those nominated by the old board did not live in the city.

Virgil Tinker is the manager of the local Idaho Bank and Trust office; Tom Condie is a local accountant; and Donna Brizee is the wife of Richard Brizee, the owner of Brizee Heating and Air Conditioning, said City Manager Tom Courtney.

The board meets monthly through the spring, summer and fall to advise City Council. Its members serve three-year terms.

In other business Tuesday, council: • Tabled a request for a special-use permit that would allow Phillip and Joan Miller, of 1417 11th Ave. E., to operate a photographic studio on their property.

In a public hearing on the matter three people spoke against granting the permit, and five, including Mr. Miller, spoke in favor of it.

Council members indicated they needed more time to drive through the neighborhood in which the Millers live before making a decision.

• Granted Robert Stuart Junior High School the right to erect "a message board larger than that allowed by city ordinance.

Those testifying for the school said there was no opposition to the sign in the neighborhood. They also said O'Leary Junior High, their rival school in Twin Falls, has a sign larger than that allowed by present ordinance.

## Only one of seven crash victims still in the hospital

HAILEY — Federal investigators have left the scene of last week's airplane crash near Hailey, taking with them findings and evidence that will be incorporated into a final report this summer.

The team, headed by Steve Corrie of the National Transportation and Safety Board, arrived on the scene following the crash of a Transwestern Airlines twin-engine prop jet with eight people aboard.

The aircraft crashed about one-and-a-half miles short of the Hailey airport runway. Of the seven persons injured in the crash, only one remained hospitalized Wednesday.

Joan Hohl of Bellevue, Wash., was listed in stable condition at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center, where she was being treated for back injuries. A hospital spokesman said the woman's condition had been upgraded. Hohl's condition was listed as being fair on Tuesday.

Corrie had not returned to Wednesday, D.C. office yet on Wednesday. A NTSB spokesman speculated that Corrie may have

stopped to visit with manufacturers of the various aircraft components before traveling back to Washington.

Such trips are common investigative procedures following the crash of an aircraft, said Brad Dunbar, a public-information officer for the board.

While still in Idaho, NTSB investigators indicated that a flight crew member had reported that the plane experienced mechanical problems prior to the crash.

Copilot Eric Thorshud of Tucson, Ariz., was quoted as saying that the crew had experienced problems with the aircraft's flight controls. Such controls regulate an aircraft's airborne position, relative to the ground.

Investigators indicated that Thorshud reported "no difficulties with engine power, with either engine," however.

Dunbar said the NTSB staff attempts to finish its report within six months of a crash. That would put the report's completion date in mid-August.

"We're still very early in the factual stage of the investigation," he said.

## Mayor expects mall case to be appealed

TWIN FALLS — The city of Twin Falls will not know before Monday who will represent it in a possible court appeal of the recent Price Shopping mall decision.

But Mayor Chris Talkington said Wednesday that "it is probably the case will be appealed" and that appeal eventually will go to the Idaho Supreme Court.

Following Tuesday night's regular City Council meeting and work session, council is studying its legal options, negotiating to retain private legal counsel and waiting to hear from

an attorney representing the Workman family, the owners of the land where the mall would be built.

The Workman family owns the land off Blue Lakes Boulevard North on which the Price Development Co. of Utah plans to build a commercial shopping mall. The family has agreed to lease the land to the company, contingent on its being rezoned by the city.

Should the case go back to the Supreme Court, it would be the second time since the Price proposal originally was reviewed by the city on April 6, 1981. The city won a partial victory in that first hearing before the Supreme Court, but it has lost two

decisions in district court, the most recent coming Feb. 11.

Tom Nelson, an attorney for the Workmans, and Rob Paibe, a spokesman for the Price Co., indicated at Tuesday's council meeting they would be willing to negotiate a new configuration for the buildings in the proposed mall, if such negotiation could head off a new round of court hearings.

Council directed Nelson to submit a proposal in writing. But Talkington said Wednesday he is not expecting anything new from the developers.

The mayor said from the developers have failed to address the fundamental issues, outlined by the city in the past

These include the lack of a buffer between the mall and a nearby residential area, the inadequacy of the traffic plan proposed and the problem of supplying services to the mall, which would be located partially on county and partially on city land.

Although the mayor said a final decision to appeal the ruling — made against the city by FJH District Court Judge Douglas Kramer — had not yet been made, the ruling is a threat to local zoning jurisdiction, he said.

And as he reads the positions of council members, some of whom have been involved in the issue for several years, an appeal is inevitable should

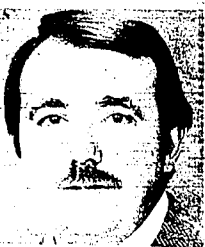
the mall developers not offer any new bargaining position, he said Wednesday.

Talkington said those council members who favor an appeal believe the case is important enough to justify the expenditure of city money on an outside lawyer who could argue it for them.

This decision was reached at an executive session of council prior to the regular meeting Tuesday night.

But Talkington said council was not unanimously in favor of an appeal, as had been indicated previously.

Kramer ruled Feb. 11 that the city had acted capriciously by denying the

## Buhl board asks patrons to lobby governor

**BUHL** — Residents of the Buhl School District may soon be receiving a letter, spelling out the district's position regarding state funding cutbacks and the proposed consolidation of eight Magic Valley school districts.

Because Buhl has its own school district — and would like to stay that way — Superintendent Bob Pratt submitted a sample letter that he wants to send residents, to school board members Tuesday night.

The letter, to be signed by the board

members, asks residents to write to their legislators and let their feelings be known about education in Idaho.

Gov. John Evans recently vetoed from the state's budget-balancing legislation a section that would have cut funding to the schools, Pratt said. If the governor had not done that, Buhl schools would have lost approximately \$56,000 in funding yet this year, he said.

In the coming school year, projected state revenue may be 15 percent less than this year, Pratt said. That would mean that out of the \$1.6 million the state would contribute toward Buhl's school budget of \$2.3 million, almost \$250,000 would be cut, the superintendent said.

"I'm not crying wolf," he said, but "it's very difficult to get the public riled up until it actually affects them."

In his proposed letter, Pratt states that \$34,000 could be cut from the Buhl school budget by eliminating all bus transportation, \$30,000 by dropping the athletic programs, including transportation and teachers, \$121,000 by omitting all books and supplies, and \$38,500 by removing band, choir and drama classes, including teachers.

Most of the district's money goes to salaries, Pratt said, so the teaching staff could be reduced by 17 teachers, out of a staff of 80, and a cut in the number of teachers' aides would

save \$25,000.

But Pratt's examples were mainly to show residents the effect of any state reductions in funding.

"They (the legislators) are not hearing that the public cares about schools." And by the time the legislators have gone home, it will be too late, he said.

As far as consolidating the school districts into one based in Twin Falls, Pratt said that Buhl spends only \$1,400 per child, per year, compared to the state average of \$1,617 per child, and Buhl produces some of the finest students in the state, he said.

With central control in Twin Falls, Buhl

would lose control of its school system, Pratt said.

Also, he said, "I don't think for a minute that you can consider a county school district without considering closing schools," he said.

Not that such a situation would occur in Buhl, he said, but "I think parents need to be aware that problems can come."

"There's no guarantee that consolidation saves anything (money-wise)," Pratt said.

In larger school districts, specialists are hired to cover each detail that superintendents handle in smaller districts, he said.

"That's my short, unbiased feelings on consolidation," Pratt said, with a smile.

## Gunsmith aims for rifles that match owners

Buhl resident Russell Collins believes that guns should fit as well as a shoe fits a foot

**BUHL** — Russell Collins of Buhl is a tailor of custom-made rifles.

Just as a tailor fashions clothes to fit the body, Collins designs rifles to fit the individual.

The likable gunsmith, who has been at his craft for more than 20 years, can make or modify any rifle — from a lightweight model scaled down for the smallest physique, to a heavy-duty safari rifle for shooting big game in Africa.

"The gun would never dream of going into a shoe store and just buying any shoe that fits the average man," Collins says.

And yet they will go out and buy a factory-made gun that is supposed to suit everyone, he says.

"But there's no such thing as the average man. We're all different." So a rifle should also be tailor-made for the person, he says.

When the custom comes to Collins, he not only designs a rifle to the person's specifications, he also takes measurements to determine his overall reach, his hand size and the contour of his face and cheek.

The soon-to-be rifle owner then goes back for several more fittings, as the gun progresses, to make sure it is right for him.

"The biggest reason to get a custom-made rifle is to get one that fits you," Collins says. "If the rifle doesn't fit right, it doesn't handle right."

As an example, Collins says one customer had shot a factory-made rifle only eight times when he decided the gun's recoil had bruised his shoulder for the last time.

Now that the man has one of Collins' rifles, he can shoot round after round of ammunition at a time.

"People want maximum velocity with minimum recoil," Collins says. What they don't understand is that it is not the caliber of the gun that affects the recoil, as much as the way the rifle is contoured to the body, he says.

"If the rifle fits you, the recoil is unnoticeable. That's the trick to a custom-made rifle."

In addition to the need for a precise fit, Collins says people buy custom-made rifles for many other

reasons.

"The prices are getting so high anyway," that people buy handmade rifles because the "quality is so much better" than "something 'mass-produced,'" he says.

Custom-made rifles offer a smoothness of operation, and the stocks have original designs, he says. "It's made for the individual," he says.

Rifle owners have a "pride of ownership" in a gun made just for them, Collins says.

"It's you; it's yours; it's individual."

Besides, guns are a good investment. Money in the bank usually does not grow in value as fast as a good gun, he says.

And guns can become an heirloom through generations of families, he says.

"The average cost for one of Collins' rifles is \$2,200 to \$2,500, although the price can start as low as \$1,800 for a basic rifle and go up into the thousands of dollars for something really special.

In his machine shop next to his home west of Buhl, Collins devotes an average of 125 hours of labor to designing and building each sporting and competition rifle.

"For each gun, I make a drawing of the gun and design the stock," before constructing the rifle, he says.

Starting with a two-inch-wide blank barrel, which looks like an old long, hollow pipe except for the rifling or spiral grooves inside, he cuts the barrel to the exact size on an 1887 lathe.

Then, on a newer lathe, he contours the barrel and threads the end, like the spiral edge of a screw, to be fitted to the "action" — the mechanism by which a gun operates.

With the use of a specialized reamer, the second lathe also cuts and

shapes the chamber for a particular caliber or diameter of shell.

But Collins' true artistic talent emerges when he sets to work on the rifle's stock, the rear, wooden hand portion to which the barrel and mechanisms are secured.

"That's my favorite part of the whole thing, is making stocks," Collins says.

Besides contouring and oiling the blank stock to his design, Collins carves patterns in the wood — called checkering — which started as an aid to gripping the handle and evolved into the decorative part of rifles.

If a customer also wants gold inlaid in the stock, Collins sends it to a friend

in Colorado, who specializes in engraving and inlaying.

Most of the rifle stocks designed by Collins, like most rifles in general, are made from the wood of walnut trees, although he will use other woods on request.

Walnut has the right "weight-to-strength ratio," Collins says, making it the most practical wood to be used in gunstocks.

That is, walnut is light enough to carry and yet strong enough to withstand the backlash of a fired shell against its grain, he says.

Besides building rifles, Collins also modifies factory-made rifles for customers and repairs firearms for three

Twin Falls sporting-good stores.

The 42-year-old Collins started building rifles for himself and friends when he was a chief petty officer in the Navy.

"I always dreamed of owning a custom rifle, but could never afford one," he says, so he decided to build his own.

"I decided 15, 18 years ago to be a gunsmith when I retired," he says.

And since Collins did retire a few years ago, custom-building rifles has become a "full-time hobby."

In 1978, Collins went through a two-year gunsmith program at Trinidad Junior College in Colorado. Trinidad has the oldest gunsmith

program in the United States, dating back to 1947, and it is the only gun school recognized by the National Rifle Association, Collins says.

Even though he believes he could charge more for his rifles, "I hold my prices down so everyone can afford one," he says.

Considering that he spends 80 hours of labor on the stock alone, "I really don't pay myself too much."

And just to remind people who may think his prices are too high, Collins vows that he will put a sign in his shop, saying: "The sweetness of a cheap price is soon forgotten, but the bitter taste of poor quality lasts forever."

## Jerome airport to land chopper service

**JEROME** — A new helicopter service will be available in the Magic Valley by April 15, according to plans revealed Tuesday at the Jerome County commissioners meeting.

Carl Estep of Jerome said he has purchased a large, heavy-duty helicopter that should be delivered by mid-April. It will be the basis for his new business, Magic Valley Helicopter Co.

"There isn't anything like this in Magic Valley now," he said. "In fact, it will be one of the largest in the state of Idaho. I am working with Mark (Walters) on plans for headquarters in the business at the Jerome County Airport."

Walters, the airport manager, who attended the meeting and introduced Estep, said the service would be expected to increase activity at the newly improved airport.

Estep will be able to use the helicopter for chemical spraying, he

said, as well as for transporting passengers. It will carry eight passengers.

Walters and Estep said there is a need for such a service in this area, for everything from rescue work to installing towers for power lines.

"We will be using it for the larger spray jobs. Probably, we will be handling spray contracts in Montana, Wyoming and other states, as well as Idaho," Estep said.

"I'm in the marketing area of aviation, and right now I'm working

with Mark to put together some other ideas that will increase use of the Jerome airport. I will maintain headquarters at the field and hire a pilot to operate the helicopter for me," he said.

The commissioners have authorized Walters to work with engineers in preparing an application for federal funds to further improve the county airport. Walters had explained last week that the facility needs a terminal building, more hangar space and added paving.

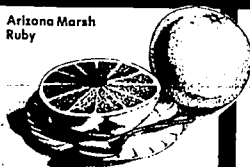

## Walker a reluctant & rich General

### Ruled ineligible by school, joins USFL for \$2.5 million a year

ATHENS, Ga. (UPI) — Helmsman Trophy winner Herschel Walker has signed a three-year, multi-million contract with the New Jersey Generals that will make him the highest paid player in the history of professional football, his attorney said Wednesday.

The spectacular University of Georgia star signed with the Generals of the fledgling U.S. Football League after discovering he had lost his amateur status by earlier signing a tentative contract with the club.

Walker's agent and attorney, Jack Manton, said Walker received his first year's salary in cash and in advance and that the entire package is "totally guaranteed."

Terms of the contract were not disclosed but earlier reports had the Generals offering Walker as much as \$16.5 million for five years. According to the report, Walker was to receive \$2.5 million a year.

Manton, an Atlanta attorney spoke at a news conference in front of an apartment building where Walker's girlfriend, Cindy DeAngelis, lives. As the news conference started, Walker slipped out of the back of the building and

apparently left in a white truck. Manton said Walker would join the Generals at their training camp in Orlando, Fla., this weekend and, at the team's request, would not meet with the media until he reaches Orlando.

Manton issued a brief statement from Walker in which the three-time All-America running back said he made a mistake in denying earlier he had signed a contract with the Generals.

"No one realizes more than I that I am a human being," Manton quoted Walker as saying. "I wish to apologize to (Georgia) Coach Dooley, the University of Georgia and all the people who have been my loyal friends. I ask for your forgiveness and ask God for his forgiveness."

"This is indeed a sad day for Georgia," said Dooley. "Herschel Walker has meant so much to our program the past three years. He made a mistake and he admits it. He's had an early

education in the hard reality of the business profession.

"Now it is time to look ahead. He can make the best of what I'm sure will be an enormous opportunity as a pro football player and I know he will do well in that endeavor. We look forward to following his career."

Manton said Walker still feels he initially "did not sign a contract" with the Generals because he had an oral understanding with the Generals owner that he could back out of it and he exercised that option.

Manton said when he found out that the escape clause was oral and not written "I immediately said, 'We've got a real problem.'"

Manton said he offered to personally finance an appeal if the NCAA ruled Walker ineligible but that Walker decided instead to sign with the Generals.

Manton said he had also contacted the National Football League Wednesday to see if its rule prohibiting the signing of underclassmen would still apply to Walker and was told by a NFL spokesman that it would.

"The ultimate figures that Herschel signed

for were amazing," said Manton. "This contract makes Herschel Walker the highest-paid player by far in the history of professional football."

As a result of the Walker episode, Manton predicted the USFL and NFL will have to come up with new regulations that will not make phones out of both of them.

Manton had maintained as late as Monday that Walker had not signed any contract with the USFL. He said Wednesday in a television interview he was "not proud of what took place and what came down," but said Walker would eventually release all of the details of events.

"When the final story is in and people find out what Jack Manton did, I hope it will better explain what happened," he said.

Manton would not reveal terms of the contract but said it involved a "substantial amount of cash" and other benefits, including possible oil deals.

Manton said the Generals had agreed if possible to allow Walker, a world-class sprinter to participate in the 1984 Olympics if he can.

Learns a 'hard lesson'

## Cast members deserve kudos for acting job

There's no need to wait for the envelope. The production of "The Herschel Walker Sting" will cop the honors for outstanding performance by an entire cast.

Make no mistake about it, this production -- to get arguably the greatest collegiate running back ever onto the roster of the New Jersey Generals before March 6 (opening day in the United States Football League) -- was orchestrated from the beginning. And here's how it really happened:

The one thing the USFL had going for it was Walker. Word had been rumbling through the league since the Sugar Bowl that Walker might leap out of the University of Georgia if, one, the package was sweet enough financially and, two, Walker, above all, wouldn't come away looking like the bad guy.

You see, Herschel Walker wanted it both ways. He wanted to come away with the money and still have some of his image -- which he has worked so hard to build over the last three years -- left intact.

Several plots were on the drawing board. They were run past the league office, various owners and even Walker's people -- namely, his lawyer-agent, Jack Manton. At first, nothing clicked, but then, in a burst of inspiration, it came. See, that's it. Give them (Georgia, NCAA and the rest of the United States) the Herschel Walker story comes in eligible-and-has-to-go-pro-but-it-isn't-his-fault routine.

How is this to be accomplished? First, make sure Walker gets to play where he wants to play for the numbers that will make him happy because he has told the USFL, through Manton, that he really doesn't want to play another year at Georgia and that, after winning the Helmsman Trophy, there isn't anything left for him to prove.

The pieces start to fit. J. Walter Duncan is the owner of the New Jersey Generals and one of two or three owners in the league who can afford to come up with more than \$3.9 million to pay Walker over the next three years -- approximately twice as much per season as any other player in pro football history. After some negotiating with Manton, Duncan marches into an Athens, Ga., hotel room. Not only that, he has a contract, which, if signed (or negotiated) would make Herschel Walker ineligible.

Now comes the key moment. Herschel signs. But suddenly, in his mind, he hears the Georgia band striking up and playing "Die!" and it just flows. He has made a mistake. He does not want to leave his beloved Bulldogs. He will turn down those millions. He will come back to lead those Dawgs to another national championship.

So, following the script, Duncan and men depart Athens, leaving Herschel to say he did no wrong. But they are sure to leave a trail. A trail indicating he had done something wrong. For example, the USFL, issues a statement saying Manton had approached the league for purposes of negotiating a contract for Walker (an apparent violation). The Generals issue a statement that backs this up, saying Manton made the approach and detailing the story right to the meeting with Duncan, stopping there, theorizing the NCAA will surely investigate.

However, unwittingly, the NCAA almost screws the whole thing up. It makes noises that it is not going to look into the matter. Evidently, this august body wants to avoid finding the smoking pistol. They are moving too slowly to suit the USFL strategists, who now suspect a double-cross might be in the works.

Alas, the USFL's suspicions were right. Manton surreptitiously goes Tuesday to the National Football League. He deals the deal. He tells a top league official that although Walker did not want to leave Thursday night with Duncan, it had a 24-hour escape clause in it and was torn up. Also, it wouldn't stick under Georgia law. He also says Walker signed a personal-services agreement with Duncan that could be troublesome.

Manton tells the NFL that Walker will come into the league if he could play on a team either in New York or a "major" market and get the same money promised to him in the USFL, \$3.9 million over three years. The NFL says, "No, thank you. We are not changing our rules."

About the same time, the USFL decides it is time to blow the whistle. The trail goes from the narrow to Georgia head coach and athletic director Vince Dooley to tell him, appropriately on George Washington's birthday, that Herschel had, ahem, misspoken.

Thus, the trap had closed on poor Dooley, who had to hang down his head, never knowing, we are told, that it had an invisible noose around it ever since the plot was hatched weeks before. Walker got his wish, spelled "C-a-s-h." And the good folks of Georgia, we are told, felt (for this great tale of make-believe so much that the state senators wore red and black armbands to mourn Walker's passing Wednesday afternoon. Just the way he wanted it.

### Bulldogs' win sends Declo to playoff game

## Kimberly's mad rush captures district title

WENDELL — After a third quarter where Kimberly did almost nothing right and Declo did little wrong, the Bulldogs put on a mad fourth-quarter rush -- including 11 points in the last minute and a half of regulation play -- enabling them to prevail 89-87 in overtime and capture the championship of the Fourth District A-3 Tournament Wednesday night.

Trailing 43-38 at halftime, Declo scored 16 points while Kimberly went scoreless for the first 5:36 of the third period. The Bulldogs made just three of 16 shots in the quarter, all of the baskets coming from Earl Molyneux. Declo took a 58-49 lead into the final quarter and expanded its cushion to 15, 70-55, with 5:27 left on Rod Butters' fast-break layin. Then the Bulldogs went on a 13-4 tear, reducing the difference to 74-68 with slightly more than three minutes remaining.

The Hornets led 78-70 when Kimberly began its 11-point fusillade. Kevin Holcomb, who like Molyneux totaled 23 points, opened the rally with a follow at 1:27. Molyneux added a free throw and Eric Wannan sank two more, putting the Bulldogs within 78-75.

Declo's Richard Hunsaker scored underneath, giving the Hornets an 87-75 lead with 41 seconds left. But 11 seconds later, Hunsaker, who had made 10 consecutive free throws since Tuesday's victory over Piler, missed the front end of a one-and-one.

Ever opportunistic, Kimberly cut the margin to one. Jeff Livingston hit a jumper from the free-throw line with 25 seconds left, and Holcomb stole the ensuing in-bounds pass and tossed the ball through the hoop, narrowing Declo's lead to 80-79.

# Coaches blast signing; USFL executives see no bad effect

Several coaches regarded the signing of Heisman Trophy winner Herschel Walker by the New Jersey Generals of the United States Football League Wednesday as severely detrimental to the future of college football.

But many USFL executives looked upon the signing as an isolated incident that will have no adverse effect on the college game.

"This is a very sad day for college football," said Charley McCondon, president of the American Football Coaches Association. "The co-existence we have had with high school, college and professional football has been very good for one and all. Now that the USFL has signed Herschel Walker to a contract before he can play his final year of college football has certainly damaged our

situation." Florida Coach Charley Pell said the signing presented "a very serious challenge to college football." "Herschel's decision to go professional concerns us as football coaches. We have to look at this USFL situation very seriously," said Pell. "We will now contact the president of our American Football Coaches Association and the (Southeastern Conference) SFC office and make an appeal that the leadership of college football begin to draw the lines and make our feeling known that we aren't interested in the USFL raiding our underclassmen, interfering with the education process, and interfering with the development of undergraduates in college football.

"This is a very serious challenge to college football and we will work to encourage our leaders to move immediately in reaching some accord

with the USFL." Joe Paterno, coach of national champion Penn State, said he was disappointed in the attitude taken by the USFL. "At the present time, I have not had the opportunity to read all the facts. I'm not sure if Herschel approached the USFL or the USFL approached Herschel so I'm reluctant to comment at this time except to say, one, Herschel's loss is a great loss to intercollegiate football and, two, I'm disturbed that it appears the USFL has some people who are taking the boys who have failed to live up to the commitments made by the league insofar as dealing with college players who have eligibility remaining," said Paterno.

John Chaffetz, vice president of the Arizona Wranglers, said the signing meant the USFL was serious about competing for talent with the NFL.

"The NFL now realizes, if it didn't realize before, that the USFL is real and intends to sign the top college players," he said.

His telephone started to ring almost immediately this morning, asking if he had heard about Walker's signing. "We personally are kind of extra excited. We had some concern about one of the dates on our schedule — Easter Sunday. We thought it might be an obstacle to drawing a good crowd. We happen to be playing New Jersey at Sun Devil Stadium (in Tempe) on Easter Sunday."

However, Chaffetz said he did not foresee a wholesale raid on college underclassmen in the future.

"This is an isolated situation," Chaffetz said. "I can't foresee anybody having the type of impact Herschel Walker has in the foreseeable future. I don't think the USFL, has any intention whatsoever of going

after underclassmen — I have been told the contact was made to our league, not to our league."

Judge Peter Spivak, part owner of the USFL's Michigan Panthers, said he also doubted the league would raid the colleges in the future.

"We haven't signed any underclassmen and we're not planning on it," said Spivak. "I don't know of any other (underclassmen) who plan on signing."

Despite what some of the league's executives said, however, USFL commissioner Chet Simmons took an opposite viewpoint.

Simmons said the league would begin exploring the possibility of setting up a new set of rules with regard to signing undergraduates.

The USFL commissioner acknowledged there was a possibility college coaches might shun the league.

"That's something we'll have to anticipate and we may have to bite the bullet," he said. "But we did not go after this young man."

The National Football League, weary of a policy which regards college undergraduates, said it would continue to abide by those guidelines.

"I felt that was the direction professional sports was going. I wouldn't want to be part of it," said Lynn Stiles, the director of player personnel for the Philadelphia Eagles. "I've never agreed with it in baseball, I don't think it's in the best interest of any professional athletics. There comes a point in time when you can't participate any longer. That time might come on the first play or 10 years from now. You still have to have an education and be part of the community. There's a life after athletics."

make the team and if the International Olympic Committee approves his participation.

He said if necessary, he would file an appeal to the committee that Walker be allowed to participate.

"Some of the highest-paid athletes in the world are European and Russian athletes who compete in the Olympics," said Manton. "Walker's mother tried to talk Walker out of the idea of sounding out the USFL when Walker first brought it up about three weeks ago."

"We tried to talk him out of sending me to New York," said Manton. "But he said 'If the money is what I'm fed to live, I will do it myself to find out.'"

Manton said the Chicago franchise of the USFL, submitted a written contract to Walker in December but Walker did not sign it. He said when he went to New York about three weeks ago, he submitted legal briefs to the USFL officials "that their rule (not drafting non-seniors) was not legally sustainable."

Manton said General Owner J. Walker Duncan met with Walker last Thursday night in Athens and Walker asked Manton to leave while he conferred with Duncan alone for about an hour. He said it was during that time that Walker signed the contract and that he did not witness the signing.

"I take Mr. Duncan at face value that he did not realize he was violating an NCAA rule," said Manton.

Asked Walker's present frame of mind, Manton said, "I think he is totally confident."

USFL Commissioner Chet Simmons said Walker approached the USFL in early January, indicating a desire to play for the new league. Simmons said because Walker was an undergraduate and not involved in the draft, he decided to allow him to negotiate with the league.

"Simmons would have said no," said Simmons. "We had to make a tough decision and I made it with all good conscience."

Simmons said Walker had approached the NFL last year, as well as the Canadian Football League in the past, and said "there was never a backup" by Walker's advisors.

# Wenzel gets 1st World Cup win in two years

**TARNABY, Sweden (UPI)** — Andreas Wenzel of Lichtenstein asked to his first World Cup success in more than two years with victory in Wednesday's slalom race — an event the spectators had hoped would turn out to be another lugarnar Stenmark Festival.

But Stenmark, the World and Olympic slalom champion, straddled the ninth gate in the first run, and went disappointed the back way home to his parents house, located at the

foot of the hill.

While Wenzel, Stig Strand of Sweden and Bojan Kriza from Yugoslavia battled for the first three spots, Stenmark was slipping coffee and watching the second heat on television.

Wenzel had exactly half a second in hand over second place Strand, clocking 1 minute 40.48 seconds for the course which had a vertical drop of 525 meters and included 66 gates in the first run and 62 in the second.

Strand, who like Stenmark was born in this remote Swedish village, returned 1:40.98 and Kriza) posted 1:41.20.

Stenmark could hardly find any consolation in the fact that overall World Cup leader Phil Mahre of the United States, who started two numbers after Stenmark, straddled the same gate in the first heat.

The American still holds the lead in the World Cup standings with 198 points, ahead of Stenmark's 157. Wenzel rose through his victory Wednesday to third place with 164.

"It's easy to make a mistake," Stenmark said. "To win a World Cup race today you have to gamble a little, and today I lost."

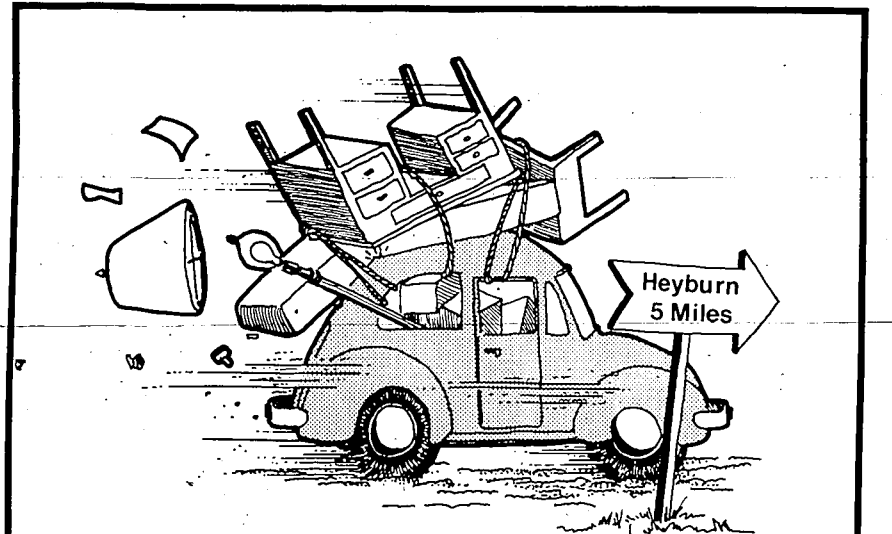

It's easy to make today's game if we get a second chance. Only if one keeps his hand off the wrong card will he make it on his first try.

South wins his heart king and leads a diamond to dummy's jack and East's ace. Which diamond did you lead?

If you didn't save the diamond, you will have suffered the same fate as South. East returned a heart after winning the diamond ace and South's last stopper was gone. Next he led a second diamond to dummy's queen and when East discarded, the game was hopeless. West refused to cover the third diamond lead and South could manage only seven tricks.

It is true that South could have saved his game by running his eight or nine diamonds on the second lead of the suit (not as far fetched as it may seem since it is routine for East to duck with more than one diamond). However, the foolproof solution to the diamond suit lies in keeping the diamond down the South's hand. First the eight is played to dummy's jack and East's ace. On the second lead, the nine is played to dummy's queen and the bid diamond queen is revealed. Thanks to these farsighted plays, South's diamond ace allows a third round

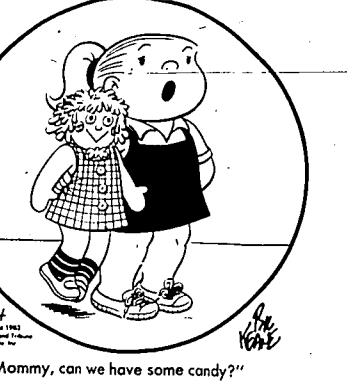

eventually dispense with the command "come" as you start off with your dog as long as you substitute the word "heel."

You may find it helpful to use the command "whoa" as you stop with your dog at heel. Its use will become apparent later on when you want to stop your dog without having him come all the way back to you.

There will come a time when you have to resort to whacking your dog with your hand or a rolled-up newspaper to enforce your commands. When that time comes, don't stand there repeating the command louder and louder until your hand descends like the wrath of Zeus.

Do it early, perhaps the second time your command is ignored. Don't bother raising your voice, unless you want your dog to teach you a game. It's called "let's see how far I can push the boss before he makes a stupid spectacle of himself."

As you train your dog, you'll see opportunities to use commands for the new skills your dog is learning.

Go ahead and use the commands to build on what you teach during training sessions.

For instance, if Spike is about to sit down, tell him to sit. Then compliment him on his good manners.

In addition to the commands al-

ready covered, you need to teach your dog to stay.

Put him on the long leash and push him into sitting if he hasn't yet learned the command well.

Move away a few feet and tell him to "stay" - but don't push your luck. A few seconds of staying is pretty good for the first session.

When your dog breaks from "stay" simply tell him to stop, by using the command "no" or "stop it," or whatever you've used to tell him he is doing the wrong thing.

Once you have retrieved your retriever from the open sewer he decided to investigate, you can usually find some clean water to send him into. But not always, I'm sad to say.

In such a situation, keeping him off the car seat on the way home is mandatory.

I teach "get off the seat" by giving the command as I push the dog off the seat. If that fails, locking up the brakes as soon as the dog hits the fabric never fails. It's a little drastic though, as a dog can injure himself bouncing off the dashboard on his way to the floor mats.

Next week, we'll talk about teaching your dog to retrieve.

## Outdoor briefs

### Wendell girl wins contest

BOISE — Tina Strickland of Wendell and Brett Rennison of Meridian are the state winners in the annual hunter safety essay contest sponsored by the Marlin Firearms Company.

Strickland's entry was chosen as the best in senior division and Rennison's was tops in the Junior division. The topic was "What I should do to preserve the sport of hunting."

To be eligible for the contest, students must have been enrolled in or completed an approved hunter education course.

The winners each received a \$50 gift certificate from L.L. Bean, a supplier of outdoor sporting specialties. The instructors, Stu Murrell, a regional conservation educator with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, and James Bartham of Meridian, also received gift certificates.

### Canada geese about to nest

BOISE — It's about nesting time for Canada geese again and they deserve a minimum of disturbance while they are choosing nesting spots where they can hatch their broods.

Favorable water and weather conditions - along with a peaceful nest - are important factors in maintaining Idaho's population of the big honkers, according to state game bird manager Dick Norell-

of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

Last year, hatching success was down in southwestern Idaho, primarily because of high water in some areas, but the numbers of goslings were above long-term averages in northern and southeastern Idaho, Norell said.

Many Canada geese nest on islands in rivers and lakes for added protection. They get added safety on islands in the Snake River section of Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge in southwestern Idaho, where fishing from island shorelines is prohibited Feb. 1 - March 31.

The stretch extends from below Swan Falls to a point downstream from Weiser.

### Hatchery renovation begins

AMERICAN FALLS (UPI) — Construction has started on a \$300,000 renovation project to put a 50-year-old hatchery back on line as a major producer of rainbow trout, Idaho Fish and Game officials say.

Work at the hatchery, which is expected to produce about 150,000 pounds of rainbows a year, is scheduled to be completed by October, IFG officials said late last week.

IFG spokesman Evan Parrish said most of the fish will be "catchable" - about 10 inches in length - and they will be healthier than some hatchery-reared fish.

"We will be producing them more efficiently with less chance of disease," Parrish said. "And we will

also then be able to utilize other hatcheries for specially fish such as brown trout, mackinaw, kokanee and coho salmon."

The first phase of the project at American Falls calls for replacement of the pond with about 20 "raceways" designed to increase the supply of oxygen, he said. Old buildings at the site will be replaced as money becomes available, he said.

Parrish said the spring-fed pond has become choked with nongame fish and an aquatic growth that has plugged channels and valves, he said.

"The life span of a hatchery is usually no more than 40 years, and the American Falls hatchery is about 10 years beyond that point," Parrish said.

### Game, bird survey en route

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho Fish and Game Department officials say about 14,000 upland game and waterfowl hunters will soon receive the department's annual questionnaire about the 1982 season.

Spokesman for the IFG wildlife bureau said this week resident and non-resident hunters will be asked to report how many of each species was harvested, how many times they took to the field and in which counties they hunted.

Spokesman said information gathered in the survey helps the Fish and Game Commission determine recommendations for future hunting seasons.

They said about five percent of all hunters are surveyed, and results should be available in April.

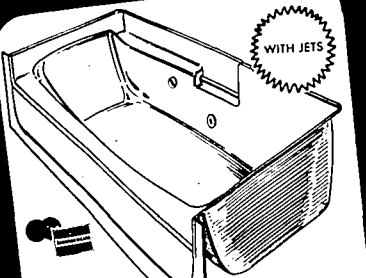

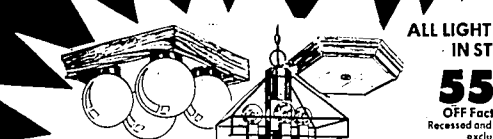
