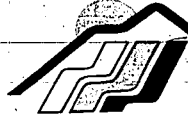

'A pillar of fire'

Canadian jet crashes during performance in Germany, kills 5

FRANKFURT, West Germany (UPI) — A Canadian jet fighter crashed Sunday during a performance at a holiday "open house" for 100,000 people at a U.S. air base, killing five people on the ground and injuring at least three others.

The pilot ejected safely. It was the second serious accident involving Allied military personnel in West Germany in two days. A bus crash killed six British airmen Saturday.

The CF-104 Starfighter went out of control during the display at the U.S. Rhein Main Air Base, skidded across a main road, killing a family of five as it crushed their car and then smashed into a crowded parking lot, injuring at least three others.

"Five people are dead. So far, we know of three people injured but this figure will be revised," said a Frankfurt police spokesman. Earlier estimates indicated six had been injured.

"There was a pillar of fire like from an atomic mushroom," one witness in the parking lot told the German news agency DPA. "I just screamed. Run, run, run."

Major Allan Ditter, press spokesman for the Canadian Air Force, said the plane was one of five

Starfighters giving an aerobatic performance at the U.S. base's annual "open-house" day. The team leader, Capt. Alan Stephenson, was making his last pass over the base to finish the display, when he lost control in an emergency, Ditter said.

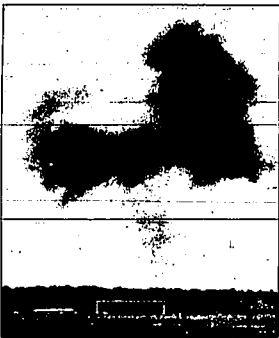
"We don't know what the emergency was. He ejected safely and was released from hospital later after a checkup," Ditter said.

He said the plane lunged on, mowed across the main road causing a series of accidents and then smashed into vehicles in the parking lot of a park near the road.

Four cars were badly burned in the fiery crash and another 40 were damaged by flying wreckage.

U.S. base rescue units and West German police, fire and ambulance teams rushed to the scene. Ditter said the Starfighters were based at the Soellingen air base near Karlsruhe, where 1,500 Canadians are stationed.

The Canadians were invited to give the display at the base, which opens its gates every year for an open house on the Whitsuntide, or Pentecost holiday weekend. Visitors spend the afternoon picnicking on hamburgers and ice cream and taking a look at U.S. Air Force planes.

New choices could 'stack' rights panel

WASHINGTON — President Reagan is planning to smother the political independence of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights by stacking it with his own appointees, a commission member and civil rights groups charged Sunday.

Reagan came under fire for his reported plans to replace up to four members of the six-member commission during the congressional Memorial Day recess.

"It reports an acquiescent President Reagan would be challenging the independence and integrity of both the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights and the U.S. Senate," said Ralph Neas, executive director of the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, a coalition of 165 national organizations.

On Saturday, Commissioner Murray Saltzman told United Press International Reagan plans to name four new members during the recess in a bid to "sidetrack" Senate confirmation. They would then face Senate confirmation.

Commission member Mary Frances Berry, a black and one of those who will reportedly be replaced, said the commission's political independence is on the line.

"The president is sweeping out and clearing out all of the appointees of the bipartisan, independent commission in violation of history, law," she told NBC News.

She said the administration feels "it would be much nicer if they had a more comfortable commission which would come out and tell the president that everything that they're doing is just fine and wonderful and right and it's all good — and that there's no problem with it."

Besides himself and Berry, Saltzman said the other commissioners being replaced are J. Richard Buckley, director of new Environmental Protection Agency administrator William Ruckelshaus, and Blandina Cardenas Ramirez. All four are Ford and Carter administration appointees.

NBC reported, however, that Mrs. Ruckelshaus would not be replaced and quoted a White House official as saying, "She just ain't gonna go."

Mrs. Ruckelshaus, contacted at her home in Seattle, Wash., said, "I have no reaction until I am called by the White House. It's still in the rumor mill."

The White House declined to say what Reagan's plan are for the commission.

As Reagan returned to the White House from a weekend in Camp David, he waved off questions about whether he planned to replace members of the commission. "I can't answer that now," he told reporters.

Saltzman, Baltimore rabbi, said Reagan plans to appoint Morris Abram, a New York City attorney and former president of Brandeis University; John Bunzel, senior research fellow at the Hoover Institution at Stanford University; Robert Destro, law professor at Catholic University in Washington, and Carolyn Reid Wallace, assistant director of elementary and secondary education projects at the National Endowment for the Humanities.

Commission members serve at the pleasure of the president and do not have fixed terms. Reagan has already named two members, including Chairman Clarence Pendleton of San Diego and Vice Chairman Mary Louise Smith of Des Moines, Iowa.

Reagan preparing for Williamsburg

WASHINGTON — President Reagan will spend most of the next five days preparing for a seven-nation Economic Summit whose success may depend more on what is not said and done than what is.

Reagan will bring the leaders of the six other major industrialized nations together in the quaint surroundings of colonial Williamsburg, Va., for three days of free-wheeling discussion about the world's economic problems.

From Reagan's standpoint, the goal appears simple: avoiding the discord that marred the summit last year at Versailles and created deep divisions among the members of the Western alliance.

In the view of top administration officials, the summit will be a success if it ends on an upbeat note, even if troubling issues are not resolved.

"This is not an action summit," said one official. "We had one of those at Versailles last year and, needless to say, we do not need another one, especially at Williamsburg."

Asked what the allies will be told if they charge the administration is not doing enough to stem budget deficits, Treasury Secretary Donald Regan said Sunday. "We're going to deny it. We're going to say that, yes, our deficits do matter."

Former West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt said he hopes Williamsburg, unlike Versailles, will be a "meeting where people do not shout at each other, where they listen to each other... I do hope the will for compromise will prevail."

One possible wild card could be French President Francois Mitterrand, who could be prompted by domestic political concerns to use the summit to repeat his charge last week that the United States is at the heart of the world's economic problems.

Mitterrand took particular aim at the budget deficits Reagan has been unable to reduce.

French Foreign Minister Claude Cheysson, however, said that Mitterrand, who has seen the franc fall dramatically against a strong U.S. dollar, will not "attack" the United States.

Congress under spending gun, again

WASHINGTON — Once again, U.S. spending is approaching its legal limit, and once again the warnings are out — unless Congress raises the debt ceiling by the end of the week the federal government faces a shutdown.

The scenario: The government cannot borrow; social security, unemployment and payroll checks stop, the stock market suffers low-grade jitters, newspapers proclaim a financial crisis.

But congressional leaders respond, telling members the increase in the debt ceiling must be approved or the Memorial Day recess will be cancelled.

Although the critical day does not come until the following week — probably the 30th (a holiday) or the 31st — but Congress must act before the start of the recess begins, now set for the close of business Thursday in the House, a day later in the Senate. The House, with its more structured rules,

rammed through a \$99 billion increase in the ceiling — up to \$1,389 trillion — by voice vote but no one knows what may happen in the Senate.

The debt ceiling itself has become so huge it no longer is controversial, but the legislation has become a favorite target for extraneous "Christmas tree" riders — and this one is no exception.

So Senate leaders want to hold the bill until the end of the week, hoping the lure of avoiding a delay in the recess may be enough to cut down on the ornaments.

Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., fearing the worst, said it is possible the week's activity could spill over into the weekend.

A highly controversial proposal, already passed overwhelmingly by the House, that which could wind up as a rider to the debt ceiling bill is legislation to repeal the 10 percent tax withholding on interest and dividends.

Dole, who strongly opposes the repeal and was forced to swallow a four-year delay as a com-

promise earlier this year, wants to consider it separately before the Senate tackles the debt ceiling.

Dole, however, is not averse to tree trimming as such. The Senate Finance Committee chairman would welcome a rider to incorporate President Reagan's economic aid program for the Caribbean Basin, and perhaps some others.

Democrats also may use the debt ceiling bill as a vehicle for one more effort to repeal the third year of the three-year income tax cut, due to take effect July 1.

The debt ceiling and the tax withholding bills pose enough problems for a recess-ender Congress, but the leaders on both sides of the Capitol also have scheduled action on the administration's MX missile program.

At stake is the freeing of \$560 million for development and \$65 million for flight testing of the big multiple-warhead weapon, and the administration's decision to base 100 of them in existing Minuteman silos.

Lebanese minister optimistic about Syrian troop pullout

Lebanon may hold talks soon with Syria on troop withdrawals but the Israeli-Lebanese agreement will "die a natural death" if there is no prompt Syrian pullout, Lebanese Foreign Minister Elie Salem said Sunday.

Salem's warning came as U.S. Middle East envoy Philip Habib briefed Israeli officials on his efforts to obtain the Syrian withdrawal. There was little indication of progress in Habib's mission.

The Israeli-Lebanese troop withdrawal agreement, signed last week, was formally ratified by the Israeli Cabinet Sunday.

Besides providing for the troop withdrawal, the accord also terminates the state of war between the two nations and sets up a security zone in south Lebanon to be patrolled by joint Israeli-Lebanese forces.

But Israel has said it will not implement the agreement and pull its 30,000 troops out of

Lebanon unless the Syrian and Palestinian forces also agree to withdraw.

Salem, in Paris at the conclusion of visits to West Germany, Italy and France to seek support for the U.S.-mediated withdrawal agreement, said the accord had to be implemented promptly.

"If the Israeli-Lebanese agreement is not applied within a reasonable period, it will die a natural death," Salem said. "If Syria does not withdraw its troops, there will simply no longer be an agreement."

Salem later flew back to Beirut and, in an optimistic assessment, said: "I think the cloudy atmosphere (in the relations between Lebanon and Syria) will be cleared soon and we will hold serious talks to secure the great interests of Syria and the Arabs."

"I think we are on the right road and this crisis will end soon."

Salem, who said he had held "encouraging" talks by telephone with Secretary of State

George Shultz and British Foreign Secretary Francis Pym, added that European nations were assisting the United States in trying to bring about a Syrian withdrawal.

Habib met with Israeli Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir in Jerusalem to report on his visits to Egypt and Saudi Arabia last week where the envoy explained in detail the Israeli-Lebanese accord, an Israeli official said. Israeli armed forces radio said Habib told Shamir the Saudis, Syria's chief financial backers, would try to convince Damascus to pull its 40,000 troops out of Lebanon.

Syrian envoys visited Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Algeria and Libya during the weekend to argue against the accord, which it considers "surrender," while Lebanese emissaries made similar trips to Arab capitals seeking support for the agreement.

Habib was due to leave for Beirut later in the day, the Israeli official said.

"He (Habib) will remain in the area," the

official said, indicating the veteran diplomat still hoped to travel to Damascus, although Syria rebuffed a Habib visit last week.

PLO chief Yasser Arafat, faced with a challenge to his leadership by a dissident guerrilla faction, visited his military command near the northern Lebanese city of Tripoli, state-run Beirut Radio said.

It was Arafat's first visit to the Tripoli area since the PLO was expelled from Beirut and south Lebanon last summer by the Israeli army.

Arafat has made several trips to guerrilla units in the Lebanon Bekaa Valley this month amid reports of fighting between PLO factions.

Lebanese Prime Minister Chelik Wazzan condemned a wave of factional kidnappings and revenge killings threatening a two-week-old truce in the Aley and Shouf mountains southeast of Beirut.

Wazzan called on rival Christian and Druze Muslim militiamen to "exercise self restraint and prevent a further deterioration of an already tense situation."



LEBANON'S ELIE SALEM Hints at fresh efforts

Numbers complicate battle over insurance

WASHINGTON — A sophisticated insurance industry campaign to stop Congress from removing sex distinctions in insurance is fueling heated debate over whether the legislation helps or harms women.

Inspired by a campaign waged by banks against withholding of taxes on interest and dividends, the lobbying drive comes at a time when Congress is under pressure from women demanding laws to tackle economic inequity.

The fierce battle is complicated by a war of numbers.

The insurance industry says the bill would cost them billions and eliminate price breaks women now get on auto and life insurance. Civil rights groups dispute those computations, claiming women have paid a price for

discriminatory rates for years.

Now that commerce committees in the House and Senate are ready to take up the legislation, which even sponsors admit needs amending, debate is escalating.

A compromise that took weeks to negotiate fell apart the day before it was due for a vote. An insurance industry trade group backed out of the agreement when its membership overruled the board.

Claiming betrayal, congressional supporters called a news conference to attack the industry. They deplored ads that cropped up in 64 newspapers warning young women their auto insurance will rise \$700 million a year if the bill passes.

The appeals include personalized letters, handbills, so those receiving the mailing can protest to their congressmen on what appears to be their own stationery because it comes in different colors and typewriters.

Personal mail is considered more carefully than form letters.

"It's rather clever," said a spokesman for Rep. Dennis Eckart, D-Ohio. Eckart denounced the campaign as "political intimidation."

An aide to Sen. Bob Kasten, R-Wis., reports 300-400 letters daily against the bill — a fraction of the 2,000 letters a day he got on withholding.

"This isn't a great grassroots movement like withholding," the aide said. "Savings accounts are important to people. But insurance — it's not something people actually

want. So you don't have the same emotional involvement."

George Bernstein, an attorney representing some of the companies that formed the Committee for Fair Insurance Rates, estimates the mass mailing generated 25,000 letters to Congress.

He predicted double that number will write their congressmen after the mailing is repeated.

Bernstein's estimate does not take into account letters generated by appeals made to policyholders by their insurance companies. Richard Schweiker, a former senator and Health and Human Services secretary who heads the industry's American Council of Life Insurance, wrote more than 500 member companies to urge their participation.

"We want them to hear from the people back home," said Bernstein. "What's wrong

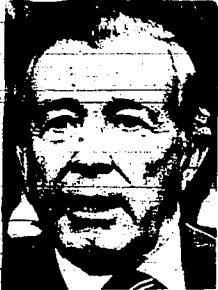
with that? We're not signing letters for people."

"One day Congress will rise up in wrath against this kind of tactics," warned Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., chief Senate sponsor of the bill. He charged the industry's claims are distorted.

Insurers say women live almost eight years longer than men on the average, so they receive lower annuities because they get payments longer. The women's groups claim 85 percent of the 150 million women in the country die at the same age as men do. More relevant than sex, they argue, are factors such as whether the policyholder is overweight or a smoker.

Opponents of the bill say it will mean higher auto insurance rates for women, who currently pay less than men before they reach the age of 25.

Regan blasts Congress over deficits

Senate budget 'a joke'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Treasury Secretary Donald Regan criticized Congress Sunday for failing to combat high deficits and called the recently approved Senate budget resolution a "joke."

"Our deficits do matter. Perhaps not the deficit of '83 — nor the deficit of '84, but certainly the deficits of '85, '86 — those out years have to be considered by our administration, by the Congress," Regan said.

Speaking on ABC's "This Week With David Brinkley," Regan said, "This most recent budget exercise of the Congress is a joke as far as attacking those deficits in the out years."

The resolution, sponsored by Republican moderates, and passed by the Senate, calls for a substantial

three-year increase in taxes and forecasts a deficit of \$78.6 billion. Regan said the resolution would,

combat high deficits only if the tax increases "were accompanied by large spending cuts."

"But what in fact that budget calls for is increased domestic spending as well as increased taxes. And that goes right back to the old theory of spend and tax and tax," he said.

Regan criticized Congress for not supporting a Reagan administration-backed budget proposal. "We've offered right from the start that if the Congress will cut spending, we'll consider tax increases in 1985. That's exactly the Reagan program," he said.

"The president's budget has never been voted on by the Congress... I would suggest that at least they ought to try it, to see if it would work or not."

Regan said the administration would be hard pressed to explain the lengthy budget debate to world lead-

ers at the economic summit in Williamsburg, Va., next weekend.

"It's going to be rather hard for us to explain this process to people that are used to the parliamentary system whereby they get their budgets passed in a matter of three or four days," he said. "Here we've been since Jan. 22... until now and we still don't have a budget."

Regan said the budget resolution recently approved by Congress has "cut defense spending, raised taxes and then increased domestic spending. I think that's the wrong way to go."

"It's quite evident that the Congress has no desire whatsoever to cut back on the driving forces behind this big deficit."

"They decry high rates of interest, they decry the slow recovery. They want things speeded up so they can help unemployment, but they won't take the logical way to do it, which is to cut down on the deficits," he said.

Tuition tax credit likely to gain OK

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Despite heavy opposition from the public school system, the Senate Finance Committee is expected to approve the administration's tuition tax credit proposal this week.

President Reagan, who promised during his 1980 election campaign to push for the tax credit, urged swift passage in a recent letter to the Republican-dominated panel. The committee plans to complete its work on the bill Tuesday, but the ultimate fate of the legislation is in doubt because House leaders have expressed no interest in taking it up.

Regan told the committee he is "deeply committed" to the tax credit "to strengthen parental control over education and extend choices" to those who now pay taxes for public schools plus private school tuition.

"Making alternatives affordable to those parents who want them... will provide competition as public and private schools seek to improve the quality of education they offer." But a leading opponent, Sen. John Chafee, R-R.I., said, "If the idea is to force competition, then they ought to operate on a level playing field."

Chafee and other opponents unsuccessfully tried for three days in the committee last week to impose a series of amendments to make private schools adhere to the same requirements — ranging from educating the handicapped to meeting the same building codes and health and safety standards — as public schools.

"We are considering funding a whole set of schools that are not subject to the same requirements as the public schools," Chafee said after his amendments were defeated. He predicted it would result in "skimming" bright children away

from public schools, leaving the public schools "to the poor, black and immigrants and those who have language problems."

The bill would allow a taxpayer making less than \$40,000 to deduct half of the tuition for private elementary and secondary education, with a maximum tax credit gradually increasing from \$100 to \$300 over a three-year period.

Old training plane crashes, pair die

MESA, Ariz. (UPI) — A World War II vintage plane crashed during an airshow Saturday, killing both men aboard.

Maricopa County sheriff's deputies identified the victims as James Orton, 35, of Mesa, Ariz., and James Maloney, 30, of Corona del Mar, Calif.

Investigators said Orton was flying a single-engine Ryan PT-22 as part

of an air show by the Arizona Wing of the Confederate Air Force, a group of volunteers who collect and restore vintage World War II planes.

Officers said Orton was flying in formation with another aircraft of the same make when it crashed on the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Reservation. The second plane returned safely to Falcon Field in Mesa.

The International Brotherhood of Teamsters just can't seem to rid itself of the unsavory aura that has surrounded its top leadership for so long. Three of the last four Teamsters' presidents were convicted of crimes, and the newly chosen president, Jackie Presser, does not seem likely to be much of an air freshener.

Presser, for years a Teamster leader in Ohio, shrugs off reports of his supposed links with organized crime. Whatever his flaws may be, Presser undertakes a formidable task as president of the giant, though ailing, Teamsters Union. Perhaps he means it when he says that he "will run an open, honest administration" and vows to bring "a new day for the Teamsters."

We shall see.

But wouldn't it be refreshing were the union to break with tradition and name a leader of high repute to polish up the Teamsters' tarnished good name? Open candidacy and election by rank and file might accomplish that. Under the present system, with power to elect vested in the general executive board, the chances are poor.

Appealing aspect

Americans may not want to go back to a monarchy, but there is one aspect of the British system of government that is appealing.

It was demonstrated recently by Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, who announced on May 9 that a general election would be held on June 9.

One month. No primaries. No caucuses. No "issues conventions." No multi-million-dollar fundraisers. No coy pre-announcements by candidates. For that matter, no announcements.

If we won the Revolution, how come we got stuck with this enormous paraphernalia? Why does it take us three years to gear up for a national election when the British can do it in one month?

No air freshener

Supreme Court Justice Lewis F. Powell, at a recent meeting of circuit judges in Georgia, said the death penalty should be abolished, unless a way is found to handle death penalty appeals more quickly.

He did not say, however, how to speed the appeals process without worsening the odds for executing an innocent person.

In a spectacular Connecticut case, convicted murderer Frank C. Smith was sentenced to die in the electric chair in 1950. His trial became a source of controversy when a witness later claimed she had committed perjury and another man signed a "confession" of dubious worth.

Though Mr. Smith never established his innocence, he was saved from the electric chair two hours before the executioner was to throw the switch; the State Board of Pardons commuted his sentence to life imprisonment, which at least allows for the possibility of error.

The irrevocability of capital punishment should settle Mr. Powell's dilemma. The death penalty should be ended, not hastened.



America should put its neighbors first

I now plunge into the murky waters of foreign policy. To say the least, I am not well-informed and will soon be over my head. A few generalizations won't hurt anyway.

First, the Russians are an implacable foe of the U.S. They are without honor or compassion in their dealings with foreign countries. This is proven in Poland, Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Afghanistan, to mention only a few. We should never delude ourselves into thinking that Russia will be reasonable on any foreign policy question.

Israel is a staunch and courageous ally, certainly deserving of our concern in the Middle East. There are scores of factions involved in that under-box area. It sometimes seems as if we be better off to ignore them and let them blow themselves up. But the Soviets would inevitably take advantage of such a vacuum and, indeed, are already up to their Red elbows in fomenting trouble there.

In addition, Israel could not survive without massive U.S. aid. We have, for several decades and under diverse administrations, determined that it was worth the price to give Israel our full support.

But we should be able to demand, from the Israelis, an all-out attempt at an accommodation with its enemies in return for this aid.

Instead, you find that nation rapidly building settlements in occupied territory, contrary to our well-reasoned advice. On several occasions Mr. Begin, the premier, has told us figuratively to go jump in the lake.

As much as I admire the courage and dedication of Israel, I believe that we must play hardball with its leaders when we believe that their actions are not conducive to peace.

In Central America, it's hard to find a government that is worthy of the title. Those in power seem about as inclined as the left-wing insurgents to violate the rights, safety, and dignity of their citizens.

The example of Cuba clearly shows that we can't

tolerate communist control of the area. Therefore, I believe we must keep the anti-Soviet factions from collapsing.

But we're kidding ourselves if we think model governments will emerge from our efforts. The only real cure is long-term economic development of the area.

I believe that our strongest efforts should be concentrated on building Mexico as an economically powerful ally. Most of the population in there. The best chance for true democracy is there.

Our relationship with our southern neighbor has too often been of a condescending nature. Canada often complains of that type of treatment too. We should treat these two countries as if they are essential to our economic health and security because they are.

Israel is important. El Salvador is important. But our neighbors should be our first concern.

Missile anorexia solves lots of issues

I was split right down the middle by the congressional missile debate.

So persuasive were speakers for both sides; I could see the wisdom of building new missiles, and also the wisdom of not building new missiles.

Then I heard it explained that building new missiles is a necessary prelude to meaningful arms control negotiations, and suddenly it all came together.

Not only did the "missiles for peace" picture become clear for the first time, several other murky issues were illuminated as well.

Gun control, for example. We'll never have a meaningful reduction in the number of shootings in this country until everyone owns a gun.

Once there is a pistol in every closet, assuring equality between law-abiders and lawbreakers, America will be ready for gun control legislation. Not a minute before.

Another controversy, the missile debate can help us find the handle on the report by the National Commission of Excellence in Education.

The commission, I gather, is 100 percent in favor of educational excellence. But philosophies differ as to how to go about achieving that goal.

Some educational philosophers argue for higher standards for public school curricula. Others say the surest way of raising grades is to make the tests easier.

The latter philosophy is the one I used to put to my teachers when I was in school. But they would just smile and say, "We know, We know."

Now, judging from the arguments that seemed to prevail in the congressional missile debate, it may be philosophy whose time has come.

So what if today's students lack basic skills in reading, writing and mathematics? As long as tests don't expose their ignorance, who is the wisest?

A similar point can be made with respect to the seemingly contradictory aspects of a new diet plan that stresses the importance of overeating.

"We're never going to have meaningful weight reductions in this country until everybody gets fat," a promoter of the plan told me.

I said, "A fat freeze wouldn't do it, huh?"

"Not for a minute," the unofficial expert replied. "Freezing fat at present levels would only solidify the pounds that already are in place, usually around the hips and stomach; it provides no incentive at all for skinny people to lose weight."

"I think I've got it now," I said. "Once obesity becomes a universal condition, there will be an insatiable demand for weight control programs with teeth. Verification at the scales is essential."

"You've got it," she confirmed. "Once everyone is overweight, we can institute a 'build-down' system. Folks will continue to eat too much, but for every pound they put on, they take off two."

"You mean...?" I gasped.

"Exactly," she said.

That seemed to sum up the missile debate right there.

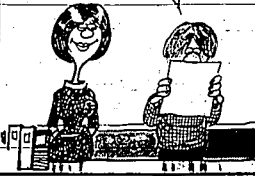
As soon as some country develops a case of missile anorexia, we'll know the disarmament talks are making progress.

Document expected to help prepare students for college

A new College Board document, three years in the making and reflecting the opinions of 1,400 experts, is expected to help high schools do a better job of preparing students for college.

The title of the document issued recently is "Academic Preparation for College: What Students Need to Know and Be Able to Do."

It describes what students headed for college need in English, the arts, mathematics, science, social studies, foreign language and computers.

The College Board, which provides testing programs and other services for college-bound youths, is a membership organization of more than 2,600 colleges and high schools.

Its testing program includes the Scholastic Aptitude Tests taken by more than a million students each year and the College Level Examination Program that provides high school students college level work through Advanced Placement courses.

The SAT predicts how well a student will perform in college, measuring aptitude for college-level work.

The new guidelines were issued in response to two concerns on the high school-college front, including sliding SAT scores.

Average scores on the SAT measuring verbal aptitudes slid from 478 to 424 in the years between 1962 and 1981. The average SAT scores measuring math aptitudes dipped from 502 to 466 during the same period.

Another reason for the guidelines aimed at

better preparation for college: many high school graduates, once they enter any but the most selective colleges, must take remedial work to raise to college level their skills in writing, reading and mathematics.

"Academic Preparation for College" is a agenda that students and parents, school boards and government officials, colleges and university faculties, as well as schools, may use in setting priorities and making decisions about educational programs and expectations," George H. Hanford, College Board president, said.

Dr. Adrienne Y. Bailey, vice president for academic affairs at the College Board, said:

"We hope that this document will assist boards of education and others responsible for educational policy to assess what needs to be done to improve the quality of secondary education.

"This will not be accomplished overnight," she said.

Highlights from "Academic Preparation for College:"

•Computer competency: Students should know how to use a computer and appropriate software.
•English: Literature, language and

composition should be studied in depth. In addition, skill in writing also should be developed in subjects besides English since it pertains to all academic disciplines.

•The arts: In addition to a basic understanding and appreciation of the unique qualities of each of the arts, students should develop some ability to perform in one—singing or instrumental performance, painting, dancing or acting.

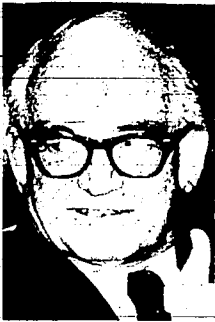
•Mathematics: Calls for integration of the computer in traditional fields of algebra, geometry and functions. Recommends calculus as preparation for students aiming for engineering, economics, medicine, natural sciences and computer science.

•Science: Recommends a thorough quantitative understanding of at least one field of science, including mastery of skills needed to perform laboratory and field work.

•Social studies: Recommends acquaintance with U.S. history and world geography and cultures, plus a thorough grounding in at least one of the social sciences—economics, political science, geography or sociology.

•Foreign Language: College entrants should be able to speak, read and write elementary sentences in at least one foreign language. Students also should acquire knowledge of the culture, history and life patterns of the society in which the language is spoken.

Time to act firmly

Senator declares: *Draw the line against Cubans*

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said Sunday he would not oppose a U.S. invasion of Cuba if the Fidel Castro government does not halt its drive to "Cubanize" the hemisphere.

Goldwater, chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, also suggested a quarantine against the communist military supply line into Central America and said the administration is probably violating the law with its anti-communist activities there.

Goldwater, interviewed on CBS' "Face the Nation," said, "only somewhat facetiously," that Cuba should be "the 51st state." Asked if the island nation should be invaded, he said: "We should have invaded it."

But should we invade it now? "I'm not opposed to it if they continue to try to take over the entire Caribbean area and Cubanize our friends in South America," he said.

Goldwater called on President Reagan to make a clear statement the United States will use force if necessary in Central America.

Asked if he would be prepared to send U.S. troops, he said, "I think the mere threat, if made in a strong enough way that people will believe it, will suffice."

"If the president made it abundantly clear that

the Caribbean is our problem now, starting with Cuba, and we would use what force is necessary to maintain Central America, I have a strong feeling we would have no further trouble," he said.

What force would be required? "We really don't understand now, at least I don't, the number of planes that would be required, the number of troops or ships."

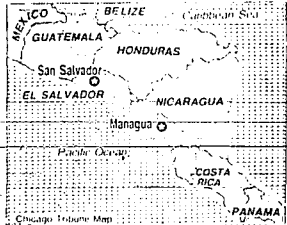
"I think we could start with a quarantine, for example—a ship quarantine to make it possible to completely stop supplies flowing into Nicaragua and San Salvador. We could use aircraft if that became necessary," Goldwater said.

"Great nations do not bluff and great nations don't go to war. Had we been ready to tell Hitler in the 1930s, 'You put a foot on the soil of this country and we're going to be at you,' there never would have been a World War II."

"Had we been willing to let the military use the forces we had in Vietnam, we would have won in Vietnam, the same in Korea," he said.

Goldwater said his panel has "passed a little doodad" telling Reagan it will approve no further covert aid in Nicaragua unless he issues a new policy statement by the end of the fiscal year, Sept. 30.

Generally, he said, he is "on the optimistic



side" that the tide in Nicaragua and El Salvador may be turning in favor of the U.S. position. "I think our covert action is beginning to take hold," he said, citing "better reports" not only from the two countries but from impartial observers.

Asked if it is not time to "drop the word 'covert,'" Goldwater replied:

"Yes, I agree. But we have a problem — overt is against the law. Just off hand, you violate nine different laws if you go overt. In fact, I think we are violating some right now."

Versatile Viking dies after 7 years on Mars

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — Viking 1, the versatile instrument-packed robot, is dead on the surface of Mars.

The lander, sent to Mars in 1976, stopped communicating with Earth last November and scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory have tried unsuccessfully to reestablish communications.

Saturday night, the last attempt was made to fire radio signals to switch on Viking's transmitter computer.

The effort failed and JPL said it had to consider Viking 1 finally dead after 6½ years. It had sent back thousands of pictures of the Martian surface and volumes of data.

JPL scientists sent commands across the 225 million miles of space, and waited two hours for a return signal.

"There's no chance of getting the signal back," JPL spokesman Don Bane said. "The plan is that we will try no more."

"There's always the chance that someone at NASA will change their mind, but the probability is remote," he said.

Viking 1 was one of two landers sent to the "Red Planet" in 1976. Viking 2 stopped transmitting in 1980.

It takes about 22 minutes at the speed of light for the radioed signals to reach the space between Earth and Mars.

Scientists were to wait for the computer commands to effect a change in Viking's transmitter, then for the signal to return to Earth where it would be received by a 210-foot diameter dish receiver at Canberra, Australia.

Trudeau worrying about 'name-calling'

OTTAWA — Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, who has been sending friendly signals to the superpowers to stop the "name-calling," suggested there was some justification for fears of a "warlike" Reagan and said it must be recognized that Washington is as capable of making a mistake as Moscow.

"If either side makes mistakes," he said, "I think it is the right or even the duty of the United States government to point out these mistakes as seen from our view."

Because Canada was not a superpower, Trudeau said, it had "certain values it intended to be upheld in the west and in the rest of the world and approach the actions of other great power in an even-handed way."

He said he voiced Canada's concerns to Mikhail Gorbachev, a member of the Soviet Politburo who spoke at the parliamentary rally as Trudeau spoke. Gorbachev headed one of the highest level Soviet delegations to visit Canada in recent years. Gorbachev delivered an invitation

from Soviet leader Yuri Andropov for Trudeau to visit Russia. Canadian officials said Trudeau warmly welcomed the suggestion, but no date for the visit was set.

While the Soviets do not view Trudeau as a mediator between the United States and their country, a Canadian official said he was regarded as a pipeline to the U.S. administration.

Trudeau, who will meet Reagan at the end of this week at the Western economic summit in Williamsburg, Va., said he warned Reagan in preliminary meetings for the summit that "name-calling" between the superpowers could only lead to a deterioration of efforts to end the nuclear arms race.

"I think it is not unreasonable to suggest to the Americans that their statements about the Soviets being an evil power, and so on, are not conducive to fair and unpassionate negotiations," Trudeau told the Toronto Star last week.

The prime minister said the Soviets were not a threat to the West economically, culturally, or socially.

"They are dangerous in the military sense. Therefore, let us deal with the areas of danger; let's not treat them as pariahs, as outlaws of the world community," he told the newspaper.

Commenting on expected demonstrations in Canada this summer against U.S. cruise testing in Canada, an territory, Trudeau reportedly said the protesters would be "demonstrating against what they see as the policies of an American president who has, rightly or wrongly, been perceived as warlike or so hostile against the Soviet Union that he can't be trusted."

Found in remote part of Australia Mineral grains believed part of Earth's first crust

SYDNEY, Australia (UPI) — Australian scientists have discovered mineral grains that are 400 million years older than any rocks now known and believed to be part of the Earth's original crust.

Scientists at Australian National University said grains of the mineral zircon were discovered last month in western Australia and dated to within 300 million years of when the Earth itself is believed to have formed.

Dr. Bill Compston, leader of the university's geochemistry research team, said the discovery challenges current theories on the chemical history and formation of the Earth.

"What we've done is opened up a whole new Earth history," he said. "The discovery will change ideas on how fast the Earth cooled down and when the Earth's surface began to form."

Zircon, a silicate of zirconium, is a mineral found in igneous and sedimentary rocks in a variety of colors ranging from gold to red. Transparent varieties can be cut into brilliant gems and often are used as diamond substitutes.

Grains of zircon were found in sandstone at remote Mount Narryer, 450 miles north of Perth. Their age was

determined in late April by the Australian National University's Research School of Earth Sciences in Canberra.

"Before the find, there was absolutely no evidence that anything existed in the time gap between 4.5 and 3.8 billion years ago," Compston said.

Up to now, the oldest known rocks were metamorphic specimens found in Isua, Greenland, and were 3.8 billion years old.

Compston said the zircon grains may have formed part of the Earth's original upper crust and more may be found in later searches.

"What we're looking at with the zircon we've found is the beginnings of the Earth itself," said Ian Williams, a scientist who helped design the equipment to date the mineral's age.

Williams said atoms were extracted from the zircon by firing an ion microprobe beam at the crystal. Scientists determined their age by measuring uranium and lead content.

Williams said the ion microprobe, unlike other methods used for dating material, does not destroy the original crystal when the particles are extracted. This allows the crystal to be re-examined layer by layer.

UN opens Namibia issue debate

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Urged on by Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar, the Security Council opens a week-long debate today aimed at persuading South Africa to accept a U.N. plan for granting independence to Namibia.

At least 21 foreign ministers gathered in New York for the most determined effort to gain independence for the disputed territory since

the Council devised the plan five years ago.

The mineral-rich territory, also known as South West Africa and about the combined size of Texas and Louisiana, has only about 1 million people, mostly black. Namibia has been administered by South Africa illegally, according to the United Nations, since the end of World War I. A spokesman for the South African

U.N. mission — commenting "Why all this fuss?" — said Ambassador Kurt von Schrindinger would lead the South African delegation in the council debate.

Representatives of South Africa's white minority government were banished from the U.N. General Assembly in 1974 because of their government's racist policies but they retained a presence on the Security Council.

Rebel force loses

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — A Nicaraguan army patrol killed five rebels fighting under renegade Sandinista "Commander Zero" on the southern front with Costa Rica, the Defense Ministry said Sunday.

A ministry communique said the army patrol followed and ambushed the band of rebels Friday after the insurgents detonated an explosion at an unidentified Nicaraguan installation in southern Nicaragua.

Bombings in Ulster escalate

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Catholic youth gangs tossed 500 gasoline bombs and snipers fired on British troops and police early Sunday in the worst rioting in Londonderry in two years.

The riots were the worst since 1981 when 11 Republican hunger strikers starved to death in Belfast's Maze prison while seeking recognition as political prisoners from the British government.

Extra police and British troops dressed in riot gear moved into Londonderry but kept a distance during the afternoon as 800 Catholics, led by a pipe band dressed in brown kilts and green jackets, marched in a demonstration called by the Irish Republican Socialist Party to mark the second anniversary of hunger striker Patrick O'Hara's death.

No incidents were reported.

Authorities said they believed the riots were part of a campaign to heighten tension before the June 9 general election in which Sinn Fein, the political wing of the outlawed Irish Republican Army, is seeking 14 of Northern Ireland's 17 seats in the British Parliament.

Police said more than 200 rioters attacked their patrols with some 500 gasoline bombs when they answered a bomb call hoax at a Londonderry pub shortly after midnight Saturday.

"Two policemen and a number of youths were injured as British security forces and the Republicans battled for five hours in the streets of the city's heavily Catholic Creggan and Bogside districts.

At least two sniping incidents were reported by police trying to break up the crowd.

Police said the snipers used teenagers for cover when they opened fire, but officers on one occasion returned fire when shots came from first-floor windows in the eleven-story Republican Rossville apartment complex in Bogside.

No one was injured in the shootings.

At the afternoon rally, Irish Republican Socialist Party speakers made references to 13 men charged Saturday with terrorist offenses and membership in the outlawed Irish National Liberation Army. They warned they would take action against any Catholics who turned police informers.

'Presidential' delays strain air travel

LAGOS, Nigeria (UPI) — Travel by President Shehu Shagari, who is campaigning for Nigeria's Aug. 6 election, is straining the nation's air services.

For security reasons, airports have to be closed for an hour or more before his arrivals and departures, forcing planes to burn costly fuel while circling in anticipation of landing.

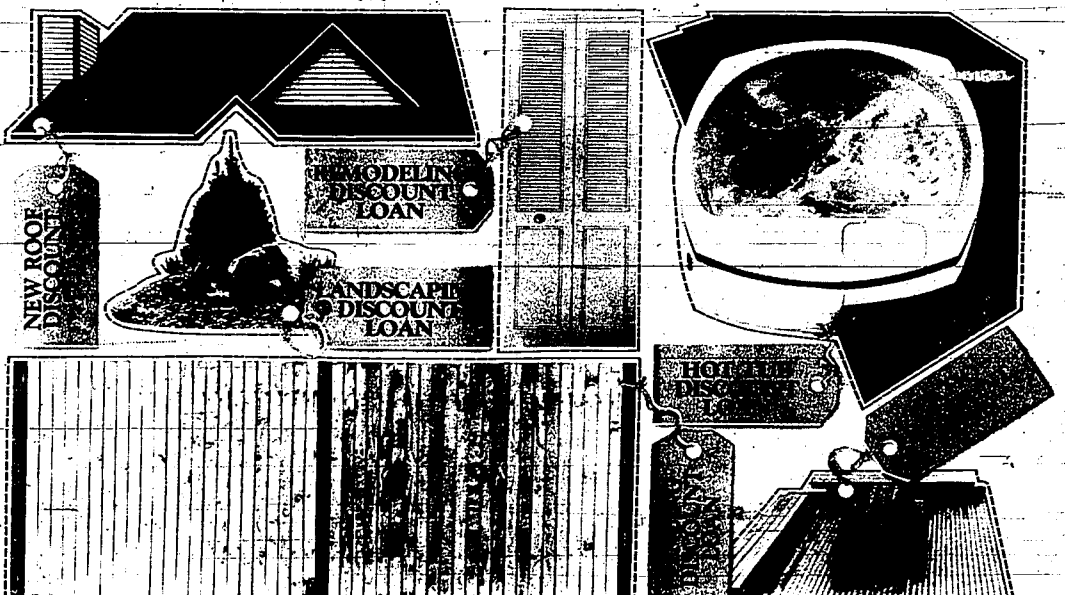
Slide in Italy takes 8 lives

TRESCENDA, Italy (UPI) — A huge chunk of mountain crashed onto a dozen homes Sunday, killing eight people, including two infants, and injuring a dozen others in the rain-soaked, mountain town of Trescenda. Italian state television quoted authorities as saying four people were still missing hours after the rock and mud cascaded onto homes during the lunch hour.

Rescue teams set up operations in a school to search for the missing victims.

The landslide came crashing over the railroad tracks and blocked a major road in the mountain area, police said.

Spraying important

What you do in the garden now can have a decided effect on this year's success. I'm thinking of dormant spraying.

That's the spray that can be applied when plants are dormant, or have no developing leaves.

If you are going to spray for insects just once a year, it should be now, with a dormant spray. That's how effective it is for the control of insects and their eggs.

Best of all, dormant sprays are not really poisons. They're compatible with organic gardening. Liquid lime sulphur kills by a scalding action and oils by smothering.

The only precaution is that a lime sulphur spray will darken white paint or discolor a sidewalk.

Dormant oils must be applied when the temperature is above freezing. It must stay above freezing long enough for the spray to dry.

Fruit trees and roses in particular will benefit from a dormant spray. Plans for rose planting can be made now. The usual planting distance is two feet.

For something different, I'd suggest under-planting the roses with wormwood, also called artemisia, or other plants with silver-gray leaves.

Many other combinations can be experimented with. Rather than clast, they complement each other.

Fast break doesn't fool Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — The opening game of the NBA championship series lived up to its advance billing as the Indianapolis 500 in sneakers Sunday but the Philadelphia 76ers had the taller gas tank in the stretch.

The 76ers uncorked their running game in the third quarter to take control and held off a pair of Los Angeles rallies to defeat the Lakers 113-107 and take a 1-0 advantage in the best-of-seven series.

With Moses Malone, who had game highs of 27 points, and 18 rebounds, controlling the boards, and Maurice Cheeks and Clint Richardson leading the break, the Sixers rallied from a 57-54 halftime deficit to go up by seven points in the third quarter and later extended their margin to 12 with 6:37 left to play.

Although the defending champion Lakers were never out of it, they lacked the reserve energy to draw even, having come off a grueling division-clinching victory over San Antonio last Friday night.

But it was hard to convince the Sixers that they were tired. "Even though the Lakers just finished up a rough series and had to hustle to get into Philadelphia for today's game, they came out and played great ball from start to finish," Philadelphia Coach Billy Cunningham said. "They were ready and they played their game."

But Kareem Abdul-Jabbar said the fatigue really got to the Lakers when an extra burst of energy was needed.

"We didn't have as much gas as we'd like," said Abdul-Jabbar who had 26 points but just four rebounds. "We had more pressure on us. That's the way things happen but it was just too much. We felt we could have made a little more of a game of it in the second half but we were tired."

Los Angeles Coach Pat Riley, however, was pleased. "I just think it was a great game for the first game," he said. "We have just finished playing three games in the last 4½ days. We will do better when we have a chance to sit down and prepare a little bit more."

Game 2 of the best-of-seven series will be played Thursday night in Philadelphia. Andrew Toney added 25 points, 15 in the first quarter — for the 76ers while Julius Erving added 20

points, 10 rebounds and nine assists. Norm Nixon led the Lakers with 26 points and Magic Johnson contributed 19 with nine rebounds and 11 assists.

Los Angeles played without veteran reserve Bob McAdoo, who suffered a deep thigh bruise Friday night in the team's division-clinching 101-100 victory over San Antonio. Nixon injured his left shoulder in a collision with Toney with 9:33 left in the first quarter. Although he did end up playing 41 minutes, the Los Angeles guard was taken to Methodist Hospital for X-rays following the game.

Richardson scored 10 of his 15 points in the third quarter and Cheeks also had 10 to lead the Sixers comeback. Trailing 57-54 at halftime, the Sixers later ran off eight consecutive points to take a 70-64 lead on a layup by Cheeks with 7:29 left in the period.

The 76ers hooded their margin to seen points on Richardson's layup.

"We just got the ball off the boards and ran our break," Cheeks said. "We knew we had to be more aggressive in the second half and take it to them. We got the big boards today when we needed them."

"We were more aggressive in the second half and stopped their transition game," Malone added. "We started hitting our shots and we stopped them from getting easy shots. They looked strong today. They're the world champs and they came to play."

The Lakers cut the deficit to 85-83 by the end of the third quarter behind Nixon, who scored 10 points in the period. But Marc LeVard and Malone accounted for layups in the first 1:23 of the fourth quarter to build the Philadelphia advantage to six and Malone's 3-point play with 7:49 left to play gave the 76ers a 94-89 lead.

After Nixon's jumper, Philadelphia ran off the next 6 points with Richardson's jumper giving the 76ers a 100-88 lead with 6:37 remaining. But the Lakers were not through yet, closing to 111-107 on a follow-up shot by Johnson with 25 seconds left.

The Lakers had possession eight seconds later following a turnover by Abdul-Jabbar. "It was a hook shot with 18 seconds left and Michael Cooper later misfired on a 3-point attempt with six seconds left. Malone hit two free throws to close the scoring."

"They ran (the fast break) few times," said Richardson. "But we were rebounding well. I think we

stopped them with our rebounding. "That's why we've been breaking a lot, because we're getting the rebounds. If you don't have the ball, you can't run."

"We know what LA's strengths are," said Erving. "Those guys run the fast-break-and-like-a-transition offense. We wanted to make them take jumpers and the deep sky hook (by Jabbar). You're not going to stop jump shots, but you can stop them from getting the easy baskets."

The Lakers had barely one full day of rest following their grueling

division-clinching victory over San Antonio Friday night and the fatigue took its toll in the closing stages.

But Johnson said it is just a matter of time before the Lakers' running game returns. In the devastating form exhibited against Portland and the Spurs.

"We can get it going," he said. "We just threw the ball away too many times. But we can run against anybody. This was a good open-court game. Both teams wanted to run but you don't have as

many chances as you'd like because both teams play good defense."

"They play great defense," added Nixon. "Philadelphia's probably the best team we have to face, as far as getting back on defense on the transition. They really hurt us."

"We worked on the trap pretty extensively," said Cheeks. "We tried to use it to our advantage when somebody traps us to move the ball around. And we got the ball off the boards, and that enabled us to be more aggressive."

Lakers missing McAdoo

PHILADELPHIA — The Doc didn't.

That, besides a 113-107 loss to the Philadelphia 76ers in Game 1 of the NBA Championship Series, was the bad news for the Los Angeles Lakers Sunday.

Backup center-forward Bob McAdoo, vital to the Lakers' championship drive last season, couldn't play. In warmups, he tested his injured right thigh. "I just couldn't get anything going," he said.

Which was one reason the Lakers couldn't get much going offensively. In the second half, the Lakers got only seven points from their subs, all by Michael Cooper. "It's frustrating not to be able to contribute," McAdoo said. "This is the championship series and you want to help. You could see that we missed some firepower off the bench today."

Fortunately for the Lakers, McAdoo has plenty of time for the injury to heal. Game 2 isn't until Thursday. "I'm hoping to be ready," said McAdoo, who was out for 13 weeks with the injury before making an emotional return at the Forum in Game 1 of the Lakers-Spurs series. "Now I have some time to stretch it out."

One need go back no farther than Friday night, to the final game of the Lakers-Spurs series, to understand how much McAdoo can help his team. In the first half, the Lakers built a seven-point lead and McAdoo did most of the damage. He scored 14 points.

But late in the half, he suffered the pulled muscle and played only briefly in the second half. The Lakers held on, 101-100.

Last year, the Lakers found his scoring very handy. He averaged 16.7 points in the playoffs. In the finals against the Sixers, he averaged 16.3 points (shooting 56% from the field) and five rebounds. Though Magic Johnson won the MVP award, many thought McAdoo deserved it.

The Lakers may have another injury to worry about. In the first quarter, Norm Nixon collided with Andrew Toney at midcourt. Nixon suffered a bruised left shoulder and X-rays were to be taken Sunday night. The shoulder didn't seem to bother him that much Sunday, though. He scored a team-high 26 points. "But I'm not looking forward to tonight (Sunday night)," he said.

Both teams have remained relatively injury-free throughout the playoffs.

Idaho wins BSC outdoor track title

TEMPE, Ariz. (UPI) — Sparked by meet outstanding athlete Mike Kinney, the University of Idaho easily rolled to the 1983 Big Sky Conference Track and Field Championship, amassing 155 points to far outdistance the field Saturday night.

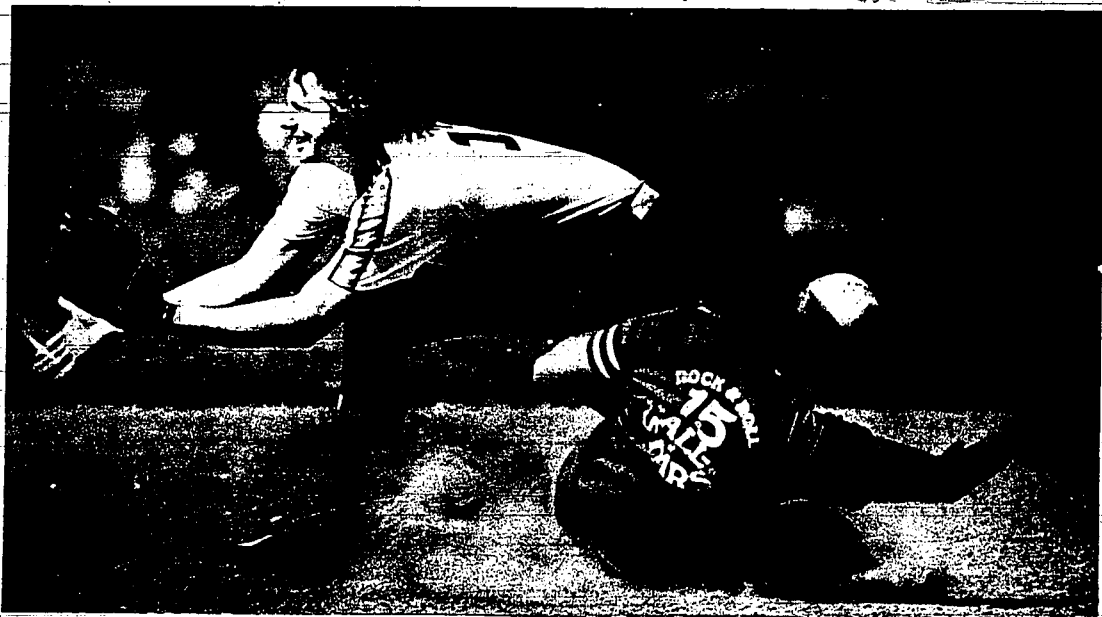
The Vandals came into the final night of action trailing intra-state rival Idaho State 32-31. However, they sped to a meet-record victory in Saturday night's first event, the 400-meter relay, and never looked back.

Idaho State had to settle for second place with 83 points and the meet really resolved into a battle for the runnerup spot. Northern Arizona and Nevada-Reno both scored Idaho State for the number two position, but wound up settling for a tie for third with 79 points apiece.

Boise State claimed fifth with 69. The Vandals won nine firsts and claimed four seconds to easily dominate the field on the last night of action.

Kinney earned the outstanding athlete trophy for his work in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles across the two days. Friday night he set a conference record with a 51.05 clocking. That lasted just 24 hours as he came back Saturday to break the standard with a 50.54 effort.

It was one of seven records broken the final night and Idaho was to claim three other new standards. Their 400-meter relay team of Everton Waulias, Dave Smith, Dave Beston and Dave Harewood began the assault on the record book in the night's first running event when they posted a 40.42.

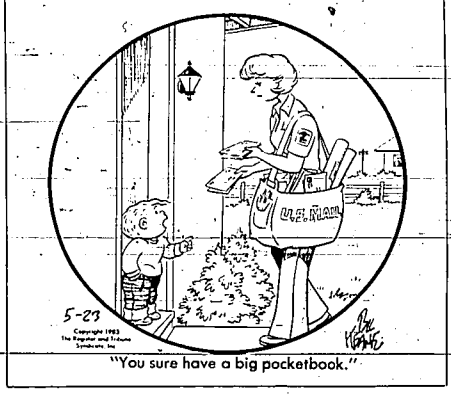
