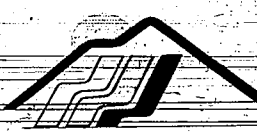

Review board nixed on land sales

TWIN FALLS — Secretary of Interior James Watt has removed the federal Bureau of Land Management's land-sale program from the oversight of the Property Review Board.

Watt made the decision last week after consulting with White House officials and Edward Harter, the chairman of the Property Review Board, according to Mark Guldry, a spokesman for the BLM in Washington, D.C.

The board is an independent agency,

established in 1982 by President Ronald Reagan to oversee the disposal of "surplus" federal properties to help reduce the federal deficit.

Last week, two of Idaho's congressmen, Sen. James McClure and Rep. Larry Craig, sent a letter to Reagan, calling for the board's dismantlement.

The two lawmakers said that establishment of the board had removed the assurance "that each land-disposal action will go through the normal study and review process."

Guldry said the Property Review Board was formed primarily to expedite the sale of surplus military property, federal buildings

and other improved real-estate—not public lands.

According to Guldry, the board had received periodic reports from Watt on the progress of his department's land sales, but it had not been involved in setting quotas or deciding what lands should be sold.

"They are no longer setting quotas for us—actually, they're reviewing them," Guldry said Friday that the secretary "was taking a lot of heat from people who were terrified that they (the property board) were going to sell off a lot of land."

"This action was just a further move to assure them that this won't happen," he said.

"There was some confusion, but basically we are still continuing with our land-sale program. It's the same basic land-sale program we had in the past. In recent years, we've been only selling 1,000 to 1,500 acres per year. This year, we are hoping to sell 30,000 (nationwide)."

Watt's decision will not have any impact on the BLM's plans to sell 14,635 acres of Idaho land in fiscal 1984 or its proposals to sell up to 175,000 acres over the next five years, according to a Boise BLM spokesman, Frederick Cook.

"The five-year plan is still in place," Cook said Friday. "The key to what action we take will be determined by how much funding we will get."

The Reagan administration originally had proposed \$18 million for the next fiscal year, which starts Oct. 1, to fund the BLM's national land-sale program. But this figure was cut to \$12 million in the House and \$8 million in the Senate. A compromise bill is expected to be worked out in a joint House-Senate conference in September.

Cook said the BLM's land-sale program is based upon extensive land-use planning

Libya in rage

Leaders await attack from U.S.

CAIRO, Egypt — Charging the United States is reading an attack, Libya put its armed forces on alert for a general mobilization Friday amid signs of an escalation in its involvement in the war in Chad, diplomatic sources said.

The official Libyan news agency JANA did not mention the military buildup but issued two stinging attacks against what it called Washington's "insolent contempt" and plans for "an invasion... and occupation" of the Arab world.

Libya, the sources said, canceled all military leaves and instructed all high school and university students and teachers of various age categories to report to military barracks in their vicinity.

Both students and teachers were

forbidden to leave the country and the government—according to these sources—was reconditioning four-wheel drive vehicles from government offices.

Youth in southern Libya close to the border with Chad, were "being recruited on a relatively large scale," the sources said.

Many inhabitants of the southern part of Libya are of the same Bedouin tribes which populate the unembattled north of Chad.

Libyan leader Col. Muammar Khadafi, in telegrams to Arab heads of state, condemned stepped-up U.S. plans for a military exercise in Egypt and the stationing of an aircraft carrier battle group in the Mediterranean.

"The real threat is coming from America itself," Khadafi said, asking the Arabs for support to fight against

Sympathizer succeeds with Upper Volta coup

OUAGADOUGOU, Upper Volta (UPI) — Former Prime Minister Thomas Sankara, reportedly using Libyan-supplied arms, Friday overthrew Upper Volta's military government in a bloody coup that left 13 people dead and 15 wounded.

It was the second African uprising currently reported to have the backing of Libya's Col. Muammar Khadafi.

The coup, which took place on the 20th anniversary of the West African country's independence from France, came two days after the State Department accused Libya of the continent-wide pattern of Libyan destabilization.

Sankara, a 37-year-old Marxist, came to power in a military coup in 1982 from the post of prime minister and jailed by President Jean-Baptiste Ouédraogo, claimed success in stag-

ing the country's second coup in eight months.

There was shooting through much of the night Thursday and Friday morning. Volts awoke to military music on the state-owned radio interrupted by denunciations of the "fascist" regime that had been deposed.

Sankara went on the radio to announce the ouster of Ouédraogo, de-

scribed as a populist reformer who himself seized power in a Nov. 7 coup.

The National Revolutionary Council, constituted of members of the regular and paramilitary forces, is now completely in control," Sankara said.

The army captain is allied with Khadafi, who is also currently supporting rebel forces in Chad trying to overthrow the government of President Hissene Habre.

A radio announcer later called on the people to march in support of the National Revolutionary Council. Several hundred young people responded by riding the government's motorbikes.

French newspaper reports said 13 people died in four hours of fighting during the coup. Six French nationals, including a four-year-old child, were injured, along with nine Volts, the

Chad battered by Libyan air strikes, retreats

N'DJAMENA, Chad (UPI) — Government troops battered by Libyan air strikes retreated from two eastern towns and fought to hold onto a key northern oasis town, Chad officials and diplomatic sources said Friday.

Information Minister Soumaili Mahamat insisted however, as he has all week, government troops still held the eastern settlements of Oum-Chalouba and Kalali, near the border with Sudan.

But other officials confirmed the air raids forced government troops to retreat from the two towns Thursday. The officials, speaking privately, said the Libyan air strikes had

retained overall control of the eastern region.

France dispatched supplies for use by Chadian government forces against Libyan-backed rebels and the United States restated its determination not to allow Libya to have its way in the embattled region.

"The United States has a strong strategic interest in assuring that Khadafi is not able to upset governments or to intervene militarily in other countries as is currently happening in Chad," Deputy Press Secretary Larry Seakes said in Washington.

If Libya or Libyan-backed forces were to gain control of Chad, Seakes said "close U.S. allies such as Egypt and Sudan would be seriously concerned about their own security."

Seakes said the violence in Chad was intensifying and added, "There is no U.S. role in Libyan intervention there."

The fighting prompted President Reagan Thursday to pledge \$15 million more in emergency military aid to Chad. Reagan approved an initial \$10 million aid package July 18 to help Habre crush the insurgents.

Authorities were reconditioning four-wheel drive vehicles from government offices, the sources said.

They said youth in southern Libya close to the border with Chad were "being recruited on a relatively large scale."

In Chad, 200 Soviet-made armored vehicles were only three miles from the northern oasis town of Faya-Largeau, whose defenders were pinned down by six days of constant Libyan air strikes, diplomatic sources said in Ndjamena.

Libya also sent a convoy of sophisticated Soviet-made T-62 and T-72 tanks across the desert toward Faya-Largeau, Western diplomatic sources said. They said the column was about 150 miles northwest of the town on Friday.

Only last Saturday, the troops loyal to Habre recaptured the northern outpost from the rebels.

Unemployment rates drop; 499,000 people return to work

National rate lowest this year

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's unemployment rate plunged to a 2 1/2 percent low, making the biggest drop in nearly a quarter century with a record number of Americans at work, the Labor Department reported Friday.

The government said 499,000 people found jobs last month, pushing total employment to a record 101.3 million.

The jobless rate, adjusted for seasonal factors, plunged a half percentage point from June's 10 percent level, the largest one-month drop since December 1969, as the size of the civilian work force, which includes both people with jobs and people seeking them, remained steady.

The news brought jubilation throughout the Reagan administration and Republican Party.

President Reagan happily asserted that his economic policies must be credited with sparking the economic recovery, saying "They don't call it 'Reaganomics' any more."

"We've turned the situation around and given the American people hope," the president declared.

It was the lowest rate in over a year and the first time since last

August that unemployment has been below double digits.

Despite the sharp drop from June and even larger slide from the recession high of 10.8 percent last December, the unemployment level remains far above the 7.4 percent rate when Reagan took office in January, 1981.

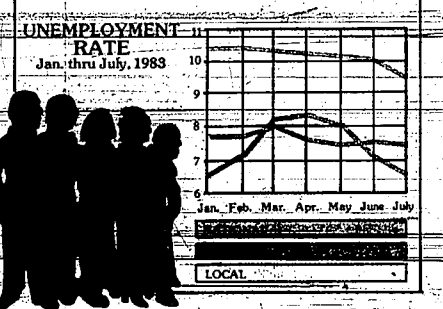
An alternative rate, which includes 1.7 million military workers, dropped from June's 9.8 percent level to 8.3 percent.

"We've licked the recession. We've licked inflation. Now it's unemployment's turn," Sen. Roger Jepsen, R-Iowa, said as he presided over congressional Joint Economic Committee hearing. "We've got unemployment on the run."

Martin Feldstein, chairman of Reagan's Council of Economic Advisers, labeled the July figures "spectacular" and said the sharp rise in employment "is a clear indication that economic activity in the third quarter has gotten off to a very strong start."

Feldstein said the new figures appear to confirm that the rate increase national product this quarter can be in the same range as the second quarter's sharp growth spurt, which was up 3.7 percent on an annual rate.

House Speaker Thomas O'Neill



was reserved in his praise of the report.

"Today's news on unemployment is good news," the Massachusetts Democrat said. "But we still have a long way to go with 10.6 million Americans out of work. The big question is not the initial strength of the current recovery—it's its duration."

Former Vice President Walter Mondale, a Democratic presidential candidate, said he was pleased at the drop in the unemployment rate but cited the 10.6 million people who are

still out of work and expressed fear the recovery "cannot be sustained."

"Unemployment among black Americans is stuck at the disastrous level of 20 percent," Mondale said. "More than half the young people in many of our nation's cities can't find their first job."

The number of unemployed persons actively looking for work dropped by 556,000 to 10.6 million, with most of the improvement among adult women, where the jobless rate fell 0.7 percentage points to 7.9 percent.

Local picture improving faster

TWIN FALLS — Unemployment fell faster in the Magic Valley than the rest of Idaho during July, according to the latest figures from the Idaho Department of Employment.

The seasonally adjusted rate for Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding counties stood at a 6.7 percent, a half-percentage point lower than in June, according to statistics released Friday. The local rate continued the downward drift that began in April when it peaked at 8.3 percent.

Lon McDonald, Idaho state labor force analyst at Twin Falls, said an increase in government employment at all levels due to summer help led an overall strengthening of the Magic Valley's employment market.

Throughout Idaho, though, unemployment improved only a tenth of a percent from June to July. It now is at 7.6 percent, partially because of a striking labor force.

"Fewer workers entered the market as a result of their perception that new or seasonal jobs were being created," McDonald said.

McDonald, the director of the state agency, "if more people had been in the labor force looking for work, our unemployment rate might have gone up."

At the same time, he predicted

continued improvement into October, as students now looking for work return to their classrooms, opening room in the market for other laborers. Signs of a recovery in the timber and construction industries also continue to hold out hope of future declines in joblessness, he said.

Unemployment rates in Idaho will stay below those for the previous year, McDonald predicted.

In the Magic Valley, analyst Lon McDonald said he is finding more optimism among job-seekers and more signs of a turnaround in some underlying industries, such as the numbers of people on unemployment who have exhausted their benefits.

"These numbers have decreased recently, indicating that more people are finding work before their 26 weeks of unemployment benefits expire," he said.

McDonald also noted another trend. The agricultural job market, a major one for this three-county area, took what he described as a normal drop in late July, as employers in the foods industry geared down to prepare for the summer and fall harvest.

Employment Department officials also noted that summer layoffs in some processing plants throughout the state seem to be occurring sooner than usual.

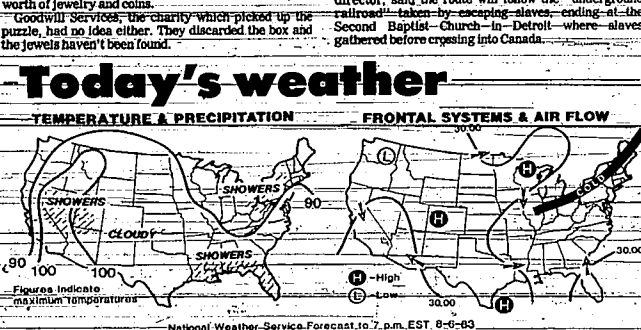

Withholding repealer signed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan, acting in the nick of time, signed legislation he had adamantly opposed repealing the law requiring tax withholding on interest and dividend income. Reagan signed the measure he once vowed to veto without fanfare. Withholding would have gone into effect Friday had he not acted. Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes announced Reagan had acted at a routine briefing for reporters. Reagan's signature ended a year-long battle between Congress and the powerful banking lobby over the withholding law.

Mondale may get labor vote

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Walter Mondale appears to have enough strength to win an accelerated presidential endorsement by the AFL-CIO, labor leaders said Friday, but rival candidates plan last-ditch efforts to thwart the move.

Both Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif. and John Glenn, D-Ohio, are high-ranking personal contacts with union presidents and political advisers in advance of next week's meeting of the AFL-CIO Executive Council in Boston.

At that conclave, opening Monday, the labor hierarchy is expected to take the first step toward placing the imprimatur of the 13.7 million-member federation on former Vice President Mondale's campaign for the Democratic nomination.

Cubans termed 'dangerous'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Justice Department, worried that "violent and dangerous" criminals will be released on the public, asked a judge Friday to postpone his order granting new rights to Cuban refugees held in an Atlanta prison.

Norman Carlson, director of the Bureau of Prisons, said in a court affidavit after he visited the prison that the 940 Cuban criminals still held "are among the most violent and dangerous that I have come in contact with during my 25 years in prison administration."

In documents distributed in Washington, the government said a July 27 ruling by U.S. District Judge Marvin Shoob in Atlanta would be "irresponsible to the American public by possibly releasing 'the most dangerous core' of boat-lift refugees.

Anti-nuke activists arrested

Four anti-nuclear protesters who released doves in the lobby of a nuclear-research laboratory, were arrested Friday in the opening salvo of a weekend of demonstrations marking the atomic bombing of Japan during World War II.

The protests were expected to continue through next week. Nuclear bombs killed 200,000 people in Hiroshima Aug. 6, 1945, and 50,000 in Nagasaki three days later.

Phone strike hovers

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Communication Workers' President Glenn Watts said Friday the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. must more than double its current wage offer to avert a strike at midnight Saturday against the Bell telephone system.

Watts has pledged to pull his 525,000 members off the job at 12:01 a.m. EDT Sunday under the union's "no contract, no work" tradition unless an agreement is reached.

The last nationwide strike by the Communications Workers against the Bell System was in 1971.

"There were indications that serious bargaining was being conducted. There apparently was some activity last night (Thursday). It started to progress a little," union spokesman Duayne Trecker said.

But Watts said Friday that AT&T will "have to more-than-double-the wage offer to get our attention."

"They haven't improved the wage offer and they've made no gesture on the employment security items and without that there is no way we could possibly reach settlement," Watts said.

AT&T spokesman Charles Dynes continued to be optimistic that a strike will be averted.

"I think we'll have a package sometime tomorrow that will meet the employees' needs in the views of the both the company and the union," Dynes said.

The management bargaining team is headed by Rex Reed, vice president for labor relations.

Bargaining also proceeded between the company and two other unions, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers and the Telecommunications International Union, who together represent about 150,000 workers.

U.S Navy demands repayment

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy Friday shrugged off a lengthy explanation by the Sperry Corp. of possible overcharges for spare parts and insisted on a refund of about \$80,000 to "put this overpricing issue behind us."

As the Navy told Sperry a refund would be in the company's interest, the Air Force announced it had banned 12 former suppliers from doing business with the government for a year because of "a serious lack of business integrity."

Navy Secretary John Lehman made his service's demand in a brief letter to Sperry Chairman Gerald Probst in New York City, responding to a letter Probst had written July 28. The letters were released by the Navy.

Lehman originally wrote to Probst July 22 asking for a refund of "something more than \$109" for each diode the Navy bought from Sperry for its F-4E simulator. Pentagon auditors found the Navy paid \$110 each for several diodes that cost \$1.

In his reply, Probst said complicated Pentagon purchasing procedures of spare parts "can lead to individual distortions" in the prices of some parts, but "the overall distribution of costs should be equitable."

In his response, Lehman expressed interest in working with the company to prevent further overcharges.

"First, however, we must balance the ledger on existing contracts," he wrote. "I consider it very much in Sperry's interest that you, as chief executive, put this overpricing issue behind us."

"This can be achieved easily by returning to the Navy the approximately \$80,000 our inspector general has determined was overcharged to the Navy."

Heat wave kills 2 more

August heat killed two children in Texas Friday and thunderstorms were blamed for toppling a building onto a St. Louis freeway, killing a teenage girl and injuring a man and woman.

The heat raised the heat wave toll to 185 people since early July.

St. Louis authorities said it appeared a lightning and high winds from a thunderstorm toppled five stories of an 80-year-old brick building onto Interstate 24 just south of downtown. The debris flattened a passing car, killing a girl and injuring the other two occupants.

In Texas, two young children died in 100-degree-plus temperatures in a closed room. Their mother talked to a roadside shrimp salesman. Houston authorities said they believed Alex Assady, 3, and his sister Crystal, 18 months, died from heat exhaustion or suffocation.

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Lightning starts 11 southern Idaho fires

Soaring mid-day temperatures and tinder-dry fuels sparked flames from smoldering lightning strikes Friday as range fires ballooned across about 30,000 acres in Idaho and smoky haze wafted through the southern part of the state.
While firefighters in the central Idaho mountains doused several blazes in that part of the state, crews

in the southern lowlands battled 11 fires ignited by a Thursday night lightning storm.
Weather forecasters predicted more lightning through the weekend, however, and firefighters braced for more electrical bolts, said Bureau of Land Management spokesman Julie Hall, Boise.
"We're just hoping to get some rain soon," she said.
Ms. Hall said nine fires were reported after the storm moved through the area Thursday night — but by mid-day Friday, two more blazes erupted from what had been smoldering embers earlier in the day.
Meanwhile, Oregon firefighters attacked two spreading fires and stood watch over the smoldering remains of a 100,000-acre blaze that was controlled Thursday night.
"This is the biggest fire bust we've had this season," Bureau of Land

Management spokesman Chris Long, Boise, said of Friday's new fire. "The lightning storm overnight really got us."
"We're expecting more thunderstorms and a lot of fire activity," Long said. "I think it's going to be a long time for several of these fires."
Ms. Hall said fire hoses dispatched about 200 firefighters to the 11 southwestern Idaho blazes.

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Jury trial of church continues

COEUR D'ALENE (UPI) — A Montana woman has told a First District Court jury she and her children were abused by her ex-husband, who claims their divorce was prompted by his wife's membership in the Tridentine-Latin-Rite Church.
Pauline Urban O'Neill said Friday she joined the Coeur d'Alene-based religious sect in January 1974 after her husband, Jerry O'Neill, became involved in right-wing political groups.
O'Neill has filed a \$1.5-million lawsuit against the so-called Fatima Crusaders, claiming the sect coerced his wife into leaving him.
Judge Wally Prather said he expected jury deliberations would begin Monday following testimony by the final defense witness and closing arguments.
Mrs. Urban O'Neill told the jury her husband beat her, threw her out of the couple's home and kidnapped one of their children.
Under questioning from defense attorney Bliss Bignall, she said she had been raised a Roman Catholic, but turned to the Tridentine sect after her husband began attending John Birch Society meetings with a cousin and became involved with the Peace Comitatus, a self-appointed law-and-order group.
The Fatima Crusaders, who are believed to have a total membership of 5,000 including about 900 people in northern Idaho and eastern Washington, were organized in Coeur d'Alene in 1968. The sect was started by people who rejected the Roman Catholic Church and favored liberalization of the mass in the early 1960s.

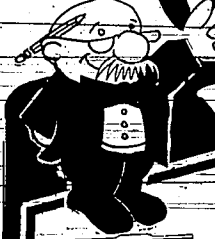
Solution to WPPSS is elusive

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senators headed home for their two-week summer recess today without having voted on an amendment to permit the Bonneville Power Administration to help finance the completion of two Washington state nuclear plants.
The Senate adjourned Thursday evening and the House followed suit a short time later, although negotiators from both houses stayed on to approve a \$268.6 billion military spending bill that included a controversial nerve gas provision.
The controversial Washington Public Power Supply System amendment, attached to an Interior Department appropriations bill, ran into a final hurdle Wednesday, that was led by Sens. William Proxmire and Howard M. "Bud" Shuster before other Senate business ended the debate.
"Hopefully, holding it over will give us some time to resolve some outstanding difficulties," an aide to Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash.
Gorton is a supporter of the amendment and companion legislation introduced by Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, that would authorize the BPA to enter into an agreement with a new financing entity to guarantee with rate revenues construction bonds to finish WPPSS plants 2 and 3.
Although the legislation is designed to promote completion of both plants through new bond sales, the nearly finished Plant 2 would be completed by the BPA with rate revenues even if McClure's initiatives fail.

Symms wins for leadership

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The American Security Council, a conservative group favoring strong military expenditures, has given Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, its leadership award for 1983.
Council officials said Friday the award is given annually to congressmen who consistently vote for legislation reflecting the idea that a strong U.S. defense is the best way to keep world peace.
Symms has "one of the best" voting records on pro-defense issues, the group said.
"Senator Symms is one of those forgotten members of Congress who knows that a strong America is a secure America," said John M. Flaherty, council president. "He knows that weakness only invites aggression, and that a balanced strategy of Peace through Strength will ensure this nation's security."

Bomb blasts kill at least 20

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Explosions rocked Lebanon's three largest cities Friday, killing at least 20 people in a wave of terrorist violence that dramatized the nation's deteriorating state of security.

The worst blast, packed in a car, occurred amid a crowd of worshippers and children outside a mosque in

the Syrian-controlled northern city of Tripoli, killing at least 19 people and wounding 38 others, state-run Beirut radio said.

Twelve hours later a bomb in Beirut went off inside a four-story building in the Christian neighborhood of Ain Rumaneh, killing a 47-year-old girl, wounding five people and collapsing one side of the building, the radio said.

In the southern coastal city of Sidon, a third explosion — a

Lebanese police station, an Israeli military spokesman said. The state-run radio said Lebanese patrolmen who arrived at the building were fired upon but no one was injured.

The violence, including fighting between Druze Moslems and Christians in the Shouf mountains east of Beirut, came on the eve of an effort by U.S. envoy Robert McFarlane to persuade Syria to pull its troops out of Lebanon.

Foiled robbers kill seven witnesses

AVIGNON, France (UPI) — A band of would-be robbers — one just out of jail — panicked and shot dead seven people Friday in an attempt to eliminate all witnesses to a bungled heist of safe deposit boxes at a hotel, police said.

"They killed in cold blood," said police chief Yves Bertrand said. He said each victim had at least one

bullet hole in the head.

Bertrand said he "convicted" three gunmen were involved, although initial police reports said there were only two gunmen. No witnesses were left alive.

"The attempted hold-up was the latest in a summer series of raids on hotels in France. Over the last two weeks, armed gangs seeking to rifle

safe-deposit boxes struck four hotels in or around Paris and two in provincial-tourist centers.

The gunmen tried to flee by jumping from the second-story window of a room where they killed five of the people. One gunman was immediately arrested by police who arrived quickly on the scene. The others escaped in a car.

U.S. troops arrive for Mideast maneuvers

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) — A U.S. military transport unloaded heavy military equipment at the port of Alexandria Friday and U.S. troops poured into Egypt for this month's joint military maneuvers, military sources said.

Workers began unloading 44 M-60 tanks and armored personal carriers and some 20 troop transport, observation and attack helicopters for the 25,000-ton USS William Callaghan, the sources said.

A total of 6,900 tons of equipment

was expected to be brought ashore for the exercises, dubbed "Bright Star '83."

Several hundred U.S. troops have arrived in Egypt so far aboard U.S. C-130 Hercules and C-141 Starliner Transport planes.

Cabinet quits amid coup rumors

LA PAZ, Bolivia (UPI) — The entire Bolivian Cabinet resigned Friday amid charges that right-wing drug traffickers were plotting a coup to overthrow President Hernan Siles Zuzo 10-month-old civilian government.

Siles Zuzo's 18 Cabinet ministers stepped down to allow the president to form a new Cabinet that will include the Bolivian Workers Central (COB), a powerful coalition

representing 95 percent of the nation's labor unions.

Participation of COB in the new government was expected to worry U.S. officials because the organization is heavily influenced by the pro-Soviet Bolivian Communist Party.

Saturday is Bolivian Independence Day, and Siles Zuzo will deliver a nationwide speech, in

which he may announce the new makeup of his new Cabinet.

Earlier this week, during a massive nationwide demonstration, COB warned that "fascist narcotics traffickers" were plotting to overthrow Siles Zuzo's civilian government.

Much of the cocaine that reaches the United States originates in Bolivia.

South Korea kills 4 spies

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — South Korean air, land and sea forces killed at least four North Korean infiltrators and sank their boat in a gunbattle Friday near a nuclear power plant on South Korea's east coast.

The Defense Ministry said there no South Korean casualties but one of its maritime police patrol boats sustained some damage by communist gunfire during the one-hour battle.

The bodies of four North Koreans in wet suits were recovered and the government announced a search was underway for possible survivors from the communist country who may have infiltrated into South Korea.

Irish terrorists go to prison

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Judge sentenced 22 Irish terrorists to a total of more than 4,000 years in jail Friday on the evidence of an Irish Republican Army informer in the longest trial in Northern Ireland's history.

A 71-year-old grandmother received a suspended sentence for harboring members of the outlawed IRA.

Security was unprecedented for the sentencing. The judge wore a bullet proof waistcoat in court and was guarded by two armed policemen. More police sat among relatives in the public gallery.

A total of 35 defendants in the nine-month trial were led in one by

one to be sentenced by Judge Basil Kelly on a range of terrorist crimes ranging from murder and attempted murder to aiding the illegal IRA.

The court sentenced 22 to jail while 13 received suspended sentences. Three people were earlier acquitted.

The longest jail term went to Kevin Mulgrew, 27, who was sentenced to 983 years in jail. But since his sentence like all the others will run concurrently his jail term amounts to 20 years.

"You are a ruthless terrorist and I do not expect any words of mine will raise a trace of remorse or prick your conscience," the judge told Mulgrew.

Stocks in small gain

NEW YORK (UPI) — The stock market eked out a small gain at the close of a grim week Friday in trading that indicated that Wall Street was plagued by concerns over high-interest rates.

"The market is exceedingly selective," said Alan Ackerman of Herzfeld & Stern. "The bull market is not over but the excesses in this extraordinary run since last August are being wrung out."

The Dow Jones Industrial average, which plunged 14.73 Thursday to a 3 1/2-month low, managed to tack on to 1.183 3/4. And although the closely watched average lost 15.93 for the week overall, "there was a more resolute defense of the 1,180 level than most technical analysts had expected," Ackerman said.

"There has been considerable concern among observers that the market would go into a steep decline if

the Dow failed to hold at the 1,180 level. It had fallen to 1,169 at midday Thursday before rebounding.

The New York Stock Exchange index added 0.27 to 83.69 and the price of an average share increased 10 cents. Standard & Poor's 500-stock index rose 0.41 to 181.74. Advancers topped declines 187-687 among the 1,521 issues traded.

The Big Board volume of 67,850,000 shares, down from the 100,670,000 traded Thursday, was the slowest since 63,115,000 changed hands July 15.

Many traders sat out the session waiting for the Federal Reserve's report after the market closed that showed the nation's money supply rose \$1.2 billion in the latest statistical week.

Composite volume of NYSE-listed stocks on all U.S. exchanges over the counter totaled 81,061,100 shares.

down from the 119,806,450 traded Thursday.

The American Stock Exchange index added 0.66 to 231.42 and the price of a share rose five cents. Advancers topped declines 389-294 among the 797 issues traded. Composites volume totaled 6,891,765 shares compared with 6,896,250 Thursday.

The National Association of Securities Dealers' index of OTC stocks gained 0.05 to 300.83.

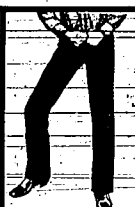
