U.S. Navy engaged in the Mideast

Navy shelling protects Marines; fighting goes on

BEIRUT, Lebanon — The U.S. Navy, protecting embattled Marines onshore, joined Lebanon's escalating civil war for the first time Thursday by shelling Muslim artillery posts in the hills ringing Beirut.

No American casualties were reported in the latest fighting near Beirut airport, where two U.S. Marines were killed earlier in the week.

State-run Beirut radio said late Thursday that unidentified planes flew over western Lebanon, a day after U.S. and French warplanes flew reconnaissance missions and the French defense minister threatened cease bombardments.

A Marine spokesman, Maj. Robert Jordan, said artillery shells crashed in the vicinity of the Marine base at Beirut International Airport Thursday night, but added he knew nothing about the unidentified aircraft overhead.

A Christian leader appealed to President Reagan to use the American fleet to stop Muslim shelling of a mountain village jammed with some 25,000 refugees.

Druze Muslim gunners broke a pledge not to endanger Lebanon's multinational peace-keeping force, firing a salvo of three artillery shells that crashed into the Marine compound only about 100 yards from U.S. officials including Lt. Gen. John Miller.

About an hour later, U.S. Marines answered with six shells from their 155mm howitzers and the USS Bowen, a frigate assigned to protect the Marine force in Lebanon, sent four 5-inch cannon rounds booming into the mountains behind the Marine base at Beirut.

"We hit what we aim at," Marine Maj. Robert Jordan said when asked if the Druze artillery units were silenced.

The shots from the frigate, anchored in the Mediterranean off the Lebanese capital, were the first use of the U.S. fleet's formidable firepower.

In Washington, White House spokesman Larry Speakes confirmed the Navy shelling and said American warships "are there to protect the Marines."

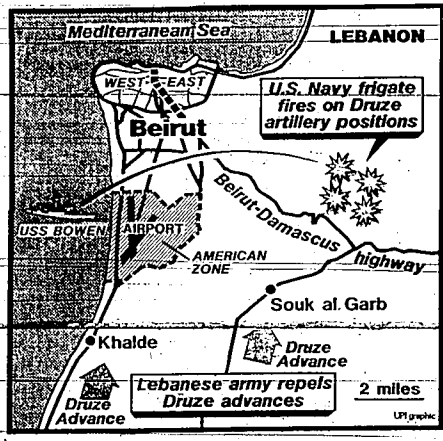
Asked if this constituted an escalation of the hostilities in Lebanon, Speakes said, "That's for you to draw" your own conclusions. He said the local U.S. commander made the decision to return the fire.

Four U.S. Marines have been killed and 25 wounded in 10 days of heavy fighting around Beirut. The French have had the heaviest casualties among the 4,800-man peace-keeping force — 18 dead and 44 wounded in the past year.

In Syrian-controlled Tripoli, 42 miles north of Beirut, a bomb exploded in a car, killing four people and wounding 12.

In Beirut, a spokesman for ABC News said two network employees returned safely to the capital after being reported missing for four days in the South.

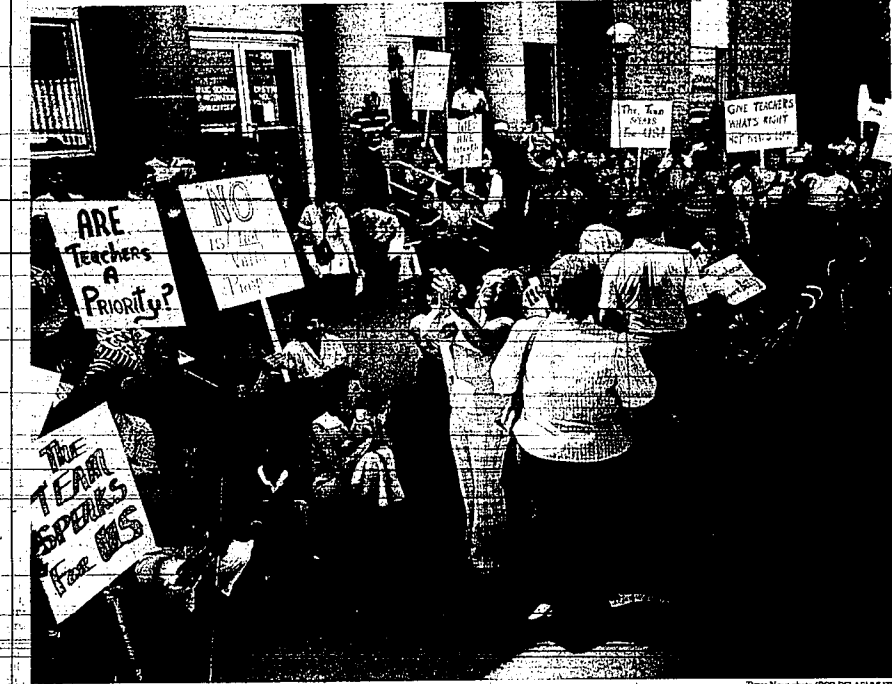
WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan Thursday promised U.S. forces in Lebanon they will be provided with "whatever support it takes to stop the attacks on you."

Reagan made the guarantee in a telephone call from the Oval Office to Cmdr. Tim Garaghty in Beirut after a Navy frigate shelled Druze artillery positions in Lebanon that had fired on the Marine peace-keeping force.

Deputy press secretary Larry Speakes said Reagan told McGaraghty, commander of Task Force 62, in a three-minute telephone conversation, "I am determined to see to it that we provide whatever support it takes to stop the attacks on your position."

Speakes gave no indication whether the president had plans to send more troops to Beirut. He said the Marine force near off the shores of Lebanon, U.S. amphibious units with 2,000 troops aboard already are based in that direction.

Gromyko angers Shultz Air links to Russia suspended in West

NATO allies — except for Greece and France — agreed early Friday to a two-week suspension of air links with the Russian Union in retaliation for the Russian attack on a Korean airliner. President Reagan ordered U.S. offices of the Soviet airline shut down.

The NATO agreement came at the end of the European Security Conference in Madrid, where Secretary of State George Shultz met Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in the first high-level American-Soviet encounter since a Russian jet downed the Korean Air Lines jumbo jet last week.

Shultz dismissed Moscow's account of the attack, saying "the preposterous explanation the Soviets have offered and continue to offer to a disbelieving world has only compounded the problem."

Diplomatic sources said NATO foreign ministers agreed to halt all flights to and from the Soviet Union beginning Sept. 15, the date on which the International Civil Aviation Organization begins a meeting in Montreal to discuss the attack.

The NATO decision, which did not include Greece or France, would be made in Brussels later Friday, the sources said.

The United States had urged its allies to adopt stronger measures in retaliation for the attack on the passenger jet carrying 269 people, including 61 Americans. Canada has imposed a 60-day ban on Soviet flights.

In Nairobi, Kenya, Raghu Raj, chairman of the International Air Transport Association deplored the Soviet attack and said the group viewed the incident with the "utmost gravity."

Hansen: Let 'em ride

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. George Hansen says the United States should respond to the Soviet Union's downing of a Korean Air Lines passenger jet by sending Russian diplomats on an identical flight.

The Idaho Republican voiced his suggestion Thursday at a rally near the Capitol, where protesters called for President Reagan to retaliate forcefully for the incident last week in which 269 people died when a Soviet fighter jet shot down the airliner.

Hansen said he was responding to remarks by Soviet ambassador Andrei Gromyko, who has said the Russians would repeat their actions if another airliner strayed into Soviet airspace.

Japanese authorities the Soviets had found debris of the Boeing 747-400 none of the bodies of the passengers or crew.

Worldwide furor over the attack on the civilian jetliner showed no signs of abating. European airline pilots associations began boycotting flights into and out of the Soviet Union.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said in Washington the Reagan administration was considering limiting or canceling Soviet trade credits but he made it clear that Reagan continues to rule out a new grain embargo or disruption of nuclear arms negotiations.

Contract talks stall; teachers picket

TWIN FALLS — The long-running contract talks between the Twin Falls Education Association and the school board stalled again Thursday.

After the meeting, the teachers said a federal mediator will be asked to intervene to help break the apparent deadlock.

About 150 teachers picketed the downtown school administration building during the afternoon negotiating session in a show of support for the TEFA.

The main issue remains employee health insurance contributions. The TEFA also is disturbed by the continued absence of board members at the negotiating sessions.

The board is asking the teachers to accept reduced insurance benefits, saying it cannot afford to pay the increased cost of the insurance policy, as it now is written. The teachers, however, say the change would amount to a pay cut, and they say the board can afford to pay the entire cost.

Under last year's policy, the board paid the entire cost of health insurance for an employee and his or her family. The employee paid a \$100 deductible and was covered fully on any expense of more than \$1,000.

In a compromise package proposed Thursday by the board, the district would continue to pay

the full premium, but the deductible would be raised to \$150. And any expense of more than \$5,000 would be covered fully.

A second board proposal made Thursday would offer senior teachers, those with more than 20 years experience, a raise. The current salary schedule does not provide an annual seniority raise for teachers with 21 to 25 years of service.

However, the TEFA negotiators rejected the proposals, saying they were worse than those offered at last week's session.

"I call that regressive bargaining," said Terry Gilbert, the Region IV Idaho Education Association director.

Both plans are unacceptable, said Joyce Houston, the president of the TEFA.

The teachers estimate that the district would have to come up with \$39,000 in additional funds to continue fully paid health coverage.

Superintendent Gary Piller says the figure is closer to \$60,000.

What the teachers are asking for possibly could bankrupt the district, Piller says. "If we had the money, we would settle."

Piller says the board has presented the teachers with two viable policies that would provide excellent medical care and would allow the board to pay master teachers more.

The teachers who were on Thursday's low-key picket line — carrying signs with slogans such as "We Are Worth It," "Is Cutting Benefits For

Good Work" and "Keep Good Teachers Teaching" — disagree with Piller.

"It's not a question of money," says Ernie Saniter, a high-school physics teacher. "We aren't asking for anything that will break the bank."

The teachers already have agreed to work under last year's salary schedule. And they argue that any decrease in insurance benefits amounts to a pay cut.

The teachers also say the board is not taking the negotiations seriously. Although the board set the time and place of Thursday's meeting, no members participated in the meeting, Houston said.

And the board's representatives presented the proposals in a take-it-or-leave-it manner, Houston said.

School board Chairman Bob Knighton said later Thursday, however, that Piller has not informed him about the negotiations.

It is up to Piller to determine who is present at negotiations, he said. "I don't know what he's doing."

Piller could not be reached for further comment Thursday night.

The two sides are scheduled to meet again at the end of next week — this time with a federal mediator, according to Connie Hutchison, the chief negotiator for the TEFA.

Earlier this summer, a federal mediator met with the negotiators for both sides once and then left the talks.

Judge: Lack of money causes prison releases

BOISE — An Idaho Court of Appeals judge says inadequate funding has turned the state's correctional institutions into "revolving doors" for criminals.

Don Burnett said Thursday taxpayers must face the "grim reality" that they will have to spend more money to provide space for inmates as judges impose stiffer sentences and prison populations increase.

Calling the state's corrections facilities "woefully inadequate," the judge said taxpayers must support legislative efforts to boost capital expenditures for corrections.

He also said lawmakers should be willing to provide additional money for "intensifying the supervision of

individuals who are on parole, and providing more local facilities for job training and work-release of low-risk inmates."

"Most everyone going into the (prison) system is coming out in two or three years. It has turned into a very expensive revolving door," Burnett said.

"The most immediate difficulty is that by sending more convicted criminals to prison and keeping them there for longer terms, we have overloaded the capacity of the Idaho State Correctional Institution," he said.

On another subject, the judge said "disparities" still exist in sentences handed down by various judges for the same offense. He recommended the Legislature appoint a special commission to study the court See JUDGE on Page A2

Marine action brings faceoff

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A key House chairman said Thursday he will push to cut off funds for the U.S. peace-keeping force in Lebanon unless President Reagan formally seeks congressional approval to keep the troops there.

Rep. Clarence Long, D-Md., chairman of the House Appropriations subcommittee on foreign operations, cited the deaths of five Marines in Lebanon and said American soldiers are "sitting-duck targets in an undeclared war."

notify Congress when he sends U.S. troops into hostile situations. Congress then has 60 to 90 days to vote on whether the troops can remain.

Reagan has contended the troops, dispatched to Lebanon last year to participate in the multinational force, were sent in for peace-keeping duties, not combat.

But Long told a news conference, "The situation today in Lebanon can be described in no other words than one of hostilities."

"Any 9-year-old kid watching television can see our people in combat, but the president of the United States doesn't see this as combat," he said.

"Our Marines are too precious to the American people to let them be wasted as sitting-duck targets in an

undeclared war, a war disguised as a peacekeeping operation where there has never been, from the very beginning, any peace to keep."

Reagan has "chosen" to "observe" a section of the war powers act that only requires him to notify Congress if he sends troops into foreign territories "equipped for combat."

Long said the president should report under another provision covering deployment of troops "into hostilities or into situations where imminent involvement in hostilities is clearly indicated by the circumstances."

That would trigger the timetable in which the troops would have to be withdrawn if Congress does not authorize their continued deployment.

Anti-discrimination change backed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan Thursday endorsed the removal of sexist wording from a variety of federal laws, including the Mann Act, but rejected such major changes as requiring women to register for the draft or allowing them in combat.

He also overruled Attorney General William French Smith, who had recommended immediate changes in certain laws that protect women so

they would conform with strict equality principles.

With fanfare inspired by concern over Reagan's raling with women voters, the White House released the third quarterly report of a Justice Department task force on women's rights and a memo from Smith reviewing "the sincerity of our efforts" to eliminate sex discrimination. It included recommended changes

In the wording of 63 laws not previously identified as gender-biased.

Forty-seven of those changes would be added to a pending bill by Sen. Robert Dole, R-Kan., whose wife, Elizabeth Dole, is one of three women in Reagan's Cabinet.

Sixteen other laws also should be changed, apparently through other legislation, Smith said, leaving the draft and combat status of women untouched.

Former governor to replace Sen. Jackson

SEATTLE (UPI) — Former three-term Republican Gov. Daniel Evans was appointed Thursday to the Senate seat of the late Sen. Jackson, a powerful Democrat who

represented Washington in Congress for 43 years.

Evans, 57, who had said he was not interested in the position, promptly announced he

will seek election Nov. 8 to the remaining five years of Jackson's term. One of the most popular politicians in the state, Evans was sworn in Monday in Washington, D.C.

Judge orders teachers back

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — A federal judge Thursday ordered teachers in St. Louis back to work in a strike that disrupted classes for 56,000 public school students and hundreds of suburban children taking part in a landmark desegregation plan.

Other strikes persisted in Washington state, Michigan, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and New Jersey, cancelling or upsetting classes for 160,940 students.

Don't harden board, teacher negotiations

Raising the visibility of a public employee labor dispute is risky. Advertisements and mass rallies may increase public sympathy but can also turn sentiment the other way.

The latter, we are afraid, is the likely result of the tactics employed the past two days by the Twin Falls Education Association, in its escalating contract dispute with the Twin Falls school board.

We think the tactic will backfire primarily because the teachers are defending a position that time and circumstances have made less viable.

The issue is a relatively simple one. Twin Falls teachers have a very generous medical insurance plan, which is fully paid by the district for the teacher and all dependents, except for a \$100 deductible.

The plan was first negotiated a decade ago, when there were fewer employees and more stable insurance costs. Both conditions have changed. This year alone, the district faces a 27 percent increase in premiums, to \$615,000.

It has budgeted \$528,000 and has offered the teachers two alternative plans, both of which would raise the deductible from \$100 to \$150.

Similar plans are in effect in many Idaho school districts and in much of private industry, but the teachers, both union and non-union, believe that any change in their coverage is a reduction in benefits.

They claim such an action is unfair since, they say, they have not had a pay raise this year. They dismiss as an "increment" the \$375-per-teacher raise they got in a "step-scale" change, saying it doesn't count because it is not a change in the "base."

But in our opinion, the \$375 is, indeed, a raise as most people would define it. It may not be as much as they would like, but it is still a raise.

We think the administration has also bungled this situation. Its original data on the insurance was incorrect; the gap between the union and the board is only an estimated \$40,000, not some \$150,000, which was estimated last spring.

That seems close enough to us for a settlement. But the board's negotiating team has insisted that the teachers accept some change in the medical coverage.

Second, the board has not been active in negotiations as we think it could be. At a critical session Thursday, board members were not present. Perhaps rightly, the teachers interpret the absence as an affront.

The tragedy here is that both sides need each other, and the community needs them both working together for the good of the district's children. A bond proposal for a new elementary school may be on the ballot this fall; we think the board needs teacher support to help it pass.

At the same time, the union needs the board. The TFEA's membership was just over 60 percent last year, assisted by the board's willingness to allow dues deductions in payroll checks. There is some feeling that the union would fall to win a certification vote if the dues deduction plan were dropped.

None of these are insurmountable problems. In our opinion, the teachers may need to accept some modest changes in their medical insurance coverage to correspond more directly to existing insurance patterns and industry practices.

The board, in its turn, should take a more direct role in the negotiations and soften its all-or-nothing stance. Both sides, in short, need to give each other graceful exit room from this developing dilemma.

Earlier this summer, the teachers called in a federal mediator, who left after one session. We think he should be called back to assist in finding a solution before positions harden further.

Island provides different view of news

BOSTON—My vacation, like a mood, passed. For weeks, I lived, at a distance from my everyday life, on an island. Islands are, I am told, prime locations for vacations. Surely ours was.

We were removed from mainland and mainstream. The world tapered in and out of our cove with no more urgency or emergency than the tide.

Even the newspapers arrived at my mailbox late. With their vintage datelines, we didn't read them dutifully, but randomly, idly. By the time they arrived, the stories had already fallen into the space between news and history.

I just sense, those weeks, of what it must have been like in the days before instant communication, when people received "news" across oceans. They learned about opening volleys in battles that were already won or lost. They were a chapter behind, hearing about things after they had happened. By contrast, we are usually up-to-date people, with news on the hour every hour.

I for one am by nature and profession a news junkie: For most of the year, I stay hooked to a 24-hour cycle, following names and faces from the front to the back pages and into obscurity.

Yet I didn't find my news unsettling. I wondered instead whether the daily airmail was mellowed among our ancestors by the time it took news to travel. I wondered how much of their perspective was formed by that distance.

I know the news that entered our cottage had been altered as it aged. The things that seemed important, no, important, changed. It was as if I

had dropped out of a soap opera audience, and lost track and interest in the cast of characters, the governments, the wars, the trends and bills.

In those weeks, the story that stuck with me most in one of my old papers, was not about worldly events but about the distant event of another world. In the vastness of space, scientists are observing a new solar system being born.

I might have ignored this astronomical discovery in my own pressing workday life, in the confusion of breaking news. But here it stuck with me. I thought about it walking on country roads and lying in the hammock. I had the space to wonder about something cosmic, a vast time frame.

The only other bulletin that made the front page of my vacation mind every day was the weather. The state of the skies, like the condition of my tennis backhand, and the status of the clam flats seemed to make a legitimate claim for attention.

By contrast, the related stories of munchkins, the tales of national politics, the war bulletins rattled around in some space I had already emptied. The transience of daily events became more apparent at days' length across the bay. All times I even heard bizarre echoes of the old Tom Lehrer song:

"They're riding in Africa, tra, la, la."

Because the papers that came to our cottage no longer news and not yet history, I asked different questions of them. Would Aquino's death be an isolated murder or the beginning of the end for Marcos? Would Barbara Honessger be seen as a minor poem of Arc or a crazy lady who heard voices? Would it all be important?

I wonder if our ancestors, less bombarded by daily bulletins, removed by time and space, were more able to weigh importance. Were they also more able to live in the near and far ground of their lives? While we live in daily cycles, were they more focused on both the minutes and the seasons, minutes and fundamentals, weather and solar systems?

I know only that my return here was as abrupt and startling as the crash of a Korean airliner. Immediately I am back to news that comes in bulletins, up-to-the-minute events. Again, I stay tuned.

Perhaps there is no leisure in our world of instant communications. While our ancestors carried the letters on frigates from one capital to another, the leaders of nations are now pressured to respond as quickly as questions and answers can be formed, telephone lines joined, computers alerted.

I suppose that it is inevitable. Communication has kept pace with potential catastrophe. Distance, disengagement is now a luxury for islands and vacations.

Mine is over. Still, somewhere in the cosmos, a solar system is being born.

This stop sign unsafe at any speed

WASHINGTON—Not-Safe, a California organization whose stated goal is to "protect everyone from everything at any cost," has expanded its field of anxieties to include subliminal messages.

According to Dale Lowdermilk, the head of Not-Safe, the organization supports legislation to require that the public be warned when subliminal messages are used in communications media, such as on bumper stickers.

Subliminal, as all of us Nervous Nellies know, occurs below the level of conscious perception. When a message produces a psychological change so slight as not to effect the consciousness, it is said to be subliminal.

Some years ago, there was concern that television advertisers would flash subliminal commercials on the tiny screen. I haven't heard any of that kind of talk lately, which probably is just as well.

My guess is that advertisers continued to buy consciously advertised products, even when they subliminally preferred Brand X.

One of the focal points of Lowdermilk's new crusade are the "STOP" signs seen at traffic intersections and at numerous other locations along our busy thoroughfares.

Because "STOP" spelled backwards is "POTS," Lowdermilk argues that these signs subliminally promote drug abuse. And he may be right. Certainly something is responsible for increased marijuana consumption.

It could be, as Lowdermilk suggests, that the highway department is unwittingly promoting subliminal messages through "hypnotic programming."

But I'm not sure what the replacement for "STOP" should be.

"YIELD" obviously won't do.

Although "YIELD" spelled backwards is pure gibberish, the word is verifiably crawling with subliminal messages.

Would you want your children borrowing your car for dates if you knew they were going to be incessantly confronted by signs urging them to "YIELD?" I sure wouldn't.

I'd rather take a chance on them reading "STOP" backwards.

Lowdermilk says "subliminal 'abstractions' contain many diabolical, ambiguous, subversive and X-rated communications that must be strictly regulated." Perhaps they should. I'm wondering, however, whether sublimination couldn't also be a force for good.

Specifically, it occurred to me that subliminal messages on street signs might abate the current national campaign against drunk driving.

Suppose, for example, an intoxicated motorist weaving his way down the street came to a sign that said "MURDER." Consciously, the sign makes no sense. But would it not give a pause to a tipsy driver?

Would not the blottertongue behind the wheel try to clear away his alcoholic haze long enough to figure out what the sign meant, perhaps even backing up to make sure he had read it right?

I think so. I'm convinced that such startling subliminal signs would be a sobering experience.

Meanwhile, the word "DRUNK" would be implanted in the driver's brain, making him subliminally aware that he had consciously downed a few too many.

Bottle finally wins after years of 'stumping'

FILER — Sometimes, even the judges in the Twin Falls County Fair antique department are stumped. A glass "pluch bottle," so named because of its indentations on all four sides for easy holding, finally became a winner this year because "this is the first year a judge knew what it was." Marlon Langdon of Twin Falls, the department's superintendent, says the bottle, like many other items, had been entered for several years. But she says there is always something different each year for persons interested in antiques and collectibles. The antique display is the best "anywhere around," she says. In fact, the Twin Falls County Fair is the only one except Gooding to even have such a department. Something new, literally, this year is a small

callopio, built last winter by Dick Diamond of Twin Falls, who entered it for display only. Informal history can be absorbed in easy gulps in the attractively paneled building that holds the display — from the birch-bark baskets entered by a descendant of the Shuswap Indians in an old geography book; from the implements and household equipment of yesterday; to the expected valuable, as well as beautiful, entries of Chiriquian and silver. Glassware entries are down this year, Langdon says, but there are more saddles than ever before. A mounted display of doorknobs, some of which were found in Nevada, show changing styles. And branding irons from two well-known large ranches, the Winthrop in Nevada and the Shoe Sole, which once covered much of southern Idaho, provide area history, while a skillet used in a California gold mine broadens the scope.

A handmade washboard and a knife sharpener with a hole for graphite and a hidden crank give youthful fair-goers glimpses of "olden days." A special local touch is a 1907 calendar from the Nibley-Channel Lumber Co., a pioneer Twin Falls firm, and a photograph of the first graduating class at the old Albion Normal School in 1904, of which Anna Hayes, now in a Twin Falls nursing home, was a member. Among the blue-ribbon-winners is a baby dress once worn by Gertrude Pomeroy Loucks, who lives in the Heritage Retirement Center, along with a picture showing her wearing the hand-embroidered white dress. And among the vintage books is a faded front page from a Boston newspaper, the "Weekly Messenger" of June 11, 1913. It cost only \$2.50 per year, but the amount was payable in advance.

After heading the state H&W committee Senator retiring into Rotary leadership

BUHL — State Sen. John Barker, R-Buhl, has decided to serve out the second year of his ninth term in the Legislature and then return to public office. The Buhl real-estate agent, who ranks second in seniority among members of the Senate, says he's decided to call it quits with a position as district governor of Rotary International. "I've been tempted with this job before." After 17 years in the Legislature, "I've gotten worn down." The Rotary position "is an honor and a good way to wind up a career." His new position, overseeing the operation of 30 Rotary clubs in southern Idaho and eastern Oregon, would be incompatible with serving in the Legislature because it will involve visiting the clubs at least once and probably twice a year, he says. Trying to hold down both positions would not be fair to voters or to the Rotary chapters, he says. Barker, a Rotarian since 1938, calls it "a easy decision."

But while Barker succeeds his decision was easy, he says his would-be successors will have a more difficult time. Under existing legislative districts candidates from western Twin Falls County stand a good chance of being elected, he says. But under a redistricting plan recently approved by a northern Idaho district judge, candidates from that area will be less likely to win those seats, he predicts. "You've got to remember, if you're going to run, you're going to have to campaign all over the county," Barker says. He says that although his area, District 24, currently includes only western Twin Falls County, he has tried to represent the interests of the entire county. The controversy over redistricting is casting a cloud of uncertainty over the election process. With just more than five months remaining in the six-week filing period for candidates begins, persons interested in seeking office do not really know what legislative seats will be up for grabs or how the contests will be decided. The plan approved by Idaho First District Judge Dar Cogswell would make Twin Falls County a single legislative district, with two senators and

four representatives. The county also would be represented by one senator and two representatives from a "districtal district" composed of the eight Magic Valley Counties. Under the existing districts, the county is split into two districts, with one senator and two representatives each. Beysara, the chief deputy secretary of state, says the Idaho Supreme Court could decide before the Feb. 7 filing date for candidates whether it will uphold Cogswell's redistricting plan. But he says that is unlikely, and he says the high court will have to decide whether to leave Cogswell's districts in effect while the appeal is being decided. Yauman says he hopes that decision will be made this year. "It would be very confusing if it's dragged on into January." Potential candidates for Barker's post do not include Rep. Lawrence Knigge, R-Filer, or Not Brackett, R-Twin Falls. These two men, who with Barker comprise the District 24 delegation, say they plan to seek re-election to their current positions. • See BARKER on Page A6

Riot police battle students' protest

SANTIAGO, Chile (UPI) — Hundreds of riot police firing tear gas and water cannons clashed with student protesters in the downtown Santiago in the fifth nationwide protest against 10 years of military rule by President Augusto Pinochet.

At least 2,000 protesters gathered in the Plaza Italia chanting "assassins, assassins" as buses loaded with some

600 riot police and armored trucks mounted with water cannon moved in to disperse the demonstrators.

Students, including one using a slingshot, alligned, flung sharp-edged stones at police.

Police responded by firing tear gas and turning jets of water from tank trucks on the crowd. At least one opposition leader was pushed to the

ground and beaten by police before the demonstrators scattered.

The violent protests followed a night of raids by secret police in which five people were shot to death.

A spokesman for the National Intelligence Agency said secret police Wednesday tracked four suspected assassins of the Santiago governor to a house in the east side of Santiago

Rebel planes attack capital airport

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — Two rebel planes attacked Managua's airport and a communications center Thursday in a coordinated dawn attack. One plane was shot down and crashed in flames into the main terminal, killing both men aboard, officials said.

Three air force personnel at the airport were injured in the dawn attack, officials said.

The second plane attacked the Santa Marta telecommunications center, and escaped without causing

major damage, officials said. Earlier reports had said the plane also attacked the foreign minister's house in southern Managua.

After attacking the airport, the plane was shot down by anti-aircraft fire and crashed in flames.

Chinese, Soviets negotiate

PEKING (UPI) — Deputy Foreign Minister Mikhail Kapitsa, the highest-ranking Soviet official invited to China in more than 20 years, arrived Thursday for wide-ranging talks that will include normalization of Sino-Soviet relations.

Though Kapitsa tried to play down the importance of his visit, Chinese and Western officials estimate he and his host, Vice Foreign Minister Qian Qichen, will try to lay the groundwork for

negotiations on repairing the 20-year split between Moscow and Peking.

The October consultations will be the third round of normalization talks between the two communist nations but Chinese officials say they do not expect a sudden breakthrough.

Peking insists the Kremlin address three demands before relations can improve substantially.

(They include the reduction of Soviet troops along the Chinese frontier, an end to Soviet support of Vietnam's occupation of Cambodia and a Soviet withdrawal from Afghanistan.)

Moscow has issued frequent calls for improved relations with its communist rival but says the three demands involve third countries and should not be included in the consultations.

"If the Soviet Union could lift just one of the obstacles, relations could improve greatly but we don't expect the three obstacles to be removed soon," a foreign ministry source said.

WEINBERGER TOURS GAMES

PUERTO CASTILLA, Honduras (UPI) — Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger visited the site of war games involving thousands of American and Honduran soldiers Thursday and called for a "joint front" to fight communism in Central America.

Weinberger's call came in a meeting with Honduran President Roberto Suazo Cordova on the third and last day of his Central American tour that included stops in Honduras, El Salvador and Panama.

Aboard his plane back to Washington Thursday night, Weinberger said the leaders of these three countries "agreed that they urgently need more economic and military assistance. Their economies are in very difficult conditions."

He reiterated it is "extremely important" to encourage investment in the three countries but emphasized "we must get people to make investments in unstable military situations."

The secretary of defense also toured an American Green Beret base on the Caribbean coast where Honduran forces are training to counter leftist guerrillas fighting a more than three year war in El Salvador.

Weinberger met Suazo Cordova in Tegucigalpa and in a news conference said they spoke about "the need to make a joint front against the communist bloc."

"There is no plan right now" to blockade Nicaragua, Weinberger said in reply to a question. "What we have planned is what we are doing," he said, referring to massive joint maneuvers between U.S. and Honduran soldiers.

IRISH OUTLAW ABORTIONS

DUBLIN, Ireland (UPI) — Voters in Roman Catholic Ireland voted overwhelmingly to make abortion unconstitutional as well as illegal, final returns from a nationwide referendum showed Thursday.

A constitutional amendment against abortion was approved by 841,233 to 416,136, according to a computation made by political parties and newspapers.

The government did not immediately announce its official figures, but the political party and media count was considered final.

All five precincts voting against were in Dublin.

VIENNA, Austria (UPI) — A Czechoslovak bicycle racer, his wife and two children, defied communist border guards and escaped over the frontier into Austria aboard a homemade hot air balloon, officials said Thursday.

Police said Czech border guards fired flares as the balloon, powered by a bottled gas heater and made of rainbow-hued, rubberized cloth, floated over them through midnight darkness at a height of 6,000 feet.

Austrian radio quoted the refugees as saying their 50-minute flight went off "completely without a hitch."

It was believed to be the first such escape from Eastern Europe in a homemade balloon in four years.

The refugees were identified as Robert Hutyrka, 38, a former member of the Czechoslovak cycle racing team, his wife Jana, 36, daughter Jana, 14, and son Richard, 11. The family lived in a town near Bratislava just across the Danube River from Austria.

Austrian radio said Hutyrka was a construction engineer who cycled in his spare time and flew hot air balloons as a hobby.

An Interior Ministry spokesman said Hutyrka applied for political asylum as soon as they landed near the northeastern town of Falkenstein.

Family flies off in balloon escaping communist nation

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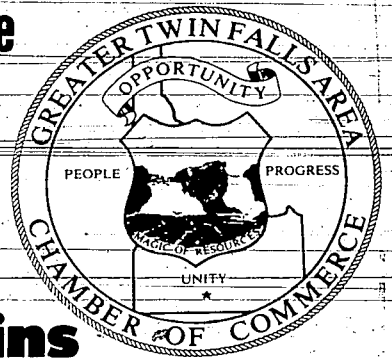

Manny Shaw: The fiddling Santa of Idaho

FAIRFIELD — It's not hard to find the Manny Shaw residence in Fairfield. It has a fiddle over the door. Fiddle music has been a basic part of Shaw's life from the time he was very young and lulled to sleep by his father's playing.

"It's a tradition," I used to sit on the floor with the violin in front of me and play the bow across the strings," he reminisces.

The 76-year-old Shaw is known as "Mr. Idaho Fiddler." "Mr. Fiddler" USA and is the organizer and past president of the Old-Time Fiddlers' Association of Idaho.

He participates in and judges the national fiddler competition held annually at Weiser and is the sponsor of the Old-Time Fiddlers' Jamboree held each July in Shoshone.

He is also a popular performer and appears at conventions, concerts and jamborees around the region. He appeared at the Twin Falls Renaissance Academy of Arts this summer and occasionally plays for funerals and religious services.

A special activity for Fairfield folks are the jam sessions held most every Sunday evening at the Shaw home when "Manny is in town."

Shaw is the proud owner of more than 40 violins, a mandolin, banjos, guitars, a viola and a cello. The instruments, as well as descriptions and history of each piece, are on display in Manny's Music Museum and workshop at his home.

Born in Torrington, Wyo., in September of 1907, Shaw moved with his family to Washington and then came to Idaho by covered wagon in 1918.

He still has the old, iron-ringed wooden wagon wheels from the wagon that brought him to the Camas Prairie as an 11-year-old boy.

The family homesteaded at Corral, as did Shaw and his wife, the former Lucille Barron. They are the parents of two daughters, and have six grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

"Each gets a fiddle," Shaw says. "Shaw's grandson operates the ranch near Corral, and Shaw can often be found there swathing hay, feeding livestock and doing other ranch chores."

His public fiddling career began at age 13 when he started playing for community dances on the prairie.

"I could get a few dollars rodeoing and then pick up \$2.50 a night for fiddling. On a good weekend I'd get \$5," he says with a winning smile. "I learned by watching and I just never could leave it alone." He further explained that he does not read music.

Shaw has been promoting "old-time fiddle music" since 1950, fearing part of Idaho's folk traditions were being lost.

In 1960, Gov. Robert E. Smylie appointed Shaw chairman of a committee to promote fiddle music as part of Idaho's Territorial Centennial celebration in 1963. The Old-Time Fiddlers' Association, chartered in 1963, is a result of Shaw's efforts. He prepared the guidelines for the organization and served as its president for four years. The same guidelines have been used

by fiddling groups in Montana, South Dakota and Minnesota.

During the 1963 centennial year, Shaw appeared around the state wearing an Indian costume with beaded jacket, a full war bonnet and, of course, carrying a fiddle.

"Everyone was growing beards to celebrate. I wanted to do something else," he explains. "I have Indian blood, so the costume was a symbol of my heritage as well as Idaho's."

Also in 1963, Shaw began his jamboree. The first one was held at his Corral ranch and attracted numerous musicians and spectators.

It is not a contest, but as he explains, "a celebration of music." The annual festival includes amateur and professional musicians playing all types of stringed instruments.

The jamboree was moved to the Mary L. Gooding Park in Shoshone in 1964 because Shaw didn't have room at his ranch to host the thousands of visitors who yearly attend the event. The Shoshone Chamber of Commerce now sponsors the jamboree the second Sunday in July.

Shaw began collecting violins at an early age, taking after his father who traded a key-wind watch for a fiddle when he was 17.

The fiddle had a tail-piece carved from a cow's horn, which embarrassed him. So when he could afford it, his father purchased a new tail-piece and threw the cow horn one away.

Young Manny saved the tail-piece from the scrap heap and now proudly displays his father's fiddle, complete with the original cow horn piece.

Each of Shaw's 40 plus instruments have a story behind them, which the fiddler loves to tell.

Favorites include the time during the 1930s depression when he traded five calves and broke a neighbor's broom to get a fiddle made by Charlie Kinney, a local harness maker.

Kinney came to Old Soldier, near Fairfield, in 1908 and Shaw admired him.

"The fiddle is made from the broken axle of a threshing machine. It's straight grain maple," Shaw points out.

Kinney's granddaughter Meryle Kinney Korhmer painted a portrait of Shaw and the fiddle. The picture, which was named "Best of Shaw" at a Boise fair in 1960, is on display at Shaw's museum.

Another of Shaw's fiddles is made from a Soldier Mountain spruce that was first made into a desk for the Old Soldier school.

He has a viola made by Dolly Daniels of Jerome and a violin made by her husband Sam. Both are well-known instrument makers.

"We've been friends for 30 years," Shaw says.

He is also proud of the violin he made himself under the expert tutelage of Sam Daniels.

"Sam was right there, looking over my shoulder all the time." He explains that he and Daniels made excursions into the forest near Soldier Mountain to select wood for instruments. "It's an instinct you develop," he says with a knowing nod. "I had a couple of Tamarack (a type of evergreen) fence posts that looked real nice, and I took them to Sam," he added.

Franklin mangle and that's my mangle fiddles are part of Shaw's collection, as is one made by the late Antone Bragg, a well-known violin maker from Gooding. He says his most unusual fiddle is the tin one found in a mine shaft in northern Nevada. "Some guy was hungry for fiddle

music," he muses. "I wish I knew more about it. You can see it has perfect shape. The back of the fingerboard is made out of an old trying pan handle." Shaw appeared on the cover of a Russian Magazine "America Illustrated," when the publication covered the first national fiddling contest

held in Weiser in 1963. In the photograph, he is playing a fiddle with circle and scroll wood inlays made by Bob Wallace of Arizona. Wallace had loaned him the violin for the competition. "Strange music pours forth from this old man's fiddle" is a loose translation of the Russian caption,

Shaw says. In 1970, 15 years after the picture was taken, Shaw was able to purchase the fiddle from Wallace's estate. He owns other "inland" fiddles including one with gold flecks and a mother-of-pearl tail-piece that was brought to Idaho from Texas in 1900. See SHAW on Page B3

Readers decide who killed the Robins

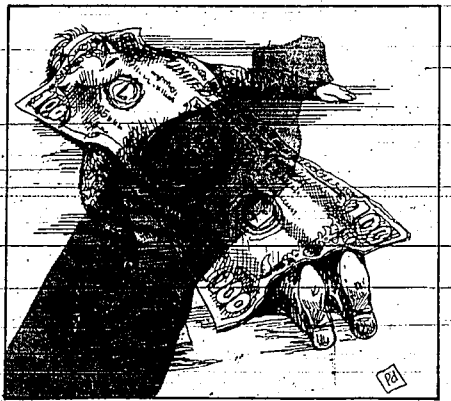

In what may be the most interesting publishing gimmick since Clifford Irving wrote the real truth about some big lies, the New York publisher William Morrow & Co. has promised \$10,000 to any reader who figures out "Who Killed the Robins Family?" by Thomas Chastain (Morrow, \$9.95).

The Robins are filthy rich cosmetics magnates. All eight of them die very unaccountable deaths. The reader's challenge is to solve the eight murders, detailing whodunit, why, where, when, how, and submit the solution by next April 15. Contest rules are inside the book.

"Who Killed the Robins Family?" is a marketing device, not a mystery. The characters are as lively as a telephone listing; the plot is a thinly veiled combination of "Dallas," "Dynasty" and Agatha Christie's "And Then There Were None," and the chapters split out bloody murders like so much tobacco juice.

Best of all, the one for profit publishing is a cutthroat business. Loren D. Estleman's fourth novel about Detroit gunshop Amos Walker, "The Glass Highway" (Houghton Mifflin, \$13.95), is a bleak view of lives chewed up by circumstance and bad choice, set against the neon ugliness



of the seediest parts of Detroit. This time out, Walker is hired by a department-store dummy of a TV anchor, Stan Broderick. Broderick wants Walker to find his 20-year-old son, Bud. The anchor says he lost his

son once in the divorce settlement and now fears he's losing him a second time to drugs. Walker finds Bud with no trouble, then trouble starts as Walker is plunged into the underworld where drugs and crime

mix and come up murder. Estleman knows how to draw readers into his waking-nightmare novel. The only problem is Estleman's overuse of the tough-talking detective device. Walker talks so knee-jerk-tough he's beginning to sound like a Dead End Kid.

The best hard-boiled mystery is coming out of Britain these days, especially Scotland. Witness "Fair Friday," by Peter Turnbull (St. Martin's, \$10.95), a walk on the dark side of Glasgow where cops, journalists and criminals are all equally hard-bitten.

The cops of "P" Division investigate the alley murder of Bill McGarrigle, a reporter for the Glasgow Clarion. McGarrigle needed a big story to salvage his career. He found it and was promptly killed. Glasgow police uncover a welter of corrupt, lethal motives. It's unsparring suspense.

Don't be deceived by the "Rebecca of Sunnybrook Farm" atmosphere and quiet start of Kenneth O'Hara's "Nightmares' Nest" (Doubleday, \$11.95), a murder-mystery set at a British riding school. This is one of the spookiest mysteries around, one that should make readers suspicious of surfaces.

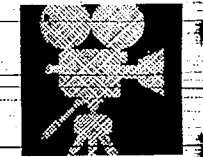

NEW YORK (UPI) — NBC rode to the top of the prime-time television ratings last week with "The Godfather Part II," the Mafia movie marathon did even better the third time around than it did its second-time-around three years ago.

 covered wagon.
 A sentimental favorite is the instrument given him by a fiddler's widow.
 The plain, unadorned fiddle was made in Virginia and handed down through the family of Charles Harris who brought it to Idaho in 1901.
 Harris, of Caldwell, had no family to leave it to, but had heard Shaw play and wanted to give it to him.
 When Harris died, his widow presented the violin, complete with antique case, to Shaw who lovingly

displays it at the museum.
 Shaw suffered a stroke in 1976 and his doctors told him he would never play the fiddle again. But he's back fiddling as good as ever, as well as writing songs and poetry.
 He is also known around the region as Santa Claus.
 "I've been Santa since 1927. Now I'm holding the grandchildren of the first kids I held on my knee," he says with obvious pleasure.

His driver's license features a picture of Shaw in his Santa suit and indicates that "Santa" was born in the year '00.
 Fairfield Fiddlin' Santa and his music museum are doing much to preserve, enrich and continue Idaho's folk traditions, a fact that has not gone unnoticed. In 1981, Shaw received the Idaho Governor's Award, a silver medallion, "in recognition of his support of the arts."

Billboard art in prime spot

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — The smoking lamp is definitely out in movies and TV unless the characters are being pot.

But think about it. How long has it been since you've seen a star on small screen or large sucking in lungful of tobacco smoke?

Probably not since medical research proved more or less conclusively some years back that coffin nails, as they were called in the '30s, provoke cancer and heart disease.

Until then, cigarettes were wonderful props for actors and actresses. They gave performers something to do with their hands while reciting dialogue. Cigarettes also connoted wickedness, daring and elegance, depending on who was smoking.

Many stars developed their own styles. Remember Bette Davis nervously punctuating her rat-a-tat dialogue with a cigarette clutched in her grating hand.

Or how about the distinctive manner in which John Wayne tossed away his cigarette butt, a contemptuous back-hand flip across his body,

just before he waded into the heavy?

Then there was Humphrey Bogart with the ever-present butt dangling from the corner of his mouth, smoke drifting past his squinting eyes. John Garfield rarely played a role without nervously puffing cigarettes. Gary Cooper and other screen cowboys always had something to do with their hands with "the makin'" — cigarette paper and the little cloth sack of Bull Durham dangling by a string from their mouths.

Who will ever forget Paul Henreid lighting two cigarettes on a single match in a love scene from "Now

Voyager" with Bette Davis, before handing her one. For years would-be Romeo did the same with prospective Julietes.

Deborah William Powell's cigarette smoking bespoke sophistication as did the long cigarette holders fancied by many a leading lady, not least among them Marlene Dietrich.

Nor was there a more handy means of demonstrating an insult on screen than having one actor blow smoke in the face of another. Usually, the villain's trick just before the hero punched his lights out.

Perkins takes initial steps in Bryant's shoes

Everyone knows Ray Perkins' situation goes into Saturday's Alabama-Georgia Tech game. Perkins will make his debut as Bear Bryant's successor under immeasurable pressure. But the game at Birmingham figures to be no picnic for Georgia Tech Coach Bill Curry...

Itself and not with the hoopla surrounding it. "When you play against a team like Alabama with a Bear Bryant coaching it, you first have to beat the mystique before you get down to the basics of execution. But Ray's a guy who will handle this thing without any apparent difficulty. If he has a problem, he'll be the only one who knows it." The Crimson Tide are 18-point favorites, and Georgia Tech hasn't been helped by the loss of six starters to injury. Still, Perkins isn't taking anything for granted. "Bill Curry is not one to blow smoke up people's noses," said Perkins. "He says Georgia Tech will be a much improved football team and the worse thing for us to do would be to underestimate them like we did two years ago."

Bryant retired last December as the winning college football coach in history with 222 victories and died a month later, after hand-picking Perkins, who left the New York Giants to succeed his former coach. Perkins has made a number of changes at Alabama, including scrapping the wishbone for a passing offense which should better utilize the talents of quarterback Walter Lewis and fleet receivers Jesse Bendross and Joey Jones. In games involving top 10 teams Saturday, No. 1 Nebraska tackles Wyoming, No. 3 Auburn takes on Southern Mississippi, No. 4 Oklahoma visits Stanford, No. 5 Michigan hosts Washington State, No. 6 Ohio State hosts Oregon, No. 8 North Carolina hosts Memphis State, No. 9 Notre Dame hosts Purdue and No. 10 Louisiana State hosts No. 13 Florida State.

At West Lafayette, Ind., Purdue Coach Leon Burtnett knows averaging last year's 28-14 loss to the cross-state rival Irish won't be easy. "The fact that they are rated in the top 10 of all the pre-season polls and even No. 1 in a couple is an indication of the great talent they have," Burtnett said. "Blair Kiel is an excellent quarterback with lots of experience and leadership qualities." Purdue's quarterback, Scott Campbell, has enjoyed more success against ND in his career than anyone in history. He has completed 53 of 89 for 702 yards and will be starting his fourth straight game against North Dakota. In other Top 20 games, No. 11 Pittsburgh hosts Temple, No. 12 Florida visits Southern Cal, No. 15 West Virginia hosts Pacific, No. 17 Southern Methodist visits Grambling, No. 17

Iowa is at Iowa State, No. 18 Arizona State visits Fresno State, UCLA, No. 19 Penn State hosts Cincinnati and No. 20 Maryland visits Vanderbilt. At University Park, Pa., Penn State looks to rebound from an embarrassing 44-6 season-opening loss to Nebraska. Nittany Lions Coach Joe Paterno claims the thumping will have no effect on the defending national champion Penn State. "We're in good health, our spirits are good and I think we're ready to play a good, determined football game," Paterno said. Paterno doesn't plan wholesale changes, but Dan Loneragan will start at quarterback over Doug Strong, and sophomore Todd Moulas has been moved from defensive tackle to starting offensive guard.

San Francisco mauls Vikings

MINNEAPOLIS (UPI) — Joe Montana passed for more than 200 yards and fired four touchdown passes and Eric Wright grabbed three interceptions, scoring on a 60-yard return, to power the San Francisco 49ers to a 43-17 rout of the Minnesota Vikings Thursday night. Montana, the NFC's leading passer one year ago, drilled touchdown throws of 21, 14, and 6 to four different receivers. He completed 17 of 24 passes for 230 yards. Wendell Tyler rushed for 107 yards on 19 carries and caught one of Montana's TD passes. The 49ers' nickel defense harassed Vikings quarterback Tommy Kramer, intercepting him three times. Kramer made 25 of 41 passes for 274 yards and threw a 30-yard touchdown pass to Terry Lee Cook in the third quarter. The 49ers held a 13-7 lead after the opening period but put the game away early in the second quarter. Safety Dwight Hicks recovered a fumble by Kramer on a handoff to Darin Nelson at the Minnesota 21. Montana capped the drive with a 1-yard TD pass to tight end Earl Cooper. Just 23 seconds later, cornerback Wright intercepted Kramer on the first play of the Vikings' possession. He pumped 69 yards for the score to open a 27-7 lead. Both teams' records are now 1-1. Dana McLemore returned the opening kickoff 39 yards to the 49ers' 37. After missing a pass intended for Roger Craig, he connected with Tyler on a 9-yard throw and Freddie Solomon on a 14-yard play to put the 49ers on the Minnesota 21. On a 3rd-and-3, Montana mistimed on a pass in the end zone to Craig which Vikings safety John Turner nearly intercepted. San Francisco settled for a 38-yard field goal by Fry Wersching to open a 3-0 lead early in the first quarter. "The Vikings failed to make a first down on their next possession and the 49ers didn't waste any time on their drive. Three runs by Tyler and a 25-yard throw from Montana to Renaldo Nehemiah put the 49ers on the Minnesota 40. Montana then connected with

Dwight Clark for a 21-yard touchdown despite a heavy pass rush, opening a 10-0 lead with 9:35 left in the first quarter. Fred Brown and Kramer combined to get the Vikings' offense in gear late in the first quarter. Kramer completed six of seven passes in an 80-yard drive, including a critical 15-yard throw to Brown on 3rd-and-3 at the Minnesota 40. Brown capped the drive with a 1-yard run into the end zone behind a block by Ricky Young to pull Minnesota within 10-7 with 2:16 left in the period. Two big plays moved the 49ers on their next possession. Montana connected with Clark on an 18-yard throw and Tyler broke free for a 39-yard run to reach the Minnesota 18. However, Montana's next two pass attempts fell incomplete, forcing Wersching to end the drive with a 32-yard field goal, giving San Francisco a 13-7 lead after the first quarter. The 49ers' nickel defense stopped Kramer again in the second quarter. Cornerback Ronnie Loft intercepted Kramer and returned the ball 22 yards to the Minnesota 14, and three plays later Montana connected with Solomon for a 14-yard touchdown with 10:52 left in the second period, giving the 49ers a 34-7 advantage.

Second-session scores fail to equal first night at rodeo

FILER — Cotton Rosser didn't compete during Wednesday's performance of the Twin Falls County Rodeo. But when the last bull rider hit the dirt, he was probably the happiest man in the arena. Rosser, the main cowp in the Flying U Rodeo Co., the stock contractor for the Filer rodeo, watched as most of his rodeo animals played havoc with the cowboys' efforts. In other cowboy or cowgirl bettered top times or scores from Wednesday night's opening round. There were only two events where at least four participants had successful runs — saddle bronc and barrel racing. In barrel racing, only three cowboys were able to complete the eight-second trip. Rookie Stephen Smith, 1983's intercollegiate bareback champion, topped the trio with a 7.1. Rye Brewer had a 69 while Tim Rydahl came up with a 65. During Wednesday night's rodeo, the fourth place score was a 69. Ron Parrish, who had an 83 Wednesday, remains aloft the leader board with two nights remaining. Steve Myatt had a relatively fast 8.8 to lead all steer wrestlers. That was far from bettering Wednesday night's 4.0 time by Marty Melvin. Twin Falls cowboy Bob Monroe had a 9.0 while Randon Munns turned in an 18.9. Saddle bronc riding was by far

the favorite for the near-capacity crowd as three cowboys eclipsed the 70-point plateau. Dixon Hamilton, the world's ninth ranked saddle bronc rider, had a 78 to lead all riders. However, Filer's Shawn Davis still leads the event overall with a 79. S.L. McClelland had a 71 while Randy Hoffman collected a 70. The world's No. 6 saddle bronc rider, Butch Knowles, had a 66. Saddle bronc is the only event where a finals round will be held. Saturday night the top 10 cowboys will compete for the top money. Based on scores from the first two nights, it will take at least a 70 for a cowboy to reach the finals. The man who currently holds the 10th spot — John Haddock — with a 69 — will be threatened tonight when a fresh crop of riders compete. Lamoat Miller had the only sub-20 second calf roping run. Miller wrapped his calf up in 15.2 seconds, a time more than 10 seconds ahead of Monroe, who had a 26.7. Kent Miller received a 27.0. In a field laced with mostly local cowboys, only two teams could come up with successful team roping runs. Magic Valley ropers Bill Bueck and Bill Bennett put themselves into the money with a 9.8 run. Miller and J.J. Miller stopped the clocks in 15.5 seconds. Dawn Dunn came up with the only sub-18 second barrel racing run. Dunn sprinted through the pattern in 17.62

to edge out Mary Knowles, who had an 18.08. Jim Wright was the only bull rider to put a score in the book. He had a 70. Bull riding is the only event where a buck performance is occurring. Oakley, Wolves fight for conference supremacy

CASTLEFORD — So much for pre-season. Castleford and Oakley high schools, two of the football powers in the Magic Valley Conference this year, opened last week with shutouts. With that out of the way, they now play what will probably be the biggest game of the season for both schools here tonight. "You've to play 'em sometime," says second-year coach Hal Jardine, whose Wolves are ranked No. 4 by United Press International's week-by-week preparation for this game this week has been the same as it was last week. "But first-year Oakley Coach Don Tompkins, whose team is ranked No. 5 in this week's UPI poll, wishes his Hornets had more time to think about it. "I really don't like it," says Tompkins, who hit the ground running with a 28-0 victory over Melba last Saturday. "I haven't seen Castleford, but I know they're loaded. This is going to be a real challenge for us." Game time is 8 p.m. at Castleford High's field. Both have experience and quickness, but both lack size and seasoning at the skill positions. Jardine, who has won nine of the 10 games he's coached at Castleford, sees his Hornets as "the Hornets' principal asset. "I think they'll be extremely quick," he says. "They have good size and appear to be well coached. In past games we've played with Oakley, they have been tough defensively. But I think because of Oakley's quickness, there might be a lot of points scored."

Tompkins, who look over the Oakley job last spring when Doug Bailey left a 5-3 team to become an assistant coach at Burley, worries that his ballclub is still making too many mistakes. "I think the kids are adapting very well to the new system," says Tompkins. "We were aggressive (against Melba), but we made some mistakes we're not going to be able to make against a good team like Castleford." The key to the contest may be the condition of Oakley flanker Gus Gorrings' ankle. Gorrings sprained it after scoring all four of the Hornets' touchdowns against Melba. "Gorrings is questionable, and he's really one of our key people," says Tompkins. "There's no question that if he can't play, it will hurt us." The Wolves, who thumped the Elks, Nev., junior varsity 32-0 last week, have a comparable star. They rely more on defense, and upon the legs of junior tailback Rich Owen (5-foot-7, 140 pounds) and the arm of sophomore quarterback Gary Reynolds, who threw two touchdowns in his debut last week. Oakley will have somewhat of an edge in size, with 6-2, 210-pound junior Steve Buckley at offensive and defensive tackle and 6-4, 200-pound sophomore John Oldham at offensive tackle and noseguard. Castleford's heart is on defense, with 5-8, 200-pound junior varsity star at one tackle and junior Quinton Fryer at one tackle and junior Rich Kinyon at the other. Oakley will win II of the 16 games the two schools have played, but Castleford won last year's meeting 14-8.

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Turner's receiving carries Filer past Buhl 34-0

FILER — Passing was Filer's fancy Thursday night, as the Wildcats raved the Buhl Indians 34-0 in a non-conference football game.

Scott Turner caught three touchdown passes in the second quarter, helping the Wildcats amass 163 passing yards and a 26-0 lead by halftime.

Filer's victory was its first over Buhl since a 14-12 decision in 1972, although the teams haven't played every year since then.

"We felt with the one-on-one coverage they were giving us, we couldn't do anything but throw the ball successfully," Filer Coach Joe Leach said.

Turner was responsible for much of this success. The 6-1, 160-pound senior grabbed scoring passes of 14 and 35 yards from Lee Chadwick and 18 yards from Andy Sackett on his way to totaling 81 yards on five receptions.

"We've known all along he had that kind of ability to catch the ball," Leach said of Turner. "And he has good speed, too."

Turner's speed was evident on his first touchdown grab, as he accelerated past Buhl's Mike Crowley on a corner pattern and made the catch with 17 left in the second quarter.

After Filer stopped Buhl on downs on the Indian 35-yard line, Chadwick connected with Turner on the first play from scrimmage, hitting him near the 15. Turner, who had out-

distanced Indian defenders Jeff Miller and Mark Munroe on the play, continued into the end zone unimpeded with 7:11 to go.

A Chadwick interception, Filer's third of the first half, set up Turner's final touchdown. Two penalties forced the Wildcats into a second-and-30 quandary at Buhl's 46, but Turner extricated them with a sliding catch for 12 yards and a leaping grab over the middle for 29.

Three plays and a penalty later, Filer faced fourth-and-14 at Buhl's 18. Substitute quarterback Sackett again found Turner in the end zone, but this time the Filer receiver was covered closely by Munroe. Turner and Munroe arrived at the ball at the same time, grappled over it and fell to the turf with 32 seconds left. The officials awarded the touchdown to Turner on the simultaneous possession.

The Wildcats' second-quarter emphasis on the pass contrasted with the style they displayed on their first touchdown drive, when Lanny Brown carried on six of seven plays and scored from 1 yard out with 8:10 left in the first quarter. Eric Parratt's conversion run gave Filer an 8-0 edge.

Leach explained that that drive, which exposed the Wildcats to Buhl's various defensive sets, helped them form their strategy for their subsequent passing attack. "We kind of changed our patterns from that," he said.

Brown added another 1-yard touchdown run with 0:47 remaining to

play, with Sackett's conversion pass to Greg Jarolimiek closing the scoring.

Arguello's 'immortality' goes on line

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Redemption and a berth in boxing history will be on Alexis Arguello's mind Friday night when he faces unbeaten champion Aaron Pryor for the World Boxing Association junior welterweight championship. Ten months ago in Miami, Pryor handed Arguello the worst beating of his 16-year career, winning on a 14th round knockout. The bout, voted 1982's Fight of the Year, was a classic, with both fighters dueling toe-to-toe before Pryor ended it with a flurry of nearly two dozen unsteered punches. The loss ruined Arguello's dream of an unprecedented fourth title. Arguello, one of only seven fighters ever to hold three titles, joining Bob Fitzsimmons, Henry Armstrong, Barney Ross, Tony Canzoneri, Wilfred Benitez and Roberto Duran, claims Friday night's fight will be his last and he wants to end his illustrious career as a champion. "The four titles have been my dream," Arguello said. "I have fought for 16 years and it would be a fitting end for my career. This will be my last fight — win, lose or draw — and I will put the last drop of my blood into this fight." The bout is scheduled to begin shortly after 10:30 p.m. EDT at a specially-constructed 11,200-seat stadium at Caesar's Palace. Pryor, 33-0, with 31 knockouts, is a 2 1/2-favorite over Arguello, 78-5 with 63 knockouts. Pryor will earn about \$2.5 million and Arguello will get about \$1.5 million. "I made a lot of mistakes last year," Arguello said. "I didn't prepare myself mentally. There were just too many distractions. Physically, I was in condition, but my mind was not where it was supposed to be. That has been a big factor for me for this fight — getting my concentration where it's supposed to be. I let him dictate the pace last time. I let him do what he wanted to do and I paid the price. Last time I danced to his music. This time he will dance to mine." Pryor feels that he will end the rematch much quicker than the first fight. "I think the beating he took in the first fight has to affect him," Pryor said. "He hit me with his best shot and didn't do anything and I knocked him out — I beat him worse than anybody in his 16 years in the ring. That's going to play on his mind. I respect him for getting back in the ring with me. I think he believes that the first fight was rigged."

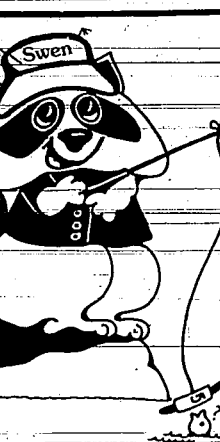
