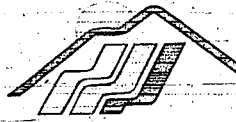

Presidential seekers drilled at forum

NEW YORK — All seven candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination, appearing together for the first time, Thursday agreed on the need for arms control but broke ranks on negotiations with the Soviet Union. The candidates fielded a wide variety of questions during a 2 1/2-hour political forum. For the most part, they were in agreement on most subjects and treated each other in a gentle and friendly fashion, holding their jobs for President Reagan. But they split on arms negotiations with the Soviet Union and

specifically over whether the SALT II nuclear arms agreement, never ratified by the Senate, could have been verified. Sen. Ernest Hollis of South Carolina, the middle-of-the-road Southerner, told the audience in historic Town Hall he voted against SALT II, which was ratified, and was "prepared to vote against SALT II because it was an uneven agreement" and could not be verified.

Hollings was immediately challenged by former Vice President Walter Mondale, Sen. John Glenn of Ohio, Sen. Alton Cranston of California and George McGovern, the Democratic presidential candidate in 1972.

Mondale, who was in the Carter administration during the time the Senate was considering SALT II, said: "I don't have the slightest doubt in my mind that SALT II was verifiable. If we had ratified SALT II, this would have been a much safer world."

McGovern, denying he advocated negotiations based on trust as suggested by Hollings, said: "I am not advocating arms control on

trust. We were offered a verifiable treaty, and it was based on hard-boiled reality. "SALT II did not die in the Kremlin," McGovern said. "It died in the United States Senate."

Glenn also took exception with Hollings' assessment, saying, "On balance, SALT II was even." He also said he favored ratification of SALT II because "it can now be verified."

The candidates also differed, although only slightly, on how to approach the Soviet Union in arms control negotiations.

Cranston suggested "we follow the Camp David formula," which led to the peace

agreement between Israel and Egypt. He said U.S. and Soviet leaders should get together with no preconditions to "find a way to make a dramatic cutback in arms."

Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado, who, like Cranston, is making a nuclear freeze a priority issue in his campaign, said one of the main features neglected in previous negotiations is the hazards posed by the firing of a nuclear weapon by mistake or accident.

Mondale said it is now virtually impossible for the Soviet Union and the United States to negotiate either through diplomatic channels or by telephone.

Misuse of funds cited

Clerk resigns amid charges

SHOSHONE — Lincoln County Clerk Linda Stevenson, who was charged Wednesday with 10 counts of misusing county funds, will resign from her post, effective Nov. 5, her attorney said Thursday. Attorney Greg Fuller of Jerome said Stevenson's decision to resign "should not be construed by the prosecution or anyone that she's admitting to anything." He termed her decision to resign "an unselfish thing," intended to ensure that the county clerk's office will run as smoothly as possible under the circumstances.

"We're going to enter into an agreement that if her deputies need help, she will be available to answer questions," Fuller said. Stevenson will be placed on administrative leave with pay until Nov. 5, under the agreement reached Thursday with Special Prosecutor Keith Roark, he said.

Roark, contacted Thursday afternoon at his Halley office, where he serves as Blaine County prosecutor, said he was in the process of drafting the agreement. "I expect that next Tuesday we will have a letter of resignation, a grant of administrative leave and we'll proceed from there on the criminal charges," he said.

Stevenson, 35, was arrested Wednesday morning at her office by Sheriff Darwin Mills and was arraigned before Fifth District Magistrate Court Judge Daniel Hurlbutt Jr. She was released on her own recognizance later in the day. She is accused of presenting falsified or forged documents and

receipts to the county for reggimento. Stevenson was barned by Hurlbutt from entering the courthouse or from communicating with her deputies.

The Lincoln County commissioners have declined to comment on the case, the alleged acts or how they were alerted to them. However, Roark says he does not believe the alleged incidents were brought to the attention of the commission. "What surfaced were some suspicious irregularities related to a very specific incident," he says.

After Lincoln County Prosecutor Doug Hase disqualified himself from investigating the case, Roark says he investigated those irregularities and looked at related areas to arrive at the evidence he plans to use in the case against Stevenson. Roark declined to disclose who brought the alleged irregularities to the attention of the prosecutor's office.

Fuller says that Stevenson plans to plead innocent to the charges. But he says he has not had an opportunity to evaluate the evidence that Roark has gathered.

Stevenson has been the Lincoln County clerk since January 1982, when she was appointed to complete the term of Joy McClure, who died. She was elected to the post in November 1982. Documents filed with the court allege the first fraudulent act occurred in April 1982 — four months after she had assumed the post.

Allegations of misuse of public funds are not uncommon in Lincoln County. In 1978, the county's treasurer, O. L. 38 years, Myron Johnson, was sentenced to 10 years in the state penitentiary for appropriating at least \$130,000 in county funds to his own use.

Commander assassinated as Mideast peace talk is delayed

BEIRUT, Lebanon — A car bomb killed a pro-Israeli Muslim militia commander in southern Lebanon Thursday in an attack the Palestine Liberation Organization said was carried out to eliminate traitors to the Arab cause.

The attack in the Shilite Muslim village of Adoun came, as negotiators in Beirut said there could be a 10- to 12-day delay in convening peace talks between Lebanon's Christian and Muslim factions. Officials also said a "steering committee"

of warring representatives would meet first "in a few days" in Beirut to decide an agenda for the talks.

Druze leader Walid Jumblatt said in Rome, however, his "priority problem" was "to topple" the U.S.-backed government of President Amin Gemayel, to win "a more equal distribution of power."

Jumblatt's forces waged a 22-day war for control of the Shouf mountains and established an administrative council in the area that Gemayel, a Christian, fears will lead to the partition of Lebanon.

The 11-day cease-fire between the factions held despite sporadic sniper fire in south

Beirut, where the Lebanese army is deployed close to Shilite Muslim militia units.

The car bomb in Adoun, 20 miles south of Beirut in Israeli-held Lebanon, killed Hussein Wanbe, commander of the 270-man Israeli-trained Shilite "Brigade of the South." State-run Beirut radio said Wanbe's wife was wounded in the attack.

The conservative International News Agency said Israel formed the group to balance the influence of Christian Phalange forces in the south. The brigade reportedly set up its first roadblock Thursday near Jouaya, 46 miles south of Beirut. A statement issued by the PLO news agency

WASA branded Wanbe a "traitor" in the Arab cause and said the bomb was set by Lebanese and Palestinian resistance fighters.

The assassination came amid reports that Israel was training new Lebanese militias in southern Lebanon to consolidate its occupation of the region.

Beirut radio said Israeli forces arrested 40 people after the bombing. In Beirut, the Saudi Arabian mediator who negotiated the cease-fire in Lebanon said after a meeting with President Amin Gemayel that the long-awaited peace talks between the government and the warring Christian and Muslim factions may not begin for "10 or 12

days." They had been expected to start this week.

"There is the issue of 8 years of war and that can't be solved overnight," said the Saudi mediator, Rafic Hariri.

The main stumbling block to arranging the talks has been Syria's rejection of Saudi Arabia as mediator to broadcast negotiations. Gemayel called the peace talks to discuss a new formula for sharing power in Lebanon among the Christians and Muslims. The old power-sharing formula in force since 1943 calls for Christians to hold the presidency, Sunni Muslim prime ministers and Shilite Muslim speakers of parliament.

Judge decries Nobel given author Golding

STOCKHOLM, Sweden — William Golding, whose novel "Lord of the Flies" depicted the savagery of people won the 1983 Nobel Prize for Literature Thursday, but one judge denounced the choice in an unprecedented attack on the British author.

Artur Lundkvist, one of 17 judges of Swedish Academy, described Golding as "a small English phenomenon of no great interest" and claimed other Academy members had been out of the decision-making process. "The Swedish Academy pulled off a coup," Lundkvist said. "There

was no full agreement on William Golding."

His comments, unprecedented in the history of the Literature Prize, appeared to violate the Nobel secrecy rules given by the Swedish crown and shocked Nobel officials.

Lundkvist said the last vote he participated in found the group split between Golding and French novelist Claude Simon. Lundkvist said he backed Simon.

Lars Gyllenstein, chairman of the Nobel committee, said there were no irregularities in the choice of Golding. He said there was "a large majority supporting this year's prize-winner and there was abso-

TV critics slapped by surgeon general

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Researchers who think violence on television generates violence in life should stop "pounding away at the broadcaster" and figure out why people watch such programs, Surgeon General Everett Koop said Thursday.

In a speech to the National Coalition on Television Violence, Koop said many questions have yet to be answered about the effects of violent TV shows.

"We may be very unhappy over the fact that millions of people, including thousands of impressionable children, will voluntarily watch something that we believe to be violent and socially harmful," he said.

But, he added, "Our job is to

research further into the motivations of the audience, rather than to continue pounding away at the broadcaster."

"The real issue is not the networks' decision to broadcast violent programs, Koop said.

"The real issue ... is this: Why on earth does anybody watch that stuff?" he said.

"After all these years, the broadcasters and mental health researchers are equally sensitive to the social problems caused by some popular shows," he added. "But refusing henceforth to broadcast those shows could be ruinous for a network."

Koop, the nation's top medical official, said researchers should find out why such shows are so popular.

Evans continues tour of Japan

TOKYO (UPI) — Idaho Gov. John Evans says he's making valuable overseas contacts for Idaho businesses in meetings with Asian business leaders. The governor, winding up a 19-day tour of China, Japan and Hong Kong, met Wednesday with several Tokyo officials as well as representatives of the Japanese External Trade Organization and Mitsui and Co.

Evans and 36 other members of an Idaho trade and goodwill mission are scheduled to return home Friday after the governor meets again with Japanese trade officials.

"The opportunity to meet with these representatives from Pacific Rim countries will provide valuable contacts for future Idaho trade development," he said.

Pilots claim attacks planned

Nicaragua accused the CIA Thursday of using Costa Rican, Salvadoran and Honduran territory to unleash a "terrorist" air war on its oil, sea and air ports as part of a planned rebel march on the capital by December. The Marxist-led government presented to reporters, two captured rebel pilots who claimed the U.S.-backed Nicaraguan Democratic Force planned "to attack all the principle cities of Nicaragua and provoke a popular insurrection."

Roberto Amador and his co-pilot Hugo Aguilar Mendez said they flew their missions from a rural airstrip in Honduras that is commanded by a U.S. major whose last name is "West."

"Supposedly, in December we would already dominate the principle cities and advance towards Managua," Amador said.

Barclay, the official newspaper of Nicaragua's Marxist-led Sandinista Front, quoted Defense Minister Humberto Ortega as saying the CIA launched the attacks using planes and bases in Nicaragua's three neighboring countries.

"It is a serious threat, and a clearly terrorist attitude which — if it is carried out — will put the Central American region in a very dangerous situation," the Nicaraguan defense minister was quoted as saying.

The New York Times published an article Thursday tracing a plane used to raid Managua's airport Sept. 5 to a company owned by a former official of a firm that was owned by the CIA.

Blind woman gets sight back

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — An elderly woman, nearly blind for 40 years, says she appreciates the little things in life — like marveling at the coloring and details on a dollar bill — since her sight was restored with experimental laser surgery.

When Edna Faye Taylor, 73, of Morrilton, Ark., went to the doctor's office for the surgery she was unable to read the big "E" on an eye chart. An hour later she had vision "520" — normally good enough to read.

"It was like a toy pistol — click, click, click," she said Thursday after returning to Arkansas from the weekend surgery in Atlanta. "After it was over, everything was real blue, then in a minute it was clearing up. It wasn't 10 minutes before I could see people walking up and down the hall, see the colors they had on."

Police die in Belfast violence

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Two police reservists were shot and killed Thursday in a town 15 miles from Maze prison and another was wounded in the community in a stepped up search for 10 escaped IRA convicts.

Helicopters, hundreds of police officers, troops and tracker dogs poured into Downpatrick, a staunchly nationalist town 23 miles south of Belfast, police said.

\$300,000 dog beaten to death

STORRS, Conn. (UPI) — University of Connecticut researchers estimate it could take six years and more than \$300,000 to replace a special hybrid dog beaten to death by vandals.

Campus police said Wednesday they are requesting arrest warrants for two suspects in the killing. The carcass of the animal was found Sept. 27 in the back of a truck near the university's physical plant.

Soviets seen shipping missiles

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Soviet Union appears to be shipping SS21 ballistic missiles to Syria in the shoulder area indicated on a potentially serious, it was reported Thursday night.

The Washington Post quoted administration sources as saying there are indications the missile shipment is under way from Soviet ports and that the destination appears to be Syria.

The SS21, with a range estimated at about 70 miles, is one of the latest surface-to-surface Soviet battlefield missiles. A mobile weapon transported on a tracked vehicle, the SS21 was only recently deployed outside the Soviet Union for the first time, in East Germany, the Post reported.

U.S. fighters collide in midair

COLD LAKE, Alberta (UPI) — Two U.S. fighter planes collided Thursday during a training exercise and one of the pilots was missing in freezing temperatures, a Canadian Forces spokesman said.

The collision occurred in northern Alberta during a practice operation called Exercise Maple Leaf, a large-scale bi-annual military maneuver, Capt. Martin Tate said.

An F-16 of the 33rd Tactical Fighter Wing, based at Eglin Air Force Base in Florida, and a F-5F of the 57th Fighter Weapons Wing, based at Nellis Air Force Base in Nevada, collided at about 2:20 p.m.

Intely, no excuse for a misunderstanding. The award requires only a simple majority of the Academy's members. Gyllenstein said. He declined to say if Lindqvist would be expelled from the body.

"I'm delighted to have won the prize, who wouldn't be," the 72-year-old Golding said from his home in the village of Bowerchalke in western England before the ceremony.

"They must think I am good," said Golding, who learned of his Nobel award from a radio news program.

In awarding the prize, the Academy compared Golding to Herman Melville and Jonathan Swift, authors whose books also dwelled on the dark side of human nature.

"Golding has, like many other candidates, been considered for many years," Gyllenstein said. "The impact of his work has consistently increased after every novel was published."

Golding became the first British writer to win the Literature Prize since Winston Churchill in 1953. The 1981 Laureate, Elias Canetti lives in England, but writes in German.

The Academy said Golding won the coveted prize "for his novels which with perspicuity of realistic narrative art and the diversity and the universality of myth illumines the human condition in the world today."

Like Melville, Golding often chooses themes from the world of the sea where "odd people are tempted to reach beyond their limits, thereby being bared to the very marrow," the citation said.

"Golding has a very keen sight and sharp pen which it comes to the power of evil and baseness of human beings — just like Jonathan Swift," it continued.

Last year the Academy gave the award to another best-selling writer,

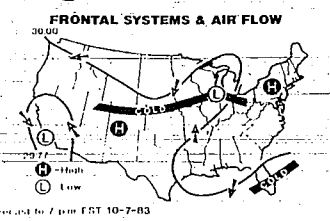
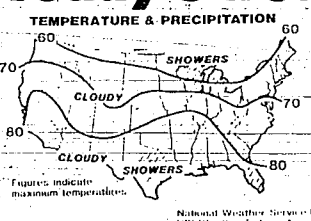

Watt's future hinges on Senate action

WASHINGTON (UPI) — James Watt's future as secretary of the Interior will probably depend on the extent of Senate support for a resolution calling for his resignation, senior administration officials said Thursday.

The officials, who declined to be named, indicated Watt may choose to resign, ending the furor created by a racial and ethnic remark three weeks ago, rather than face repudiation by an overwhelming majority in the Senate.

Watt flew to California Wednesday for what was described by the Interior Department as a "working visit." One administration official indicated Watt would spend the time contemplating his future, including a possible resignation.

"It's a decision I'm sure he's weighing," the official said, adding that any significant change could take several days.

The decision could hinge "on the outlook in the Senate," the official said, with Watt likely to choose resignation over a strong vote of no confidence, even though the Senate resolution introduced by Democratic leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia has no legal force.

At the White House, deputy press secretary Larry Speakes continued to insist reporters are "beating a dead horse" with the Watt affair and said President Reagan retains confidence in his controversial Interior secretary.

Speakes said Watt has neither offered his resignation nor been asked by the White House to deliver one. "As far as the White House is concerned," he said, "the case is closed."

Speakes said he had spoken to Reagan before making the statement. Watt created a stir Sept. 21 in characterizing the composition of an advisory commission. "We have every kind of mix you can have," Watt said.

Leukemia claims spiritual leader for 4 million

NEW YORK (UPI) — Cardinal Terence J. Cooke, spiritual leader of nearly 4 million Roman Catholics and a leader of the American church's anti-abortion battle, died Thursday of leukemia in the shadow of his beloved St. Patrick's Cathedral.

The 62-year-old cardinal, who had been archbishop of New York for 11 years, was terminally ill and two days after he suffered a serious setback.

City and state flags were ordered to fly at half-staff as hundreds of people flocked to St. Patrick's to offer prayers and light candles for the

cardinal. Cooke's chief administrative aide, Bishop Joseph O'Keefe, was named by a special archdiocesan committee to be run the 175-year-old archdiocese until Pope John Paul II picks a successor.

The archdiocese late Thursday released a portion of Cooke's last will and testament in which he said, "With gratitude I accept whatever manner of death God wills for me and despite my unworthiness, with faith in God's grace and plan, I hope for eternal life in the company of the Risen Saviour." The testament, titled "Thy Will Be Done," was written Sept. 15, 1981. The

cardinal was first found to have lymph cancer 20 years ago, but it was successfully treated. The disease recurred about 8 years ago and became terminal with a recent onset of leukemia.

"I thank God for the wonderful gift of the priesthood and for the happiness that I have found united with the laity of the Church. The prayers of my brothers and sisters in God's human family," Cooke, who was born in Harlem, said in the will.

Cooke added it had been a "joy" to live with and serve all the people of the church and that he was sorry for any failure on his part in doing the

Will of our Heavenly Father."

The Rev. Peter Finn, spokesman for the archdiocese, announced the cardinal's death just after dawn.

Terence Cardinal Cooke, tenth bishop, seventh archbishop, fifth cardinal of the See of New York and vicar to military service, Veterans Administration hospitals and government services overseas, completed his work on Earth and was called home by Almighty God to heaven this morning, Oct. 6, 1983, at 4:45 a.m., Finn said.

He said Cooke "died peacefully... in the shadow of his beloved Cathedral of St. Patrick."

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Rain threatening stricken Arizona

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) — Massive cleanup efforts continued in southeastern Arizona Thursday from once-in-a-lifetime flooding that left 15 dead and \$300 million in damage. Thousands of homeless were threatened by disease and more rain was possible.

Several days of sunshine started drying out many mud-caked towns. No new deaths were reported. As heavy rains receded, there was the two-fold danger of even more rain and disease outbreaks. But many who lost their possessions remained optimistic.

"The Lord has a purpose in things," said James E. Maroney. "Maybe it's to bring people together, who knows? But things will work out."

Water releases from Coolidge Dam in eastern Arizona forced evacuation Thursday of 75 homes at Winkelman after the Gila River rose four feet in four hours.

Dynamite blasts punctuated the rumbling of bulldozers and dump trucks at Clifton, where battalions of relief workers worked around the clock to restore services. Military demolition crews blew up rain-loosened boulders threatening homes and roads.

Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz., the House Interior chairman, said two more counties — Gila and Yavapai — were added to the federal disaster relief eligibility list, raising the number to seven.

President Reagan declared Arizona a disaster area Wednesday.

Potential for health problems is "very grave," said John Paulsen of the state Division of Emergency Services. His agency coordinated relocation of water and sewer services in hard-hit areas such as the copper mining town of Clifton near the New Mexico state line.

"Even at this time of year, mosquitoes can come very quickly in large numbers," Paulsen said. "That always translates into terms of potential encephalitis, tetanus and other problems. It's not very nice."

The National Weather Service kept an eye on tropical storm Frisquilla, said to have the potential to dump two inches of rain on flooded-stricken areas before the weekend. Many of the 10,000 people who were displaced returned to their homes.

President lauds young heroes for bravery

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan Thursday presented bravery medals to two youngsters who faced death to rescue other children, actions the president said exemplified "the nobility of the human spirit."

Reagan gave the medals to Carolyn Hartscock, 16, of Castlewood, Va., and Bennitt Pionke, 11, of Clarendon Hills, Ill.

Carolyn, known as Karen, suffered burns over 80 percent of her body while saving her sister and brother, a cerebral palsy victim, from a fire in

their house June 13, 1982. Her father died last month of cancer and her family is living on Social Security disability payments, unable to meet the medical bills.

Bennitt rescued a 5-year-old boy who had fallen through the ice of a pond Dec. 11, 1982.

Neither Karen, her face scarred by the fire and her right hand heavily bandaged, nor Bennitt said anything when Reagan presented the medals in a Rose Garden ceremony.

But both soft-spoken youngsters described their ordeals for reporters later.

Asked what it was like, Karen said, "I didn't feel nothing." She said she ran through the flames twice to save her sister, Norma Kay, and brother, Johnnie, because "I loved them and I had to help them."

Bennitt, recalling his act of heroism, said, "We were playing hockey. There was a white thing bobbing around and I went to see what it was, and it was a kid. And I went out onto the ice, fell through myself and pulled him out."

According to the citation, Bennitt tried to pull the boy, Ray Venezio, out of the water but fell in himself.

Firefighters ward off lava

TOKYO (UPI) — Firefighters used sea water Thursday to cool and slow down molten lava from the Mt. Oyama volcano that has destroyed hundreds of houses on a Japanese island.

Weather officials warned of a second possible eruption north of Tokyo. Police said 100 firefighters were plying sea water onto 1,600-degree F lava, hoping to cool and slow the flow as it crept toward homes at the foot of Mt. Oyama on Miyakejima island. The volcano erupted Monday for the first time in 21 years.

The "Breast of the Agency" said Mount Shirane, about 75 miles north of Tokyo, belched white smoke 100 feet into the sky during the day in what appeared to be a prelude to an eruption.

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Judging Watt is Reagan's job

The storm continues to brew over the tenure in office of Secretary of Interior James Watt. As it does, a contention of the secretary's is being increasingly borne out. A great deal of the flap is the result of pure partisan politics.

But the politics have the sort of twist that Watt didn't have in mind.

In Congress, a great deal of the hue and cry for Watt's head is coming from the Republican side. More than 10 Republican senators have called for his resignation. They are supporting the pending congressional resolution advising President Reagan to fire his Interior secretary.

These are not voices we have heard in past choruses of criticism of Watt. True, his latest gaffe was reprehensible, but it was not that much out of synch with his previous remarks.

Watt's latest indiscretion did not make his GOP critics see the light. What did was the rapid approach of the 1984 elections. Recent public opinion polls make it clear that the American people do not view Watt as one of their favorite public officials. Clearly, he would be a liability to the Republican Party next fall.

Comments from Watt's critics within his own party have reflected a perception of that liability. They may have supported him in the past, but they want him out while there is still time for the short memory of the electorate to do its job.

We think that's unfair to the voters. Congress has no business considering the resolution counselling the axing of Watt. That is not Congress's job. The secretary serves at the pleasure of the president. There is no mentor of Congress in that relationship.

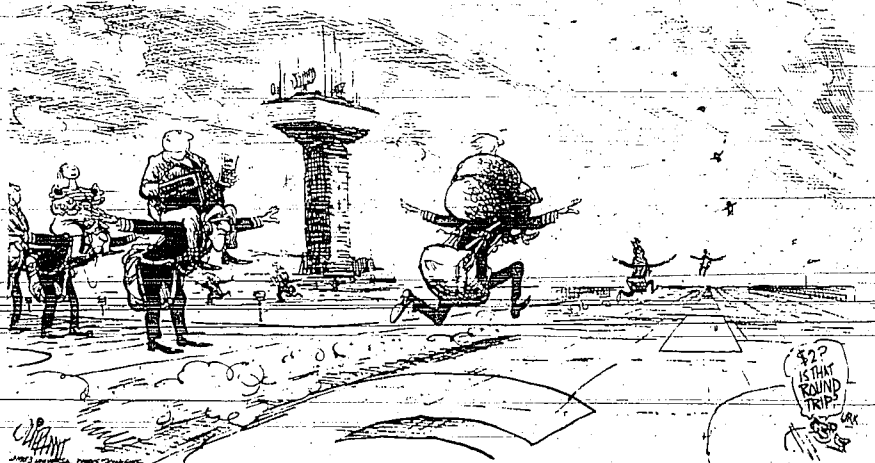
Even if the resolution is approved, it is not binding on Reagan. Congress cannot force a president to fire a Cabinet official.

And that is as it should be, especially in this case. James Watt is not an independent figure. He is a part of the Reagan administration. His policies may be controversial, but they are just one facet of Reagan's overall approach to running our country.

Because of that, Watt should stay right where he is. The present administration is due for an evaluation next November. When the voters issue that evaluation, they should have all the facts before them. The administration should stand for election, warts and all.

Congress may be displeased with Reagan's choice of spear-carriers, but the house cleaning being advocated is not the business of Congress.

Reagan should be allowed to make his own choices about who stays and who goes. If his decisions do not set well with the public, fine. The public will have its say in November.



Bush entered politics for the long haul

WASHINGTON — Kaiser Wilhelm's aides prepared for him each morning a newspaper of carefully selected items, printed in gold. Vice President George Bush gets less glided, but better, information.

Tucking into scrambled eggs at his office at 7:30 a.m. last week, Bush looked forward to a day that began with the feeding of a columnist but soon became interesting. It included several meetings with the President and ended with a political fund-raiser, the sting of which was assuaged by the fact that it involved playing tennis. By 8:30 a.m. he was receiving his daily briefing from the CIA — the brutality of facts, not printed in gold. He went from there to another national security briefing with the President.

Most thoughtful people entering government are dismayed by, and their dismay steadily deepens about, the weak information base on which decisions are made. So Bush wants to be a super-tanker loaded to the Pliofilm mark with information.

His experience during the last three years is a case study in the natural mortality of the silliness the flourishes during campaigns. References to Ronald Reagan as "a B-movie actor" are dead. So is the science of prepsychology. That involved the scrutiny of Bush's wristwatch bands for signs of terminal Yale influences. Another melody no longer heard is the refrain that his conservative credentials are not in good order. He has now extinguished the suspicions of all conservatives except those who need suspicions the way plants need sunshine.

Bush only became suspect because he was Reagan's opponent. Leave aside those conservatives who themselves wear white collars and whose manual labor extends only to moving the carriage of a typewriter, but who think Bush can not relate — as they can — blue-collar America. If Bush would just do something ungentle — drink the water from the finger bowl, perhaps — he might complete his conquest of conservative holdouts.

It is to the credit of the current President and especially his predecessor — two former governors with no Washington experience — that the vice presidency has become a serious job. Walter

Absorbing information

Mondale was the first vice president to have an office in the White House West Wing, as does Bush. Hitherto, vice presidents had offices next door, in the Executive Office Building. That building is just a 30-second walk from the Oval Office, but (in the words of a Bush aide) "politically, it's Baltimore."

Bush can attend any meeting the President has, except those which heads of state traditionally have alone. He speaks his mind only in private with the President, for several reasons.

The author of the most memorable phrase of the 1980 campaign — "voodoo economics" — must feel somewhat inhibited about entering the intramural debate between those who still say the tax cuts will close the budget gap and those who say tax

increases are necessary. Furthermore, Bush speaks circumspectly when not alone with the President because he knows it would be a matter of minutes before any real or imagined differences with the President became common gossip.

Bush has had the sort of career common in Britain but rare here. That is, he has passed through a series of significant offices (congressman, chairman of his party, ambassador to the U.N. and to Peking, director of the CIA). He is the most comprehensively experienced person to serve as vice president. This is a political asset because of Reagan's age. That was expected to be an issue in 1980 and was not. It is not expected to be an issue in 1984, but may be. Perhaps it will be less an "issue" than a vague anxiety. So, Bush and his many credentials will be important again.

Last time, it was important as evidence of Reagan's pragmatism and taste for quality. "Exit polls" taken among voters leaving polling places showed that 9 percent of those who voted for Reagan listed his choice of Bush as the reason. It is hard to know exactly what those polled were saying, but 9 percent is a large number of persons saying it.

Of all mortals in their 60th year, Bush is the least weatherworn, perhaps because he has come to terms with the fact that there is only so much, and not very much, any man can do to control events. (Will Reagan run?) reflects his certitude that Reagan will run, and his general knack for cheerfulness. Happiness often is a by-product of a mature person's fatalism, and a certain fatalism is essential to the emotional well-being of a long-distance political runner.

Logic takes wrong turn on the road to faulty autos' recall

I am constantly fascinated when I read in the newspapers that the Justice Department or a federal agency has just arrived at an agreement with a large company or powerful individual accused of wrongdoing.

The stories read something like this: "The Double Jeopardy-Automobile Company agreed with the Justice Department not to manufacture any more of their Double Y cars without brake pedals. The company paid a \$20,000 fine, and said it would recall all Double Y cars now on the road that are missing the brake pedal. While paying the fine and making the recall, Double Jeopardy executives denied that there was a problem with the Double Y car, or a reason for the recall."

I consulted a lawyer friend, of which I have many in Washington, to ask him what exactly it meant when the company was fined, agreed to recall all its cars, and still was able to maintain its innocence.

"They have to do that," he said. "Otherwise the company would open itself up to a lot of frivolous lawsuits."

"I understand that. But why would the government allow them to maintain their innocence when Double Jeopardy forgot to put a brake pedal on the car?"

"The government is more concerned with getting the cars fixed than punishing the company for incompetence. If they bring Double Jeopardy to trial it's going to take years to resolve the problem, and in the meantime a lot more people could get killed."

"Suppose the company knowingly was selling cars without brake pedals? Isn't that a criminal offense?"

"Possibly. But let's start at the beginning. Double Jeopardy puts out a Double Y car without brake pedals. The engineering department catches it after the millionth car is on the market. They inform their salespeople, who tell them to shut up. Finally, the government safety people get wind of it, and, after testing the vehicle for two years, come to the conclusion that the Double Y could cause a danger on the highway."

"They contact Double Jeopardy and say their data indicates the Double Y car may be a flaw in its braking system. The company responds by saying the safety agency did not test the car under road conditions, and the only time people have accidents in a Double Y car is when they try to stop it."

"The safety agency studies the data

submitted by Double Jeopardy and concludes the only thing that can stop a Double Y car is a brick wall. In preparation for this negative reaction, Double Jeopardy has hired the best law firm in Washington — that usually means the law firm with the best connections to the present administration. The lawyer calls his friends at Justice and says he is shocked that the auto safety agency would pick on an American car firm just as the economy is starting to shape up. He offers to meet with the Justice Department lawyer to work out an equitable solution that will satisfy the company and the government. They make a date for a golf game at the Burning Tree Club."

"It sounds so civilized," I said. "It is. Usually by the ninth hole an agreement can be hammered out. In the case of the Double Y car, the Justice man says, because of the publicity, he can't look the other way and Double Jeopardy will have to

be fined and go ahead with a recall.

"Oh, that's fine for the company says this is all right with him, providing Double Jeopardy doesn't have to admit there is anything wrong with the car, or else the settlement could be construed as an admission of guilt."

"This is where I always got confused," I said. "Double Jeopardy agrees with the government there is a serious defect in the Double Y car, but doesn't have to admit it to its customers."

My lawyer friend said, "That's because you don't understand how the government and big business work. The government's job is to protect the consumer, the company's job is to protect their sales. As long as both sides sign an agreement that they know the company botched, the law is satisfied without admitting it, and no one really gets hurt."

Mondale cheered by union

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (UPI) — Walter Mondale accepted organized labor's presidential endorsement Thursday, telling cheering delegates to the AFL-CIO convention, "I am ready to be the president who puts America back to work."
As the former vice president and Democratic front-runner promised to make labor's agenda his campaign theme, 800 delegates stood on tables and chairs, alternately singing choruses after chanting of "Solidarity Forever" and cheering, "We want Fritz."
He promised more jobs, labor law reform, a "sound" trade policy, rebuilding of the nation's industrial base and equal rights for women.
"I'm on your side. We've been

together all these years," Mondale said. "We have everything we need except a leader and I ask you to help make me that leader."
The AFL-CIO endorsement, made official by the 13.7-million member labor federation Wednesday, will mean considerable help for Mondale's campaign in terms of thousands of volunteers to staff telephone banks and get-out-the-vote, plus other services that could total as much as \$20 million.
Some of the strongest cheers came when Mondale denounced the Reagan administration, saying, "Mr. Reagan has a theory as to why our nation has slipped. He thinks American workers are lazy. Well, he is dead wrong."

"We must dig ourselves out of Reaganomics," he said. "We can dig our way out of one term of Reaganomics, but four more years will mean that our kids may never know an America as confident and hopeful as we did."
He also got a standing ovation when he blasted industries like the airlines for using threats of bankruptcy to gain concessions in labor contracts.
"When workers make concessions to keep firms afloat, it's wrong for corporations to use bankruptcy laws to bust unions, break contract and duck liability," he said.
Some labor leaders, however, said privately the endorsement is not a permanent commitment.

GOP women refute 'gender gap'

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — Leaders of the National Federation of Republican Women hope President Reagan will try to expose the so-called gender gap by a false issue when he addresses the group's convention Friday.
Most of more than 2,000 GOP women feel Reagan, who is to appear before them, has done an excellent job for women in America. And they plan to demonstrate to the nation that the gender gap is only Democratic rhetoric.
Democrats, pointing to polls, have contended a much higher percentage of men than women favor Reagan's policies.

"I don't think there is a gender gap," Susan Collins, 32, a delegate from Dallas, said Thursday. "I think we have let the Democrats say there is and set an agenda. But that will change with this election. America will see there is a great deal of support for the president among women."
Many of the delegates and alternates questioned on the eve of Reagan's visit to the convention said they believed the president had no problem with support from women.
"I think it is a lot of hullabaloo," Madge Zuloaga, 50, of El Paso, Texas, said. "I don't think there is a gender gap. I think that is coming from

Democrats, and they wouldn't be happy if he filled his Cabinet with women."
Joan Collins, 39, of Columbia, Md., said she is a staunch supporter of the Equal Rights Amendment, women's rights and Reagan.
"He may be wrong on ERA, but he's 99-percent right on everything else," the unsuccessful 1978 candidate for House of Delegates said. "I think he has gotten a bum rap."
Many of the leaders of the biennial convention said, however, there is a problem of perception about Reagan's policies among the nation's women voters, and the Republican Party must tackle it.

Striking teachers won't concede

Teachers in Chicago, the nation's third largest school district, were on strike for a fourth day Thursday and vowed to keep schools closed for 42 days unless they got a contract and a raise — without granting concessions.
Teachers in Oakland, Calif., rejected the school district's latest offer and Mayor Lionel Wilson called representatives of both sides into his office while \$100-a-day substitutes held classes for 49,000 students.
After the meeting, Wilson announced that negotiations — which

had stalled Wednesday — would resume later in the day.
In Chicago, contract talks between the Chicago Teachers Union and the Board of Education centered on concessions — the union would have to make to win a pay raise. The talks were recessed without an agreement and were to resume Friday.
"They put on a condition of talking about a pay increase that we talk about the 18 (concession) items, so we better talk about the 18 items," CPU President Robert Healey said.
When talks recessed, Healey said the board withdrew all but six concessions proposals. The union agreed to consider both monetary and

non-monetary concessions, he said.
The union is seeking up to a 10 percent pay raise. The board has offered a 0.5 percent raise, which would cost \$4.1 million. Further pay raises would be tied to cuts in benefits under the board's proposal.
Healey rejected a plea from Operation PUSH that teachers return to the classroom while negotiations continue. He said union rules prohibit teachers from working without a contract.
Healey accused the board of stalling contract talks to save \$3.9 million daily in salaries for 27,000 CPU members and 11,000 additional school employees also on strike.
"They went to the other unions as a show of good faith," the News quoted a source as saying.

Eastern Airlines resumes contract debates

MIAMI (UPI) — Eastern Airlines resumed contract negotiations with its flight attendants union in a more optimistic atmosphere Thursday after a break of nearly a week.
Eastern's President Frank Borman

made an unusual five-minute appearance at the opening of the bargaining, urging both sides to come up with a solution.
Negotiations had recessed last Friday after little progress had been

made toward a new contract to replace the one which ran out 18 months ago.
"They went to the other unions as a show of good faith," the News quoted a source as saying.

Teen guilty in dad's killing

BALLSTON SPA, N.Y. (UPI) — A teenager who claimed she shot her millionaire father 10 times because he had raped her before and was about to do it again was convicted Thursday of first-degree manslaughter.
The Saratoga County jury deliberated over two days before returning the verdict against Dawn Crulickshank, 18, in the slaying of her father, prominent real estate developer George Alan Crulickshank, 42.
Miss Crulickshank had claimed she was raped several times by her father since she turned 15 and feared another attack last Nov. 16 when she shot her father 10 times in the garage of the family's palatial home in Clifton Park.
She was shot while visiting his daughter, Crulickshank and his wife, Jean, were in the process of what she testified was a "messy" divorce.
Under a separation agreement, his visits were limited to the garage.
Miss Crulickshank had been tried on a charge of second-degree murder. The defense had sought an acquittal on the grounds she had been sexually attacked by her father on numerous occasions and feared another attack.
Miss Crulickshank broke into sobs after the verdict was announced.
The maximum penalty for first-degree manslaughter is 8 and one-third to 25 years in prison. She was scheduled to be sentenced Nov. 2.
Defense attorney John McMahon said he would be appealing.

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World

China warns Britain, colony

PEKING (UPI) — China warned Thursday it could reclaim Hong Kong "any time it chooses" and that it might not wait long if Britain clung to its "obstinate colonialist stand" in talks over the colony's future.

The warning, in a commentary by the official Communist Party newspaper Peoples Daily, was the third and most threatening of three denunciations of Britain's position on Hong Kong during the past week.

It was considered likely to magnify the tension that has been mounting in advance of the next round of talks over the future of Hong Kong when a

British lease on 90 percent of the territory expires in 1997.

Hong Kong governor Sir Edward Youde arrived in London, meanwhile, for discussions with Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and Foreign Secretary Geoffrey Howe on the future of the talks scheduled in Peking Oct. 19 to 20.

The commentary bitterly took issue with recent remarks by a British official, Richard Lacey, who said the outspoken Chinese propaganda campaign over Hong Kong was "unhelpful" to the confidential negotiations.

"China, as the sovereign state, has the right to recover its sacred territory, Hong Kong, at any time it chooses," Peoples Daily said.

"Should Britain happen to mistake China's sincerity and cooperation ... for signs of weakness and decide to stubbornly stick by its wrong position, China certainly cannot wait for long," it warned.

China, which has declared its intention of reclaiming all of Hong Kong after 1997, has rejected proposals that British administration over the 5 million residents continue after that date.

Thousands vow to oppose Marcos

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — Thousands of Filipinos marched through the streets of Manila Thursday, vowing to fight the "guns, goons and gold" of President Ferdinand Marcos with increasingly bigger protests until he is driven from office.

"There is no power on earth that can destroy us," protest leader Salvador Laurel told 5,000 cheering anti-government demonstrators

gathered in Manila's main financial district of Makati.

For the second consecutive day, Laurel — president of a coalition of 12 political parties pledged to end Marcos' 18 years in office — led a bolstered demonstration of sloganeering marchers under a blizzard of confetti showered by supporters in surrounding office buildings.

"I sincerely believe, as God is my

witness, that we will prevail," Laurel said.

"Marcos has the guns, goons and gold. But without popular support no government can endure. We will be here every day," he said.

He said another anti-government demonstration will take place Friday and protests would continue until Marcos was driven from office.

Missile talk breakthrough unlikely

GENEVA, Switzerland (UPI) — U.S. and Soviet negotiators resumed strategic arms negotiations Thursday but officials said there was almost no chance of an early breakthrough on reducing the number of nuclear missiles.

Chief U.S. negotiator Edward Rowley met with Soviet chief delegate Viktor Karpov and other U.S. and Soviet officials for two hours and 50 minutes, ending an almost two-month recess in the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks.

The two sides agreed to meet again next Tuesday.

Romy, a retired army general, said earlier the most that could be

expected from the latest round of negotiations was a "narrowing of differences." He said an agreement before Christmas was "just not in the cards."

Western officials said privately the superpowers were far apart even on deciding what kind of weapons should be included in the negotiations.

The START negotiations are closely linked to the stalled Intermediate-Range Nuclear Forces Talks on limiting medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe.

Moscow has warned that Western deployment of 572 new missiles in Europe in December will directly

affect the talks on long-range strategic weapons.

Soviet negotiators consider America's new medium-range cruise and Pershing-2 missiles "an extension" of U.S. intercontinental strike capabilities, one U.S. negotiator said.

Rowley met privately with Karpov Wednesday to present a new START proposal.

Eight die in India terrorism

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) — Anti-Hindu extremists have killed eight people in northern India's Punjab state in separate attacks on a bus and a train, police said Thursday.

Officers blamed the killings late Wednesday night on extremists members of the Sikh religion fighting for autonomy in Punjab state, where they outnumber Hindus.

Police said two Sikhs with a machine gun hijacked a New Delhi-bound bus near the Sikh holy city of Amritsar and picked out six Hindus from the 25 people on board.

"The two extremists asked the passengers to get down from the bus and then gunned down six of them and seriously injured another," police said.

In another incident, three Sikh extremists attacked the Calcutta-Amritsar express train and killed two people in a riotous clash on a train board a crowded second-class car, police said.

One of those killed was a Sikh policeman and the other an income tax inspector, officers said. Five others were wounded.

Terrified passengers jumped off the moving train to escape the gunfire, witnesses said.

The attackers escaped when the train slowed down at a signal crossing near Amritsar.

Prime Minister Indira Gandhi met with top Punjab officials to order an investigation of the killings and a review of the state of security situation in the Punjab.

Strike settled at U.S. bases

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — U.S. and Filipino officials Thursday signed an agreement ending a 4-day-old strike by 22,000 civilian workers at America's largest overseas military bases.

The agreement was signed by U.S. Lt. Gen. Dickson Smith, commander of Subic Bay Naval Base, and Bobby Flores, president of the Filipino Civilian Employees Association.

Officials said the Filipino workers at five vital U.S. bases, including Subic base and Clark Air Force Base, were expected to return to work Friday.

Under the agreement, the United States will carry out a new wage survey of 36 Philippine companies to

come up with comparable pay rates for the base workers.

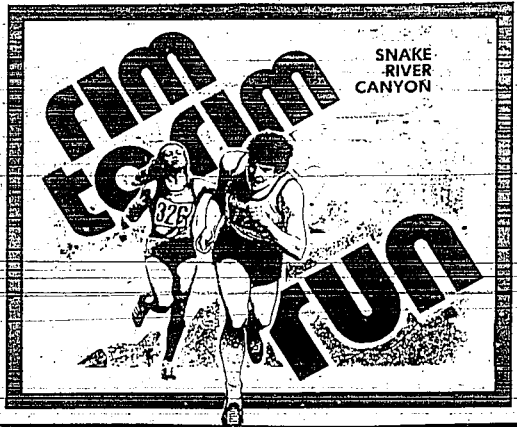
Union officials had disputed an earlier wage survey under which American officials offered pay hikes of 4.5 percent for laborers and 6.1 percent for supervisory personnel.

The new wage survey could increase the workers' paychecks by an additional 1 percent or more, officials said.

The Filipinos had demanded a pay hike of between 10 and 13 percent, claiming Wednesday's 2.14 percent devaluation of the Philippine peso wiped out any gains offered by the Americans.

Under the new agreement, Filipino base workers will also receive a \$5.35 monthly cost-of-living allowance.

General: Nuclear annihilation a 'myth'

BOISE — A retired general said Thursday the United States should suspend all arms-control negotiations with the Soviet Union and embark on a massive weapons buildup that would include preparations for a "winnable" nuclear war.

Former Army Brig. Gen. Andrew Gatsis said a U.S. boycott of arms-control talks would prevent the Soviet Union from scoring further gains with its "masquerade of peace" and free America to shore up its military capabilities.

Gatsis, at a news conference sponsored by the John Birch Society,

said the United States could pay for blockbuster defense projects by cutting off billions of dollars in economic aid to unfriendly foreign nations.

And he said nuclear war would not be as cataclysmic as predicted by nuclear-freeze advocates.

"Absolutely, nuclear war is winnable and survivable," he said. "I'm not saying there won't be destruction. There's always destruction in war."

But the West Point graduate added the United States could limit casualties by bolstering its defense systems. He did not advocate a first-strike nuclear attack at the Soviet Union.

Gatsis said "paceniks" and "freezies," aided by the news media,

have played into the hands of Soviet strategists by portraying nuclear war as the ultimate disaster.

"This fear, this scaring people out of their wits that there would be incineration and no civilization, that's a myth in itself," he said. "You're going to have misses, malfunctions, failures, failures in command. There is no absolute weapons system."

Gatsis and John Birch Society officials said they were scheduling a series of public speeches in an effort to inform the public that the United States must quit talking to the Soviet Union and improve U.S. defenses before the Soviets "enslave us."

"We're trying to get the people to put pressure on the congressmen and

senators," the general said. "But it's difficult to get that because you can't get through the news media." The news media puts out the wrong philosophy.

Advocates of a nuclear freeze and news organizations, who give "slanted" reports about the dangers of nuclear war and U.S. and Soviet defense systems are essentially doing the work of Soviet propagandists, he said.

The general said the Soviet Union wants the West to embrace a nuclear freeze because the Soviets are now ahead in the arms race and want to stop development by the United States while gradually increasing their strategic power.

Immigrant sentenced to die for leading the murder of 13

SEATTLE (UPI) — Hong Kong immigrant Kwan Fai "Willie" Mak was sentenced to die Thursday by hanging, or lethal injection for the slayings of 13 people in a Chinatown gambling den.

After deliberating 1 1/2 hours, the jury of six men and six women agreed with prosecutors that Mak's crime " screams out for the death penalty as proper punishment " and said it could find no mitigating circumstances to spare his life.

Mak, as he had throughout the 3 1/2-week trial, displayed little emotion. Several members of the jury gazed at Mak as they individually affirmed the death verdict.

Mak, 27, was convicted Wednesday of 13 counts of premeditated first-degree murder for the Feb. 19 killings at the Wah Mee gambling club after the jurors deliberated for seven hours.

King County Superior Court Judge

Frank Howard, who presided over the trials of Mak and co-defendant Benjamin Ng, will formally sentence Mak to die. His clerk said Howard would set the date of sentencing in the next few days.

Ng, 29, who also was convicted of the mass murders but spared the death penalty, will be formally sentenced to life in prison without possibility of parole on Oct. 25.

The two convicted killers and a third man, Tony Ng, 26, who is still at large, were charged with pulling guns inside the high-stakes gambling club, tying up patrons and employees, robbing them and then methodically shooting them in the back of the head.

Ng and Mak were identified as the killers by Wal Chin, 62, who survived the massacre despite gunshot wounds in the neck and jaw. Chin, the key prosecution witness at both trials, will be freed from police protective custody Friday.

Watt issue hits congressmen

BOISE (UPI) — An unsuccessful candidate for the U.S. House says Idaho's congressional delegation has failed to represent state residents by refusing to join a bipartisan effort to oust Interior Secretary James Watt.

"I have been very frustrated over the past week that our delegation has been sitting on its hands and remaining silent on this question," Larry LaRocco said Thursday.

La Rocco, a Democrat, lost a bid in 1982 to unseat GOP Rep. Larry Craig. He said there is "still a 50-50 chance" he will challenge Craig again in 1984.

"but a final decision won't be made until the first of the year."

The Boise investment broker said Idaho's all-Republican delegation should join other party members on Capitol Hill in support of a resolution calling for the resignation of Watt because of a comment the secretary made at a speaking engagement several weeks ago.

Watt told a group an advisory panel on coal leasing was comprised of "a black, a woman, two Jews and a cripple."

The Interior chief later apologized for his remark.

WPPSS study starts at end

SEATTLE (UPI) — A study of what caused the financial disaster of the Washington Public Power Supply System has been outlined by the U.S. Department of Energy, but lists its conclusions before it begins.

Many of the conclusions listed are about Northwest energy-demand forecasts, which led to WPPSS' undertaking construction of five nuclear power plants in Washington state.

The federal Bonneville Power Administration and Northwest utilities predicted in the late 1970s that the region's electrical use would rise annually at 6 percent.

But growth predictions have since fallen to 1.6 percent annually. Coupled with that news and huge cost overruns, WPPSS eventually canceled or postponed four of its five plants.

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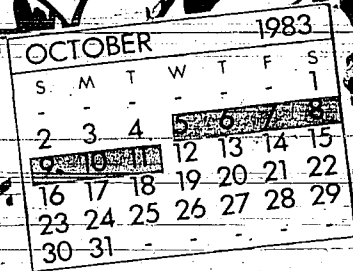
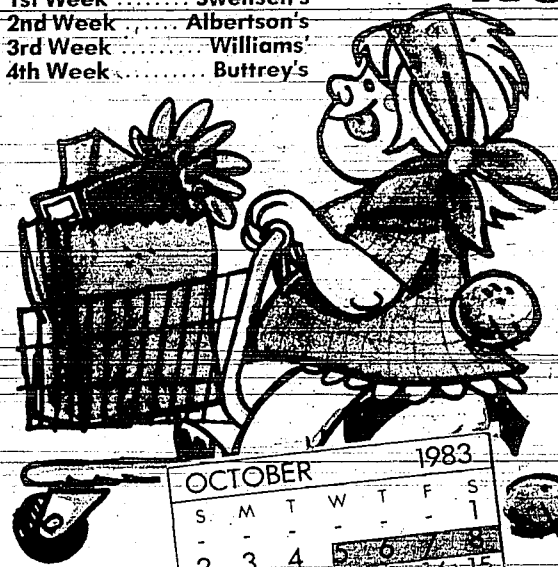

Mostly undeveloped Thermal well raises dander

TWIN FALLS — The pool that is fed by a torrent of hot water cascading out of the geothermal well in the Blue Lakes area of the Snake River Canyon makes a great place to take a bath and grab a quick shave.

But fish production — not bathing — was the reason that the state Water Resources Department gave the well's original owner permission to tap some 2,700 gallons of water per minute from deep within the Snake River Aquifer.

A tour of two ponds fed by the well reveals little evidence of commercial fish production.

The ponds, located on grounds now owned by the Aqua-Life Corp., are populated by only a smattering of tiny guppy-like fish, medium-sized yellow fish and a few catfish.

The only commercial concentration of fish appear to be the trout swimming in a series of nearby ponds, fed by cool spring water.

Aqua-Life is principally owned by Ken Ellis, a major Magic Valley fish producer who has declared bankruptcy. Ellis failed to respond to repeated phone calls from the Times-News requesting comment on the status of the well.

The Aqua-Life well is approximately the same size as the College of Southern Idaho's geothermal well that is used to heat the Shields Building and a vocational education annex. The CSI well also is under consideration as a possible heat source for the Taylor Administration Building and a proposed Twin Falls municipal swimming pool.

sources officials fear that the Twin Falls-area aquifer already may have reached the point where the aquifer pressure may not be sufficient to support both new development and maintain flows at current wells.

Loren Holmes, a Twin Falls-based state Water Resources Department official, says his department will conduct a study of the aquifer area to determine whether it is necessary to establish a management area to regulate its development.

The idea of restricting new development while Ellis's well continues to operate at full-throttle does not sit well with Gene Walker, a driller who helped develop the Canyon Springs Country Club geothermal well.

"It's hard to buy the idea of restricted drilling when you are wasting that much water," he says.

But shutting down the Ellis well, or even modifying its flow, is not an easy or inexpensive proposition.

"I told the well owners a couple of times that we wanted to shut it down (to test its effect on pressure), and they told us, 'Don't do it because we're afraid it will blow right out of the ground,'" Holmes says.

According to the Holmes, the Aqua-Life well, which received its state water permit in 1972, was one of the first geothermal wells drilled into the Twin Falls-area aquifer.

Charles Brockway, a water specialist at the Snake River Research Center in Kimberly, says, "The way the well is constructed, when you try to shut it off, the high pressure causes it to shake, rattle and roll. And the ground vibrates."

Brockway says that the well casing is not constructed to state standards, which require that its metal casing be cemented together.

Two other area geothermal wells, developed by the College of Southern Idaho and Joe McCollum, both have cemented casings and can be regulated or even turned off, if necessary, Brockway says.

A casual inspection of the Ellis well does not inspire confidence in its construction or in the way it has been maintained.

A pressure gauge that should be screwed into its top lies rusting on a cracked concrete foundation. The well has small leaks in several places, and its top is coated with a thin layer of slimy growth.

Lopez was struck by a pickup truck on Falls Avenue on Sept. 21. The boy died later that day at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

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Over pay dispute
Teacher wins court ruling
BOISE (UPI) — A former Mindoka County school instructor is entitled to extra pay for having to teach more than the required five class periods a day, the Idaho Supreme Court has ruled.
 In a 3-2 decision on Thursday, the justices said that W. Monte Robinson was entitled to a 10 percent pay raise for teaching six class periods during the 1978-79 school year.

 However, dissenting Justice Allan Shepard said Robinson had taught only 45 students in his six vocational-education classes and did not necessarily deserve a 10 percent pay boost, particularly since he had signed a contract that did not include a provision for extra compensation.
 Robinson claimed he did not notice the contract provision requiring him to teach six classes.
 The teacher originally won a judgment in Mindoka County Magistrate Court, but Fifth District Judge George Granata overturned that decision. The Supreme Court ruling reinstates the first action.
 The school district includes Mindoka County and parts of Cassia, Jerome and Lincoln counties.
 The majority ruling was written by Justice Stephen Blistine, said Robinson was entitled to the extra pay because the school district had established the policy for five other teachers in 1973, and in almost all cases, it had paid the bonus to teachers who exceeded their minimum responsibilities.
 The school district had claimed its 1973 decision had not established a district-wide policy, but the majority ruled that the minutes of the meeting did not clearly state what had happened.
 In a "specially concurring" opinion, Justice Robert Bakes said the majority opinion should not be interpreted to mean that a school board's action is void unless the action, as specified in the meeting minutes.

Courtney: One that got away

POCATELLO — When Matt Courtney came with Dave Kragthorpe to Idaho State University 3½ years ago, there was no need for Matt Courtney in the Big Sky Conference.

But that was 3½ years ago. "There were good defensive backs playing in the Big Sky Conference before, but you never saw much of them," says Randy Stewart, a graduate assistant who coaches receivers at Boise State. "Until 1980, this was a running conference. Now the pressure is on them, and they're making the big plays. It stands to reason that as the passing offenses get better, the defense has to get better too."

Courtney, now a senior cornerback at ISU, is the personification of the changes that Kragthorpe — and later Idaho's Dennis Erickson and Weber State's Mike Price — wrought in the Big Sky. First-team all-conference as a sophomore, second-team all-league last year, he is generating the kind of excitement among professional scouts that Boise State's Ricke Woods — now of the Pittsburgh Steelers — did two years ago. In four games this season, Courtney has 25 tackles, three interceptions and eight pass deflections. He has also returned 13 punts for 152 yards and a touchdown of 65 yards.

"Guys who have the physical tools that Courtney has and who understand offenses and can read them are hard to find," says Erickson. "You really have to go out and look for them, because if you have a guy back there who blows his coverage you're going to get killed in this conference."

"When you're evaluating a cornerback, you look for discipline," says Stewart. "You look for a guy who has the physical tools that Courtney has and who understand offenses and can read them are hard to find."

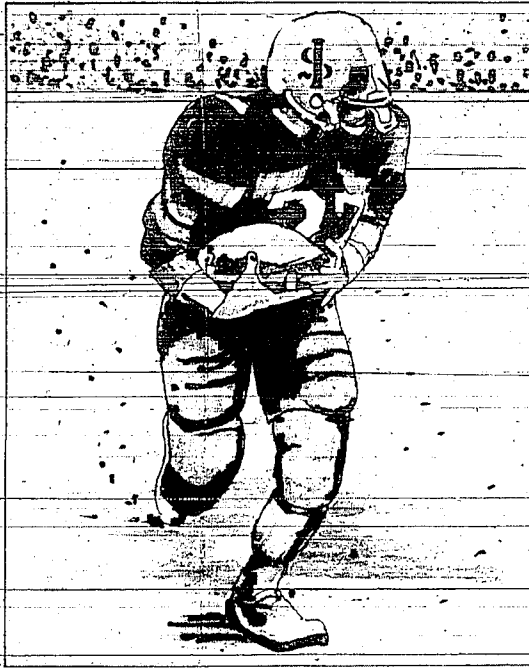

Arapahoe, Colo., passed over by the major colleges that recruit the Denver area because of a sprained ankle in his senior year. Courtney unquestionably has the chemistry to be a good defensive back, that of being the Good All-Around Athlete. But not all GAAAs make good cornerbacks.

"Then he's got phenomenal vertical leaping ability, a 26- or 28-inch vertical jump, which is incredible for a guy 5-10. He's got quick feet and he's strong but I think most importantly he's smart. He can think on his feet. That's why you don't see him get burned very often on the blitz."

The thinking defensive back is important in the Big Sky because the pass offenses in the league are so sophisticated. It's not enough for the defense to react, it must anticipate what's going to happen and disguise its intentions.

"You have to be versatile, which is probably Courtney's biggest asset," says Montana State defensive coordinator Ed Schmidt. "You're not going to be able to

the same things defensively from week to week because you're going to see completely different types of offenses when you play Idaho than when you play Boise State. "For a defensive back, you can't just play man and you can't just play zone. You have to be able to do it all."

Courtney can do it all, but he hasn't always done so. "Moller thinks Courtney has gone a long way toward solving that problem this fall."

"This year he's playing hard on every down," says his coach. "Last year he played a lot of very good downs, but not as well on others."

"Last year we took it for granted," says Courtney of the Bengals' 3-8 season and his own off-year. "We weren't working as hard as we should have been. This year we know physically that we have the potential of being a good team. It's just a question of playing tough mentally."

Boddicker rescues O's again

BALTIMORE — With Mike Boddicker silencing the Chicago White Sox's guns and Gary Roenecke supplying the artillery, the Baltimore Orioles proved the American League playoffs will be a battle after all.

Boddicker had a record-tying 14 strikeouts and Roenecke hit a two-run homer Thursday night, enabling the Orioles to blank the White Sox 4-0 and even the series at one victory apiece.

"He had command of his stuff all night long," said Chicago manager Tony LaRussa. "He didn't give us much to hit. It's a two-of-three series now. We're happy with a split. But we would have liked a sweep after winning the first. Boddicker pitched well and Roenecke broke our back."

"I threw curve balls all night,"

said Boddicker, who relaxed himself before the game by playing a video game. "It's just a regular curve ball. I just changed speeds. Right now I'm ready to go to Chicago and start there. I'm grateful to get a chance."

"It certainly was a gutsy performance," said Baltimore manager Joe Altobelli. "It was his sixth shutout and it couldn't have come at a better time. We just tried to play the best game that we possibly could not only because of our situation but because of the great fans."

The victory was particularly satisfying for Roenecke. "I was thinking of this game a lot," he said. "It was on my mind. I'm glad the way it turned out because I've been struggling."

Boddicker, the rookie right-hander who helped rescue Baltimore's rotation this season, pitched a five-hitter and Roenecke

in addition to his homer in the sixth inning, doubled, walked twice and scored three runs to send the playoffs to Chicago for the rest of the best-of-five series.

Boddicker's strikeout total tied the AL playoff record set by Detroit's Joe Coleman in 1972. It also represented a season-high for Boddicker.

The White Sox will send Richard Dotson, 22, against Orioles left-hander Mike Flanagan, 24, in the first, postseason game in Chicago since 1969.

A 26-year-old native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, who was thrust into the rotation because of injuries to the Orioles' staff, Boddicker finished with a 16-8 record and a 2.77 ERA. He kept the White Sox off balance with a sharp breaking ball and a crafty mixture of pitches.

Before a Memorial Stadium crowd of 52,347, Boddicker pitched

with all the effectiveness that Lamar Hoyt did for the White Sox on Wednesday. He struck out two batters in the first, second, fourth, fifth, eighth innings and allowed only two hits until the eighth. He walked three and never faced more than four batters in an inning until the eighth and ninth when he began to tire.

Boddicker's strikeout victims included Harold Baines and Julio Cruz three times each and Carlton Fisk and Vance Law twice apiece. He ended the fourth inning with a flourish, nailing Tom Paclerek with a sidearm breaking pitch.

Boddicker, who became a regular starter when Flanagan sustained ligament damage in his left knee, hurled a five-hit shutout in May against Chicago for his first major-league complete game. He led the AL with five shutouts and was second on the staff in

NCAA confronted by rash of lawsuits by transfers, redshirts ruled ineligible

SAN FRANCISCO — Jaymes Benson came to the University of California from Mesa Junior College with high hopes of becoming a starting inside linebacker for the Golden Bears.

He had the size, speed and desire to make a strong impression upon the coaching staff.

But things just didn't work out.

During spring practice in 1981, Benson injured his knee and underwent reconstructive surgery. He battled his way back into shape and was able to play at the end of the season.

But things just didn't work out. Benson's suit has yet to be ruled on by the U.S. District Court in San Francisco but if it follows the national trend, he'll likely lose.

"We don't lose many," Gangwere said. "Our (NCAA) rules are based on reason and the desire for the member universities to accomplish their purposes."

Benson is not the only player in the country who has sought out a lawyer to fight for his right to play.

In New Orleans, Tulane quarterback Jon English has sought for and won a temporary restraining order allowing him to play.

English had been declared ineligible for this season by the NCAA because he is required by association rules to sit out a year after transferring from one member university to another.

The Green Wave quarterback started his career at Michigan State then transferred to Iowa State and sat out the required year. This year, he transferred to Tulane.

English's suit contends that he does not have to sit out another season because he sat out one year at Iowa State.

Ultimately, the Louisiana Supreme Court may be called in to rule on the case and the big loser is likely to become Tulane because the university could be forced to forfeit the contests English has played in and give up the money it has received in television rights for any of those games.

"I think a lot of these players find a court that is lenient about issuing restraining orders," Gangwere said. "They are ruled ineligible and go out and get a lawyer. Suddenly, they have a court order which says they can play."

In the past, Gangwere said, most of those orders have been later overruled.

"They are just thinking about themselves," the NCAA attorney said. "They don't think about what the impact of their action is going to be on their school."

Only one has to look at this year's University of Arizona squad to see how great an impact the actions of a departed group of athletes and coaches can have on a school's future.

Landry said he was not optimistic that wide receiver Tony Hill would return this week since Hill is still bothered by a sprained foot. Hill has missed the last two Dallas games.

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Stillwater could run deep for UN

Nebraska is cruising along at a 58 clip and would like to speed up the tempo en route to a national college football championship.

The Cornhuskers, a unanimous choice as the country's No. 1 team the last two weeks, should receive their steadiest test of the season Saturday when they meet Big Eight rival Oklahoma State, ranked 20th in the nation and also unbeaten.

Nebraska averaged 58 points a game in beating Penn State, Wyoming, Minnesota, UCLA and Syracuse, but now encounters a Cowboy team that only yielded an average of 11 points in trouncing North Texas State, Cincinnati, Texas A&M and Tulsa. The Huskers ran up their biggest total of the year in an 84-13 mauling of Minnesota, while Oklahoma State's best production was in a 34-15 win over A&M.

"We haven't had to struggle through four quarters yet," admits Nebraska coach Tom Osborne, who has an early jump on his second 100 career victory goal. "Most of our starting players haven't even been playing in a fourth quarter and the few that have have only been in for a couple plays. None of our players have had to go out there and play 75-80 consecutive offensive or defensive plays."

Osborne is thankful for Nebraska's depth, especially since his lineup against Oklahoma State in their conference opener will not include starting offensive tackle John Sherlock and reserve split end Scott Schoet-

lger, both of whom suffered sprained knees in last Saturday's 63-7 win over Syracuse.

Returning for Osborne after missing the Syracuse game because of injuries are starting left defensive tackle Mike Keeler and reserve fullback Tom Rathman.

One other matchup in the top 20 is the game between No. 7 ranked Texas and seventh-ranked Oklahoma. Texas is 3-0 and Oklahoma 3-1 that includes a loss to Ohio State.

Sooner coach Barry Switzer is concerned over the health of Marcus Dupree after his top running back suffered a bruised knee in the Ohio State game. A bright note for Oklahoma, though, is the fact Dupree rattled Kansas State defenses last week for 151 yards.

"Marcus Dupree isn't the same back he was at this time last year," says Switzer. "He hasn't practiced, he is not conditioned and he is hurting. He doesn't have the quickness he had at this time last year."

Sculptor picks Shoshone to live and work

SHOSHONE — Sagebrush and fine cotton in the lava desert. Internationally known artist-craftsman Chris Christopherson, a Magic Valley native, is now living and sculpting in Shoshone.

Christopherson spent his early youth in a log cabin on the Little Snake River north of Fairfield, attended school in Gooding and Bliss, and graduated from Boise Junior College. He returned to the Magic Valley 13 months ago.

A prolific artisan, he describes himself as a problem student who was often in trouble for drawing in class.

Christopherson has a workshop and showroom in Shoshone, where people can see his work and meet the artist.

"What is fine art depends on who you are talking to," he says thoughtfully and points out that the hardwood, stone and metal combination sculptures of sea birds, cattails, roses and other plants on display at his shop are often described as "interior decorating pieces."

He says he does large sculptures, bronze castings and electro-formed pieces as well, and has examples of his work in collections around the world.

His wood and rock pieces are popular with the public and he says he has good success with the waterfalls he constructs.

The one on display in his showroom features metal calla leaves that fill with water and then tip forward to pour the water to the next level. The intricately moving waterfall is set in a rock sculpture.

He works in exotic hardwood, various rocks, bronze, copper, silver and nickel, and indicates he expects to incorporate Idaho's native stone, lava rock, into his work.

Area residents should appreciate a couple of small copper sculptures on display that suggest wind in the grass.

"Each piece is done by hand and each is always different from any other," he explains. He uses hand tools, welding and soldering.

At present, he is sculpting two

American bison in metal. "When I am satisfied with the original, I will produce copies in limited edition for sale, and keep the original," he said.

He also indicates he plans to do more regional pieces with local wildlife and pine trees.

Christopherson worked for 20 years in California as a medical products

researcher, specifically a master mold maker, designer and sculptor.

During that time he learned some of the techniques of electroforming, a process for creating shapes in metal using electricity and chemistry. He has adopted this process for his art.

"It is the versatility of the process that makes it exciting and fascinating," he says with excited intensity.

"The accuracy and intricate detail possible with this process is incredible."

Another obvious benefit of electroforming is that the sculptures are not heavy.

"Cast bronze is a time honored sculpturing process but the pieces can be extremely heavy and expensive."

With electroform, Christopherson

can create sculptured wall hangings which he integrates with other materials because they only weigh a few ounces.

"It makes shipping my work much easier," he says with a smile.

Christopherson says "producing is number one for me. I must produce," and that need is one of the reasons that he came to Shoshone. "It's a

quiet friendly town where I can work and still be close enough to my material, suppliers and markets."

He also says he enjoys being able to hunt and fish. "I went fishing this summer for the first time in 25 years."

Shoshone's resident sculptor travels to art shows and sales throughout the West but can often be found at his shop in the old city firehouse.

And not since Neil Diamond in "The Jazz Singer" has a leading man led a movie nowhere.

To these epics of bad moviemaking has been added a new achievement. "Easy Money" starring Rodney Dangerfield.

Dangerfield convincingly plays a polyester-clad slob named Monty. A foul-mouthed, gambling drinker, Monty is a baby photographer no less but that's not the least incredulous aspect to this turkey.

In order to receive millions left to his wife in the will of his uptown mother-in-law, Monty must lose weight and stop all his vices.

It's a struggle for Monty who takes on the challenge for the sake of his family, which consists of a sickly sweet wife; money-grubbing daughter and another newly-married daughter whose honeymoon with a badly-stereotyped Latino was a flop.

He receives no help from his friends, who keep doing all the things he can't do right in front of him.

Such is the plot. With his incessant twang and buggy-eyes, comic Dangerfield can be funny in small doses when he does his

"I get no respect!" neurotic. He wins a small role as an anonymous, low-class entrepreneur in a bit part in "Caddyshock." He even is funny in the beer commercials running during the football games.

But for 90 minutes? Rodney becomes as stale as the leftover beer he peddles.

Dangerfield, who co-wrote the script, is heads above the supporting players. Geraldine Fitzgerald in her grand dame role as the mother-in-law is the same old whiny mother-in-law character seen in every unimaginative comedy.

Joe Pesci is the biggest disappointment. As Robert DeNiro's brother in "Raging Bull," Pesci was a fireball. In "Easy Money," he plays the same tough Italian character, only watered down to the point of embarrassment.

"Easy Money" is not meant to be sophisticated satire or comedy. But, it doesn't even succeed on the sex, dirty-language and slob-humor level.

The only sequence that brings a smile is the fashion show based on Monty's garish "regular guy" look. Its a neat farce of high fashion.

For this whole movie, Rodney doesn't deserve any respect.

Book focuses on settling the West

Benjamin Franklin Parker led the kind-of-life many small-boys dream about, but will never experience beyond old "Guns-moke" reruns.

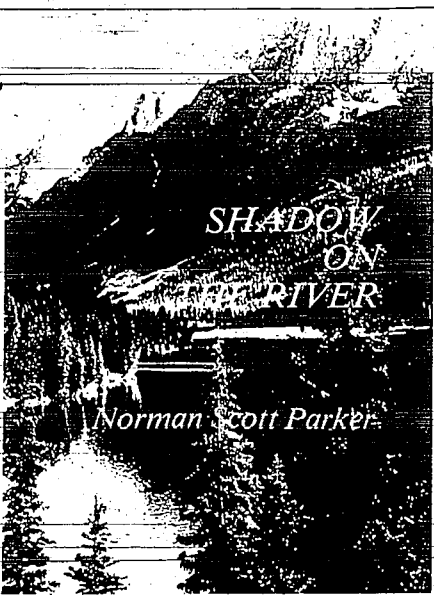
In the recently published "Shadow on the River," the long-time Gooding resident's adventures are chronicled by his adopted son from his 1876 trip west in a covered wagon until he settled down in Idaho with a mail-order bride.

Author Norman Scott Parker concentrates much of the book on the good and not-so-good people Parker met as a frontiersman and pioneer along the way. And he describes the physical hardships of settling the West.

As a teen-ager, Parker watched helplessly from shore as his father and brother drowned in the Rio Grande. A short time later, his mother died from consumption, and Parker set out on his own to try life as a boxer and miner.

But the novelty of living in small mining towns, like Cripple Creek and Leadville, Colo., filled with outlaws, con men and gamblers soon wore thin.

After "Norman" Scott Parker headed for Victor, Idaho, a town purported to be more civilized. Widely known as the "Bachelor Kid" in the late 1890s and early 1900s, Parker won a reputation as a proficient boxer, not only in Victor, Driggs, and Rexburg, but throughout the western states. His bouts and the primitive ring

conditions of the time are graphically described in the book.

Parker's next career as a freight hauler from Victor to Jackson Hole, Wyo., was no less dangerous. He never knew when he might be attacked by outlaws or hostile Indians.

Parker later moved to Jerome and then Gooding. In 1915, a respectable Gooding resident, he sent for a mail-order bride from St. Louis and promptly married her. According to the author, Parker

spent the rest of his life reckoning with the former milliner's "city ways" and trying to curb what he perceived to be her "impulsiveness and acquisitiveness."

Beside its colorful stories, "Shadow on the River" is noteworthy for its historical look at life in Gooding, Jerome, Shoshone, Twin Falls and many other Idaho towns.

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Author shouldn't have revived Huckleberry

Greg Matthews may have learned all he knew from Mark Twain, but he didn't learn all that Twain knew. His book, "The Further Adventures of Huckleberry Finn" (Crown, \$15.95), proves that.

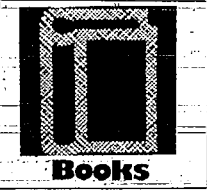
It's an odd and in the end a dismal book, an ill-assorted melange of Twain, Horatio Alger and Amos 'n' Andy.

Matthews, a young Australian writer, set himself a most difficult task: to continue the story of Huck and Jim beyond the end of "Huckleberry Finn." Huck, it will be remembered, ends Twain's novel by saying, "But Jackson got to light out for the Territory ahead of the rest, because Aunt Sally she's going to adopt me and civilize me and I can't stand it, I been there before."

"The Further Adventures" picks up our two heroes and chronicles their adventures in a long flight across the West to California after Huck is accused of murdering Judge Thatcher. The stage for all this is set when Huck's Pap is revealed not to have died at all, but to be alive and up to his villainous old tricks.

The mechanics are irrelevant. Huck and Jim flee, as they had done in Twain's novel, and the flight becomes the story, as do Huck's observations, experiences and assessments.

Twain tried several times to write a

sequel. He never succeeded, and the various efforts, including one long fragment titled "Tom and Huck Among the Indians," are eloquent testimony that Twain had outgrown Huck, that the writer had used his subject effectively and completely. "Huckleberry Finn" is, despite its flaws, an undeniably great novel, touching and alive: its characters are believable and engaging. The language and the point of view combine, through a stunning use of irony, to give us an effortless and inclusive view of American river society in the 1840s.

"The Further Adventures" doesn't work very well because it lacks the originality of the prototype, because it is formulaic rather than free, and because its very inventiveness is shackled and embodies a straining aftereffect that is in dismal contrast to the seemingly effortless ease of the original.

Matthews might well have written a good picaresque novel, comparable perhaps to "True Grit." Instead he has forged a new definition of "derivative."

The author imprisoned himself with a series of rigid constraints. There's a lot of Huckleberry Finn in his book. He tries, for example, to replicate Huck's original series of deleted autobiographies, the dismal little tales of catastrophe Huck makes up on the spur of the moment to explain his presence, to get out of a tight spot, or to buy time. In Matthews' book these are devices rather than leitmotifs.

Matthews is inventive, almost obsessively so, and one must admire the fast pace, the rapid flow of incident. At the same time, his choice of a framework and characters make it impossible to judge the work on its own merits. One finds oneself comparing his achievement to Twain's, and every comparison leaves Matthews a distant second.

One hears the echoes of the original, and one wishes for the sound of the copy. When all is said and done, Matthews just doesn't have much of an ear for dialogue or dialect. "The Further Adventures" has a consistently forced tone, an allited artificiality of dialect and a strained quality that turns humor to buffoonery. It is melodrama, not adventure; slapstick, not comedy.

The structure of the novel, the flight across the country, is reminiscent of the original, but lacks the organizing focus of the river and the raft. The flight across the West becomes mere aimless wandering, even though some of it, particularly the desert scenes, is well-presented. The flight is punctuated by Huck's periodic meetings with the resurrected Pap, and with the Bloodhound, a detective who has been hired to bring him to justice. Huck and Jim have lots of narrow escapes, and eventually things work out for them.

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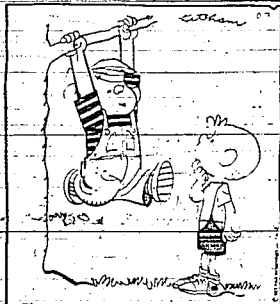

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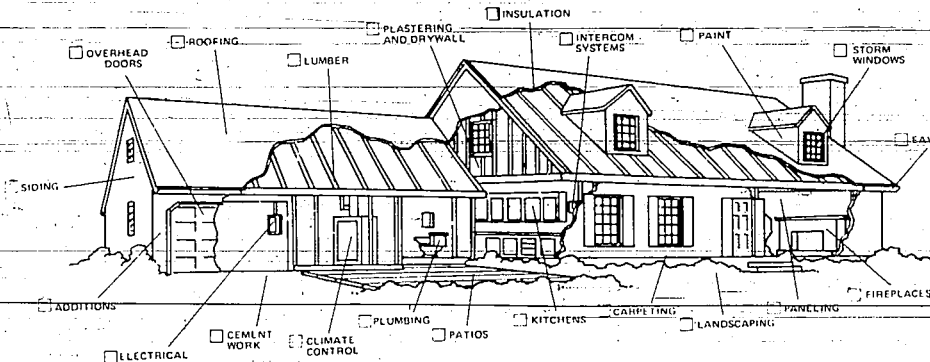
