Aid to rebels killed

Reagan loses

WASHINGTON — The House, warned that the United States is "heading straight for war" in Central America, Thursday rejected Reagan administration appeals and voted to stop CIA aid to rebels battling Nicaragua's Marxist-led regime.

By a vote of 277-194, the House approved a Democratic amendment ordering a cutoff of funds for the anti-Sandinista forces.

The roll call went generally along party lines, with only 18 Republicans voting with the Democratic majority.

The amendment to the intelligence authorization bill is identical to a bill that was approved by the House, 228-195, in July but ignored by the Republican-controlled Senate.

The latest vote ensures that the issue will be dealt with by a House-Senate conference committee.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said: "The vote today was not unexpected. We knew it would be a difficult vote. We think we will do well in the Senate. We think our position will be upheld in the Senate and we hope our differences will be worked out in conference."

House passage of the amendment followed warnings by Democrats that the CIA-sponsored covert activity threatens to expand the conflict in Central America.

"The situation has never been worse," said Rep. Michael Barnes, D-Md., "We are heading straight for war."

Won't file disclosure Senators help Hansen's fund

WASHINGTON — Idaho Senator Steve Symms has joined with other conservative Republican senators in a fund-raising effort aimed at bolstering Idaho Congressman George Hansen's legal defense fund.

Hansen, who was indicted last spring by a federal grand jury on four counts of filing false financial disclosure reports, is mounting a legal challenge to those charges, being brought against him by the U.S. Department of Justice in a Washington, D.C. district court. He is asking the U.S. Supreme Court to intervene in the case and dismiss the charges.

It was revealed Thursday that the Idaho congressman also is not filing an income statement for 1982 — at least until some decision is made on the four outstanding charges.

Meanwhile, Symms's office confirmed a report contained in Thursday's Wall Street Journal that the Senator had signed the fund-raising letter along with Sens. Paul Laxalt, R-Nev.; Jesse Helms, R-N.C.; Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz.; and Orin Hatch, R-Utah. "The letter seeks donations to help George defend his right, to represent the American people with a free and independent voice," the newspaper reported.

Neither Symms's office, Hansen's office, nor Bill Barlow of Pocatello, the chairman of Hansen's legal defense fund committee, would make a copy of the letter public.

The Wall Street Journal article also stated: "House officials say the Idaho Republican is the only member who has flatly refused to file such a statement since the annual filings were required by the Ethics in Government Act of 1976 (which Mr. Hansen defied against)."

James McKenna, a Hansen spokesman, told the Times-News that Hansen has been granted an extension by the House Standards and Official Conduct Committee on his 1982 disclosure report until his pending case is resolved. If Hansen were to file the

report in the manner he has in the past, the Department of Justice could bring a fifth count of filing false reports against the congressman, McKenna said.

If Hansen were to file the reports in the manner the Department of Justice contends is correct, the congressman would be admitting guilt, McKenna adds.

John Davison, a staff member for the House standards committee, declined to confirm or deny McKenna's claim, that Hansen had been granted an extension. He said "extensions are routinely granted. But generally all the committee activity is conducted in executive session."

The Wall Street Journal story and earlier filings with the Idaho Secretary of State show outstanding debts of \$28,206.21 from Hansen's 1982 reelection campaign.

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Former missile commander says wastes drip from old silo

BOISE — The former commander of an Idaho missile complex now used as a hazardous waste dump says design of the concrete silos makes it likely toxic chemicals are dripping into the ground, threatening nearby water supplies.

And a former contractor who worked at the Owyhee County installation says "corrosive water from an artesian well on the site may have mixed with the volatile buried chemicals.

The silos were not fitted with protective liners, state and federal officials say, adding tests have not been completed to determine whether the structures are leaking.

Retired Lt. Col. Oscar Herrmann said Thursday the design of the abandoned Titan Missile silos near Bruneau and Grand View in southern Idaho leads him to believe chemicals stored inside are seeping through sealant at the bases of the 160-foot-deep structures.

Herrmann, of Boise, and former Maple Valley subcontractor Dick Stapleman said they believe leakage from the silos and an artesian well at Grand View may be creating

a pool under the missile complex that could seep through the earth toward nearby ranches and drinking water sources.

And Herrmann said the slowly growing pool may be the reason recent test wells have hit water at a level about 2,000 feet higher than the documented groundwater level.

"What the hell is going on out there?" said Owyhee County Prosecutor Clayton Anderson. "And what are they (state and federal officials) doing about it?"

Environmental Protection Agency spokesman Steve Provant said he could not comment on possible contamination until his

agency and the current site owner, Environsafe Services of Idaho, drill additional wells.

"I've heard a lot of statements similar to the one you're making, but we just have to take this one step at a time... before we make a statement," Provant told UPI.

Practices at the Grand View site have sparked controversy recently with Owyhee County officials "demanding better management and more stringent government monitoring."

The three silos at Grand View were fitted with pesticides and industrial chemicals and capped before Environsafe bought the site from

Wes-Cor and re-opened the facility in 1981.

The three silos at Bruneau are not completely filled, and EPA has given Environsafe preliminary approval to continue using the concrete structures for hazardous waste dumping, Provant said.

Both sites also are operating under state permits, Provant said.

He said none of the six silos have been fitted with liners that could help prevent the alleged leakage through the sealant, which is used to avoid cracking along the silos' floors and walls.

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Prison suits could end in state losing control

BOISE — Idaho's prison system is in danger of being placed under the supervision of a federal court to relieve overcrowding, state Corrections Director Al Murphy said Thursday.

"Thirty-two states are under court-ordered injunctions and I think it's a real danger that Idaho soon might be one of those," Murphy said.

At a meeting of the state Corrections Board, Murphy said the state could lose at least four of the more than 50 lawsuits filed over the past few years by prisoners alleging Idaho State Penitentiary inmates are being subjected to unconstitutional conditions.

"The individual things in the lawsuits alone probably won't do it, but when the judge looks at everything, we might have some real problems," he said.

Corrections Board member Charles Hall said it is inevitable that Idaho's prisons will be placed under court supervision.

"These lawsuits are not going to go away until we resolve the basic problems of overcrowding," Hall said. "All 50 states will probably be under court order someday."

Murphy said Idaho could face the same problems as Oklahoma, where he supervised a maximum-security prison before taking over the Idaho Corrections Department earlier this year.

He said a judge ordered Oklahoma officials to either release hundreds of inmates or build nine new prisons at a cost of nearly \$400 million.

Idaho Penitentiary Warden Darrol Gardner, who also attended the meeting, said the facility near Boise is so overcrowded that some medium-security inmates are being housed in an old kitchen.

He said the kitchen building has no locking doors and inmates, meaning prisoners constantly have to be moved in and out of the structure.

Island coup may have involved Cuba

BRIDGETOWN, Barbados — Troops with orders to shoot curfew violators on a night patrolled Grenada Thursday with a military council ruling the Caribbean island nation following a coup that left Prime Minister Maurice Bishop dead.

Leaders of the Caribbean community said they would meet Saturday to discuss sanctions for what Barbados Prime Minister Tom Adams termed the "vicious murders" of the man known as the "black Fidel Castro" and five of his backers.

Bishop's death, less than two hours after a crowd of more than 3,000 joyous people rescued him from the house arrest where his deputy had kept him for nearly a week, stunned Grenadians.

Army Commander Gen. Hudson Austin, who founded the ruling New Jewel Movement along with Bishop, said a revolutionary military council was in control of Grenada and imposed a curfew until dawn Monday, warning anyone outside their homes would be "shot on sight."

Soldiers rode Russian-made jeeps on constant patrols on the eastern

Caribbean island, 90 miles north of Venezuela, after Bishop, three ministers and two union officials were killed by government troops.

In Washington, a senior U.S. official said the administration is concerned that the Cuban government may have been behind the coup. "We have mounting evidence" of Cuban involvement, the senior official said.

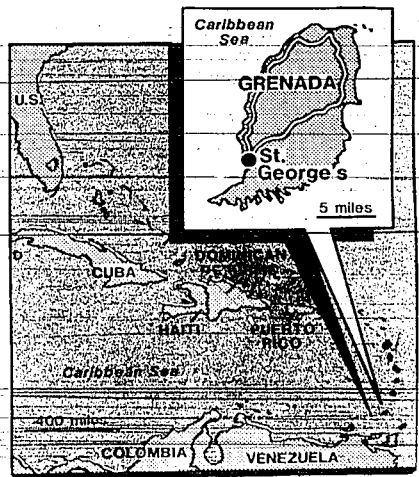
On Capitol Hill, Secretary of State Shultz met in private with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to discuss the events in Grenada.

Last Thursday, state-owned Radio Free Grenada announced that Deputy Prime Minister Bernard Coard had deposed Bishop and placed him under house arrest.

Western diplomats said Coard, a hard-line Marxist ideologue, with strong Cuban ties, was running Grenada behind the scenes of the military council, designed to shield him from public outrage over the death of the charismatic Bishop.

Sources close to the ruling party's central committee said Bishop angered Coard and other Marxist hard-liners in the New Jewel Movement last year when he banned the Cuban ambassador from Cabinet meetings he regularly attended.

Health budget passed; first one in five years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress Thursday passed a compromise \$104.4 billion spending bill for health, education and labor programs that includes \$41 million to search for a cure for Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS).

The House passed the measure 323-79 and the Senate concurred by voice vote.

The bill also includes the yearly ban on use of federal funds for abortion except when the life of the mother is in danger.

The fiscal 1984 Labor-Health and Human Services appropriations bill is the largest and usually the most controversial of the yearly federal money bills.

For five straight years, it has bogged down in bitter squabbles that prevented passage of any bill forcing many federal agencies to operate under stopgap "continuing resolutions."

But this year, the bill caused hardly a ripple. The bill is expected to be signed by President Reagan even though it is \$2.2 billion over his budget request.

The Appropriations subcommittee chairman of the House and Senate, Rep. William Mitchell, D-Ky., and Sen. Lowell Weicker, R-Conn., made a personal project of pushing a bill through Congress this year, and ranking GOP House Appropriations Committee member Silvio Conte, R-Mass., went to bat for it at the White House.

"I believe that we're going to get a signature on this bill," Conte said.

The bill contains a ban on use of federal funds for abortions except when the life of the mother is in danger, the same language included for several years in the continuing resolutions under which the Health and Human Services Department has operated.

House panel discards all nerve gas funding

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee voted Thursday to remove all funding for two controversial new nerve gas weapons, dealing President Reagan's military program a significant setback.

But the committee, during work on a \$246.2 billion military appropriations bill for 1984, rejected efforts to scrap production funds for the MX and Pershing-2 nuclear missiles and to strike \$400 million for multi-year contracts to build the B-1 bomber.

Funds for production of a binary 155mm-nerve gas artillery shell and the "Bigeye" binary bomb already had been deleted by the House Defense subcommittee. The full committee's 23-22 roll call vote on an amendment by Rep. John Porter, R-Ill., removed the remaining \$61.6 million budgeted for the binary weapons program.

In other votes, all motions offered by subcommittee chairman Joseph Addabbo, D-N.Y., the committee:

- Refused, 23-23, to strike \$2.1 million for production of the first 21 MX missiles, to be deployed in Minuteman-3 sites in Nebraska and Wyoming beginning in 1986 or early 1987.

- Refused, 26-21, to strike \$400 million for multi-year contracts for the B-1. However, the committee adopted by voice vote an amendment requiring that fiscal 1984 contracts for the bomber not exceed Air Force program costs for that fiscal year.

The Air Force had promised to keep the price for the bombers at \$20.5 million each if it was allowed to line up contractors through three-year procurement contracts.

Secret auto report released

WASHINGTON (UPI) — General Motors Corp. "internally" disclosed Thursday the nation's No. 1 automaker had persistent brake problems during test driving of the 1980 model X-body cars the government wants to recall in a \$4 million suit.

The material was released by the Justice Department Thursday following an order by U.S. District Judge Thomas Jackson to unseal thousands of pages of secret documents, including many from GM, in the unprecedented case to recall 1.1 million 1980 X-body cars.

Washington the cars are safe and it is not unusual to have some problems during the testing stage.

The government filed a civil suit in August seeking the recall and \$4 million in penalties against the automaker. It has asked Jackson to rule on the charges without going to trial.

It charged the design of the front-wheel-drive cars contains a defect that "under a variety of conditions causes the rear wheels to lock prematurely in medium to hard braking," often resulting in a skid and loss of control.

Homosexual killings probed

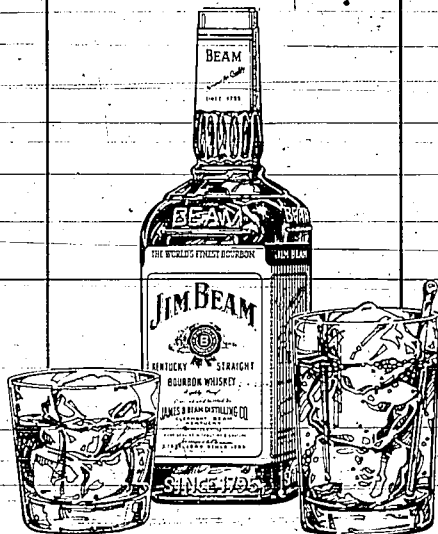
LAKE VILLAGE, Ind. (UPI) — One killer may have slain four young men whose badly decomposed bodies were found in shallow graves, possibly part of a two-state string of unsolved homosexual slayings, authorities said Thursday.

Two of the victims were white, one was black and the race of the other — whose head was missing — was unknown.

State Police Capt. Larry Carmichael said it appears the four men were killed by the same person.

He said a task force was studying similarities between the deaths and a string of unsolved homosexual murders in Indiana and Illinois.

Watt indicates he'll leave with fanfare

WASHINGTON — Interior Secretary James Watt, in one of his final public appearances in Washington since announcing his resignation, signed documents Thursday that add nearly 1.3 million acres to a remote wildlife refuge in Alaska.

The controversial Watt, who will leave the Interior Department when the Senate confirms William Clark as his successor, gave a strong indication he intends to depart his post with fanfare.

Watt argued no prior administration has acquired as much land in a single year — for the federal estate — since the United States purchased

the territory of Alaska in 1867.

"This year we have done more than Teddy Roosevelt, more than Franklin Roosevelt, more than Lyndon Johnson and Jimmy Carter," Watt said.

Environmentalists immediately took issue with the claim.

"What he's doing is telling half the story. He's not telling about the lands he gave away," said Wilderness Society spokeswoman Gail Bachman, whose group closely monitors Interior Department activities.

"If you subtract the land he has exchanged, the amount of land he has acquired is about the same as the Carter administration, and he's only acquired those lands under congressional or court mandate," said James Norton, a wildlife refuge specialist for the society.

"So what we have here are some lands going in and some going out," Norton said.

Wilderness Society officials also noted the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act — passed in 1980 with strong support from President Carter and his Interior Secretary, Cecil Andrus — created 21 million acres of new national parks spread across the Alaskan landscape.

The enormous acreage, however, was not a direct addition to the federal system since it was already federal land. The land added today to the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge is a key wildlife habitat — particularly for a 100,000-animal porcupine caribou herd, which crosses the area during migration from calving grounds in the north to southern wintering areas in Canada.

Resents 'small clique'

Six years of public service have taught me well that a large segment of the public believes virtually everything that any general circulation newspaper chooses to print. I am also well aware that impressions created in the mass media are nearly impossible to change. Notwithstanding my pessimistic view in this regard, I feel compelled, as the person most obviously damaged by your publication of what was purported to be an "attorney's poll" in your Oct. 16

edition to make a point or two of my own:

1. Unlike the survey which is conducted by the Idaho Judicial Council, your questionnaire contained no cover sheet designed to assure that the responding party was in fact an attorney and that such person voted, "anonymity" you chose also to sacrifice authentically.
2. Again, unlike the Judicial Council survey, your questionnaire sought to gauge who was best liked or, conversely, least liked by those lawyers to whom you chose to mail the form in question. While the Judicial Council seeks to gauge a candidate's skills, you appear more interested in a candidate's popularity.
3. While the story accompanying the putative results of your poll claimed that twenty-six percent of those to whom a questionnaire was sent replied, there was no explanation of why some attorneys were polled and others were not. Every attorney in Blaine County with whom I spoke was insulted by the format you chose to employ and refused to cooperate at all. At best, only one out of four of the attorneys whose opinions you sought responded to your questions and, as previously stated, there is no assurance that all responses were authentic.
4. Under Judicial Council rules, attorneys are instructed not to rate candidates with whom they are not familiar. Your questionnaire stated no such qualification. Consequently, an attorney not familiar with a particular candidate was encouraged by your survey to rank that candidate anyway and to place him at the bottom of the popularity list. Since the time I filed my application for the position in question, I have been aware that a small group of Twin

Falls attorneys was adamantly opposed to my candidacy and would use any means available to block any chance at appointment that I might have. I am neither shocked nor surprised that such a movement has developed, public life is and always has been rough and tumble and those who can't stand the heat were long ago warned to stay out of the kitchen. I have no objection to any reporter or private citizen speaking confidentially or otherwise with any attorney or judge in this state against whom I have practiced or before whom I have appeared as to my qualifications and skills. I do resent a small clique of those who have not ever been in court with me employing the kind of intellectual dishonesty your survey catered to and invited in order to hurt me personally and professionally.

I have served with pride as a public prosecutor and I will not apologize for representing the people of this State aggressively and zealously. It had not occurred to me that in doing so, I was forever forfeiting my chance to someday serve as a District Court Judge but, if that is the case, so be it. There are far worse things to be enduring in this life than a reputation as the judicial candidate who is not enough of a good ally for the good old boys.

No King holiday

Robert C. Jones of Jerome, and John P. Cox of Twin Falls, are to be commended for the excellent letters contributed recently as to the proposed memorial to Martin Luther King and establishment of a national holiday in his honor; also for the former's pointing out the erroneous content of your editorial of Oct. 6 in a culture of King.

As a researcher of many years experience, my file on Martin Luther King is a thick one, containing much which would be shocking to most Americans of all races. The February, 1976 release of the Herald of Freedom and Metropolitan Review, of New Jersey, offered a fine treatise on the Myth of Martin Luther King Jr., as had the Richmond, (Va.) News Leader of June 26, 1969, in an article entitled "Why the King Wretpap?" "The Network of Patriotic Letter Writers of Pasadena, Calif., years ago, widely circulated the picture showing King and others in attendance at a "subversive training school," revealing as to activities of the Highlander Folk School. Dr.

King's United Front, which first appeared in the Richmond News Leader of Sept. 27, 1963, has had wide circulation; it points to King's affinity for the Communist party of the U.S.A., his role in the NAACP, etc. As Mr. Jones has suggested, there are many reputable Negro Americans who might be honored, but not Martin Luther King. His quotation as to J.A. Parker, of the Lincoln Institute for Research and Education, is reflective of others: "Why not give credit to worthy Negro Americans like Archie Moore, George S. Schuyler, Rev. H. Mitchell, Manning Johnson, whose color, communism and common sense is a masterpiece!"

Incidentally, King was a signer of the Petition for Clemency to the President of the United States, on behalf of the convicted communists, Carl Brader and Frank Wilkinson, whose appeals to the Supreme Court of the U.S. were denied Feb. 27, 1961, by a decision of five to four. King was a signer of the Feb. 22, 1962, Petition to Abolish the House Committee on UnAmerican Activities, appearing in the New York Times. Of course, the HCUA has been abolished, and we are sorely lacking as to any government agencies serving in roles to protect Americans against internal subversion. If anyone is interested, I can supply you with a list of eight questionable affiliations as to organizations and publications fostered and promoted by Martin Luther King from 1957 to 1960. I trust this letter is not too long for your publication, as was one I submitted to you more than a year

ago, containing a warning as to the role of the "Christian Phalange" under guidance of Israeli forces nearby, when that group mercilessly murdered more than 1,600 innocent Palestinians — men, women and children. I had the worst fear, coming from an American who had returned from beleaguered Beirut, asserting that Americans must know that a "Christian" in Beirut, wasn't the same as one in America — the appendage being a handy one to arouse support of Christians in the U.S.A.

Merit pay a concept

Your editorial of Oct. 12, "Raise pay for the very best teachers," reminded me of a story about President Lincoln. When asked how it felt to be President, Lincoln replied, "You've heard about the man tarred and feathered and ridden out of town on a rail? A man in the crowd asked how he liked it, and his reply was that if it wasn't for the honor of the thing, he would much rather walk."

Well, if it wasn't for the honor of a possibility of higher pay for some teachers, we'd just as soon walk too, thank you. The gratuitous editorial comment, for instance, that teachers resist tying their pay to their performance is the type of tar to which I refer. Do teachers have legitimate questions about how "performance" will be defined and who will measure it? Of course, they do.

For instance, this week you ran a color graph comparing ACT scores for students from Twin Falls, Wood River, Kimberly and Dietrich. The Dietrich students scored an average below the other three schools. Should we lower, freeze or retard teacher salaries in Dietrich therefore? The ACT company itself warns against comparisons of school districts saying the number and backgrounds of students taking the test can vary and skew the results. Such was the case in Dietrich where only six students took the test and scores from one or two adversely affected the outcome.

Your comment about the NEA approving "fluff" courses as its approach to educator review is simply wrong. Long before the current public interest about achieving quality education, the IEA/NEA have been working to upgrade pre-service and in-service programs for teachers and professional evaluation procedures. NEA has pushed college of education review through its involvement with the National Council for the Accreditation of Teacher Education

(NCATE). Actually, the decision to accept or reject certain professional courses for salary advancement is made on the local level and not by the NEA.

Your central argument was to espouse merit pay as a way to reward and retain excellent teachers. First, merit pay is a concept and not a plan. Few in or out of education have trouble with the concept alone; it is the specific plan which causes many to think the cure is potentially worse than the disease.

The IEA/NEA and its affiliates have identified several criteria that are essential for any sound plan to retain and reward teachers. We will seriously consider and review plans that meet the following criteria:

- The plan is not in lieu of compensation entry level salaries in the professional market place.
 - The plan provides a career ladder for the best instructional competence without removing excellent teachers from teaching.
 - The plan clearly delineates responsibility for its implementation. Where administrators are involved in evaluation, they should be adequately trained to identify and assess effective teaching techniques.
 - A plan authorized at the state level is developed in consultation with the appropriate teachers' organization.
 - A state plan should provide for local adaptation and implementation through involvement of the local teachers' organization.
 - The plan is designed to promote cooperation, equity and harmony in the workplace. It must not be intrinsically divisive — pitting teacher against teacher or teacher against administrator.
 - The plan must provide a selection process free from arbitrary or capricious political whim. An effective plan recognizes academic freedom as a foundation for professional practice.
 - The plan allows all teachers to demonstrate the evidence of advanced level teaching skills that would enable them to move up in the teaching professional hierarchy, as opposed to the pyramid approach whereby only a predetermined small percentage of teachers can become designated "master" teachers.
- Now, to show you how even-handed I can be, in my next letter I wish to detail my merit pay plan for presidents, Idaho politicians, and, of course, professional educators.

Congressman claims Soviets shot planes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Soviet Union has shot down 30 foreign aircraft, capturing or killing the crews, over the past few decades, Rep. George Hansen claimed Thursday.

Several United States planes are included on the supposed roster of downed flights of both military and civilian aircraft, Hansen, R-Idaho, said.

The conservative lawmaker said his assertion was backed up by his own research and documentation in the Congressional Record.

Hansen introduced Thursday a res-

olution under which Congress would call on Secretary of State George Shultz to make public any information his department might have on the alleged incidents.

The GOP House member from Idaho's Second District said the alleged incidents have gone unreported because of "foot-kissing" of the Soviet Union by those who have known about them.

"It's like your Russian Awareness Week in Boise going on right now, with former Sen. Frank Church (D-Idaho) speaking and so forth," he said.

Idaho mining lost optimism

Silver prices are plunging because of over-supply, lack of industrial demand and disenchantment among investors who hoped for quick gains during the economic recovery, investment and mining executives said Thursday.

The Handy and Harman exchange Thursday quoted the price of an ounce of silver at \$9.39, down from \$11.92 on Sept. 20 and \$12.60 on Aug. 20.

However, mining executives in the Silver Valley of northern Idaho said they were not planning production cutbacks.

Spokesmen for Bunker Limited Partnership and the Sunshine Mining Co. agreed that record-level stockpiles and sluggish industrial demand have combined to push prices down, despite predictions this summer that silver represented nearly a sure-fire investment bargain.

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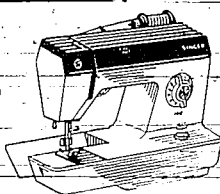
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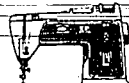


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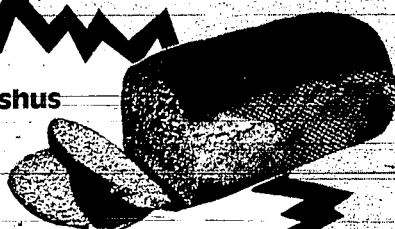
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Mideast factions agree on site of peace talks

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Foreign Minister Elie Salem said Thursday the nation's warring factions reached unanimous agreement on a site to hold peace talks designed to end eight years of sporadic civil war in Lebanon.

Though Salem did not name the site, politicians said the talks would be held in Switzerland.

The reported agreement followed intense diplomatic activity involving U.S. and Saudi Arabian mediators who came only hours after anti-government rebels bombed a convoy of French peace-keeping soldiers.

Salem said only that agreement had been reached to hold the long-delayed talks "on friendly territory."

The politicians, who have close links with the government, said the talks would be held in either Geneva or Bern, Switzerland. State-run Beirut radio said word was expected from the Swiss Friday or Saturday confirming the negotiating site.

One of the diplomats arranging the talks was Saudi mediator Rafic

Hariri, who said agreement on a talks site came during his contacts with Syrian Foreign Minister Abdel Halim Khaddam.

Limited fighting was reported around Beirut and Beirut radio said a car bomb exploded near the social headquarters of the Druze community in Moslem west Beirut late Thursday, but caused no casualties.

Hurricane ravages Mexico's Pacific coastland

MAZATLAN, Mexico (UPI) — Hurricane Tico drove 25,000 people from their homes, ruined 1.1-million acres of farmland and caused \$200 million in damages on Mexico's Pacific coast, authorities said Thursday. Thirty people were missing at sea.

The hurricane, with winds clocked up to 180 mph and torrential rains, hit the Pacific resort of Mazatlan in the state of Sinaloa and other coastal towns — unexpectedly — Wednesday morning as it veered in from the ocean.

It raged for at least three hours before breaking up against the Sierra Madre mountain range inland. At least 14 people were injured when Tico smashed into Mazatlan, located 600 miles northwest of Mexico City.

The rains and high winds cut telephone lines, tore off roofs, damaged crops and halted the flow of drinking water. Mazatlan was without electric power. A Sinaloa state spokesman said 13 luxury tourist hotels around the town, a favorite destination for Americans, were badly damaged.

Pupils, teachers decry nukes

BONN, West Germany (UPI) — Thousands of students and teachers skipped classes and took to the streets Thursday to demand that NATO cancel deployment of new nuclear missiles in Europe. Protesters and police clashed briefly in Bremen.

In Bonn, Defense Minister Manfred Wörner warned the peace movement the Soviet Union represented the real threat to Germans because it had designs on all of western Europe.

The protests in West German schools and universities came on "school resistance day," the eighth

day of a 10-day campaign against NATO's plan to base 572 medium-range U.S. nuclear missiles in western Europe unless agreement is reached at U.S.-Soviet arms talks in Geneva.

Under the plan, beginning in December, 108 Pershing-2 missiles and 96 cruise missiles will be stationed in West Germany.

Peace movement organizers claimed more than 70,000 teachers and pupils across the country cut classes, held workshops and protested. Police estimates were lower.

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Idaho Governor: State will watch site

BOISE (UPI) — Gov. John Evans said Thursday the state will more closely monitor a hazardous waste disposal site near Grand View, and "if it's not acceptable we're going to phase it out."

Evans, appearing on Idaho Public Television's "Idaho Reports," said he was startled to learn toxic wastes are possibly being stored dangerously close to groundwater at the EnviroSAFE hazardous waste disposal site in Owyhee County.

"We're going to watch it very carefully, and if it's not acceptable we're going to phase it out," the governor said.

Evans, however, said there is no evidence the site is unsafe.

He said he had no concerns about the 17-acre site when it was thought the water level below the site was 2,580 feet.

Recent tests indicated groundwater levels of about 150 feet below the site.

He said if the site is determined to be unsafe, there would be plenty of blame to go around.

Stuntman schedules daring feat

GRANGEVILLE (UPI) — An escape artist with a fear of heights says he'll close out his career this weekend when he tries to free himself from leg irons and padlocks while suspended 1,200 feet above the Salmon River.

Johnny Sands, 33, known as the "Nashville Flame," said this week he figures the odds against his success are "58 to 2."

He said his faith in God should carry him through the ordeal, but he added he had purchased a \$1 million insurance policy in case the stunt failed.

Sands will be suspended upside down on a trapeze bar by leg irons and will be rolled 610 1/2 feet to the middle of a steel cable suspended over DeWorm's Wind Canyon. He will then attempt to free himself from a straightjacket, and a chain wrapped around his body and secured by 100 padlocks.

Idaho pupils doing better

BOISE (UPI) — The state Education Department says Idaho students performed better on their college entrance tests this year than their counterparts across the nation, but the average score remained unchanged from the 1982 tally.

The agency said Thursday that Gem State students during the 1982-83 school year had an average score of 18.9 on the American College Testing assessment, which has a range of 1 to 36.

The score was the same as the Idaho rating recorded during the previous year, but more than half a point above the national average of 3.

Jury says manslaughter in woman's beating

TWIN FALLS — A jury returned a verdict of voluntary manslaughter Thursday for 21-year-old Jerry Pennell, who was accused of beating his girlfriend to death last spring.

The Twin Falls resident was on trial this week on a first-degree "torture" murder charge in connection with the March 23 death of 27-year-old Carlene Gillespie of Twin Falls.

"Obviously Jerry would rather have been found not guilty," said his lawyer Randy Stoker. "But, he's accepted the verdict rather well."

The maximum punishment for the voluntary manslaughter conviction is a 10-year

prison sentence. Fifth District Judge Theron Ward ordered a pre-sentence investigation. Pennell is being held in the Twin Falls County Jail.

"I am grateful the jury saw fit not to convict him of murder," Stoker added. "They will wait until after the sentencing before deciding about an appeal, he said. But, it looks like they may not because 'I think he received a fair trial.'"

Twin Falls County Prosecutor Harry DeHann could not be reached for comment about the verdict.

Pennell's fate was handed to the jury about noon Thursday. After lunch, the four-woman, eight-man jury got down to business. About 6:30 p.m., they returned their verdict.

Earlier that day, Ward instructed the jury on the definitions of first and second-degree murder and voluntary or involuntary manslaughter. In his closing statement, DeHann described voluntary manslaughter as a death resulting from the "heat of passion, without time to reflect."

DeHann and Stoker's closing remarks wrapped up two days of testimony surrounding the death of Gillespie, a deaf mute, who had dated Pennell for two years. Along with doctors, police, relatives of the defendant, a neighbor and more, Pennell took the stand.

The defendant Wednesday told his side of what happened that morning at Gillespie's residence, where she was found injured. He said they had fought and that he had hit her

about five times. While carrying her back to the house, she slipped away, hit her head on the concrete and became limp. She died later of brain injuries at a Boise hospital.

DeHann claimed in his argument that Pennell had a problem with "self-control," that was evident in his courtroom behavior and past arrests; Pennell's lack of control also occurred on March 23.

DeHann said that he believed Pennell did care for Gillespie in a "rather sick and immature way." But the lack of control, "terrible jealous rage" and "black anger" made this more than simple assault. The evidence showed Pennell did intend to hit her.

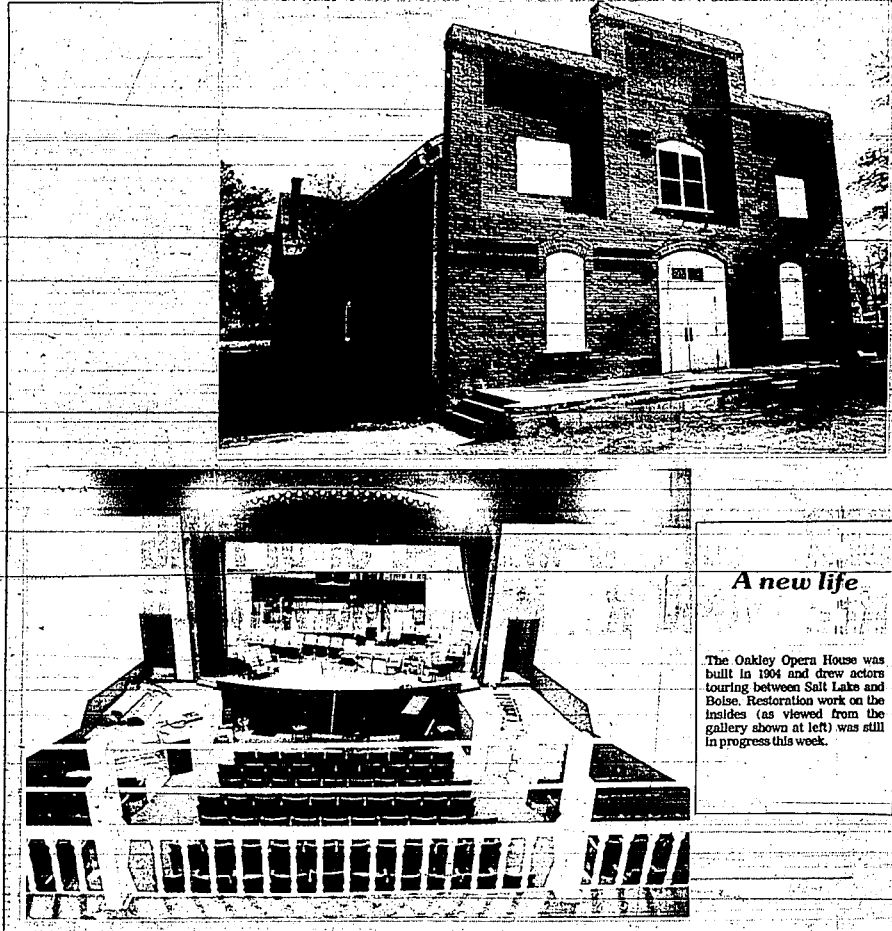
DeHann said he did not have to show "intent to kill" with a torture murder charge. Also,

the proof of brutality required for a conviction was demonstrated in the color autopsy photos of Gillespie, showing distinct bruises on Gillespie's skull, arms and legs, he said holding them up to the jury. Pennell couldn't explain why marks he added.

Stoker later answered, "I don't know what the state's trying to tell you about brutality," but it was not equivalent to striking someone. The "gruesome" photos didn't prove whether there was intentionally applied torture. "It defies me that the state could even think that."

DeHann, in his rebuttal, claimed Stoker must relate torture to medical rack and thumbscrew. This case involved the "Nazi"

Opera House Theater restored after years

OAKLEY — This year's annual membership meeting of the Oakley Valley Arts Council will be a special one.

Scheduled for 7 p.m. tonight, it will open with a dinner in the Oakley Mormon Stake Center and will conclude with an open house in Howell's Opera House.

Refurbishing and restoration of the old theater has been the goal of the organization since it was formed several years ago.

Friday night the public and arts council members will see it in a new light — a new and better life. This includes new carpets, new walls, new stairs leading to the balcony and something the old 1904 building didn't have — restrooms.

Kent Severe, president of the council, says most of the restoration has been possible because of community pride in the area's history.

Severe says everything under the balcony was redone except one wall.

Just to be completed is the repair and repolstering of the auditorium seats. The council has funds for the materials, but needs the labor.

"I think if we had paid for all of the work and materials we would have cost us about \$55,000. With the cooperation and support of art enthusiasts, we are getting by for about \$15,000," he says.

Severe says the building was known as the Oakley Playhouse for a number of years, but is now named in honor of the late Judge B.P. Howell, who built the theater nearly 80 years ago.

"He had a great love for the arts and wanted this pioneer community to have quality entertainment," Severe says. "He built the theater and then brought traveling troupes of actors into Oakley from the railroad terminal at Mindoka as they toured via train from Salt Lake City to Boise."

A new life

The Oakley Opera House was built in 1904 and drew actors touring between Salt Lake and Boise. Restoration work on the inside (as viewed from the gallery shown at left) was still in progress this week.

Council votes to move slated pool back to Harmon Park

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls City Council Thursday voted to move the location of a proposed new city pool from Frontier Field to Harmon Park.

With less than three weeks to go before voters will be asked to approve a \$500,000 general obligation bond issue for the project, it appears certain this time the council's choice will stick.

Council members voted 4-3 for the switch at a noon work session, after hearing the results of a city engineering report on rock depths at Frontier Field.

Members of the department probed for

bedrock at three sites at Frontier Field. They found a "fairly uniform plain" of rock from one to two feet below the surface, said city engineer Gary Young.

Young said the city would need to dig a hole at least six feet deep in order to construct the general recreation sections of the pool. Based on a rough figure, he told the council it would be "unwise" to budget less than an extra \$30,000 for rock removal.

Council members Chris Talkington, John Edlerman, Alan Wubker and Paul Newton voted to move the pool. Newton's vote was crucial since he favored Frontier Field when the council first voted on the matter Aug. 31.

Newton had been ambivalent to begin with, favoring Frontier Field on the basis of eco-

nomics.

He said the rock problems, and the uncertainty of inking a long term agreement with the College of Southern Idaho for water from the college's geothermal wells tipped the scales.

After a joint council-college board meeting Monday, the college said it would begin calculations as to whether there was artesian heating water from its two artesian geothermal wells for the pool.

City Manager Tom Courtney explained the college was making every effort to cooperate with the city. But the college also felt obligated to look after its future needs first, he said.

The favored site at Frontier, behind the fire

station at the entrance to the park, currently is occupied by a softball diamond.

Councilman Alan Wubker pointed out the city also would incur the expense of replacing this diamond, and councilman John Peterson added a pool at Frontier would cause pedestrian safety problems at the corner of Falls Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard North.

Of those opposing the move, councilman Emery Peterson was the most vocal. Even with the rock studies, he proposed waiting another week to see whether something concrete could be worked out with CSI.

He felt certain an agreement could be reached, since he did not think new buildings would be constructed at CSI for many years to come.

But he said he hoped people would vote for the pool, anyway. "If they don't vote for it, there may be no pool for several years," he said.

Talkington said the question of a heat source for a pool at Harmon Park remains "unresolved."

"He thinks the city has a good chance of hitting hot water there if it were to drill its own well. The expense of this well, and a 're-charge' well to pump water back into the geothermal aquifer, has been placed as high as \$120,000, however. Conventional heating sources may have to be explored, he said.

But Talkington said placing the pool at Harmon Park would show a commitment to revitalizing the southeast corner of the city.

Filer teachers have 15 days to return contracts

FILER — Teachers in the Filer School District will have 15 days to return their teaching contracts at the beginning of each school year or they may find themselves without a job.

The school board recently approved

the first reading of a new school board policy requiring teachers to return their contracts within 15 days of receipt or consider the job vacated.

The principals will read the policy to the teachers before it is adopted by the board.

The new policy will be strictly enforced because the board members

have said in the past the district has been too lenient in allowing teachers extra time to sign and return their teaching contracts.

In one recent case, the district did not confirm that a teacher, designated by special education teacher Treva Green, because it was assumed she was returning to her job.

Two weeks before school started, Green resigned and the district quickly had to find another teacher.

The matter prompted the board to establish the contract policy to confirm which teachers will be returning.

Railroad wants to close its freight office in Buhl

SALT LAKE CITY — The Union Pacific Railroad wants to close its Buhl freight office as part of a system-wide program phasing out rural depots in favor of computerized regional centers.

The rail line, now owned by the Union Pacific System, asked the Idaho Public Utilities Commission Oct. 3 for authority to close the doors and to serve customers from Twin Falls or Rupert. Agents at existing offices already must work through those regional centers because the centers are tied directly into the railroad's main computer banks, according to a company announcement Thursday.

Union Pacific also has filed papers to shut the Shoshone Gooding office, located in Shoshone. On Oct. 13, the company was granted permission by the state agency to close its Arco branch. Customers on those lines would deal with agents in Pocatello or Blackfoot.

"We're doing it system-wide," said Dick Tineher, Union Pacific's regional director of public relations.

"The problem is that all of these little rural agencies were established many years ago and, at that time, did a lot of work. There isn't enough now generally to keep an agent busy eight hours a day," he said.

The same work done by the

Out-of-court pact sought for business district

TWIN FALLS — Lawyers for the city and the businesses who challenged the constitutionality of the downtown Business Improvement District this summer have decided to pursue an out-of-court agreement.

Greg Fuller, attorney for the businesses, said Wednesday an administrative hearing may be the "most economical and equitable way" for the two parties to settle their differences.

City attorney Fritz Wonderlich said Thursday the option is never exploring, even though it may not be successful.

On Aug. 3, seven businesses filed suit to overturn the BID.

Named as plaintiffs were United Automotive, Inc.; Ralph Lockerby, doing business as G and R Office Products; Lowell Havener, doing business as Havener's Frames and Gallery; H.L. Ramsay, doing business as Ramsay's Window Decorating; Nordling Parts Co., Inc.; J.M.A., Inc.; and John J. Elter Jr., doing business as the Beacon Club.

The BID, a non-profit municipal corporation, was established by the city last fall to downsize merchants and professionals could "tax" themselves to pay for certain services.

This year, the BID split its budget between beautification projects, pool advertising and special promotions.

The seven businesses charged, however, that they were assessed unfairly by the BID.

In August they sued to block assessment collections and to test the constitutionality of the Idaho

Evans opts for free agency

SAN DIEGO (UPI) — Darrell Evans of the San Francisco Giants, voted the team's most valuable player this season, is the latest major leaguer to opt for free agency, his agent, Jerry Kapstein, reported Thursday.

Evans, who batted .277 with 30 homers and 82 RBI this season, previously went through the re-entry draft in 1978.

"Unlike 1978 when I felt there was a good possibility that Darrell would return to the Giants after the re-entry draft, now, however, I firmly project that Darrell will not be in a Giant uniform in 1984," Kapstein said from his San Diego office. "I informed the Giants of this position in August and we have had no discussion since that point."

Rosen will stay in Houston

HOUSTON (UPI) — Al Rosen Thursday signed a three-year contract to remain the Houston Astros president and general manager, automatically taking him out of the running for the job as president of the American League.

"It was personally very gratifying to be extended such a long-term position," Rosen said, "but I prefer it here in Houston."

Astros owner John McCall retained the services of Rosen, who had just completed his third year with the club, despite a concerted effort by the American League office to have Rosen replace Lee MacPhail, who resigned to take another job in baseball.

Judge: English not eligible

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — A federal judge Thursday handed Tulane quarterback Jon English his fourth consecutive courtroom loss in his bid to regain college eligibility.

U.S. District Judge Patrick Carr denied a request by English's attorneys for a temporary restraining order that would have allowed the senior quarterback to play Saturday for Tulane in its game at Southern Mississippi.

Attorneys said they had not yet decided whether to take their request to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals.

Reds to Rose: No thanks.

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Pete Rose's desire to play every game has dampened the Cincinnati Reds' interest in re-signing Rose.

Rose, who played his first 15 seasons for Cincinnati before leaving five years ago for Philadelphia, was released by the Phillies Wednesday. Phillies President Bill Gillet explained, "Pete wants to play every game and we could not assure him he would play every game with the Phillies."

President Bob Hovans said Thursday, "Certainly the Reds would be interested in talking with Pete, but it seems to me that the conditions he has laid down would not fit the conditions and situation which we have here in Cincinnati."

"I can understand what Pete is looking for and why he wants it. We all can. I hope he can find it because he has been a great ballplayer and a real asset to baseball."

Top free agents are pitchers

NEW YORK (UPI) — Reliever Kent Tekulve heads a list of five pitchers who have been designated as Type A free agents in next month's re-entry draft, it was announced Thursday by the Major League Baseball Player Relations Committee.

Tekulve, the long-time bullpen stalwart of the Pittsburgh Pirates, joins relievers Doug Bair, Tom Underwood and Dennis Lamp and starter Mill Wilcox as free agent pitchers who will require compensation of a player from the free agent pool as well as a first-round draft choice if they are signed in the re-entry draft Nov. 7.

Two members of the California Angels, eligible for free agency but yet to declare, have also been designated as Type A players — third baseman Doug DeCinces and left fielder Brian Downing. Three Type B players have been designated, including two who have already chosen to enter the re-entry draft. San Diego outfielder Ruppert Jones and Montreal second baseman Manny Trillo have already filed for the re-entry draft and California catcher Bob Boone will also be listed as Type B. If he declares himself a free agent, requiring compensation of a draft choice.

Murphy was the only unanimous choice with 38 votes, followed by Dawson with 37, Denny with 35 and

Schmidt with 26. Thirty-eight writers from around the country participated in the voting.

Mario Solo of the Cincinnati Reds was picked for the other starting berth on the pitching staff and Jesse Orosco of the New York Mets was chosen as the relief pitcher.

The closest vote was at first base where Hendrick received 13 votes to 10 for former teammate Keith Hernandez, now with the New York Mets. Hendrick batted .318 with 18 homers and 97 runs batted in while Hernandez had a .297-12-63 offensive performance. Al Oliver of the Expos received eight of the other 15 votes.

Schmidt, considered a strong MVP candidate, had a .256 batting average but hit 40 homers and drove in 109 runs while Denny posted a 19-6 record

and a 2.37 earned run average for the Phillies.

Thon, who had 24 of a possible 38 votes, batted .286 with 20 homers and 79 RBI and Cruz batted .318 with 14 homers and 92 RBI.

Kennedy, who out-poll'd Tony Pena of the Pirates, 19 votes to 12, hit .284, slammed 17 homers and drove in 98 runs for the Padres; Ray had a .283-5-53 offensive performance for the Pirates; Dawson batted .259 with 32 homers and 113 RBI, and Cruz hit .318, had 11 homers and drove in 92 runs.

Solo, the hard-throwing Cincinnati right-hander, posted a 17-13 record and had a 2.70 ERA while Orosco, batting .407 for the Mets, had a .377 record with a 1.47 ERA and 17 saves.

The GSC champion, which will be Highland unless the Rams lose to Bonneville next Friday, will host Caldwell in the first round of the playoffs on Friday, Nov. 11 at 7 p.m. in the ISU Mindome in Pocatello. The winner of that game will face the District 3 champion in Bronco Stadium on Nov. 19.

The state championship game will be played on Friday, Nov. 26, in either Bronco Stadium or the Mindome.

In the other A-2 playoffs, the District 5 champion — either Marsh Valley or Preston — will take on the District 1 runner-up which will be either Salmon or Rigby, in the third game of a triple-header in the Mindome on Nov. 5. Up north, District 2 champion Moscow and the District 1 winner — probably Post Falls — will meet in Moscow's Kibbie Dome in the second game of the double-header on Saturday, Nov. 5. The other first-round playoff game will pit the District 1 runner-up, probably Wallace, against District 3 champion Middleton in Middleton on Nov. 5.

In the other A-3 playoff games, District 6 champion Sugar-Salem will meet the District 3 runner-up — probably Fruitland — in the Mindome in the second game of a triple-header on Nov. 5. In the first game, District 5 champion Westside will face the runner-up from District 6 — Firth or North Fremont. The 8-man championship game, scheduled for Friday, Nov. 4, will be played at a site to be determined after the first-round game. Traditionally, the game is played at the home field of the school with the best record going into the final game.

 had... for life and each other, and wanted to illustrate the crossover from the old day of the Indian to the new day of the Indian culture.

"It really is the same. I wanted to express in one statement their love of life and their heritage. I did that by using different textures and designs that exist in their culture."

"Gourteaux" recently won the Best of Show Award at the Twin Falls County Fair.

Heindel demands that he be honest with himself and his subject. "I don't want to be faddish or cliché," he says of his art. "For example, I don't want to draw 'just another Indian.'"

To accomplish that end, he researches his subjects as thoroughly as possible before he allows the images to appear.

"Each year I spend part of my time traveling to Indian festivals and other Indian cultures to better understand their culture. In so doing, I take two hundred photographs a year of that particular subject."


"I also have a large library and many, many Indian friends from various tribes. They've been a key influence in my life," says Heindel.
