# Shrinking deficit latest view

WASHINGTON — Buoyed by the recommy's vigorous performance; the Reagan administration Wednesday projected the federal budget deficit would hold steady over the next three years and slip to \$161.7 billion at the end of the decade.

This past week, the Congressional Budget Office turned out its own projections, forceasting that the defi-cits would widen to an enormous \$263.

The administration's budget revisions, which were delayed about a
month to take account of congression
and deficit-cutting actions and updated economic growth figures, werimmediately attacked by Walter F.
Mondale as 'cooked' and 'garbage.
Mondale has piedged to reduce the
deficit by two-linirds by the end of the
next presidential term, partly by
raising taxes.

The new ligures, released by the
Office of Management and Budget,
will no doubt-be-widely-comparedwith those of the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office.

## American units join Red Sea forces planning to sweep mines

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — An American ship carrying four helicopiers entered the Suez Canal on Wednesday on Its way to John a multinational task force forfining to clear the Red Sea of the explosives that have damaged at least 16 ships in the last Its weeks.

Four British minesweepers and a support vessel-passed through the Guil of Suez earlier Vednesday, and the U.S. transport, the Shreveport, was expected to Join them after the 12- to 13-hour trip down the 100-mile canal.

The British ships were anchored at an Egyptian naval base south of Suez while crews worked on some last-mjrute\_steering\_and\_sonar\_problems\_Officers\_aboard one of the ships, the Gavinton, were briefed Wednesday aftermoon and they salt operations would begin tonight or Friday morning.

Egyptian officials have speculated that Iran or Libya may be responsible for laying the mines, but both countries have denied it.

Iran's official news eigency on Wednesday reiterated Tehran's accusations that the United States was behind the mining.

"There is not the least doubt that the plot for damaging ships in the Red-Sea and-disrupting safe navigation there was designed and endorsed by the Pentagon," said a commentary by the Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Nicosia, Cyprus.

The aigency charged that Egypt was involved with the United States in Liber mining and urged that "Lippartial" authorities" such as representatives of Moslem and non-aligned nations should investigate the mining.

Mohamed Kamel, deputy director of Sucz Canal operations told reporters in Sucz City on Wednesday—that 10 "suspect" ships of various nationalities had been stopped and searched by Egyptian authorities. American, British and Egyptian officials said, that apart from locating and dismantling mines, they want to examine them for evidence that could determine who sowed them.

## Storms drench Death Valley, Utah

A powerful storm in the Mojave Desert turned California's Death Valley into mud Wednesday, flooding homes and closing highways, while a tornado touched down in south-central Utah and 1.75 Inches of rain triggered flash floods.

In Los Angeles, power was restored by aftermoon to the last of 4,800 customers who were without electricity at the height of a storm that began before dawn and was still dumping rain by midday, said Department of Water and Power Spokeswoman Nancy Niles.
Flash flood watches remained in effect through Wednesday evening.

A twister accompanied by half touched down in a field about 5 miles south of Manti in central Utah about 3 p.m., said Richard Pringle of the National Weather Service office in Sail Lake City.



## Reagan budget plan a cause for worry

President Reagan now declares that he would raise taxes in a second term only as a last resort. He hardly needed to say that. No president ever raises taxes except as a last resort.

In Reagan's case he arrived at that last resort nearly three years ago, in the autumn of 1981. His enormous program of tax and spending cuts had gone through Congress the previous summer, the greatest legislative success of this administration.

legislative success of this administration.

But as the year ended, it was beginning to be clear that Reagan had lost control of the deticit, and was running out of ideas about further cuts in spending.

Reagan has certainly reduced federal spending substantially in several areas, but he did most of it in his first seven months in office.

All of his nondefense cuts together will keep the federal budget about \$50 billion lower this year than it would otherwise have been. The revenue losses from the lower tax rates are now almost twice as great as: that and have become the leading reason for the size of the current deficits.

Or, to put it another way, all of Reagan's spending

the current deficits.

Or, to put it another way, all of Reagan's spending cuts so far are more than offset by the increase in interest alone on the federal debt since 1980.

Interest payments have more than doubled in the past four years. To get them under control will require either higher taxes or lower spending — and as a practical matter, the only acceptable answer will be a combination of the two.

Reagan keeps talking as though he had repeatedly given Congress long and explicit lists of spending cuts that it obdurately refused to enact.

-The reality is that, since 1981, his suggestions about reduced spending have generally been pretty minor.

In his budget last January, for example, Reagan proposed a total net cut of \$4.7 billion in nondefense—spending;—more than half of it was to come out of—low-income benefit programs. That's in comparison with a deficit that will run about \$180 billion this year.

To make a substantial difference in the deficit, spending would have to be curtailed in three sensitive categories: defense, pensions and medical care for the elderly.

lderly.

If Reagan has a grand plan for further reductions in the budget, why doesn't he reveal it openly? If he doesn't, he will invite suspicion that the previous absence of inspiration still prevails.

Reagan's opponents—in-both—parties—have—been—angrily charging that if he were re-elected, he would eventually raise taxes. But they might usefully give some attention to another possibility, both more dangerous and more likely.


Perhaps he would neither raise taxes nor do much about spending, but instead continue as he has done for the past several years—sporadically complaining, but letting the deficits roll up.

As for that last resort, he seems to have taken up permanent residence there.

\_which will be described for the first time in a medical journal article appearing today, was characterized by experts across the United States as perhaps the most significant advance in burn treatment since skin grafting was first developed early in this contury.

Skin that has been grown in a laboratory dish from seed skin tissue—from the patient's—body is still genetically the person's own and, for that reason, is not susceptible to. rejection. Now brothers Glen and Jamie Selby of Casper have become the first two recipients of large amounts of skin.—more than a square yard, in their case—grown in a laboratory from a patch of skin cells the size of a postage stamp salvaged—from what 'little of their own 'skin tissue was not destroyed when they were burned.

The Selby brothers were treated at Massachusetts General Hespital and the Shriners Burns Institute in Boston, where the new technique was ploneered. An article describing the development and an editorial

The author of the journal editorial, however, cautioned against characterizing the new method as a breathrough—br—lack—Fisher of the University of California, San Diego Medical Center said there has been some other promising work in strictly artificial skin for burn victims. The new technique, he said, has no effect on the disfigurement of serious burns or on the tendency of burned areas of the body to tighten, making some joint movement nearly impossible in the most severely injured patients. Even if more of them are saved.—Fisher—said,—quality-of-life questions for survivors will remain unanswered for some time to come.

The new liaboratory-dish skin could be generated at many large hospital burn centers across the United States, the developer, Dr. G. Gregory Gallico III, said in a telephone interview, and the technique may soon become a routine part of the treatment of the worst burns.

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#### **EPA** seeks virtual ban on creosote

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency on Wednesday proposed to ban creosole for almost everything except pre-serving wood because of the risk of

cancer.
Last month, EPA put heavy-restrictions on-creosote as a wood
preservative but did not ban it
because of the great economic

because of the great economic benefits from its use.

The actions follow six years of study of the finding that creosote can cause cancer and genetic changes in laboratory animals, and has been associated with skin cancer among workers handling it.

Almost all creosote is sold for wood preservation, but about 2 percent, some 14 million pounds a year, has other uses.

other uses.

Cresoste and related products covered by the proposed ban, coal tar and coal tar neutral oil, are used as herbicides in gardens and on highway rights of way, to control lungus on canvas and rope and as insecticides to control gypsy moths, screwworms and mosquitoes.

The chemicals are also registered under the federal pesticide law as disinfectants for use in homes and institutions, seed potato storage, livestock and poultry premises, metal institutions, seed potato storage, livestock and poultry premises, metal working-fluids, webticles, and tree wound dressings.

When Ek was ordered jailed 16 months ago for—violation—of—parole, jailers—refused to recognize—As a result, Ek said he was forced to eat off a plate on the floor and couldn't take care of other bodily functions because no one would help him.

Munn previously said that Ek had been jailed

last fall without problem.

In April, Fix was sentenced to 30 days in jall for possession of marijuana.

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## **Flooding** by lake possible

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A new study predicts the Great-Salt-Eaker-which some researchers say could rise another 8 feet, may remain swollen for 30 years.

The research, published by the Utah Geological Survey, indicates an 8-toot surge in the lake would wipe out all mineral industries on its shores, submerge railroad tracks and highways and flood portions of Salt Lake City.

In the Introduction to "Man 73.

In the Introduction to "Map 7, Andyor Laves or Great Sait Lake and Lake Bonneville," the authors say they drew to geologic and historic evidence from the past 32,000 years. Most predictions of the lake's activity have relied upon records from the past 140 years, beginning with John C. Premont's surveys of the lake region 1833 and 1845, the document said.

Recently, scientists said the lake level could continue rising until it reached 4,217 feet above see level, 6 feet Jahove the current measurement.

The new map shows that if that happened; the expanded lake would bury parts of Interstates 15 and 80 and surrounding railroad tracks. Water-would: inundate: west- and northwest-areas of Salt Lake City, including the alroort; industrial zones, utility and sanitation plants, homes, parks and streets.

Western portions of North Salt Lake, Woods Cross, West Bountiful and Centerville also would be flooded according to the map's forecast. Res-tiential and industrial areas of Davis. Weber and Box Elder counties would be included in the damage.

South wins the second trump and leads a heart to dummy's king and East's ace. East has no third trump to lead and exits with a diamond. South wins, cashes the heart queen and ruffs a heart. Now it's an easy matter to draw the last trump and to claim 10 tricks.

Since West has no quick entry, he does much better if he leaves a trump in partner's hand. Instead of leading ace and another trump. West should lead a low trump. South wins and leads a heart to dummy's king and East's ace as before, but now East's trump return allows West to clear dummy's trumps. South enjoys no-heart ruff and the defenders get four-tricks for a plus score. Sometimes a delayed attack is more effective than a quick thrust.

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



My friend responded: "Like it or not, Indians are legally different. They are unavoidably unequal citizens of this nation, essentially a conquered people whose country has been occupied by other peoples. And they didn't have it coming. They did not try to invade any country. "The courts of the United States have held that treatles with the conquerer — the U.S. government — most certainly do give today's government — most certainly do give today's Indians some greater rights to what once belonged exclusively to their ancestors. It is this fact that his initiative is trying to legislate out of existence. "It is property rights, What if this legislation should earn its own way and just because some distant ancestor 100 years ago possessed a fish run doesn't mean that his descendants today should have it? But if that makes sense, then what right. do non-Indians have to the businesses and houses

"Apparently, what is wrong is that it's an Indian expecting his property right. And when you challenge a property-right of the people of one race only, that is by definition, if not by intention, racist."

Swen has a view on such legislation: it feeds on the redneck anger against indians, it inflames bigotry, it is divisive.

On the question of an Indian sitting on the Idaho Fish and Garne Commission, i suggest that if any of us owned half of the inventory of any company in the U.S., we would sure as hell want a seat in the directors' meeting.

I for one think such a move would moderate the Indians' position on fish and game issues, because we could confuse them with the facts.
