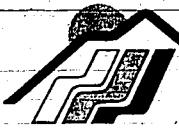
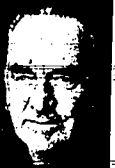

## Power sites lure Tacoma utility

TWIN FALLS — Tacoma City Light is interested in building three power plants in the Magle Valley. They would provide at least 113 megawatts of power for the city of Tacoma, Wash.

In recent months, Tacoma City Light officials have explored the possibility of financing construction of a 43-megawatt Milner Dam project, a 40-megawatt Auger Falls project and a 30-megawatt Star Falls project, according to Garth Jackson, the utility's power supply supervisor. All of these sites are located along the Snake River.

"We're interested in (the sites), but there are an awful lot of things to be answered

first," Jackson said. Jackson said Tacoma City Light is interested in building the plants with three developers who have already submitted Federal Energy Regulatory Commission license applications on the sites.

The Milner site FERC application has been jointly filed by the Twin Falls and North Side Canal companies. Application for the Auger Falls site, located just south of the Percine Bridge, has been filed by Steve Harrison, a Salt Lake City developer who is a partner in the reorganized Cogeneration Inc.

The Star Falls site, located downstream from Milner, has been filed on by Bish Beymer, an area developer working with the Boston-based National Hydro. "We would ideally wish to see some sort of

situation where we would come in and construct the sites using their (the applicants') licenses," Jackson said.

Under this scenario, Tacoma City Light would essentially own the plants, but agree to pay royalty fees to the license holders.

Jackson said Tacoma City Light officials had held discussions with all three license applicants and is now talking with engineering firms to try to "firm up some numbers on what is available."

If the numbers look reasonable, Jackson said the utility would probably "put a little money into investigating" the sites. In years past, Tacoma City Light has jointly developed hydro sites with Seattle City Light in eastern Washington, Jackson said. The largest project was a 90-megawatt site in-

volving an eastern Washington irrigation district.

Idaho Power had previously expressed an interest in developing the Milner site with the canal companies. In November of last year, the Twin Falls Canal Co. board voted to accept a formal Idaho Power Co. proposal to build a 50-megawatt power plant a mile below Milner dam.

The cost of the plant was estimated at \$32 million, with Idaho Power expected to pick up all construction costs.

Idaho Power President Jim Bruce said that he thinks Milner "is a good project and we would like to see the power remain in Idaho."

But he said that the current growth of the state's independent hydro power industry has contributed to a power glut that has forced

Idaho Power to back away from the Milner project.

Bruce said that Idaho Power might be interested in buying Milner power later.

In years past, Idaho Power had looked at the Auger Falls and Star Falls projects, but the company has no short-term interest in developing the sites, Bruce said.

"They aren't cheap. There's no free lunch in any of this," he said. Jackson said Tacoma City Light is interested in developing the new power sites to help reduce the utility's current dependence on federal power generated by the Bonneville Power Administration.

The Tacoma utility has informed the Washington state Public Utilities Commission that the three Idaho sites are currently "under evaluation."

## Amid chants, Reagan hoists party banner

DALLAS — President Reagan accepted the presidential nomination of the Republican National Convention Thursday night, declaring that Democrats intend to raise taxes, but he's going to stop them.

The reelection rally ended to chants of "Four More Years" and the strains of "America the Beautiful." Reagan summoned voters — 17,000 in the hall, and millions watching at home — to reelect his administration of "hope, confidence and growth" and reject the "pessimism, fear and limits" offered by opponents.

The Democrats "are openly committed to increasing your tax burden. We are committed to stopping them — and we will," said Reagan. His first and only appearance before the delegates off the noisiest floor demonstration of the week — and the most colorful.

The president waved and smiled as the band played "Hail to the Chief" and delegates chanted, "Four More Years." Reagan's speech was designated as a "political valedictory," his speechmaker said, but it read like the reelection appeal it was and the crowd punctuated it enthusiastically. Under the Democrats, Reagan said "Country after country fell under the

Soviet yoke. Since January 20, 1981, not one inch of soil has fallen to the communists." This prompted a rousing chorus of "Four More Years."

Reagan's speech closed out a convention that propelled him and Bush into the fall campaign as solid favorites against Democrats Mondale and Geraldine Ferraro.

As the president ended his remarks, red balloons dropped from the ceiling and white ones floated upward as delegates gave him his last and loudest ovation. Vice President George Bush was at his side, the first lady and Mrs. Bush joined them.

Ray Charles provided the patriotic finishing touch with a soulful rendition of "America the Beautiful," and the Republican ticket then walked with him to the podium for a salute from 17,000 persons who sang along.

Undergoing an invitation issued all week in Dallas, Reagan said Democratic leaders had taken their party "further and further away from its first principles," and said "we welcome to our side" voters who feel more comfortable with the Republicans.

"Our friends in the other party never met a tax they didn't like... or hike," he said, repeating a favorite. See GOP on Page A2

## Past 4 weeks leave Mondale prostrate

DALLAS — "What a difference four years make" is the campaign theme trumpeted by Republicans — from President Reagan to the most obscure convention delegate.

For underdog Democratic challenger Walter F. Mondale, the problem is the difference the last four weeks have made.

A month ago, the big question of the campaign was whether Reagan would raise taxes. Suddenly it shifted to whether John Zaccaro had paid any. When Mondale left San Francisco as the Democratic presidential nominee, it looked as if he had done the impossible. He had closed the gap in the polls and succeeded in setting the agenda of the campaign with this convention statement:

"Mr. Reagan will raise taxes, and so will I. He won't tell you. I just did."

### Analysis

The history-making nomination of Geraldine Ferraro for vice president, the time on taxes and the flag-waving upbeat closing session of the Democratic convention gave Mondale a running start on his campaign.

For a candidate who had been down and counted out so many times during the long campaign, the former vice president was riding an extraordinary high.

Now, as Labor Day approaches, Mondale is as far down as he's ever been, flat on the canvas, battered and bloodied. Like a punch-drunk fighter who doesn't know what hit him, the Democratic candidate could claim his opponent "never laid a glove on me."

During their convention, the Republicans tried out their anti-Mondale rhetoric. The tie to Jimmy Carter was part of every speech — Sen. Paul Laxalt describing Mondale as Carter's "hand-picked vice president."

And, of course, the Democrats who nominated Mondale were "an eccentric clique" according to the president, "... the party of the past..." the party of tired old clichés.

There were references aplenty to "special interests."

More telling may have been the expected quotations from Mondale's Democratic opponents. Laxalt enjoyed quoting John Glenn rapping Mondale for "promising everything to everybody," and Ernest Hollings calling him "a good lap dog." Then there was the quote from Gary Hart: "Mondale's mush. He's weak."

But all the Republican rhetoric was predictable. See THEME on Page A2

## Deficit soars in July

WASHINGTON — The federal budget deficit soared upward by \$16.4 billion in July, eight times the level recorded the month before, the Treasury Department said Thursday.

However, for the year the deficit is still running 11.8 percent below the record level set in the last fiscal year.

The department reported that the \$16.4 billion July deficit followed \$2 billion in red ink recorded in June. For the first 10 months of the 1984 fiscal year, the

government has run up a deficit of \$158.6 billion.

During the same time in 1983, the deficit totaled \$179.8 billion on its way to an all-time high of \$195.4 billion for the entire year.

The Reagan administration last week forecast a fiscal 1984 deficit of \$174.3 billion, an 11 percent improvement. It forecast a deficit for fiscal 1985, which begins Oct. 1, only slightly lower at \$172.4 billion if there are no changes in tax and spending policies.

The Treasury said federal spending totaled \$68.4 billion in July against receipts of \$52 billion.

## Revelations rekindle Falklands war battles

LONDON — More than two years after Britain's victory over Argentina in the Falklands, the war is still being fought in print and by an opposition Labor Party legislator who accuses Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher of lying.

The latest and most sensational accusation, published Thursday, was that Mrs. Thatcher's Conservative government had sent a Polaris nuclear missile submarine to the South Atlantic and contemplated a "threatened or demonstrated nuclear attack" on the Argentine city of Cordoba during the 1982 war. According to the left-wing New

Statesman magazine, Mrs. Thatcher also had ordered the sinking of the Argentine aircraft carrier, Veinticinco de Mayo (25th of May), with 1,500 men aboard.

This did not occur, but on May 2, 1982, a conventional British submarine sank the Argentine cruiser General Belgrano with the loss of 368 lives.

The sinking of the Belgrano has since been the persistent whipping boy of veteran Labor Party legislator Tom Dalglish. His constant theme has been that the war, which cost 255 British and 712 Argentine lives, could have been settled in its early stages if a Peruvian peace plan had been allowed to mature.

## Zaccaro defends loans for his firm

NEW YORK — Saying, "I felt I was doing the right thing... I still do," John Zaccaro on Thursday defended borrowing \$175,000 for his own business from an elderly woman's estate that a judge had appointed him to manage.

Zaccaro, husband of Democratic vice presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro, testified at a court hearing on the propriety of his actions as the woman's financial guardian.

State Supreme Court Justice Edwin Kassisoff was expected to issue a decision in the case within 30 days. Zaccaro's lawyer said his client made the loans in "good faith" but acknowledged they might have been improper.

Zaccaro is accused of improper "self-dealing" with the money of Alice Phelan, 84, and faces possible

reprimand or removal as conservator of her estate.

In the past year Zaccaro made two loans from Mrs. Phelan's accounts to his real estate management company, P. Zaccaro Co., of which Mrs. Ferraro has been part owner and director. She has said she had no role in running the company and announced Tuesday she was giving up her interest in it.

Zaccaro, sitting in the witness chair, said that "as a businessman, I believed the investments were prudent... to preserve the estate and enhance it." He was appointed conservator of the estate in 1982 after Mrs. Phelan was declared incompetent to manage her finances.

Zaccaro borrowed \$100,000 from the estate in October and repaid it with 12 percent interest in March. A loan this year for \$75,000 also was repaid with 12 percent interest, he said.

The loans, Zaccaro said, were "a safe investment" because "I knew that I had the wherewithal to guarantee them." He explained that since he controls P. Zaccaro, he knew the loans would be repaid. According to a financial statement released Monday, Zaccaro personally guaranteed the loan.

Asked by Kassisoff if he considered seeking legal advice on the propriety of his actions, Zaccaro said, "It never entered my mind."

Zaccaro's attorney, Morton Pomeroy, said "no lawyer" would regard Zaccaro's conduct permissible under the laws and guidelines that govern estate management. But he noted

## Utah escapee traced to Idaho

**POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP)**—Utah State Prison officials sent fingerprints and photographs of escaped inmate Wesley Allen Tuttle to Idaho Thursday to be matched with information obtained from a van thought to have been stolen by the convict.

Lynn Jorgensen, director of investigations at the prison, said the photographs will be shown to a witness who reported seeing a man abandon the van and start hitchhiking north near Rupert.

Tuttle and two other inmates, Walter Wood and Darrell Eugene Brady, escaped Thursday morning by prying open three doors and walking out the prison's front door dressed in civilian clothes. Wood and Brady were recaptured within 12 hours.

The van, a white 1979 Ford, was found parked by a drainage ditch near Rupert on Thursday. A resident told the Minidoka County Sheriff's Office it had been there for about 24 hours. Sheriff's investigators said the van was the same one being sought by Utah officials as the vehicle Tuttle may have stolen.

## Rollover kills Payette woman

**MOUNTAIN HOME (AP)**—A Payette woman was killed when her husband was injured Thursday when their suburban rollover as an ambulance on U.S. 20 north of here, Idaho State Police report.

Velda Newman, 67, died at the scene of the accident at about 11:30 a.m., ISP Cpl. Don Otto said. Her husband, 71-year-old Harold Newman, was listed in fair condition Thursday night with multiple broken bones at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, a nursing supervisor said.

Another passenger in the Newman vehicle, Matthew Newman, 13, was treated and released from Elmore Memorial Hospital in Mountain Home, a hospital spokeswoman said.

## Leak shuts down plant unit

**SAN ONOFRE, Calif. (AP)**—Southern California Edison Co. shut down Unit 3 of the San Onofre nuclear power plant Thursday after ocean water was discovered leaking into a steam turbine condenser.

"At 10:35 this morning, we shut the reactor down after we found high chloride levels in a steam generator," SoCal Edison spokesman Frank Bello said.

The leak was traced to a condenser tube feeding the generator on the non-nuclear side of the plant, Bellos said, adding that the unit would be operating again Friday.

## Police raid guerrillas' lairs

**SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)**—Chilean police shot and killed eight suspected guerrillas Thursday in what appeared to be the largest single crackdown on the extreme left in Chile since the mid-1970s.

A bystander was also reported killed in the shootings and three police agents wounded.

The shootouts and raids on presumed guerrilla hideouts took place in four cities and were apparently carried out by undercover agents who had the suspects under surveillance.

## Mid-August car sales climb

Sales of U.S. made cars rose a sharp 3 percent in mid-August following a mild downturn caused by spot shortages, the domestic automakers reported Thursday.

Among the Big Three carmakers, Ford Motor Co. said mid-August sales rose 4.2 percent from a year earlier, while industry leader General Motors Corp. said sales were up 3.5 percent and Chrysler Corp. posted a 2.7 percent gain.

Overall, it was the best mid-August sales pace since 1979, with the six major manufacturers selling 23,651 cars per day in the period compared with 17,900 a year ago.

In other developments, first-time applications for jobless benefits totaled 351,000 in the week ended Aug. 11, up 2,000 from the previous week, the Labor Department said.

## Napalm girl' leaves hospital

**LUDWIGSHAFEN, West Germany (AP)**—Kim Phuc, the "napalm girl" who became an image of the Vietnam war when she was photographed running naked and screaming from a bombing attack, was released from a clinic Thursday after surgery on the scarred areas of her body.

"The pains have stopped," she told reporters gathered at the Ludwig Gatlikman Clinic in Ludwigshafen, near Heidelberg, where she underwent surgery Aug. 2.

Kim Phuc, whose full name is Phan Thi Kim Phuc, became known worldwide as the "napalm girl" because of the photograph of her taken after a bombing attack on her South Vietnamese village in 1972.

## Druse officer dies in crash

**BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)**—Lebanon's highest-ranking Druse army officer, Maj. Gen. Nadim Hakim, was killed with nine other people Thursday in a fiery helicopter crash on a fog-shrouded mountain, the military command announced.

An army spokesman blamed the crash on "poor visibility resulting from thick fog," but Druse militia leader Walid Jumblatt said he was not convinced it was an accident.

Army spokesman Maj. Yousef Atrissi said Hakim was flying back to the Defense Ministry in suburban Yarzac east of Beirut from a meeting with former President Suleiman Franjeh at Franjeh's summer villa in Ehden when the helicopter hit the mountain.

## Gem court rules on evidence

**BOISE (AP)**—It isn't necessary to have direct evidence showing intent in a criminal case if the jury can reasonably determine that from circumstantial evidence, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Thursday upheld the hasty and grand theft conviction of Marvin Krommenhoek, an Ada County man convicted of stealing a car and injuring the vehicle's owner when the man later confronted him.

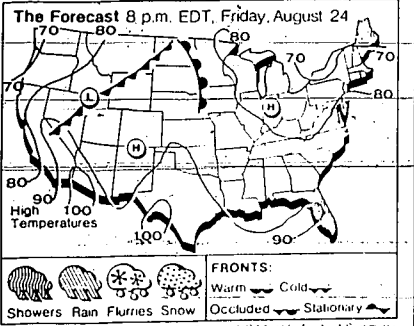

insult to Walter F. Mondale's prediction of higher taxes, no matter who wins Nov. 6.

He vowed to lower tax rates for "every American," but didn't say whether that meant a tax cut. He listed some legislative priorities, including a line item veto for curbing back specified spending commitments.

The Republican courtier attack on tactics led Mondale, at home in Minnesota, to charge that Reagan's reelection platform would add almost \$160 billion a year to the federal deficit — in part by granting "even more tax cuts for Mr. Reagan's rich friends."

The president, 73, was introduced to the audience by a slick 18-minute film produced by the Republican Party that drew repeated cheers, and not a few tears, from the delegates who watched a giant screen behind the podium.

The hall fell silent as the delegates

watched a replay of the 1981 assassination attempt on Reagan. God "must have been sitting on my shoulder" to help him survive, the president said.

So clearly partisan was the film that only one of the three major television networks, NBC, showed it in its entirety.

Bush spoke before Reagan, pledging his "every effort" to help re-elect the president.

But he was only a limited partner on Reagan's night as the president asked voters to join him on the road to "prosperity and economic expansion in a world at peace."

"America is coming back and is more confident than ever about the future," he said, establishing a principal theme of his re-election campaign.

"In this springtime of hope, some lights seem eternal."

He used his acceptance speech to contrast his own four years in office

with the Carter-Mondale years, and offered a grim prediction of a Mondale administration.

"Is there any doubt that they will raise our taxes. That they will send inflation into orbit again... make... deficits — even worse, raise unemployment, cut back defense preparedness, raise interest rates, make unilateral and unwise concessions to the Soviet Union..." he asked.

With each question came and the crowd's emphatic answer: "No."

He renewed his call for Congress to enact a constitutional amendment to balance the budget, and said, "If our opponents were as vigorous in supporting our voluntary school prayer law as they are in raising taxes, maybe we could get the lord back in our schoolrooms and get drugs and violence out."

He invited the voters to take a "little stroll down memory lane" of high inflation in the Carter-Mondale years.

And while Glenn, Hollings and Hart may have had some of the best lines in the Democratic battle, it was Mondale who emerged with the nomination.

The punches that have Mondale reeling were self-inflicted, and fed what may be a deeper problem than his ties to Carter or his liberalism.

It goes to the issue Mondale has tried to make paramount in the campaign since he stood in the chamber of the Minnesota House of Representatives and announced his candidacy in February 1983, saying

that the nation needs "a president who knows what he's doing."

When the controversy suddenly erupted over whether Ferraro's husband, John Zaccaro, would renege his tax returns, the Republicans jumped on it and they aimed their jibes less at Ferraro than at Mondale.

As the affair still was unfolding, Laxalt sounded almost sympathetic to Ferraro and said "her people have been badly served by the Mondale president." He said the former vice president "should have seized control and cleaned it up."

It was Mondale's theory that the American people continue to be uncertain over the issue like war and peace and where he is taking the country with his domestic policies.

He may be right. But to capitalize on it, Mondale must demonstrate that he is a credible alternative, that he has leadership qualities people want.

The last four weeks has made that job tougher.

It has enabled Reagan loyalists like Tommy Thomas of Florida to get mileage with jibes like: "Walter Mondale couldn't lead a group in silent prayer."

Zaccaro is not an attorney, and said, "I don't think that knowledge (about estates) is known outside the legal field."

Povman said Zaccaro "leaves the courtroom wiser as to his responsibilities" and charged that the guidelines his client was given when he was named conservator were "absolutely completely vague."

An administrative judge said this week that new guidelines for court-appointed conservators would be issued to prohibit the type of "self-dealing" in which Zaccaro engaged.

Under New York law, a conservator may not mingle the assets of an estate with his personal property.

The court-appointed referee in the case, Jonathan Weinstein, said the hearing was not a trial of Zaccaro's character. "The only question is with respect to his discretion," Weinstein said, "whether he should have known... that self-dealing is prohibited in this case."

Zaccaro told Kassoff that if F.

Zaccaro Co. had not borrowed the money from Mrs. Phelan at 12 percent, it probably would have had to pay "a half point above the prime rate."

The prime rate last October was 11 percent, meaning that if Zaccaro's assessment is correct his company paid 0.5 percent more to Mrs. Phelan than it would have on the open market. The money Zaccaro bor-

rowed was earning 10.6 percent in a money market fund.

Zaccaro said that since he began managing the estate, its value has risen from \$700,000 to \$1.1 million, partly because of the sale of stock at a high price. He also said he has visited Mrs. Phelan, who lives in a Queens nursing home. "She's in good condition," Zaccaro said. "She's healthy. She's well taken care of."

# Most Ferraro votes against real estate lobby

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Geraldine Ferraro has voted consistently against legislative positions taken by the National Association of Realtors, a potent lobby that lists her husband, John Zaccaro, among its 625,000 members.

Since coming to Congress in 1979, the New York Democrat opposed the Realtors' wishes nearly 86 percent of the time, according to voting records released Thursday by the association.

The statistics show that Ms. Ferraro, the Democratic vice presi-

dential nominee whose husband is a multimillionaire real estate dealer in New York City, sided with the Realtors nine times in 63 roll calls during the past 3 1/2 years.

Among these nine votes, however, seven were that were either procedural or involved tax issues where the position of the Realtors coincided with that of the House Democratic leadership in a dispute with the Republican-controlled Senate.

In legislative "report cards" covering Ms. Ferraro's first four years in

Congress, the Realtors said that almost 82 percent of her House colleagues had better voting records from the association's standpoint.

"The group awarded her a grade of 'C' for her performance in the 1981-82 session. No letter grade was given for her first session, and a corresponding 'report card' for the 1983-84 session has not yet been prepared, according to Marjorie Leedy, a spokeswoman for the Realtors.

Ms. Ferraro pointed out her Realtors' record Tuesday in a news con-

ference in which she answered questions about her family finances.

In their 63-vote scorecard, the Realtors tracked the performance of Ms. Ferraro and the rest of the House on a variety of issues, ranging from those directly affecting real estate to broad questions of budget and taxes.

As far as the Realtors were concerned, Ms. Ferraro got off on the right foot in her freshman year when on May 10, 1979, she was in the majority that voted to scuttle a standby gasoline rationing program

opposed by the group.

But in 16 other votes in her first term, she voted against the association.

In her second term starting in 1981, she voted against the association's positions on 22 of 25 roll calls.

A major vote that year was on President Reagan's three-year tax-cut plan. The Realtors supported it, but Ms. Ferraro was on the losing end on July 29 when the House approved it.

## Stevens target

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — In primary races where the key issues are the incumbent Republicans, five Democrats are battling for a chance to take on U.S. Sen. Ted Stevens and three others hope to challenge Rep. Don Young on Tuesday.

Stevens, a Republican who won two full Senate terms after being appointed to office in 1968, has avoided reacting to the criticism of the Democrats seeking his seat.

# Religion big part of GOP convention sessions

DALLAS (AP) — From the prayers that opened and closed each session to the adoption of each state delegation by a Dallas church, religion was as much a part of the Republican National Convention as concerns over taxes and America's defense.

One speaker even referred to the GOP as the "Prayer Party."

"Politics and morality are inseparable," President Reagan said at a prayer breakfast Thursday. "Without

God there is no virtue."

At the ecumenical breakfast, Reagan said he believes "faith and religion play a critical role in the political life of our nation and always have."

Religion, he said, has worked to the benefit of the nation from its very beginnings.

"Today, there are those who are fighting to make sure voluntary prayer is not returned to the

classrooms," he said. "The frustrating thing... is that those who are attacking religion claim they are doing it in the name of tolerance and freedom and open-mindedness."

"Questions isn't the real truth that they are intolerant of religion? That they refuse to tolerate its importance in our lives?" the president said. "I submit to you that those who claim to be fighting for tolerance on this issue may not be tolerant at all."

The party's platform stops just short of claiming religion as a Republican virtue. Democrats, it says, "tried to build their brave new world by assaulting our basic values... they attacked the integrity of the family and parental rights. They ignored traditional morality. And they still do."

On the night that Ronald Reagan and George Bush were renominated, the Rev. Jerry Falwell called them "God's instruments in rebuilding America."

A black Baptist minister, the Rev. R.V. Hill, wound up his speech to the convention by saying that "America needs God."

## Tax breaks draw attack by Mondale

NORTH OAKS, Minn. (AP) — Democratic presidential nominee Walter F. Mondale charged Thursday that tax breaks proposed in the Republican platform would help only the wealthy.


Mondale made the charge through staff aides who provided detailed estimates of the tax breaks' effects.

Mondale said in a statement that he has challenged Reagan to explain his budget plan. "The Republican Party has now responded — with even more tax cuts for Mr. Reagan's rich friends and an increase in the deficit that threatens our economic future."

In addition, Susan Estrich, a Mondale policy adviser, said, "These are things generally enjoyed by the wealthy in our society."

She said the Congressional Research Service examined Republican proposals approved at the party's Dallas convention this week for eliminating taxes on stock dividends and interest, doubling the personal exemption for individuals, repealing the windfall profits tax, and indexing business depreciation, inventories and capital gains.



### Zaccaro explanation should get scrutiny

John Zaccaro, the realtor-landlord husband of vice-presidential candidate Geraldine Ferraro, has some difficulty explaining to do about why a man of his supposed experience would use someone else's estate assets as the source of two loans to his own companies for \$75,000 and \$100,000.

The explanation, so far, has not been adequate. Zaccaro says he was never told that using funds from an estate of which he was named administrator for personal use is illegal in New York.

Maybe, but it strains his credibility. Prohibitions against such "comingling" of assets is against the law in most jurisdictions of the nation, a fact that any one-year student in law school could have told him if he had asked.

What we're seeing here is the systematic financial underdressing of a political candidate and the spouse, a practice which seems to go on with increasingly regularity in the post-Watergate morality politics.

Some would have it otherwise, returning politics to a time in which a person could run for office without ever disclosing the financial ties which bind him to lobbies, interest groups and partisan causes.

The result of the present trend, some say, is to drive genuine leaders away from the political process out of what amounts to fear of public scrutiny of their personal financial affairs. More legitimate secrecy, the argument goes, would both protect personal matters while ensuring public knowledge.

There is always a balancing act in such considerations. On the one hand, we all want respect for personal privacy in our financial affairs; none of us, for example, want people snooping through our bank accounts.

On the other hand, we believe, the public has a right to know a broad range of financial details about their public officials. It is not right, we believe, for a man like Zaccaro to hide all of his assets, no more than it is right for our own congressman, Rep. George Hansen, to run \$890,000 through a checking account in a month and refuse to say where it came from or to whom it went. The people have a right to know the truth about both.

The nation is in a curious period of accountability in American politics in which people expect a high degree of disclosure from our public officials. Yet, many Americans apparently are willing to accept their foibles as mere innocent omissions, despite persuasive evidence to the contrary in some instances. Who knows if that forgiveness will work for John Zaccaro or George Hansen?



## Moderate GOP women stick by but not its deeds

DALLAS — There are moments when the tiny band of moderate Republican women at this convention sound like graduates of parent training programs.

"I love YOU," they tell their misbehaving political family, "but not what you are doing."

What the party is doing is moving to the right, trampling some of the traditions that stand in the way. The platform not only opposes the ERA but rejects the proposed plank to welcome ERA supporters in the party. It not only opposes abortion but demands that would-be federal judges oppose abortion. The women who had a minority voice in 1980 can hardly be heard in their party in 1984.

Only a very few, such as Margaret Heckler, who led the ERA demonstration on Detroit streets in 1980, have been absorbed into the administration. A good many, like Elisabeth Griffin of the Women's Campaign Fund, have declared the title of Republican feminist to be an "oxymoron." Like Griffin, they are going underground instead of going to Dallas. A few — including Kathy Wilson of the National Women's Political Caucus or Illinois politician Susan Catania — have publicly split with the party.

But there are a few hardy survivors who refuse to go into exile and are being members of the loyal opposition. They are neither deserting nor approving the actions of their political family, but hoping that it will, in time, come around.

Most prominent among these women is Mary Louise Smith, former co-chair of the party. Until the conservative takeover, Smith,

who's been a Republican far longer than Ronald Reagan, could have posed for the profile of 'Typical Republican Woman.' To her, the party is the prodigal son who will surely return.

Moderate Congresswoman Claudine Schneider of Rhode Island, who decided only at the last minute to show up in Dallas, also came with the future in mind. On Monday, Schneider carefully drew a distinction between the platform, even the convention, and the party. If this is the heyday of ultra-conservative henchmen, said Schneider, "we feel, this too shall pass."

Even Maureen Reagan, whose attempt to broaden the women's rights platform was rejected, echoes Schneider's sentiment with the words, "We will live to fight another day." The common wisdom at this convention is that moderates are in for a long March. By 1988, they'll be scattered in political caves plotting a return to the power. But if there's any chance for moderation in this party, it may come from women.

The hard-core women's rights agenda is eclipsed, but women themselves are everywhere. Monday was women's night on the speakers' platform. More significantly, the percentage of women delegates has risen from 29 in 1980 to 44 in 1984. Most of them are first-timers.

There is nothing that makes these delegates angrier than the notion that they are mere "or" show. The general conceit is that the Republican women get their consent on merit, while Democratic women get theirs on quotas.

In fact, it's fair to say that women owe their numbers in part to the opposition. It was the Democrats who put the fear of the gender gap into the GOP. The party knows that only 23 percent of American women identify themselves as Republicans while 40 percent call themselves Democrats.

What's intriguing is how the conservative Republican women have behaved. In Detroit in 1980, conservatives, even women, spoke a "get behind your man" line. There was talk of extra ribs and biblical injunctions against stepping out of place. This year, Republican print-out sheets indicate that more than half the women delegates work outside the home. In life-style they are more like the rest of America.

In general, the rhetoric of conservatives about women's rights has been toned down and updated now to the nearly universal claim, "I'm for equal rights but not for the Equal Rights Amendment." Republicans are more likely to say the amendment is "unnecessary" than "dangerous." Everyone is tipping his or her hat to achieving women.

Not that there aren't some bizarre moments. The Eagle Forum luncheon and fashion show Monday featured a bona fide Republican congresswoman, Barbara Vucanovich of Nevada sashaying down the runway. In Sakowitz clothes fit for "running"

One of the more amusing themes of Republican orators is that they are the party of cheer and optimism, whereas the wretched Demos preach nothing but gloom and despair. For heaven's sakes, how dumb does the GOP think the American people are? The party in power is always the one singing, "Everything's Comin' Up Roses," while the Outs are always the guys going around like the prophet Isaiah yellin' "Doom, doom."

Four years ago, you couldn't get a Republican to admit there was a shred of hope for America to save yourself; the nation was on the high road to hell; and not one single good thing had happened in the U.S. of A. since of Jimmy took the oath of office. Four years ago, the Republicans were the most pluperfectly pessimistic herd of poor-mouthers there ever was and the Democrats were trying to pretend life under Carter had been one long Camp David Agreement. Being as the associates are unidentified and unknown, it's impossible to say how much of that \$3.2 million went to Bush, but he was co-founder and chairman. It was also assumed about Bush that he had inherited some money from his daddy Preston Bush.

The Hartford Courant could provide no specific information about the Bush family money, but has written about George's brother Prescott of Greenwich, Conn., that he is "blue-blooded," "an aristocrat," "old family" and "so forth."

That means an old family fortune, the reporter from Connecticut explained kindly, as though we might never have heard of such a thing down here.

By the time Bush ran against Lloyd Benson in 1970, we all assumed they were about equally rich. In fact, we used to complain that it was two rich guys from Houston running against each other, and Benson was rich enough to spend the famous \$6 million beating Yarborough that year.

So what happened to ol' George's money, always assuming we were right in assuming he had quite a bit? Part of the answer must be in something Barbara Bush said in an interview with the Other Paper. After Bush was elected to Congress, she said her only concern was for their children. "I worried that if the children came to me and said, 'I want to go to camp,' I would have to say 'O, we can't afford that.' So George very nicely set up very small trusts for all the children. That took care of the real thing in me. It was wonderful all the time they were growing up."

I'm sure it was, and of course it is entirely legal to put your money into trusts for the children. And the nice thing about doing that is you don't have to pay taxes on it. I thought about that when I read that Gerry Ferraro and John Zaccaro have been paying 40 percent of their income in taxes since 1978.

# U.S. scoffs at pictures of Sakharov

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration said Thursday that videotapes of dissident Andrei Sakharov and his wife, Yelena Bonner, "prove nothing" about their present condition.

It accused Moscow of trying to divert attention from a report that Mrs. Bonner has been sentenced to five years' internal exile.

Alan Romberg, a State Department spokesman, said the administration is concerned about a report that Mrs. Bonner was sentenced to internal exile after being convicted of "slandering the Soviet state." He said the trial apparently ended on Aug. 17.

Romberg said the report has not been confirmed, and he declined to say where it came from or to provide additional detail. But it was evident the department gave it credence.

If true, Romberg said, the action would "reflect the Soviets' disregard

for basic human decency" and violate the Soviet pledge in the 1975 Helsinki accords to uphold freedom of movement and expression for its citizens.

"We are outraged at the Soviet treatment of the Sakharovs," the spokesman said.

Romberg said the videotapes, which show the Sakharovs in various poses, were reportedly made available by Moscow to news media in the West by Victor Louis, a Soviet journalist who has previously served as a contact to Western public relations for the Soviet government.

But Romberg said the pictures appear to be more than a month old, and "prove nothing about the Sakharovs' present condition."

ABC, broadcasting excerpts of the videotapes on "World News Tonight" Thursday, said "the quality of the pictures suggest a hidden camera."

meaning that the Sakharovs were unaware they were being filmed. ABC said only the Soviet's secret police, the KGB, could have had such access in the closed city of Gorky.

"So it must be taken for granted that this is Soviet government propaganda," ABC said.

Pictures included old black-and-white footage and more recent color shots, but the Sakharovs are seen together only once — in the black-and-white section, "several years ago," said AHC.

The recent tapes show Mrs. Bonner driving her car and filling it with gas, "apparently living an active, healthy life," said ABC. Sakharov reportedly had initiated his hunger strike May 2 in an effort to get the Soviet authorities to let Mrs. Bonner leave the country for medical treatment.

Romberg said the United States will continue to demand that Soviet authorities allow independent observers to contact the Sakharovs.

"We will still not know definitely what the Sakharovs' mental and physical condition is until reliable observers are allowed to meet with them and talk with them," Romberg said.

## Pentagon tries for better press but combat coverage not certain

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department announced Thursday it has accepted proposals to improve relations between the military and the news media, but the chief Pentagon spokesman said the guidelines "don't guarantee that the press will be allowed to cover future combat operations."

The guidelines call for the maximum news coverage of the armed services, "consistent with military security and the safety of U.S. forces."

They were proposed by a special panel appointed by the Pentagon in the wake of the U.S. invasion of Grenada last October.

Reporters were barred from the Caribbean island for the first 48 hours of the invasion, the first time in U.S. history that the media had been banned from covering military actions.

The American Newspaper Publishers Association and the American Society of Newspaper Editors praised the new guidelines in a joint statement and said the panel's work "was exhaustive and productive."

The two groups promised to cooperate to improve military-media relations and said "it is the American people's right to be an informed citizenry which will benefit most from proper news coverage of the activities of the men and women of America's armed forces."

Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said he also plans to name a panel of "eminent journalists and former war correspondents" to advise him on how to deal with the press in future military actions.

Michael I. Burch, assistant secretary of defense for public affairs, told a news briefing that the new guidelines "are 'general ground rules'."

But he added, decisions about whether journalists can accompany troops will be made on a "case-by-

case basis" and the "most important thing is the safety of our forces and the security of the mission." Burch conceded that means the press might be barred again.

The guidelines were proposed by a panel headed by retired Army Maj. Gen. Winant Sigle and consisting of military officers and former journalists.

In general, the panel urged that defense planners give more consideration to helping the media do their job, such as providing information and assisting journalists to move themselves and their equipment in military areas.

## Military looks around for missile suppliers

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Pentagon spokesman suggested Thursday the military might "look to take our business elsewhere," if Hughes Aircraft Co. fails to clear up workmanship and other problems in producing key missiles.

Michael Burch, the Pentagon spokesman, dropped this warning while being questioned by newsmen about a halt in deliveries of the Phoenix Navy air combat missiles, Army TOW anti-tank missiles and Air Force Maverick ground attack weapons.

Acting for all the services, the Air Force's Contracting Management Division at Kirtland Air Force Base, N.M., announced Wednesday that the government was halting "progress payments" to Hughes because of what were described as "serious deficiencies" in the company's quality control system at its Tucson, Ariz., plant.

Hughes has been ordered to come in by Sept. 1 with a "comprehensive management plan" to solve the deficiencies, which one Air Force expert said involved chiefly poor workmanship.

Hal Watkins, a Hughes Missile Systems spokesman at Canoga Park, Calif., said: "We have responded to

the Air Force notification regarding the intention to suspend progress payments, and in a letter we have set forth the reasons why we think it should not be done." He declined to elaborate.

Burch estimated that about \$38 million is involved the holdup in progress payments for July.

When a reporter asked if such payments could be withheld for months, Burch said, "I don't know at this point."

"Before we continue, we want to be absolutely certain that Hughes can perform the work with the standard of quality that we expect," Burch said.

"It would not be unreasonable that if Hughes can't do it, that we look to take our business elsewhere," he said.

He did not indicate any other firms to which the Pentagon might turn.

In any event, Burch said none of the armed services will accept delivery of any missiles from Hughes "until after we evaluate this Sept. 1 report."

Only a month ago the Navy announced that it planned to open production of the Phoenix missile to competition in 1986. The Navy said it decided a second source of the missiles was needed because of the quality-control problems at Hughes.

# Boston utility cuts downtown power

BOSTON (AP) — Boston Edison cut power to a 20-block section of downtown on Thursday after smoke began pouring from manholes in Chinatown.

Hotels, theaters and subway stations were thrown into darkness, and rush-hour traffic was snarled as stop lights went dark.

Power was cut to 6,500 customers at 1:30 p.m. MDT when smoke was seen billowing from the manholes, said Patricia Korell, a spokeswoman for Boston Edison.

"We took the network out of service to prevent future damage," she said.

The power was shut off after underground cables over-heated and caught fire, said Jack O'Brien, another utility spokesman.

Power was to be restored later in the evening to about three-quarters of the area, with Chinatown expected to remain dark until today, O'Brien said.

Boston Edison's earlier estimate of 12,000 customers affected was incorrect, said Ann Carter, another utility spokeswoman.

The outage affected 20 blocks, or about a square mile, in an area bounded by Beacon Hill, Tremont Street and the city's waterfront.

Homebound-bound traffic was delayed as downtown traffic lights went dark.

Boston police moved 30 extra patrolmen into the area to move traffic and guard against looting,

said Tom Santry, a police spokesman.

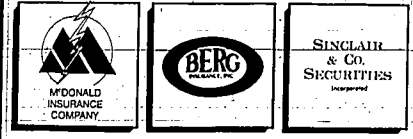
"These people drive better when the lights are out," joked police Sgt. Roger Spring, reporting no accidents.

New England Medical Center, located in the blackout area, reported its emergency generators cut in to provide the needed electricity.

"We lost all power. I've never experienced this before," said Emily Aertker, assistant to the manager of the Parker House hotel.

About 10 percent of the hotel's 400 guests were relocated because the Parker House had no power or water, said Manager Philip Georgas.

Transit officials said the outage knocked-out lighting in crowded subway stops, forcing a temporary end to train service along several routes.

# Oswald's perch for JFK slaying damaged by fire linked to arson

DALLAS (AP) — A Thursday morning fire which investigators blamed on an arsonist scorched three floors of the red brick building where Lee Harvey Oswald perched almost 21 years ago to assassinate President John F. Kennedy.

The fire began in the basement of the former Texas Schoolbook Depository, where photographs, documents and other artifacts from the Kennedy assassination were believed to be stored.

"There were multiple points of ignition," said Fire Department spokesman Bill Jernigan. Investigators are trying to determine how the fire was set, he said, but declined to discuss possible motives or suspects.

The basement contained newspapers from the time of the Nov. 22, 1963 assassination, books about Kennedy and panels from an auto rental sign that had been on top of the building, said Lindalyn Adams, president of the

Dallas County Historical Society, which plans an exhibit on the sixth floor.

"It's not that bad," she said after fire officials allowed her to inspect the inside of the building. "It's a relief."

The fire, first reported at 3 a.m. and declared out at 4:54 a.m., quickly spread to the first and second floors, sending smoke throughout the building, Fire Chief David Miller said.

Damage was estimated at \$30,000, but Miller said he understood most of the assassination-related materials in the basement were duplicated elsewhere. No injuries were reported.

The Warren Commission, which investigated Kennedy's assassination, concluded that Oswald fired the fatal shots from a sixth-floor window of the seven-story building in 1963.

Now the Dallas County Administration Building, the structure houses county offices, including the fire marshal's office and the county

commissioners court, which were among the areas damaged Thursday.

No offices are on the sixth floor.

The building is 10 blocks northwest of the Dallas Convention Center, the site of this week's Republican National Convention.

The sprinkler system had been turned off for repairs after a leak was discovered Sunday, said Fire Marshal Jim Baggett. The leak was fixed but others were discovered, so the system was not on when the fire started, he said.

"The fire traveled up into the walls," Miller said. "We had to cut into the walls. There is some smoke throughout the entire building. I saw smoke all the way to the top."

Asked what was burning, Fire Capt. E. B. Hill said, "It appeared to be wood, like plywood, like packing crates. We found lots of wood down there."

Burton died of a cerebral hemorrhage Aug. 5 in Geneva, Switzerland. He was 58.

The Wilshire Theater was filled with 1,000 people for the memorial organized by "Camelot" producer Mike Merrick. Burton and his former

wife, Elizabeth Taylor, had starred on the same stage last year in the poorly received "Private Lives."

Miss Taylor did not appear at the tribute, which was attended by Burton's third wife, Susan Hunt, and his widow, Sally Hay Burton.

"We have always known, we who act, that he was the best one," said actor George Segal, who told the audience of his fond memories of making "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" with Burton.

"He makes us all proud to be actors," Segal said.

# Gibb says chancellor not a 'panacea'

BOISE (AP) — An unpublished report urges Idaho to adopt some form of strong chancellor system to run the state's higher education system and avoid regional-bickering.

But Richard Gibb, president of the University of Idaho, said Thursday that would not be a "panacea" for the problems facing higher education. And Gibb told the Idaho Press Club he's worked in a state with that system, and it doesn't necessarily make the problems go away.

The state Board of Education re-

cently spent \$40,000 on an outside study of some of its problem areas.

Board President J. Clint Hoopes, Tetonla, said the board called in experts from other states in the fields of engineering, health services and graduate studies.

But rather than concentrate on the three areas, Hoopes said the report also contained a fourth chapter, suggesting changes in "governance" or the way the higher education system is run.

"Idaho Reports," a television pro-

gram prepared by the state's public broadcast stations, said Wednesday night the "governance" report was contained in a preliminary draft of the study, but was deleted from the final version.

Hoopes said he didn't recall whether board members took formal action to leave that chapter out, but members felt it was outside the scope of the requested study.

He said later this year, the education board plans to look at its own

organization and functioning, and may get into some of the same questions.

"Idaho Reports" said the deleted chapter strongly urged giving the Board of Education's executive director, currently Charles McQuillen, more authority.

As it stands now, the report said, the presidents of University of Idaho, Idaho State, Boise State and Lewis-Clark State College hold most of the authority.

## Ethical decisions due

BOISE (AP) — Because of technological advances, questions which were only hypothetical 20 years ago are crying for ethical decisions now, says the University of Idaho's president.

Such as what is "death" if a person's body can be frozen, perhaps to be revived years later?

And, what about the legal rights of frozen embryos from an Australian couple killed in a traffic accident?

Or, should colleges and universities continue research into producing more farm crops — knowing that bumper crops often produce reduced prices, thus hurting the very group the research is supposed to benefit?

Those were the ethical questions posed Thursday by Richard Gibb, University of Idaho president, to a

meeting of the Idaho Press Club here. And Gibb admits he doesn't have the answers, and neither does anyone else.

# Approval to prepare ballots expected from Boise today

BOISE (AP) — The secretary of state's office will give county clerks the go-ahead on Friday to print election ballots, and there apparently will not be any last-minute Democratic legislative amendments.

On Friday, the November election ballot will be certified. That means county clerks can order printing to start preparing for absentee balloting.

Clerks must make absentee ballots available by Sept. 27, 50 days before the Nov. 6 general election.

As a matter of practicality, said Deputy Secretary of State Ben Ysursa, that means a candidate who is not qualified by Friday afternoon will not appear on most ballots.

Candidates have until 10 days before the election to qualify for the ballot. But most counties have all their ballots printed at the same time, because it's less expensive that way, Ysursa said.

That means late-blooming candidates might have to be added by sticker, he said.

Since the May 22 primary election, 10 candidates have withdrawn - and they all are Democrats - Mc Morgan, Democratic party state chairman, said Thursday he doesn't know of any

replacement candidates in the works. Democrats were gearing up for a major effort at ousting a Republican veteran, Sen. Dane Watkins of Idaho Falls. The district is a huge new "floating" district covering several counties. And that's one reason why Bonneville

County Democratic Chairman Russ Webb said Rexburg lawyer Breck Barton was thinking about the race. Barton was nominated by the Democrats to replace James Peavler of Idaho Falls, who pulled out of the race against Watkins on Aug. 13.

But Webb said Barton has decided that personal and professional commitments will keep him from making the race.

Watkins, an Idaho Falls Republican, is serving his seventh term, and is in a powerful negotiating position as chairman of the Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee.

But Webb said that Watkins is almost unknown outside Bonneville County, and a well-known Democrat from the Upper Snake River Valley could have given Watkins a battle.

Democrats planned to focus on Watkins' vote against subordinating Snake River water rights held by Idaho Power Co. to upstream farm use.

Absentee ballots must be printed long before the election, because it takes "forever" to mail ballots to foreign countries and get them back in time to be counted in the election, Ysursa said.

## Stallings sets debate day

BOISE (AP) — Democratic congressional candidate Richard Stallings said Wednesday he would debate his opponent, Rep. George Hansen, on Oct. 18, regardless of whether Hansen discloses his personal financial records.

Bill Hansen, the congressman's son and campaign manager, said his father will not decide until Sept. 7 whether to debate Stallings. The debate is to be sponsored by the League of Women Voters and the Idaho Press Club. It is to be held on the campus of Idaho State University in Pocatello and aired on public television across the 2nd Congressional District.

Stallings said last week that he did not want to debate Hansen until the congressman answered questions about his personal finances. Stallings said then that he wanted the debates centered on issues, not Hansen's legal problems.

But Stallings said Wednesday that it was "more of a hope than a condition" that Hansen would disclose his finances before the debate.

Hansen was convicted in April of four counts of filing false personal financial disclosure reports with the House Ethics Committee.

## Envirosafe call for order fails

MURPHY (AP) — A 3rd District judge on Thursday refused to grant Envirosafe Service's request for a restraining order against Owyhee County.

But District Judge Dennis Goff set Sept. 4 for further proceedings on the company's request for an order that Owyhee County can't inspect and regulate its hazardous waste disposal site because that's a function already performed by the state and federal governments.

Envirosafe, which operates a hazardous waste disposal site near Grand View, contends the county has improperly collected \$105,000 in fees since February.

## Idaho Power denies gas takeover

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Power Co. has denied reports it is seeking to acquire Intermountain Gas Industries based in Boise.

"We've discussed it a number of times," Idaho Power President James Bruce said Thursday. Acquisition would be favorable for ratepayers, he added.

But Bruce said Idaho Power has no immediate plan to seek acquisition of Intermountain, the parent of Intermountain Gas Co., which sells natural gas in southern Idaho.

Plateau Resources, a newly formed corporation controlled by businessmen from Colorado and Canada, has made a cash takeover bid of \$36 per share to Intermountain Gas shareholders. The offer apparently was unchanged on Thursday, Intermountain spokesman Bill Chapman said.

Court action after the offer was announced on Aug. 13 resulted in Plateau winning a preliminary injunction.

The U.S. District Court order de-

clared that pending judgment on the constitutionality of Idaho's corporate takeover law, that statute cannot be used to block purchase of Intermountain stock.

Officials of another utility, Utah Power and Light Co., refused to deny or confirm on Thursday that the Salt Lake City-based company is seeking to acquire Intermountain Gas.

Chapman also said he could not comment on reports Utah Power and Light had made a proposal.

## Judge awaits motions

BOISE (AP) — A Boise district judge says he's postponing setting a new execution date for convicted slayer Lacey Sivak to give a new state law a chance to work.

That means Sivak's attorney will have 42 days to file motions and legal arguments designed to bar Sivak's execution for the slaying of Dixie Wilson, 30, in a 1981 Garden City robbery.

Sivak has been sentenced to death for the slaying. Earlier this year, the U.S. Supreme Court refused to consider the case.

Last Friday, the Idaho Supreme Court directed 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse to set a new execution date for Sivak.

Similar orders went out to 1st District Judge Gary Haman, covering convicted killers Thomas Gibson and Donald Paradis. Their appeals also were rejected by the nation's highest court.

At the recommendation of Attorney General Jim Jones, the Idaho Legislature approved a new law designed to expedite appeals in criminal cases.

It requires defense attorneys to submit all legal arguments at the same time, rather than submitting new appeals and arguments as each previous appeal is rejected.

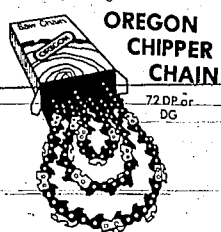
Newhouse said Thursday he will wait 42 days, the period specified in the new Idaho law, before setting a new sentencing date for Sivak.

That will allow Sivak's attorney to advanced any argument or appeal that should be considered before the man is sentenced again, the judge said.

It will be the first test of the Idaho law, which Jones said was designed to prevent the "endless" appeals which can drag murder cases on for years.

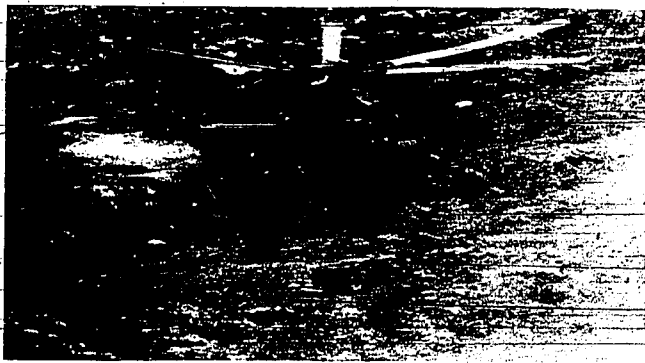

## Soviet ships join mine quest

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — A Soviet destroyer and helicopter cruiser, outfitted with anti-mine gear and tailed by a U.S. warship, sailed through the Suez Canal Thursday and into the Gulf of Suez.

They brought to five the number of Soviet naval vessels that have passed through the canal since Saturday, bound for the multinational minesweeping effort in the Red Sea.

Eighteen ships from four Western navies — the United States, Britain, France and Italy — are already in the area or headed there for the attempt to clear the vital waterway of mines that have damaged at least 18 vessels since July 9. The operation went into full swing last Friday, but no mines have been found.

...The Egyptians have blamed Libya for the mining, but have not ruled out Iran, which earlier threatened to extend the Iran-Iraq war from the Persian Gulf to the Red Sea.

Joining the Western effort Thursday were the French mine-hunters *Cassiope* and *Eridan*, which arrived at Port Said in the morning. A French support vessel, the *Loire*, was expected over the weekend.

Canal officials said the Leningrad, a 20,000-ton cruiser carrying 500 crew and with three helicopters visible on its deck, left the canal Thursday at 4 p.m. It was followed by the 3,000-ton destroyer, identified only as No. 710, carrying 250 crew.

Tailing them was the U.S. frigate John L. Hall, Defense Department

officials in Washington acknowledged that the frigate was shadowing the Soviet helicopter cruiser, which qualifies as a helicopter carrier in the U.S. Navy.

The canal officials, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said the two Soviet ships were headed for the Babel Mandeb Strait at the mouth of the Red Sea, an area bordered by South Yemen. South Yemen is linked to the Soviets by a friendship treaty and provides the Soviets with naval facilities.

Eleven of the 18 explosions have occurred in the southern part of the Red Sea. The Soviet Union is reported to be conducting mine-clearing operations in that region.

## Iran bomb kills 17

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — A bomb explosion ripped through a busy rush-hour street near Tehran's railway station Thursday, killing at least 17 people and wounding 300 others in the bloodiest terror attack here in two years, the official Iranian news media reported.

Callers to foreign news agencies claimed responsibility for the attack in the name of two groups opposed to Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Islamic revolutionary government. Official Tehran radio blamed "the stooges of America."

The bombing occurred against a backdrop of reported in-fighting

within the Moslem fundamentalist regime, internal subversion and continuing war with Iraq.

The bomb, said to have been planted near a fruit-juice vendor's stand just off south Tehran's Rah-Ahan (Railroad) Square, exploded at 8:50 a.m., the height of the rush hour.

The news agency said 17 people were killed, but the radio put the total at 18.

Tehran's police chief, Col. Abbas Moazzami, told the agency that eight of the approximately 300 wounded were listed in critical condition.

## Now Chernenko drops from view

MOSCOW (AP) — Konstantin U. Chernenko has not been seen in public for six weeks and his complete retreat from "public life" has prompted speculation about the health of the 74-year-old Soviet president.

Chernenko suffers from respiratory problems, and Western diplomats in Moscow say they have heard rumors that he returned to the hospital for some type of medical treatment earlier this month. However, the diplomats say they doubt anything is seriously wrong with the Soviet leader.

## Livestock futures prices up

By The Associated Press

Buyers returned to the livestock pits on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange Thursday and drove futures prices higher for cattle and frozen pork bellies and mostly higher for live hogs.

Wednesday's sharp losses in the pork pits were reversed as traders anticipated the Agriculture Department's September hogs and pigs report that is expected to show some liquidation in the breeding herd, said John Ginzell, a livestock analyst with Drexel Burnham Lambert in Chicago.

"If they're not born they can't be brought to slaughter," Ginzell said.

The frozen pork belly contract for August, which went off the board Thursday, closed near its 2-cent ceiling as no deliveries were made against that contract, Ginzell said.

Analysts said live cattle charged ahead at the close on strong buying by a major commercial firm and belief that beef carcass prices have touched bottom.

At settlement, live cattle were .10 cent to 1.48 cents higher with the contract for delivery in October at 62.95 cents a pound; feeder cattle were .02 cent to .75 cent higher with September at 65.60 cents a pound; live hogs were 12 cent lower to .52 cent higher with October at 46.82 cents a pound; and frozen pork bellies were .70 cent to 1.92 cents higher with August at 56.47 cents a pound.

Precious metals prices fell on the Commodity Exchange in New York.

An increase in the federal funds rate, the reserves banks lend one another overnight, helped boost the strength of the U.S. dollar against the metals and major foreign currencies, said Martin McNeill, vice president of Dominick & Dominick Inc. in New York.

"Everything in the metals market is predicated on the dollar," said McNeill, who termed the market "thin and easily swayed."

At settlement, gold was \$4.50 to \$4.70 lower with the contract for delivery in September at \$349.80 a troy ounce; and silver was 8.8 cents to 9 cents lower with August at \$7.002 a troy ounce.

Cocoa closed higher for the third day in a row on the New York Coffee, Sugar and Cocoa Exchange.

"Cocoa has been propelled by word that Nigeria has defaulted on its shipments," said Mike Paulenoff, a cocoa, sugar and coffee analyst with Smith Barney in New York.

The said uncertainty over the Nigerian cocoa exports has sent buyers scurrying in search of high-quality beans in Ghana and the Ivory Coast. Rainfall in the west African cocoa belt may have been too generous and there's talk the crop may suffer some pod rot, Paulenoff said.

At settlement, cocoa was unchanged to \$18 higher with the contract for delivery in September at \$2,366 a ton.

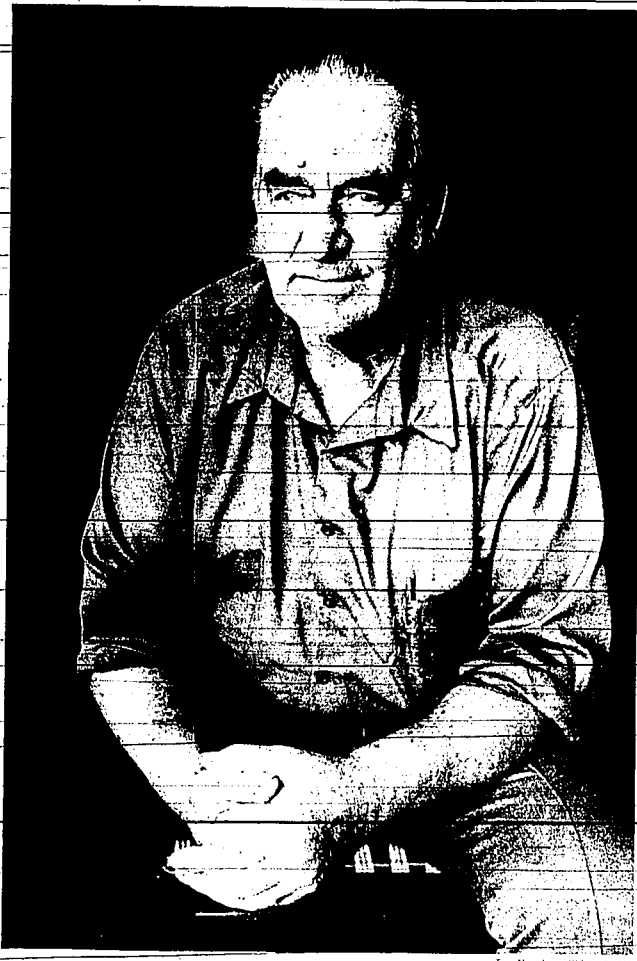

## Idaho's artistry impresses visitor

BOISE — Idaho is "blessed not only with mountains and good weather, but also with a wide variety of artistic excellence," says Frank Hodsoil, Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts in Washington, D.C. Hodsoil was in Boise recently to assist with opening ceremonies for a new exhibit of Idaho folk art.

Funds from the endowment organization assisted with research and development of the exhibit, "We Came To Where We Were Supposed To Be: Folk Art of Idaho," now on exhibit through Sept. 16 at The Boise Gallery of Art.

Hodsoil's visit to Boise was part of a three-state western tour primarily oriented toward "getting a sense of how we can assist, particularly the smaller communities, to have a bit more of the arts available to them."

His visit was the first time in more than 10 years that a chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts has come to Idaho.

At an afternoon news conference, Hodsoil's remarks focused on finding "cooperative ways in which there can be more arts presence," whether through touring, the media, artists in schools, or devices such as providing libraries video cassettes of programs like "Dance in America" so they might be available in rural communities.

Pointing to a survey conducted by the National Endowment for the Arts in conjunction with the Census Bureau, Hodsoil said very few people list costs as a reason for not attending arts events. Distance and non-availability of arts events are two of the major reasons cited in the survey, he said. Hodsoil acknowledged that getting the arts to small communities is "tough," particularly in the west where distances are great and costs high.

He said the National Endowment for the Arts acts as a "catalytic stimulus to assist the arts."

"What we really have to do is the federal level, working with the states and localities who are partners in public funding, is to find ways to make those dollars stretch further and to focus them in a cohesive way on national problems, like this, instead of getting (the arts) out to the rural areas."

## Authors take close look at anthropologist Margaret Mead

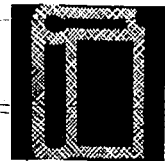
Margaret Mead was not just our most famous anthropologist and popularizer of social science. She was a whirlwind of energy, a secular prophet, in time a larger-than-life American icon simultaneously embodying science and religion, tradition and change, womanhood and androgyny. She was also three times a wife, once a mother, a lover to both men and women.

Fame came early, with the publication in 1928 of "Coming of Age in Samoa" while she was in her 20s. But if public acclaim made her the Carl Sagan of social science, it also

encouraged her to pontificate on matters beyond her ken.

She was, by general agreement, a first-rate scientist but not a seminal thinker. Her forte, both in her own writing and in the conferences she was continually convening or attending, was to set off one point of view against another and watch as something altogether new emerged from the collision.

With a Daughter's Eye, a memoir by anthropologist Mary Catherine Bateson, daughter of Margaret Mead

and Gregory Bateson (the third "Mr. Mead"), and "Margaret Mead: A Life" by journalist Jane Howard complement each other nicely. Both manage to reduce the icon to life size

while maintaining the largeness-of-Mead's humane vision.

Mead and Bateson, a quirky British scientist whose interests ranged from anthropology to cybernetics to family therapy, separated when their daughter was 8. Mary-Catherine lived with her mother, but nonetheless remained close to both parents. Her affecting, unsentimental book has much to teach us about their distinctive personalities and styles of thinking

and about the perils and pleasures of growing up a child of famous parents. She is a memoirist and not a keeper of the sacred flame, precisely, one suspects, because the level-headed Batesons would not have wanted it

any other way.

In "Margaret Mead," the first full-scale biography, Jane Howard is both thorough-reporter and affectionate admirer. She interviewed nearly 300 of Mead's friends and professional colleagues (including Gregory-Bateson-and-Mead's-first-husband, Luther Cressman; her second husband, Leo Fortune, died before he could be interviewed; and Mary Catherine Bateson was one of the few family members and in-

terviews who declined to be interviewed). Additionally, the author has drawn on Mead's published works and numerous letters in manuscript collections to produce a smoothly readable book charged with the same

gusto that animated Margaret Mead's life.

While this biography occasionally succumbs to hyperbole (limitless energy seemingly equated with limitless talent), it certainly succeeds in presenting a vivid portrait. By Howard's account, Margaret Mead could be an intellectual provocateur and a delightful companion, never a bore.

What this book lacks, however, is any evaluation of the quality of Mead's ideas or any perspective on their place in our intellectual history. Still, as "a generalist's portrait," which is all its author claims for it, the book should find an appreciative audience.

## Olympic pianos now collectors' treasures

LOS ANGELES — The 84 pianos that pounded George Gershwin's "Rhapsody in Blue" into the world's consciousness at the Opening Ceremony of the Olympics are now making music for some serious memorabilia collectors. After the Games ended, medallions reading, "Kimball, Supplier to the 1984 Games" were affixed to each of the pianos.

Then the 5-foot-2 and 5-foot-8 ebony grands were cleaned and shipped to stores, where they're selling as fast as Olympic pins — but apparently at non-Olympian prices. Times, Inc., Glenn Holloway, manager of San Diego-based Piano Exchange, said

he's been selling the 10 he received for the regular price — in the \$6,000-\$7,000 range, for the smaller size and \$8,000-\$10,000 for the large. He's got two left.

Purchasers want them "primarily because they were in the Olympics," he said. "I've been doing this for 28 years, and it was surprising to me that people would buy a piano just because it has been used in the Olympics."

Did the buyers know how to play the piano? "Some did and some didn't," Holloway said. "They said they were going to learn."

The instruments were built by the Kimball Pianos in French Lick, Ind., and provided to the Los Angeles

## 'Dreamscape' is fluff for nightmares

The ability to project yourself into and manipulate the dreams of another would be a powerful talent. Used for good, it could help those plagued by unconscious fears and dream-state horrors.

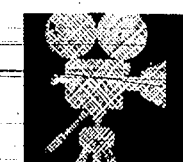
But for other than benevolent purposes, the gift could be a tool of torment and murder. In "Dreamscape" is an able if not irresponsible telepath (Randy Quaid) is good-naturedly blackmailed into participating in the development of such nocturnal skills.

The research program in which he becomes a star is supposed to be for the good of scientific advancement. But its real aim becomes

questionable when the President of the United States begins to have nightmares of nuclear holocaust. "Dreamscape" is an imaginative concept. With its competent and eerie special effects, it sports deft moments of representing the temporal quality of dreams.

But it quickly loses its grip on the audience by getting bogged down in the worn sub-plot of bad government men prostituting the worth of scientific discovery.

The biggest weakness of all is Quaid, who makes a ho-hum hero. The character's carefree attitude is reduced by Quaid into a frequent smirk. And when the going gets

tough, his acting ability is nowhere to be found. Co-star Kate Capshaw, who played the spunky love interest in "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom," portrays a spunky love interest in "Dreamscape." She is lovely, but unconvincing.

Max Von Sydow is capable as usual as the compassionate head of the research program. He alone provides a stable performance.

The usually enjoyable Christopher Plummer, on the other hand, adds nothing to the role of chief government benchman. Only John Patrick Kelly, as a menacing telepath, also involved in the dream experiments, provides any fright and fun. He really puts the psych into psychopath.

"Dreamscape" does offer some exciting scenes like the final battle within a phantasmagoric world. It can't alone, however, for the predictable stuff that dominates the film. "Still," "Dreamscape" is a passable fluff piece and the stuff that moviegoers' dreams are made of.

# Paying high prices for art appears to be fashionable

Too many American museums today are shelling out megabucks for mini-values in art, says a leading American art authority.

The exception is a jewel of a museum in Little Rock, Ark., according to Thomas Hoving in his column in the August issue of Connoisseur.

"Every time I pick up a press release from an American art museum these days, I seem to read that—another—million—dollar—masterpiece—has—been—acquired, with much hullabaloo," he writes.

Hoving, editor of Connoisseur and former director of New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art, calls these works "millionart" and describes them as anything from an American landscape painting to an Oriental bibelot.

"He traces the trend in 'millionart' back to 1961, when the Metropolitan Museum bought Rembrandt's 'Aristotle Contemplating the Bust of Homer' for a mind-boggling price of \$2.3 million.

He says that set off a chain reaction of super-spending."

"Today, shelling out big bucks for works of art—sometimes second rate ones—has become a fashionable activity, reported eagerly by newspapers, television, and gossip columnists," Hoving says.

"Nowadays, if a curator does not present his acquisitions committee with something that costs more than a million rocks at least once a year, he or she is a 'wimp.'"

"Recently, one member of an eminent museum purchasing committee was asked to vote for some things priced at only \$25,000 and blurted out nervously, 'It's so cheap, how do I know it's any good?'"

He traveled to Little Rock to interview Townsend Wolfe, the center's executive director and the man responsible for assembling its stunning collection.

Wolfe told Hoving the center's board of trustees decided in 1962 to use its modest budget to buy only works on paper. Since 1971, when the program shifted into high gear, the center has gathered more than 500 European and American drawings—from Rembrandt to contemporary American artists.

Wolfe explained to Hoving why the center acquired only drawings:

"A drawing for us is a major work of art; we feel that it possesses all the qualities of a painting or sculpture. It can provide us, the viewers with spiritual and intellectual experiences as profound as any other that man can have in the world of art. A drawing not only shows the search but can often be the promised land as well."

He summed up his strategy of collecting in one word: "Quality." Wolfe told Hoving the group of more than 100 American masterworks cost the museum from \$150 to a top price of \$20,000, with most of the drawings in the \$3,000 to \$4,000 category.

"Which proves, Hoving says, 'that if you're dedicated and if you have the eye,' you can still find a host of masterpieces well outside the lofty markets of 'millionart.'"

# The Cars have hit road again

The Cars have hit the road again. They're out on a two-month tour that started in mid-July.

Their Elektra album, "Heartbreak City," their first in two years, was No. 5 on the best-selling chart for three weeks in May. On Aug. 11 it still was No. 6.

"Drive" the third single from the album, was No. 39 and climbing on the Aug. 11 chart. "Drive" entered the best-selling chart only the week before, high up at 55.

"There should be four or five singles off this record, which is quite a lot," says Ric Ocasek, singer and guitarist who also writes the Cars' songs. "The most we've had off a single was three off our first—most of the records had two."

"Heartbreak City" already is a platinum album, which means it has sold more than a million copies. "The Cars," which was the first album, in 1978, "Candy-O," "Panorama" and "Smoke It Up" also sold platinum.

There were rumors during the last two years, that the Cars were on the scrapheap. "We just laughed at that," Ocasek says.

Writers also like to put a little tension into the band when there isn't any. I don't care what they say.

"Most definitely, as far as getting along with each other, it's pretty good."

"There has got to be someone at the helm of the thing. I guess I would be that person, since the material emanates from me. There is a certain amount of control. It is not like a dictatorial thing. The money is split even. Bruce Springsteen can hire sidemen. This is the Cars, a band.

It has been two years between records by the Cars, Ocasek says. "Because I did a solo record and produced three other albums by other people, Alan Vega, the Bad Brains and Iggy Pop. I was very busy and didn't write a Cars record.

"The records I produced were definitely on the art side. They're all pretty esoteric, not commercial pop. My solo record wasn't as accessible as Cars music, on purpose. It helps me spread out a bit."

Olympic Organizing Committee without charge, said Charles Tagliareni, Kimball's director of advertising.

In return, Kimball avoided paying a whopping fee to become the official piano supplier to the Summer Games. Tagliareni said from the firm's Jasper, Ind., headquarters. "In comparison to being a sponsor, it was quite inexpensive," said Ray Reuter, professional products manager for the 17-year-old firm. Reuter said he didn't know the cost of moving and preparing the pianos.

Although some music stores are rumored to be charging premium prices for the pianos, most retailers said they're already too costly for such a mark-up.  
In fact, Plano Mart in Santa Monica discounted the Olympic pianos even though they sell "like hot cakes" and

the store has sold about a dozen and has just two left, spokeswoman Cathy Wyatt said.

"Who knows if this is just a fad?" Ms. Wyatt said. "Hi wear-off-and we'll be back with them."

"Few people can just go ahead and plunk down \$5,000 to \$6,000," the price Plano Mart is charging, Ms. Wyatt said. "It's quite a souvenir. It's a gamble to hope that it goes up a lot in value."

Kimball was chosen by Tommy Walker, the director of the Games ceremonies, who had talked with Kimball about a "monster concert" at the New Orleans World's Fair that never worked out.

"But when Tommy went out and presented the idea to the Olympic committee, they loved it, and he contacted (Dennis) Guillaume, national sales manager for Kimball Pianos," Tagliareni said.

Six piano technicians, including Reuter, tuned all 84 pianos to concert pitch on Friday, July 27, the day before the Opening Ceremony. The next day, Guillaume and Jim Bly, an executive vice president of the firm, were among the 84 pianists that rose on platforms in the peristyle end of the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum, playing "Rhapsody in Blue."

# Actor hits peak in his 60s

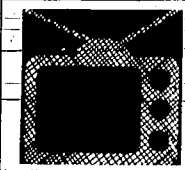

LOS ANGELES — George Gaynes, who has performed with the New York City Opera, acted on Broadway and was the soap opera actor on the make for Dustin Hoffman in "Tootsie," has no trouble handling stardom in his 60s.

After "Tootsie," he scored as the marvelously dippy commandant in "Police Academy." Television took notice of the "new" comedy performer, and now he's starring in the new NBC sitcom, "Punky Brewster."

He is a big, robust man of 64 with sandy hair and a friendly face. He seems such a native American that it's a shock to learn he was born in Finland to a Dutch father and Russian mother.

"My parents divorced soon after I was born," he said in an interview. "I went with my mother to Paris, then she married an Englishman and I was raised by governesses for

eight years. They divorced, my mother moved to Switzerland and I was a Swiss boy for seven years.

He was studying opera in Milan, Italy, when World War II broke out, interrupting his schooling. He joined the Dutch navy and then the British navy.

After combat in the Mediterranean, Gaynes served a year in the occupation force at bombed-out Emden in northern Germany, and then became manager of an opera

company in Alsace. Gaynes's soaring-basso took him to Europe's major opera houses, then to the New York City Opera in 1949.

"Opera falls after a few years," he said. "The sets and costumes are tacky, the operas are not well directed, and they are insufficiently acted. I took a role on Broadway in Gian Carlo Menotti's 'The Consul,' and for several years I was the only performer commuting between opera and Broadway musicals, sometimes doing both at the same time."

Gaynes appeared in such shows as "Wonderful Town" (with Rosalind Russell) and "A Community of Two" (Claudette Colbert). He was in the movies, "PT 109" and "The Way We Were," and even played the malevolent Mr. Smith in the soap "General Hospital."

But despite a seemingly successful career, there was a period when he could find only small-time TV and theater jobs.

Margaret Mead (1901-1978) was the eldest child of Edward Sherwood Mead, a professor at the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Finance, and Emily Fogg Mead, his bookish wife. From an early age, the child learned a lesson that would shape her life ever after: that "being observed was wonderful, and that observing others ... was more wonderful still."

At Barnard College, Margaret Mead came under the spell of anthropology, then a fledgling discipline struggling for academic respectability. Her mentors were the eminent scholar Franz Boas and an instructor named Ruth Benedict, who would later become one of the field's superstars and Margaret's sometime lover and lifelong friend.

Always willing to jump when opportunity beckoned, Margaret went off to

Samoa in search of a Ph.D. dissertation. Exotic peoples and faraway places had more allure than her husband, who remained at home. On the voyage back, she met and fell in love with Reo Fortune, a New Zealander bound for Cambridge University. On yet another field trip in the South Pacific, with Reo along as colleague and husband, she met Gregory Bateson, also an anthropologist, and the pattern repeated itself.

In Howard's biography, there is little accounting for Mead's boldness in a world dominated by men. Mead is not an avowed feminist, though she is an emancipated woman. She plunges into the world of scholarship, travels round the world, discards husbands with aplomb. She neatly finishes up an article for the Encyclopedia Britannica the day before giving birth.

Mary Catherine "Dr. Spock" will

get to be the child's pediatrician, for having had the good sense to be psychoanalyzed.

Mead seems here a force of nature who had no match, at least until she met Bateson. Luther Cressman survived the breakup of his marriage, Howard reports, but Reo did not fare as well. He was deeply hurt by the departure of his more famous wife. Though he went on to publish several well-received books, his battered psyche was never quite the same.

# Ruined Buhl building didn't meet fire code

**BUHL** — A Buhl building destroyed by fire Wednesday did not meet uniform fire code standards adopted by the Buhl City Council.

The building, whose lone tenant was killed in the Wednesday fire, was gradually being brought up to code by its owner Tom Fleming, says Buhl Fire Chief Mark Grimes.

But Grimes says that Fleming lacked the money to bring the building fully up to code; he was in the process of shutting down a second-floor rooming house destroyed by the Wednesday fire.

Grimes said that he has been "extremely worried" about the fire hazards posed by both

Fleming's building at the west corner of Broadway Avenue and Main Streets and the adjacent Buhl Hotel, which houses 46 residents.

But he said the Buhl Fire Department has been forced "to sell fire prevention" rather than enforce it, because city ordinances fail to grant fire officials citation powers.

Grimes said the city does not have a certified fire inspector or an ordinance allowing enforcement of the code.

"I cannot issue citations for violations," he said. "I can only recommend."

In the wake of the fire, Grimes said he plans to meet with the Buhl city council to again request a certified state fire inspector and an ordinance allowing the inspector to issue citations for failure to bring buildings up to fire code.

He said that a similar measure he previously requested failed to win city council approval.

Grimes said Buhl has never had a certified fire inspector and he has been unable to train one. The Buhl Fire Department consists of three paid firemen, including the fire chief, and 24 volunteers.

Grimes said he has worked with area businessmen to reduce fire hazards. Grimes said he began working with Fleming two years ago to bring the Sports Shop building up to code.

Fleming could not be reached for comment Thursday night.

Grimes said no inspection of the building had been made this year. However, a "pre-plan inspection," which consists of examining

a building and planning how firemen would fight a possible fire, was made in May.

This pre-plan inspection found the first floor, which housed the Sport Shop Cafe and Bar, Hair Hut, and a cable television office, had been largely brought up to code. But the second floor continued to have code violations that would be expensive to correct, Grimes said.

"Due to economics, he (Fleming) took the best option available and that was to cut down the occupancy,"

Grimes said the second floor had only one exit, however, he was unsure whether this constituted a code violation because of the second-story windows that could serve as emergency escape exits.

The wood-heated Buhl Hotel has also been a

major source of concern, Grimes said, because of a lack of up-to-date fire extinguishing equipment, lack of sprinkler systems, lack of exit signs and lack of alarm systems.

Jerry Cahill, the owner of the Buhl Hotel, says he has tried to correct conditions pointed out by Grimes. He says the hotel has five exits, including several fire escapes.

Grimes says Cahill has corrected some problems, but lacks the money to completely bring the building up to code.

An investigation into the cause of the fire was scheduled to continue today with the arrival of an insurance investigator. Grimes said he would probably be able to release a dollar figure on fire loss today. But he said there was still too much heat and smoke to get into the rubble in an attempt to reach the areas where the fire could have started.

### Pair on cycle injured In Wendell crash

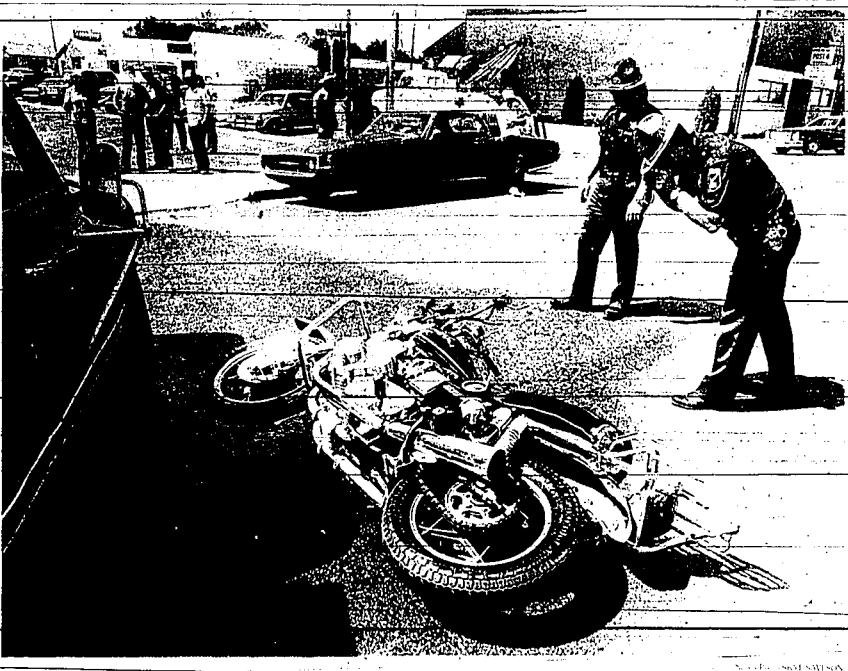

Laughlin was cited for failure to yield while turning left. He was not injured. McFall said neither Rasmussen nor Busch was wearing a safety helmet. The young woman suffered head injuries while Rasmussen received severe arm and leg lacerations. McFall said the man's leg was nearly severed and both lost considerable blood at the scene.

St. Benedict's Family Medical Center in Jerome and Busch was flown by helicopter about 7 p.m. to St. Alphonsus Hospital in Boise.

The hospital nursing supervisor reported Rasmussen was still in surgery at 7:30 p.m. and no condition report was available.

Busch was listed in critical condition at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise late Thursday night.

### Body of drowned boy found

**DECLO** — The body of a 5-year-old Declo-area boy was recovered Thursday morning in a canal 11 miles downstream from his home after several hours of intense search by about 100 neighbors, friends, deputies and volunteers.

The victim was identified as Mark James Taylor Jr., the son of Mark and Lois Taylor, who live two miles east and one-half mile north of Declo, reported Cassia County Chief Deputy Sheriff Billy Crystal.

At 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, the boy's parents had reported to deputies that their son was missing, Crystal said. Deputies learned that about an hour before they were notified, a neighbor had spotted the boy near the bank of the six-foot deep, 15-foot-wide canal.

"The canal runs about 100 yards from the Taylor residence.

The neighbor said he told the boy to go home, watched the youngster head back toward his house and "went back to his business," Crystal said.

A half an hour or so later, the Taylors realized neighbors and friends to search nearby fields and stock pens for the missing boy.

After more than an hour, the Cassia County Sheriff's office was called and responded with deputies and volunteers.

"At that point, they couldn't find the boy and were not sure where he was," Crystal said. "He could have gone into a nearby cornfield and there were other options, including kidnapping. But we felt the canal was the most likely (place)."

The search of nearby fields continued, however.

Meanwhile, several farmers had placed chicken wire across the canal about two miles downstream from the boy's home, Crystal said. At about 9:30 p.m., employees from the Burley Irrigation District diverted water from that section of the canal. When the water level was low enough, 15 volunteers walked "elbow to elbow" in the canal to the chicken-wire barrier.

The walk and search produced no results and the efforts were abandoned about midnight and resumed at 6:30 a.m. Thursday.

The boy's body was found at 8 a.m. 11 miles downstream from his home.

### Poulignot receives guilty verdict in rape trial

**TWIN FALLS** — After less than three hours of deliberation, a jury found David Poulignot guilty Thursday of raping a Twin Falls woman last fall after a night of "tormenting" her at a Twin Falls bar.

The 44-year-old Poulignot of Gooding responded without visible expression when the seven-woman, five-man jury returned its verdict about 6:30 p.m.

Public Defender Mike Powers said they will appeal.

The third day of Poulignot's trial began Thursday with the continued testimony of the

victim. Under cross examination by Powers, she again told how she had met Poulignot at a bar.

Poulignot kept bothering her and followed her to another bar, she said. He later showed up at her home, forced his way through the door and put a knife at her back. He then raped her, said the woman, breaking into a sob once during the questioning.

The woman's 10-year-old son also took the stand and testified he had seen Poulignot at their home that night and "was scared" by his presence.

The defense presented no witnesses. During his almost hour-long closing argument, Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor

Dennis Voorhees said the woman was mentally "slow" but had a clear strength. He urged the jurors to "get inside her head and see the world the way she sees it." If they don't, "the case certainly will fall."

Because she may not have had the "resources," the woman's response to the ordeal may have been different than what would be expected, he said. Though she struggled with Poulignot throughout, she finally was overpowering and cornered, with "no place to go."

The young woman's testimony was corroborated by a female companion with her that night at the bars and her son, the deputy prosecutor said.

In his statement, Powers said the woman,

though "slow" was competent.

She had said that after she returned home she was too scared to lock the door. "If she was as afraid as she says she was why didn't she lock the door and call the police?" Powers asked. "It doesn't make any sense to me."

In the final word given to the prosecution, Voorhees asked what was the difference if the small details between witnesses differed. Whether Poulignot had sexual intercourse with the woman against her will, "that should be the focus."

The jury also found Poulignot guilty of burglary and aggravated assault in connection with the incident.

### Senate candidate Busch accuses Republicans of 'selling fear'

**TWIN FALLS** — Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Pete Busch says the Republicans are "selling fear" at their convention in Dallas this week.

Busch, who was in Twin Falls for the opening of the Democratic party headquarters here, also says the Republican platform provides further evidence how "hardware," not people, is the Republicans' main

concern.

"I am just as patriotic as the next person," says Busch, a retired Marine Corps fighter pilot who is challenging incumbent James McClure.

"But we continue to see the Russians and Cubans as whipping boys in our hemisphere to justify a massive military buildup," he says.

He says Republicans continue to play on people's fears to gain their support, instead of making a concerted effort to improve the

economy.

An example is the B-1 bomber program, backed by McClure and the Reagan administration, he says.

Each plane is now projected to cost \$400 million, he says. If the money for just one bomber was redirected, it could pay for a north-south road linking Boise and Lewiston, one of the most vital economic development projects that could be undertaken here, he says.

Busch says the Republican convention has provided "an awful lot

of flag-waving, a lot of expression for wealthy people, but no expression for the working people."

In particular he cannot understand Republicans' continued opposition to equal rights for women, when Democrats have capitalized on 1984 as "a strong year for women's expression" by means of the Mondale-Ferraro ticket.

Busch admits he will have to play David to McClure's Goliath if he is to win in November.

# Irrigators cast doubt upon EPA's 'sole-source' claim

**BOISE (AP)** — A spokesman for an Idaho Irrigators group has labeled as "speculation" an Environmental Protection Agency claim that the Snake River Aquifer is the only viable source of drinking water for many southern and southeastern Idaho residents.

The EPA is looking into designating the aquifer a "sole source" of drinking water under the provisions of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act. The designation would empower EPA officials to review federally funded projects with the potential for polluting the aquifer, a vast underground lake running from St. Anthony to near Hagerman and serving more than 200,000 people.

The federal agency conducted hearings on the plan last week in Idaho Falls and Twin Falls. But Sheri Chapman, executive director of the Idaho Water Users Association, says testimony presented by EPA officials at those hearings did not take into consideration alternatives to sole-source designation.

"The EPA did not analyze either the available water rights or the economic viability of surface water resource alternatives," Chapman said. "The statements made at the hearings in Idaho Falls and Twin Falls appear to be no more than speculation."

Wendy Marshall, a representative from the EPA regional office in Seattle, said the aquifer provides the only source of drinking water for more than 90 percent of residents in the area.

Ms. Marshall also testified that the cost of obtaining water rights and developing alternative drinking water systems was too expensive and impractical for most of the communities currently served by the aquifer.

But Chapman, whose group represents 154 irrigation districts and canal companies in Idaho, disagreed.

"Most cities near the Snake River on the Snake Plain have water rights for domestic supplies, and also water stored in Snake River reservoirs is available for domestic consumption," he said.

"Additionally, some cities are in water districts in which water rights are no longer being used for irrigation and could be converted to domestic use, Chapman said."

He argued that if sole-source designation is necessary, the EPA should "start with something small and reasonable and identify specific problems rather than put the federal burden on several thousand people who do not want any part of the designation."

# Plans proceed for moving police

**JEROME** — Jerome Police Commissioner Glen Capps said plans were moving ahead Thursday for withdrawing the Jerome Police Department from the joint city-county law enforcement operation in Jerome.

He said he is investigating costs and other factors in either renting, buying or building quarters for the police station. That department now operates from a basement office in the county courthouse.

Capps made public the city's plans to break up the joint program Wednesday morning in a press conference. He blamed dissension between personnel in the two departments, but said he believed the move would bring with it benefits such as improved service to Jerome-city residents and greater economy.

Capps said Thursday that some of the things he is now checking into include available rentals, costs buying building space and the possibility of building a new structure. He said the city already owns property adjacent to the Jerome Post Office and also owns Pioneer Hall on Lincoln Street.

"That building is obsolete but the site is large enough for a new city building. We (city council) have been discussing for some time the need for expanding our buildings. The library (Jerome Public Library) has run out of space and we need other space as well," Capps said.

The councilman said the \$50,000 the city may be paying next year for cost sharing in the joint operation would cover dispatcher salaries, and other moving costs, Capps said. There are contingency funds in the city budget to cover rental or building costs, he added.

Capps said he believed the plans can be put together within the coming week for a final council decision on the move. Capps released city plans for the move following an executive session of the council, called Tuesday night to discuss personnel matters.

Jerome County commissioners were out of town when the announcement was made Wednesday morning by Capps.

Sheriff Elza Hall said, however, he had no prior knowledge such a plan was under way, except for a brief discussion with Police Chief Darryl Cameron Tuesday afternoon. Hall said he opposes the move because he believes differences can be worked out, at least with his own department, and that such a move would prove costly to the city and county taxpayers.

Capps' charge that night and holiday-water department calls are not being conveyed by the central dispatch personnel was disputed by Hall. He said every call that comes into the dispatchers is recorded.

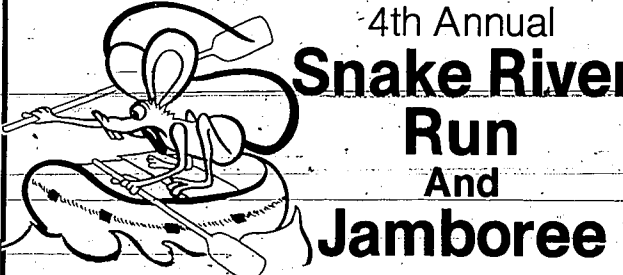

## USFL tries merging clubs for survival

CHICAGO (AP)—United States Football League owners voted Thursday to approve the merger of the Oklahoma and Oakland franchises, the first of several expected consolidations to strengthen the USFL before its anticipated battle in 1985 with the established National Football League.

The decision to base the team in Oakland turned out to be the only merger decision made during the two-day league meetings, USFL Commissioner Chet Simmons said. But he said it was unlikely the USFL would enter the spring season in 1985 with 17 teams, adding the matter likely would be discussed at league meetings now scheduled for October.

"The question of whether to go ahead and add a franchise or consolidate further to 16 (teams), or even 14, will depend" on what a committee of owners studying the implications of a move to the fall season in 1986 recommends, Simmons continued. "Some shakeout is inevitable."

The "shakeout" could take on any of several looks, Simmons maintained. The league now owns both the failed Los Angeles and Washington franchises, though he said several groups have expressed serious interest in the former with a move to the fall and Florida real estate developer Sherwin Weiser is negotiating to purchase the latter.

Additionally, Eddie Elbam, the owner of baseball's Chicago White Sox and the recent buyer of the USFL's Chicago franchise, has agreed to be committed to fielding a team for 1985 — whether in Chicago or elsewhere.

There was speculation after USFL owners voted Wednesday to move to a fall schedule in 1986, after one final spring season next year, that the change was designed to force a merger of the two leagues. But on Thursday, NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle said USFL owners are misguided if that is their intention.

"I just can't see it happening. Rozelle said in discussing the topic of a merger during a meeting with the Washington Post. "There's just no sentiment for it. When we expand, we'd want to pick our own cities and our own owners. "There are many, many reasons why it would not be feasible. One of them would be antitrust problems. We had to get a bill through Congress to merge with the AFL."

Rozelle, in response to comments from New Jersey Generals owner Donald Trump that the USFL move would hurt NFL television ratings and increase NFL salaries, said, "Donald has an erroneous view if he thinks this shakes up the NFL."

Rozelle said he had talked to about 10 NFL owners and all of them welcomed the USFL shift. "Everyone I spoke to said they're in favor of going to the fall because it stops spreading football out," the commissioner said.

The owners left the meeting with some other business unfinished, most notably approving the move of the league-champion Philadelphia Stars to Baltimore for the 1986 season. Myles Tannenbaum, owner of the Stars and one of six of the 12 original USFL owners, said he would make the move rather than compete with the NFL's Eagles and baseball's Phillies for use of Veterans Stadium.

Tannenbaum said the motion for approval of the move was tabled and likely would be taken up at the USFL's next meeting. He also confirmed he would meet Friday with Philadelphia Mayor W. Wilson Goode to discuss the planned move to Baltimore. A spokesman for Goode said Thursday the mayor "wants to see what the city can do to possibly turn this around."

The consolidation of the Oakland and Oklahoma franchises, however, occurred without any snags. Ted Taube, who owned the Oakland franchise, said he and William Tatham, current owner of the Oklahoma Outlaws, made the move to strengthen the franchise in preparation for the USFL's head-to-head competition in 1986.

"The league is attempting to consolidate and strengthen its position, focusing on markets with respect to network television," Taube said. "Oklahoma is not a market where we can make a significant contribution (to television ratings)."

Taube also said Tatham had expressed a desire to own a franchise closer to his Fresno, Calif., home, and that decreased expenses and increased capital resulting from the consolidation would make the new franchise able to compete effectively in an already saturated San Francisco-Oakland market.

## Top stars make East worth watching

Doug Flutie, quarterback, Boston College. Bill Fralie, offensive tackle, Pitt. Napoleon McCallum, tailback, Navy. Listed alphabetically, these are three of the main reasons to keep an eye on Eastern football this fall. Flutie, a 5-foot-9 1/2, 175-pound senior, is one of the nation's most electrifying performers. Despite his image as a scrambling, busted-play specialist, Flutie is bidding to become a major-league football's first 10,000-yard passer and needs 2,490 yards — he threw for 2,724 last year — to pass Duke's Ben Bennett at the top of the all-time Division I-A list.

Fralie, a 6-5, 290-pound senior, "may be the best there has ever been at his position," according to Bill Davis, director of player personnel for the Cleveland Browns. In 1981, he became the first freshman to start the season opener since Tony Dorsett in 1976. Since then, he has twice been a first-team All-American. McCallum, a 6-2, 208-pound senior, led the country in all-purpose rushing last year (216.8 yards a game) and was third in rushing in electrifying performers. Despite his image as a scrambling, busted-play specialist, Flutie is bidding to become a major-league football's first 10,000-yard passer and needs 2,490 yards — he threw for 2,724 last year — to pass Duke's Ben Bennett at the top of the all-time Division I-A list.

Hill faced the likes of North Carolina's Kelvin Bryant, Penn State's Curt Warner and Southern Methodist's Eric Dickerson. But the East is more than just individual talent. Two Eastern teams have won national championships in the last eight years (Pitt in 1976, Penn State in 1982) and three finished in the Top Twenty a year ago (West Virginia 16th, Pitt 18th, Boston College 19th). Then there's Penn State, which will be trying to extend its NCAA records of 26 consecutive winning seasons and 45 straight non-losing campaigns. And Syracuse hopes to join the ranks of "winning" teams this year. "All of which means that, with only nine Division I-A teams in the area, the East can expect some pretty good football this fall."

Although West Virginia and Pitt finished higher in the "83 rankings, Boston College won the Lambert-Meadowlands Trophy as the top team in the East. The Eagles' 9-3 record included victories over Clemson, Penn State and Alabama. Flutie is one of nine offensive starters returning, plus the top six rushers. Nose guard Mike Ruth heads seven defensive starters. "We have a chance to be a very good football team again," Coach Jack Bicknell says. "I really feel good about this team. We've made great strides in our over-all strength and speed, and that is what gives you a chance to win every game you play." A rugged schedule includes trips to

## Lietzke's hot start gives him Series lead

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — Bruce Lietzke, propelled by a double-eagle start, shot a 4-under-par 66 from what he called "an uncomfortable breeze," and established a 2-stroke lead Thursday in the first round of the \$700,000 NEC World Series of Golf. "It was a north wind, and it's one I'm not familiar with," said Lietzke, a winner in the Honda Classic early this season. "I made it an entirely different golf course. And I did not feel comfortable at all. "It was not a Bruce Lietzke-type round," said Lietzke, who used only 10 putts on the front side, holed six times from 15 feet, once from 13 and five from 20. And two of those 15-footers and the one from 20 were par.



Lietzke played the front side in a scarily 30 on the long, difficult Firestone Country Club course and then came home in par 36, losing a shot to par on the final hole. "That's a tremendous score," said Rex Caldwell, who was tied with Tom Purtzer for second at 68. "It was hard work out there. With this wind, it was really tough, and really long," Caldwell said. Craig Stadler, a winner here two years ago, scrambled to a 69. He was tied with Mark McCumber and South African Denis Watson, the only other players in the International, 42-man field able to crack par on the very long course that played even longer in gusty breezes. Watson, a winner two weeks ago in the Balcis Open, got under par with a 65-foot chip-in birdie on the 17th, then saved the position with a one-putt par on the 18th. Tom Watson, winner of three titles this season and in his customary spot atop the money-winning list, led a large group at par 70. Jack Nicklaus, a frequent winner of this title, and Lee Trevino, the 44-year-old who took

TOM PURTZER Tied for second at 68. The PGA national championship last week in Birmingham, Ala., each had a 72. Kite, Watson's chief challenger for Player of the Year honors, had a 73.

Masters champ Ben Crenshaw had the same total. British Open title-holder Seve Ballesteros of Spain was one stroke higher at 74. Lietzke, golf's most successful cross-handed putter, dropped a 15-foot birdie putt on the first hole, then, on the second, drove into a bunker, played it out, and holed a wedge shot from 111 yards for an eagle-3, the ball bouncing into the cup on the second hop. "If it wasn't for that start, there's no way I could have shot 66," Lietzke said.

He one-putted five holes in a row beginning on the fifth, including 18 and 15 for birdies, and got to six under par for the day with still another 15-footer on the 13th. But he bogeyed the 15th, 2-putting, and bogeyed the 18th after hitting the lip of a fairway bunker with his second shot.

## NFC Central a 'nip-and-tuck' division

In the National Football League, they used to call the Central Division of the National Football Conference the "black and blue" division. But something happened, and it scares Detroit Lions Coach Monte Clark half to death.

Last year three of the five teams in the NFC Central finished with identical 8-8 records and the Lions actually won the divisional title with only a 9-7 mark.

The three 8-8 clubs were Green Bay, Minnesota and Chicago. Tampa Bay finished 7-1. "We won the title only because we went 7-1 against other teams in the division," Clark said during a recent break in training camp. "It's the 'nip and tuck' division now. It almost always goes down to the final week. I have to believe it will again this year, too." It is doubtful, however, that a 9-7



MONTE CLARK Predicts balanced race record will be good enough to win the NFC Central again, and Clark concedes as much. "This year, there are the new coaches," Clark noted. "That almost always makes an impact. Any one of us could win it. It's very, very com-

petitive." The new coaches are in Green Bay, where Forrest Gregg has returned to try and remold the Packers in the image of his old mentor, Vince Lombardi, and in Minnesota where Les Steckel, a former Marine has taken over from Bud Grant. Most observers feel Gregg will realize the most immediate success, for two reasons: one, his no-nonsense approach took the Cincinnati Bengals to the Super Bowl two years ago and, two, the Packers are loaded with talent, especially on offense. "The one thing this team needs is to play consistently," said Gregg, whom the great Lombardi considered his finest player. "We will demand, not ask for, production. And we will get production. The more you're pushed, the more productive you will be." The Packers offense features three Pro-Bowl players — tight end Paul Coffman, who had 54 catches for 814 yards and 11 TDs; wide receiver James Lofton, who had 58 for 1,300 and eight TDs; and center Larry McCarren.

The other Green Bay wide receiver is only John Jefferson, who caught 57 for 830 yards and seven TDs. With quarterback Lynn Dickey, immobile but deadly, completing 289 of 484 passes for 4,458 yards and 32 TDs with 29 interceptions, it's no wonder the Packers finished fourth in NFC Central scoring behind only powerful Washington, Dallas, and San Francisco. "Injuries riddled them defensively last year," Clark noted. "They're healed now and I really look for Green Bay to be tough." Steckel, at age 38, becomes the NFL's youngest coach. He put his own stamp on the Vikings immediately by outfitting them in white shoes, breaking tradition with the 47-year reign of the low-key Grant who left with a 161-99-5 record. His practices are nothing like Grant's, either. "The area where I want to see improvement is in our work habits," Steckel said. "I want the players to learn from hard and demanding practices. Those work habits will carry over to the games and then continue with them in their careers after football." The Vikings were 6-2 midway through the 1983 campaign, despite

# World mark falls in Friendship Games

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Sylvia Gerash of East Germany set a world record in the women's 100-meter breaststroke Thursday and Soviet swimmers won four of five finals on the seventh day of the Friendship '84 Games here Thursday.

Gerash, 15, clocked 1 minute, 08.29 seconds breaking the previous record held by Ute Geweniger, also of East Germany, with a time of 1:08.51.

It was one of the fastest breaststroke sprint races ever with the first three finishers all beating the Los Angeles Olympic gold medal time set by Petra Van Slaveren from the Netherlands in 1:09.88.

Geweniger came second in 1:08.59 and Larissa Belekou of the Soviet Union was third in 1:09.63.

Olga Mostepanova scored three perfect 10s in optional events and the Soviet women led an overwhelming victory in the team event at the gymnastics "Sparkatadi" at Olomou, Czechoslovakia.

Mostepanova, the Soviet champion this year, got the first perfect score in the vault, scored 9.75 on uneven bars after a shaky performance, but rallied superbly for a dazzling and acrobatic show on the beam where she earned her second 10 of the evening.

The Soviet women collected 395.250 points for first places. East Germany was second with 352.330 and Czechoslovakia placed third with 391.950.

Basketball moved into the second round with the favored Soviet hosts defeating Colombia 143-41 over the objections of the assistant trainer of the Colombian team.

"One of the referees was abysmal. He called my team all the time and let them get away with countless fouls," said Christopher Hankins Edlison after the game.

The Soviets were led by Arvidas-Romas Sabonis who scored 27 points for the second straight day.

The rowing competition got off to a confused start at the Moscow Olympic basin, and off the Estonian port of Tallinn yachtsmen finished their second to last race with the few Western sailors way outside the top plaques.

Five swimmers posted times faster than the ones winning gold at Los Angeles and three more swam faster than silver medalists at the Summer Olympics.

Tatyana Kurnikova won the women's 100-meter butterfly in 59.41 seconds and the Soviet 400-meter freestyle relay team of Sergei Smirnov, Sergei Gurbatov, Sergei Krasnyuk and Alexei Markovskiy clocked 3:20.19 for another European mark.

Kurnikova's time would give her silver at Los Angeles behind American world record-holder Mary T. Meagher, but the Soviet relay team would only have meant a bronze medal at the Olympics.

Soviet ace Vladimir Salniko, a triple Olympic gold medalist at the 1980 Moscow games — and world record-holder in the 400-meter and 1,500-meter freestyle — could not touch his own world record in his 400-meter specialty. He stayed nearly one second above his best of 3:48.32.

Still, his time of 3:49.27 was nearly two seconds faster than the Olympic gold medal winning time of 3:51.23 clocked by American George Dicarli at Los Angeles.

Sven Lotzlewski of East Germany also stayed within Dicarli's Olympic winning time, clocking 3:50.98.

The Soviet Union now has won 10 of the 19 swimming finals contested so far, with the others going to East Germany.

The Soviet hosts' and their East German allies have been over-performing at the Friendship Games here where more than 40 nations, mostly allied with the Soviet Union or from the third world, participate. Among them are the 14 that boycotted the Los Angeles Olympics.

All women's rowing heats were canceled Thursday when not enough teams showed-up, while the men's events began in total confusion.

Officials said, all the teams had advanced directly into Friday's finals.

There was similar disorganization in the men's events. Qualification in five of the eight categories were canceled.

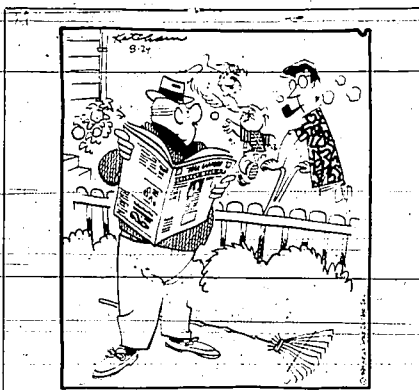

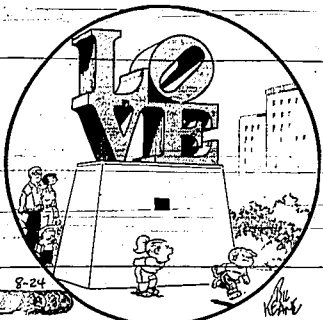
