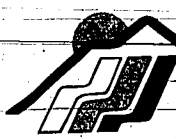

## Populists lose bid for Idaho ballot

BOISE — The Populist Party filed a last-minute legal action here Friday afternoon, trying to win a spot on Idaho's election ballot this fall.

But after a hurried hearing, a U.S. district judge refused to grant a restraining order that would have stalled the printing of ballots for the Nov. election.

The Populists argued that they should be allowed a spot on the Idaho ballot, particularly for presidential candidate Bob Richards.

Idaho's law that an independent or new political party must produce a certain number of signatures to qualify for the ballot. After a brief hearing, Judge Ray McNichols refused to grant a restraining order. He noted the Populists waited until the last minute to launch the legal action, even though the election situation was clear months ago.

State election officials Friday afternoon were scheduled to certify the fall ballot to county clerks. That would clear the way to start printing ballots. Absentee voting starts next month.

The Populist Party claimed Idaho's requirement for a new party to get on the ballot is unreasonable.

Ben Ysursa, deputy secretary of state, said that's 3 percent of the vote cast in Idaho in the last presidential election, or 13,135 signatures.

The party did not turn in any signatures by the May 30 deadline, he said.

On June 25, the Idaho Populist Party submitted about 400 signatures. Ysursa said that also did not meet the requirement, so he refused to order Populist Party candidates placed on the ballot.

"We're very much concerned that this delay could disenfranchise voters," said Ysursa. "Any sort of delay now will make it hard to get ballots printed and out to absentee voters."

Boise Friday was in the name of the national Populist Party, the Idaho Committee of the Populist Party and Harriet Crank, listed as state chairperson.

Named as defendants were Gov. John Evans, Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa and his top aide, Ysursa.

The lawsuit argued that the Populist Party is a valid political organization, active in 45 states, and the state laws "arbitrarily and effectively" keep new parties off the ballot.

It contended that the established political parties have a vested interest in keeping new parties off the ballot, precisely the sort of parties that might provide the greatest challenge to the major parties.

The lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Boise Friday was in the name of the national Populist Party, the Idaho Committee of the Populist Party and Harriet Crank, listed as state chairperson.

There is no need for state laws which require parties to organize early in the year and gather signatures to win a spot on the ballot.

"It is precisely the well-known and well-respected candidates like Bob Richards who will not agree to become part of a campaign until the issues have ripened in the public mind, who is excluded by such laws," it said.

Parties such as the Populists should be allowed to present "an alternative choice" to the major parties, the suit said.

## State map Busch-whacks candidate

SHOSHONE — Senate candidate Pete Busch planned to land his single-engine airplane at Shoshone Municipal air strip for a Friday campaign stop. The only problem with that plan is that the landing field was abandoned two years ago.

Busch landed there anyway. Busch said parking his plane in what is now an alfalfa field east of Shoshone was "interesting." The Lewiston Democrat, an experienced pilot, said a "current" airstrip map prepared by the State Aeronautics Division of the Transportation Department shows the strip to be open. He was surprised to see alfalfa and irrigation pipes where he had expected to find a runway.

Julle Nance of Shoshone, who helped organize Friday's festivities, said she too was surprised to find the airstrip gone, because she had been told the strip was at the end of a gravel road near the Shoshone Cemetery. She said she was not aware the strip had been closed.

Lincoln County joined Minidoka County as the only Idaho counties without public landing strips when the Richfield airfield was closed several months ago.

The Shoshone strip was closed by the city when tense and maintenance difficulties came up two years ago.

Busch said his makeshift landing strip is a field operated by Pete Onelda of Shoshone. He has received Onelda's permission to try to take off through a portion of the area this morning.

He said Onelda's cooperation is indicative of the support he has received around Idaho, which includes the airplane loaned to him by Clay Condit, manager of the Arco airport.

Meanwhile, Gene Sullivan, a candidate for the state Legislature from Fairfield, also had his share of troubles getting to the same gathering. "I was stuck in traffic for an hour and a half in describing the car trouble on State Highway 20 that made him late for the gathering."

Sullivan's experience was not as colorful but his stalled vehicle did force him to hitchhike from the "Moonstone Lodge" area back to Fairfield to get another car.

Busch is running against incumbent Sen. Jim McClure, and he says he is getting support from people who are disillusioned with McClure.

## Mid-air crash takes 17 lives

SAN LUIS OBISPO, Calif. — A commuter plane that had just taken off and a private plane on a training flight collided Friday, killing 17 people and scattering flaming wreckage and body parts over 20 acres.

The collision occurred at 11:34 a.m. midway between Los Angeles and San Francisco in "excellent" weather, according to an air traffic controller.

Some of the bodies were decapitated, an ambulance attendant said.

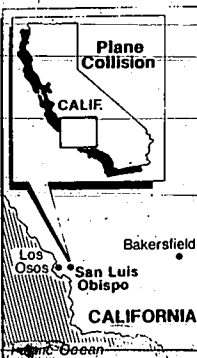
"There was wreckage on top of hillsides and wreckage strewn over a real wide area," said the attendant, who spoke only on condition he not be identified, for fear of losing his job. "Both planes were in pieces. There were bodies outside the fuselages of both aircraft, and there were bodies inside the airplanes as well."

The bodies inside were burning, he said. "All the bodies were in such bad shape there was no chance at all of resuscitating anybody," he said.

The crash site was a grazing land of rolling hills called Sage Ranch. The burning debris sparked a 20-acre brush fire, which is quickly controlled.

The remains were taken to funeral homes, said San Luis Obispo County Sheriff's Lt. John Hastie.

"We've asked for the assistance of the FBI disaster response team," he said. "We want to make sure the identification is positive." None of the remains had yet been identified, he said.



A team of 25 to 30 rescue workers formed a line and walked across the pasture Friday afternoon to find body and airplane parts.

Bill Machado, 60, who lives in a mobile home one-half mile from the crash site, said he was hosing down his dog when he spotted the two aircraft flying toward each other.

"I watched those planes and then I heard a blast. I looked and saw this plane spiraling down," Machado said. "The little one disappeared so fast. The big two-engine job was coming down... slowly... spiraling... spiraling down."

## Smokers run higher risk of heart attack

LOS ANGELES — People with a family history of heart disease often believe they can't do anything to avoid heart attacks, but a new study says quitting smoking will cut their risk least threefold.

"The general bias in most people's minds and most doctors' minds is that once you have a family history of heart disease, there's not much you can do about it," said Dr. Paul N. Hopkins, the study's principal author.

"What this study points out is that those with a high risk of heart disease because of their family background are the ones who would be most likely to benefit by stopping smoking," he said.

Earlier studies have shown that smoking roughly doubles a person's risk of heart disease and that a family history of heart disease can increase the risk of heart attack by up to seven times.

The increased risk is not as pronounced in older people because of family history of heart disease is a more significant risk factor in younger people, Hopkins said in a telephone interview.

The study also found that smoking may be the most important reason why heart disease occurs more often in some families than in others, said Hopkins, who conducted the study with Dr. Roger R. Williams and Steven C. Hunt at the University of Utah. Hopkins now works at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

## High deficit, interest rates mean tough times for farmers

WASHINGTON — Hard times for American agriculture are likely to continue as ballooning federal deficits and high interest rates make the business of farming difficult.

That is the finding of an 18-month study released Friday by a non-partisan group.

In a report designed to focus discussion on future farm legislation, the Curry Foundation also said that farmers are losing export revenues

because of the dollar's rise in value against foreign currencies.

"We still have a fundamentally strong agriculture, but we do have some difficulties," John C. Datt, director of the American Farm Bureau Federation's Washington office, told a news conference. "There are no easy solutions. If there were, we'd have them by now."

One of the most important problems facing farmers is high interest rates on loans, the panel concluded. The size of the federal deficit is expected to exceed \$180 billion in

fiscal 1984, is a major factor in the high cost of borrowing money — and spokesmen for the more than 200 people who worked on the report said that borrowing was particularly important to agriculture.

"A significant number of farmers are highly indebted and using a rapid cash flow to cover indebtedness," Lynn M. Datt, a co-author of the report, said. "Agriculture depends heavily on borrowed capital as it moves through the production season."

When interest rates are high, farm

purchases and other major expenses, such as new machinery, become much more expensive. Foreign investment chases the high interest rates in the United States, forcing up the cost of the dollar and, in turn, the cost of American agricultural exports.

For example, the amount of wheat exported dropped from 64 percent in 1980 to 55 percent in 1982, according to Sam Evans, a U.S. Department of Agriculture economist. For corn, the drop in exports was from 25 percent to 31 percent over the same two-year

period, he said. Annual domestic corn production averages about \$22 billion a year, while the wheat crop averages \$10 billion.

High interest rates also can be linked to the failure of some agricultural businesses, the panelists said.

For the year that ended June 30, 1983, for example, the Department of Agriculture estimated that 2.3 percent of the nation's 2.4 million farmers were forced to quit because of financial hardship. In the South, the region worst hit, the number of farm-

ers dropped 3.1 percent because of money problems. The West matched the 2.3 percent national figure, while the Northeast recorded a 2 percent drop.

Nevertheless, according to Department of Agriculture figures, the government has been spending at record levels to aid farmers. During fiscal 1983, for example, the department spent \$18 billion on commodity support systems. In contrast, the department spent \$3.9 billion two years earlier.

## Pentagon probes Hughes unit

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The military said Friday that it is investigating the work of a unit of Hughes Aircraft Co., and the company confirmed that it was transferring the manager of another plant probed by the Pentagon.

Hughes is the Pentagon's largest supplier of missiles, radar and a host of other high-technology items.

The latest unit to come under scrutiny is the company's Electro Optical Data Systems Group in El Segundo, which develops and produces sensors, firing-control mechanisms for space, airborne and surface applications, laser systems and aerospace computers, processors and software systems.

An Air Force official, who spoke on condition that his name not be used, said Friday that an investigation of the electro optical unit had been under way "for two or three days." The Air Force planned no further comments "until the audit is completed," he added.

## Soviet Far East under water

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Far East has been hit by the worst flooding this century, with villages swamped and cattle and crops threatened but no loss of life, Soviet newspapers said Friday.

Torrential rains swelled the Amur River and its tributaries in the Khabarovsk region, between the Soviet Union's east coast and northeastern China, according to the press accounts.

The Communist Party newspapers Pravda and Sovetskaya Rosiya said that in some places along the Amur, water in districts around Khabarovsk has risen by 33 feet. Precise locations were not pinpointed.

The stricken areas were mostly sparsely populated, with small villages and sprawling collective farms, although the Khabarovsk area has been under industrial and military-strategic development in recent years.

## No mines found after week

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — After a week of searching, none of the three Western nations in the mine-hunting force has found any of the explosives and Egypt had no concrete evidence Friday to back up its suspicion that Libya is the culprit.

Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak would not say how long the mine-hunting teams from the United States, Britain and France — soon to be joined by Italy — would remain in the Red Sea area.

"These foreign forces came in for a special mission he said in response to a question asked at a news conference before he met with President Gaafar Nimeiri of Sudan. "Whenever that mission is finished, they will leave."

Egypt says it is nearly certain that Libya is responsible for laying the mines, but still has no concrete evidence to back up its suspicion.

Mubarak told reporters Friday, "I think there is much evidence to prove that it is Libya." He admitted the evidence is circumstantial.

## Chinese agree to visit Idaho

BOISE (AP) — Officials from Shaanxi Province of the People's Republic of China, have accepted an invitation from Gov. John Evans to send an agriculture and forestry delegation to Idaho, the governor's office said Friday.

A date and itinerary for the visit has not been set.

In a telegram to Evans, provincial Gov. Li Qing-Wei said he was "honored" at the invitation and hoped "the cooperation between us will develop more constantly and extensively."

Li said he "rejoiced over the exchange program which has started between Shaanxi and Idaho in the field of education and agricultural science."

He said he would like to see an Idaho group make a return visit to China "at your appropriate time."

## State gains highway money

BOISE (AP) — An additional \$5 million in federal highway funds has been allocated for use on Idaho roads before the end of the current federal fiscal year, Gov. John Evans has announced.

He said there were state projects ready for the funding which must be completed before Oct. 1.

"Our state was able to take advantage of federal-aid authority which other states could not use because the Idaho Transportation Department had projects ready for contract," Evans said Friday.

The new funding increases to \$85 million the total of federal highway money allocated to Idaho during the current fiscal year, he said.

## Guerrillas, peasants celebrate

CORINTO, Colombia (AP) — Leftist guerrillas and peasants drank beer and danced to folk music Friday, celebrating the signing of a cease-fire between the rebels and the government.

The ceremony had been delayed when police shot at one rebel group en route to this town, wounding five people. Another delay followed as guerrilla leaders expressing their desire for peace, spoke to the crowd of 12,000 people gathered in Corinto's main plaza.

The one-year truce is to take effect next Wednesday at midnight.

About 500 guerrillas of the April 19 Movement, wearing combat uniforms and carrying rifles and hand grenades, had entered Corinto, 200 miles southwest of Bogota, for the signing.

## Missile strikes Cypriot ship

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — A Cypriot tanker laden with 50,000 tons of Iranian crude oil was hit by a missile — and sinking in flames in the Persian Gulf on Friday.

The vessel, presently fired by Iraqi warplanes — and was reported to be sinking in flames in the Persian Gulf on Friday.

Iranian air force helicopters hoisted 33 crewmen from the water, but one man was missing.

"It is still burning furiously," one Bahrain shipping source said, hours after sea-going tugs rushed to combat several fires aboard the 31,280-ton tanker Amethyst. "One part of it is low in the water."

She identified the pilot as Capt. Paul Nebolon, 27, of Rolling Hills, and the co-pilot as Deverl Johnson, 45, of Merced. Johnson had just retired from the Air Force, and had been stationed at Castle Air Force Base near Merced, Ms. Kronin said.

The other plane was a single engine Rockwell Commander that had left Paso Robles Airport at 10:55 a.m. on a training flight with an instructor and student aboard, said a Federal Aviation Administration controller at Paso Robles who spoke on condition his name not be used.

The controller said the pilot of the single-engine, four seat aircraft took off into weather — he described as "excellent."

No plan was filed for the training flight, according to Don Loring of the National Transportation Safety Board. NTSB investigators from Los Angeles immediately flew to the scene, 175 miles northwest of Los Angeles, he said.

A woman who answered the telephone at Aesthetech's offices Friday said only, "We have no statement."

## Mondale stresses Reagan's connections to the nation's rich

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Campaigning in the land of Abraham Lincoln, Walter F. Mondale said Friday the just-ended Republican National Convention demonstrated that President Reagan represents the party of the rich.

The Democratic presidential candidate pledged that in the remaining days of the 1984 campaign he will "smoke Mr. Reagan out" on issues such as

arms control and the federal deficit. Mondale said television ratings for the GOP convention were low and added, "the reason is the American people know a summer rerun when they see it."

Mondale spoke against the backdrop of the old Illinois state capitol building across the street from where Lincoln, the Republican Civil War

president, worked as an attorney in the 1850s. Mondale used the opportunity to remind his audience of the most-famous series of debates in American history, between Lincoln and his U.S. Senate opponent, Stephen Douglas, in 1858.

Mondale said he has sent a telegram to President Reagan repeating his call for six presidential debates this year.

## Ferraro wonders if her candidacy has been worth all the pain

"She's far from the innocent creature that everyone thinks she is," Guccione said in a statement after the magazine announced it would publish the new photos in January.

"Enough is enough," Miss Williams said in an interview published Friday in the Syracuse Herald-Journal.

"Everyone is a little disgusted by this now. Obviously, everyone is making money off it."

"I'm getting burned twice by these people, but this is the last of it," she

said. "There are no more surprises. I don't think my heart can take any more of it. This has got to be the end. How many editions can they (Penthouse) do?"

In interviews with The New York Times and The Record of Hackensack, N.J., Miss Williams admitted Thursday that she posed for the pictures during the summer of 1982, shortly after she posed for the photographs which appeared in the September issue of Penthouse. The earlier photographs prompted her resignation.

Guccione, through a spokeswoman, declined to describe the new pictures or to reveal how much he paid for them.

Miss Williams told The Record of Hackensack, N.J., that she posed for Whitman a week after they met at a studio in the Astoria section of Queens. First, she said, Whitman took fashion shots.

"Then, before I knew it, I was posing nude," she said. "I'm not sure what led up to it, but shortly afterward, I knew I had made another mistake."

"In my naivete, I had signed a release for Whitman," she told The New York Times from Los Angeles.

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# Boston Chinatown has power back after day

BOSTON (AP) — Electricity was restored to most of Boston's Chinatown section Friday evening after a power shutdown that began a day earlier left unrefrigerated food spoiling in restaurants, many of which were closed by health inspectors.

The blackout affecting 1,600 homes and businesses in Chinatown continued until about 6 p.m. Friday, although power was restored to the rest of a 20-block downtown section shortly before midnight Thursday. An underground cable fire that sent

smoke seeping out of manholes prompted Boston Edison Co. to cut electricity to the area at about 3:30 p.m. Thursday.

Only about two dozen Chinatown customers were still without power at 6 p.m. Friday, said Walter Salvi, a Boston Edison spokesman.

Boston Edison turned off power to the 20 blocks just before rush hour Thursday — afternoon after — smoke swirled from manhole covers. Traffic snarled and one hospital had to rely on emergency generators.

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## Blaze kills pair in New Jersey

ASBURY PARK, N.J. (AP) — A fire razed through a rooming house Friday morning, killing a woman and her son.

Thirteen other people were injured, some as they jumped from windows.

"It was arson," said Monmouth County Prosecutor John Kaye. "We found an accelerant used on the stairwell, a fuel oil of some kind."

Authorities said the blaze began about 5:20 a.m. in a wooden structure that residents of the Jefferson Motel Inn said had been the scene of a fire 24 hours earlier. It was under control by 6 a.m.

## Boise plane maker to close

BOISE (AP) — Eagle Aircraft Co., owned by Boise industrialist Joe Terling and his family, will shut down and liquidate all assets at an auction scheduled next Thursday.

The company has manufactured the biplane Eagle agricultural spray plane since 1980.

"We are going out of business because of a lack of a viable market," General Manager Jack Snyder said. "Every year it seems like half the number of planes sell compared to the previous year." Snyder declined to disclose how much money the firm has lost on the Eagle operation in the past four years.

Eagle is negotiating with several companies to sell the manufacturing rights on the aircraft so production may resume sometime in the future.

Eagle has built 96 spray planes since the company was formed in 1980. Snyder said the firm has sold 68 planes to date at about \$100,000 each.

## Six knifed in Pocatello fight

POCATELLO (AP) — Six Pocatello residents sustained knife wounds in a fight at a bar late Thursday, police said.

Two of the six, Michael Schall, 21, and Robert Motley, 25, were in serious condition Friday at Bannock Regional Medical Center. The two were in intensive care, authorities said.

A third man, Scott Sprecher, 25, was undergoing surgery Friday. His condition wasn't immediately known.

Authorities said two others — Walker Wadman, 29, and Terry St. Hillary, 27, — were treated and released.

Police said another man, Ron Wood, was treated and released at Pocatello Medical Center.

## Maureen Reagan plans visit

BOISE (AP) — President Reagan's daughter is scheduled to visit Boise next Friday.

Maureen Reagan's itinerary will include a stop at the Western Idaho Fair. She also will be honored at an evening reception at a private Boise residence, according to the Idaho Reagan-Bush campaign.

The campaign has sent out 1,400 invitations to the \$30-per-person reception. The money will go the Idaho Republican Party.

# Corrections board opposes staff plan

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Board of Correction said Friday it will seek funds to staff the state prison with the 120 additional guards consultants recommend, instead of with the 63 proposed by State Corrections Director Al Murphy.

The board told Murphy to scrap his budget proposal and replace it with one for the larger personnel expansion that could reduce chances of violence, and court orders dictating prison operations.

The addition of 120 guards was recommended in a consultants' study the Idaho Legislature ordered last year.

The board's decision won praise

from the Idaho Service Employees Union, which last month filed a grievance on behalf of guards claiming their safety is jeopardized because of understaffing at the prison south of Boise.

"I think you've got to ask (the Legislature) for what you need, and then support it and substantiate it," board member Charles Hall said.

He said it is pointless for the state penitentiary to limp along with minimum staffing improvements that still would leave the facility with glaring inadequacies.

"I think what we have to do is just throw their own report right back at them," Hall said of the Legislature.

Murphy's proposed 32 percent budget increase for fiscal 1986 included money for an additional 63 guards to work the prison's main yard and its perimeter. He also proposed adding eight corrections officers to the minimum-security section.

He said he was recommending the minimum additions needed to make the prison safe. The facility now has about 140 officers.

Murphy told board members that meeting consultants' recommendations will increase his department's \$18.5 million budget proposal by \$1.2 million.

Other costs the department may face include the expense of various

improvements that could be ordered as the result of a class-action lawsuit by inmates alleging unconstitutional conditions at the prison. A U.S. District Court ruling in that case is expected any day.

Murphy said on Friday that he has been unable to find another state that spends as little as Idaho's \$30.50 a day for care and supervision of each inmate. Even states with relatively low expenditures per inmate spend double that amount, he said.

The director said security needs include addition of a full-time shake-down team to ensure every area of the prison is inspected for contraband once a month.

## Choice of companies set for phone owners

BOISE (AP) — Starting in December, telephone users with certain prefixes in Boise and other Idaho cities will be given a chance to choose the company they want to handle their long-distance calls.

Mountain Bell will send information to customers in the affected areas in October, telling them they can remain with AT&T Communications or switch to any other company that has applied to serve the area, Mountain Bell spokesman Steve Guerber said.

The "equal access" program resulted from the court-ordered break-up of the Bell system in January.

Under the plan, phone users need only dial 1 plus the long-distance number, regardless of which company provides their long-distance service. Use of long-distance carriers other than AT&T previously required

dialing as many as 22igits to complete a call.

Companies that have applied in Idaho are AT&T, Sprint Communications and MCI Communications.

Besides Boise, other phone exchanges that will receive the option starting Dec. 15 are those in Idaho Falls, Arco, Howe, Island Park, Mackay, Moore and Roberts. MCI and AT&T have applied to serve those areas.

Remaining exchanges where electronic switching is available will get the option before the end of 1986, Guerber said.

Idaho customers who do nothing will remain with AT&T, he said. In some larger cities, phone users who do not act have been assigned a long-distance company on a rotating basis, but such a system was determined too expensive in Idaho, he said.

## Jetty in Snake River causes consternation

### Damming effects of lava rock is focus of officials' worries

FILER — The fate of a lava-rock jetty that now blocks two-thirds of the Snake River near Filer has become a matter of considerable consternation for county, state and federal bureaucrats.

The jetty was inadvertently created last April by an over-sized blast created by a crew working on a hydroelectric project. It initially extended only about a third of the way across the river, but with the advent of low-water, it now stretches almost two-thirds of the way across the river, according to federal and state officials.

The jetty consists of more than 22,500 tons of rocks that blew away from the south side of the canyon when the workers were building an access road to a turbine site.

Bonneville Pacific, the Salt Lake City-based hydro developer responsible for the jetty's creation, has asked the state Department of Water Resources for an after-the-fact stream alteration permit to legalize the structure.

Erv Ballou, a Boise-based water department official, says no decision on whether to grant the permit has been reached.

Meanwhile, Twin Falls County, the Environmental Protection Agency, state Fish and Game, state Department of Health and Welfare and Water Resources Department officials have all been studying the jetty to figure out what should be done.

Officials from all these agencies met about three weeks ago at the hydro project with Bonneville Pacific officials to examine the site. The bureaucrats describe Bonneville officials as cooperative and eager to resolve the problem.

But many of the bureaucrats now appear to be going their separate ways in figuring out what to do about the jetty.

A hard-line position advocating the removal of the jetty has been taken by both EPA and Twin Falls County officials.

Warren McFall, a Boise-based EPA official, says that he has recommended to his superiors that the rockfall be removed, because its presence in the river constitutes a violation of the federal Clean Water Act. This act prohibits any discharges into navigable waters without first obtaining permits.

McFall says that EPA hasn't made any official decision yet on

whether to invoke the Clean Water Act, and would prefer to see the matter resolved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, the agency that originally approved the hydro developer's power permit.

Lee Taylor, a Twin Falls County planning and zoning official, says that the county also wants to see the site cleaned up.

"The County owns the property up the river from the site and we hope someday to put a park in there," Taylor said.

The jetty mars a four-mile stretch of smooth water that is one of the few good boating areas near Twin Falls, according to Taylor.

"If we ever open up a park, and waterskiers and fishermen get in

there, it could be dangerous to them."

Taylor said that Darrell Heider, the county's Parks and Recreation supervisor, has sent a letter to the Water Resources Department requesting the jetty's full removal.

Bill Webb, a Jerome-based state Fish and Game official, has taken a different tack in dealing with the

jetty.

He said his agency is negotiating a deal with Bonneville Pacific that would call for some type of compensation to state Fish and Game for the loss of riparian habitat caused by the jetty.

Webb said that Fish and Game may require Bonneville Pacific to

## Judge delays setting Rosencrantz sentence

TWIN FALLS — The sentencing of Keith Rosencrantz, a Castleford resident convicted June 20 on two counts of voluntary manslaughter, was delayed Friday after Judge Daniel Hurlbut decided he wanted time to draft a written sentencing order.

The order is tentatively scheduled to be issued in Fifth District Court next Friday. Rosencrantz was convicted of the June 1983 shotgun slaying of Kathy Allee Gittel and Michael Wayne Lee. The jury concluded that Rosencrantz, in a heat of unpremeditated passion and acting under the influence of alcohol, killed his former girlfriend and her

new boyfriend, Lee. Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecutor Dennis Voorhees had sought first- or second-degree murder convictions, but the jury ruled that the slayings were the result of the lesser crime of voluntary manslaughter.

In an unusual move, Hurlbut said the complexities and implications of the case prompted him to withhold sentencing for an additional week while he studied arguments made by "the defense and prosecution" in Friday sentencing hearing.

Defense attorney Jeff Stoker argued for a single, 10-year indeterminate sentence, which Stoker said would allow Rosencrantz to be eligible for parole within 3 1/2 to six years. Stoker said the sentence should be issued

purely as "retribution," and not as a deterrent, because he was convinced Rosencrantz "was not going to do anything wrong and not going to ever go back before a court of law again."

"As long as he (Rosencrantz) was sober he was a fairly mellow guy and an easy person to like," Stoker said. Stoker called Lyle Gonterman, Rosencrantz's step-father, to the witness stand to bolster his defense's case that since the night of the slayings the defendant "was free on bail, had managed to control his drinking problem."

Gonterman said that Rosencrantz had not drunk any alcohol while staying at the family's Castleford residence.

Rosencrantz then took the witness stand to testify that he had "only one glass of wine" while out on bail.

Stoker said the single 10-year sentence was in line with other voluntary manslaughter sentences that had been issued in Idaho, citing the Claude Dallas case, in which a self-proclaimed mountain man killed two Fish and Game officials.

But he admitted that the Rosencrantz sentencing was a difficult one and told Judge Hurlbut that "it wouldn't want to change places with you."

"There are people who have suffered in this case who will never be satisfied with what this court does," Stoker said.

allowable penalty, two 10-year determinate sentences that would run consecutively rather than concurrently. Voorhees rejected Stoker's argument that alcohol and anger had resulted "in totally bizarre and unexplainable" actions that mitigated his responsibilities for the killings.

"We can all allow ourselves to let our emotions run rampant if we don't have to face any consequences for our actions," Voorhees said. "But individual responsibility is the cornerstone of our system. He (Rosencrantz) promised to kill her (Gittel) if he found her with another man. That is what he promised to do and that is what he did to."

## School board to meet with officials

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls School Board will hold its fourth executive session in two weeks Monday at 8 p.m. to discuss personnel matters and a controversy surrounding Superintendent Gary Piller, the board announced Friday.

The closed session will be followed by a public hearing — not a "hearing" as a Times-News headline reported earlier — Tuesday at 8 p.m., at which the board is expected to announce proposed solutions to the problem.

School Board spokesman Gary Fay said Friday the executive session Monday would be the first time the board has been able to meet in the past two weeks with Piller and other key administrators.

Piller, assistant Superintendent Carl Snow and Personnel Director Dennis Messenger have all been on vacation and are expected back in town during the weekend, Fay said.

Piller, Snow and assistant superintendent Kent Heaton have been told to be available to meet with the board Monday to discuss solutions to the district controversy, Fay said.

Piller has been under increasing criticism within the district this summer. He was criticized by a number of district administrators in private evaluations in June, and recently had an attorney send a letter to board members Bob Knighton accusing Knighton of undermining his administration, a charge Knighton denies.

Two weeks ago, Piller proposed an administrative reorganization that would have removed Snow from curriculum responsibilities.

That plan met with sharp public protest at a public meeting and the board formally rejected it in an executive session.

Since then, there has been one public demonstration in which citizens protested the proposed demolition of Snow and circulated petitions saying it was "impossible for Dr. Piller to establish his credibility."

The board is also expected to discuss bid proposals for re-roofing work scheduled to be done this summer.

## Kimberly school contract looks close

KIMBERLY — The Kimberly School Board and the Kimberly Education Association agree a contract settlement is close at hand. At a special meeting earlier this week, procedural agreements were reached between negotiator Jerry Gates and teachers' negotiator Gayle Wilson.

Trustee Carol White says "all that is remaining is distribution of salary and we are very close to a settlement."

Wilson says the teachers have tentatively settled on a "narrow" scope of what is negotiable within the contract: salary, base pay and fringe benefits.

The areas not yet agreed on include the salary schedule and the fringe benefits.

The board has offered a \$25 per month increase in the amount of money teachers now receive for fringe pool benefits, Wilson says. The teachers are asking for \$130 a month, a 55% increase per month, more than the 25% they presently receive.

Wilson says insurance rates have gone up drastically, making the increase necessary.

Disagreement on the salary schedule has arisen because the teachers want to change from the present additive schedule to a progressive schedule, she explained.

An important issue tentatively agreed upon by the board, is the teachers request that all money for personnel increases approved by the Idaho Legislature this past year be included in the salary schedule.

What remains is determining the exact amount of money available for salaries and how it is to be

distributed in the salary schedule, as well as the fringe pool benefits, Wilson says.

Both White and Wilson agreed one statement in the negotiations is a discrepancy in the amount of state appropriation money available to the board for teachers salaries.

Friday, Wilson met with Superintendent Richard Bauser and his secretary to run several possible salary schedules through the computer. In so doing, the exact salary cost factor should be determined and negotiations can be resumed, said Wilson and White. They say this was done to alleviate any discrepancy and to verify that the computer had been programmed correctly.

Wilson says she feels since procedural agreements have tentatively been reached, the contract agreements can be finalized at the next meeting with the board before school begins.

## Utah escapee search now in Magic Valley

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN (AP) — The search for convicted murderer Wesley Allen Tuttle, the last of three Utah State Prison escapees to remain at large, moved into the Magic Valley Friday, law enforcement officials said.

Prison fingerprint records of Tuttle sent by the prison to Idaho matched latent prints found on a van thought to have been stolen by the convict, said Minidoka County Sheriff's Deputy John Fisher.

The stolen 1979 Ford van was found Thursday by deputies near Rupert. A witness saw a man abandon the vehicle and start hitchhiking north, Rupert is about 50 miles from Wendell where Tuttle's wife lives.

"We have established he was in the area about 8 a.m. Wednesday," Fisher said.

However, he said the search for Tuttle in the southern Idaho region had been relaxed, because it was believed he had left the area. He also said law enforcement officials had learned Tuttle had relatives in Washington state.

Tuttle and inmates Walter Wood and Darrell Eugene Brady escaped Tuesday by prying open three doors and walking out the prison's front door dressed in civilian clothes.

Wood and Brady were recaptured within 12 hours, but Tuttle — whom Deputy Warden Dave Franchina described as "the most violent of the three" — remains at large.

## Good weather foreseen for outdoor recreation

TWIN FALLS — Hikers, boaters and other outdoor enthusiasts should have good weather to enjoy this late-August weekend, according to the National Weather Service forecast.

In the Twin Falls-Ranger District, all campgrounds are open; except for Big Bluff, but Birch Glen, Harrington Fork, Steer Basin, Diamondfield Jack and Father and Sons campgrounds are without water.

Rough roads remain in the district, and with heavy vehicle traffic expected, motorists should travel slowly and with caution throughout the district. Trapper Creek and Big Cedar roads are still very rough and recommended for 4-wheel drive use only. Big Creek Road is still closed

due to a culvert washout. Recommended wood cutting areas include Buckskin Ridge, Eagle Springs, Ecklund Creek and Basin Patch north of Bossletier.

Firewood permits can be obtained at the Twin Falls District Office Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., and at a trailer at Diamondfield Jacks in the South Hills during the weekend.

For those heading out toward the Burley Ranger District, the Forest Service reports Lake Cleveland and Brackenbury Campgrounds are without drinking water. Thompson Flat Campground closure due to logging remains in effect. In the Raft River Division, there is no drinking water available at Clear

Creek Campground, but all trails are open and clear. Fishing is poor at Sublett Reservoir and Sublett Creek but "pretty good" at Independence Lakes. Motorcycle entry to the Independence Lakes area is illegal.

In the Fairfield Ranger District, Bounds Campground is just partially usable, so there is no fee charge. The road over Dollarhide has been graded, but it is still somewhat rough. There is still a road closure in effect on weekdays between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m. from Baumgardner Campground to the Ketchum Ranger District. The Ketchum Ranger District reports "serious washout problems" on the Little Wood River Trail near Chaparral Creek, and on the Box Canyon Trail below Box Lakes. Trail

crews will be working in these areas next week. The washouts are dangerous, and visitors should be careful, particularly those on horseback.

The East Fork of the Baker Creek road will be closed effective Aug. 31 to protect an elk herd.

The Kale Creek Road in the Little Wood River drainage remains closed to all motorized vehicles. Fishing in this district is good. However, the

**Union's leaders to consider target**

DETROIT (AP) — The United Auto Workers union on Friday summoned its top leaders from around the country to what a UAW official said probably would be a meeting to choose a strike target. **Less tobacco in inventory**

WASHINGTON (AP) — World inventories of tobacco dropped 3 percent in 1983 as a result of smaller crops in some of the major producing countries, says the Agriculture Department. A recent report by the department's Foreign Agricultural Service said the world supply as of Jan. 1 was estimated at 6.91 million metric tons of tobacco, down 184,000 tons from the level a year earlier.

One reason cited for the decline was a substantial decrease in tobacco stocks held by China. "The U.S. carry-in stocks" fell marginally between Jan. 1, 1983, and Jan. 1, 1984, but stocks in the Soviet Union, India and the Philippines were up 107,000 tons, 107,000 tons and 23,000 tons respectively, the report said. A metric ton is about 2,205 pounds. Overall, tobacco stocks increased during 1983 in 39 countries, fell in 39 and remained stable in 15, the report said. "Present indications are that global production in 1984 may be slightly below tobacco use, indicating that Jan. 1, 1985 inventories may be down marginally from Jan. 1 of this year."

**Kenya secures U.S. grain**

NAIROBI, Kenya — Kenya will get 35,000 metric tons of wheat from the United States worth \$8 million to help ease the effects of the current drought over wide areas of the country. An agreement to this effect was signed here Friday, the U.S. Embassy announced.

The repayment period is 40 years, and the interest rate will not exceed 3 percent. At the beginning of July, the United States already had pledged to donate food aid worth \$10 million. The International Red Cross Society said there is an acute food shortage in 16 of Kenya's 42 provinces.

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**Occidental Petroleum chief quits**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A. Robert Abboud resigned Thursday as president of Occidental Petroleum Corp., said Dr. Armand Hammer, chairman of the giant energy company.

Abboud, whose resignation is effective Sept. 1, and Hammer had "honest" differences, Hammer told board members. Hammer, also the corporation's chief executive officer, read a statement by Abboud explaining his resignation from the board of directors. He said he would remain as a consultant to the company.

Differences between Hammer, 86, the company's founder, and Abboud arose during Occidental's acquisition of Cities Service Gas and Oil Co. and Iowa Beef Processors Inc. in 1981 and 1982, Abboud's statement said. "The planning and establishment of priorities for such an effort are enormously complex in a large multinational company like Occidental and honest differences result," Abboud said.

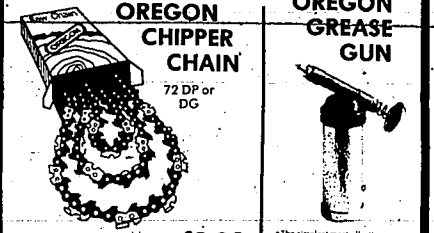
"Dr. Hammer wishes to assume total leadership in the formulation and implementation of this program," Abboud said. "We thus have mutually agreed to have an amicable, no-fault parting." Occidental executive vice president Dr. Ray R. Irani will succeed Abboud as president and chief operating officer, Hammer said. MetroMedia Inc. Chairman John W. Kluge will replace Abboud on the Occidental board.

**Catfish farming keeps growing**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Production of farm-grown catfish continues to rise from year-earlier levels, says the Agriculture Department. In July, output was 11.3 million pounds, up 9 percent from July 1983, a monthly report said Monday. During the first seven months of 1984, output was almost 88 million pounds, up 10 percent from the same period of last year. Prices paid to growers last month averaged 74 cents a pound, nine cents more than in July 1983. Imports also have increased sharply.

# Liechtenstein prepares for coronation

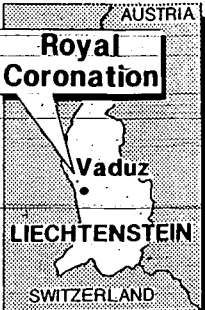

VADUZ, Liechtenstein — He has lived in the family's 13th century castle and managed a fortune including a \$150 million art collection, but the crown prince of Liechtenstein drives a Volkswagen Rabbit and favors free enterprise on the eve of his reign.

On Sunday, the 29-year-old Crown Prince Hans-Adam of Liechtenstein is to be installed as regent of this prosperous 61-square-mile nation on the upper Rhine, the last surviving monarchy of the Holy Roman Empire, which the prince calls "the world's most industrialized country."

In a simple ceremony in the family castle, his 78-year-old father, Prince Franz Josef II, will turn over to Hans-Adam the executive functions he has held since 1938. The popular Franz Josef will continue as head of state, retaining only a ceremonial role.

In his new position, Hans-Adam has the final say on any law, can issue emergency decrees, dissolve the 15-member parliament and quash judicial proceedings. His father made history by forming a national coalition government after the 1938



Anschluss when neighboring Austria became part of the Nazi Reich, and Hans-Adam says he too wants to be more than a figurehead.

In an interview with The Associated Press at the castle above Vaduz, Hans said he favors "new ideas" and "if necessary... legislative changes." His primary interest is foreign policy and his hope is to strengthen Liechtenstein's ties with international organizations, including the United Nations.

"We would already have joined the U.N.—if it depended only on my hopes," he said. "But 900 people could force a national vote on the issue if membership means a public expenditure of more than 20,000 francs (\$8,330)."

The principality's diplomatic interests are looked after by Switzerland, but the two countries' foreign policy decisions are not necessarily the same.

In 1980, Liechtenstein, unlike its two neutral neighbors, joined the U.S.-led boycott of the Moscow Olympics to protest the Soviet intervention in Afghanistan. Last year, the prince raised eyebrows by endorsing increased European military integration, including the creation of a European nuclear deterrent force.

"We have to think about European stability, even though we are neutral," he said.

Two generations ago, the country was so poor that the government tried in vain to mortgage the government-cum-prison building and Hans-Adam's grandfather sold some of the family jewels to bail the government out.

## Tiny orphan still smiling after difficult surgery

BRAINTREE, Mass. (AP) — marveled speech therapist Charlene Manning.

Alexandra Balzacar, the tiny Ecuadoran orphan whose fused jaw was unlocked by American surgeons, has returned for treatment she cannot get in her homeland and is again impressing doctors and therapists by smiling through her pain.

"That's me! That's you!" she said Thursday as she laughed with her speech therapist at Braintree Hospital in suburban Boston. "In the house. On the plane. Look!"

"It is amazing how well she has adjusted. Here is a little girl who is out of her own country, she didn't speak English, she's with people she doesn't really know, and she is so cheerful and motivated."

Thousands of people who saw news stories on the spunky girl contacted Cardinal Cushing Hospital in hopes of adopting the child, who was abandoned at birth on the steps of a crowded Ecuadoran clinic.

# Sakharov's wife reportedly in exile

HAMBURG, West Germany (AP) — The wife of Soviet dissident Andrei Sakharov apparently was exiled after being arrested on her way to seek political asylum at the U.S. Embassy in Moscow, a Soviet source was quoted Friday as saying.

The mass-circulation newspaper, Bild Zeitung, which earlier this week obtained videotapes of Sakharov and his wife, Yelena Bonner, said the

information came from a source who has previously acted as the Kremlin's pipeline to Western publications.

The newspaper did not identify the source, but the description fits journalist Victor-Louis, who Bild said provided the videotape.

"The source, quoted in a Moscow-dated interview with the West German daily, said Mrs. Bonner had been tried this week and "presum-

ably will be prevented from leaving Gorky," the closed city where Sakharov was banished in January 1980 for criticizing the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan.

The interview followed a U.S. State Department announcement Thursday that it had received an unconfirmed report that Mrs. Bonner, 61, had been sentenced to five years of internal exile after a conviction on charges of

"slandering the Soviet state."

The Bild Zeitung source did not deny that report, but stopped short of confirming it and did not say how long Mrs. Bonner must stay in Gorky, a city closed to foreigners about 220 miles east of Moscow.

Sources in Moscow this month quoted Mrs. Bonner as saying Sakharov had ended the hunger strike and was being treated in a hospital.

LONDON (AP) — Two admirals in charge of the Royal Navy during the Falklands war denied that Britain ever considered attacking Argentina with nuclear weapons, the Times of London reported Friday.

They were responding to allegations Thursday in the left-wing weekly New Statesman that a Polaris submarine was sent to Ascension Island. The magazine said that had the war gone badly for Britain, the submarine was to launch a nuclear attack on an Argentine city.

Admiral of the Fleet Sir Terence Lewin, chief of the defense staff during the South Atlantic war in the spring of 1982, said Britain never sent a Polaris submarine there because of the war.

Admiral of the Fleet Sir Henry Leach, chief of the naval staff at the time, said: "We did not contemplate a nuclear attack and did not make any even potentially preparatory moves for such action."

## Shiites hit Saudi embassy

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Radical Shiite Muslims ransacked the consular section at the Saudi Arabian Embassy compound Friday, hours after a rocket attack on the British Embassy in Beirut.

The government, meanwhile, announced it was requesting a U.N. Security Council debate on Israel's occupation of southern

Lebanon in an effort to end alleged "fascist practices" against the area's population.

An underground group involved in guerrilla warfare against the Israeli army claimed responsibility for the overnight rocket attack on the British Embassy, which caused damage to the visa section but no casualties.

## Dominican students in riot

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP) — One university student was shot to death and at least four were injured Friday during clashes between police and rioting youths at the Autonomous University of Santo Domingo.

The chancellor of the university, Fernando Sanchez Martínez, said the death of Angel Ramon Perez Lopez, 20, "aggravates the difficult situation brought on by the violent confrontation" between students and police.

Authorities said Perez Lopez received a fatal bullet wound to the chest, but there was no immediate information on who fired the shot.

The Federation of University Students organized the disturbances to protest sharp increases in bus fares and the cost of textbooks. They also blamed the more intense violence Friday on a rumor that a student injured in similar rioting Wednesday had since died. But authorities denied any such death had occurred.

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# Fish & Game board limits chukar hunting

BOISE — With chukar populations described as near the "minimum threshold" for survival, the Idaho Fish and Game Commission has voted to sharply curtail hunting for that species.

The commission voted unanimously Friday to limit hunters to three chukar daily and three in possession this fall. Last season's limits were 8 and 16. And the panel also voted to cut three weeks off the chukar season, and close hunting completely in four southwestern counties.

That means hunting for chukar and hungarian partridge will open Oct. 5 and close Dec. 2

in most of the state. Hun limits remain at 8 and 16.

An exception will be the Fish and Game Department's Region 2. At the request of Commission Chairman Keith Stonebraker, the bird season in that region will open Sept. 15 and run through Dec. 2.

Game bird manager Gary Will said last winter's harsh weather, plus several seasons of poor breeding, have left the state's chukar population dangerously low.

Chukar hunting was closed completely in Ada, Gem, Boise, Elmore and that part of Gooding County west of the Bliss-Hill City Road. Will said 3,200 spring breeders were released 10 weeks ago to replenish low bird populations in those counties, and the birds

should not be subjected to hunting pressure now.

The department staff recommended reducing the limits to two birds per day and two in possession. But commission members felt they could accomplish the same thing, limiting the number of birds harvested, by increasing the bag limit slightly but shortening the season.

Commission member Fred Christensen, Nampa, said the best available "hard data" indicates chukar populations have fallen to no more than 6.2 per square mile, indicating the species might be in danger.

"We have to pay attention to hard data," said Christensen. "If we are to provide birds for the citizens of Idaho...the birds have to

come first."

Stonebraker said there was "no outcry" from hunters in his area to delay the opening of the season by three weeks.

Commissioner Norm Guth, Salmon, said he favors giving hunters as much of a "quality experience" as possible, and supported the higher bag limit and shorter season.

Will said last year Idaho hunters took about 81,000 chukar and 77,000 hungarian partridge. He said the agency wants to cut that to about 20,000 chukar this season, because the state's game bird hatcheries can't produce much more than that.

The commission voted for other upland game bird seasons generally unchanged from last year. That includes pheasant, quail,

partridge and grouse.

An exception will be the goose season. Most of southwestern Idaho will close Dec. 23 instead of Jan. 6. The season opens Oct. 13. Agency staffers said that's to protect local goose breeding pairs nesting along the Snake and Payette rivers.

The closure extends south from Adams County to Nevada, and west from U.S. 20, Idaho-51 and -C.J. Strike Reservoir to the Oregon border.

Will said this season hunting conditions will be watched closely for the critical bird species. If harsh weather and deep snow causes the birds to "concentrate in certain areas, he said, the department could ask for an emergency curtailment of hunting.

## 'Other' Watson ahead in Series

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — South African Denis Watson set at least five course and tournament records with a spectacular, 8-under-par 62 that gave him a three-stroke lead Friday in the second round of the \$700,000 NEC World Series of Golf.

Watson, 28, a regular on the American PGA Tour for four seasons, completed two trips over the 7,173-yard Firestone Country Club course in 131 nine shots under par for the respected layout that ranks among the most difficult the touring pros encounter all season.

His 18-hole score broke the course record of 63 set by Bruce Crampton in the 1975 PGA National Championship and the tournament record of 64 set by Andy Bean in 1979.

His 36-hole total broke the course record of 132 set by Jack Nicklaus in the 1969 American Golf Classic and the tournament record of 133 set by Tom Watson in 1979.

His eight birdies for the day was still another record for the elite, international tournament.

Both his 18-hole score and 36-hole totals matched the low for the year on the tour.

Bruce Lietzke, the first-round leader, had a 68 in the mild, partly cloudy weather and dropped back to second at the tournament halfway point with a 134 total.

"God, it feels good," said Watson, who qualified for this event with his first American victory, two weeks ago in the Bulck Open.

"I said yesterday it's possible for somebody to get hot and shoot 62 or 63. But I had no idea it would be me."

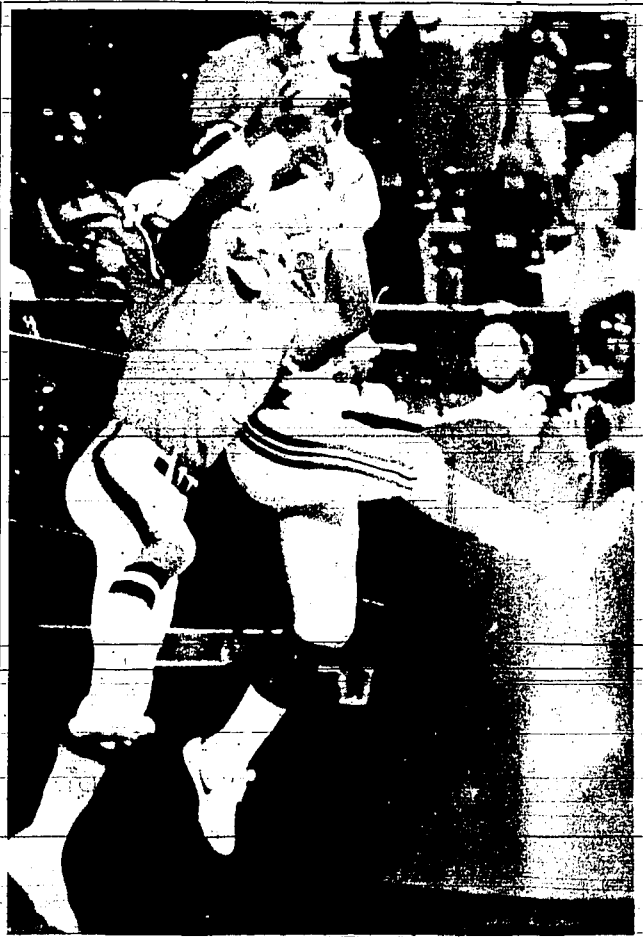
"It amazes me, everytime I shoot one of those low rounds," said Watson, who had a 63 in the Bulck and another 63 in the Heritage Classic earlier this season.

But this, he said, was "the best scoring round I've ever had. Firestone is one of the toughest golf courses you can ever play. It's gratifying to shoot this kind of score on such a great course."

Peter Jacobsen, a 24-time winner this year, was third alone at 137, six back of Watson at the tournament halfway point, after 67.

## Suddenly, would-be coach Schnellenberger's out of a job

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) — Howard Schnellenberger, who left the national champion University of Miami for the United States Football League, was left without a coaching job Friday when plans fell through for the USFL team's move from Washington to Florida.

Sherwood Weiser, who said last May he would bring the Redskins to Miami in 1985, and Schnellenberger made the announcement at a news conference at the headquarters of

Weiser's Continental Companies.

Both said the league's announcement this week that it would switch from a spring to a fall schedule affected their decisions.

"First of all, I'm regretting to tell you that we have elected to discontinue any further negotiations to purchase the Washington Redskins," Weiser said.

"I regret the fact that we can't bring a team to Miami, but I think the need to make a prudent business

decision overshadows the desire to bring a team to this area," the hotel developer said.

Schnellenberger, who guided the Hurricanes to an 11-1 season and 31-30 Orange Bowl upset over top-ranked Nebraska, left the college team on May 25. At the same time, Weiser affirmed that he had nearly completed a deal to bring the Redskins to Miami.

Schnellenberger, who signed a reported five-year, \$3 million contract

with Weiser just three months ago, said the two men still have a "financial arrangement," but he would not elaborate. The former assistant to Dolphins Coach Don Shula admitted he's looking for work elsewhere in football.

"I'm a football coach by trade and I plan to be one for a long time to come," he said. "I know that it's not going to be in Miami, though."

Schnellenberger said he would consider offers from college or professional teams, but he refused to speculate about his future and said he had not talked to anyone yet about a new job.

Weiser recently said the agreement had not been completed because a partner, Miami auto dealer Norman Braman, backed out of deal. As recently as last week, Schnellenberger said only minor details needed to be completed.

But on Wednesday, the league said it would switch to a fall schedule.

## Air attack isn't just a passing fancy for Edwards, BYU

It was once said of the University of Oklahoma — and other college football teams who thought every forward pass meant another step toward purgatory — that the only time they put the ball in the air was when they flew to a road game.

And it was former Texas Coach Darrell Royal who cracked that "three things can happen when you throw the football — and two of them (interceptions and interceptions) are bad."

Now comes LaVell Edwards, who has been the head coach at Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, since 1972 and whose offensive philosophy is that three things also can happen when you run the football — and two of them (lose ground, fumble) are bad.

It has taken a while for Edwards' game plan to catch on. But the last two national champions — Penn State in 1982 and Miami last year — threw the ball more than they ran it.

"I think you can win being a passing team," Edwards says. "Passing is like anything else — there are a lot of different ways of doing it. I don't look at our passing attack as being high-risk. We don't turn the ball over near as much as option teams do on pitchouts. To me, that's a high-risk offense. Most of our passing is medium-to-short-range — although we do have the capability for the long ball — and we've never turned the ball over more than we've taken it away from our opponents."

So that Edwards and BYU like to throw the ball is like saying Elizabeth Taylor and Zsa Zsa Gabor like to get married. The NCAA record book lists three BYU quarterbacks among the top 10 in major-college career passing yards (Jim McMahon is second with 6,536, Steve Young is ninth with 7,739, Marc Wilson is 10th with 7,637). On the single-season list, BYU claims four of the top five spots (McMahon is first with 4,571 yards in 1980, Young second with 3,902 last year, Wilson third with 3,720 in 1979 and McMahon fourth with 3,555

in 1981).

In average yards per game, McMahon's both first with 380.9 in 1980 and second with 335.5 in 1981. Young is third with 354.7 in 1983 and Wilson is fifth with 328.2 in 1979. Young was the national leader in passing efficiency a year ago. McMahon in 1980 and 1981. The list of noted BYU quarterbacks goes back through Clifford Nielsen (1975-77), Gary Shiede (1973-74) and Virgil Carter (1964-66).

The Cougars must be doing something right. They have won eight consecutive Western Athletic Conference championships and Edwards' career record is 105-37-1. But, although they are among the favorites this fall, the rest of the WAC can take hope from a line in the BYU football guide which says that "quarterback" is the biggest question mark.

There are three candidates to carry on the line of succession. The top two are Robbie Bosco, a 6-foot-3 junior from Roseville, Calif., who completed 17 of 28 passes for 252 yards and three touchdowns as Young's backup last

season, and Blaine Fowler, a 6-0 junior from Elmira, N.Y., who saw some action in two games in 1982 and was redshirted last year.

The third candidate is Mike Young, a 6-2 sophomore from Greenwich, Conn., who recently returned from a Mormon church mission in Honduras. Mike is the great-great-great grandson of Brigham and brother of Steve and probably will be redshirted this fall.

But before the rest of the WAC gets too ecstatic, Edwards has these words of warning: "I'd like to have more experience, but it's not really a question mark. Bosco — he's the guy, and I feel good about his progress. If we have problems this year, it won't be because of Bosco. I don't want to put any undue pressure on him, but he's got the arm and he's looking sharp."

"Bosco is probably more like Wilson in size, temperament, the way he throws the ball. He's got a very good arm and he's very accurate. Fowler is a lot like (Steve) Young, kind of a scambler and not very tall."


