

Panel studies ethics of genetic therapy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Initial efforts to change the basic genetic information of humans to treat certain
hereditary diseases may not pose the
complicated ethical problems some
people have envisioned, says a congressional study released Monday.
The report said, however, that before scientists gain the ability to
make genetic changes that can be
passed on from generation to generation, society will have to debate the
possibilities and decide whether to
proceed.

The Office of Technology Assessment saft proposed genetic therapy for inherited disorders is similar to other medical treatments and does not raise new ethical issues if it only affects individuals and not their off-sering.

Non-inheritable gene therapy is
likely to be tried as soon as next year
in efforts to help patients whose
defective genes cause serious
diseases for which there is little or no
treatment, said the report.
First uses likely will be to correct
relatively rare enzyme deficiencies;
but eventually the techniques could
be used to treat major diseases such
as cystic librosis.
The treatment probably will involve removing cells from the patients' bodies, inserting copies of goodgenes in place of defective, ones and
returning the cells in hope that the
new genes work properly and correct
the defect.

The report said this type of genetic manipulation probably would be acceptable to society if it only involves helping individuals. But any plans to make genetic changes that are passed on to subsequent generations require more debate before proceeding, it ad-

ded.

"The controversy over gene therapy probably will not be as great as some people first thought," Gore lold a news briefling. "But it is clear that max a society, we should start discussing possible ethical problems of future applications."

Time to crack down on Arvan Nations

Many Idahoans are aware of the existence in our state of a radical organization known as the Aryan Nations, a neo-Nazi group which claims God's blessing in its promotion of racial and religious harred. For most of us, they are simply right-wing kooks whose presence we tolerate under the belief that there

is room in the world for all kinds of people, even some

is room in the world for all kinds of people, even some whose beliefs are repugnant.

But-two events in the past week have raised our consciousness about this organization and caused us to rethink their presence in Idaho. One was the shootout and firey death near Seattle Dec. 8 of Robert Mathews, founder of an Aryan Nations splinter group called the White American Bastion.

The second was the arrest of Mathews', associate.

White American Bastion.

The second was the arrest of Mathews' associate Gary Yarbrough and the discovery in his Sandpoint, Idaho residence of a machine gun which authorities have now linked to the killing last summer of Jewish talk show host Alan Berg in Denver, Colo. Authorities also think the group may be responsible for armored car holdups this year in Seattle and California in which more than \$4 million was stolen.

These threads suggest that this group is no longer your basic crowd of harmless hatemongers. Rather, they seem to have both the economic resources and the will to launch a campair of violence in their quest for

will to launch a campaign of violence in their quest for

will to launch a campaign of violence in their quest for racial purity.
That impression is confirmed in a weekend interview by the San Francisco Examiner with Aryan Nations.
head-Richard-Butler of Hayden Lake, who praises Mathews for the "courage to die for his beliefs" and for leading the splinter group as a vanguard. "The future is theirs," Butler said. "We cannot tell them what to do."

In the same article, another associate, Keith Gilbert, In the same article, another associate, Keith Gilbert, claims the neo-Nazis want to gain control of parts of Idaho and other Western states to remove "racial filth" from the area. "This is the last stronghold of the Aryan nation on the face of the Earth, and we're not going to be budged," says Gilbert.

Such rantings may seem far away for us, but they are not. There have been cross-burnings in the Magic Valley on several occasions in the past couple of years, and statements by people who say they share the Aryan Nations philosophy.

It is time, in our view, for this hatred to be resisted. The time calls for strong voices by the broad yast ma.

It is time, in our view, for this natred to be resisted. The time calls for strong voices by the broad, vast majority of Idahoans who find the Aryan Nations's aims repugnant to a free society.

It calls for coordinated efforts by local law enforcement personnel and state and federal authorities, who are working diligently to contain this hate group even as the streams.

And the time calls for some careful review by the Legislature of state laws to both contain such hate

Legislature of state laws to both contain such hate groups and monitor their activities. If laws need to be strengthened, let's do so.

It is one thing for a group to preach an unorthodox set of beliefs; that is within the American tradition of violence. But these events go beyond that.

Idaho must not be allowed to become a haven for people who murder and rob as well as poison our environment with their vemonous beliefs.

Cooperation needed on steelhead run

During the summer months, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game was projecting the biggest run of steelhead trout in recent years: By October those projections were being modified downward. Now this year's wild steelhead run looks four of ive times worse than last year's run and the resurgence of ocean-going steelhead trout in idaho waters remains an elusive goal.

This disappointment to Idaho Ishermen and conservationists has sparked a bitter conflict between Fish & Game and the tribal Ishing authority, the Columbia River inter-Tribal Fisheries Council. The Native Americans are not willing to carry the blame of what they consider the mismanagement of Idaho steelhead production by Idaho officials.

The solution may be to change the mesh size of Indian gillnets and adjust the timing of the harvest to lavor wild fish. To implement such changes will require the good wild of alparties. The two sides are still talking to one another and hope to resolve their difference quietly.

For the public to take sides at this time is pointless until the range of difference has been aurrowed and specific options are under consideration. The public's understanding of the opportunity for steelhead restoration will only suffer by continued dispute between the tribes and Fish and Game.

However, the economists also pointed on Monday to new evidence that restraint on money-flowing into the economy was eased somewhat last week; just before the closed-door meeting of the Federal Open Market Committee.

And rumors spread on Wall Street and elsewhere that a new reduction might be imminent in the interest rate the Federal Reserve charges on its own loans — a move that would seem to indicate lower rates at banks and elsewhere.



WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, re-jecting ealls for a major slowdown in his Pentagon buildup, has decided to recommend-relatively small savings of about 8s billion for the next budget year, administration officials said Monday night







IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Based on the variations found in the partial recount earlier this month; it is virtually impossible for Republican Congressman George Hansen to reverse his defeat through a districtwide recount, a statistician says.

Still, Hansen, fighling for his political life and refusing to give up his quest for an eighth term, has challenged Attorney General Jim Jones' denial of his request for a full recount, arguing that until one is conducted the true outcome of the Nov, 6 election will remain in doubt.

The state Supreme Court on Monday agreed to hear arguments on Hansen claim Tuesday morning. The incumbent's attorney says the court has until Christmas Eve to act.

While acknowledging that it is not impossible for a recount to reverse the certified results that gave the election to Democrat Richard Stallings, Corvin Atwood says the variations found in the partial recount, if spread districtivide, would reverse the outcome only one time in every thousand.

The partial recount of 45 of the district's 451 precincts, financed by Hansen, found nearly 70 changes from the certified vote but most were in Stallings' favor. His certified victory margin of 133 votes widened to 170.

Hansen discounts the votes added to Stailings' margin after the partial recount, arguing that in 10 precincts he established a trend that benefited him. Atwood agreed that the overall outcome of the limited recount; is not at Issue.

"It-doesn't matter-who-coines-out_ahead_in_the_precincts, but how big the variance is," said Atwood, who taught statistics for a decade at the university level and now works for an ideaho Falls engineering firm.


He said the error rate found in the partial recount extended to the remaining unchecked precincts would still give liansen only a ope-tenth of one percent chance of overtaking stailings.

Even if errors occurred more often than the overall limited recount demonstrated, Atwood said Hansen's chances of reversing the election's outcome would be just over 1 percent. They would rise to 5 percent if the error rate in the remaining 460 precinets ran twice as high as those involved in the partial recount, which covered to for the district's 26 counties, he said.







If DECA is transformed into a commerce department, the state funding-would ont necessarily increase dramatically, but it would give the organization increased legitimacy, McMullan said.

Trade deficits worsen, sink to record low

WASHINGTON — The broadest measure of the nation's foreign frade sank to another record deficit from July through September as a flood of imports contributed to red ink totalings \$32,9 billion.

The Reagan administration said the deficit this year would easily top \$100 billion — more than double the previous record — and would worsen still further in 1985.

Private analysts agreed that there appears to be no end in sight to the country's trading woos.

The Commerce Department's latest information on trade was contained in its estimate of the country's current account, which measures not only the trade in merchandise between the United States and the rest of the world but also the trade in services, reflecting such things as invices, reflecting such things as in-vestment income and money-spent by

vices. Feliceting such duning as investment income and money-spent by tourists.

The current account was in surplus as recently as 1981, but by last year-the deficit totaled a record \$41.6 billion. For the first nine months of this year, the deficit already totals \$77.3 billion. The third quarter figure of \$32.9 billion was 33 percent higher than the \$24.7 billion was 32 percent higher than the \$24.7 billion first quarter deficit. Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige predicted the total for all of 1984 will exceed \$100 million and would rise still further in 1985. He blamed the problem on the strength of the U.S. dollar, which he linked to high U.S. interest rates.

Most of the gain was attributed to a strong rebound in the auto industry following two months in which production was held down by strikes in the United States and Canada.

The Commerce Department report said the surplus in the service category — which includes the impact of furrism as well as overseas investment earnings — fell by \$200 million to a new low of \$3.1 billion. The drop had been even greater from the first quarter to the second quarter, when the surplus declined by \$5 billion.

Analysts 'said' the strength of the dollar has cut into the surplus in services this year by reducing the profits U.S. companies and citizens earned on their overseas investments. While the payoff in the foreign country has remained essentially the same, that amount of foreign currency totaled up to far less in U.S. dollars.

Much of the deterioration in trade came from a large jump in foreign imports, which rose 10.2 percent from July through September, swamping a modest 1.7 percent increase in exports.

Micron tries to expand

BOISE (AP) — Micron Technology Inc. of Bolse, one of the world's leading producers of computer chips, intends to create, a new market for those chips by expanding into the bustness of computer systems.

"Micron would like to become more than a component supplier. It would like to grow into a systems manufacturer." President Joe Parkinson sald, "We are trying to build up the systems end of our business."

For a couple of years, Micron has produced one system involving a a camera that plugs into computers. Recently, the company legan bolstering its efforts, with the industrial user as the target.

The company's systems division now has about 30 employees, half of them engineers.

Micron Systems plans to triple the number of engineers in the next sev-eral months to develop and hone computer systems that range from filmless cameras to optical scanners and robots, said Kipp Bedard, divi-sion manager.

"It's a significant move. It's a complementary move to promote the sale of DRAMS (dynamic random access memory chips)." he said.

Bedard said that in 1986 he hopes to boost Micron System sales from \$130,000 a month to \$6 million a month. That is about half of Micron Technology Inc.'s current sales.

Since Micron Technology opened its plant in May 1931, its primary product and the vast majority of its sales have come from the 64 kilobit dynamic random access memory chip. The plant now makes about 6 million chips a month, ranking it among the top 10 companies in worldwide production. This fall, the company also started limited shipment of 256 kilobit chips that have four times the memory and a special feature called error correction coding that acts like a spare tire. Because of its success in chips, company officials say they can use their expertise in that area as a springboard into computer systems, and create a market for their own chips. "We can't just be a DRAM manulacturer. If the market turns down, one way, to control! Lis to get into systems in markets company officials say the rone way to control it. But of the plant is the systems work," Bedard said.

So far, Micron has developed or plans to work on several types of systems in markets company officials feel-have good potential. Bedard said development of some 3f the systems is years away.




