

## **Right to work won't** produce Nirvana

Sensing a final victory after years of veto defeats, the Idaho Freedom to Work Committee is flooding the press and legislators' offices with right to work litera-ture to promote passage of a state right to work law.

A bill could be introduced as early as today in the Idaho Legislature nd passage is anticipated quickly.

We support passage of the law because we think it would help set the right philosophical alignment on labor-relations-as-an-attraction-to-new-businesses to

But this is not the time, we believe, for a lot of dogmatic rhetoric on the issue. Pragmatically, the law will have little impact on current Idaho industries.

Those industries in Idaho which have traditionally been unionized will probably continue to remain so. Their numbers aren't that large. Idaho is not a heavily unionized state.

Unionization in America is already in a great period of change. Membership has peaked and is now declin-ing. That trend will continue, not because states enact right to work laws, but through forces in the American economy.

The shift from an industrial to a post-industrial age has already lowered many wage scales, reflecting more closely what the work is really worth.

Idahoans should also be cautions about the claims, now being made by right to work proponents that passage of the law will bring new businesses pouring into Idaho.

That is simply not realistic. Businesses pick and choose potential sites for on the basis of many criteria. The chief ones are proximity to raw materials, the product's market, transportation costs, and overall production costs, of which the labor climate is just one part

The evidence suggests that a right to work law can have some positive effect in recruiting new industry. But it is only one factor in a complex business decision.

To give it more importance that is merited, in our view, is to distort its potential effect.

There is little likelihood that a right to work law would double the number of companies coming to or even considering Idaho, or even "dramatically enhance": Idaho's employment picture, to quote a phrase right-to-work proponents have used.

Instead, we think it's impact will be chiefly philosophical, a change that should improve rather than harm the climate for employment growth.

The world of labor relations won't end when the Legislature passes right to work. But it won't be Nirvana either.

# Getting courage to eat oyster worth it

The Associated Press Someone once said, "He was a bold man who first ate an oyster." I can believe it, since it took me 40 years to work up the nerve to con-sume my first one. Bui I have been enjoying them ever since. Up through April, oysters will be available across the land, From the good Lymnhavens off the coast of Virginia, to the tiny Oympians of the Pacific Northwest, American American American American Awaters abound with thes bivalves. But few oysters capture the ocean flavor and builtery quality as do the mollusks from Delaware that are said to have delighted William Penn. As the oysters pop open, they are removed from the shells and dunked in a skillet of meited butter.
