'High time' to meet, Reagan says

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, declaring "it's high time" for a superpower summit, renewed an offer Thursday night to meet with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev. "I think there is a good chance" the invitation will be accepted, he said. "It's our turn to be the host," Reagan said at a televised news conference, adding he wasn't surprised that Gorbachev hasn't yet replied to

an offer first extended last week. "The man has only been in office for a few days and I have some idea of what is confronting him now." The president also said he stands prepared to discuss his unpopular budget with Senate Republicans pressing for changes. But he resisted two options that many GOP lawmakers favor — canceling next year's Social Security cost-of-living increase and trimming the defense build-up — and said raising taxes would only "take the heat off the

backs of those who don't want to cut spending." Reagan seemed relaxed during his 30-minute question-and-answer session, and appeared ready to take a few more questions after the allotted time had expired. "Well, all right," he said when informed the time was up. Nor did he disappoint several women reporters who wore red — first lady Nancy Reagan's favorite color — in hopes of being recognized. The first question came from a

reporter in a red dress, and Reagan told her, "I know that Nancy, upstairs, would die — she's watching on television — if I didn't call on you in that pretty red dress." On "major issues" raised by reporters, Reagan: • Offered to have U.S. diplomats meet with a joint Palestinian and Jordanian delegation to promote peace in the Middle East, so long as the Palestine Liberation Organization is excluded. But he ruled out direct American involvement in peace talks.

"We are not getting into direct negotiations," he said, but instead, "just going to do whatever we can to help." • Rejected a call from Democratic House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., to renew the federal program of supplemental unemployment benefits due to lapse on March 31. • Described the police shootings of black demonstrators in South Africa as "tragic," but said the racial troubles in that nation result in part from

those who want "violence in the streets." • Said the closure of 71 state-insured savings and loans institutions in Ohio had no national implications. "This is not a major threat to banking systems, and not a problem anywhere else," he said. • Said he won't visit a concentration camp site when he goes to Germany this evening, but commented on the end of World War II because "a guilt feeling" has been imposed upon the • See REAGAN on Page A3.

BLM decision on office site due out today

TWIN FALLS — When Idaho BLM Director Clair Whitlock announces today the realignment of his agency's districts due to the land interchange between the BLM and U.S. Forest Service, three south central Idaho cities will have a lot at stake. The one that gets the District Office for the realigned central district in southern Idaho will reap the benefits of a large government payroll such an office will bring. Although the other two will have some type of government office, it will be considerably less than what they have now. Twin Falls already knows it will lose the combined \$2 million payrolls of the Twin Falls Ranger District office and the supervisory office of the Sawtooth National Forest, which will go out of existence and merge with the Boise and Challis National Forests. But it has hopes of gaining the new BLM central district office. If it does, it will do so at the expense of Burley

and Shoshone, which now claim BLM district offices carrying their names. In Idaho, the interchange will cut the six BLM districts down to three, all in southern Idaho. There will be an east, central and west district, with Boise keeping the state office and west district office. In the East, the district office will be in either Pocatello or Idaho Falls. One government official close to the planning process for the interchange says Pocatello already has been selected for the east district office. In fact, the only decision not yet made as of Thursday morning was where the central district office will go, he says. Thursday afternoon, Whitlock was in a Salt Lake City hotel meeting with Western officials from the Forest Service and BLM. The decision on the central office was expected to be made there. Because each city stands to lose a

New wild area bill for Idaho in works

LEWISTON — A Connecticut congressman is drafting an Idaho wilderness bill which is expected to include more than 8 million acres, an aide to the legislator said. Herb Holtz, legislative assistant to Rep. Samuel Gjedensson, D-Conn., said the bill would include all remaining roadless areas on national forests in the state. The bill, expected to be introduced within the next two weeks, would be the largest wilderness proposal to be introduced in Congress for Idaho, the Lewiston Morning Tribune reported Thursday. Gjedensson agreed to introduce the bill at the request of Richard and Carole King Sorensen, who live near Stanley. The popular rock musician and her husband have been waging a running battle with the U.S. Forest Service after buying a ranch near Stanley in 1981. The case is still pending in court over the wilderness dispute last year.

The bill grew out of a meeting with about a dozen representatives of Idaho senators in Washington last month, Sorensen said. Holtz said Gjedensson has agreed to introduce the bill but must still document the extent of roadless lands in Idaho not protected as wilderness, which is expected to fall between 8 million and 9 million acres. There is still a possibility Bureau of Land Management administered roadless lands, encompassing several million acres more, might still be added to the bill as well, Holtz said. Gjedensson's interest in Idaho's wilderness dispute, Holtz said, "is that the lands that are viable wilderness areas are protected. "We think there is something wrong when you propose a bill for 500,000 acres." He referred to the Idaho congressional delegation's Idaho Forest Management Act introduced in the Senate a year ago that called for

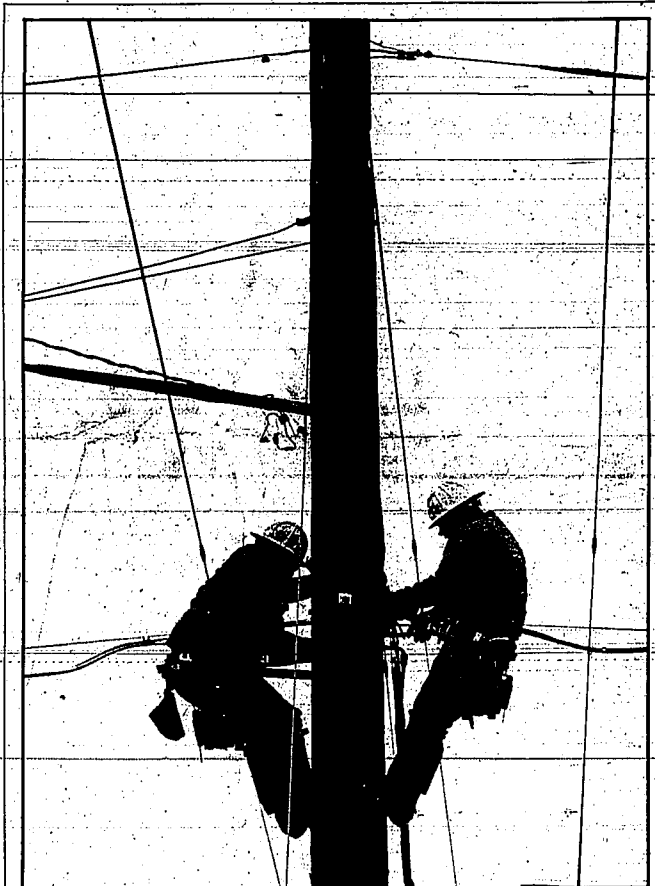

South African police fire on, kill 17 blacks

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Police fired into a crowd of blacks marching toward a white town Thursday, killing 17 and wounding 19, the government said. It was the bloodiest single incident in a year of racial unrest. The shootings at Uitenhage, an industrial area outside Port Elizabeth, occurred on the 25th anniversary of the shootings in the black township of Sharpeville, where police firing on a crowd killed 69 blacks and wounded 178.

Louis Le Grange, the white government's minister of law and order, said the violence began when 3,000 to 4,000 blacks advanced on a police detachment of 19 men and stoned them, refusing orders to disperse. Newspapers quoted an unidentified witness as saying, "The police suddenly opened fire. We deny we stoned them." Le Grange said the crowd advanced on police "armed with stones, sticks, petrol (gasoline) bombs and bricks," trying to march from the black township of Langa toward the white area of Uitenhage, near Port Elizabeth on the Indian Ocean coast.

Growth weak for quarter

WASHINGTON — Economic growth slowed to a surprisingly weak pace during the first three months of the year, while one measure of inflation spurred to its highest level in almost three years, the government reported Thursday. The Reagan administration and many private economists called both statistics misleading, contending that the economic expansion is more robust and inflation far less of a menace than the Commerce Department figures seem to indicate. Other analysts were less optimistic, warning that the unexpected weak growth could translate into falling unemployment rates as domestic industries lose further sales to a flood of foreign imports. Before taking inflation into account, the GNP was estimated to be growing at a rate of 7.6 percent in the first quarter, hitting an annual figure of \$183 billion, up from \$176 trillion in the fourth quarter. The GNP report, revised growth down slightly for the fourth quarter to 4.3 percent from an earlier 4.9 percent estimate. The change put GNP growth for all of 1984 at 4.3 percent, still an annual growth since a 10.1 percent gain in 1981.

All sides agreed that the department's estimate of growth in the gross national product — the total output of goods and services — was much lower than the 4 percent rate that had been widely expected for January through March. The 2.1 percent gain was the weakest performance since a 1.6 percent rise from last July through September, a period of slumping growth, which was followed by a 4.3 percent rebound from October through December. In other bad news, the report said that a measure of inflation led to the GNP — the implicit price deflator — rose at an annual rate of 5.4 percent in the first three months of the year, the fastest clip since a 5.6 percent pace in the second quarter of 1982. This inflation-measure had risen at a rate of just 2.8 percent in the final quarter last year.

Decision delayed until today

Education board split over fee boost

BOISE — The state Board of Education was sharply divided Thursday over its proposal to approve for an immediate legislative appropriation for boosting the local fees students pay at the four state-run colleges for the second time in as many years. The Board with university officials and the public may already be debating qualified students for a college education, the board delayed until today to decide whether to even keep a student fee increase as an option when it allocates money for 1985-86 operations of the schools next month. The Legislature argued board members Diane Rilly and a staunch opponent of the increase, the students have sacrificed enough. The school presidents, school board members, and chief financial officers in splitting three to one against the fee, only Stanford Clark of the University of Idaho declared in daily reject a fee hike.

But Cheryl Hymas argued that the board will lose credibility in future battles with lawmakers over spending if it simply accepts the state allocation as sufficient when it knows full well that it is not. "We lost the money" that was requested this winter, Mrs. Hymas said, because they thought they could get more. By doing just that, she claimed the Legislature will just continue ignoring its responsibility to adequately finance higher education. The decision by the board today will be whether to give notice that a fee increase, possibly as much as \$81 per semester in the basic student charge, is under consideration. It would not commit the board to raising the fee, but only leave that as one of the options available when budgets for the four schools are set in April. At that time the board would decide whether the fee will actually be raised. The fee "will be retained," it appeared Thursday, that any vote to actually raise fees would be extremely close. The legislative appropriation of \$88 million

approved earlier this month, coupled with funds from current student fees and other sources, will still leave the four schools \$1.8 million below the amount officials say is needed just to maintain current operations, resolve problems threatening the continued academic accreditation of some programs and raise severely low faculty salaries. In any case, there would be no money for other program needs at Idaho State University and the University of Idaho, Boise State University and Lewis-Clark State College. In addition, the four schools have proposed increases in other fees ranging from \$16 to \$40 a semester as well as hikes in the cost of campus housing. Athletic fees, needed to offset the loss of media revenue for sports programs and limit the state's financing for those activities, would rise \$10 at Lewis-Clark, \$15 at Idaho and \$20 at BSU. The decision on increasing fees comes after the board approved a \$75 hike in the basic student fee for last summer, boosting it to \$28 a semester.

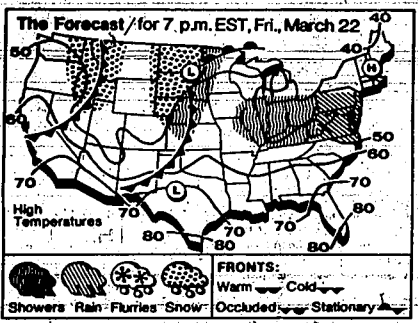

Evans signs PUC intervenor

BOISE (AP) — Starting in July, consumer groups intervening in major Public Utilities Commission cases might have some of their costs reimbursed by the utilities. Gov. John Evans on Thursday signed into law legislation granting intervenor groups up to \$25,000 if they make "material contributions" in PUC proceedings. "This will give citizens an opportunity to appear on issues of great concern," said Evans at a bill-signing ceremony. He said it would be a "most equitable process." If public interest groups have some of their expenses covered in rate cases. The legislation, sponsored by a consumer advocate group, Idaho Fair Share, goes into effect July 1.

Swan Falls protection urged

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Upper Snake River Valley water users who have expanded use or made unauthorized water uses could obtain priority over Idaho Power Company's water rights if they file for those rights before June 30. In an Idaho Falls press conference Wednesday, Jones said "those people who have an established use and a valid permit or license need not worry about taking any action under the Swan Falls settlement agreement." But farmers, for instance, who have adjusted their water-use requirements through sprinkler application may have to file for an amended water license.

Stallings, Craig split on MX

FOCATELLO (AP) — Idaho's two congressmen appear split on the question of funding for MX missiles, but both Richard Stallings and a spokesman for Larry Craig predict the House will fund at least some new missiles. The House is expected to vote next week on whether to fund the first 21 MX missiles that President Reagan has requested. The Senate has already voted to fund the missiles. "I'm voting against it," said Stallings, the 2nd District Democrat. "I campaigned against it and I think I filled out a half dozen questionnaires taking that position. I don't think it would be right to vote for it." Meanwhile, John Keenan, a legislative aide to Craig, of the 1st District, said the congressman is leaning toward funding at least some of the 100 MX missiles Reagan is requesting.

ISU pharmacy plans to wait

BOISE (AP) — The Permanent Building Fund Council says it won't approve preliminary work to improve the Idaho State University pharmacy building until the state Board of Education endorses a drive to revitalize the entire program. At a meeting here Thursday, the council, which controls state building funds, refused to start work on a new or renovated Pharmacy Building at the Pocatello campus. On the agenda was a request to advertise for architects to prepare drawings for a new pharmacy building, or major improvements at the existing one. School officials said they're trying to generate \$3.5 million in donations, and need the drawings to stimulate interest of potential donors.

Idahoans prepare for ascent

MOSCOW (AP) — Ten climbers, many of them University of Idaho students, are preparing for an ascent of Alaska's Mt. McKinley. The climb will be unique because the team is independent and will be self-guided, said Mike Beiser, leader of the expedition and director of University of Idaho Outdoor Programs. Members of the team range from 22 to 41 years of age. The team plans to depart on May 13 for Talkeetna, Alaska, then fly to the Capitan Glacier at the 7,000-foot level of Mt. McKinley. That is where the first of seven base camps will be established, Beiser said.

Evans may not sign education budget

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature's two major education budget bills passed in the final days of the 1985 session, probably will become law without the signature of Gov. John Evans. Evans told the Idaho Press Club on Thursday he cannot support the appropriations for higher education and public schools, because they are short of the amount education officials say is needed to maintain current operations. But the appropriations are so close that it appears there would be little chance of vetoing the bills, calling the Legislature back into session, and hoping for more money. "I think the Legislature did probably as good a job as it could with the problems it was facing," Evans said. "I'm disappointed in the money for education — but we came very, very close," he said. Evans urged \$306 million in state support for public schools, plus money for the career ladder program and improvement in teacher salaries.

The Legislature approved \$304 million in school support, but nothing for the other programs. The \$88-million appropriation for higher education was about \$3 million under Evans' recommendation, and the governor said the colleges and universities will have a harder time coping with the shortfall than public schools. Evans said a coalition of moderate Republicans and Democrats formed early in the session and blocked "radical" legislation that might have been expected from an extremely conservative Legislature. Evans said Stevens made a mistake when he signed out strongly in favor of closing Lewis-Clark State College. "That's not going to happen," the governor said. Evans said he remains confident state revenue will run about as expected this year, eliminating the need for a holdback or a special session. Some economists have been predicting an economic slowdown, but Evans said tax collections show no sign of it.

Race against Symms nears reality for Evans

BOISE (AP) — Gov. John Evans is inching closer to declaring he will make a bid for the U.S. Senate next year, against Republican Steve Symms. While Evans wouldn't commit himself to the race, in an appearance Thursday before the Idaho Press Club, the governor said it would take a "huge roadblock" to keep him from making the race. The Democratic governor said he's launched the preliminary steps toward making the campaign against Symms, who defeated Democrat Frank Church in a bitterly contested 1980 race. That includes opening an office, formation of an exploratory committee and commissioning political polling. Based on what the polls show, Evans said, he will weigh the issues, family and business circumstances before deciding whether to run. Evans, when advised that state Democratic Chairman Mel Morgan has been saying he expects Evans to make the Senate bid, said, "He doesn't make my final decision." But if he does run, the governor said he expects Democrats to field a "tough ticket" next year. If he's the U.S. Senate candidate, Cecil Andrus captures the governor nomination, Rep. Richard Stallings runs again and Bill Hellar makes a second bid for Congress. "There are four people who have some substantial visibility and identity across the state of Idaho," Evans said. He also said there's no shortage of candidates for lieutenant governor. "Right people want to run for lieutenant governor and the other state political offices," Evans said. "I think we can fill the entire slate of candidates." Evans, governor since early in 1977 when Andrus surrendered the job to become Interior secretary, said the timing appears to be good to be making a bid for the Senate. He said traditionally, a two-term president is at his weakest in the first election after his second victory, which means Idaho GOP candidates won't have the "coastal" boost they had in the 1980 and 1984 elections from Ronald Reagan.

Mining magnate Henry Day dies

SILVERTON (AP) — Northern Idaho mining magnate Henry L. Day died Thursday in East Spokahn Hospital at the age of 82 following a lengthy illness. Born Oct. 4, 1902, in Spokane, Day was president of his family's Day Mine Inc. for many years. The family's involvement in Silver Valley mining dates from August 1889, when Day's father, Harry L. Day, and his partner, Fred H. Harper, staked two claims that became the Hercules Mine in Burke Canyon near Wallace. That mine went out of production in the mid 1920s.

Redgrave dies at age of 77

LONDON (AP) — Actor Sir Michael Redgrave, master of his craft and patriarch of an acclaimed British acting dynasty, died Thursday the day after his 77th birthday.

Redgrave died in "The Nursing Home in Denham, just west of London. He had suffered from Parkinson's disease for 12 years and had been unable to work since 1979.

His son Corin was by his bedside, said Redgrave's agent, Anne Hutton.

The actor died four days before the Academy Awards ceremony in Hollywood, where his elder daughter, Vanessa, is nominated as best actress for her role in "The Bostonians."

Vanessa said in Los Angeles that her father put "all the troubles he felt into his work. . . I loved him very much. . . She said she would fly to London for the funeral and would miss the Academy Awards ceremony.

Redgrave, a contemporary of Sir Laurence Olivier and Sir John Gielgud, was a pillar of the British acting pantheon already deprived in the past 18 months of James Mason, Dana Frawley, Richard Burton and Sir Ralph Richardson.

Redgrave's film career began with Alfred Hitchcock's "The Lady Vanishes" in 1939 and ended 33 years later with a supporting role in "Nicholas and Alexandra."

His Shakespearean stage career began with "Love's Labor Lost" in 1936 and ended with "Shakespeare's People," a celebration of the bard that Redgrave assembled, performed in, and took on his four-month tour of the United States in 1976.

His last stage appearance was in Simon Gray's 1979 drama "Close of Play."

Redgrave's autobiography, "In My Mind's Eye," was published in October 1983. He had become too ill to write and dictated it to Corin.

"My chief memories are of his extraordinary courage in facing his long illness," said Dame Peggy Ashcroft, a life-long friend and colleague.

Richard Todd, who starred with him in one of his most famous British films, "The Dam Busters," said: "He was a very shy man, a very reserved man, but absolutely sweet once you got working with him. He was really, really charming."

Arms talks to split

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — U.S. and Soviet arms control negotiators agreed Thursday to divide into three groups next week to discuss separate categories of nuclear and space weapons.

The agreement on procedure followed harsh Soviet criticism of President Reagan's quest for a space-based defense system and his drive for congressional approval of "intercontinental" missiles.

"We have agreed that negotiating groups will begin their work on Tuesday, March 26," a U.S. spokesman said after a two-hour meeting between the full delegations, led by American Max M. Kampman and Soviet Victor F. Sarov.

The U.S. spokesman said he did not know which groups would meet on Tuesday or where they would meet.

Both sides have finalized almost on details of the talks under a confidentiality agreement.

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Two men on a motor cycle roared up beside a Soviet diplomat's car Thursday and pumped several shots through the right rear window, killing him instantly, police reported. His wife, with whom he had been shopping, and his driver were slightly injured by flying glass.

Police identified the diplomat as V. Khabitskaya, 43, a senior expert in the Soviet Embassy's Economic Affairs department. Embassy spokesman Vladimir Novikov confirmed the identification.

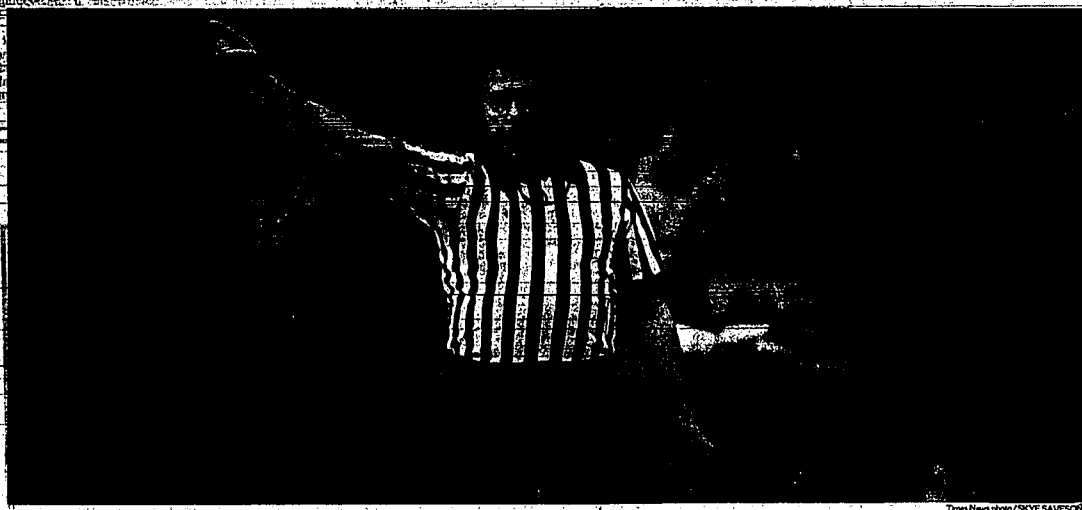

TWIN FALLS — After 34 years of work with young athletes and other students, Paul Ostyn says his retirement in June leaves only one regret.

He will "miss the kids."

Ostyn is leaving his post as Director of High School Relations at the College of Southern Idaho with the close of the current school year. He was the first to serve in that capacity when the position was created in 1972.

His entire career in education, from the time he graduated from college and was hired as the coach for Richfield High School in 1950, has involved work with students.

"Working with youngsters keeps you thinking young and I believe, as a result, I have always thought of myself as young, but I am ready to retire," says the 56-year-old CSI staff member.

His career has covered coaching duties in Shoshone, Piler and Twin Falls high schools, and administrative duties including the offices of athletic director and vice principal in Twin Falls.

He also served five years as athletic director at the University of

Idaho before becoming disillusioned with intercollegiate athletics and coming back to Twin Falls.

Ostyn said he had "better than average records with his high school athletic teams," but then he was fortunate because he had some excellent athletic talent and ability on the teams. It's not hard to organize and direct a group of "outstanding athletes."

At Twin Falls High School, his basketball squads won their way into state competition five of the six years he coached them, usually finishing in second or third place.

"We never won, because we never beat Borah. That was the team you had to beat to win the title and we just didn't do it," Ostyn says.

In 1959, when Ostyn accepted the athletic director's job at the University of Idaho, he said it was an opportunity he could not afford to pass. However, after five years, he said he

was tired of the recruiting programs and found the relationships between the boys and the coaches somewhat disillusioning.

Ostyn says he is extremely proud of CSI and believes it offers as good an education for the first two years of college as can be had anywhere in the state.

"Largely, this is because we have full-time instructors. Many of the other colleges are using graduate instructors. This is fine, except that in most cases these people are concerned basically with completing their own education rather than educating their students," Ostyn says.

As high school relations director, Ostyn contacts schools in Idaho and northern Nevada on a regular basis. His work is still with high school youth, because he sees them a year ahead of other college personnel.

"We don't call it recruiting, but basically that is what we do by offer-

ing information on CSI courses and opportunities. I also help the students find sources and answers to assist with financial and other matters," he said.

College costs are becoming an increasing problem for some students, he says, recalling that when he joined the CSI staff it was estimated a student would pay around \$1,000 a year to attend the school. Now, he says, students are quoted a figure of \$3,000.

One of Ostyn's main concerns about current trends in education "push is the de-emphasis on extracurricular activities. Be it sports or some other activity, Ostyn says, these school programs are important to the overall educational program.

"Many students who would otherwise drop out are kept in their interest in sports or other extracurricular opportunities."

"I also hate to see academic re-

quirements made too stringent. Generally, it is the student who is having a difficult time with academics who needs educational help the most. But with more stringent requirements these students become discouraged. They are forced out of school when they could be achieving something by just staying in class," Ostyn said.

He said in his own case, without sports activities, he would probably not have finished his education.

At that, he left school at 16 to enter the U.S. Marine Corps, but at 21 had completed his college training.

Ostyn said the responsibilities of a coach are many because of the influence the coach has on his team members.

"The two most important people in my life as to influence were my father and Jerry Dellinger, my high school coach," Ostyn says.

Ostyn has also seen a share of community services. He spent eight years as a member of the Twin Falls City Council and two years as mayor of the city.

"That's something I wanted to do in return for what I have gained in the communities where I have lived. Twin Falls and the other communities have been good to me," he said.

Stanley to drop plans for secession

STANLEY — The Stanley-Sawtooth Chamber of Commerce Thursday temporarily dropped its plans to secede from Custer County to join Blaine County.

The chamber dropped the effort after it was assured by Custer County Commissioner Cliff Hansen that he would try to balance county services in the Stanley-Sawtooth area with the amount of taxes the area pays.

Hansen, a summer-time resident of the Stanley area, told the chamber he prefers the region to stay in Custer County.

"If we are a part of Blaine County, we'd have the same problems as we do now," Hansen said.

He told the group of local business operators from Stanley and from recreation sites within the Sawtooth National Recreation Area in both counties that the area would be just as far from services in Blaine County as it is from those in Custer County.

Blaine County faces the same budget problems as Custer County, Hansen said, probably could not provide any greater services to the region, Hansen said.

Because he is in his first year as a commissioner, Hansen said he is still learning where the county collects, he will look into the chamber's complaints that the western region of Custer County is not getting adequate services for the money it pays.

"Those attending told Hansen they want an accounting of the funds they send to the county made by the time the 1985-86 fiscal budget is set by Oct. 1."

The chamber brought up the secession issue because it says it does not get any law enforcement, protection, road maintenance, or any other services from the county.

Law enforcement has been a major complaint of the area for several years. The residents of Stanley and the rest of the area say they get by part-time protection and often delayed emergency service from the county sheriff.

At the heart of the issue is the revenue split from the Stanley-Sawtooth region to the county that does not

Winter's lingering vestiges return snow to valley landscape

TWIN FALLS — An early spring wind and snow storm whipped through parts of Magic Valley early Thursday morning leaving some 10,000 power customers without electrical service and forcing several school closures.

Two school districts closed classrooms and sent students home because of blowing snow and another school, O'Leary Junior High School in Twin Falls, closed because of the power outage that left the building unheated and without lights or lunches.

Minidoka County Schools closed at 1 p.m. on the advice of the county highway district director when winds of up to 25 mph with large trucks to become stuck on some paved roads.

Highway officials suggested the district get the youngsters home while buses could still negotiate most of the roads.

"It may be hard to believe in Twin Falls," said a Minidoka district staff worker, "but we still have a lot of snow on the ground, especially in our outlying areas."

Hansen County closed early Thursday because of a power outage. Twin Falls Highway District officials said there were no

snow-caused problems in the district, but severe spring road break-up was causing even large trucks to become stuck on some paved roads.

Kimberly and several other schools had to do some quick work on substitute menus for Thursday's school lunches when an outage cooled ovens.

Dale Monson of Twin Falls, Idaho Power's electrical superintendent for the southern division, said the high winds caused power outages early Thursday morning that lasted up to four hours.

He said the outage affected some 10,000 customers in an area that included Hagerman, Jerome, Twin Falls, Kimberly and Hansen.

"This is about half of our total customers in this general area," he said. "I believe with the exception of a few individual cases, everyone was back in service by noon."

Monson said there were no major transformer or plant problems, but many instances of broken tree limbs falling on lines and trees that in some cases fell on power poles, breaking them and downing lines.

In other cases, he said winds simply whipped the lines together. Some of the lines were

more susceptible to the high winds because of a heavy coating of snow and ice. All available line crews and some Idaho Power employees who normally do not work on line repairs were at work throughout the morning.

Monson said power began going out at about 7 a.m. and the average outage was about an hour long but some lasted up to four hours.

The surprise spring storm that brought some light snow and high winds to most Magic Valley areas moved into southern Idaho on the heels of a warm, high pressure area that welcomed the first day of spring Wednesday.

Ex-Blaine deputy sentenced in elk case

HAILEY — Former Blaine County Sheriff Deputy Ed Tyner has been sentenced to five days in the county jail and fined \$600 for his role in the illegal killing of two elk last fall.

County Magistrate Judge Daniel Alban also ordered Tyner to pay \$1,000 in mandatory civil penalties as restitution for the killings and revoked his fishing and hunting privileges for three years.

County Prosecutor Keith Roark says the penalties imposed by Alban are appropriate, but Tyner's attorney, Mark Russell, says "the incarceration was unduly harsh under all the circumstances."

Following the charges, Tyner was dismissed by Sheriff Dennis Hyman and Russell says Tyner lost another job indirectly because of the charges brought against him. He also said Tyner has had to move out of the state to find work in law enforcement.

The jail time could hurt the employment and financial status of Tyner, who has responsibilities he is trying to meet, Russell added.

The attorney also is critical of the \$600 fine imposed by Alban. He says the penalty was harsh considering the charges were his client's first of-

fenses. He also says Tyner's record as a law enforcement officer was spotless until the two incidents last fall.

Alban says he imposed the sentence in order to deter others from committing similar offenses. Tyner's status as a sheriff deputy at the time of the crimes was not a consideration in the sentence, Alban says.

Tyner was charged with killing an elk in a controlled-hunt area of Blaine County while having only an open-hunt elk permit and with possessing an elk he illegally killed in Custer County.

Despite Russell's objections, Roark says the

Noh: Water rights, education issues still alive

TWIN FALLS — In the wake of the 1985 legislative session, Idahoans still have reason to question the quality of both their water rights and their children's educations, says Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

In an address to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club Thursday, Noh, chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee, said the Swan Falls water rights battle between the state and Idaho Power Co. appears to have been resolved by lawmakers' passage of 11 bills in the recently ended session. But other unresolved water-rights issues could still jeopardize even the most senior of water users on the Snake River Plain, he said.

"The water war isn't over; the focus has just shifted," Noh said, pinpointing the new source of water rights uncertainty at the Fort Hall Indian Reservation near Pocatello.

The Shoshone-Bannock Tribes that occupy the reservation are expected to attempt to assert an 1868 priority water right for all of the irrigable land on the reservation, Noh said. Such a water right for the reservation would rely on ground-water sources that are crucial to water users serviced by the Twin Falls Canal Co., Noh said.

"Everyone's water rights are potentially up in the air unless Noh said that the resolution of the Indian treaties. The Legislature established a mechanism to help resolve questions on Indian water rights before those questions are taken to court, Noh said.

While Noh appeared complimentary to himself and his colleagues on the way water rights issues were resolved, he was more critical of the Legislature on the way it attempted to resolve the issue of adequately funding education.

The Kimberly sheepman — whom Twin Falls banker David Mead introduced as a "broad-minded Republican" and "not a red-neck" — recounted the session's battle for education funding in a manner that reflected the sharp division between legislative moderates and conservatives on the issue.

Noh, considered a leading moderate in the Senate Republican Caucus, said the Legislature's failure to provide money for the "career-ladder" component of the state's education reform program "cast a pall of discouragement" over parents and teachers.

While he lamented the Legislature's failure to appropriate the education funds, Noh was nonetheless critical of the approved spending. "We overspent," he said, calling the budget passed by lawmakers "deficit spending."

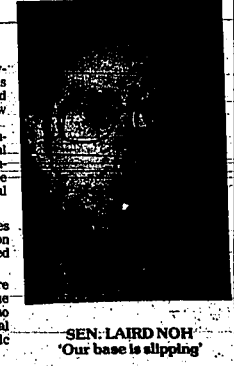
The amount of money lawmakers agreed to spend during the next fiscal year exceeds the amount of tax money they had previously agreed would accrue to the state during the year, he said.

Their decision to spend above their own revenue estimate may lead to revenue shortfalls in the coming year, he said. And it also falls several of the moderates' efforts to raise new tax money for education, he said.

"It's hard to believe Idaho is overburdened," Noh said, comparing Idaho's national ranking for per-pupil public schools expenditures — 46th in the nation in 1983 — with the state's national ranking in after-tax personal income — 11th in the nation in 1983.

He added that the revenue-raising measures which were proposed to improve education funding would not have adversely affected struggling Idaho industries.

"Our economic base is slipping. We're becoming increasingly a poorer state," he said, noting that the deficiencies in Idaho educational opportunities represent a real disincentive to new industries and economic growth in the state.

In other business:

- Marvin Schow, Minico High School industrial arts teacher, was granted permission to sell the school's craft equipment that is not being used in order to provide money for a spindle shaper.
- "I think that craft programs are going from the curriculum. There is

more emphasis now on occupational skills such as welding and woodwork- ing," says Schow, noting that the equipment would probably bring about \$2,000.

- William Woodstein Jr. Inter-mountain Gas told the board the district could save "at least \$400 a year" by combining nine meters into one meter.

He said the district is now paying a minimum on each individual meter, and by combining them, there would only be a minimum payment on one meter.

Woodstein also suggested increasing the size of the gas lines.

The board took no action, but agreed to consider the proposal.

Complaint fails to lower Burley golf fee

BURLEY—Despite a complaint from a councilman, the Burley City Council took no action on lowering fees at the Burley Municipal Golf Course, which were increased at the last meeting.

Councilman Garth Payne, who missed the previous meeting, questioned the fairness of the action. Noting the golf course 1984 budget reflected a revenue shortfall of approximately \$3,000, Payne said he also noticed the city's public swimming pool reported a \$497,000 shortfall, and the city parks also expended \$229,447 over budget during the same year.

"I do not feel good that we continue to penalize one particular department of the community without doing the same for the others," he said.

However, Councilman Truman Bradley said there was no way to make the parks pay for themselves and that part of their function is to beautify the city.

Responding to a further challenge by Payne that "the golf course beautifies the city, also," Bradley said the golf course serves people from out of the area — not just those in the city of Burley.

In other business:

- The council voted to retake bids

on a tractor-mower for the city because of a suggested change in specifications.

The council took the action after hearing Burley Recreation Director Ron Ploger tell them the accepted bid of Highland Equipment Company of Salt Lake City for \$23,955 included the unnecessary expense of both front and back rollers on the mower. He said the city had specified it only wanted rollers on the back.

- The council authorized City Clerk Bud Bringer to temporarily hire June Green of Burley, at a salary of \$5 per hour.
- Green will be hired to help the clerk's office staff to prepare voting records for the anticipated May 21 Burley Sunday beer sales referendum election, said Bringer.
- City Attorney Bill Parsons told the council APT's Project Mutual was willing to amend a contract for the installation of a new communications system to be shared by the Burley Police Department and the Cassia County Sheriff's Department in the Burley Law Enforcement

Center.

The amendment would take care of "governmental problems" concerning the shared involvement by the two agencies in the installation of the new phone systems, said Parsons.

Parsons said the amending process would make a distinct separation between the city's \$9,353 obligation in the contract and the approximately \$2,000 being paid by the county.

- Parsons said he was also concerned about the 13 percent interest rate being charged the city for financing the project and suggested the city check to see if the finance rates can be lowered.
- The council moved to accept the contract with Project Mutual with the idea they will negotiate on interest rates.
- Mayor Chuck Shaddock told the council there would be a meeting held at noon, Monday between city officials and Ed Feising of Zion First National Bank of Salt Lake City, to discuss the "refinancing of the bonds raised in 1976 for the city's water system."
- Shaddock said Feising had once before bolstered the city's finances considerably by helping them refinance the bonds three years after the water line was installed.
- "By refinancing again, we could realize another fantastic savings for the city," said Shaddock.

• Payne said he had been receiving calls from business people located on Overland Avenue in downtown Burley, who were complaining about "the pigeon problem."

- "Obviously, the birth control pills we have been feeding them don't work," said Payne, adding that perhaps a shotgun would be the next step to eradicate the pigeons plaguing the city.

Loss of buses worrying cab drivers

KETCHUM (AP)—While the financial woes of the Ketchum Area Rapid Transit bus system have meant increased profits for local taxicab drivers, some are disturbed by the prospect of the "free bus" service's demise.

"It's not doing anybody any good, really," said Bob Chenoweth, who operates five taxis in the Wood River Valley. "For the benefit of the valley, they ought to have some kind of system."

Jim King, who operates 10 taxis, agreed, contending, "I'm not trying to compete with KART."

The bus system's financial future became shaky earlier this month when the cities of Sun Valley and Ketchum temporarily shut it down after

the state Senate rejected legislation to validate the local option sales tax they had been using to finance it and other services.

The tax has been voided by a district judge on constitutional grounds and while the decision is being appealed receipts are being placed in escrow.

Local businesses have agreed to chip in \$10,000 to keep the buses running for now, but both Chenoweth and King said a permanent long-term solution is needed. For one thing, they say the taxis just are not designed to haul skiers and their unwieldy equipment.

"And it's not just an isolated problem that involves Ketchum," added King, who with Chenoweth believes all

the communities in Wood River Valley should work together for a viable public transit system.

Chenoweth suggested a nominal charge to help offset costs along with limiting bus operations to those times that the current system has been most heavily used.

"Something will have to be done," said King.

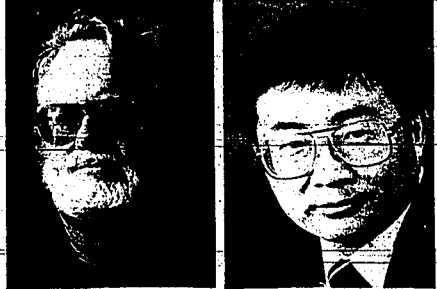

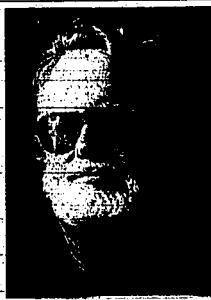

Bright, fun, densely packed, "Buckaroo Banzai" really creates its own world of repetition, caught by the intelligence of this offbeat satire written by Earl Mac Rauch ("New York, New York") and directed by W. D. Richter. Peter Weller, John Lithgow, Jeff Goldblum and Ellen Barkin lead a perfectly chosen cast into a plot that connects the dots between Orson Welles, Zelig masters, alien marionettes on Earth, Einstein and an East Jersey rock band called the Hong Kong Cavaliers. Don't ask. **G**

BABY: Secret of the Lost Legend (PG) The movie is about a family of lovable dinosaurs found in the jungles of modern Africa by a cute young couple. George Loomis (William Katt) is an aspiring sportswriter who has followed his graduate student wife Susan (Sean Young) to the wilds. At times the film is fairly bloody and vicious, as dozens of Africans are dispatched

with all the glee of young boys squashing flies. In general, the blacks in this movie are treated as objects of derision and sport by the idiotic whites. That aspect of "Baby" is thoroughly unpleasant. The rest of it is just deadily dull and formulaic.

BEVERLY HILLS COP (R) Language and violence. The plot may be formula, the intent may be narrow, but still this film sparkles with intelligence. It's definitely Eddie Murphy's movie, one that sets off his best special skills and appeal. Murphy's Axel Foley, a streetwise and munterously glib Detroit cop, comes up against a wealthy Beverly Hills art dealer (Steven Berkoff) whose gallery is stocked with trendy abstractions and who also does crate loads of cocaine dealing on the side. Director Martin Brest handles everything with a light touch, wit and charm.

MASK (PG-13) Language and adult situations. Mask might well be this season's two-hankie-chief flick in a quirky sort of way. It tells the story of Rocky Dennis, a youngster whose head has ballooned to monstrous proportions because of a congenital disorder. He is gently played by Eric Stoltz wearing layers of makeup. But the central force behind this film is Cher, who plays Rocky's mother. Rusty, a biker lady who answers to no one. Supporting Rusty and Rocky

are a group of bikers. They are perhaps a bit too sanitized to be believable, but they're a funny and lovable bunch.

A PASSAGE TO INDIA (PG) Adult situations. This is a civilized, affecting, humorous, surprising, ironic, intelligent film. Big in scope and location, it is at the same time an intense six character drama. In this stunningly fine production, director David Lean has served novelist E.M. Forster beautifully. The casting is nearly perfect as you could hope for: Alec Guinness as Prof. Godbole, Victor Bannerjee as Dr. Aziz, Judy Davis as Adela Quested, Peggy Ashcroft as Mrs. Moore, Nigel Havers as Ronny Heaslop and James Fox as Fielding.

TEACHERS (R) Some strong language, some violence; not suitable for the very young. Although marred by awkward shifts from the comical to the earnest, this film attempts a serious comment on the apathy and mediocrity that grips so many American high schools. Nick Nolte acts as a weary but earnest teacher. With Jobeth Williams, Judd Hirsch, Ralph Macchio, Allen Garfield, Lee Grant, Richard Mulligan.

THE WILD LIFE (R) Considerable nudity and drug use. A raucous, beer-drenched look at a group of teenagers trying to squeeze every last breath out of their waning summer break that's about as stirring as an acne commercial. The film, from the makers of "Fast Times at Ridgemont High," goes nowhere fast, offering few insights into the turbulent teen psyche.

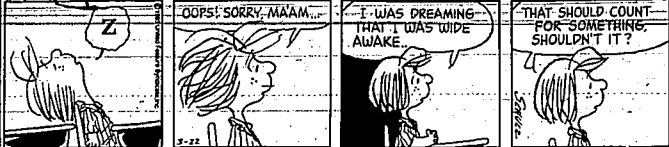

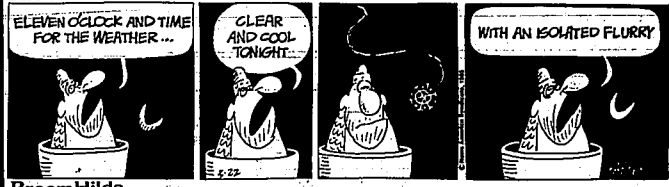

Rugs exhibit at craft museum makes you laugh

When was the last time a rug made you laugh?

For most people, the answer would be "never." But those who have seen the "For the Floor" exhibition at the American Craft Museum in New York might come up with a different reply.

The variety of funny, beautiful, serious, colorful and conceptually interesting rugs created by 46 international craftsmen in this show is likely to cause stronger-than-usual reactions to floor coverings.

After its run in New York is over this spring, the exhibition will circulate to 10 American cities for two weeks, according to Paul Smith, director of the museum. Except for its first stop in Tacoma, Wash., a definitive list of cities has not yet been completed, he added.

Aside from their visual power, another difference between handmade and mass-produced rugs which surfaced at the show is just how much trouble some people are willing to go to for art.

Take Carolyn S. Bowler, for example. Bowler, of Moscow, Idaho, made the wool felting for her black and white rug, which comes with 10 brightly colored felt balls to roll about

and play with. She uses pillows while lounging. She dyed the balls herself. She also raised and sheared the sheep that furnished the wool. The rug's black and white pattern was inspired by the view from her window of grazing sheep, she said.

Gloria Crouse of Olympia, Wash., invested three months of full-time effort to complete her rug. It is made with four different techniques. Weaving, hooking, an application of paint to some of the surface, and applique were employed to create the variety of surface textures which together make the rug a kind of landscape in fiber.

Commercial rug designs usually emphasize repetitive patterns which are easily duplicated in the manufacturing process. In handmade rugs, variety is the rule. An artist may incorporate a number of themes in a rug. The rug may be woven and hooked and have painted images. Each method from a different tradition. A design source might be a Navajo blanket, but the colors selected could be the pastels associated with an oriental kilim.

These choices are merged into a completed work through the vision of the artist. It is this originality which makes for visually exciting work as

onlookers discover for themselves the many themes brought together by the artist.

While a major goal of the exhibition is to give pleasure to those who see the work, another purpose is to correct a neglect of the floor in fiber art, recently, said Smith. He said handmade paper, wearable art and wall hangings — all different aspects of fiber art — have been illustrated in exhibition recently, while the floor has been forgotten. That's why one requirement for works in this exhibition was that they had to be primarily for use on the floor.

Some of the rugs on display could be reproduced commercially, according to Smith, who hopes that the artists will benefit through contacts with

carpet manufacturers who have been invited to see the exhibition. Consumers may also recognize the rugs as alternatives to the standard mass-produced variety. However, a number of artists at the show agreed it is often difficult for the general public to find original rugs such as these.

Retail carpet and rug outlets don't generally carry one-of-a-kind rugs. Fiber artists producing them tend to work primarily on commission. Finding customers is a hit-or-miss thing, for them.

However, one recourse for weavers capable of and interested in making rugs is local craft galleries found all over the country.

Rugs exhibit at craft museum makes you laugh

What was the last time a rug made you laugh?

For most people, the answer would be "never." But those who have seen the "For the Floor" exhibition at the American Craft Museum in New York might come up with a different reply.

The variety of funny, beautiful, serious, colorful and conceptually interesting rugs created by 46 international craftsmen in this show is likely to cause stronger-than-usual reactions to floor coverings.

After its run in New York is over this spring, the exhibition will circulate to 10 American cities for two years, according to Paul Smith, director of the museum. Except for its first stop in Tacoma, Wash., a definitive list of cities has not yet been completed, he added.

Aside from their visual power, and their difference between handmade and mass-produced rugs which surfaced at the show is just how much trouble some people are willing to go to for art.

Take Carolyn S. Bowler, for example. Bowler, of Moscow, Idaho, made the wool felting for her black and white rug, which comes with 10 brightly colored felt balls to roll about

and play with on the rug or to use as pillows while lounging. She dyed the balls herself. She also raised and sheeps that make her wool. The rug's black and white pattern was inspired by the view from her window of grazing sheep, she said.

Gloria Crouse of Olympia, Wash., invested three months of full-time effort to complete her rug. It is made with four different techniques. Weaving, hooking, an application of paint to some of the surface, and applique were employed to create the variety of surface textures which together make the rug a kind of landscape in fiber.

Commercial rug designs usually emphasize repetitive patterns which are easily duplicated in the manufacturing process. In handmade rugs, variety is the rule. An artist may incorporate a number of themes in a rug. The rug may be woven and hooked, and have painted images, each method from a different tradition. A design source might be a Navajo blanket, but the colors selected could be the pastels associated with an oriental kilim.

These choices are merged into a completed work through the vision of the artist. It is this originality which makes for visually exciting work as

onlookers discover for themselves the many themes brought together by the artist.

That's a major goal of the exhibition is to give pleasure to those who see the work, another purpose is to correct a neglect of the floor in fiber art recently, said Smith. He said handmade paper, wearable art and wall hangings — all different aspects of fiber art — have been illustrated in exhibitions recently, while the floor has been forgotten. That's why one requirement for works in this exhibition was that they had to be primarily to use on the floor.

Some of the rugs on display could be reproduced commercially, according to Smith, who hopes that the artists will benefit through contacts with

carpet manufacturers who have been invited to see the exhibition. Consumers may also recognize the rugs as alternatives to the mass-produced variety. However, a number of artists at the show agreed it is often difficult for the general public to find original rugs such as these.

Retail carpet and rug outlets don't generally carry one-of-a-kind rugs. Fiber artists producing them tend to work primarily on commission. Finding customers is a hit-or-miss thing for them.

However, one recourse for weavers capable of and interested in making rugs is local craft galleries found all over the country.

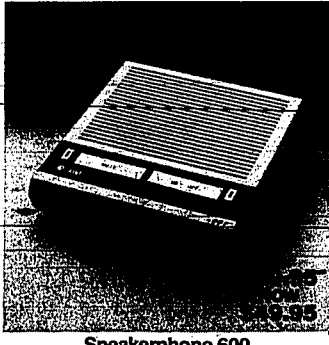

Rugs exhibit at craft museum makes you laugh

When was the last time a rug made you laugh?

For most people, the answer would be "never." But those who have seen the "For the Floor" exhibition at the American Craft Museum in New York might extricate themselves at the College of Southern Idaho. The variety of funny, beautiful, serious, colorful and conceptually interesting rugs created by 48 international craftsmen in this show is likely to cause stronger-than-usual reactions to floor coverings.

After its run in New York is over this spring, the exhibition will circulate to 10 American cities over two years, according to Paul Smith, director of the museum. Except for its first stop in Tacoma, Wash., a definitive list of cities has not yet been completed, he adds. Aside from their visual power, another difference between handmade and mass-produced rugs which surfaced at the show is just how much trouble some people are willing to go to for art.

Talk to Carolyn S. Bowler, for example. Bowler, of Moscow, Idaho, made the wool-felted fur her black and white rug, which comes with 10 brightly colored felt balls to roll about

and play with on the rug or use as pillows while lounging. She dyed the balls herself. She also raised and sheared the sheep that furnished the wool. The rug's black and white pattern was inspired by the view from her window of grazing sheep, she said.

Gloria Crouse of Olympia, Wash., invested three months of full-time effort to complete her rug. It is made with four different techniques. Weaving, hooking, an application of paint to some of the surface, and applique were employed to create the variety of surface textures which, together, make the rug a kind of landscape in fiber.

Commercial rug designs usually emphasize repetitive patterns which are easily duplicated in the manufacturing process. In handmade rugs, variety is the rule. An artist may incorporate a number of themes in a rug. The rug may be woven and hooked and have painted images, each method from a different tradition. A design source might be a Navajo blanket, but the colors selected could be the pastels associated with an oriental kilim.

These choices are merged into a completed work through the vision of the artist. It is this originality which makes for visually exciting work as

onlookers discover for themselves the many themes brought together by the artist.

While a major goal of the exhibition is to give pleasure to those who see the work, another purpose is to correct a neglect of the floor in fiber art. Recently, said Smith, He said handmade paper, wearable art and wall hangings — all different aspects of fiber art — have been illustrated in exhibitions recently, while the floor has been forgotten. That's why one requirement for works in this exhibition was that they had to be primarily for use on the floor.

Some of the rugs on display could be reproduced commercially, according to Smith, who hopes that the artists will benefit through contacts with

carpet manufacturers who have been invited to see the exhibition. Consumers may also recognize the rugs as a challenge to the standard mass-produced variety. However, a number of artists at the show agreed it is often difficult for the general public to find original rugs such as these.

Retail carpet and rug outlets don't generally carry one-of-a-kind rugs. Fiber artists producing them tend to work primarily on commission. Finishing customers is a hit-or-miss thing for them.

However, one recourse for weavers capable of and interested in making rugs is local craft galleries found all over the country.

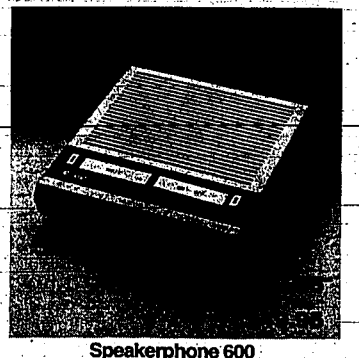

Indians receive blame for fishing industry's financial woes

SALMON (AP) — Residents of Lemhi and Claster counties, long in the throes of economic decline, are angry about setbacks in the sport fishing industry, and some are blaming Indians for the problem.

The Salmon River steelhead run the hardest, because those fish were migrating upriver at the time.

Most of those fish were produced in Idaho hatcheries and streams, Pollard said.

But fishing by several Northwest Indian tribes in the Columbia River, last summer, resulted in 10,000 fewer steelhead returning to Idaho from the Pacific Ocean than had been expected, the Idaho Fish and Game Department said.

Backed by court decisions and treaty rights, Indian commercial fishermen using gill nets last summer harvested 71,000 steelhead for Idaho, Oregon and Washington, compared with an average 15,000 annually in previous years, said Rick Rolland, anonymous fisheries coordinator for the Fish and Game Department.

"They (Indians) finally licked off the Idaho steelhead," said Chuck Rooks, Challis, an attorney who concedes that there were oblique pressures two years ago that prompted the board to come up with the long-range plan, Gibb and the schools of the other three state-run presidents said Thursday that circumstances had significantly changed since then, requiring at least a postponement of the cuts if not abandonment of the plan itself.

The tribes have asked to meet with Fish and Game officials and want to reach an agreement on what caused the problem, said Doug Dompter, commission biologist.

But after the Indian fishing, the Fish and Game Department estimates that the Salmon River dropped to 17,000 fish, down from 50,000 Indians caught, fewer steelhead returning to the Snake and Clearwater rivers; so Idaho's total run, at 90,000, is slightly ahead of last year, Pollard said.
