## Rupert herbicide spill puts dozen in hospital

20 evacuated from trailer park, firms

RUPERT — Twelve people were hospitalized, and one placed in intensive care, after a truck spilled the toxic herbicide-dinitrophenol at a gas station, a roadside cafe, and down the state highway in Rupert Thursday morning.

About 20 people were evacuated from a trailer park and from Parky's Drive-In, Lockwood Corp., and other businesses in the vicinity of the spill, police said.

Donald R. Frasher, 44, of Pea Ridge, Ark., the truck's driver, was in satisfactory condition at Mindoka Memorial Hospital Thursday afternoon where he was treated and kept under observation. He came into contact with the dinitrophenol that had spilled from a broken container in his truck.

His wife, Helen, 41, and son, Woodland, 18, were also hospitalized along with seven police and fire officers, an ambulance attendant and Rosemary Hill, operator of the gas station where Frasher cleaned out his truck, police said.

"There is no health risk, where the spill was cleaned up," said Magic Valley chemical spill team member Ken McDonald. Thursday evening after inspecting the sites at the Husky gas station and truck wash in Rupert and at the Wayside Cafe south of Rupert, near Interstate 84.

The truck was moved from the parking lot of the Wayside Cafe to the fenced yard of the J. Simplot Co. in Rupert to limit the exposure of Rupert residents to any fumes from the truck.

Idaho Health and Welfare Department Division of Environment official Pat Stoll said his testing equipment found no evidence of the chemical in the air in Rupert, but that the fumes inside the trailer were at a dangerous level.

Stoll said the truck and spill sites will have to be "cleaned by Environmental Emergency Services of Portland, Ore., who have been hired by American Farmlands, which owns the truck, to clean up the two sites and the trailer.

Stoll said it appeared that about 15 gallons from a 30 gallon drum had spilled in the truck. Stoll says Frasher apparently washed the chemical onto the ground at the truck wash and then drove away.

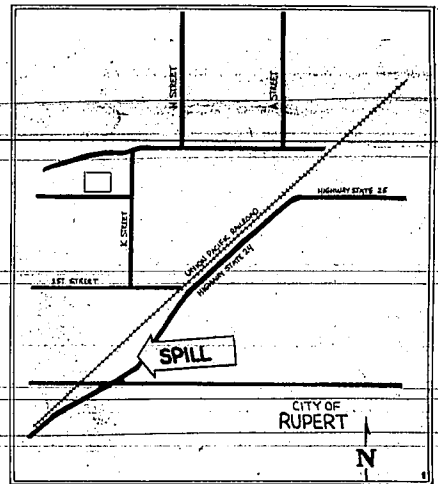
Some of the chemical apparently ran out the drain in the floor of the trailer and onto the highway as Frasher drove to the Wayside Cafe from the truck wash, Stoll said.

Dinitrophenol can be highly toxic if inhaled or ingested, Stoll said. He said it appeared only one of the 116 30-

gallon containers in the trailer had been punctured. Police said there were also some smaller five gallon drums of the chemical in the trailer. Stoll said the chemical might kill the bacteria in the Rupert sewage treatment plant if it runs into the sewer from the truck wash drain in high enough concentrations. He said the bacteria in the sewer system would most likely digest and break down the spilled chemical.

Stoll said the truck stop drain sump

## Officials uncertain of exact form of chemical

RUPERT — The chemical spilled in Rupert was either a phenol form of dinitro or 2,4-dinitrophenol, a chemical about 100 times more toxic, depending on which official was doing the talking.

Joyce Rosencrantz, who headed the efforts by the Magic Valley Contamination Team, said the yellow liquid was a chemical commonly called Dinitro, used to control broad leaf weeds and grasses. In this area farmers commonly use it to kill potato vines.

"The yellow color makes it look worse than it is," says Dave Bromers of the contamination team. He accidentally got some of the chemical on his hand while removing his gloves but is not concerned, he says.

But Ron Moczynska, of the Environmental Protection Administration in Boise, said the chemical was 2,4-dinitrophenol. That chemical is about 100 times more toxic than the dinitro used for killing potato vines, according to the Farm Chemical Handbook. It is used as a dormant spray for mites and aphids, the handbook says.

Frank York, head of the motor carrier safety division of the U.S. Department of Transportation in Boise, says he classified the poison as Class B. The only poisons worse are usually in the form of compressed gas, he says.

Class B poisons have a lethal dosage rating lower than 50, he says. What was spilled probably was one of the worst Class B poisons with a rating of between 8 and 15, he says. The Division of Environment of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare will take samples of the chemical today to

determine where the toxicity falls in that range, he says.

He believes the chemical is extremely toxic because it is shipped in a far more concentrated form than farmers use on their fields, he says.

Denny Nelbaur, with the Idaho State Poison Control Center, said symptoms resulting from breathing fumes from or touching what he calls dinitrophenol 3 are headaches, nausea, restlessness and general weakness. It can cause additional or accelerated heart beats and in severe cases can attack the liver and cause kidney failure.

"The poison index indicates that symptoms can strike 12 to 72 hours after contamination, he says. Marie Washburne, safety officer for the trucking company transporting the material, refused to say what sort of pesticide the truck was carrying.

## Divided rights panel rejects comparable worth concept

WASHINGTON — A bitterly divided Civil Rights Commission voted Thursday to reject the concept of comparable worth, which calls for equal pay for jobs that are different in type but similar in value.

In its 5-2 vote, the commission called on the Department of Justice to "resist comparable worth doctrine" whenever it arises in court, and the panel urged Congress, the courts and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission to leave the comparable worth issue to "market forces," such as job qualifications.

John V. Wilson, a Department of Justice

spokesman, reaffirmed the department's opposition to comparable worth and said that any intervention "would depend on the case."

The commission's recommendation, which is advisory only and does not carry the force of law, came after 2 1/2 hours of contentious debate. But, even before the vote, the panel had distributed a news release and women and labor unions had launched a barrage of criticism in anticipation of the decision.

In a sharply worded statement, Judy Goldsmith, president of the National Organization for Women, called the action "an abomination." She charged that the report was "biased, absurdly one-sided,"

and that the commission "has profoundly and thoroughly betrayed the public trust it once commanded."

During the commission's debate, Chairman Clarence M. Pendleton Jr., who in November called comparable worth "the loneliest idea since 'Looney Tunes' came on the screen," described comparable worth as "a disingenuous attempt to restructure our free enterprise system into a state-controlled economy under the false guise of fairness."

But Mary Frances Berry and Blandina Cardenas Ramirez, the two commissioners who usually vote against the conservative majority, halted the concept in a joint statement as "an important tool in the

arsenal for attacking employment discrimination." Both women voted against the report, and Francis S. Guess abstained because he might be hearing cases involving the issue as commissioner of the Tennessee Department of Labor.

The eight-member commission has a conservative majority that has repeatedly taken positions on civil rights that are contrary to the stances of most traditional civil rights activists. When the panel decided last year to study the comparable worth issue, activists predicted the outcome and, since then, many have even called for dissolution of the commission, charging that it has become nothing more than a multipiece for the Reagan administration.

The scathing reaction by activists to the commission's report was a significant demonstration of the passion surrounding the issue of comparable worth.

Proponents of comparable worth argue that women historically have been relegated to undervalued jobs, such as nurses, clerical workers and secretaries. They say this situation has resulted in an unfair wage gap, meaning that women, overall, earn about 60 cents for every dollar earned by men. Minority women fare even worse, activists say.

Under the comparable worth concept, a female secretary could be paid the same as, say, a truck driver, if their jobs were deemed comparable in value.

## Shultz advises U.S. trade partners to seek sustained economic growth

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz, continuing the administration's low-key response to trade tensions with Japan, warned on Thursday against protectionism and said all U.S. trading partners should work toward sustained — world economic growth.

"We — and other countries — share a responsibility to make some hard political decisions," the secretary of state said in a speech at Princeton University, his alma mater. He called

for reducing global imbalances in trade, investment and currencies.

Shultz, an economist, gave an address that was partly a basic economics lesson and partly a preview of the position President Reagan likely will take next month at the seven-nation annual economic summit in Bonn, West Germany.

"The secretary of state said a program of international action to protect the current recovery and sustain growth should include:

- Reduction of the U.S. budget deficit.
- Stimulation of Western Europe's

stagnant economy through "policies that reduce the obstacles to change and innovation, that attract capital and that stimulate domestic investment."

Action by Japan to reduce the impact of its high savings rate, "including liberalized capital markets that internationalize the yen and measures to stimulate investment in Japan by Japanese and foreigners alike."

• Moves by developing nations to stabilize their economies, expand their trade and stimulate growth.

## Spending by House candidates declines

WASHINGTON — Spending for House election campaigns was smaller in 1984 than in 1982 — the first time in memory such a decline has occurred.

In addition, fund raising by congressional candidates last year slumped dramatically, barely outpacing inflation.

The seeming leveling-off comes after a string of elections in which House campaign receipts jumped enormously, by as much as 48 per-

cent. Experts Thursday offered a number of explanations for the drop — such as more incumbents seeking re-election and fewer closely contested races than in 1982 — but some contended that the change was too sharp to understand without closer study.

Figures compiled by Common Cause, the self-styled citizens' lobby, showed that spending by the 302 House candidates on the November ballot dropped to \$165 million, a decrease of 5.4 percent from the \$174.5 million spent on 1982 House

**Error let fugitive go free**  
SALMON (AP) — An error on a routine license check by the Bonner County assessor's office in September may have delayed the arrest of alleged militant neo-Nazi leader Bruce Carroll Pierce by six months, Lemhi County Sheriff William Baker says.  
Baker said his department ran a motor home license check last September on a Salmon resident, but the name was misspelled. The former Tri, Mont., and Metaline Falls, Wash., man used the name William Rogers during his brief stay in the central Idaho mountain town last summer.  
The check was initiated when Pierce, reputed leader of a white-supremacist group known as The Order, tried to sell a motor home to another Salmon resident. The man, whose name Baker refused to release, asked the sheriff's department to run a check on the vehicle to see if it had been stolen.  
The license number was checked through Bonner County, where it had been issued, Baker said. However, the Bonner County Assessor's Office incorrectly added the B county prefix to the actual license number in running the check, he said.

**Hand grenade wounds bishop**  
MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Monsignor Salvador Schiaffer, a Wisconsin-born bishop, was slightly wounded Thursday when gunmen threw a hand grenade at his jeep on a road in northeastern Nicaragua.  
The Sandinista government said the attackers were Nicaraguan rebels, but Schiaffer said he was not sure who they were. He said they apologized after he shouted "All men are created equal" and they realized he was a Roman Catholic bishop.  
Schiaffer, 65, is a native of Wisconsin but acquired Nicaraguan citizenship and has been the bishop of the Atlantic port city of Bluefields for years.

**Reagan to attend German rite**  
SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — After ruling out a visit to a World War II concentration camp, President Reagan has decided to attend a wreath-laying ceremony at a West German cemetery where Nazi soldiers were buried after the Battle of the Bulge, it was announced Thursday.  
Explaining the decision, White House spokesman Larry Speakes said, "The rationale is that... he is there in a spirit of reconciliation, in a spirit of 40 years of peace, in a spirit of economic and military compatibility of the European community together with its specific allies."  
American Jewish organizations, however, were sharply critical of the announced visit.  
Reagan will be in Europe April 30-May 10 for the seven-nation economic summit in Bonn, a state visit to West Germany, and trips to Spain, France and Portugal.

**Illinois health chief fired**  
CHICAGO (AP) — The Illinois public health director was fired Thursday for vacationing in Mexico during a salmonella outbreak linked to three deaths and the illness of almost 3,000 people.  
Gov. Jim Thompson said he dismissed Thomas Kirkpatrick, who "saw fit to leave his responsibilities as director of the Department of Public Health at a time when he should have been at his desk."

**Shuttle countdown proceeds**  
CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Technicians plugged a leak in a drug-making machine aboard Discovery, saving a crew member from being left behind when the shuttle lifts off on its much-delayed voyage today with Sen. Jake Garn as a passenger.  
Discovery was scheduled for launch at 6:04 a.m. MST, whether the machine was working or not. A recheck in the pre-launch hours showed the device was still leaking slightly — five drops every 15 minutes — but officials said that was within specifications.

**Plenary arms session called**  
GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — U.S. and Soviet negotiators on Thursday scheduled their first plenary session since arms talks between the superpowers broke into working groups on March 21.  
The announcement came after the third session of the subgroup on medium-range missiles, which lasted three hours and 20 minutes. Teams headed by Maynard W. Gilman and Alexei A. Obukhov met at the Soviet mission.  
The plenary session will be held today at the Soviet mission, the statement said.

**Israelis pull out of village**  
NABATIYEH, Lebanon (AP) — The Israeli army withdrew Thursday from this market town and the hostile Shiite Moslem villages around it, and hundreds of Lebanese streamed into the streets to celebrate an end to nearly three years of Israeli occupation.  
In the pullback, Israel relinquished control over about 115 square miles of territory and between 60,000 and 70,000 people, the military command in Tel Aviv said.

**Brazil's Neves in surgery**  
SAO PAULO, Brazil (AP) — President-elect Tancredino Neves suffered a worsening abdominal infection Thursday night and underwent his seventh operation in less than a month, government spokesmen said.  
Antonio Brito said the 75-year-old Neves experienced "sharp changes in breathing, temperature and pulse," making the new surgery necessary. Brito said the abdominal surgery was in progress while the announcement was made.

# Rain spawns Texas flooding

Heavy rains sent floodwaters coursing through nearly 400 southeastern Texas homes Thursday and hundreds of people were evacuated, Red Cross officials said.  
Showers and scattered thunderstorms raged across the lower Mississippi Valley, while rain showers were scattered along the north Atlantic Coast, western New York and northern New England.  
Floodwaters poured into about 300 homes in Corpus Christi, while 75 to 80 homes were deluged in Odem, said Art Roberts, disaster chairman

for the Coastal Bend Red Cross.  
Red Cross officials said hundreds of people were evacuated in the area near the Gulf of Mexico.  
Sinton had 9.17 inches of rain from 8 a.m. Wednesday to the same time Thursday, and Odem had 5.55 inches of rain during the same period, said John Leathers, a National Weather Service meteorologist.  
Up to 5 feet of water was standing on some Sinton roads, said Mayor Rosalie Brown.  
Fratry fog occurred from the Great Lakes to the mid-Mississippi Valley, and was blamed for dozens of traffic accidents that caused three deaths in

the Kansas City, Mo., area.  
Warm air pushed north across the Plains, with early afternoon temperatures in the mid-80s as far north as central Nebraska, and near 70 in eastern Montana.  
In Sioux Falls, S.D., a 17-year-old record was broken by three degrees when the temperature reached 88 degrees. In Rapid City, S.D., a reading of 85 degrees eclipsed a 1963 mark. It reached 90 degrees in Winter, S.D.  
A few showers and thunderstorms occurred over the northern Rockies, while rain was reported over western Washington.

had been secured by the spill team to limit any further impact on the sewer.

Clark says he asked Frasher what the chemical was and he called Fire Chief Thayne Taylor, who told him to stop the vehicle because the chemical is poisonous.

Neal said there were more than two violations of the law in the incident. He says there should not have been three occupants in the cab of the truck, the truck should not have been moved after the spill was discovered, and the truck's engine may have been inoperatively filled out and placards on the truck were inaccurate. The trailer's stowage and rear curved diamond "poison" placards, Thursday afternoon, the spill at the truck wash was covered with sand and washed with a neutralizing Clorox solution by Rupert firefighters

and members of the Magic Valley Spill team.  
Those admitted to Mindoka Memorial Hospital in Rupert complained of headaches, nausea and some chest pains, said Dr. Bruce Campbell, a staff doctor at the hospital who treated most of the people admitted after the chemical spill.  
Campbell said he treated all but two of the people who asked for their own private physicians.  
"There were no other significant problems," Campbell said about those exposed to the chemical.  
The dozen people were reported in stable condition and were kept in the hospital for observation. Health officials say other symptoms related to the exposure to the chemical may surface. These symptoms include more breathing problems, high fever and irregular heart beat. None of these symptoms, however, have been noted in the people who were admitted.  
Campbell added that those people who had contact with the chemical in addition to inhaling the fumes did not show signs of injuries on their skin.  
Six of the police and fire officers had been released by 9 p.m. Thursday, but hospital officials would not release their names.

Neal says no charges have been brought yet, but that the Department of Transportation and Mindoka County prosecutor's office will decide today.  
Clark says he asked Frasher what the chemical was and he called Fire Chief Thayne Taylor, who told him to stop the vehicle because the chemical is poisonous.  
Idaho State Police officer Kevin Winn says Frasher had the dried yellow chemical on his face, hands, and boots when apprehended by Winn in the Wayside Cafe, about 3 1/2 miles south of the truck wash. Winn says Helen Frasher was eating with Frasher and Woodland Frasher was found sleeping in the truck.  
Idaho State Police officer Dave Neal says the police cordoned off the truck and a flat-bed truck next to it, cordoned off the truck stop where Frasher cleaned out his truck, and called the Environmental Protection

Open-seat contests usually are more expensive, the study noted; in 1984 they cost "on average, 70 percent more than contests involving an incumbent."  
Another factor, the group said, was the larger number of House candidates without opposition on the November ballot — 64 compared with 46 in 1982.  
Finally, it said, there were fewer "marginal" or closely contested races, where the victor won 55 percent or less of the vote. Common Cause said there were 57 of these traditionally expensive campaigns in 1984, compared with 82 in 1982.

Action by all nations to support freer international trade and preparations for a new international trade round.  
Shultz warned against turning to protectionism in the face of growing trade tensions, especially moves in Congress and elsewhere to force Japan to shrink its trade surplus.  
"Protectionism is not the remedy to an illness," Shultz said. "It is, itself an illness. . . . Protectionism keeps prices up, reduces living standards and stifles growth."  
The secretary of state said, "We cannot have a healthy trade deficit, only through a combination of, first, a stronger worldwide recovery, and second, a strengthening of our currencies in relation to the dollar. . . . Even with movement on these fronts, the effects on the trade deficit will be significant."  
Shultz also stressed the links among capital flows between nations, an unusually strong dollar compared to other currencies, the largest U.S. trade deficit in history and large U.S. budget deficits.  
"These imbalances are interrelated, and they must be corrected if we are to maintain the momentum of our economic success," Shultz said.

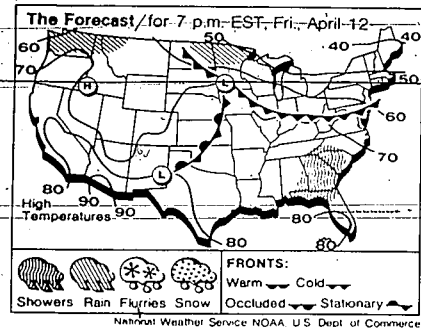

# Soviets give homage to FDR

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union is marking today's 40th anniversary of the death of Franklin D. Roosevelt with unusual tributes that evoke nostalgia for the years of Soviet-American alliance.

The tributes also are critical of current American policy.

Tass, the official news agency, issued two long stories Thursday about Roosevelt, who died April 12, 1945 of a cerebral hemorrhage while at a resort at Warm Springs, Ga.

One was by Valentin Berezikov, a leading political analyst who was Josef Stalin's interpreter in talks with Roosevelt.

Both stories praised FDR as a "statesman of world caliber" and "a convinced champion of cooperation with the Soviet Union." They put Roosevelt into the context of superpower politics 40 years later by contrasting cooperation during his administration with the state of U.S.-Soviet relations today.

The Soviets have long included Roosevelt in the group of foreign statesmen deserving of praise and prominence in the Soviet buildup to the 40th anniversary of victory in World

U.S. presidents should treat the Soviet Union.

He has been given special prominence in the Soviet buildup to the 40th anniversary of victory in World

War II. Roosevelt has been praised in a TV series on the war and also in a new film called "Victory."

The Tass coverage of the anniversary of his death was unusual because such tributes normally are reserved for figures from Soviet and Russian history.

Noting that Roosevelt died less than a month before the end of the war, Berezikov said his "death was an irreparable loss to the peace settlement. Many people believe that if he had lived longer, the military situation in Europe would have shaped up differently."

Berezikov added: "There is every reason to believe that the possibility of accords between the U.S.S.R. and the U.S.A. at the time was directly linked to the position of principle of Roosevelt."

In the other article, news analyst Igor Orlov said Roosevelt was "a statesman of world caliber who is remembered in American and world history as a man who demonstrated the great possibilities of a policy of realism based on world social, economic and political realities."

### For the next heart, don't pick tax evader

The strides in medical science being what they are, we can soon expect artificial heart operations to fade from the news. They will become ordinary, usual events. No doubt in a few years, you'll be able to pick one off the shelf like a Radio Shack computer and plug it in.

But before we all get ho-hum about this, we'd like to raise a small voice in protest to the case in Sweden this week in which a well-known tax evasion-defendant, known as "Mr. X" in local newspapers, was chosen as the latest recipient.

Not that we are prejudging patient Lief Stenberg's need for a new ticker. Knowing what Swedish tax bills are like — they take a hefty percent from everyone's income — maybe we should have expected more need for heart transplants in that country.

Still, what we're witnessing is the first trial balloon in what will probably be a new twist — the artificial hearts will go to those who can afford them, regardless of whether the individual is a contributing member of society — or not — Tax evader? Step right up, Robber? This way please.

Not that we think every candidate for an artificial heart ought to pass a Moral Majority test.

If we applied Jerry Falwell's standard for entering Heaven, there wouldn't be many who could qualify.

Despite that, we still find it a bit unseemly for tax evaders and similar folks to be considered for new tickers.

From our view, it would be much more equitable to pick a hard-pressed taxpayer from the millions of eligible candidates. That would surely be more representative of us all.

And there's a side benefit: This Swedish fellow may live another day to evade paying taxes, but a taxpayer recipient would, of course, live to ante up again. Now isn't the world a just place?

### They're off, running in latest PR race

BOSTON — My word, but didn't they sound put out about the whole thing.

Downright grumpy. You could hear a collective "harumph" coming from the Reagan boys, as if they had been personally offended by the Gorbachev peace offensive.

No sooner had the new Soviet leader publicly agreed to a summit and announced a unilateral freeze on deploying middle-range missiles in Europe than a very few spokesmen narrowed his eyes and uttered dark suspicions about the meaning of the whole thing.

By the morning after, National Security Advisor Robert McFarlane had called the Soviet message a "guise, a snare, a delusion." Finally, Donald Regan accused the Soviets of trying "to divide the Western allies" and — the nerve of them — trying to "gain a propaganda coup."

Someone who only heard the Reaganite response would have assumed that the Soviets had just announced a new round in the arms race or eternal hostility toward the West.

Actually, Gorbachev had said, "Confrontation is not an inborn defect of our relations. It is rather an anomaly." This wasn't exactly a cue to let the doves of peace fly, but neither was it anything to shout down quickly.

The administration honchos practically banged their fists on the table. They tried to throw out any good vibrations. It was as if this were still a campaign year and the opponent had scored a few surprise points in the debates.

And maybe that's what's going on. Suddenly the President's men are faced with a serious contender for the title of world leader. If there is one thing that sets the White House thermostat on burn

It's finding a Great Communicator in the Kremlin. After all, our guy is supposed to be tops at this sort of thing, but their guy came out with a peace message on Easter Sunday. Our guy was on vacation and their guy was in the headlines. Never mind the missile gap, this was serious stuff: the PR gap. Man the damage controls.

Gorbachev's offer to freeze missiles was indeed a propaganda move, not a strategic sacrifice. It didn't really take the President's men to tell that. The Soviet version of the Oxford-English Dictionary defines propaganda as "information" rather than, say, disinformation. But it seems a bit nervy of this administration to yell foul at propaganda. The biggest peace initiative of the Reagan Years was to rename the MX missile "The Peacekeeper."

What happened — where the tanker passes — was that Gorbachev made a great opening move, bound to win points in the European public-opinion polls. He came out sounding flexible and asking the right questions. . . . Is it not time for those who shape the policy of states to stop, think and prevent the adoption of decisions that would push the world to a nuclear catastrophe? It wasn't a brilliant line, but it would make a good 30-second

bite for an international commercial set against jets of what and smiling young Russians waving red stars of peace.

By comparison, our government sounded suspicious, testy and negative. Gloom and doom. It sounded like the Democrats in the last campaign.

Granted the White House isn't used to second spot in the ratings. It certainly isn't used to playing follow-the-Soviet leader. But if the Reagan boys are unhappy now, imagine how a series of these headlines — Soviets Propose . . . USA Dismisses — will look? It reeks of a worldwide role reversal with American leaders hunkered down, rigid and pessimistic in the Kremlin on the Potomac.

Still, spring is in the air, and I do find some hope in this new phase of international relations. The President is no slouch in the image biz. Nor is he the sort of guy who likes to accentuate the negative. I expect the old fudging instinct will rise again in Dutch Reagan. He'll want to get the upper hand on the upbeat again and we may yet be off — and running in a PR race instead of an arms race.

If the Soviets pledge to freeze weapons they don't need, we can top them with a pledge to freeze weapons we don't need, and once we've bargained away everything redundant, we might even get down to serious stuff. An international PR race would at least be based on the notion that leaders know what the public wants: to survive.

The President is now contending for the title of Peacemaker against a real com. Reagan's men should stop pouting and start planning a comeback.

### Trade restrictions hurt consumer most

One good question for Congress to ask itself before declaring a trade war on Japan is, "Who will get hurt?"

Many senators apparently believe that the United States can inflict punishment on the Japanese by restricting imports on their manufactured products. Yet experience suggests otherwise. We have restricted imports of Japanese automobiles under the guise of "voluntary export restraints" since 1981.

But who was hurt? Certainly not the Japanese. Thanks to the law of supply and demand, Japan's leading auto manufacturers found themselves in the enviable position of making more money by selling fewer cars. The real victim was the American consumer, who wound up paying \$15.7 billion in higher car prices. Some American automobile jobs were saved, of course, but, according to the International Trade Commission, the price was more than \$50,000 per job.

Does Congress want to punish Japan again the same way? The current favorite among trade-war advocates is the proposed Super Trade Bill. Would that hurt the Japanese? Perhaps. But an import surcharge is just a sales tax by another name, and it would surely hurt U.S. consumers a lot more. Does anyone believe that if a surcharge is imposed on imports, domestic manufacturers will raise their own prices to match? Aside from the cost to the consumer, there is little doubt that other countries would retaliate to the great detriment of American exporters and the international trade system.

What else is in our trade arsenal? Some ad-

vocate restricting the inflow of Japanese capital. But the United States is becoming the largest debtor nation in the world, and we need money and lots of it from Japan and elsewhere to finance our budget deficits. Besides, direct Japanese investment in U.S. plants is strengthening our industrial base and providing new jobs.

Another good question is whether a trade war doesn't risk much more than trade. For the Japanese, trade and security are closely linked. Over the last few years, Japan has poured billions of dollars into the United States not only for protection against military threats but also for assurances of access to food, supplies and other vital resources. Continuation of a strong U.S.-Japan relationship is the policy that the Japanese strongly prefer, but it is no longer their only option. With its immense industrial, technological and financial resources, Japan is in a position to negotiate other options if necessary. If it loses its faith in America's goodwill, its leaders will have no choice but to consider those options. That would not be in either Japan's or America's interest.

Despite frequent claims of Japan's "free ride" in defense, the forward basing of U.S. forces in Japan has enormous strategic advantages for our own safety and for that of the entire Pacific region. In the event of a conflict, American and Japanese forces are ideally situated to bottle up

the Soviet Pacific fleet behind a small number of narrow straits. The air bases, home ports and intelligence facilities that Japan provides to the United States play an invaluable role in keeping the peace.

Moreover, Japan pays us \$1 billion annually toward the cost of maintaining about 60,000 members of U.S. forces there. Redevelopment of those forces could involve far greater net costs. If we could find a sensible place to put them, placing our strategic relationship at risk through a trade war is a folly that we might long regret.

A third question is whether there is any cause for a trade war. We have a serious trade deficit with Japan, but we are running large deficits with all our major trading partners. Does Japan really "happ" American goods out of its market? Even in a bad year, such as 1981, the Japanese, on a per-capita basis, bought from us about 80 percent as much as we bought from them.

If we were willing to sell the Alaskan oil that the Japanese government has asked for, the total deficit could be cut by as much as half. In services (such as banking, insurance and computer software), where we enjoy greater comparative advantage, we continue to run a healthy bilateral surplus. If we bring our high-flying dollar under control through greater fiscal restraint, we could greatly increase the competitiveness of our exports in Japan and the world whole.

### Chile's worker repression leads writer into self-censorship

Last week I visited the campus of Colorado State University at Fort Collins to hear Chilean novelist and former diplomat Jorge Edwards speak.

Edwards was asked to discuss the literature of Chilean repression and to speak about how government pressure over the presidency of General Augusto Pinochet Ugarte has changed his country's literature — into a literature of suppression, of censorship.

According to Edwards, secret police no longer remove books from library shelves, but they have made reading authors. The Pinochet government is too sensitive to Chile's history of literary freedom to such brutish methods, too sensitive to international judgment to overtly censor its authors. Acts against writers critical of the government are covered — writers lose their jobs for vague reasons; they threaten to be made and eventually, many are forced to leave their country.

Covert repression has altered the nature of

Chile's literature. Significantly, it has also altered the nature of a writer's relationship to the process of writing. This repression has taught the writer self-censorship — the most ubiquitous, insidious form of suppression.

Allegory is a method of camouflage for political commentary under a repressive government. Edwards gave the example of a recent Chilean novel titled "Country House," by Jose Donoso. The novel, on the surface, simply tells the story of a wealthy family of landowners living on a vast country estate who decide to go on a picnic and leave the children at home. The children without parental

supervision begin to take over the house and at an allegorical level, begin to take political power.

They throw off old rules and out of the chaos begin to establish their own order, a freer order. Certainly, a few windows get broken, a few cars are hit, but the underlying order has a kind of innocence and gaiety which the old regime did not. When the parents return, they severely punish the children. The reader may gradually realize that this country house and the adults who inhabit it represent the political power of landowners and military men which has been overthrown by the people and a new order represents former President Allende's government.

The political criticism is indirect. Those who want to see below the allegory, or behind the mask, do so; those who choose not to see the other realities, look them out. Yet there is something more subtle occurring. For as Jorge Edwards looked out into the room full of

people, he seemed wary. Despite his urbane, witty manner he seemed careful just how he phrased his comments. As eloquent as his lecture was, caution turned his tongue — self-censorship had insinuated itself into the classroom in a Colorado college; in America, self-censorship is a murderer. Those who seek to ban literary, political, or artistic works, unconsciously understand that.

When a writer sits down to confront himself and his craft, he must feel the freedom to express anything — no matter how disturbing, how terrifying to the writer, or to the society in which he lives. Literature demands the freedom of inner confrontation. Art demands it. When the artist avoids such confrontation, he avoids uncomfortable truths, uncomfortable desires which may enlighten us to the human condition; he eventually avoids art and merely declares and decorates sentimentality.

Writers must have the right of privacy. In

order to feel free enough to explore the psyche: it is essential to honest writing. When a writer knows that someone he loves, or who has power over him, will frown or chastise him for his written thoughts, then that writer must turn away from those explorations. No one has the right to limit a writer's inner landscape — not a spouse, not children and certainly not society. Writers who do not demand such privacy will never serve literature, for they will never truly face themselves.

Before the mask, before allegory, can work in literature, there must be honesty, there must be the facing of disquieting truths. And where there is continuous suppression, either by family, or by social and political agents, there is eventually a loss of literature; for there is eventually an erosion of courage in men and women.

## Conviction upheld after rape recanted

MARKHAM, Ill. (AP) — A judge on Thursday upheld the conviction of a man who already has served six years of a lengthy prison sentence for a rape his accuser now says never happened.

Cook County Circuit Judge Richard Samuels decided not to grant freedom to Gary Dotson, who was convicted of raping Cathleen Crowell Webb in 1977.

Dotson, 28, who has been out of prison on bond for the past week, slammed his hand on the table as Samuels began reading his decision and then sat staring at the judge.

"He's innocent! . . . He's innocent! I told the truth!" Mrs. Webb screamed in the hall after the ruling, clutching her husband's arm.

Dotson's mother, Barbara, exclaimed, "What happened?" and then clutched another relative and waited in the front row of the courtroom.

"Why did they do it?" Mrs. Dotson said as she was led to her car.

Dotson was taken to the Cook County jail, where he was to be picked up by state corrections officials and returned to prison. John McLeary, Mrs. Webb's attorney, ushered the Webbs to his waiting car.

Warren Lupel, Dotson's attorney, said Dotson's last words to him were: "Please find John McLeary and Cathy Crowell and tell them that I forgive them, that I hold no ill will toward them, I'll make it."

Lupel said the judge's decision was "appealing" but declined to say whether such action would be taken. He also declined to say whether he would try to contact Gov. James F. Thompson about granting clemency to Dotson.

"The petitioner has failed to sustain his burden of proof and I cannot find that perjury was committed . . ." Samuels said.

During Dotson's trial in 1979, "the jury found (Mrs. Webb's) testimony to be credible. I would say that was correct," Samuels said in his ruling.

He said Mrs. Webb's testimony last week that she lied when she said she was raped was "impeached" by "selective recollection" of certain facts.

New witnesses who testified that Dotson was elsewhere during the alleged rape, did not sufficiently uphold Mrs. Webb's new story, Samuels said.

Samuels also noted the length of time it took for Mrs. Webb to come forward and say her original story was a lie.

Previous rulings by Illinois courts made it difficult to accept recanted testimony, he said.

"Recanted testimony is regarded as very unreliable and it is unusual for a court to grant a new trial," especially when a claim of perjury testimony is involved, Samuels said. Past decisions have said the "the defendant must bear the burden of proof" and Dotson had not done so, he added.

Earlier in the day, Dotson took the witness stand for 30 minutes and denied he had assaulted the woman.

"Did you rape her?" Lupel asked his client.

"No," Dotson replied.

Dotson testified he had never even seen Mrs. Webb until he appeared at a preliminary hearing to answer charges of rape and aggravated kidnapping.

The doctor who treated Mrs. Webb the night of the alleged assault also testified Thursday that he found no sperm or seminal fluid when he examined her that night.

After his conviction in 1979, Dotson of the Chicago suburb of Country Club Hills, was sentenced to 25 to 50 years in prison by Samuels.

He was freed April 4 from the Joliet Correctional Center on \$10,000 bond after a hearing before Samuels at which Mrs. Webb recanted her original testimony.

Mrs. Webb, 23, now a mother of two living in New Hampshire, testified last week that she was never raped on July 9, 1977, as she had said before. She said she concocted the story when she was 16 because she feared she was pregnant and wanted to prevent her foster parents from learning she had had sex with a boyfriend.

She said she came forward to free Dotson because she couldn't live with herself and because of her faith in God.

## White House blames Soviets for chill

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — President Reagan is accusing the Kremlin of trying to "incite and exploit differences" in the West with threats and misrepresentation, and the administration on Thursday blamed Moscow for plunging relations between the two superpowers in to a chill.

Reagan said a summit meeting with Soviet chief Mikhail Gorbachev likely would not mark a turning point

in U.S.-Soviet relations.

"I would look on it as an opportunity to clear the air and express our desire to have a relationship that would eliminate this great (nuclear) threat that seems to hang over the world," Reagan said in comments made a week ago and released Thursday.

Meanwhile, responding to charges leveled by Gorbachev, White House spokesman Larry Speakes said "the

deterioration in U.S.-Soviet relations which has taken place in recent years is due in a large part to Soviet actions.

"There is a limit to the degree to which U.S. actions alone can thaw out our cool relationship," he said.

Speakes' comments came in response to a statement Wednesday by Gorbachev that "a kind of ice age is being observed in relations between the U.S.S.R. and the United States."

The comments by Reagan and

Speakes reflected a tougher line of rhetoric toward the Soviet Union than in recent weeks. It follows Gorbachev's call for the United States to match a Soviet freeze on deployment of medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe.

The administration has rejected the missile-freeze idea, saying it would freeze in place a Soviet warhead advantage.

## Railroad engineer set to get artificial heart

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — A railroad engineer from Illinois, the victim of a near-fatal heart attack in October, will become the world's fifth recipient of a permanent artificial heart this weekend, Humana Inc. announced Thursday.

The surgery was scheduled for 7 a.m. Sunday after Jack C. Burcham of Le Roy, Ill., signed a 17-page consent form warning him and his family of the procedure's experimental status and possible dangers, including stroke.

Burcham, a 62-year-old paratrooper veteran of World War II, was referred to Humana Hospital Audubon by his Illinois cardiologist, Dr. Vinod Nakornchai, said Humana Inc. spokeswoman Linda Broadus.

Dr. William C. DeVries will lead Humana's surgical team in his third implant since Nov. 25.

Without intervention, Burcham would die within one to two months, Nakornchai said at a news conference in Bloomington, Ill.

Burcham suffered a near-fatal heart attack Oct. 9 and was hospitalized again March 28 with symptoms of congestive heart failure, Nakornchai said. Burcham "failed to respond to all the aggressive medical treatment."

Nakornchai said he got the idea for the artificial heart several weeks ago.

"It shocked him a little at the beginning," he said. But a week later, Burcham was ready for an implant, the doctor said.

"He's fighting always," Nakornchai said.

"Burcham, who has been 'quite miserable and suffering,' can take no more than a few steps at a time, but he is not in pain, Nakornchai said.

Surgeons will cut out Burcham's damaged natural heart and replace it with a plastic-and-metal Jarvik-7 heart. A pair of plastic tubes from the device will be attached to a 325-pound compressor that will drive the mechanical heart with puffs of air.

## AT&T seeks rate hike

NEW YORK (AP) — American Telephone & Telegraph Co. asked Thursday for permission to raise rates by up to 26.7 percent for long-distance interstate calls between parties less than 55 miles apart.

The company said the increases would generate \$74 million annually in revenue and would affect about 13 percent of its long-distance traffic.

In a filing with the Federal Communications Commission, AT&T said it wanted to make the following rate changes effective April 26:

- For a call of one to 10 miles, the day rate for the initial minute would increase 26.7 percent to 38 cents from 30 cents. The rate for each additional minute would be increased to 19 cents from 15 cents.

- For a call from 11 to 22 miles, the day rate for the initial minute would be raised 21.1 percent to 46 cents from 38 cents. The rate for each additional minute would be hiked to 25 cents from 21 cents.
- For a call from 23 to 55 miles, the day rate for the initial minute would rise 13.3 percent to 51 cents from 45 cents. The rate for each additional minute would be raised to 30 cents from 26 cents.

The rates would be discounted during the evening and night weekend periods by 40 and 60 percent, respectively, the company said.

AT&T said it proposed the new rates to further align the price of the calls with AT&T's costs.

## Webster mulls security move

WASHINGTON (AP) — Saying he worries that would-be terrorists could "have a great country going into siege mentality," FBI Director William H. Webster on Thursday questioned whether it would be wise to close off a 90-acre area surrounding the White House.

"Sometimes excessive security actually invites trouble," Webster said when asked about reports that Secret Service officials are discussing putting a large barrier around the White House off-limits to vehicles.

Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III has acknowledged publicly that the Secret Service talked of a plan to augment concrete barricades placed in front of the White House in 1983 by closing a two-block stretch of Pennsylvania Avenue.

## Group files FEC suit for Evans ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — Common Cause sued the Federal Election Commission Thursday for dismissing its complaint against the Republican National Independent Expenditure Committee, a political fund-raising panel.

Common Cause, a lobby group, complained to the FEC on Nov. 22, 1983, that the committee had violated legal limits by spending \$185,000 to promote the campaign of Sen. Daniel J. Evans, R-Wash., in a 1983 special election.

Common Cause said the National Republican Senatorial Committee, a principal fund-raising arm for GOP Senate candidates, had spent the maximum under the law, \$260,000, to support Evans, who successfully sought to retain the seat to which he had been appointed after the death of Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash.

Common Cause said the Republican National Independent Expenditure Committee, like the National Republican Senatorial Committee, was a political group established and maintained by a national political party because it was organized by key GOP officials. Its goal was to elect GOP candidates and that it used the words "Republican National" in its name.

**Pair arrested in shooting spree**

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An Idaho Falls couple has been arraigned in 7th District Court on a series of charges related to an early morning shooting spree at an Idaho Falls gun shop, police say.

Officers waited outside Ike's Gun Shop for nearly two hours without firing a shot before William Toby Mink, 20, and his wife, Terry Lou Mink, 19, surrendered about 6 a.m. Thursday.

The pair faces charges of attempted first-degree murder, first-degree burglary and aggravated assault on a police officer. Bond was set at \$500,000 each, and a preliminary hearing was scheduled for April 17.

Police said Mink is also known as Toby Haight.

Idaho Falls Police Lt. Delbert Sprague said the couple entered the shop through an upstairs window and inadvertently set off a silent alarm.

**Unemployment ruling upheld**

BOISE (AP) — A day-care center operator who claimed an employment law violated her constitutional rights has lost her appeal before the Idaho Supreme Court.

The court issued its opinion on Thursday in the case of Susan Hill, operator of Hill's Country Club Academy and Day Care in Boise.

The case stemmed from Ms. Hill's 1982 termination of an employee, who then was awarded unemployment benefits. Ms. Hill appealed the Idaho Employment Department decision to the state Industrial Commission, and then to the Supreme Court.

On appeal, she raised more than 25 issues, most involving constitutional points.

Among other things, Ms. Hill contended the Employment Security Law that requires employers to keep certain records violated her privilege against self-incrimination. She said the records could be used as evidence against her.

The Supreme Court called that argument "misplaced."

The justices held that Ms. Hill has constitutional protection assuring the records couldn't be used against her in a criminal matter. She didn't prove she would be subjected to "substantial and real hazards" of incrimination by keeping the records, they said.

**Lapwai district stands to lose**

LAPWAI (AP) — The Lapwai School District would lose nearly \$40,000 in federal funding if a proposal by President Reagan makes it into next year's budget, said Superintendent Robert Sobotta.

The district would lose its attendance officer, a teacher of remedial courses and three aides, Sobotta said. The cuts would mean discontinuing a number of service programs for the district's Indian students, Sobotta said.

The cut would affect nearly all of the 331 Indian students in the district, either directly or indirectly, Sobotta said. There are 45 students who are actually in the programs, he said.

**Aryan spitting probe dropped**

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — At the request of the child's parents, no charges will be filed against white supremacist Keith Gilbert for allegedly spitting on a 5-year-old black girl, Kootenai County Prosecutor Glen Walker said.

Gilbert, of Post Falls, was arrested on 36 tax and welfare fraud charges one week after the prosecutor's office investigation into the alleged incident became public.

The investigation has concluded, Walker said Wednesday, and the family decided not to pursue misdemeanor battery charges.

The family of 18, including several adopted children with handicaps and racially mixed backgrounds, travels across the country and is now in Texas.

**Highway chief says road conditions to worsen**

POCATELLO (AP) — Although there's enough federal funding for Idaho roads right now, the situation will steadily get worse and the Legislature will have to be lobbied to come through with more funding, State Highway Administrator Keith Green said Thursday.

Speaking to some 15 officials from 10 southeastern Idaho local governments, Green said the Idaho Department of Transportation has money now to meet most local applications for funding, "but long term it is not as rosy."

"There is not support in Washington for funding local projects," he said.

Green added that "there's lots of pressure from big eastern urban states to revise the federal funding formula" to give more to urban areas and less to rural. Even though Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, heads the Senate Transportation subcommittee, "urban areas are gaining and Idaho is losing."

After all, he explained, Idaho has only one million population and only two congressmen in the House of Representatives.

One result, Green said, is that some of the lesser traveled state highways like S.H. 34 are unlikely to obtain federal funding. There hasn't been federal funding for rehabilitating these state roads for the last five years, he reported.

"The roughest picture for us that for the interstates we can expect continued funding. Other programs will go downhill," he said.

The state and local highways funding prospects, he pointed out, are in line with the federal trend to leave more financing to the states.

Therefore, he urged, the local officials should work with the state transportation department to press for more road assistance with the legislature. Fortunately, the highway chief said, local governments have been much more active in lobbying for more roads funding from the Legislature.

"I'm glad to see Pocatello go after a street preservation fee system," Monte Fiala, the highway division's district engineer, said.

Green went on to report that one cent of the five-cents-per-gallon federal income tax increase of a few years ago went for urban mass transit. And now, he said, congressional representatives from the big cities are pushing for another penny increase, all for mass transit.

States like Idaho have not received one penny of the revenue from the five-cent tax increase. Yet none of the big urban transit systems is self-supporting, Green added.

**Regional jail proposal gets cops' support**

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Law enforcement officials have given their support to former state prison warden Darrol Gardner's suggestion that a privately run jail facility be established in the southeastern part of the state.

But they think Gardner may be overly optimistic about having a regional jail in operation within the next two years.

"My first reaction is that, yes, that would be a good idea," said Blackfoot Police Chief Ed Jones, but he added, "I don't see that as a viable alternative in the near future.... I would say it's 10 years down the line at the very minimum."

Gardner, now the Idaho Falls district parole supervisor, said last month that in view of the spread of regional — correctional — facilities throughout the West in recent years, now would be a good time to consider one for southeastern Idaho. He said a privately run jail housing between 100 and 250 prisoners could alleviate overcrowding in the jails of the five southeastern counties.

"He's been down here and we've talked," said Bingham County Sheriff Hoy Nelson. "He's evidently got a group of people who have some money who are thinking about doing it as a business type of thing."

Although the discussion comes as Pennsylvania businessmen prepare to start work on a West-wide prison at the old state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding, Jones said legal problems still surround a regional jail facility and legislative action would need to be solved then.

Under current law, only the county sheriff has authority over county jails, and he said that would have to be modified to accommodate a regional facility. In addition, both Jones and Nelson raised questions about liability for prisoners, jurisdiction between various judicial districts in the region and the fact that local officials may not have any control over prisoner treatment.

# Submarine's presence spurs Sweden's navy into action

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Swedish naval units fired at a suspected submarine intruder Thursday near the entrance to Karlshamn harbor on the southeast coast, a Defense Ministry spokesman said.

Following the submarine chase a year ago, a military report said: "We can safely say that there (were) three indications of conventional submarines inside Swedish territorial waters off the closed-off archipelago and seven indications of submerged activities inside the archipelago, including smaller submerged vehicles and divers."

Sweden's military commander-in-chief, Gen. Lennart Ljung, has proposed that about \$10 million be taken from the army and air force and given to the navy to further strengthen its anti-submarine forces. But the plan has been opposed by heads of the service branches that would see their budgets reduced.

In 1982, Rear Adm. Per Rudbeck, then navy chief, declared in a clear reference to the Soviet Union that "a foreign power is preparing for war against us."

southeast of Karlshamn. The military turned back a tanker that was steaming out of Karlshamn, it added, and Swedish television reported that authorities had forced two freighters leaving the harbor to turn back.

TT quoted sources as saying the submarines were fired in swarms about 550 yards from the port entrance and were set to explode at different depths.

The incident took place about 18 miles from the Karlskrona archipelago, where an intense submarine hunt took place a year ago after intruder submarines were spotted in the area. No foreign submarines were ever trapped.

"The national news agency TT reported that anti-submarine grenades were fired, and that during the afternoon a minesweeper sped to the area some 275 miles southwest of Stockholm and joined by a navy helicopter and other naval units. By nightfall, three minesweepers and four patrol boats were searching the area, it said.

But the defense staff's press officer, Hans Westberg, refused to say what type of weapons were fired or specify the equipment used in the attempt to uncover "alien submerged activities."

"We have recorded just one indication. It could be anything. I can't see any dramatic development," Westberg told The Associated Press.

In recent years, military reports have indicated that Soviet submarines may have intruded into Swedish waters but said only in two cases was enough evidence found to conclude that an intrusion did take place.

Westberg said that after an overnight search, the efforts would be halted if no evidence were discovered.

TT news agency said the search was concentrated in an area between the port entrance and a small island

# Hoxha death may help out Soviets in Albania

MOSCOW — The death of Albania's leader Enver Hoxha offers the Soviet Union a chance to try to bring the Communist nation back into the Soviet bloc after a 24-year rift.

Hoxha, a disciple of Josef Stalin, spurned all Soviet efforts to improve relations with Albania following a 1961 break with Nikita S. Khrushchev over the Soviet leader's denunciation of Stalin.

Albania subsequently turned to China for economic and technical aid, but relations with Peking deteriorated after Mao Tse-tung's death in 1976, and China withdrew all aid in 1978.

The official press in both the Soviet Union and China reported briefly and without comment the death of Hoxha on Thursday at age 76.

The Soviet news agency Tass later reported that the Communist Party Central Committee sent a message of "deep condolences" to the Albanian Communist Party.

During the 42 years of Hoxha's leadership, Albania became increasingly isolated and there was little information on whether his death would lead to any immediate political change.

But since 1961 the Soviet Union has repeatedly stated a willingness to improve relations with Albania.

Speaking last fall in Bulgaria before he became Soviet Communist Party leader, Mikhail S. Gorbachev renewed an offer to resume relations.

"I should also like to emphasize that the Soviet Union is in favor of normalization of relations with Albania," he said. "This issue could be solved by mutual good

will on both sides to the benefit of both nations and the cause of peace and socialism."

Gorbachev became Communist Party leader in March after the death of Konstantin U. Chernenko.

Last November, the Soviets published for the first time since 1961 a message to the Albanians marking their national day.

The official news agency Tass announced Hoxha's death in a terse, one-sentence report quoting the Albanian agency ATA monitored in Rome. Radio Moscow also broadcast the news shortly.

The neutral tone of the announcements indicated Moscow would await announcement of a successor and proceed cautiously.

# Sudanese junta plans to end reign in a year

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) — The new military junta agreed Thursday to surrender its power after a one-year transition period in which a Cabinet with only one military member will administer the country, civilian negotiators reported.

The country is now being run by the Military Council, headed by Gen. Abdul-Rahman M.H. Swareddahab, who led the coup ousting President Gaafar Nimeiri on Saturday. The council will continue to hold ultimate power during the transition.

Swareddahab was named commander-in-chief and defense minister by Nimeiri on March 18 a few days before he left on his last

trip as president. The coup, coming after days of a general strike protest against food price increases and other Nimeiri actions, occurred while the president was returning from a U.S. visit. Nimeiri has been in Egypt since the coup.

Atlan el-Khirdalo, spokesman for the Alliance of National Forces, formed by political parties and professional unions which organized the protest strikes, said agreement on the transition plan was reached in a meeting with the 15-man Military Council.

Under a decree by Swareddahab, the interim government will administer laws passed by the council.

# Bhopal plant to close shop

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — The Union Carbide Corp. said Thursday it has abandoned efforts to reopen its pesticide plant in Bhopal, where a gas leak killed more than 2,000 people and injured 500,000 last December.

A company statement issued in Bombay said the decision came after government officials made it "abundantly clear that permission to restart the factory will not be given."

The plant in Bhopal, capital of Madhya Pradesh state, leaked more than 40 tons of methyl isocyanate on Dec. 3 in the world's worst industrial disaster.

The plant was closed after the leak, and government officials have controlled it since then while investigations were conducted. The Madhya Pradesh government said Thursday the factory would be officially shut down July 11.

**Women in bed longer than men, says survey**

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Women spend more time in bed than men, and Midwesterners are in the sack longer than residents of other parts of the nation, a survey of Americans' sleeping habits indicates.

The survey tended to confirm the belief that older people sleep less than younger folks.

Nearly 73 percent of women reported spending 7 hours or more in bed daily, sleeping, reading or watching television, the survey found, by comparison, about 70 percent of men said they were in bed 7 hours or more.

Of those aged 50 and over, 70.1 percent reported spending more than 7 hours in bed each day, by comparison, 7 hours or more was reported by 72.8 percent of people aged 35 to 49; by 73.8 percent of those in the 25-34 age group and by 73.9 percent of folks aged 18 to 24.

The survey, made public Thursday, was conducted by the Gallup Organization, which polled 1,053 adults nationwide on their sleeping habits.

More than 8 hours in bed daily was reported by 35 percent of the 15-24 age group, a total that dwindled to 27.5 percent of those 25 to 34; to 24.4 percent in the 35-49 group and 24.5 percent for those over 50.

The survey was paid for by Arco Chemical Co., which produces chemicals used in the manufacture of polyurethane foam mattresses and other bedding.

Regionally, Midwesterners seemed to need the most sleep and Westerners the least.

Nationwide, the survey found that the greatest share of Americans, 45.8 percent, spend between 7 and 8 hours in bed daily.

More than three-quarters of Midwesterners — 75.2 percent — said they spent 7 hours or more in bed daily.

Some 26.5 percent said they were abed more than eight hours, 21.2 percent estimated they spent 5 or 6 hours in bed, 4.9 percent less than 5 hours and the rest didn't know.

Southerners were not far behind, with 73.5 percent spending 7 hours in the sack. The figure was 70.3 percent of Easterners and 68.5 percent for residents of the West.

There was considerable regional and age variation in time spent in the sack, however.

The study also found that 28.1 percent of Americans still use the traditional innerspring mattresses, while 10.9 percent have waterbeds and 7.1 percent use foam mattresses.

**Presence of public at mine hearing debated**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge will hear arguments today on whether the public should be allowed to hear testimony from government mine inspectors when hearings on the Wilberg Mine fire resume next week in Price.

The federal Mine Safety and Health Administration has announced it will resume its closed-door hearings on the Dec. 19 fire in which 27 miners perished. Investigators questioned some 85 witnesses during five weeks of previous hearings that concluded last month.

Most of the two dozen witnesses in the new round of interviews are to be inspectors from MSHA, the Utah Industrial Commission and Kinery Mining Corp., the mine's operator, and safety committees from the United Mine Workers of America.

Attorney Patrick Shea, who represents the Society of Professional Journalists and 13 news organizations, including The Associated

Press, said Thursday he will ask U.S. District Judge David K. Winder to modify a previous order upholding a ban on public access to the hearings. Government employees were singled out because "they have a public duty to perform, and their performance of that duty should be public, particularly where the investigation might lead to information about their not having fulfilled their duty."

The original hearings began in Price on Jan. 21, but were halted when Winder granted a temporary restraining order to news organizations. However, Winder modified the order several times and ultimately allowed MSHA to bar the public and press.

During the earlier hearings, the UMW requested that MSHA inspectors be questioned to determine whether the agency's "decisions, policies or enforcement actions contributed to the conditions which led to the mine fire."

**Andrus backs industry**

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Oregonians seem indifferent to the loss of regional jobs and should show support for traditional industries, former interior secretary Cecil Andrus says.

Andrus, a former Idaho governor who served as interior secretary from 1977-81, told Rotary Club members Wednesday that Northwest leaders should change their industrial energy policies to support such traditional industries as aluminum.

Smelters deserve long-term electricity rates that would stabilize both the companies and the region's economy, said Andrus, now a spokesman for the aluminum industry.

The Bonneville Power Administration's direct service industries — 90 percent aluminum smelters — buy about 30 percent of the BPA's power. The companies accepted a temporary rate Feb. 25 of 1.88 cents per kilowatt hour, effective until July 1.

The normal industrial rate is 2.58 cents. The BPA, which must establish a long-term rate schedule by July 1, has proposed several options that are being studied.

Andrus said he does not favor cut rates for all industrial electricity users. He said that would force inflated rates for residential users.

On the other hand, he said, all rates would climb if the aluminum smelters closed because of high production costs.

City was about three miles east of Lindbergh field when the pilot saw the smaller plane and leveled out his descent to avoid the plane, Ms. Dozier said.

The incident was not reported as a near-collision by the Western pilot, but the smaller craft flew in the path of the Western jet, airline spokeswoman Linda Dozier said in Los Angeles.

## Coupon book sales pitch fails to meet codes

TWIN FALLS — A telephone pitch used by a Butte, Mont., company to sell coupon books is misleading consumers and omits facts required by state law. Officials from both the Idaho Attorney General's Office and the Better Business Bureau of Treasure Valley said the selling techniques of Far West Promotions, which now is operating throughout the area, violate the Idaho Consumer Protection Act by failing to tell who is selling and by misnaming the product. The phone solicitors, who use a pre-written speech, also do not directly tell people on the

other end of the line that they are being solicited for a sale, another requirement of state law. "If (the sales presentation) would appear to me to violate Section 48-603 of the Idaho Code," said David High, chief of the business affairs and state finances division of the Idaho Attorney General's office. Ken Thornberg, executive director for Better Business Bureau of Treasure Valley, was more colorful: "This pitch would not meet our standards — not within the distance from here to the sun and back," he said. The site manager for Far West Promotions, Brenda Latvaho, said Wednesday the speech is prepared by her headquarters in Butte. She said she could not respond directly until she

contacts Karen Williams, listed as the owner of Far West Promotions. Despite the questions about the company and its sales tactics, the coupons appearing in the small booklet seem legitimate. The Times-News contacted several of the merchants, and all said they signed contracts with Far West Promotions. They also stand behind the coupons and have had good results to date, said the local retailers, who run businesses ranging from repair outfits to fast-food restaurants. The owner of the Bonanza Casino in Reno, which has the last coupon in the book, also said his gambling house will deliver the \$92 worth of tickets, cash and free drinks for the length of the contract (Dec. 31), despite a

printed warning that the coupon is "revocable at option of management." "They're perfectly OK. We're honoring all of ours right here," said Pat Brady. The way in which the coupon books are being sold has sent dozens of calls into the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce office, as well as some to The Times-News. A chamber spokeswoman said she received 15 to 20 a day for several days this week. The sales approach apparently also has caught the interest of Twin Falls Police Department, which has assigned a detective to ask questions. The sales pitch, which Latvaho supplied to The Times-News and the chamber of com-

merce, opens by saying the solicitor is "calling for the Twin Falls Merchant Fun Book," which is not the name of the product. It is called the Magic Valley Fun Book. State law is clear. It requires the solicitor to immediately identify himself and identify the trade name of the company for whom he works. No where in the speech is Far West Promotions mentioned. The chamber's consumer affairs representative, Betty Zuck, said many callers have told her they thought that Twin Falls merchants are sponsoring the coupon book. Some also have complained of high-pressure tactics, she said. State law also demands that — before any products are mentioned — that the phoner

## A dog and her lamb

TWIN FALLS — The re-enactment of a well-known nursery rhyme is going on at the Ron and Miriam Watson home west of Twin Falls. The names have been changed, but the story is true. Instead of "Mary Had a Little Lamb," at the Watson home, it's "Veronica Had a Little Lamb, and everywhere because she thinks the lamb was sure to follow." Instead of a little girl, Veronica is a black Labrador retriever with an interesting background of her own. The lamb, Nanny, follows the dog everywhere because she thinks it's her mother. The dog is the mother by adoption.

Miriam Watson said that had the dog not come to the rescue on a cold, stormy night two weeks ago, Nanny would have died. The lamb was one of triplets born to a Hampshire-Suffolk cross and as a result, her baby coat is almost as black as that of her adopted mother. The lambs were born during the snow storm two weeks ago and Watson says the mother accepted the two stronger lambs but butted the little one out of the pen. "When we found her, she was huddled up into a cold little ball beside the pen," Watson says. "Even the inside of her mouth was cold, which is a pretty sure sign that death is close." Watson said she took the lamb into the house and had planned a warm water treatment to try to save her. However, the dog stepped in,

hegan vigorously kicking the chilled infant, warming her and increasing circulation. The two then curled up together for the night on a blanket in the utility room with the dog's warmth substituting for the ewe's. "She knew the baby lamb was in trouble and needed a mother. The two spent that night sleeping together and they still do every night. Nanny sometimes sleeps on Veronica's back and walks over her as lambs do with their mothers. Veronica doesn't seem to mind," Watson added. Because the dog cannot feed the lamb, Watson purchased goat's milk for her first week or so and fed her with a bottle. She now drinks lamb's milk compound as her diet and comes to the door to announce meal time. "With the warm weather, Nanny and

Veronica spend lots of time in the sunny lawn behind the Watson home. There is a hole in the pasture fence, so when Nanny wants to mingle with the lambs she can, but so far most of her two weeks have been spent at the side of her adopted mother. The two follow Watson around the property as she does her chores and both are house pets. "At times the two ride in the pickup truck with their owner when she goes on short errands." "One day a man who saw my sheep pens beside our house knocked on my door and said he wasn't sure but he thought he saw a big black dog down the road being followed by a lamb," Watson says. Watson says there is some sort of logic for the very unusual combination of a lamb with a dog for a mother.

## Game draws probe

### Prosecutor to eye promoter

HAILEY — What started out as a game of chance in Twin Falls and evolved into "The Game of Sun Valley," has now become a legal game with the Blaine County Prosecutor's office as one of the players. Some Diaz de Leon, an investigator with the prosecutor's office, contacted The Times-News by telephone April 9 seeking information on the game's promoter, Curtis Johnson, the man who in an October interview with The Times-News claimed to be president of the Twin Falls Chapter of the Vietnam Veterans of America. In a letter dated April 5, Johnson apologized to a number of Wood River Valley merchants for not being able to pay them back the investment they had made in his aborted game. He also stated that "I did not misrepresent my office as president of a veterans organization." Some recipients of the letter were unimpressed. Cheryl Welch, manager of Chapter One Bookstore in Ketchum, said Thursday she had gone ahead and given written information to the Blaine County Prosecutor's Office after reading the letter. "He's told me all that stuff before," Welch said of Johnson's letter. Lydia Maria de Lynde's Bakery in Ketchum also acknowledged by telephone Thursday that she had filed information with the prosecutor, adding that at least four or five other businesses had, as well. Diaz de Leon refused to say if the prosecutor's office was going to press a formal charge against Johnson, just that she was collecting information on his activities and nothing more would

## Taking care with arrests key to avoiding suits, police told

TWIN FALLS — "Every arrest is a potential lawsuit," Florida attorney Pete Walsh warned a group of law enforcement officers Thursday. Walsh should know because he is retained by the City of Tampa to handle claims of misconduct and civil rights violations against its police department. The claims number about 30 a month. Walsh was one of the speakers at a two-day seminar in Twin Falls on law enforcement liability. The event was sponsored by the

Peace, Officers Standards and Training Academy. Walsh and Pat Gallagher, a Washington D.C. consultant on liability and former South Bend, Ind. public safety director, presented the laws and ways of police misconduct litigation. By educating officers on the means by which they can be sued, "maybe you can lessen your liability," Walsh said. The number of claims against law enforcement officers is rising. In 1971, there were less than 1,000 claims nationwide. Last year, there were 5,600 alone against the Los Angeles Police Department. One of those included a \$1.8 million settlement

against the city. Compared to past years, many more avenues have opened for people to file suit against law enforcement officers, Walsh said. Because officers are the most powerful unit in the law enforcement chain, there are more sanctions against abuse of that power. Because officers conduct business under the "color of the law," the additional sanctions kick into gear when someone alleges misconduct such as false arrest or brutality. Using a case of battery, Walsh outlined the differences in the potential penalties facing civilians and officers. For instance, if a civilian slaps someone

else, he could face state criminal and civil prosecution. If an officer slaps someone, he not only faces state criminal and civil action, but possible prosecution under federal criminal and civil rights statutes. Unlike criminals, policemen charged with wrongdoing wear name tags, drive color-coded cars and are always caught, Walsh said. In Idaho, unfortunately, all lawsuits claiming false arrest and other misconduct against officers must be filed in U.S. District Court, which is a tougher place to fight the claim, Walsh said.

The federal civil rights laws often used against officers, he added, never were intended for that. They were passed after the Civil War to protect former slaves whose rights were being violated. Claims citing federal civil rights violations, however, are among the largest numbers being filed. Walsh said his personal favorite among civil rights violations was enacted by Congress in 1976. The law made it possible for judges to award attorney fees to "the prevailing parties." The purpose was to promote the prosecution of those who violated civil rights.

## Rock Creek Park grant may improve grounds

TWIN FALLS — A \$195,000 grant proposal from Twin Falls County for the expansion and improvement of Rock Creek Park was approved Wednesday. The project, which includes the construction of an amphitheater and addition of 11 acres, should begin this summer. Although the total grant proposal was about \$195,000, the county actually will receive about \$77,000 in funds because it was a matching grant, said Darrell Heider, the Twin Falls County parks director. The county will have to come up with the rest of the money. It will be allowed, however, to match the grant funds with the value of donated land, gifts and labor from its own crews and service clubs, he added. Service clubs were significant in donating money and labor to the construction of the present park, which is located across from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

The grant proposal was approved by the State Parks Department, which handles federal Land, Water and Conservation funds. The first phase of the project will be soliciting the donation of 11 acres of land across the creek from the present park, Heider said. The Twin Falls Canal Co. has already been contacted about the donation. The county already has acquired land on the other side of the creek for an easement into the proposed park addition. Once the land is acquired from the canal company, the second phase will be the construction of foot bridges to link the two sections of land. County crews should begin working on the footbridges as well as landscaping for picnic sites and sprinkler systems this summer, Heider said. Work on the amphitheater should begin next year.

## abvourlod berrut blrow A Dyslexic children may need outside tutoring, speaker says

TWIN FALLS — Parents of dyslexic children are better off tutoring each other's children than their own, says Mary Swiger of Buhl, a retired tutor of dyslexic students. Children with dyslexia, a perceptual disorder that affects mostly boys, reverse and sometimes invert letters and words when they are reading. A symptom of dyslexia may be a noticeable gap between intelligence and reading ability. Swiger, speaking to a group of 13 teachers and parents at an Immanuel Lutheran School workshop on teaching and tutoring dyslexic students, said it is easier for parents to be businesslike with someone else's child than with their own. Dyslexic children usually have average or above-average intelligence and are eager pupils; they just get the 26 letters of the alphabet mixed up, Swiger says. Physicist Albert Einstein and Renaissance ar-

tist Leonardo DaVinci were dyslexic, she says. In the schools, Swiger suggested dyslexic students are better taught in a classroom of other dyslexic children by trained teachers able to take a little extra time. Training in the Slingerland method of teaching dyslexic students costs about \$450, much less than the cost of keeping students back for a year, Swiger says. She says as many as 20 percent of all children may be dyslexic. "If every teacher bumps into a child like this and feels very sad she doesn't know how to deal with it," Swiger says. The method of tutoring dyslexic children outlined by Swiger Monday night included the extensive use of sound and sight to reinforce the child's learning. She says the combination of sight, sound, and kinesthetic (feeling) associations best teach the child to pronounce words properly and see them correctly. "By drilling the child to distinguish among similar words like saw, and sew, the child stops reversing and inverting words and begins

to read more easily. When the child's learning material forces him to look at the words in comparison to one another, he learns faster, Swiger says. In the process of teaching pronunciation, Swiger says she does not use the small markings used in dictionaries to indicate long and short vowels. She calls them visual pollution and says "the dyslexic child has enough trouble looking at normal letters without the added clutter of the markings." Swiger also uses a list of nonsense words with common vowel and consonant combinations to teach children to hear the sounds properly. "They need to know they can read anything," she says. Swiger says she hopes some school in the area will take steps to train teachers in the Slingerland method to deal with dyslexic children and serve as a model for the rest of the area. At the Clover Lutheran School in Buhl, a parents have organized a group to tutor dyslexic students, she says.





## Hallberg's torrid finish earns Masters lead

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Gary Hallberg, wearing an Indiana Jones-style hat to avoid eye contact with the gallery, turned a fast finish into a 4-under-par 68 and a one-shot lead Thursday in the first round of the 49th Masters golf tournament.

"I feel like this is the start of my career," said Hallberg, 26, who has spent five full seasons on the PGA Tour.

"I feel like this is a stepping stone, something I can build on for my career."

"I'll just try not to get too excited about it, just try to go out tomorrow and do it all over."

But Hallberg, who has one lone victory to his credit and never before has led one of golf's major events, knows that can be a difficult assignment.

"At one time or another, everyone in this field has thought, 'the Masters champion ... me.'"

"You can't think that way. If you do, you're gone," said Hallberg, who put himself in front of some of golf's most glamorous names with birdies on three of the last six holes on the revered old Augusta National Golf Club course.

Tom Watson, Lee Trevino, Ray Floyd, even troubled defending champion Ben Crenshaw all were within two shots of the longshot leader, and the legendary Jack Nicklaus was but three behind.

Watson, the outstanding player in golf over the past few seasons, went 2-over-par on the front when he said he encountered "some pin placements that scared the hell out of me."

But he rallied with a remarkable birdie-par-eagle birdie-birdie burst on the back nine and got in with a tie for second with Payne Stewart at 69.

"The round was like a roller coaster," Watson said. "On the front nine, I didn't play at all well. On the back nine, I played very well."

Trevino, swaggering over the rolling hills of the course he once vowed he'd never play again, had a share of the No. 2 spot until his approach ran through the green on the 18th and made bogey.

Still, it left him at 70 along with Crenshaw, former Masters winner Floyd and a pair of surprised and surprising amateurs, 20-year-old Sam Randolph, runner-up in the last U.S. Amateur, and national collegiate champion John Inman, 22, from North Carolina.

"It's a great shot in the arm for amateur golf. I'm tickled pink," said the mighty Nicklaus, whose son is a teammate of Inman's.

Nicklaus, the 45-year-old Golden Bear who still seeks to expand his record collection of 17 major professional titles, also was pleased with some aspects of his round of 71, which was highlighted by a 4-iron

cond shot that set up an eagle-3 on the 18th.

"It was a very typical round for me. I missed a lot of greens, about half of them. That's not like me. But I putted very well," Nicklaus said.

"I know I'll hit the ball better than that. And if I can keep on putting that well, well, it's a very encouraging sign."

But while Nicklaus found some encouragement, another Masters legend, Arnold Palmer, found only despair.

Palmer, 55, who built much of his reputation around four Masters victories between 1958 and 1964, took a punishing 83, including 44 on the back nine. It was, by his shots, the worst score he has had in 31 Masters appearances.

But he was not alone in his troubles.

Fuzzy Zoeller, the U.S. Open titleholder who has returned to action after major back surgery, took a 77.

Tom Kite, so often a challenger in this event, shot 75. So did Cal Peete, a winner of two titles already this season.

Curtis Strange, the year's leading money-winner and a two-time 1985 Tour winner, shot 80.

British Open champion Seve Ballesteros of Spain matched par 72. South African Gary Player was at 71 despite a bogey-bogey finish.

Trevino, 45, was the last of the leaders to finish. He got to within one stroke of the lead when a 10-foot birdie putt freed the cup on the 16th and sent Lee into a happy little trot around the green.

He had a chance to take a share of the top spot when his approach cleared a bunker on the 17th by inches, then stopped some 15 feet short. The putt hung on the lip, and Trevino just grimaced.

"The bogey on the 18th dampened his enthusiasm not at all and he was smiling broadly when he walked off the 18th green of the course he once said was not suited to his game. For a couple of years, he declined his invitation to this tournament, the only one he needs to win to join Nicklaus, Player, Gene Sarazen and Ben Hogan — those to score career-sweeps-of-golf's Big Four events."

"If I can strike the ball the way I did today, there's no reason I can't win here," Trevino said. "If I'd had a good attitude, I could have won here before. It's my own fault. I'll probably haunt me some day."

Crenshaw, who has been in a deep slump and troubled by a divorce since his emotional triumph here a year ago, had to battle back from a double bogey on the 11th hole, where he hit into the water.

"It was an OK round," he said. "I wouldn't call it any better than that. I've played better this year, but this was a more meaningful round. It's a positive note."

## Sub-par scoring by youthful amateurs spices first round

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — John Inman and Sam Randolph, a couple of amateurs making their first starts in the historic Masters tournament, shook up the field with sub-par rounds Thursday.

On a day when the challenging Augusta National Course was stingy with its scores, Inman, 22, and Randolph, 20, each fired a 2-under-par 70.

Over the years, this tradition-laden layout with its lightning fast greens has spoiled the concentration of all manner of players. But if the two rookies were disturbed by it they didn't let it interfere with their game.

"On the first tee, when I got over the ball, my knees were quivering," Randolph said. "I was happy to get the ball out of there and leave."

The youngster from Santa Barbara, Calif., a junior at the University of Southern California, finished the front nine with three straight birdies and by the time he was walking up the fairway at No. 11, his name showed up on the leader board.

"That personally historic moment did not rattle him, though."

"I was kind of wondering where it was before that," he said.

Before the tournament, Randolph said he had visited with Inman and the other amateurs while practicing on the putting greens.

"It's nice to know someone else is nervous," he said.

How nervous was Inman?

"I felt like I wasn't even breathing on the first hole. Someone turned off the oxygen. After I was off the first tee, I was all right," he said.

"Then I found out my caddy forgot the pin sheet. That's easy to do. I've done the same thing caddyding."

So he was sort of feeling his way around the course but it hardly disturbed Inman, who graduated from the University of North Carolina in December and will turn pro after this tournament.

He described his round hole by hole and after repeating the same phrase — "clipped two feet, made par" — a number of times, he grinned.

"Sounds kind of funny," he said.

The lingering amateur label means little to Inman. He retained that status because, as a member of the 1984 World Amateur team, it was a ticket to the Masters field.

"I feel like a golfer," he said. "They classify you amateur or professional. You have to feel in your gut how well you can play. I feel like a golfer who's maturing with a lot to learn. But I'm ready to move on."

Inman's older brother, Joe, is already on the tour and offered some advice before the Masters started to John.

"He said, 'You'll be nervous, that's to be expected. It's a golf course. Go down there and play,'" Inman said.

"I thought I could."

And that's what he did.

## Burley coaches resign

BURLEY — Burley High School may begin a search for head football and basketball coaches in the wake of resignations by John Billetz and Gary Swan.

The coaches tendered their resignation at the board meeting Wednesday night but the board took no action.

Billetz, who has guided the Bobcats in football for the past four years, called it a coaching career and said he will continue his career in public school administration, not necessarily in Burley.

Swan, who came under some fire from Bobcats fans this past season, probably will seek to remain in coaching in another system but has not ruled out the possibility of remaining on the Burley faculty.

Burley Athletic Director Bob Matthews said Thursday the school hierarchy has not set any plans for filling the positions if they open up.

"This is something that will draw input from several sources," Matthews said. "Right now it would be impossible for me to say whether the sentiment is to fill the positions from within or open it to applicants."

But the coaching telegraph already has begun churning out some names. Likely candidates if the job is filled from within the system will be Steve Jensen, who has been head coach and assistant boys basketball coach at different times for the past few years, and girls head coach Gordon Kerbs.

Billetz came to Burley after a successful football stay at Gooding, leading the Senators to a state runner-up finish. He became vice principal at Burley two years ago and believes his future is best tied to administration.

## Getting down to business

# CSI opens quest for berth in regional tournament

COEUR D'ALENE — Jim Walker, coach of the defending National Junior College Athletic Association champion College of Southern Idaho baseball team, is facing today's Region 10 opener against North Idaho College with a little trepidation.

"I don't think we've played up to expectations," Walker said. "We haven't played up to my expectations. Right now, we're just showing a one-dimensional aspect. We hit somebody we're bringing the ball, but we simply do not adjust to pitchers who throw off-speed."

"We're going to be a team that's going to be the trademark of this team."

The Eagles' 10-10 will face NIC on a 1 p.m. MST twinbill today, then move on to Ontario, Ore., for a Sunday noon double-header against Treasure Valley Community College.

"They're vital," says Walker of this weekend's games. "We should win the ballgames, but that doesn't mean we will."

Under the new playoff system this spring in the expanded Region 10, CSI, NIC, TVCC and Ricks will compete for two berths in the post-season regional tournament in which they will play the top two teams from the

other half of the region — Dixie, Snow, Utah Tech, Eastern Utah and Colorado Northwestern Community College. The winner of the regional tournament advances to a bi-regional "playoff" against the champion of District 1 (the junior colleges of Arizona), with the winner of that game going to the NJCAA World Series in Grand Junction, Colo. Under a rotational system, the northern division champ will host this year's regional playoffs.

Walker, whose charges have been hampered by bad weather and playing fields too wet for play, sees signs of improvement. But he complains that the Eagles are still making mistakes they should have corrected a month ago.

"We do have a lot of games left, but they're important games," he says. "They're not the kind of games that you can afford to make a lot of mistakes."

"The Eagles will open against a Cardinal team that has been struggling. NIC is 10-12 for the season, riding an eight-game losing streak."

"We don't have problems getting the lead, but we have problems holding it," says NIC Coach Jack Blokhum. "Last week we had two outs in the bottom of the ninth and a two-run lead and we ended up losing

the game. Pitching is not our strong point this year."

The Cardinals will be at a further disadvantage due to an injury earlier this week to their No. 2 starter. The Eagles will see sophomore right-hander Jan Cameron (3-2) in the opener, but Blokhum isn't sure who will pitch today's second game.

"For all their pitching woes, North Idaho hasn't had trouble hitting the ball. Sophomore center fielder Kenley Graves is hitting .447, while cleanup hitter Jerry Miller, a sophomore who plays shortstop, carries a .400 average. Right-fielder Leo Francis is hitting .470."

"This is a year that we should be much improved because of the number of kids we had coming back from last year," said Blokhum. "But so far we haven't shown it."

# Holmes to defend title against Spinks

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Larry Holmes said Thursday he will try to break Rocky Marciano's 49-0 record and that his first step toward that goal will be a fight against light-heavyweight champion Michael Spinks.

Holmes said by telephone from his Easton, Pa., office that he had signed to fight Spinks for between \$2.5 and \$3 million, plus "a sum of money for signing." He did not reveal the sum.  
"I might as well go for it," Holmes said. "Everybody is pushing me. I'm talking about 49 and 50, but I'll have to look at the situation after Spinks."

Marciano is the only heavyweight champion to retire without losing a fight.  
Holmes, whose record is 47-0, said he signed a contract with Ringling Events of Palm Beach, Fla., which would promote the fight with Butch Lewis, who represents Spinks.  
Holmes said he did not know if Spinks, who is also undefeated, had signed a contract and wasn't sure of the date or site of the bout. Possibilities include Atlantic City, N.J., or Reno or Las Vegas, Nev.  
Lewis was not immediately available for comment, but the New York Times reported Thursday that

Spinks will earn \$1.5 million for the fight.  
NBC, meanwhile, wants to televise Holmes-Spinks but only during prime time on May 20, said network spokesman Tom Merritt.  
"We're dealing with three promoters. If we can't agree on the May 20 date, we're not interested in another date. We should know where we stand in 24 to 48 hours," Merritt said.  
NBC, which reportedly is prepared to pay more than \$2.5 million for the domestic TV rights to the bout, wants the May 20 date because of the "sweeps" period when ratings are

important to the network.  
Before Holmes stopped David Ben in the 10th round on March 15 in Las Vegas in defense of the International Boxing Federation heavyweight title, he indicated he would announce his retirement on June 9. That day would mark the seventh anniversary of his winning the World Boxing Council title from Ken Norton. Holmes relinquished that title in December 1983.  
The last light heavyweight title attempt to win the heavyweight title was Bob Foster, who challenged Joe Frazier on Nov. 18, 1970. Frazier knocked out Foster in the second round.

# Hagler-Hearns fight means big money

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Promoter Bob Arum said Thursday that the Marvelous Marvin Hagler-Thomas Hearns middleweight title bout could be the biggest money fight ever.  
"It really looks like the advance sales (for closed-circuit television) are bigger than anything ever been before," Arum said.  
"Right now it's positioned to top Holmes-Cooey based on the way tickets sales are and where (the closed-circuit) locations are," he said.  
Arum said the Larry Holmes-Gerry Cooney heavyweight title fight in Las Vegas on June 11, 1982, netted \$22 million and is the biggest money match to date.  
"My feeling is if everything goes

right we could do \$24 million (net), and they (the fighters) would rack up another \$8 million," he said.  
Hagler is guaranteed \$5.6 million and will get 45 percent of all income above a certain figure for his scheduled 12-round title defense Monday night at a 15,000-seat outdoor stadium at Caesars Palace. The fight is sold out, with tickets going for as much as \$500.  
Hearns, the World Boxing Council super welterweight champion, is guaranteed \$5.4 million and 35 percent.  
If the promotion can take in \$24 million, Hagler could end up with \$10.1 million and Hearns \$8.1 million.  
Sugar Ray Leonard earned more than \$10 million against Roberto Duran in their first fight on June 20,

1980, and \$12 million when he stopped Hearns in the 14th round for the undisputed welterweight title on Sept. 16, 1981.  
"It looks now like \$17 million (net) is a clinch, and even if a disaster happens, we won't do less than \$14 million," Arum said.  
"So much of this business depends on the last day," Arum said, noting that past successful closed-circuit TV fights did big business on fight day.  
"The biggest closed-circuit fight was Muhammad Ali-Joe Frazier I (at New York's Madison Square Garden), which brought \$18.5 into the promotion and drew 1.6 million people to the telecast," Arum said.  
He said that much of the revenue for the Holmes-Cooey bout was generated by pay-per-view television.

For Monday night's fight, Arum said, "pay-per-view will be isolated into areas where it was economically feasible or wouldn't hurt the closed-circuit."  
He said pay-per-view will essentially be in the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas.  
As for closed-circuit TV, Arum said, "there are more than 600 locations where more than 3 million seats in the United States and Canada. As of Wednesday, he said, 15,000-seat Boston Garden was sold out and the Capital Centre at Landover, Md., was close to a sellout.  
Arum said one advantage for this fight, from his standpoint, is that he has not had to spend time convincing people it will be competitive, as he did for the Hagler-Roberto Duran fight.

## Gunslingers' paychecks bounce

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A dozen paychecks to San Antonio Gunslingers football players bounced this week, but team officials say they have made good on the checks.

Team General Manager Roger Gill confirmed the checks did not clear the bank after they were issued last week.

But Gill said Wednesday "a large deposit was made today. There is enough money to go into next week and then some. It's been taken care of and everybody seems to be satisfied."

Both the San Antonio Light and The Express-News reported team owner Clinton Manges had obtained a \$10.5 million loan to cover Gunslinger expenses. The loan reportedly was from at least one McAllen bank.

All three of the team's paychecks to date have been either late or they have bounced.

The first payday, the checks were three hours late. The second paycheck and the third was resolved Wednesday, eight days late.

The paycheck situation was resolved just as players called a meeting to consider boycotting their next game against the Jacksonville Bulls Friday.

Gill spoke to the players during the meeting. Afterward, he said, "I told the players that contrary to what they believe, Mr. Manges is doing everything he can to satisfy them."

After the team meeting, quarterback Rick Neuheisel said, "As players, we've decided not to comment on it. We're trying to analyze our options. Anything's possible. These distractions are becoming a daily thing. We're trying to handle it with a sense of humor."

The Gunslingers are due for another paycheck next week.

Gill said management "asked eight players to wait until yesterday to cash their checks because all of the money was not wired through. They were the last ones to receive their checks."

Linebacker Puff Cheate said Gill's remarks to the team convinced players a walkout would damage the United States Football League's image.

"What happened today is that a lot of the guys realized how tough the situation is all over the league," he said. "If we had voted not to play against Jacksonville, that could have been the stone to start things rolling down the hill."

## Stallions lagging in stadium rent

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — The Birmingham Stallions have not paid rent for five games at Legion Field, but the city is not taking any immediate action against the United States Football League team, officials said.

The disclosure of the unpaid bill came as the City Council sought a way to provide the team with \$1 million.

The bills date back to an exhibition game Feb. 16, almost a month before Marvin Warner, the team's majority owner, lost his savings bank in Ohio and six weeks before it was announced that Warner had given up his share in the franchise.

Failure to pay the rent would be a violation of the contract and could permit the Birmingham Park and Recreation Board to seize team property.

However, Mayor Richard Arrington said he had asked the city finance director to hold off until a decision is made on the city's proposal to lend \$1 million to the Alabama State Fair Authority and have it buy shares of the team.

Arrington said he had not been aware of the unpaid rental bills.

"I don't know what we are going to do," said City

Councilman John Katopodis. "If the team goes under we're lost out rent anyways."

"We're just trying to salvage a bad financial situation but a good public relations situation."

He said that support of the team "has to impress" the National Football League, which Birmingham has sought for years to join. The city has received about \$31,000 from Stallions games this year. Under terms of the contract, the park board withholds 16 percent of the revenue from tickets it sells and turns the rest over to the Stallions.

The team then has 10 days to make a full accounting of all tickets sold and send the board its share, minus the 10 percent already withheld.

Arrington said the city has made no commitment to waive the rent.

Nina Miglionico, City Council member and president of the park board, said the board has asked for an accounting "so we know what is supposed to be coming to us." She said she expects that to be done within a week.

Last season, the Stallions paid \$286,443 in rent for nine games plus one playoff game.

# City's ban on night games faces Illinois supreme court

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — The Illinois Supreme Court agreed Thursday to decide the constitutionality of city and state laws that prohibit the Chicago Cubs from playing night baseball at Wrigley Field.

Justices granted a request by Gov. James R. Thompson and others to hear an appeal from a trial court ruling that upheld laws effectively banning night ball at the only major league park in America without lights.

The Cubs sued to have the laws found unconstitutional, saying they discriminated against the National League team. They also argued against the direct appeal to the Supreme Court, saying a speedier resolution might be available by going first to a lower court of appeals.

Cubs General Manager Dallas Green seemed philosophical when asked about Thursday's developments during the Cubs' game at Wrigley with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"What happened today is that a lot of the guys realized how tough the situation is all over the league," he said. "If we had voted not to play against Jacksonville, that could have been the stone to start things rolling down the hill."

Justices ordered a speeded-up schedule for hearing the case and oral arguments for May 31.

Thompson and a neighborhood group asked the high court to take the case now because it would almost certainly hear it eventually. They said the issue needed speedy consideration because the baseball season is under way.

"It would be beneficial for all to have a final resolution by this court sooner rather than later," said lawyers for Thompson in papers filed with the court.

"Given this level of public concern ... an early, final adjudication of this case is certainly in the public interest," they said.

Lawyers for the Cubs argued against the direct appeal, saying the Supreme Court's intractable would not produce a timely decision. However, the hearing set by justices Thursday apparently was sooner than the Cubs thought it would be when they opposed the direct appeal.

The state law applies only to Wrigley Field. Chicago's two other large stadiums — Comiskey Park and Solder Field — are exempt because both held night contests before the measure was passed in 1982.

The 1983 city ordinance prohibits professional sports contests between 8 p.m. and 8 a.m. in open stadiums containing more than 15,000 seats that are located within 500 feet of 100 or more dwelling units.

Residents of the neighborhood surrounding Wrigley Field have complained that their evenings would be disturbed by noise and rowdy behavior by Wrigley's "bleacher bums."

The Cubs, 1984 winners of the National League East Division, complained the state law and city ordinance unfairly singled out Wrigley Field.

## Ripkens' streak may come to end

BALTIMORE (AP) — Cal Ripken Jr. doesn't want to think about the day his streak of 444 consecutive games with the Baltimore Orioles comes to an end. It may, however, be quickly approaching.

It is still unclear whether a sprained ankle will sideline the team's star shortstop for Friday's game against the Toronto Blue Jays. Ripken suffered the injury in the third inning of Wednesday's game with the Texas Rangers, won by the Orioles 7-1.

If Ripken does play in Friday's game against Toronto, he'll pass first baseman Eddie Murray for second place on the Orioles all-time consecutive game list and pull within 18 games of former third baseman Brooks Robinson. Ripken also has a streak of playing in 4,009 consecutive innings.

"I don't want to sit and have someone else do my job. Heck, I remember back when I played basketball and soccer. I hated to be substituted for," he said.

Orioles Manager Joe Altobelli said he decided to go along with Ripken's decision to finish Wednesday's game.

"If I was him, the streak would mean a lot to me, too," Altobelli said. "But the important thing is how (Ripken's playing) affects the team. He knows the (the streak) has to come to an end sometime. And I'm the guy who inevitably has to sit him down."

"But hey, I'm the guy who released Palmer and Singleton and Bumbry," Altobelli said. "It's a dark, lonely job."

## The public wins in student art show

TWIN FALLS -- The jury has reached its decision on the annual College of Southern Idaho Student Art Exhibition, and it appears that once again the public comes out the winner.

In what art instructor Mike Green calls "getting a taste of the real world," many CSI students had to carry off their cherished artwork Wednesday afternoon because it was juried out of the show, while others gathered in the Herrett Museum Gallery to hear a critique by jurors DI and Aldrich Bowler, the owners of Snake River Pottery near Bliss.

Moving rapidly through each of the 67 accepted works, the Bowlers explained what in

their opinion were the strong points of each. They pointed out that, in judging, they were looking for mystery, curiosity, originality, statement, technique and argument. Awards of merit and judge's comments were given to Ken Carey, TI, Mary Cook, June Carey, Agnes Schubert, Tori Pratt and Joan Fay.

Ken Carey's acrylic, "Wheat Fields," drew this response from the judges: "Raising the horizon so high and accenting the sky gives a sense of the transitional and strengthens the hyperbole of color and form so the ripe fields are more than ripe fields." Cook's "Forgotten Beginnings" was cited because, "The watercolor technique is excellent and the rendering as well as the title excite the viewer to imagine the rest of the farm -- the split-level ranch house -- the satel-

lite dish, the Chrysler Imperial -- the yard full of machinery."

June Carey's acrylic, "Fat Years," won judge's approval because it "started with an idea which has been fully developed," while Schubert's hand-made paper, "Separate Ways," was noted because, "The many textures and colors make up a thoroughly pleasing composition."

Pratt's splatter of four thin streaks caused the judges to be "intrigued by the mystery the photo invokes. Who are the black suited men? What are they doing?" And, Fay's high-fire porcelain, "Punch Bowl," was called "An idea which lots of potters have beautifully explored."

Honorable mention was given to Elizabeth James for a photo and for her pottery, "Raku Jar." Others receiving honorable mention

were Virginia Carter for the hand-made paper, "Fiancino," Mary Hennig for her acrylic, "Asad," Agnes Schubert for "Cookie Jar," Katie Wright for her bronze sculpture, "Face of the Moon," Keith Earnsworth for his bronze, "Rhino," and Mar Briles for "Rawhide Tepee."

Though Green feels that exposing the students to jury criticism "can be a little painful," he says, "It's good experience for them." Ninety percent of the time, jurors pick what we would pick, but the students need to hear another opinion," he says.

An opening reception for the exhibit is slated for 7 p.m., April 16 at the Herrett. Regular museum hours are from 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday; 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, and from 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday. Admission is free.

## Africa album soars

### Benefit record hits chart high

LOS ANGELES (AP) -- "We Are The World," the charity album to fight hunger in Africa and America, started at No. 9 on Billboard magazine's pop albums chart, "roaring its way to No. 1," an editor said. "A debut at No. 9 is incredible -- particularly so, when you consider that not all the dealers who sold had the album," said Tom Noonan, an editor at Billboard.

Noonan said the last previous album to debut at No. 9 was Bruce Springsteen's "Born In The USA," in June 1984. That album quickly went to No. 1, and "hasn't been out of the top four for 44 weeks," Noonan said.

Other top-selling albums, such as Michael Jackson's "Thriller," and Prince and the New Power Generation's "Love Symbol Album," started at the No. 11 spot, Noonan said.

"It's easy to say it's headed for No. 1. It's roaring to the top," Noonan said of "We Are The World." The album was certified gold, meaning 500,000 copies were sold, on the first week it was shipped.

"I don't remember any album being certified gold that quickly," Noonan said. "Now, they're way over a million shipped -- probably 1.5 million," he said. A million sales means a platinum certification by the Recording Industry Association of America.

The album contains the USA for Africa single "We Are The World" and songs contributed by such artists as Springsteen and the E Street Band, Prince and the New Power Generation, Huey Lewis and the News, the Pointer Sisters, Chicago, Tina Turner, and Northern Lights, a group of Canadian artists including Neil Young and Joni Mitchell.

The single "We Are The World," written by Jackson and Lionel Richie, took the No. 1 spot on Billboard's "Hot 100" chart last week. The most recent #1 single, "I Wanna Dance with Somebody," by Belafonte, Cyndi Lauper, Billy Joel, the Pointer Sisters and Dionne Warwick.

The charity album and single are part of a package put together by music promoter Ken Kragen that includes music and documentary videos, posters, T-shirts and other promotional items.

So far, the campaign has grossed \$16 million for the hunger relief effort, Kragen and Co. spokesman Steve Warnick said Tuesday.

## Networks already considering new series for fall TV season

HOLLYWOOD -- Even as the prime-time TV season continues to unfold, with "Dallas" and "Dynasty" building toward their cliffhangers, the networks are deep at work planning the 1985-86 season that starts in September.

What will it bring? "We won't know for sure for another month, when, with great flourish, ABC, CBS and NBC unveil their fall schedules, purging themselves of the old, the weak and the unwatched and replacing them with the untried, untested and therefore promising."

But invariably most of these new series won't live up to the hype. Viewers will shake their heads: "Was that the best they can come up with?"

Now you can judge for yourself, from this rundown of pilots that the networks are considering for the fall schedule.

characters may prove permanent; the major "Dynasty" stars certainly will make guest appearances. The show won't debut in September but instead will be spun out of a new "Dynasty" story line a month or two later.

"The Twilight Zone" -- CBS has

asked Philip DeGuere, creator and executive producer of "Simon & Simon," to "breathe the new life into one of TV's classic shows. Each hour-long episode will contain up to three stories, most of them remakes from the original but some new. The first show done uses stories by Arthur C. Clarke, Stephen King and Ray Bradbury."

"Spielberg's Amazing Stories" -- This half-hour anthology series is being produced for NBC by Steven Spielberg, who got his first directing job on "Night Gallery." This supposedly will have family appeal and feature a wide variety of stories, many from Amazing Stories magazine.

"Slingshot" -- Stephen J. Cannell, co-creator of "The A-Team" and "Hiptide," has been given a 13-episode order by NBC for a series about a mysterious crime fighter (Nick Mancuso) who drives a super-charged Corvette. (Familiar?) For his trouble, the hero asks only that the people he helps promise to do a favor for him in the future; he then cashes in on these favors to solve future cases.

"All Is Forgiven" -- NBC has ordered 13 episodes of this comedy

series from the creators of "Cheers." Bass Armstrong is a woman juggling the demands of a new job as producer of a TV soap opera and her home life, where she has just acquired a teenage stepdaughter from her husband's first marriage.

"Golden Girls" -- Creators and producers of "Soap," "Benson" and the new ABC series "Fall to the Chief" are producing a comedy for NBC about three women living out their retirement years in Miami. They share a home and have a gay houseman. Already cast are Betty White and Rue McClanahan.

Several shows also have been given a green light for midseason:

"Dark Mansions" -- ABC execs didn't want to launch two serials at once, what with the "Dynasty" spinoff planned for the fall, so this was put off a bit. Loretta Young, who hasn't appeared on a TV series in 24 years, will portray the mother of L.L. da Purl and Melissa Sue Anderson. The theme is centered around the fight between two brothers for control of their late father's shipping empire. This will feature aspects of the recent "Blackie's Magic" -- Hal Linden portrays a magician who, when he isn't busy clashing with his father and

ex-wife, uses his skills to solve crimes.

NBC plans to announce its fall schedule May 2. ABC is shooting for May 6 and CBS has targeted May 10 as its release date.

A handful of the pilots that don't make the September lineup will nonetheless be activated and put on the bench, to be brought in as needed during the season. (CBS did that this season with "Crazy Like a Fox," which looks certain to be renewed for another year.) Others may be sent back to the production company for reworking and recasting. Most, however, will quietly be played off during the summer and laid to rest.

The candidates:

DRAMAS:

ABC: "Brothers in Law" -- Mac Davis and Joe Cortese star as partners in a salvage business who used to be married to sisters. Action-adventure. Worth keeping an eye on for the simple reason that writer-producer Stephen J. Cannell has sold every pilot he's made since forming his production company in 1979. "Spenser: For Hire" -- Robert

Urich is the Boston-based detective from the novels of Robert Parker. ABC says this would feature "harder" characters than such shows. Pilot written and produced by John Wilder, former producer of "Streets of San Francisco."

"Hollywood Beat" -- "Miami Vice" moves west. Cop show from Aaron Spelling Productions about two officers (Tom Seaton, Jay Acovoni) who deal with the weirdos, lowlives and hustlers of Hollywood. (No; they are not assigned to the show-business beat. Don't be sarcastic!)

"Braker" -- "Odd Couple" cops Carl Weathers (as a tough, experienced A. policeman) and newcomer (Joseph Bottoms) still sporting the polish of an East Coast prep school. "Magycyber" -- Action-adventure show about an adventurer (Richard Dean Anderson) willing to tackle seemingly impossible challenges. "Northstar" -- ABC, with unusual candor, calls this a 1985 version of "The \$6 Million Man." Greg Evigan is an astronaut who, while on a space walk, was exposed to a solar explosion and acquired superhuman powers. "J.O.E. and Michael" -- Another

 secret agent team. The gimmick is that Michael, a scientist, created J.O.F. from a test tube. J.O.E. was supposed to be the Army's ultimate fighting machine but Michael gave him a conscience so he could judge right from wrong. Now they hire out as a team, to the government and private citizens.

**"Triple Cross"** — From the producers of "Call to Glory" comes a mystery series involving three former police officers (Ted Wass, Markle Post and Gary Swanson) who are now wealthy and get involved in crime-solving just for the fun of competing with one another.

**"Family Chasers"** — Who you gonna call? Kenneth Johnson, producer-director of the original "V" and "The Incredible Hulk," teams with Brian Grazer, the producer of "Splash," on a tongue-in-cheek look at supernatural phenomena.

**"Family Honor"** — Not your typical family drama, this contrasts the lives of two conflicting clans: One a family with three generations of cops, the other involved in organized crime. Their fates become entangled when a son from the organized crime family falls in love with a daughter from the cop family.

**"Dark Horse"** — Shades of "Miami Vice": Action show about a white reporter (Nick Campbell) and his black, street-smart assistant (Stoney Jackson), who investigate stories by going undercover.

**"In Like Flynn"** — Jenny Seagrove portrays a novelist who travels the world in search of adventures that she can incorporate into her books. But in "Remington Steele" like twist, she writes under a pseudonym and passes herself off as the fictitious author's editor.

**"Generation"** — A family drama set in the year 2000, which theoretically will allow the producers to tell traditional stories about the future while also looking at what life might be like 15 years from now.

**"Fifty-Five-Three-Street"** — Robert Wagner goes after yet another series success in an action-adventure show that will incorporate elements of his real life — namely, the problems of a widower raising two daughters.

**CBS:**  
**"I Had Three Wives"** — Detective show whose "eternally" romantic hero (Victor Garber) is frequently helped by his three ex-wives, who, conveniently, happen to be a reporter, a lawyer and an actress — with Shanna Reed, Teri Copley and Maggie Cooper.

**Solomon's Universe"** — Action-adventure about a think-tank researcher (Telly Savalas) who forms a high-tech "Mission: Impossible" team of experts recruited from the fields of science, medicine and other specialties to fight crime and social evils.

**"On the Road"** — Hoping to tap into some of the country's resurgent patriotism, this "fantasy adventure" (says CBS) stars Janet Leigh and Harry Guardino as a married couple who retire and explore the nation from a mobile home.

**"D&B: Steel Collar Man"** — Dave Thomas (one of the Mackenzie Brothers from "SCTV") wrote the pilot for this sort-of action-adventure chase show about a supercharged robot Charles Rocket, who runs away from his military creators and teams up with truck driver Hoyt Axton.

**"Murphy's Law"** — Described by CBS as a "risky new form" of programming, this series has Barry Newman as an assistant district attorney who would have each of his cases played out in miniseries style over four to six episodes.

**"The Equalizer"** — "The concept of this," says CBS, "is basically 'Dirty Harry' with a heart of gold." A tough action show starring Edward Woodward as an ex-government official who runs his own agency to help people achieve justice.

**"Dirty Work"** — A young woman (Kerrie Keane) searching for the perfect 1980s career goes to work for a "wired" and supposedly dead private investigator (Louie Giambalvo), handling "offbeat cases out of the Valley." Dorian Harewood is a policeman.

**"Brass"** — Carroll O'Connor returns to the tube, this time as New York City's chief of detectives. Ah, but he's no deskman and still gets involved in the toughest cases. Other characters: Boss Vincent Gardenia, sister Anita Gillette who is a nun and runs a shelter.

**NBC:**  
**"The Covenant"** — NBC, which has yet to develop a successful nighttime soap like "Dallas" and "Dynasty," tries again with gothic tales of a strange, powerful San Francisco family with sisters vying for control over the supernatural forces that reside in the clan. "Champion" — Duncan Regehr, who portrayed Errol Flynn in the January TV biography, is another swashbuckler, a daring crime fighter who masquerades as an eccentric New York inventor of "semi-useless gadgets."

**"Point Blank"** — How do you adapt "Death Wish" to the tube without provoking more protests about vigilante justice? You have the hero work with the cops. And so it is that John Loughlin decides to track down the people who murdered his wife and son and other criminals.

**"Suburban Beat"** — Creators of CBS' "Scarecrow" and "Mrs. King" have come up with a variation: Instead of a housewife caught up in battling bad guys, why not four? Dee Wallace, Shelley Fabres, Patty Austin and Heather Langenkamp star.

# 'Police Academy II' pulls in top Easter receipts

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — The holiday weekend meant lower box office receipts for most films, but the redoubtable "Beverly Hills Cop" showed its strength by seizing more than \$3 million and edging toward the \$200 million mark.

The Eddie Murphy comedy by Paramount attracted \$3 million on 1,070 screens last weekend for a total gross of \$199.8 million after 18 weeks. It came in fourth at the box office.

The revenue leader for the second week in a row was Warner Bros.' "Police Academy 2, Their First Assignment," with \$8.6 million in receipts on 1,613 screens for a \$23.8 million two-week gross.

"Mask," starring Cher, remained in second place with \$4.5 million on 1,023 screens compared to \$4.8 million the previous weekend at only 839 screens. The movie grossed \$20 million in its first five weeks.

"The Last Dragon," in third place, took in \$3.4 million at 1,037 screens compared to \$3.1 million the previous weekend at 1,039 theaters. The TriStar film has grossed \$9.8 million in three weeks.

In fifth place was "Porky's Revenge," a 20th Century-Fox release that collected \$2.6 million at 1,339 screens over the weekend for a three-week total of \$15.4 million.

"Friday the 13th, Part V, A New Beginning," dropped from a \$4 million take and third place the previous weekend to a \$2.5 million gross and sixth place this past weekend. The Paramount horror film has grossed \$17.7 million in three weeks.

Paramount's "Witness" starring Harrison Ford improved its standing in the box office race from 10th to seventh-place and increased its weekend take to \$2.4 million on only 895 screens. The film has grossed almost \$50 million in nine weeks.

Disney's dinosaur movie called "Baby" came in 10th, grossing \$1.8 million on 1,277 screens for a total of \$11 million in its three weeks of release.

# 'King David' a failure despite a gallant effort

## Film review

"**KING DAVID**" is a valiant effort by Paramount Pictures to recapture the Biblical glory of Cecil B. DeMille, the studio's late, great moneymaker.

The effort is valiant but unavailing, possibly because of a change in public taste, possibly because of miscalculated casting.

The saga has been treated on the screen before; notably in Henry King's sensuous "David and Bathsheba" (1951) with Gregory Peck and Susan Hayward in the title roles. The new version, directed by Bruce Beresford ("Breaker Morant," "Tender Mercies") and written by Andrew Birkin and James Costigan, tries to portray the entire sweep of David's life, from his beginnings as a shepherd boy to his death after a 40-year reign.

The tales familiar to every Sunday school pupil are there: the battle with Goliath; the feud with King Saul; the troubles with his Absalom; the shameful affair with Bathsheba. If

anything, the filmmakers evidence a slavish adherence to the scripture, sacrificing dramatic values that DeMille never overlooked.

The script writers, however, could not resist this kind of line: "Samson, I would be obliged if you would stay away from those pillars."

Beresford's approach to "King David" appears to be aimed at interpreting the story in realistic terms. The tone is set in the first minutes when the prophet Samuel assails King Saul's consideration for the captured Amalekite king whom Samuel summarily beheads. The king's is only the first hint to be held aloft.

A film with the sweep of "King David" requires a bravura player such as Peck or Charlton Heston at its center. Richard Gere does not qualify. Some actors simply do not fit into period movies — Paul Newman is still trying to live down his debut in "The Silver Chalice."

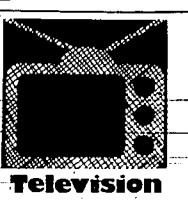
# 'Space' inspires once it's off the ground

James A. Michener's "Space" (beginning on CBS Sunday night and running through Thursday) is much like a NASA moon capsule — the higher it gets, the faster it goes.

Which is by way of saying that if the audience can make it past the first sluggish three hours of "Space," they're in for a rare and often wonderful treat. In the next four nights, the 13-hour program, based on Michener's book, and brought to home screens for \$13 million, was filmed in Houston, Cape Canaveral, England, Maryland, Los Angeles, San Diego and Washington, D.C. In generous detail, it presents the story of this country's beleaguered space program, from the end of World War II, when the U.S. government began secretly recruiting German rocket scientists, until the moon landings in the early 1970s.

The events of these years, underscored by authentic newsreel footage, to a large degree determine the lives of the leading characters, who embody all the varying attitudes and moods, the clashing politics and rapidly changing styles of three vital decades of our history. Most of the principals' lives touch on each other: Stanley Mott (Bruce Dern), an engineer and professor, is the recruiter of German rocket scientists.

one of whom is Dieter Koff (Michael York). Commander Norman Grant (James Garner), a World War II naval hero with political ambitions, gets only discouragement from his socialite wife (Susan Anspach), who seems incapable of happiness. John Pope (Harry Hamlin) and Penny Hardesty (Blair Brown) are high school lovers; he wants a career in the Navy, and she vows to stand by his side all the way. And Martin Scorsella (David Dukes) is the all-campus smart: caught selling exam answers, he weasels out of punishment by threatening to publicize the fact that he's been sleeping with the dean's daughter.

Essentially, that's Part I, which follows the narrative thread of the Michener book. In introducing a large group of characters on an almost impossibly wide canvas, director Joseph Sargent (who did Parts I and V; Lee Philips directed II, III and IV) and writers Stirling Silliphant and Dick Berg seem to have choked on the horns of their rush to get to the main course. There are no real grabbers in the first three hours. One sees, instead, a lot of marching, slouting Nazis who seem on loan from other movies. Another distraction: Michael York, who isn't a Nazi, doesn't seem an authentic German, either. His accent is dreadful, and so is that of Barbara Sukowa, who plays his lover. But she is really German.

Of more concern are the many interchangeable bedroom scenes featuring York and Sukowa, Hamlin and Brown, Garner and Anspach with much heat and no electricity. It almost seems as though the creators are convinced that young people never have anything interesting to say to each other and only laugh after being tickled; that is, wit and humor don't exist for most of them. What Berg-Silliphant-Sargent have overlooked is that boring young people don't grow up to be interesting adults, except in unconvincing

dramas. A brilliant exception is David Dukes, who is always better than any part he plays — (unfortunately, his character here is incidental). Complaining to his lover (Christina Pickles of "St. Elsewhere"), he says, "I'm impatient with the world. I'm making no impact on it." Next he announces he is changing his name from Martin Scorsella to Leopold Strabismus, because "Strabismus means uncontrollable blinking." One wishes for more outlandish like this. Another electric moment: Newsreel shots of movie stars entertaining the troops during World War II.

Beginning Monday night with Part II, it's time to break out the popcorn. The war is over. Dern, whose always intelligent performance seems to pair the morals of a missionary with the pragmatism of a pirate, has gotten his group of German scientists over to the United States. Garner decides to run for the Senate, and Anspach is opposed to this. She comments, "... of all human endeavors, I consider politics the most demeaning." (Off-camera, Anspach says, "The tragedy of this woman is that she was one of many girls of that time who were molded by their husbands and couldn't get out of the mold.")

Blair Brown, one sees early on, is not going to be such a woman. When Hamlin enlists in the Navy, she volunteers for Garner's senatorial campaign. And David Dukes opens a business called "Universal Space Associates," which sells fake diplomas. Dern has problems with citizens objecting to his group of Germans, not to mention that the FBI wants to deport York. "Without them the scientists," Dern says, "we are standing absolutely naked in space." To the frequent strains of Glenn Miller's "In the Mood" (surely folks in the '40s occasionally danced to something else), we get rooted in this era. Garner is now a senator, and Blair, his aide, has enough influence

to get Hamlin into Annapolis. As the years move on, Blair and Hamlin get married. She becomes a lawyer, and he, a Navy flier. In Part III, the audience meets Beau Bridges, as a fellow pilot, in a performance of such perfection that it's a real flier. (Of course, Bridges says he patterned his performance after astronaut Richard Gordon, who served as one of the film's technical advisors.)

With the launching of Sputnik, the United States intensifies its space program. Hamlin and Bridges are accepted as astronauts and, in several of the following scenes, there is a superficial resemblance to the film, "The Right Stuff." (Hamlin recently said that in researching his role, "I talked to a number of astronauts who didn't like 'The Right Stuff' film because it pictures scientists and politicians as buffoons, and they weren't. They were the ones who created and supported the program.")

In Part V, Dukes is now a famous TV evangelist married to the Senator's daughter; his influence is such that he can guarantee a politician's election, but Garner still refuses to associate with him publicly. Much else goes on in the domestic scene, but, clearly, the star of this final section is a flight to the dark side of the moon by the Apollo 18. (Special effects are so stunning and realistic that astronaut Gordon claims some of the NASA people couldn't always tell the difference between the effects and the authentic footage used in the film.) There is triumph and tragedy on the moon, and the film's end is a rousing, old-fashioned, tearful ceremony, with planes flying overhead. The cumulative effect is so strong that the viewer may want to see "Space" all over again — starting with Part II.

## Loretta Young pulls out of planned serial

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Loretta Young, citing "creative differences," has withdrawn from her role in the family matrilian in "Dark Mansions," an ABC movie and projected series, a spokesman for the actress said Thursday.

The Academy Award-winning actress had been due to complete her retirement to begin work on the two-hour movie on April 22. The movie goes into production on April 15.

"Loretta Young will not be rendering services because of creative differences over the story," her agent, James Brokaw of the William Morris Agency said in a statement.

"The parting between Miss Young and (producer) Aaron Spelling was amiable despite the story differences," the statement said.

Miss Young had been scheduled to play the role of Margaret Drake, the matriarch of a Seattle shipping family in "Dark Mansions," a contemporary Gothic drama.

There was no immediate word from either Aaron Spelling Productions or ABC who would replace Miss Young in the role.

"It's true that we had creative differences over the way her character was developing," Spelling said in a statement released by a spokesman, David Horowitz. "She's a great star and a great friend and I hope she always remains both."

Miss Young won a best actress Oscar in 1948 for "The Farmer's Daughter." She was the star of 94 motion pictures and the creator, producer and star of "The Loretta Young Show" in the 1950s.

Miss Young had been scheduled to work eight days out of the four-week shooting schedule.

The movie, a pilot for an ABC prime-time soap opera, also stars Michael York, who would make his series debut, Linda Purl, Paul Shenar, Melissa Sue Anderson, Raymond St. Jacques and Dan O'Herlihy. Miss Young's last television work was "It Happens Every Thursday" in 1983. She then took the unprecedented step of retiring from films to produce and star in "The Loretta Young Show" on television. She won three Emmy awards as best dramatic actress in 1954, 1956 and 1958. She was also nominated five other times. The anthology show ran on NBC from 1953 to 1961. In the 1962-63 season she starred on NBC in a dramatic show called "The New Loretta Young Show."

# UB40 brings reggae music to forefront

NEW YORK (AP) — They were dark with rasta-farian looks and blond and ruddy. Together they dipped, danced, talked, sang, beat on congas, blew trombones and gave a stomping, screaming crowd at the Beacon Theater what wanted — reggae music.

For UB40, a band that plays a brand of reggae with pop appeal, the idea is simple. As keyboardist Michael Virtue tells it: "Once everyone hears it, that's all they ever want to hear is reggae music."

"When we were growing up, reggae music was so different than anything else. Everyone else was listening to the Beatles and the Rolling Stones," Virtue said in an interview. "You had to understand it, it had its own language. ... It was an underground thing. ... It was something more; it was something better."

Back in Birmingham, England, in 1978, Virtue and seven other schoolmates from an industrial London suburb — James Brown, Ali Campbell, Earl Falconer, Norman Hassan, Brian Travers, Robin Campbell and Astro — felt that not enough people had access to reggae music. They thought it was a form of music that should be as much part of everyday listening as pop or jazz.

So with a lot of enthusiasm and little musical knowledge, they decided to pick up some instruments and play reggae music. They took their name from the reference number on an



from a racially mixed family — father is Jamaican and his mother is Irish.

"It's hard to explain to people who don't come from multi-racial areas that don't have the access that we did. I believe that 10 years ago we heard more reggae than most people hear today," he said.

"Though UB40's music owe a lot to its Jamaican roots, it definitely has its own sound. Some of the difference comes from high-tech recording, and some from blending white voices with traditionally black music. Virtue denies charges that they are corrupting the pure reggae sound, and said his band takes reggae basics and fur-

thers them with its own contribution.

"We could go out and try and copy what Jamaican musicians do, but we'd rather try to give our own experience which no one else can — the experience of growing up in Birmingham and playing reggae music," he said. "(Reggae) can't stay a Jamaican-sounding sound all the while. It's got to move on."

UB40, which ranges in age from 25 to 30, has worked hard at mastering their music, combining drums, horns, guitars, keyboards and bass. The present musical strength of the band belies the fact that they haven't been at it all that long.

On a recent warm day in Central Park before performing at one of two sold-out New York shows, Virtue lounged on the grass, awed but elated by the success of the band's first North American tour.

Lighting up his last Silk Cut, he said: "We come from a very working class background. It's really a shock to any of us that we can achieve something in the music business."
