# Set clocks ahead hour tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) - It's time to save some daylight, by turning the clock ahead an

hours.

Daylight-saving time takes effect across most of the nation at 2 a.m. Sunday.

Most Americans, though, will probably reset their clocks fore retiring Saturday night.

The clock-should-be-set ahead by an hour, meaning that 2 a.m., for example, becomes 3 a.m.!

The change, instituted during: World War I to save energy used for lighting in the evening, now has the effect of providing extra daylight for golf, tennis, barbecues and other recreational pursuits.

That lost hour of sleep will be returned Oct. 27.

# Senate balks at bitburg visit

WASHINGTON — The Senate asked President Reagan on Friday to reassess his plan to lay a wreath at the German military cemetery at Bitburg near the graves of 49 of Adolf Hitler's SS elite.

Instead, the resolution — co-sponsored by 82 senators — said Reagan should visit a symbol of German-democracy and honor "the memories of the millions of innoent civilians and hundreds of thousands of American and akied soldiers who suffered and died at the hands of the Nazis."

Several Rey Senators said the resolution, which passed on a voice vote, is a clear message to West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl to relieve Reagan of his commitment to visit Bitburg, a pledge that they said is severely damaging U.S.-West German relations.

Reagan has so far refused to cancel the trip on his own and Kohl has praised as "noble" his determination to go ahead with it.

# GOP dodges vote on spending cuts

WASHINGTON — Senate Republican leaders, short on support, flinched for the second straight day. Friday rather than permit a test vote on a \$52 billion package of spending cuts for 1986 that would curtail many politically popular domestic' programs, including Social Security. "I'm still optimistic," Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan, told reporters, as President Reagan lobbled reluctant Republicans in person and on the telephone to raily enough support to sustain a symbolic vote of approval before any amendments are considered. "Our strategy is to pass a budget resolution with \$300 billion in deficit reduction," Dole added, although he said no vote would be held before Tuesday.

## Viet family saved by a bottle

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A Vietnamese refugee family arrived in the Upited States on Friday to a tearful welcome from an American couple whose message in a bottle floated 9,000 miles to the shores of Thailand and answered a prayer for freedom.

Hoa Van Nguyen, 31, a former South Vietnamese soldier, tod reporters through an interpreter that he's "the most lucky man in the world." He said he doesn't know why what he called "a sixth sense" prompted him to pick up the bottle carrying the message from John Henry Peckham and his wife.

Nguyen traveled from Singapore with his wife, Joang Kim, 27, their 16-month-old son and Nguyen's 17-year-old brother, Cuong Van.



# Pathologist sees discrepancy in Arbaugh wounds

BOISE (AP) — There are a number of possible explanations for the discrepancy between the number of entry wounds and the number of exit. wounds and slugs recovered from the builet-riddled body of a Jerome County woman mar

Robert Ramsey, who conducted an autopsy on the body of Marilyn Arbaugh the day after her death, testified Friday at the first-degree murder trial of Jamie Charboneau, 25.

The Jerome man is accused of gunning down the 36-year-old Ms. Arbaugh, his ex-wife, at the woman's rural Jerome County home on July 1.

Charboneau also faces charges of grand theft and kidnapping in connection with a complaint fled by Ms. Arbaugh several days before her leath

death.

Ramsey's autopsy of Ms. Arbaugh showed that 16 bullets entered her body, but that only 15 slugs or exit wounds could be found, he said.

To account for the difference, Ramsey said he might simply have overlooked one of the exit wounds, or two of the bullets might have left the body through the same hole.


Other explanations included the possibility that one of the bullets fragmented before it struck the body, thus causing multiple entry

wounds, or a builet could have broken up after entering the body. Ramsey said in that case, tiny fragments might not be detected. He said it also was possible that Ms. Arbaugh coughed up a builet lodged in her throat before she died, or that one of the shells passed through her body and ricocheted back in, causing another entry wound.

In addition, Ramsey said a 17th builet that grazed the woman's arm may have penetrated her body somewhere else, accounting for one extra entry. He said a builet that went through her hand also could be responsible for making a second entry wound.



Stallings won this time by 170 votes, but his spending increased from \$117,000 to more than \$207,000. Even so, he paid out \$20,000 less than Hansen, whose 1982 campaign budget was \$186,000. Hansen received about \$74,000 in PAC contributions, while Stallings attracted PAC durations of more than \$147,000. Hansen said he ended the campaign with \$1,222 left over, while Stallings reported an unspent \$393.

There was more modest spending in Idaho's other House race.
Incumbent Republican Larry Craig, who picked up nearly 69 percent of the vote, spent \$250,000, compared to the \$372,000 he spent in
1982. His opponent, Bill Hellar, raised \$43,000.



# Fish & Game-fended off worst proposals in last Legislature

There was a lot of cheering and booing as the last Idaho legislative circus staged a match between timber interests and the game department.

If you'll remember, the Fish and Game Department was under attack by north Idaho legislators who objected to the department's powifierness stand.

The department made enemies in logging country when it continued to favor enough wilderness to protect wildlife populations.

As a result, some legislators introduced measures that would have crippled the game department by placing it under the Legislature.

Other legislators would have banned the department from commenting on timber sales. Still others would have diverted the

newly-established big game winter feeding fund to grasshopper control.
I'm happy to report that the game department won every battle.
And in the meantime, legislators passed several measures that will benefit hunting—and fishing in Idaho.
First, Sen. Laird Noh R-Kimberly, managed to drart and win approval for a new antipoaching law in Idaho.
That bill makes commercial poaching a felony upon the second conviction in five

years. It also boosts maximum fines to \$1,000 per conviction for bighorn sheep, mountain goat, moose and elk poaching and boosts maximum fines to \$500 for poaching deer,—antelope, wild-turkey, whistling awan, sturgeon and chinook salimon.

More importantly, the legislation created minimum fines for poaching those animals, so that a big game poaching conviction will cost you at least 200 in addition to the civil penalities.

The concept of a minimum fine for poaching in Idaho is a new one, and it makes larroads—against the "needed the meat" defense commonly offered by poachers. You see, poachers have escaped serious punishment by claiming they "needed the meat" or their families in some court cases. And whether he needed the meat or not, a man with a hungry family should be out look-

try to make ends meet on food stamps, unemployment benefits and federal farm sub-

Another important measure which made it into law is an additional tax on out-of-staters. The game department plans to make inno-cent vacationers, Californians and Utah resints pay up to \$5 more for out-of-state fishing

licenses.
The game department will use the expected \$290,000 from the additional fee to match expanded federal funding for urban fishing programs and access sites.
Meanwhile, every measure designed to prevent the game department from doing its job—that of protecting and managing the state's wildlife — died before getting to the governor.

There's a dual message in this.

First of all, we know that same key legislators continue to support the game department's role.

And second, we know that many legislators want to see the department in chains.

Consider the bill which would have required the department to submit its management plans to the legislature for approval. The bill passed the house, but was held in the Senate Resources and Environment Committee.

That may be a victory to you, but the fact that such a measure actually passed the house worries me.



There are several ways that will lead to the sure defeat of today's agame; there is only one way that offers some chance for the game to make. But unless that play is made with confidence, the defenders will fail to take the bait.

South wins the first heart and studies his options. If he establishes his longest suit, the opponents will continue hearts and South will take only eight tricks. (After East plays the heart inneat trick one, West will unblock the suit.)

If South plans on two spade finesses, the defense does even better. South will then lose three hearts, one spade, one diamond and rubt for down two.
