Senate balks at Bitburg visit

WASHINGTON — The Senate asked President Reagan on Friday to reassess his plan to lay a wreath at the German military cemetery at Bitburg near the graves of 49 of Adolf Hitler's SS elite.

Instead, the resolution — co-sponsored by 82 senators — said Reagan should visit a symbol of German democracy and honor "the memories of the millions of innocent civilians and hundreds of thousands of American and allied soldiers who suffered and died at the hands of the Nazis."

Several key senators said the resolution, which passed on a voice vote, is a clear message to West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl to relieve Reagan of his commitment to visit Bitburg, a pledge that they said is severely damaging U.S.-West German relations.

Reagan has so far refused to cancel the trip on his own and Kohl has praised as "noble" his determination to go ahead with it.

There was a hint, meanwhile, that the White House may be considering a change of plan.

Sen. Alfonse M. D'Amato, R-N.Y., said after a talk with White House chief of staff Donald Regan that, "I am convinced there are ongoing efforts to attempt to deal with that situation."

"It's easier said than done," D'Amato added. "If I were to go further, I might jeopardize that and the White House would feel compelled to deny any attempt."

Sen. Paula Hawkins, R-Fla., who was also at the White House, told reporters, "I think the entire responsibility rests on Chancellor Kohl and I am sure that when he sees the names that were on the resolution that was voted on today in the Senate that he will suggest an alternative site."

On Thursday, 257 House members sent a letter to Kohl urging him to withdraw the Bitburg invitation. A House vote on a resolution urging Reagan to reconsider the visit is scheduled for Monday.

One of the co-sponsors of the Senate resolu-

tion, Majority Leader Robert Dole of Kansas, told the chamber "the record is clear that this is not an effort to jump on the president."

"It's an expression of the Senate that we should pay homage to the memories of the millions of civilians and the American and Allied soldiers who suffered and died at the hands of the Nazis," said Dole, who was wounded severely during World War II. "We want reconciliation. The German people have been our friends."

But other senators denounced the planned visit in harsh terms and Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., said that in going to Bitburg, Reagan will effect honoring the SS whom he called "the lowest and vilest of criminals."

Citizens may pull invitation

BONN, West Germany — The mayor of Bitburg said Friday that the town's citizens are "scandalized and dismayed" by the furor over President Reagan's plan to visit their soldiers' cemetery, and might cancel the visit themselves.

"Our people find unbearable the gushing forth of abuse and slander on our city, and especially on the soldiers lying in the cemetery," Mayor Theo Hallet said in an interview with ZDF television's weekly afternoon feature show "TeleIllustrierte."

"If it continues like this, then it would be better if we would cancel ourselves the visit of the American president and our chancellor," the mayor said.

Reagan has planned to lay a wreath at the cemetery May 5 during a state visit to West Germany, but what he intended as a gesture of reconciliation 40 years after Germany's defeat in World War II has become a political nightmare.

American veterans' groups oppose it and Jews condemn it because 49 graves are of combat soldiers from the Nazi SS, which ran Adolf Hitler's concentration camps. Even Margaret Thatcher, Britain's prime minister and Reagan's staunchest European ally, expressed "considerable sympathy" Thursday with those who want him to cancel.

New entity arrives

GemTec to make phone controls

TWIN FALLS — GemTec Inc., a new electronics company emerging from the E.F. Johnson Co. factory at Twin Falls, will go into business on June 1 as a prime contractor for former employer E.F. Johnson.

GemTec official Dick Converse announced Friday an agreement with E.F. Johnson executives to buy the manufacturing equipment at the plant and to supply the Minnesota-based company with mobile telephone controls for the foreseeable future.

The agreement strengthens the bid by local investors to save the factory's 90 jobs, which were due to be eliminated when the plant's assembly line was shut down late this year.

GemTec investors now are seeking a public stock offering to raise between \$2 million and \$4 million needed to start production, Converse said. The company will be officially incorporated on Monday and its attorney now is preparing government applications for the stock offering.

GemTec officials hope to release the stock to Idaho residents about the third week in May, Converse said.

Converse, who is general manager at the E.F. Johnson factory, declined to disclose the financial terms of this week's agreement with E.F. Johnson executives.

However, GemTec will obtain all equipment in the factory and will make its first dollars by manufacturing for the company, he said.

As part of E.F. Johnson, the plant's work force produced the hand sets and electronic controls

April 28th. Set clocks ahead hour tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) — It's time to save some daylight, by turning the clock ahead an hour.

Daylight-saving time takes effect across most of the nation at 2 a.m. Sunday.

Most Americans, though, will probably reset their clocks before retiring Saturday night. The clock should be set ahead by an hour, meaning that 2 a.m., for example, becomes 3 a.m.

The change, instituted during World War I to save energy used for lighting in the evening, now has the effect of providing extra daylight for golf, tennis, barbecues and other recreational pursuits.

That last hour of sleep will be returned Oct. 27.

GOP dodges vote on spending cuts

WASHINGTON — Senate Republican leaders, short on support, finched for the second straight day Friday rather than permit a test vote on a \$2 billion package of spending cuts for 1986 that would curtail many politically popular domestic programs, including Social Security.

"I'm still optimistic," Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., told reporters, as President Reagan lobbied reluctant Republicans in person and on the telephone to rally enough support to sustain a symbolic vote of approval before any amendments are considered.

"Our strategy is to pass a budget resolution with \$20 billion in deficit reduction," Dole added, although he said no vote would be held before Tuesday.

The GOP holdouts included Sens. Alfonse D'Amato of New York and Paula Hawkins of Florida, who said they told Reagan at a White House

meeting they opposed a provision slowing the rise of Social Security benefits.

"I am tired of the budget process terrorizing our senior citizens every time the budget comes out," Mrs. Hawkins told reporters after the meeting.

But D'Amato did not flatly rule out the possibility of voting for the GOP package on the first round, and said he was working with Dole on a "method for resolving this issue." Other Republicans suggested one possible way out would be to permit D'Amato and Mrs. Hawkins to have the first opportunity to amend the package after its first-step approval.

A spokesman for Sen. Lowell Weicker contended that the Connecticut Republican also was a GOP holdout, and Sen. Charles Grassley of Iowa told reporters earlier in the week he was "on the fence." Other sources identified Sen. Mark Andrews of North Dakota and Robert Kastan of Wisconsin as other members of the group.

President orders review of policy in Nicaragua

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, unable to win more congressional aid for "contra" rebels fighting Nicaragua's government, Friday ordered a broad review of U.S. policy toward Nicaragua and a report on "the full family of measures that can be taken" in the region.

A senior State Department official said the review is "tactical, not strategic," and does not signal that any fundamental change in attitude is being contemplated.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said that in rejecting Reagan's request for \$14 million

in aid to the anti-government rebels, Congress "has in a way compromised the U.S. position" in Central America. "It is now back on the shoulders of the administration... to take some initiative."

Speakes said Secretary of State George P. Shultz and national security affairs adviser Robert C. McFarlane would direct the review, but that it would be "short-term" and could result in "various options that are taken over the course of time" rather than any written or public package. Other officials said Reagan would be given a report before he leaves Tuesday for the European economic summit meeting.

Reagan has said repeatedly that the contra military effort against Nicaragua's leftist San-

destinista government was the centerpiece of his policy here, but by refusing to vote for "lethal" military aid, Congress has now forced the administration to take another approach.

At the same time, this week's debate in Congress indicated there was bipartisan support for some type of U.S. pressure on Nicaragua, without deciding whether the line should be drawn at diplomatic efforts, at economic sanctions, at trucks and boots for the contras, or at some other point. Neither Congress nor the administration has decided whether the fundamental goal is to oust the Sandinistas or to convert them to the U.S. brand of democratic process.

Idaho's Great Rift among recommended wilderness areas

WASHINGTON — President Reagan on Friday sent to Congress a recommendation to curb development on 382,000 acres of Western land in four states.

The Great Rift area in Blaine, Butte, Minidoka and Power counties of Idaho, 322,450 acres of desert lava flows, was among the areas included.

In addition, there were also nearly 174 miles of rivers. The president's message said "We must

protect wilderness areas and wild, free-flowing rivers for this and future generations to enjoy in their natural, undeveloped state."

At the same time, the president recommended that almost 103,000 acres in eight states be dropped from candidacy for wilderness protection, either because the land is not suitable or because it is more valuable for other purposes.

All the land involved is controlled by the Interior Department's Bureau of Land Management and before 1976 was protected

by the bureau under designations of "natural" or "primitive." In 1976, Congress ordered the bureau to study those lands and recommend which should receive wilderness protection under other laws.

Other proposed wilderness areas are: • The Powderhorn area in Gunnison and Hinsdale counties, Colorado, 43,311 acres. • The Humburg Spires area in Silver Bow County, Montana, 8,791 acres. • The Seat Creek area in Sublette County, Wyoming, 7,836 acres.

Additions proposed for the national wild and scenic river system are:

- The North Fork Kern River in Tulare County, Calif., 60.7 miles of the river in the Inyo National Forest and the Sequoia National Park.
- The Cache la Poudre River in Larimer County, Colorado, two segments totaling 62 miles in the Roosevelt National Forest and the Rocky Mountain National Park.
- The Manistee River in Manistee, Westford and Lake counties, Michigan, two segments totaling 51 miles in the Manistee National Forest.

Apartheid Neo-Nazis plead innocent to arms charges

Police evicted 60 students from the UCLA administration building to end a three-day-old anti-apartheid sit-in Friday, as demonstrations continued at many other campuses and some schools said they would review their investments in companies doing business in South Africa.

In New York, 58 Columbia University students were arrested for blocking the entrance to an off-campus building that housed the office of the school's board of trustees. The students had ended a four-week blockade of a campus administration building on Thursday.

UCLA campus police arrested two students and issued 19 trespassing citations in the sweep. Hundreds of people had taken over the building Tuesday, said police Sgt. Alan Christopher.

At University of California at Berkeley, police on Friday morning arrested four of the 150 people who have been conducting a sit-in at Spruce Plaza since April 10.

The arrests were prompted by an incident that occurred as cleaning crews tried to remove debris, university spokesman Ray Colvig said. He did not have more information on the incident.

Another 150 people camped out outside UC Santa Cruz's library through Friday morning while 200 people slept outside UC San Diego's library. More than 50 continued their sit-in at the University of Southern California's administration building and about 70 staged a sleep-in at California State University at Northridge.

FORT SMITH, Ark. (AP) — Two members of a neo-Nazi group were released on their own recognizance Friday after pleading innocent to federal weapons charges.

Viet family saved by a bottle

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A Vietnamese refugee family arrived in the United States on Friday in a tearful welcome from an American couple whose message in a bottle floated 9,000 miles to the shores of Thailand and answered a prayer for freedom.

Hoan Van Nguyen, 31, a former South Vietnamese soldier, told reporters through an interpreter that he's "the most lucky man in the world." He said he doesn't know why that he called "a sixth sense" prompted him to pick up the bottle carrying the message from John Henry Peckham and his wife.

Nguyen traveled from Singapore with his wife, Joang Kim, 27, their 16-month-old son and Nguyen's 17-year-old brother, Cuong Van.

UPI payroll checks bouncing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Directors of United Press International on Friday authorized managers of the news agency to file for protection from creditors under federal bankruptcy laws.

The move came as UPI told employees that there was not sufficient funds to meet the current payroll.

It was not known whether UPI Chairman Luis G. Nogales would actually file a petition for reorganization, the agency said in a story transmitted on its news wires. UPI is the nation's second largest news service.

The agency's four-member board of directors voted unanimously in Los Angeles to authorize Nogales to file for reorganization under Chapter 11 of the Federal Bankruptcy Act.

NASA sets another countdown

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A week after Discovery returned to Earth, NASA began Friday for the launch of sister ship Challenger on a mission carrying seven astronauts, two monkeys, 24 rats, two satellites and a Spacelab full of science and technology experiments.

Challenger's electrical power was switched on as the count started at 10 a.m. MST, with liftoff set for 10 a.m. MDT on Monday for the 17th shuttle mission.

Six of the crew members — the pilot, two physicians and three scientists — flew to Cape Canaveral Friday from the astronaut training base in Houston and said they were eager to get on with their scientific mission.

Nancy Reagan continues fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — First lady Nancy Reagan, keeping the focus on her war against drugs, greeted about 2,000 school children on the White House lawn Friday and urged them to say "No!" to pushers.

The students, members of the "Just Say No" clubs, marched to the South Lawn from a downtown building in their crusade against drugs and alcohol.

Mrs. Reagan, who held a two-day drug summit this week for first ladies from other countries, told the children that as they get older, people may try to persuade them to use drugs.

The students presented Mrs. Reagan with a green-and-white T-shirt emblazoned with the slogan "Just Say No," as well as some buttons.

Activist suit settled

U.S. District Judge Donald Alsop approved the settlement, which contained a stipulation providing for the payments.

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
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Court ruling may cut down Jerome force

TWIN FALLS — If he doesn't get any more money from the county, Jerome County Sheriff Eliza Hall said he may have to cut a deputy's shift due to a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling that says counties must pay overtime to employees.

The February 19 ruling in the case of Garcia versus San Antonio Transit Authority reversed a previous court decision that exempted county and city workers from the federal Fair Labor Standards Act. The federal regulations include strict overtime and wage rules. And, the former probably will cause the counties and cities the most trouble.

The federal rules, which are enforced by the Department of Labor, state that overtime must be paid if employees work over 40 hours. If more than 40 hours are worked, but no overtime is paid, then compensation time — at time and a half — must be given within the same pay period.

According to the FLSA guidelines,

law enforcement officers must be paid overtime for working more than 171 hours on the basis of a 28-day work period. Firefighters must be paid overtime for more than 212 hours in a 28-day work period. Hospital and other health-related employees must be compensated for working more than 80 hours in a 14-day work period.

Professionals, managers, administrative employees and public officials are exempt from the rules. Counties and cities also are required to keep accurate records of all hours worked by employees.

County sheriffs already felt the tremors from the ruling. Hall said his department, which includes seven deputies and two jailers, has been hit hard.

He has no budget this year to hire new people and most of his budget designated to hire "extra" help is 80 percent gone.

Under the previous county policy, deputies who worked extra hours were given "comp-time."

Now comp-time has to be given during the same pay period.

Gun club's range given new permit

HAILEY — Despite strong objections from the neighboring landowner, an eight-year permit was given for the Blaine County Gun Club's Ohio Gulch firing range by the Planning and Zoning Commission Thursday.

In giving the conditional-use permit, the commission found the club has met all the conditions of its previous two-year permit, and that there is no opposition from other residents or landowners in the area.

The only adjacent property owner, Fred Blechmann, who owns 372 acres of residential land near the club, filed an appeal to the decision Friday morning. The Board of Commissioners will hear his appeal on May 23.

Blechmann said in the meeting he will take the issue to court if the ap-

peal is denied by the board, because the activities at the club has devalued his property.

"We want the club moved further up the canyon. If they don't want to do that, I want them to buy the land that's being devalued," Blechmann said.

He offered to sell 160 acres of his land in four, 40-acre blocks closest to the shooting range to the club. The 160 acres, he said, would provide a buffer to the rest of his property.

The commission, however, said Blechmann could not give any evidence that his land has been devalued by the presence of the club.

"Although I was concerned two years ago that this would affect the value of my property, I'm not that concerned now," said commission member Nick Purdy.

Purdy said the Planning and Zoning Commission will issue the permit on May 23.

Italian version of doll headed for ceremony

TWIN FALLS — The Cabbage Patch Kids craze has spawned everything from backpacks to books.

So why not a Cabbage Patch Kid immigrant? Such is the case of "Pio," an Italian version of the famous cherubic doll.

Yet Pio will be saved from possible deportation from the good ole USA because on Saturday, May 4, he will become a citizen. It will not be child's play, either, because a real judge will do the honors.

In addition, two dozen more Mediterranean cousins of the big-checked American dolls will be allowed to become citizens that same day.

The event will take place May 4 at the Cabbage Patch Kid Convention sponsored by Hospice of South Central Idaho as a fund-raiser. The convention will be held from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Twin Falls Armory.

Coordinators originally planned that just Pio, who was donated by Smith's Food King store, would be legally admitted to the country in a ceremony and then given away at the convention, said hospice director Elaine Fenwick. The boy doll is a Cabbage Patch Kid with adoption papers from Florence, Italy, but actually made in Spain, Fenwick said.

Yet the organizers of the event thought he should become an American. So, a lawyer drew up naturalization papers. The process will be complete when Jerome Magistrate Judge Roger Burdick performs the necessary ceremony at the convention to make Pio a legal citizen, Fenwick said.

Fenwick and the other organizers, however, learned that 100 similar Italian Cabbage Patch Kids had been sold in the area. They contacted the Caleco company, which manufactures the dolls, and donated 10 of them to the event. The company agreed to send "papers" so that 12 boy and 12 girl "immigrant" dolls also can become citizens at the naturalization ceremony, Fenwick said.

First place in the news category went to "Newsday" of Long Island, N.Y., and first place in the editorial category went to the Ft. Wayne Indiana "Journal Gazette."

Pathologist sees discrepancy in Arbaugh wounds

BOISE (AP) — There are a number of possible explanations for the discrepancy between the number of entry wounds and the number of exit wounds and slugs recovered from the bullet-riddled body of a Jerome County woman murdered last summer, a Pocatello pathologist says.

Robert Ramsey, who conducted an autopsy on the body of Marilyn Arbaugh the day after her death, testified Friday at the first-degree murder trial of Jamie Charboneau, 25.

The Jerome man is accused of gunning down the 36-year-old Ms. Arbaugh, his ex-wife, at the woman's rural Jerome County home on July 1.

Charboneau also faces charges of grand theft and kidnapping in connection with a complaint filed by Ms. Arbaugh several days before her death.

Ramsey's autopsy of Ms. Arbaugh showed that 16 bullets entered her body, but that only 15 slugs or exit wounds could be found, he said.

To account for the difference, Ramsey said he might simply have overlooked one of the exit wounds, or two of the bullets might have left the body through the same hole.

Other explanations included the possibility that one of the bullets fragmented before it struck the body, thus causing multiple entry

wounds, or a bullet could have broken up after entering the body, Ramsey said in that case, tiny fragments might not be detected.

He said it also was possible that Ms. Arbaugh coughed up a bullet lodged in her throat before she died, or that one of the shells passed through her body and ricocheted back in, causing another entry wound.

In addition, Ramsey said a 17th bullet that grazed the woman's arm may have penetrated her body somewhere else, accounting for one extra entry. He said a bullet that went through her hand also could be responsible for making a second entry wound.

In all, the pathologist said it was possible as few as 14 bullets actually hit Ms. Arbaugh.

The bags of gunfire cut through two of Ms. Arbaugh's arteries, Ramsey said. The bleeding in her upper chest from either wound could have killed her within 10 minutes, he said.

Defense attorney Randy Stoker said earlier that 14 rounds of ammunition were missing from that package by Charboneau along with a .22-caliber rifle he used to shoot Ms. Arbaugh. Three bullets also were found in the gun.

The defendant has said he witnessed one of Ms. Arbaugh's daughters, Tiffine Arbaugh, shoot her mother repeatedly with a .22-caliber pistol.

Hailey seeking to amend well grant application

HAILEY — The city of Hailey wants to amend its 1984 block grant application to put a water well in its proposed high-tech industrial park the grant will help build.

The Hailey City Council chose the well Tuesday rather than an access road to the development so there will be enough water to fight fires in the project, which the city is planning with developer Dave Manookian of Sun Valley.

In exchange, Manookian will construct the road and add power to the project in phases, if

the new concept is approved by the state Division of Economic and Community Affairs.

Manookian also will deduct the cost of the well from his impact fees to the city for his added expense for putting the road and power into the development.

The city plans to use \$237,000 of the \$332,000 grant to put in water and sewer lines and an access road into the project. Manookian would finish the development as a planned unit development.

Jan Blickestaff, the division's administrator of the economic block grant program, said he has to review the proposal before he can make a

decision on it. Although the well is eligible for funding under the program, Blickestaff said he does not know if it is appropriate in this project.

Blickestaff put the city on notice in February that it stands to lose the grant if progress is not made in completing the annexation agreement.

The amendment to add the well was one of two important points the council and Manookian agreed to change in their attempt to finish the agreement that will define the city's and developer's roles in putting the high-tech park together.

In another change, the city also created room

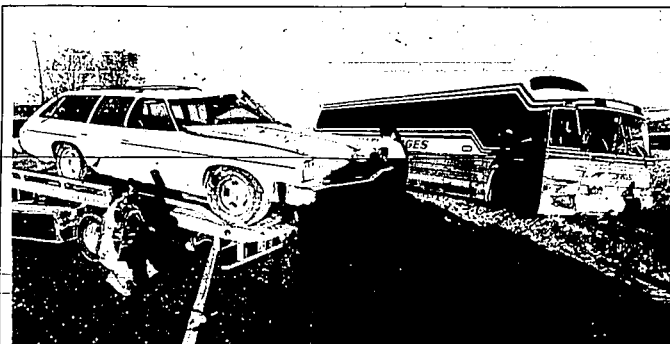
for Manookian to adjust the sizes of the two zoning districts in the development because the lot actually is smaller than it was first believed.

Manookian told the council his error made a mistake in estimating the size of the lot, which lies west of Friedman Memorial Airport on the south end of town.

Instead of nearly 25 acres, Manookian said there are 24 acres in the parcel with only 18.6 acres available for the two industrial zones rather than 20.55 acres.

The city originally restricted Manookian to seven acres of light industrial zoning to keep the

Bus-auto collision brings few injuries

TWIN FALLS — Drivers and passengers escaped serious injury Friday evening when a station wagon collided with a bus about two and a half miles west of the Idaho Highway 74.

The driver of the station wagon, 31-year-old G'Lenn Hamilton of Route 4, and her 12-year-old son Kipp were treated for injuries at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and later released.

At about 6 p.m., Hamilton was driving west when 48-year-old Ewing Skinner of Twin Falls attempted to pass her, according to Idaho State Police Cpl. Mike Burgess. Skinner was driving a Sun Valley Stages bus

with 31 passengers.

When Hamilton turned left into her driveway the two vehicles collided, Burgess said. They both left the highway at a hair fence. The car came to rest blocking the door of the bus. A wrecker had to be summoned to remove the station wagon so the passengers could leave the bus, Burgess said.

Aside from Hamilton and her son, there were no injuries to either; his passengers or to Hamilton's three other young children, Burgess said.

There was about \$1,000 damage to the bus and \$3,800 to the station wagon.

The accident still was under investigation.

Sudan offers rebel cease-fire

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) — Sudan's military leader on Friday declared a unilateral cease-fire in southern Sudan and an amnesty for the rebels despite their refusal to end the two-year-old civil war. In a decree issued by the official Sudan News Agency, Gen. Abdul-Rahman Saredhdahab said government forces will fire only in self-defense and the amnesty will apply to "all those who carried or are still carrying arms against authorities."

Saredhdahab overthrew President Gaafar Nimeiri in a coup on April 6 while the president was in Egypt, returning from a visit to the United States.

Hess marks birthday in prison

BERLIN (AP) — Rudolf Hess, the former deputy of Adolf Hitler, marked his 91st birthday on Friday and for the first time in four years, his wife visited him in the West Berlin prison where he is the lone inmate.

Carrying a bouquet of yellow tulips, Ilse Hess, 85, spent one hour with her husband, the last surviving member of the Third Reich hierarchy. They met in a special visiting room monitored by guards.

It was her first visit to Spandau Prison, in the British sector of the city, since 1951.

U.S. to skip Austria ceremony

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The United States will not participate with the Soviet Union in ceremonies marking the end of World War II and Austrian independence, but top U.S. and Soviet officials will meet as scheduled, the U.S. Embassy said Friday.

Embassy spokesman Michael Bennett said he was not authorized to comment on the reason the United States pulled out of ceremonies.

Bennett said Secretary of State George P. Shultz would meet as scheduled next month with Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko of the Soviet Union as part of the Austrian ceremonies.

U.S. vets taking part in Soviet VE celebration

MOSCOW (AP) — Russian officials said Friday that a delegation of American veterans of World War II will be coming to the Soviet Union for celebrations marking the 40th anniversary of the victory over Nazi Germany.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said about 40 Americans, including veterans who attended Thursday's 40th anniversary commemoration of the Soviet-U.S. military linkup at the Elbe River in Torgau, East Germany, will be arriving Sunday.

The Soviet Veterans Committee in Moscow said it also sent invitations to

the May 9 Victory Day celebration to many U.S. veterans' organizations, but had received no response.

At a news conference in Torgau, Robert Swan, an American veterans organizer, said about 15 veterans and their families would tour the Soviet Union for about two weeks. A Foreign Ministry official said the veterans will visit the "hero cities" of Kiev, Leningrad and Volgograd, formerly Stalingrad.

They will be in Moscow's Red Square for a military parade May 9, and will lay a wreath at the tomb of the unknown soldier at the Kremlin wall May 10, spokesman Vladimir Mikoyan said.

Western embassies said they were uncertain about which Soviet celebrations they would attend. Most of them

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Gorbachev offers cuts

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev used the platform of the Soviet-led military alliance on Friday to offer a deal on deep mutual cuts in nuclear arsenals if the United States abandons its "Star Wars" space-defense project.

The Soviet leadership was in Warsaw for a Soviet bloc summit meeting that voted a 20-year renewal of the Warsaw Pact, the alliance formed 30 years ago in response to NATO.

The seven-nation pact would have dissolved next month without the formal renewal.

Gorbachev criticized the United States and NATO for not agreeing to his call for a six-month freeze on deployment of medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe, and warned U.S. allies not to take part in space weapons research.

"No matter what their authors say and how they justify themselves, the essence of these plans is clear — to acquire a possibility to deal the first nuclear blow and do that with impunity," the Soviet party chief said.

Gorbachev's remarks were distributed by Tass in Moscow and by the Polish news agency PAP in Warsaw.

Activist: Terrorists aren't new

BOISE (AP) — While partially blaming society in general for their existence, peace activist Elise Boulding, chairman of the Dartmouth College Sociology Department, says the increased attention being given terrorist groups in the United States and the Northwest now does not signal a change in society.

"Certain words come into fashion, and terrorism is like that," Ms. Boulding said Friday between speeches at Boise State University. "In fact, these groups have always existed."

By one name or another, Ms. Boulding said all cultures for centuries have been marked by small bands of people committed to violence for political purposes or simply personal greed.

"That phenomenon is not a new phenomenon," she said. "It comes in waves."

Phone complaints on the rise

BOISE (AP) — State utility regulators say they're hearing a lot of dissatisfaction about telephone access charges, but the complaints more appropriately should be filed with congressmen and the Federal Communications Commission.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has been receiving complaints from businesses and non-profit organizations disturbed about the fee that must be paid for each telephone line they use.

Under an FCC order, all of Idaho's local telephone companies began charging the fee to multi-line business customers last July. Residential and single-line business customers will start paying a \$1 fee in June.

State commissioners oppose the access charge, but they have no jurisdiction over it because the FCC considers the charge an interstate phone rate matter.

Hansen-Stallings race costly

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rerun of Idaho's George Hansen-Richard Stallings congressional race cost twice as much as the original.

Final figures, compiled from Federal Election Commission records, show the two candidates spent nearly \$635,000 in 1984. That was roughly \$3.13 for each of the 202,404 votes cast.

Stallings won this time by 170 votes, but his spending increased from \$117,000 to more than \$307,000. Even so, he paid out \$20,000 less than Hansen, whose 1982 campaign budget was \$186,000.

Hansen received about \$74,000 in PAC contributions, while Stallings attracted PAC donations of more than \$177,000. Hansen said he ended the campaign with \$1,222 left over, while Stallings reported an unspent \$393.

There was more modest spending in Idaho's other House race. Incumbent Republican Larry Craig, who picked up nearly 69 percent of the vote, spent \$226,000, compared to the \$372,000 he spent in 1982. His opponent, Bill Hellar, raised \$34,000.

Reagan honors Lewiston man

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Lewiston retiree's volunteer work earned him the congratulations of President Reagan at a ceremony in the White House rose garden.

Robert Tyndall, 67, was one of about 150 people from across the country who were honored on Friday for their work in the federal Retired Senior Volunteer Program. Tyndall, who retired from Politech Corp. in 1982, said the honor was more than he expected when he started his volunteer service.

Tyndall's work in Lewiston includes operating a no-fee job-placement office that is staffed with volunteers and has a budget of \$175 a month.

Stivers wants panel to examine LCSC

LEWISTON (AP) — The status of Lewis-Clark State College will be on the agenda of a special ad hoc committee appointed by Idaho House Speaker Tom Stivers.

Though LCSC's status is not on the committee's formal agenda, "I'm sure it will be discussed, and more rightly so now than ever," Stivers said Wednesday.

"Here they are building more buildings and adding more programs," Stivers said in reference to the proposed expansion of the College Union Building on the Lewiston campus. "We are going to get so locked in with additional buildings and additional programs we won't ever be able to get out of there."

The Idaho Board of Education last week approved a \$30 per semester increase in student fees to help finance the expansion.

Rep. Janet Hay, R-Nampa, will chair the committee.

Stivers appointed the committee early last week and charged them with reviewing a report by the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry on Higher Education and a recent report by the Northwest accreditation team.

In particular, the speaker asked the committee to study splitting the state education board in two, to examine the funding, governance and taxing authority of community colleges and to study the role of the state education board and its executive director.

State pen staffers asked to resign

BOISE (AP) — Two staff members at the Idaho State Penitentiary have been asked to resign, and more dismissals are possible in the wake of what Warden Arvon Arave called misappropriation of state property at the prison.

The employees, who Arave refused to identify Friday, were a mechanic and a food warehouseman at the penitentiary south of Boise. The warden said he asked for the resignations after a couple of weeks of in-house investigation. A legislative auditor has been called in to continue the probe.

"It goes a little deeper now, so it will probably take a little more time," Arave said. "We may ask for some polygraphs. We've gotten through the things that were obvious. Now the work starts."

The prison staffers could face criminal charges if the investigation finds that state funds were diverted for private use. Arave said his investigation showed the mechanic was involved in the repair of automobiles from outside the prison, and may have paid inmates to do some of the work.

Officials have confiscated an engine and a transmission from the prison auto shop, Arave said. It was unknown how much money was involved, or how much state money may have been used to purchase parts.

The food warehouseman also is suspected of exchanging money for inmates, the warden said.

An official from legislative auditor Bruce Balderston's office will begin examining the case next week, Arave said.

New judge set in Tate case

FORSYTH, Mo. (AP) — A new judge has been appointed in the case of David C. Tate, the white supremacist charged with killing a Missouri state trooper last week.

Tate, 22, of Athol, Idaho, was arrested last Saturday in a Forsyth park after a five-day manhunt. He had been scheduled for a preliminary hearing here Monday before Taney County Associate Circuit Judge Joe Chowning.

But Chowning has been disqualified at the request of the defense, said June Reynolds, clerk of the associate circuit court. She said Associate Circuit Judge Sam Appley of neighboring Christian County was appointed to the case Thursday.

Oil, auto stocks point way as sluggish Wall Street slides

NEW YORK (AP) — An abrupt downturn in oil issues helped push the stock market broadly lower in sluggish trading Friday.

Auto stocks, notably General Motors, also paced the losers. Paper, computer and airline stocks lost ground as well.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial fell 9.60 to 1,275.18 erasing its 6.29-point gain on Thursday and narrowing its net gain for the week to 8.62 points.

Losers overall led gainers 1.4 to 3 on the New York Stock Exchange, whose composite index fell 0.53 from a record high to 105.52.

Board volume slowed to 86.57 million shares from 108.63 million in the previous session.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 104.08 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrial fell 1.02 to 202.35, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 1.25 from a record high to 182.18.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index fell 0.38 to 229.81.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market closed at 284.14, up 0.17.

Cracks were slightly ahead through morning trading but then steadily lost ground for the remainder of the session, finishing near their lowest levels of the day.

Earlier this week the market had pushed ahead despite some bullish developments, such as a rebound in interest rates and further reports of first-quarter declines in corporate earnings. But those developments continued to weigh on Wall Street, analysts said.

Unocal again led the NYSE's active list and fell 1/4 to 46. A federal judge ordered Unocal to postpone its annual meeting for at least two weeks, a development cheered by Texas oilman T. Boone Pickens Jr. in his attempt to reverse Unocal.

Other oil stocks slumped as well, recovering their sharp gains on Thursday. Exxon lost 1/4 to 51 1/2, Mobil gave up 1/4 to 30 1/2, Texaco fell 1/4 to 39 1/2 and Atlantic Richfield fell 1/4 to 33.

GM tumbled 1/4 to 89 1/2 in heavy trading. Ford Motor, which reported lower first-quarter profit, lost 1/4 to 42 1/2 and Chrysler was off 1/4 to 35 1/2.

Elsewhere in the blue-chip sector, International Business Machines dropped 1/4 to 127 1/2 and Eastman Kodak fell 1/4 to 66 1/2. But U.S. Steel rose 1/4 to 27 1/2.

Monsanto slipped 1/4 to 45 1/2 after raising its quarterly dividend to 62 1/2 cents from 57 1/2 cents, payable June 12.

Crown Zellerbach skidded 2 1/4 to 41.

Sir James Goldsmith, the British industrialist, abandoned his bid for control of the forest-products concern after Crown Zellerbach said it planned to split itself up as a takeover defense.

Great Lakes International jumped 3/4 to 50 after it said it owned 12.3 percent of Great Lakes and would attempt to acquire the marine construction and dredging company. Itel was unchanged at 8 in over-the-counter trading.

Williams Cos. plummeted 2 1/4 to 27 1/2 in heavy trading after posting sharply lower first-quarter earnings.

Jeff Malone and Frank Johnson, who played the last two playoff games after missing 32 contests because of a foot injury, scored 13 points apiece in the final quarter for the Bullets.

Moses Malone scored 18 points for Philadelphia, Andrew Toney had 17 and Charles Barkley came off the bench to contribute 16.

Jeff Malone led Washington with 24 points and Gus Williams had 17.

There are several ways that will lead to the sure defeat of today's game; there is only one way that offers some chance for the game to ... South wins the first heart and studies his options. If he establishes his longest suit, the opponents will continue hearts and South will take only eight tricks.

The best chance for South to score the game lies with the club suit, but it takes a bold and unusual play to bring it off.

After winning the first heart, South should play his club king, looking like one intent on establishing dummy's club suit. West may be convinced to duck (the duck might well be the best play) and that's all South needs.

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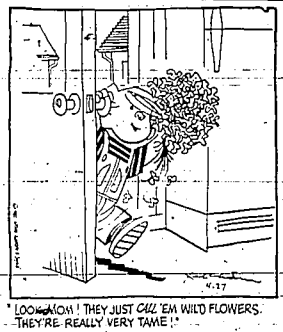

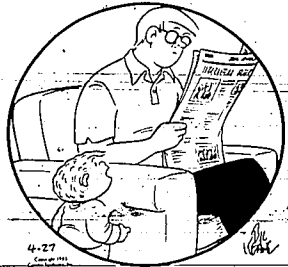
