## Gooding makes plans to hire hospital chief

GOODING — Plans are under way to hire a new administrator sometime next week for Gooding County Memorial Hospital.

"We need a strong professional who can administer both the business and medical ends of the hospital," Rod Spackman, newly selected hospital board chairman, said Friday.

"We're looking for someone qualified to handle the immediate problems of the hospital until we board members have time to determine long-term goals," the Idaho Hospital Association is helping us with this, and we're looking at selecting a new administrator next week.

Spackman was named chairman late Thursday during the group's first meeting since resignations of three board members were accepted by Gooding County Commissioners Monday.

Spackman, John LeMoine and Marlon Klingler were appointed to replace James Molchan, Merle Owsley and Juan Menchaca, who resigned in a dispute with commissioners over emergency room operation and financial management. Gooding Memorial Administrator Frances Whorton resigned in the same disagreement.

Former board chairman John Vagin and board member Darwin Voder also submitted resignations, but were talked into remaining by the commissioners.

"I think some of the problems experienced by the hospital board earlier happened because communication

between the board and county commissioners was getting stale and had broken down," Spackman said. "Right now, there seems to be nothing but cooperation and a conviction that the hospital will remain open."

During Thursday's meeting, the new hospital board identified six basic problems faced by the hospital and prioritized them.

- Hiring an administrator to manage Gooding Memorial.
- Solving immediate cash flow problems.
- Determining what shortcomings exist with weekend emergency room procedures.
- Analyzing a possible shortage of registered nurses at the hospital.
- Reviewing hospital rules and regulations.
- Evaluating equipment needs of the hospital.

However, the board decided Thursday to concentrate immediate efforts only on the first two issues since they are the most pressing, according to Spackman.

Spackman stressed the new administrator will be hired only on a temporary basis, allowing the hospital board time to evaluate other alternatives, including hiring an outside management firm.

To accomplish this, however, financial assistance is needed to maintain the hospital's cash flow. After inspecting hospital records, Spackman, a Gooding accountant, said Gooding Memorial is in no immediate financial danger, but county support will be needed during the coming year.

The Gooding County Commissioners have approved a \$40,000 hospital support budget for the 1980-81 fiscal year.

## Economic indexes improve

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Producer prices fell for the first time in more than four years in September, while the nation's jobless rate dipped to its lowest point since last spring, the government said Friday in a pair of politically potent reports.

In separate reports, the Labor Department said producer prices fell 0.2 percent in September, and the unemployment rate declined another notch to 7.6 percent.

It marked the first drop in wholesale prices since a 0.3 percent decline in February 1976, almost a year before Carter took office. The jobless rate was the lowest it's been since last April.

A 0.2 percent drop in food prices accounted for almost two-thirds of the overall decline in producer prices, the Labor Department said. In August and September, food prices had jumped 3.8 percent and 4.4 percent respectively.

But the department also said automobile prices fell as car and truck manufacturers closed out the 1980 model year by offering discounts. Energy costs also dipped for the fifth consecutive month.

The PPI index now stands at 288.3, which means the same goods that cost \$100 in 1967 now cost \$248.

Although the reports may prove politically beneficial to Carter during his campaign, some economists were skeptical of their significance and indicate the economy may be in for some rough times in the months ahead.

Private Washington economist Michael Evans noted this was the first time the Labor Department has ever included the impact of year-end auto discounts and rebates in its numbers.

"If you take them out, then lo and behold, the index for non-food goods did not go down at all," he said. "It went up 0.8 percent which was more than it did the month before."

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## Unemployment drops locally

TWIN FALLS — Unemployment dropped a notch during September in the Magic Valley, but it is still more than 2 percent above the rate a year ago.

With interest rates moving up, any substantial improvement in the unemployment rate will probably have to wait for spring, said Craig Hobbey, Twin Falls labor market analyst for the state Department of Employment.

The Magic Valley seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped a tenth of a percent to 6.7 during September, according to employment department figures released Friday. This compares with an unemployment rate of 4.4 percent during September 1979, Hobbey said.

For the state as a whole, unemployment dropped 4 percent to 6.9 percent during September, according to the department's monthly report. This compares with a state unemployment rate of 4.9 percent during September 1979.

Hobbey said there was a brief surge in construction activity, but with recent increases in interest rates, several banks linked the prime rate to 13.5 and 14 percent earlier this week.

That won't continue. "Consumers just aren't interested at these rates," he said.

Unemployment will remain well above last year's levels until the construction industry improves, Hobbey said.

Another area that will have to recover before unemployment can drop to last year's levels is retail sales, Hobbey said. "People are unsure about the economy and their jobs will not go deeper into debt to make new purchases, Hobbey said.

With the exception of agriculture, most sectors of the local economy were "slightly depressed" through the summer, Hobbey said.

The increase in employment that usually comes with the harvest has already occurred, Hobbey said.

From now until spring he expects to see relatively flat employment levels. "If interest rates drop by next spring, we could have a pretty good spring," Hobbey said.

Department of Employment spokesman James D. Day pinned the state's employment upswing in September on improved economic activity across the state.

## Federal aid keeps elderly living at all

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The President's Commission on Pension Policy received Friday reports showing a significant portion of elderly relies on "rock-bottom poverty" only by food stamps, subsidized housing and Medicaid.

Commission executive director Thomas Woodruff, chairing a hearing on the subject, said three "working papers" show today's retirement income programs and individual sources of income still leave "millions of the elderly, particularly women, at or near the poverty level."

The reports estimate that almost 15 percent of

the elderly remain below the official poverty line and millions more hover just above it.

Woodruff said benefits such as food stamps, subsidized housing, Medicaid and Medicare "save a significant portion of the elderly from rock-bottom poverty." But, he added, they also obscure failures and deficiencies of the retirement income system.

"They fill a large gap left by our uncoordinated and limited retirement programs," he said.

"Our nation's pension systems have not developed in a rational way because there is no national

pension policy," Woodruff added. "As a result, retirement income benefits are haphazard and inadequate for millions of older Americans."

A paper prepared by consultant Thomas Borzilleri shows public and private expenditures in income security currently exceed \$50 billion, with one out of four Americans depending on such payments as a major source of income.

The report shows that for elderly with cash incomes low enough to qualify for aid, such assistance amounts to 45 percent of their income for a single person and 40 percent for a couple.

## FBI thinks link between S.I.C. sniping and Vernon Jordan case

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — The FBI said Friday it assumes a high-powered rifle used to shoot civil rights leader Vernon Jordan in East West, Ind., could have been used in attacks on blacks in five other cities including a double slaying in Salt Lake City.

And agents said, the attacks could all have been the work of one man, but they still have no proof.

Agent Steve McVey said the FBI was proceeding on the assumption that a 30.06 rifle offered for sale in a Cincinnati newspaper advertisement June 7 is the weapon with which Jordan was shot and wounded last spring — and that the rifle was offered for sale by Joseph Franklin, who has been linked to the August 20 sniper

slayings of two black joggers in Salt Lake City.

The FBI is checking into the Jordan shooting, the shootings in Salt Lake City and shootings of blacks in Cincinnati, Johnstown, Pa., Indianapolis and Oklahoma City.

"The shootings could be linked, but then again they may not be," said McVey.

But he said they had not yet been able to prove a connection between the Jordan shooting and the others.

"We don't know if he (Franklin) is involved in the shooting, but we're looking at it on that basis," McVey said. "We think there was a rifle being sold in Cincinnati around the time Jordan was shot and so far it hasn't

provided the plate number to police.

He was picked up by police in Florence, Ky., Sept. 25, but escaped through a window in the police station five hours later.

Investigators said Franklin apparently has several aliases and his real name might be James Vaughn, a native of Mobile, Ala.

James C. Vaughn, the father of the sniper suspect, said his son is a "smart boy" who always "went to church when he got the chance."

"It's hard for me to understand him doing a thing like this — what he did." "He's the religious type. He went to church when he got the chance," added Vaughn, who hasn't seen his son since 1976.

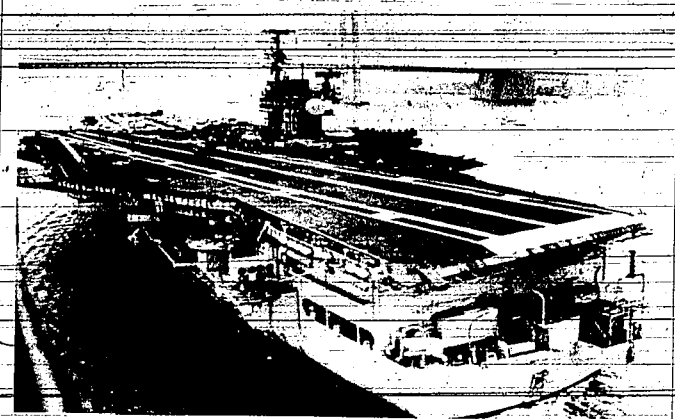

Olympia lawmakers found guilty of racketeering

SEATTLE (UPI) — Two top state legislators and a lobbyist, caught in an FBI "sting" operation, were convicted Friday in the Washscam racketeering trial. The seven-man, five-woman jury convicted lobbyist Patrick Gallagher on 14 counts of conspiracy, racketeering, extortion, mail fraud and interstate wire fraud. Former state House Speaker John Bagnariol was found guilty on nine of 11 counts. Senate Majority Leader Gordon Walgren was guilty on three of 14 counts. The federal jury deliberated 11 days. The conspiracy, racketeering and mail fraud charges were lodged against the three men as a result of an ABSCAM-style FBI undercover operation in which agents posed as mobsters. Arrested April 2, the three men were accused of promising undercover agents they would help legalize slot machines and blackjack in exchange for a percent each of the expected profits. FBI agents posed as mobsters representing fictitious S.O.U. Enterprises whose profits supposedly were to be laundered through the Cayman Islands. Bagnariol and Gallagher also were charged with

secretly taking thousands of dollars from the phony underworld figures. Walgren was accused of trying to sell his money-losing trucking firm at an inflated price to the undercover agents in order to hide a payoff from them. The agents carried tape recorders under their shirts and collected some 55 hours of taped conversations played during the trial. The tapes made up the backbone of the government's case. On one tape, jurors heard Bagnariol take \$5,000 in cash from an undercover agent in the men's room of a Portland, Ore., restaurant. The lawmaker testified he figured the money was Gallagher's and gave it to him later. The defendants said they never thought the agents were mobsters — just sleazy businessmen — and that the tapes captured nothing but 21 months of drunken talk deliberately orchestrated to make them look bad. In addition, they claimed to be the political targets of Gov. Dixy Lee Ray. They accused her of trying to derail their campaigns for higher office by using the State Patrol's Organized Crime unit to push the FBI probe in their direction.

Accused of sodomy with minor

Lawmaker faces sex charge

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Robert Bauman, 45, faced a major conservative voice in Congress pleaded innocent Friday to a sex-solicitation charge he said was the result of a drinking problem. Police said Bauman performed oral sodomy on a 15-year-old boy in the Capitol Hill district last March. Bauman agreed in court to participate in a six-month rehabilitation program for first offenders. If successful, the charge of "soliciting for lewd and immoral purposes" will be dismissed. The 43-year-old third term congressman will appear before District Superior Court Judge David Norman again April 2 at the conclusion of the program. Thomas O'Malley, Bauman's attorney, told reporters the congressman will continue to run for reelection to the House. "My impression is that he has to go on living," O'Malley said. "He is not going into hiding." Bauman attributed his problems to alcoholism, which he said he had overcome in recent months. "As a result of the help I received from my wife and my family, my priest, my doctor, and Alcoholics Anonymous, my own alcoholism is now under control and my sobriety restored," Bauman said in the statement. "Equally important, I have confessed my sin as my religion requires and I am in the state of grace and will remain so with the help of God."

Heading for dry dock

By United Press International Ronald Reagan said Friday President Carter's decision to keep a top aide from testifying before Congress on a new radar-defying aircraft shows the president puts his re-election campaign above national interests. Reagan made the accusation in a statement released aboard his airplane en route to Lynchburg, Va. for a speech at Liberty Baptist College. Carter signed an education bill in a ceremony at the Loudoun County campus of Northern Virginia Community College, saying, "The act I am signing today emphasizes to us how vital our education system is because it reminds us how enduring our national ideals have become." The president then flew to Georgia

Reagan blasts Carter 'leaks'

to visit his mother, who is recovering from a broken hip. John Anderson, campaigning in California, compared Carter to Calvin Coolidge, who he said as a Republican president of the 1920s showed little concern for the unemployed. Reagan said Carter should not have invoked executive privilege to keep national security aide David Aaron from testifying in Capitol Hill about leaks on the "Stealth" aircraft. A House Armed Services subcommittee, investigating how leaks on the secret project occurred, summoned Aaron after retired Adm. Elmo Zumwalt — a Reagan advocate — said he learned Aaron was the source of the leaks. "Mr. Carter's refusal to permit him to appear at the congressional hearing is a direct contradiction of his campaign pledge to give us an open government," Reagan said. "Today Mr. Carter is promoting government secrecy, hiding possible malfeasance and preventing necessary public interrogation." White House press secretary Jody Powell summoned a reporter to his office to "flatly deny" the Reagan charge. Powell pointed out that a Washington Post reporter who first wrote about the Stealth project has said publicly Zumwalt was wrong in saying Aaron was his source. "The charge is irresponsible and he knows it because the reporter on the story has said Aaron was not the source," Powell said. Reagan also said he — unlike some fundamentalist preachers — thinks God hears Jewish as well as Christian prayers.

Jenrette case nearing end

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The government Friday completed its case against Rep. John Jenrette, D-S.C., with a psychiatrist testifying the congressman was thinking clearly when he talked to undercover agents about taking a bribe. Dr. Ralph Ryback, a psychiatrist affiliated with the National Institutes of Health, testified for the government in its effort to refute defense claims that Jenrette was an alcoholic, unaware of what he was doing when he talked to undercover agents about taking a payoff. Jenrette and co-defendant John Stowe are on trial for conspiring to accept a \$100,000 bribe in exchange for introducing a private immigration bill for a fictitious Arab sheikh. Ryback, who reviewed in court videotapes of Jenrette's meetings with undercover agents, said the congressman was not too drunk to realize what he was doing. During cross-examination, defense lawyer Kenneth Robinson pointed out that Ryback based his opinion solely on the videotapes and had never talked to Jenrette about his drinking problems. Defense and government lawyers were scheduled for final arguments in their cases Monday, and the jury was scheduled to begin deliberations in the case on Tuesday. Ryback, who reviewed in court videotapes of Jenrette meeting with undercover agents last Dec. 4 and Jan. 7, said there was no "significant impairment" of his ability to function. "He's talking in very complex language, coherently and somewhat rapidly," Ryback said. In nearly three days of testimony, Jenrette maintained he did not re-

member many of the things that happened on the tapes. He said he had been drinking heavily during that period of time. But Ryback said there was no evidence that Jenrette was suffering an "alcoholic blackout" because he kept referring to previous conversations. Ryback said Jenrette's ability to talk, think, remember and move had not been affected by any drinking. Doctors who treated Jenrette for alcoholism at Bethesda Naval Hospital have testified that he was in the "final stages" of alcoholism. But Ryback said Jenrette's medical records showed he was "almost that of a healthy man." The psychiatrist also said Jenrette was so aware of what he was doing that he was even pointing out the implications of what he was doing by taking the bribe.

U.S. to extradite Jonestown aide

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The United States is preparing to extradite Larry Layton, a member of the Peoples Temple from Guyana and try him in connection with the assassination of Rep. Leo Ryan, D-Calif., it was reported Friday. Layton, a close aide to Jim Jones, who headed the notorious cult, was acquitted in a Guyana court on charges he attempted to murder two former Temple members. The alleged attempted murders occurred during the outbreak of gun fire at a remote airstrip near Jones' mission on Nov. 18, 1978. Ryan and four other people were killed in the shooting. The FBI said Friday it was sending two agents to Guyana "for liaison purposes with the Guyana government." The agency refused to say if the agents were being sent to return Layton, and the U.S. attorney's office in San Francisco, which has been investigating the Ryan slaying, also declined to comment. But the Oakland Tribune reported that Guyanese authorities have agreed to extradite Layton. He is in jail there pending possible additional charges in Guyana. "He will be tried in San Francisco on charges of conspiring to murder a federal official, the Tribune said. Guyana's prosecution of Layton was hampered because some potential witnesses who survived the Peoples Temple carnage refused to go there to testify. They could be subpoenaed to a San Francisco trial.

Coverup under in FBI break-ins

WASHINGTON (UPI) — FBI officials told former Watergate prosecutor Archibald Cox they had no files on break-ins by their agents months after such break-ins had been authorized, a former FBI official testified Friday. Just months before Cox requested all the FBI's files on such "black bag jobs" in 1973, W. Mark Felt and Edward S. Miller, the former No. 2 and No. 3 officials, had authorized break-ins in a hunt for fugitive members of the radical Weather Underground. Disclosure of the alleged coverup came during a day of legal haggling, with the jury absent, at the trial of Miller and Felt on charges of conspiring to violate the civil rights of private citizens — in approving nine break-ins at their homes. Prosecutors John W. Nields Jr., on the verge of wrapping up two weeks of government testimony, said the evidence of a cover-up was needed to show a "consciousness of guilt" on the part of Mr. Miller in connection with the break-ins. Bryant then ruled some of the evidence may be introduced. Miller and Felt contend they thought their actions were legal, that they approved the break-ins on the advice of former acting FBI director Patrick Gray and they considered the probe a legitimate national security investigation. Prosecutors contend the break-ins required a court warrant, or at the minimum approval of the attorney

Judge defends no contest plea for Agnew

NORFOLK, Va. (UPI) — The federal judge who accepted former Vice President Spiro Agnew's "no contest" plea seven years ago has ended his silence on the case, saying it was a "wise decision" because it blocked a possible Agnew presidency. U.S. District Judge Walter Hoffman said by approving the income tax evasion plea, under which Agnew left office, it removed the possibility of Agnew succeeding President Richard Nixon, who resigned nine months later as a result of the Watergate scandal. "Had I not accepted the plea, Agnew would have been indicted on many charges," Hoffman said. "He would have been tried in court. He would have been tried in one or two courts, at least." Hoffman said had Agnew been convicted, he probably would have filed an appeal and that the case probably would have been unresolved when Nixon resigned Aug. 9, 1974. "When Nixon resigned, Agnew would automatically have been president of the United States," Hoffman said. "And God knows that would have been a tragedy."

Judge defends no contest plea for Agnew

"I think it was a wise decision to accept the plea in the Agnew matter and I think it was a wise decision for President Ford to issue a pardon to President Nixon, as much as I know it irked many of you," Hoffman said.

# Poles strike

## 1-hour show-of-strength works

GDANKS, Poland — A well-organized general strike brought economic life in this port city to a halt for 60 minutes Friday when smaller demonstrations in other cities showed the reach of Poland's new, independent unions.

At precisely noon, a host of whistles, horns and sirens sounded the beginning of the one-hour Solidarity strike under the aegis of Solidarity, the new independent labor federation, in Gdansk and its neighboring cities of Gdynia and Sopot.

Trolleys ground to a halt, buses and trucks pulled to the curb and stores shut their doors.

Red and white national flags were displayed at factories where employees also stopped work. A bus driver operator stuck two flags into the pile of dirt that happened to be on his machine at noon when he stopped.

Across the city, red and white banners were plastered in windows and declared: "Solidarity today, success tomorrow."

"It was a complete success," Lech Walesa, leader of the new union confederation, said at his headquarters. "We showed we know how to start a strike and how to end a strike. That's what we needed to prove."

The government and ruling Communist Party were silent about the party's right- and left-wings also

sparked speculation that moderate party leader Janus Galloway may play a role in bowing out in November as expected.

Conference chairman Lady Lena Jeger, a veteran/former Laborite member of Parliament, admitted the convention harmed the party and its image as a possible alternative government.

"People being nasty to each other in front of television cameras does a lot of harm," she said.

More damaging to the party's chances of returning to power, the disunity at the convention also destroyed the system under which Labor elected its leaders.

The party scheduled an important meeting of its Central Committee for Saturday after the announcement of the Friday strikes. Many observers believe the party is divided between those who believe the government must continue to adjust to the union movement and others who believe the party and Communists' supremacy preserved.

# Economic espionage leaves 2 facing time behind (chocolate) bars

BERN, Switzerland (UPI) — Federal counter-espionage agents have arrested a young man and his girlfriend suspected of trying to sell Swiss chocolate secrets to the Soviet Union and China, the Justice Ministry said Friday.

The unnamed couple will go on trial.

A ministry spokesman said the 20-year-old man and his 19-year-old fiancée offered to sell the recipes for 40 different kinds of chocolates.

"They were held under arrest for three days but are now free pending legal action on charges of attempted economic espionage on behalf of foreign powers," the spokesman said.

"The whole affair is more funny than serious, but the law is the law," the spokesman said.

The couple offered the chocolate secrets in letters sent in mid-August to the Soviet and Chinese

embassies in Bern, the Swiss capital, a statement said.

Similar letters were sent to the East German and Saudi Arabian embassies.

Switzerland takes economic espionage very seriously and officials at first were reluctant to give any details at all about the affair.

They finally disclosed that the would-be chocolate spies worked for the Stuchard candy company, the girl as an apprentice.

Government officials said the man faces prosecution for trying to sell industrial secrets while the girl probably will be charged with being an accomplice.

Switzerland takes a fairly benign attitude towards foreign spies — as long as the agents spy on each other and not on the Swiss. With few political or military secrets to hide, the Swiss lack particular exception to foreign spies out to obtain industrial information.

# Junta names new president

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (UPI) — The military junta Friday named Gen. Jorge Videla as president and told him he should use the next four years to prepare Argentina for a return to democracy.

The replacement of Videla as president is part of a normal rotation of officials included in the military government's guidelines to avoid the formation of "personality cults."

Videla, 55, a close friend of Videla, will take office March 29, 1981, and

stay in office until 1984, when the military government marks its eighth year.

The announcement of Videla's successor originally had been scheduled to be made last Monday, but an internal power struggle reportedly forced the junta to announce a delay in Videla's appointment.

Sources said the delay stemmed from a dispute among branches of the armed force, over which sectors of the government each will control during Videla's term of office.

# Myrdal leads pack for Nobel

OSLO, Norway (UPI) — Swedish disarmament activist Alva Myrdal is the leading contender among 71 nominees for this year's Nobel Peace Prize, sources close to the Nobel Committee said Friday.

The prize is to be awarded Oct. 13 if Mrs. Myrdal wins it, she will be following in her husband's footsteps. He won the Nobel Prize for economics in 1974.

The Myrdals would be the second husband and wife to receive Nobel prizes. In 1903, Pierre and Marie Curie shared the physics prize for

their work developing the theory of radiation.

Among the other nominees for this year's prize are Pope John Paul II, President Carter and King Juan Carlos of Spain.

But sources close to Nobel Committee chairman Torbjorn Selnes said Mrs. Myrdal, 78, is the leading choice at the moment.

A prolific and noted author on the subject of the arms race, Mrs. Myrdal has served as a Swedish government minister and led her nation's delegation to Geneva disarmament talks.

# England's Labor Party holds bitter convention

BLACKPOOL, England (UPI) — The opposition Labor Party ended a contentious five-day convention Friday by voting to ban nuclear weapons and dismantle the private school system made famous by such names as Eaton and Harrow.

But while the annual rank-and-file meeting took a sharp turn to the left on a series of policy votes, it ended in such disunity that it appeared unlikely to win the chance of implementing its decisions by unseating Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and her Conservatives in the next national elections scheduled for 1984.

The bitter feuding between the party's right- and left-wings also

sparked speculation that moderate party leader Janus Galloway may play a role in bowing out in November as expected.

Conference chairman Lady Lena Jeger, a veteran/former Laborite member of Parliament, admitted the convention harmed the party and its image as a possible alternative government.

"People being nasty to each other in front of television cameras does a lot of harm," she said.

# Anti-semitism on the rise in Europe again

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JERUSALEM—Evidence of a neo-Nazi and anti-Semitic revival in Western Europe on the political left as well as the right is causing growing concern among Jewish experts who seek to prevent the seeds of hatred from sprouting into another genocidal Holocaust.

The concern was fed by the current wave of terrorist attacks on Jewish institutions in France and Belgium that claimed several lives and severely damaged schools, kindergartens and synagogues.

The most detailed examples of resurgent racism were presented at a conference held, ironically, in this city's grim "Yad Vashem" memorial to the six million Jews who perished during Nazi Germany's World War II bloodletting. They came from Samuel Roth, director of the London-based Institute of Jewish Affairs.

The examples included the so-called "revisionist historians" centered in the U.S., who attempt to use academic data to prove that the Holocaust is no more than a hoax perpetrated for political or economic motives by the Jews themselves.

Next year, Roth said, a "revisionist tour" of the major European death camps, including such infamous places as Dachau and Auschwitz, will take place in a bid to prove that they are not what the Holocaust survivors reported.

Roth attributed the upsurge of anti-Semitism in the 1960's to changes in the European anti-Semitic attitudes during the previous decade.

The shock of the Hitler era and the feeling of guilt or shame are wearing off, he said.

The economic boom has become a recession. In the nine countries of the European Common Market alone there are not less than seven million unemployed.

He noted that two million Britons are out of work and that 11 percent of the Belgian work force is unemployed, ascribing anti-Jewish violence as expressions of their discontent.

Another expert, Abraham H. Foxman, associate national director of the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League—in the U.S.—singled out Northwestern University lecturer Arthur Butz as the world's leading historical revisionist.

He described Butz's "The Hoax of the Twentieth Century" as the world's most widely-promoted anti-Holocaust book.

"Such revisionist literature is just an example of the use of code words of anti-Semitism to attack Jews and the Jewish people," Foxman said.

Among the long-range political effects of revisionist doctrine, according to Foxman, is to remove the moral basis upon which Western governments have backed Israel in the past, and thereby relieve them of the "sense of contrition" caused by the adoption of anti-Israel positions in the diplomatic arena.

The conference was told that the most active neo-Nazi terrorist groups in West Germany—where swastika painting, threatening phone calls and the distribution of hate literature has reportedly increased sharply in the past year—were the Nationalsozialisten, led by Michael Kuehn, and the Deutsche Aktions-

gruppen, headed by Manfred Roeder. French right-wing terror groups are headed by the outlawed Federation D'Action Nationale et Europeenne, or FANE. The British counterparts are centered in the para-military underground Column 88, whose name derives from the letter H being the eighth letter of the alphabet. Hence 88 is the equivalent of HfH, meaning Heil Hitler.

Zeroing in on anti-Semites on the left, Roth credited the Western European communist parties with condemning anti-Semitism but said the same cannot be said of the so-called "new left" and the radical groups that have emerged from it.

According to Roth, the anti-Jewish stance of the extreme left "manifests itself as anti-Zionism, which means not just criticism of the policies of the

Israeli government, but also opposition to the whole ideological foundation of Israel and, therefore, is an attempt to delegitimize Israel."

He charged that left-wing anti-Zionism uses terms that differ from those of traditional anti-Semitism, such as "opprobrium," racist, colonialist and imperialist.

Turning to France's intellectual right, Roth cited the Groupement de

Recherche et D'Etudes pour la Civilization Europeenne, known as GRECE, which preaches the inequality of man.

GRECE adherents believe "the elite is chosen to rule," he went on, "and that only a hierarchical structure which gives certain peoples or races the right to rule others can ensure the progress of society."

"GRECE therefore dismisses the

Judeo-Christian civilization with its emphasis on egalitarianism and wants to go back to the Indo-European, that is the Aryan, roots of European civilization.

Roth estimated GRECE membership in France at 10,000 and charged that the cultural supplement of the Paris daily "Le Figaro," known as Figaro-Magazine, serves as a platform for GRECE.

## The Times-News Did Not Report This But In Twin Falls On September 19 Idaho's Senator Jim McClure Spoke Out.

Excerpts from Senator McClure's speech:

I made a special note on my calendar when I knew of this event tonight to be here tonight to be with my friends in Magic Valley.

I'm particularly pleased to be with Steve Symms. Steve took my seat in the House when I moved over to the Senate. I've known Steve and his family and I know the people that live down on the Sunnyslope region. I know that they're among the most honest and hard working people in the State.

And there isn't anyone who knows you better than your neighbors.

Steve has the support of his neighbors. The Symms family has the respect and the admiration and the love of the people they live and work with. There isn't anything that can be said better about people in a rural community than that their own people like them.

I've been involved much more in this Senate race than some people thought I would. I'm not here tonight to say anything against Frank Church. But I am here to say that he has been wrong. I'm not going to talk about him, personally, because he, personally, is not the issue. The issue is, what is done for this country and what has been done that is right and is wrong.

Are we a stronger nation today, militarily, or economically, or morally, because of his service? Or do we find ourselves before the world today with less respect than ever before in history. We have never had the same disrespect shown to Americans and the American flag as we have today. Never.

And some of the policies that have been forged in the Congress of the United States and some that were spoken out loudly for by my colleague in the Senate (Frank Church), have helped contribute to that lack of respect.

We are not as strong a nation as we should have been. Our military defenses are down not because of evil intentions, but because of the bad judgment of the people who have voted to weaken our military posture before the world.

It's a marvelous thing... what happens at the time of election when people who are in office and are running for re-election begin to feel the heat of the electorate at home saying you were wrong. We should have had a B-1 bomber, even George McGovern is for a bomber now.

But the issue isn't the George McGovern and Frank Church or the Birch Bayh or the John Culvers, the issue is: can the United States regain the strength and respect that is necessary to make us secure? We can. We can when we elect men and women to office from the presidency to the court house who want us to be strong, who respect ourselves enough to demand respect of others, who live and work and speak honestly and courageously so that we earn that respect at home and abroad.

That requires people of judgment. People who are right about the kind of world that we live in.

- Why was it that we ran into trouble in Iran? Because we didn't know what was going on.
- Why was it we misjudged the situation in Nicaragua? Because our intelligence eyes had been blinded.
- Why is it there is so much going on in the world today about which we know so little? Because we have cut off our means of access to the knowledge of what's going on in other countries around the world — largely as the result of investigations of the intelligence community in the United States led by our own Senior Senator, Frank Church: Not because he was evil, but because he was wrong.

You will remember just a little over a year ago when suddenly we found a Russian brigade in Cuba? And it was intolerable.

Well, just last week, we had a group of treaties before the Senate of the United States that had been reported by the Foreign Relations Committee. One of those treaties happened to be with the nation of Cuba. One Senator said, "let's vote on that one separately." Senator Helms offered an amendment that said, "this treaty will not go into full force and effect until the Russian brigade is out of Cuba." And there was a motion made then to substitute another one — in other words, to nullify the intention of the Helms amendment.

That substitute amendment would pull the teeth and make meaningless the restriction that Sen. Helms was offering. And when the motion was made to table the substitute amendment, so it would be brushed aside and we could vote on the Helms amendment, my senior colleague, Frank Church, voted against tabling it because he wanted it adopted to nullify (kill) the effort to say, "we will not do this kind of diplomatic relations with a nation that exports revolution around the world and supports the efforts of the Soviet Union to dominate the continent of Africa."

I say that tonight because I don't think you'll read about it in any of Frank Church's newsletters. And yet I thought you might like to know whether that intolerable Russian brigade is still intolerable, whether or not we have come to a point where we're going to brush aside what Cuba is doing around the rest of the world to make our world less secure.

Many Idahoans have contributed to Steve Symms' campaign to pay for this message. They feel you should have an opportunity to study Senator McClure's unreported statement. And judge for yourself.

### Bomb blasts synagogue, killing 4

PARIS (UPI) — A powerful car bomb exploded outside a synagogue crowded with worshippers Friday, killing at least four persons and injuring 24 in the worst anti-Semitic attack in the history of post-war France.

A caller claiming to represent a neo-fascist group took responsibility for the blast.

The synagogue was packed with more than 400 Sabbath worshippers who had come to pray in a protection against a wave of terrorist attacks against Jewish schools and memorials last week, community sources said.

Authorities said the bomb apparently exploded prematurely. "It was timed to coincide with the end of the services in the synagogue when all would be leaving the Temple," said Jean-Pierre Bloch, President of the International League against anti-Semitism and Racism.

"If the bomb had gone off as the killers had planned it, there would have been some one hundred dead," Bloch said.

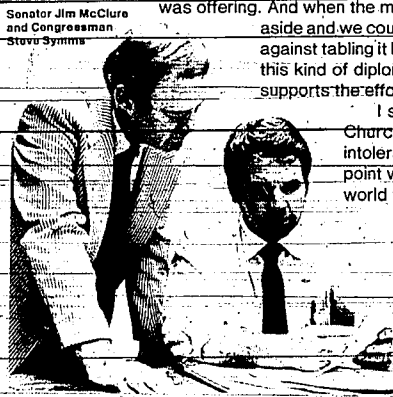
Interior Minister Christian Bonnet went on nationwide television to appeal to French Jews not to seek revenge and to promise that France would find the terrorists.

"We must at all cost avoid an escalation in violence," he said. Last week's attacks against Jewish schools were also attributed to a group he anonymous. Bloch, Butz spokesman for the group denied the claims. The earlier attacks caused no casualties.

It was the worst single anti-Semitic outrage in France since the days of the Nazi occupation 35 years ago, authorities said. It also coincided with what appeared to be a rising tide of right-wing terrorism throughout Western Europe.

Last Friday, 13 persons were killed when a bomb planted by neo-Nazis exploded outside the Oktoberfest beer festival in Munich.

On August 2, neo-fascists also blew up the central train station in Bologna, Italy, killing 84 persons.

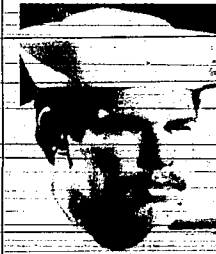

## Widow who died after her dog 'evicted' sparks protest

COCOA, Fla. (UPI) — The death of a broken-hearted widow who was told to either give up her pet dog Sparky or move out of her senior citizens' home has spawned a batch of angry letters, angry meetings, angry demonstrations and at least one political campaign. Alice Marsteller, 77, died two weeks ago and friends blame her death on a broken heart. The Cocoa Housing Authority ended in July telling her to give up Sparky or leave the senior citizen center.

Despite the public sentiment, John Thomas, chairman of the housing authority said the pet issue will not come up at the board's Oct. 16 meeting. "A lot of people are saying we're responsible for the lady's death, we're not," Thomas said, indicating that the no-pet rule was passed in the interest of public health and safety.

Clara Gunde, executive director of the Central Broward County Humane Society, is so incensed she's decided to run for city council to "inject some humanity into the council."

Mrs. Gunde said Friday her office has been inundated with mail from across the country. "They're very upset with the city of Cocoa and want to know what we're going to do to change the no-pet policy of the city's housing administration," she said.

More than two dozens thank you letters from people around the country also have arrived at the home of Broward County Sheriff's Lt. Beau West, who adopted Sparky when he read that Mrs. Marsteller had to give him up.

West, who lives about two blocks from the senior citizens center, said Mrs. Marsteller came to visit Sparky regularly at first, but was always depressed when she had to leave and stopped coming about a month before she died.

Her friends say she also stopped bathing, ate next to nothing and gave up her daily walks. Also getting mail — but not thank-you notes — is the Cocoa Housing Authority. Most single out director Frank Chavers as the villain and none are kind.

## 7-year old girl can open mouth for first time

NEW YORK (UPI) — "Mommy, it hurts," moaned little Adalza Brown, but the doctors Friday were overjoyed at the success of their operation to allow the 7-year-old girl to open her mouth for the first time. Adalza, nicknamed Millie, was what Dr. Stewart Super Friday called "the only case that we know of" in which a child was born with extra jaw bones on both sides of her face that held her teeth closed. During her seven years, Millie had learned a modified speech pattern. After the surgery, her speech was mumbled but easy to understand. The family thought she would outgrow the affliction and did not seek medical attention until earlier this year when the child suffered a vomiting spell, choked and nearly died. "We had never encountered such an anomaly, and in our research," Super said, "we couldn't find any medical history of a similar operation. There was no previous experience to go on." Therapy will be required to exercise the jaw muscle and develop her speech, Super said.

This is one of the few times that I would recommend someone chew gum," he added.

## Search for monkey drives cops bananas

WASHINGTON, Pa. (UPI) — A search for a missing monkey in this southwestern Pennsylvania community has left one policeman wondering about his role in life and the chief dodging crab apples.

North Franklin Township police have been trying to catch the monkey since Monday when the animal escaped from a visiting petting zoo.

The monkey, about 18 inches tall, has been lurking about ever since embarking on the police with their inability to catch him. The monkey business began when police received a call from the owners of Havens Petting Zoo of Poyntelle

Wis. They were on their way to Kentucky for a show when the monkey escaped during a stop in North Franklin.

"It was spotted Wednesday morning and we tried to get him. But he got away," a police spokesman said. And the monkey's success in eluding police has been partially achieved by doing little with the searchers.

"The monkey threw crab apples at Police Chief Roger Cuccarini," the spokesman said. All the monkeying around apparently was too much for one policeman on the search, Sgt. David Gapp. "I can't believe I am doing this," he said.

## Miss Lillian in good spirits

AMERICUS, Ga. (UPI) — Miss Lillian Carter, President Carter's 82-year-old mother who is hospitalized with a broken hip, was reported suffering considerable pain but in good spirits Friday. She was comforted by family members as she awaited a visit by the president.

Svbl Carter, Billy Carter's wife, visited her mother-in-law at Americus and Sumner County Hospital and came away concerned about Miss Lillian's suffering but relieved that she had overcome some nighttime nausea.

"She's not feeling too good," said Mrs. Carter. "She's in a lot of pain." Doctors said the president's mother was in good spirits and was receiving dozens of cards and many small

bouquets at her hospital room. Her daughter, Gloria Spann, spent much of the day with her.

Doctors Thursday afternoon inserted a stainless steel pin in the ball joint of her hip, reattaching the severed head of the femur to the main shaft of the thigh bone. Dr. John H. Robinson III, Mrs. Carter's personal physician, said she would be hospitalized two to three weeks. He predicted a full recovery and said she should be able to walk by the time of the inauguration next January.

The doctor said the Carter matriarch is "disappointed that she's going to be disabled for a while. Other than that, her reaction has been perfectly normal. Her spirits are good."

## Man wins case, claims power is health hazard

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Albert T. Goadby is a "little man," but he took on the Philadelphia Electric Co. and won an argument that too much energy might be hazardous to your health.

U.S. District Judge Clarence Newcomer, in what defense attorney Joseph Romano Friday called a landmark decision, ruled the utility violated Goadby's civil rights by not informing him of the potential health hazard from a 500,000-volt power line's electromagnetic field.

Romano said it was the first time in the United States a utility had been enjoined from completing a power line because of potential health effects.

Newcomer said that because of the utility's failure to notify Goadby, hearings held by the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission in 1974 in which Goadby's land was condemned for the power line were "a sham."

There is nothing that the little man can do when he lights somebody huge like that," Newcomer said in his decision. "This is the first time the little man has won."

Goadby said Friday he already had a 230,000-volt line bordering his property, about 60 feet from the home he has been building for 2 1/2 years.

"You can hear it crackling and carrying on," said the 47-year-old unemployed heavy equipment operator. "I've been told by the electric company that I worry about it." They said it was the best neighbor I could possibly have and it was absolutely harmless."

However, Dr. Andrew A. Marino, a physicist from New York, testified that long-term exposure to high voltage electromagnetic fields might affect the heart rate, create central nervous system disorders and cause enzyme problems in the endocrine system.


A spokesman for Philadelphia Electric said the utility was "surprised" at the decision and would appeal. "As far as we know, it is the first time that such a credence was given to that theory," the spokesman said.

Romano said Newcomer's decision means landowners whose property was confiscated in eminent domain proceedings could sue under the Civil Rights Act of 1964 if the utility failed to notify them of potential harm from a power line.

PE has completed the 18-mile, \$18 million power line except for the one section over Goadby's property.

## New popularity for old-fashion warmth

**TWIN FALLS**—Some of the old-fashioned practices that kept frontier families warm in their homestead housing may be coming back in fashion.

Dr. Patricia Triple of the University of Nevada School of Home Economics said families living in the homes of the 1800s and early 1900s had to conserve energy and find ways of keeping warm because of less efficient heating systems.

Triple addressed Idaho homemakers Friday during the annual convention of the Idaho Home Economics Association convention at the Littletree Inn.

She said the return of the footstool is an energy saving move.

By keeping the feet elevated on the footstool, the individual escapes the cold drafts that follow along the floor. She said the shawl that grandmother or great-grandmother wore had a worthwhile use. It kept the shoulders and back warm and was usually made of wool, the best insulator against cold.

She said there were a number of other lessons to be learned from a few decades back. Ankle warmers and the slipper-socks, especially those with leather soles, keep the feet warm, even when the thermostat is turned down to the energy-saving levels.

Other suggestions in the address on "Energy Behavior in the Home" included placing a throw rug over the bottom of every door leading to the outside and the use of a central chimney instead of one on an outside wall. She said the heat going into the chimney with the smoke gives off heat in the area around it.

"The shutters that decorate today's house exteriors originally had a more useful function," she said. "They were attached on hinges and were pulled closed over the windows to shut out the cold in winter and reduce the heat in summer."

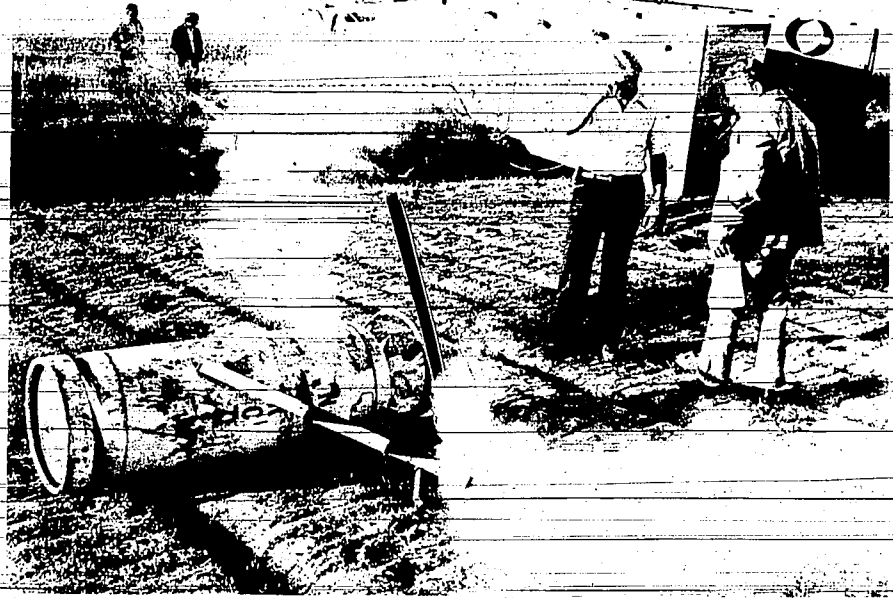
Triple said home design also may change to meet the energy conservation needs. A large central room where all of the family activities can be carried on will save heating costs, she said. She said not only can everyone use the same lights and heat, but body heat will help keep the room comfortable.

"Our conspicuous consumption needs to be replaced by conspicuous conservation. We now have about 4 billion people in the world and by the year 2000 there will be 6 billion, all consuming energy. We have to conserve if we are all going to have energy resources in view of the growing population."

The speaker also listed a number of energy saving innovations in the new designs of household appliances.

Another speaker at the convention, Carl P. Bergstrom, director of the Center for Treatment of Addictive Diseases in Gooding, told the home economists about 60 percent of those coming to the center make a good recovery from alcoholism, but he said those who recover usually continue in some social contact organization such as Alcoholics Anonymous or work with Alanon, the organization aiding families of alcoholics.

The Home Economics Association convention continues through this morning, Friday, delegates also heard a food marketing presentation by Willetta Warbey, owner of Willetta Enterprises, and a talk by Pat Nelson, home economics teacher at the Idaho State School for the Deaf and Blind in Gooding.

## Ranchers against graze land cuts

But they like having a say in how the cuts are made

**SHOSHONE**—It's like asking a man about to be hung if he would rather be killed in the gas chamber or the electric chair, according to Bliss rancher Doran Butler.

Even so, he compliments the Bureau of Land Management's efforts to get ranchers to agree on grazing cutbacks, instead of simply ordering them.

In the Shoshone District, "we know we're going to get cut," said Butler, who is president of the Bennett Hills Grazing Association, which represents the ranchers in the Shoshone District. At least ranchers get a small say in how they'll get cut.

Four years ago, the BLM began formulating a range management plan for the more than 500,000 acres of public range on the Camas Prairie between Picabo, Hill City, King Hill and Shoshone. The final plan called for average grazing cutbacks for the more than 110 ranchers who use the Bennett Hills range of about 29 percent.

Because of an amendment by Idaho Sen. James McClure to a bill providing funds to the BLM, the BLM cannot immediately enforce grazing cutbacks of that size without a rancher's consent.

The BLM began seeking agreements with the ranchers to get them to accept the grazing cutbacks. Where the large and small ranchers cannot agree, the McClure amendment limits the grazing cutbacks to the BLM order to 10 percent while the decision is appealed through the U.S. Department of Interior and then, if necessary, federal court.

Shoshone District BLM director Charles Haszler had hoped to have all the agreements, which take effect next spring, written by the end of September.

As of last week, more than 70 agreements had been reached and about 30 were left to be negotiated, Haszler said. Of the ranchers who have not yet reacted agreements with the BLM, some will undoubtedly use the appeals process, although no formal appeals have been filed yet, Haszler said.

Butler and the other ranchers in his allotment are close to agreement with the BLM. "They offered us some real plusses," he said. "But they are still asking for a 30 percent cut within three years," he said.

Some of the larger ranchers can afford to fight the plan, and must, because they have more at stake, Butler said.

But he can't afford to fight. "It's a no-win situation," he said, like for the man who must choose between the gallows, the electric chair or the gas chamber.

## Graham says Church irresponsible

**TWIN FALLS**—A former deputy director of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Friday called Idaho Democrats Sen. Frank Church's investigation of the CIA "irresponsible" and "damaging to American security."

Retired Lt. Gen. Daniel Graham appeared in Twin Falls on an Idaho campaign swing in support of Church's election year opponent, Rep. Steve Symms, R-Idaho.

The investigation required in legislation that required extensive congressional review of covert actions by the CIA, Graham said.

By requiring advance notice to be given to two separate congressional committees, "you have effectively killed covert operations."

The CIA should not be blamed for actions it committed, Graham said. "They did exactly what they had been asked to do" by past presidents, he said. "Once policy was decided they carried it out."

If blame was to be laid for CIA activities, that blame should rest on past presidents, he said.

Church's investigation ignored that fact and simply condemned the CIA as some wicked organization, Graham said. Church's portrayal of the CIA as a "rogue elephant" that indulged in unauthorized activities did irreparable violence to the agency he added.

Graham's appearance was the latest of several trips he has made to the state to castigate Church. One earlier trip was paid for by the "Anybody But Church" Committee.

# Bunker Hill president says mineral independence needed

POCATELLO (UPI) — Bunker Hill Co. President Jack W. Kendrick said Thursday the United States is becoming too-dependent on foreign minerals.

Kendrick, of Kellogg, speaking at the annual meeting of the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, told delegates the U.S. could do better to develop its own mineral resources similar to the 1973-74 Arab oil cut-off.

He said the nation has no minerals policy, and actions by the Carter administration have thwarted mining-industry attempts to find new mineral deposits.

Other speakers at the IACI meeting Thursday included Democratic congressional candidates Diane Bilyeu and Glenn Nichols, Gov. John Evans and various business executives. Re-

publican Reps. Steve Symms and George Hansen and GOP congressional candidate Larry Craig were scheduled to speak Friday.

Both Democratic congressional hopefuls, battling to come from behind in their races against Republican candidates, said they favored the free enterprise system as the best way to run the economy, adding that many government regulations were excessive had needed to be dumped.

Nichols called for more investment incentives for businessmen, while Mrs. Bilyeu blasted Hansen for having accomplished little in his last three terms in Congress.

Evans said Idaho is in the midst of an unprecedented financial crisis, but he predicted the economy would im-

prove next year and pull Idaho out of a deficit situation.

Boise-Cascade Corp. Chairman John Fery said slower but real economic growth can be achieved in the 1980s in the federal government can control spending, the money supply and regulation.

Without better fiscal and monetary management, Fery said, the American economy will be subject to longer and deeper recessions and shorter and lower economic recoveries.

Roger Lyon, president of the Valley National Bank of Phoenix, Ariz., warned that "business flexibility is being strangled by high interest rates and the increasing reliance of businesses on the use of debt for expansion.

# More delays for Adamson trial

TUCSON, Ariz. (UPI) — The murder trial of John Harvey Adamson winding up its fifth week, incurred two more delays Friday.

Adamson is on trial on a reinstated first-degree murder charge in the 1976 bombing death of reporter Don Bolles.

Tina County Superior Court Judge Ben Birdsall had hoped to select 12 jurors and five alternates Friday so that opening arguments could begin Monday.

However, Birdsall reset the start of the trial to Tuesday when defense attorneys said they would go to the Arizona Supreme Court in an attempt

to move the trial from Tucson.

Another hitch developed when one of the 37 potential jurors, who had tentatively approved, was excused. She said her nephew, who worked for the state Department of Public Safety, had told her Adamson was guilty.

The first two persons questioned to fill her spot were excused.

Friday's session opened with Adamson's attorney, Greg Martin, presenting his fourth motion for a change of venue. Birdsall denied the motion, but agreed to delay opening

arguments until Tuesday to allow Martin to appeal.

Martin said he would meet with Maricopa County Superior Court Judge Gerald Strickmeyer in Phoenix Monday, seeking to halt the trial while he filed and pursued a special action petition with the Arizona Supreme Court. That petition would appeal Birdsall's denial of Martin's motion to move the trial.

Another of Adamson's attorneys, William Feldhaacker, said if the trial is stopped, the delay would probably be two to three weeks until the Supreme Court makes a decision.

He made the remarks at a ribbon-cutting ceremony marking the beginning of the Idaho Career Information System offered by Nampa High School, the first institution in the state

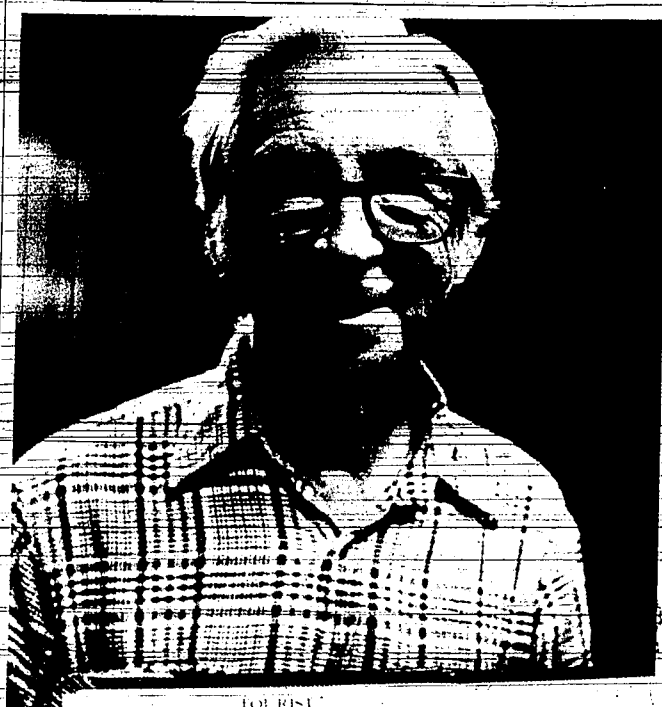
to offer the program.

# Sentenced to gas chamber, man is confident he will be freed

RAWLINS, Wyo. (UPI) — Condemned killer Mark Hopkinson, saying he will never face the gas chamber for arranging the torture-murder of Jeffrey Lynn Green, claimed in a death row interview that Green carried out a bombing which resulted in three life terms against Hopkinson.

Hopkinson, the only inmate on Wyoming's death row, told the Casper Star-Tribune that star prosecution witness Michael Hickey was given "one half of a deal" for testifying he bombed the home of Evanston, Wyo. attorney Vincent Vehar on Hopkinson's orders.

The 29-year-old Hopkinson was sentenced at the close of his September 1978 trial to die in the gas chamber for arranging the death of

Green, who had implicated him in the May 1977 bombing of Vehar's home. He also received consecutive life terms for arranging the blast, which killed Vehar and two members of his family. Vehar's law firm represented a sewer board involved in a dispute with Hopkinson.

Hickey, currently serving a 20-year term for the murder of a Wyoming state trooper, testified during Hopkinson's trial that he carried out the bombing for Hopkinson.

But Hopkinson, dressed in cutoffs, T-shirt and sandals for his death row interview, Wednesday, said the prosecution "created the Hickey kid to come up with the story he came up with — because you've got to remember, Hickey is the first person that I have ever known that comes out

ahead by saying he killed three people."

"Remember," Hopkinson said, "they had this kid point-blank for killing a little 14 or 15-year-old girl ... So they gave him a deal."

Hopkinson, bearded and appearing heavier than he was at the time of his home state, Hickey in fact did not bomb the Vehar home.

"I wasn't Mike Hickey who did that bombing, I can guarantee you that," he said. "Jeff Green did it. Jeff Green was in Evanston that night — the cops know he was there."

Hopkinson added: "You know, it didn't even bother me that the kid got killed, and I can give you a list of people who would want to kill Jeff Green. I just wish he wouldn't have got killed when he got killed — that

looked bad for me."

The one-time Mountain View High School athletic star, who referred to the state penitentiary's death row as "the executive suite," also claimed the prosecution failed to prove that he arranged Green's death.

"I didn't have Jeff Green killed," he said. "They don't know who killed him. They have nobody to say I did anything to him, or ordered anybody to do anything to him."

The prosecution had contended Hopkinson ordered Green's death from a Lompoc, Calif., prison cell where he was serving time for the attempted bombing of a Phoenix, Ariz., man's car, because Green had linked him with the Vehar deaths.

"No witness was ever called to support Spence's theory," Hopkinson

said, referring Jackson, Wyo., attorney Gerald Spence, who acted as special prosecutor in the case. "Did one person say I offered anybody to kill Jeff Green? ... He (Spence) never proved I arranged Green's murder."

Hopkinson, whose death sentence currently is under appeal to the state Supreme Court, contended numerous flaws in his trial will guarantee him a new trial.

"I'll beat his case," Hopkinson said. "They won't see the day when I'll have to die in the gas chamber."

"That's the reason I didn't defend myself against Gerry Spence," Hopkinson said. "I knew I was going to get a new trial out of this."

Hopkinson told the Casper newspaper that "even if the Wyoming Supreme Court rejects his appeal, the U.S. Supreme Court will not.

He added his testimony during the trial probably would not have helped his defense.

"I don't think anybody in that trial could have walked out not guilty," he said. "I mean, you had a dead girl (Wydhuyse) that had been all mutilated up, you had blow-up bodies — a whole family just wiped out while they were sound asleep, for some ungodly reason — and then you have a kid (Green) that's tortured beyond your imagination ... It was just too much at one trial."

But Hopkinson said his conviction "doesn't matter because they'll never get close in carrying out the death sentence on me."

"I think I'll be out of here (death row) as soon as the state Supreme Court comes down with its decision," he said.

## Murder sentence delayed

CALDWELL (UPI) — The first-degree murder sentencing of Melvin Dean Major has been delayed until Oct. 21, when attorneys will decide whether the convict deserves the death penalty.

Third District Judge James R. Doolittle ordered the sentencing delayed after he denied defense motions seeking an acquittal and a new trial.

Major, 31, was convicted in July of murdering Manuel Antonio Meza, 45, whose mutilated body was found in his home Jan. 3. He had been killed on New Year's Day.

He sentenced to death Major would join David A. Osborn, Starlineville, Utah, on Idaho's death row. Osborn has appealed his conviction. The state's new lethal-injection death penalty has not been used.

The last execution in Idaho took place Oct. 18, 1957, when Raymond Snowden was hanged for murder.

## Suspect returns to Idaho

BOISE (UPI) — A suspect in the 1979 Troy Vance Jr. murder in Canyon County has been extradited to Idaho and was being held today in the Ada County jail at Boise.

Robert Richard Jones, 37, was arrested at Salt Lake City Aug. 28 on a fugitive warrant for failing to appear in Ada County court Nov. 29, 1979, for sentencing of a burglary charge.

Canyon County sheriff's officers believed Jones may have been involved in the execution shooting of Vance, a wealthy Caldwell businessman. Vance was found dead in his ranch house June 27, 1979. He had been shot at close range three times in the head.

## Spokane man pleads innocent

SPOKANE (UPI) — Gordon Dellarm, 21, Spokane, has entered pleas of innocent to charges he killed one man and stabbed two others during a fight on the city's west side Aug. 5.

The suspect appeared before Spokane county Superior Court Judge William Grant on charges of second degree murder and two counts of assault.

He is charged with the stabbing death of Wayne Graybo, 24, Spokane.

## Registration law little used

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho's new voter-registration law giving county clerks the power to appoint at-large registrars is being ignored in many county courthouses.

The law was drafted by Capitol Hill School of American government students last spring and entered into law by the Legislature. It allows, but does not mandate, appointment of registrars to register voters in shopping centers and other public places.

Clerks contacted in a survey by the Idaho Statesman said they had no idea of the law's existence. Lack of additional personnel and possible misuse of the law by political candidates were reasons for not hiring roving registrars. Of 12 clerks contacted, only two said they had implemented the provision.

## Pianist to solo in Boise

BOISE (UPI) — Hungarian pianist Istvan Nadas will give a solo concert Oct. 15 at Boise State University and will perform in a duo-piano concert Oct. 21 with BSU pianist Madeleine Hsu.

Nadas, who has studied with Bela Bartok and Zoltan Kodaly, also will give a free piano lecture Oct. 17 at Hammond Music Co. in Boise and will be available for private lessons at a cost of \$35.

## Law bars benefits for felons

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In the final hours before adjournment, Congress approved legislation authorized by Sen. Frank Church barring felons from receiving Social Security benefits.

Church said research has shown that about 6,000 prisoners are receiving \$16 million in Social Security benefits annually. Church said many prisoners use the money to buy such items as liquor, systems and color televisions and to make financial investments.

"Prisoners' receipt of Social Security benefits adds insult to injury when the checks are based on disabilities which are themselves related to their crimes of violence," Church said.

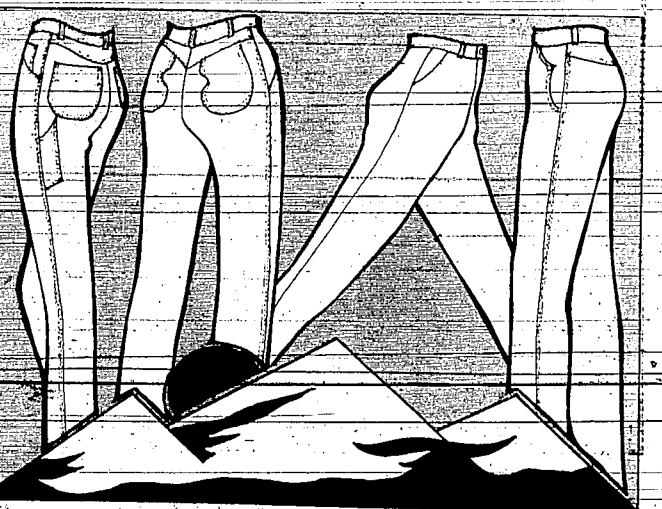
## Hanging ruled suicide

Smith also was charged pending in Elbert County for allegedly stealing firearms, failing to yield to an officer and possession of marijuana, Ricketts said.



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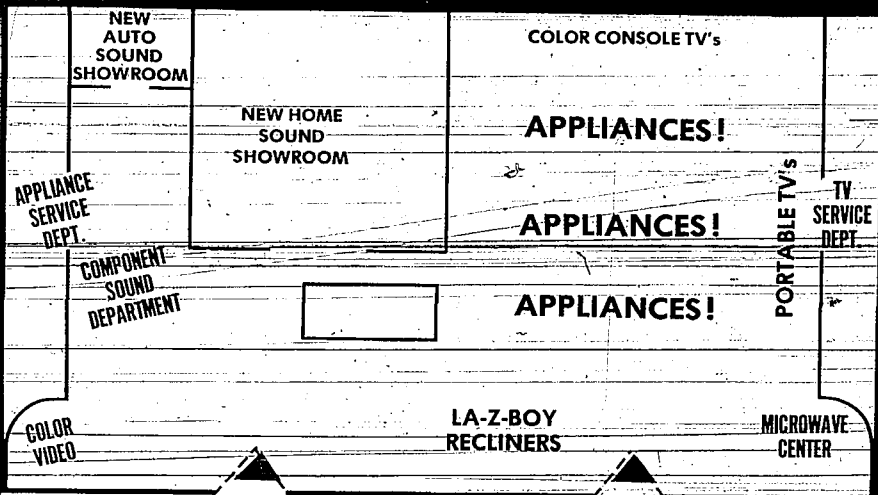
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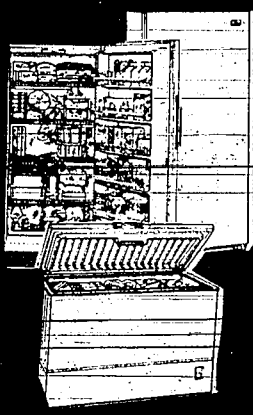

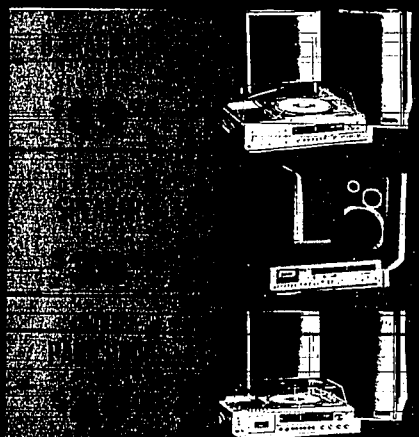
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# Bruins revel in 21-6 homecoming romp

**TWIN FALLS** — Twin Falls Bruins, 436 the past four years, thumped Idaho Falls 21-6 Friday night and moved to within a victory of gaining the state playoffs.

The game was not as close as the score indicated as Twin Falls owned the ball all night and, indeed, used up the most time with a 13-play drive that didn't produce a score.

But it was the offense that dominated the night as Idaho Falls was

unable to contain the running attack. The Bruins piled up 87 yards in total offense, all but 110 of those yards on the ground.

And it was senior Bob McMillan that made it work best as he rushed for a pair of touchdowns and 117 yards. He was abetted by junior Larry Hurt who picked up 84 more. In other words, the Bruin defense seldom was on the field.

"I'm starting to believe in these kids, that they can sustain a drive and we no longer have to be a team that relies on the big play," Coach Bill Jones said afterward, indicating the offensive line improvement has been

most marked and gratifying.

But he added with a smile, "I'm not so sure that our offense wasn't our best defense tonight. It didn't seem like Idaho Falls had the ball six plays in the second half."

Coach Bill Ingstrup was asked if he was pleased with the offensive showing. "You're damned right," he beamed.

The victory, equalling the total of the past four years, leaves Twin Falls a win over Nampa away from going to the state playoffs. The Bulldogs come to Twin Falls Nov. 10 for the season finale.

"We're in the position now of really

rooting for Minico to beat Idaho Falls because of the (playoff) rules concerning ties," Jones said. "All ties are broken through head-to-head competition. Nampa has lost to Idaho Falls and we've beaten them now. If Nampa beats us we'd be one-on-one head-to-head games. So we really have to root for Minico."

Although Twin Falls dominated possession, it took a while for it to score. On its first possession, Twin Falls rolled to the 10-yard line but fumbled that away. After a punt exchange, however, the Bruins went to work.

Taking over on their own 38, the

Bruins sent McMillan and Gary Krumm for a first down. Then Krumm hit Rick Tegan on a sideline pattern. The senior shook a leg away from the Idaho Falls defender and sprinted 29 yards, being knocked out of bounds just as he hit the goal line. Steve Galley booted the first of three extra points.

Idaho Falls replied with its only offensive move of the half, getting two first downs to midfield before Jeff Holcomb piled up the drive with a quarterback sack. Idaho Falls booted the Bruin-11 and Twin Falls used 14 plays to cover the 89 yards to paydirt.

The payoff came on a one-yard drive

by McMillan with 1:16 left in the half. The Bruins still appeared to be all business when the second half opened. They drove from their own 30 to a first down at Idaho Falls 26 as Hurt and McMillan alternated on carries.

At the 26, Twin Falls tumbled the ball away but lived when Idaho Falls fumbled it back two plays later at the 29. Darrell Reynolds fell on it for the Bruins.

On the next play, McMillan ducked off tackle, broke away from one Bruin defender and straggled off another in gaining the outside. Once

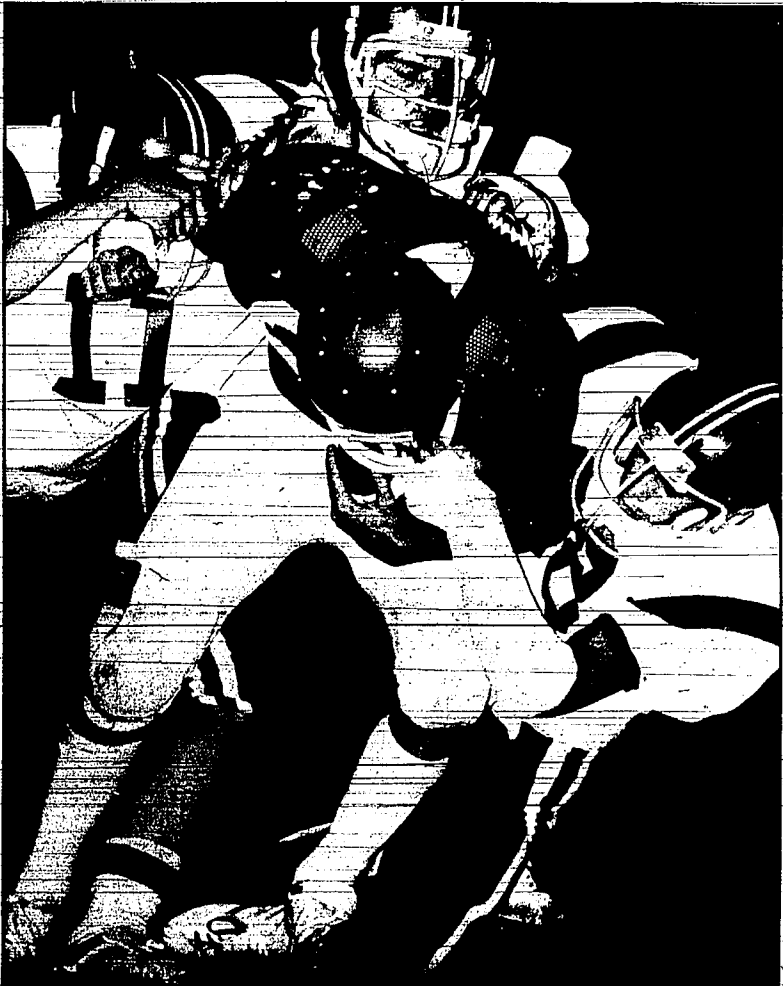

## Huskies end frustration

**MURTAUGH** — The Hansen Huskies wiped out two years of frustration Friday night with a surprising 30-6 demolishing of the Murtaugh Red Devils.

After dropping two close and crucial conference games in the last two years to the Red Devils, Hansen, which now takes sole possession of the Magic Valley Conference with a 3-0 record, put together a solid effort on both sides of the ball for the victory.

Quarterback Cooper Urie led the attack from the beginning to the end, passing for 169 yards, throwing for one touchdown pass and running for two more, one in each half.

"The kids played a super ball game, I'm proud of them," Hansen head Coach Barry Epsil said following the win. "I knew we could get them from the start, but I had no idea the score would be this far apart."

After taking a 22-6 first half lead, Urie came out in the third period and laced on one more with a two-yard run that pretty much closed the door on Murtaugh. Todd Miller then led the game in the fourth with a one-yard plunge to make it 30-6.

The Huskies wasted no time in getting their explosive offense into high gear and on the second round to draw first blood early in the game.

After taking the opening kick at their own 43 and running six straight plays up the middle, Hansen saw tailback Jeff Conner hit senior Dean Goodwin on a 39-yard fly flicker with 7:14 left in the initial period. The conversion attempt failed but the Huskies led 6-0.

The defense took over as the next five drives ended in punts for both teams. The Huskies started threatening again when Urie hit Shane Lierman on a 41-yard pass that put the ball at the Red Devil 20 early in the second.

However, Murtaugh's Todd Shouse nullified that drive with a fumble recovery inside the 20

and a 22-point scoring spree by both teams in the final two minutes began.

Within that span the scoreboard changed three times, twice in Hansen's favor and once for Murtaugh.

Lineman Robert Elthington stole a Roy Nebeker pass and ran it into the end zone with 1:44 left in the half to stretch Hansen's cushion to 14-0.

Nebeker went to work in the air and hit paydirt after two long passing plays that carried the pigskin to the Hansen 40-yard line.

The final blow came on a 40-yard picture perfect pass to Paul Graf that closed the margin to 14-6.

Hansen came right back in seven plays when Urie hit Craig Daw on a 15-yard pass play with 21 seconds left. Urie then hit Lierman on a pass for the conversion and the Huskies entered the locker room with a 22-6 lead.

"Our secondary just acted like they were lost out there," said an upset Jim Anderson, Murtaugh's head coach. "The guys on the line were doing a fine job holding their running game to the minimum, but the secondary people just kept giving up the big plays that really killed us."

Before the game, Epsil felt the key to a Huskie win would be if his defense could stop the arm of Nebeker. "The plan worked," despite the one TD pass in the second period.

"We need to get jam up in his backfield and pressure him to stop their passing," he said while eyeing pre-game warm-ups. "If we could pull-off that and stop their running game, we'd have the game in the bag from the beginning."

Instead, Ali went on national television and when asked about his future in boxing, he said flatly "I shall return."

Several hours later, at a news conference in Las Vegas, Ali hedged a bit but left little doubt that he wanted to fight again, preferably going after his old title — currently held by Mike Weaver.

"We have a couple of options," said Ali. Then, turning toward promoter Don King, Ali added, "I have told me to tell you I haven't made up my mind yet."

Then in the next breath, Ali said "In a couple of weeks you'll get the news, Larry Holmes is a fine, heavyweight champion but I'm still the greatest of all time."

Holmes also retreated from remarks he made Thursday night. After beating Ali, Holmes said he wanted to fight again, preferably going after his old title — currently held by Mike Weaver.

"I think Muhammad can go on," said Holmes. "There are a lot of fighters he can beat. But he shouldn't have fought last night — not at 217."

"He should have come in at 229 or so because that would have made him stronger. He worked so hard to get his weight down and he may have overtrained."

As to his future, Holmes said he was planning to take at least two months off and then would make up his mind about his next opponent.

"I don't know who will be next," said Holmes. "I don't have to be Leon Spinks."

Spinks, a former heavyweight champ, knocked out Bernardo Mercado at 2:52 of the ninth round in their scheduled 12-round elimination fight Thursday on the Holmes-Ali undercard. The winner of that fight had been assured of a shot at the winner of the heavyweight title match according to King.

The victory over Ali was the 36th without a loss for the 30-year-old champion. It also was Holmes' eighth straight title defense by a knockout, breaking Joe Louis' record. The loss dropped Ali's record to 56-1.

Holmes was the first to attend Friday's news conference and he brought his wife and infant daughter with him. His entrance hardly stirred the crowded room of reporters and others, but when Ali made his entrance, he received a hand from the crowd. This disturbed King, who chastised the media for hanging on to Ali.

"Ali was a great champion," said the outspoken promoter, "but his day is over. Larry Holmes is now the world's greatest fighter and you should be paying more attention to him."

Despite King's sermon, Ali dominated the news conference that followed, demonstrating that the former champion hasn't lost anything when it comes to regaling a crowd.

**EASTON, Pa. (UPI)** — WBC heavyweight champion Larry Holmes beat Muhammad Ali because he was in fine shape, fought his fight and simply had more heart than the aging legend. But there was another reason — he listened to his mother.

"Larry did what I told him to do," said Mrs. Fannie Holmes, who raised the champ and his 10 siblings. She watched the fight with 2,050 other screaming fans Thursday night at the Easton Area High School gymnasium in the Holmes' hometown.

"Muhammad Ali was badgering him and I told him don't go around Muhammad. Ali would have the fight, I didn't want him to have a street fight. I told him wait until you get into the ring," she said.

"I know in the ring Muhammad Ali didn't have a chance. I know Larry's the greatest."

The champion, who answered his own phone in his room at Caesars Palace in Las Vegas Friday, said he felt fine and was gratified by the reaction of his hometown, where celebration erupted after the victory. Mobs of fans poured into the downtown area, honking their horns and shouting Holmes' name.

"I think it's great," said Holmes, who said he expected to arrive home today.

NEW YORK — The reservations are made at Kentucky's Claiborne Farm and a stall has been put aside for a sleek gray colt to spend the rest of his natural life. Three more races, including today's \$500,000 Jockey Club Gold Cup at Belmont Park, are all that stand between Spectacular Bid and retirement.

Syndicated for \$22 million, Spectacular Bid will make an appearance at Laurel on Oct. 25 and will say farewell to the racing world and hello to the fillies after a Nov. 1 assignment at Churchill Downs. Then, it's off to Claiborne for a duties-alongside some notable residents — among them Secretariat.

"They'll move Secretariat over, naturally, when Bid shows up," said trainer Tom Delp. "His hands buried deep in the pockets of a blue Spectacular Bid is Spectacular Secretariat that's some trouble when he first got to Claiborne. He was a little shy with the ladies. Bid won't have any trouble at all."

He won't have much trouble with

seven would-be giant-killers in the Gold Cup, either. If all goes according to form, the 4-year-old Bid, fresh off a walkover victory in the Woodward Stakes two weeks ago, is fit and in fine shape for the mile-and-a-half he faces Saturday and the early line lists him as a 1-to-10 favorite.

He will be opposed by Temperence Hill, an erratic and immature horse who won the Arkansas Derby and the Belmont Stakes this year. No problem, says Delp. "There's not a horse around who can touch him."

Instrument Landing, John Henry, Novel Notion, Sluff Sentence, Silver Eagle and Ivory Hunter are also entered in the Gold Cup. John Henry, listed as the second choice at 6-to-1, will likely bow out.

"We have nothing left to prove," Delp said Friday morning. "Bid's 9-for-9 this year and he's won 10 in a row. I'm convinced he's the very best ever. He's beaten them all. He just overwhelms horses — it looks like he's beating a bunch of nothings. People that knock Bid either don't know horses or they're stupid."

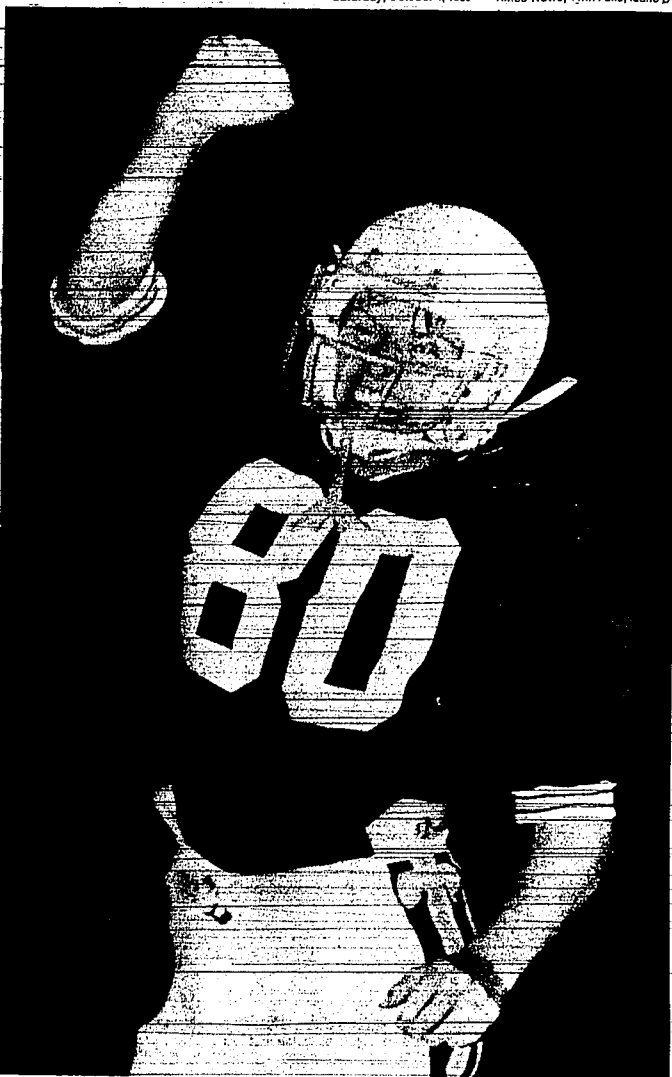
Each of the starters in the weight-for-age Gold Cup will carry 126 pounds except for the 3-year-olds.

Temperence Hill and Sluff Sentence, who will carry 121. The number of entrants surprised a lot of people after Bid scared everybody off in the Woodward, but the Gold Cup purse lured everybody out of hibernation. Second place will be worth a mere \$121,220.

"I'm not running for second place," said Joe Canley, who trains Temperence Hill. "I have to agree that our chances are slim, though. My horse has won at a mile-and-a-half and that's something Bid hasn't done. If my horse runs as hard as he can — a 3-year-old and his attitude is suspect. "He's got a lot of baby in him," said Canley. "He doesn't try as hard as he should. He's got a good disposition, he's quiet and very good natured, but he never has gotten down to business. That should change next year."

At this time next year, Spectacular Bid will be commanding a large sum for an easy afternoon in the hay.

"I'll miss him," said Delp. "So will the racing world."

### Sullivan leads Southern, Palmer 4 back

COLUMBUS, Ga. (UPI) — Mike Sullivan shot a 7-under-par 63 Friday for a record-tying two-day total of 131 and a two-stroke lead midway through the Southern Open golf tournament.

The 25-year-old University of Florida graduate had his best-ever round to stand two strokes ahead of George Burns and four over rookie Harry Taylor and Arnold Palmer, the first-round leader.

Sullivan, a third-year pro who has never won a PGA event, equaled the tournament record for 36-holes, which is held by John Schroeder (1975), Jerry Pate (1977) and Rocky Thompson (1978), but missed the course record of 62, set by Bobby Mitchell in 1972.

"I missed just three greens,"

said Sullivan. "It was a solid round."

Sullivan, whose best finish was a tie for second on the Bob Hope Classic, had seven birdies and no bogeys during his tour of the 6,793-yard, par-70 Green Island Country Club course. He turned in 31, two strokes off the front nine record, and shot 32 on the back.

He birdied three of the first four holes, ending four consecutive 3s, and added his fourth birdie on No. 5. Sullivan birdied three holes on the back, his longest birdie putt coming from 15 feet.

"This is a fun course," he said. "You have to drive well, and the greens are tricky so you have to hit the ball close."

"I putted awfully yesterday, and it got to me today," said Sullivan, 45th on the money list this

year with \$94,159. "Then today, I hit some solid shots and it snowballed."

Burns had four birdies on the front to equal Sullivan's 31 and birdied No. 10 to go 8-under for the tournament, but he bogeyed No. 13 and parred out for his 66 and 133 total.

"There was a lot of wind this afternoon," Burns said. "Anything in the red (under par) is a good round — I'm pleased to be in contention."

Palmer had an up-and-down round en route to his 69-135 and second consecutive sub-par round. He started on the back with a birdie on No. 12, bogeyed No. 16, but a birdie on the par-5 18th hole put him at 5-under through 36 holes.

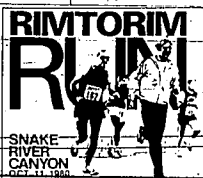

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# Court says Illini QB can continue to play

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (UPI) — University of Illinois quarterback Dave Wilson can continue playing football for the Illini in the Illinois Supreme Court ruled Friday in a 4-3 decision.

The high court rejected a motion from Big Ten attorneys, who Tuesday asked the William Clark to ban Wilson from the field.

The high court's action upheld a Sept. 19 appeals court ruling that allowed Wilson to play until his lawsuit against the Big Ten — which had denied him eligibility — is resolved.

The Big Ten has contended Wilson does not have enough academic credit to compete as a senior. Wilson, however, originally agreed to waive his rights as a junior with two years of eligibility remaining.

The Supreme Court's decision was confined to a four-justice ruling with no explanation. Dissenting from the majority opinion were Justices Howard Ryan, Thomas J. Moran and Thomas E. Kluczyński.

Clell Woods, clerk of the Supreme Court, said he did not expect to return any further appeals from the conference. He said the only legal recourse apparently open to the Big Ten would be an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Wilson's attorney Robert Auler was elated by the news.

"When we found out [his lawsuit] was over, I just went bananas," Auler said. "And then I called Dave, and he said 'I'm very grateful for all your help Mr. Auler.' That's the kind of kid he is."

Wilson will start for Illinois, now 2-1, Saturday against Mississippi State at Champaign.

The 21-year-old quarterback transferred to Illinois from Fullerton Junior College where he broke his arm on the first play of the first game of the 1977 season. Under Big Ten and NCAA rules, that one play used up one year of playing eligibility.

A conference eligibility committee originally agreed to waive its rules and let Wilson play football this fall. But a committee of faculty representatives overturned that decision and Wilson filed a lawsuit.

The Illinois State Bar Association Circuit Judge Harry Clem ruled Sept. 2 Wilson could play until his lawsuit went to trial. But new information surfaced and Clem two weeks later rescinded his ruling.

That decision sent the case to the appeals court, which reinstated Clem's Sept. 2 injunction and Wilson was calling signals again.

# Miami deal for Cunningham no go; he flunks physical

MIAMI (UPI) — The Miami Dolphins deal with the New England Patriots for holdout fullback Sam "Bam" Cunningham was scratched Friday when a physical examination revealed his knees, ankles and a shoulder were ailing.

More specific results of the examination by club physician Dr. Charles Virgin were not revealed. Cunningham, hindered by injuries last season, said before the physical he was now completely healthy. The Dolphins disagreed.

Cunningham didn't pass the physical—a club spokesman said. "He has problems with both knees, both ankles and a shoulder."

The Dolphins said the deal with the Patriots had not been completed, so they would retain any draft choices involved.

It had been reported that the Dolphins offered first and seventh round choices for Cunningham, but could change to a second and third depending on the kind of year they

have.

Cunningham had been a holdout at New England since training camp opened because he wanted a reported \$350,000 over a three-year contract. Rumors were only that Cunningham might be paid more than \$250,000 if he joined the Dolphins.

The 33-year-old Cunningham, 6-3 and 230 pounds, had rushed for 5,136 yards in seven seasons since joining the Dolphins as a first round draft choice. He also caught 188 passes for 1,819 yards.

But last year, he missed four of the club's last six games and gained only 567 yards rushing.

Despite persistent rumors Thursday, the Dolphins had insisted no trade had been completed and negotiations were still under way.

The Dolphins have been looking for a big running back since last summer when Larry Csonka and owner Joe Robbie failed to come to terms. Second-year man Steve Howell, thus keeps his job as starting fullback.

### Taylor reactivated by Giants

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (UPI) — Billy Taylor, who led the New York Giants in rushing last season but injured his knee in the final preseason game this year, Friday was reactivated from the injured reserve list.

Taylor, who was placed on injured reserve just before the regular season began, gained 700 yards last year and scored seven touchdowns. He is expected to make his 1980 regular-season debut Sunday in Dallas, but New York Coach Ray Flunkin has indicated the third-year back will probably see only limited action.

The Giants also reinstated free agent safety Gary Woodford one day after they placed rookie safety Tony Blount on injured reserve. Blount underwent knee surgery following an injury in last Sunday's game against Los Angeles.

### Top seeds advance in Madrid tennis

MADRID (UPI) — The top four seeds of the \$125,000 Madrid-Open Tennis Championships advanced to the semifinals in straight sets Friday, led by Argentinean Guillermo Vilas.

Despite the lack of surprise in the outcome of the quarterfinals, the play was the best so far on the courts of the exclusive Club de Campo.

The high point of the round was the first set of the match between second-seeded Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia and fifth-seeded Balazs Taroczy of Hungary.

Lendl, playing a confident game with hardly any errors, met strong resistance from Taroczy until the Hungarian lost the first set 7-6 in the tie break. Lendl swept the second set 6-1.

The top-seeded Vilas outlasted Bolivian Mario Martinez, 6-1, 6-1, giving him the sixth seed in the tournament.

In the other two quarterfinal matches, third-seeded Jose Luis Cere of Argentina defeated unseeded Ross Case of Australia and fourth-seeded Hans Gildemeister of Chile beat eighth-seeded Andres Gomez of Ecuador, both by 6-2, 6-4.

Vilas will meet Gildemeister and Lendl will face Cere in today's semifinals.

### Sayers honored by Camp Foundation

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (UPI) — The Walter Camp Football Foundation Friday named former Chicago Bears running back Gale Sayers as its man of the year.

The foundation honored Sayers for his "tremendous achievements on the football field" and "his contributions to his community, his country and his fellow person."

Sayers, now director of athletics at Southern Illinois, will be honored at the foundation's annual banquet Feb. 7 in New Haven along with George "Papa Bear" Halas, the owner of the Chicago Bears.

Halas was named earlier to receive the foundation's distinguished American award.

Sayers was the NFL rookie of the year in 1965 when he set an NFL record by scoring 25 season touchdowns. The five-time NFL All-Pro was the youngest person to be inducted into the pro football Hall of Fame in 1977 at the age of 34.

# BRIDGE

## Opposing negative doubts

By Oswald Jacoby and Alan Sontag

If you play in bridge tournaments you will find that many of your opponents use the double of overcalls for full-out, not double jump. Most of the time this double will be made with a fairly weak hand, as little as six or seven points, but the minimum will be greater. In general the fourth hand is likely to have support for his partner's suit and he should take immediate action to compete.

The general rule here should be to give weak single raises, preemptive jump raises and to use the redouble with good hands.

We will show some illustrations after the bidding goes: one club-one spade-double.

You hold: S x x x H J x x x x D 5 C x x x x. Bid two diamonds to get a bid later on. Five hearts with two negative doubles, remember that a negative double of a major suit almost always shows four cards of the other major — a negative double of a minor suit shows at least 4-3 in the two suits.
