Dow average barely misses 1,000 level in heavy trading

NEW YORK (UPI) — Blue-chip stocks Tuesday climbed to their highest level in nearly four years but the Dow Jones average failed to crack the magical 1,000 barrier.

It was the fourth heaviest trading session on record. The Dow average, which hit 999 shortly after noon EST, gained 11.69 points to close at 997.95, the lowest level since it finished at 997.75 on Dec. 3, 1977.

The Dow last closed above 1,000 on Dec. 31, 1976, when it hit 1,004.65 just before Jimmy Carter took office as president.

One observer said it appeared some professional traders poured their money into the market just to see the average hurdle past 1,000, just as it did on Nov. 14, 1972, when the Dow first closed above the 1,000 mark by reaching 1,003.16.

President-elect Ronald Reagan has been the catalyst in the latest rally — the Dow has climbed 60.75 points since election day — because Wall Street is hopeful the Republican leader will be successful in pushing policies favorable to business.

The New York Stock Exchange index gained 1.16 to 80.48 — a record high — and the price of a share increased 35 cents. Advances topped declines, 1,065-540, over the 1,947 issues traded at 4 p.m. EST.

The Big Board volume of 70,380,000

most active NYSE-listed issue, plunged 2 1/2 to 12 in trading that included blocks of 46,700 shares at 14 1/4, 120,000 shares at 12 1/4, and 679,200 shares at 11 1/4. The company cut its quarterly dividend payout to 16 cents from 20 cents a share.

Sears, Roebuck was third on the NYSE active list, tacking on 1/2 to 16 1/4 in trading that included a block of 318,000 shares at 16.

Armco Steel Corp. rose 2 to 39 1/4. Armco and Nippon Steel have agreed to swap \$1.2 billion worth of stock of each company's.

On the American Stock Exchange, advances topped declines, 334-308, with over the 865 issues traded at 4 p.m. EST. Volume at that time totaled 9,620,000 shares, compared with 8,160,000 traded Monday.

Houston Oil & Minerals was the most active Amex issue, off 1/4 to 47 1/4. Gulf Oil of Canada followed, up 1/4 to 19 1/4. Amdahl was third, off 1/4 to 36 1/4.

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# Air Force names first of possible MX sites

**SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)** — The Air Force has selected Coyote Springs, Nev., as the recommended site for the major support base for the proposed MX missile system, while suggesting that a secondary base be located at Milford, Utah, state officials say.

Kent Olson, head of Utah's MX coordination office, said he was informed by Air Force leaders Tuesday that a draft environmental impact statement due to be released by the military next month will list the two sites as the best available locations for housing support personnel who will maintain and operate the huge nuclear weapons system.

Utah and Nevada officials will then take 90 days to analyze and respond to the draft EIS, he said.

He said the statement probably will not include suggestions on how Coyote Springs — located about 60 miles northeast of Las Vegas — and Milford in Utah's Beaver County about 45 miles north of Cedar City, could provide services for the new

residents.

Air Force officials would prefer to see personnel housed off-base, he said, but would provide on-base units if the two areas cannot provide necessary services.

"They feel that off-base housing would help integrate their personnel into the communities, and would allow workers to find a hedge against inflation by buying their own homes,"

Olson said.

"Unfortunately, what it does is to rely excessively on the free market at a time when the housing industry is in really bad shape," he said. Olson said if the federal government is willing to help communities in the impact area build new streets, water and sewer systems, it would provide an incentive for contractors to move ahead with new home construction.

He said location of a secondary base in Milford would bring at least 6,500 military employees and their dependents into the area. In all, the base might attract more than 16,000 new residents, Olson predicted.

The MX coordinator said Milford appears to be a good site for such a base since it is equidistant from Cedar City and Beaver — allowing all three communities to share the social im-

pacts and economic benefits of the influx of new residents.

"I am pleased that the Air Force has decided to recommend specific sites for location of the support bases," Olson said. "This will allow us to deal more accurately with the impacts associated with possible construction of the system."

Under the Air Force plan, 4,600 concrete launch sites would be built in

the Great Basin of Utah and Nevada. Two hundred multi-warhead nuclear missiles would be rotated among the launchers to stymie enemy detection of any specific missile location.

The Pentagon has also promised to look at other possible sites for the planned \$33 billion system, and is considering a proposal to split-base the MX in two areas of the United States.

## Heating bill subsidies are delayed

**BOISE (UPI)** — Idaho Department of Health and Welfare officials said Tuesday low income families eligible for federal funds to help defray winter heating bills will have to wait until January to receive their first checks.

Kenneth Blomstedt, chief of the department's Bureau of Benefit Payments, said the state's plan to distribute \$11 million in Low Income Energy Assistance payments was submitted last week and approval is expected by Nov. 26.

She said anyone seeking help through this year's program will have to file an application. In the past, payments to some persons were automatic.

The department spokesman said applications will not be available until the second week in December and at that time they will be mailed to all families receiving Aid to Dependent Children, food stamps or Supplemental Security Income.

The deadline for applications is Feb. 28, 1981, to be eligible for both the first and second payments or March 21, 1981, to be eligible for the second check only.

Eligibility for the program is based upon poverty guidelines set by the federal Community Services Administration. For example, a family of two is eligible if its annual income is under \$6,264. The income limit increased by \$1,525 for each additional family member.

Under the plan, payments will vary according to five factors: family income, geographical location, type of fuel, source of supply, and whether fuel is purchased directly or is included in rental cost.

## PUC orders rate break for 911 call

**BOISE (UPI)** — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission ordered Mountain Bell Telephone Co. Tuesday to offer low rates to local governments for 911 emergency calling service.

The service should be offered at the standard one-party residential rate, not a higher commercial or government rate, the PUC order said. For 911 service, the utility usually charges local governments at a much higher rate than the standard residential rate.

The commission said its 1979 ruling that raised Mountain Bell's pay-phone rate to 25 cents from 10 cents per call gave the company extra revenue to offer a lower rate to local governments for 911 service.

The commission said it granted Mountain Bell authority to charge 25 cents per pay-phone call rather than the utility's requested 20-cent rate to allow quicker implementation of system-wide emergency calling service.

## Pharmacy investigator reinstated

**BOISE (UPI)** — Idaho Pharmacy Board investigator Jeff Black, fired last winter for his role in releasing a controversial board memorandum, has been reinstated by a state Personnel Commission hearing officer.

Black was ordered returned to work Monday, and the board has 30 days to appeal the ruling.

Black and the board's chief investigator, Bert Wilson, were marked for dismissal in an internal memorandum, which was made public with Black's help.

The investigators had been critical of board practices and advocated transfer of its investigative powers to the state Law Enforcement Department.

In another board-related matter, the board has put off for at least a month a decision on whether to revoke the Idaho pharmacist's license of former Payette City Councilman Darrell J. Fike.

Lawyers for the board and Fike told the board yesterday they would submit legal briefs, meaning the board would need more time to consider Fike's case.



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### Gang of Four charged with building army

PEKING (UPI) — The Gang of Four built up a massive secret army equipped with 74,000 rifles and 300 artillery pieces to seize power in a nationwide rebellion, Chinese authorities charged Tuesday.

The unusual public release of the fourth and last part of the book-length charge sheet against 10 of China's former rulers, including the widow of Mao Tse-tung, cleared the way for opening the trial itself, probably within a few days.

China also announced it would broadcast part of the trial — the most dramatic in the history of modern China — via satellite to television viewers around the world.

The latest chapter of the indictment filled in details on the alleged plot by the Gang of Four led by the late Communist Party chairman's widow, Jiang Qing, to create a private army in its main powerbase, the seaport of Shanghai.

The gang, arrested in 1976, had been worried that the regular Chinese army was "not in our hands" and methodically built their own force of tens of thousands of men recruited mainly from the Shanghai militia, the indictment says.

This underground army was formidable — 74,000 rifles, 300 artillery pieces and 10 million rounds of ammunition. It was to spark a nationwide rebellion during which the gang would seize control of China and eliminate opposition.

The plan collapsed when the gang was seized in Peking during a power struggle. When news of the arrests reached Shanghai, supporters marshaled 33,500 troops and set up a command team to seize the city.

The indictment, however, gave no indication of what happened to the army — whether it disbanded quietly or its members were rounded up and imprisoned or shot.

Earlier portions of the indictment listed details of 48 specific treasonous offenses allegedly committed by 10 plotters, collectively labeled the "10 evil heads," which includes the Gang of Four and the Clique of Six, who were followers of the late Defense Minister Lin Biao. Lin reportedly died in an airplane crash while attempting to flee the country in 1971 after a plot to kill Mao failed.

The offenses included the murder of 34,000 people and the persecution of 500,000 more during the 1966-76 Cultural Revolution, the planned assassination of Mao, and the systematic harassment of such well-known personalities as the late Premier Chou En-lai and China's current strongman, Vice Chairman Deng Xiaoping.

### Iran calls for probe by UN, says Iraq used gas in attack


BAGHDAD, Iraq (UPI) — Iran asked for international investigation of its charges that Iraq used chemical and incendiary weapons in attempting to seize Susangerd, 20 miles east of the frontier between the oil giants and a key objective on the road to beleaguered Ahwaz.

Tehran radio claimed Tuesday that Iranian troops had cleared Susangerd of Iraqi attackers in fighting that left the desert town's streets littered with corpses.


Baghdad communiques, in contrast, said Iraqi forces tightened their grip on "enemy pockets" in the town, while helicopter gunships pounded the Iranian positions on the 58th day of the Persian Gulf war.

Iran also said its warplanes made numerous raids, sinking three "medium-sized" Iranian warships in the Persian Gulf.

U.N. peace envoy Olof Palme left Switzerland for Tehran on a mission that he cautioned was unlikely to resolve the "very contradictory" positions of the warring states and end the fighting.

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### Polish party announces key changes

WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — Authorities announced major changes Tuesday in local Communist Party leadership along with new currency regulations limiting travel by Poles to Czechoslovakia to four times a year.

In Gdoscnowa, a strike alert was called by Solidarity, the independent labor coalition, when it was learned that the provincial governor was still in office. Workers had demanded his resignation Monday and thought it was accepted. And at the same time, official reports said fullscale rationing of meat, meat products and fats would go into effect Jan. 1 if plans went as expected.

A government spokesman said details of the ration plan would be released Friday.

In major party reforms, Alojzy Karkoska, head of the Warsaw area Communist organization, was ousted from office. He was an ally of former party boss Edward Gierek who was toppled in September in the wake of massive strikes.

The party leader in the textile center of Lodz also was replaced, the government announcement said.

The currency regulations, limiting the number of times a Pole can buy Czech money, will effectively limit travel to Czechoslovakia to four times a year as part of an overall attempt to prevent the spread of the "Polish revolution."

### Helmut Schmidt arrives in U.S. for discussions

BONN, West Germany (UPI) — Chancellor Helmut Schmidt flew to the United States Tuesday for meetings with President Carter and top aides of Ronald Reagan.

Government sources said Schmidt, accompanied by Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher, was carrying a pledge to increase defense spending following U.S. criticism of German plans to hold military outlays below a NATO target.

On the eve of Schmidt's trip to the United States, government sources said the chancellor had decided to hike military spending in 1981 from the originally planned 1.8 percent of West Germany's overall budget to close to 3 percent.

Genscher supported the surprise increase as a way of alleviating U.S.-German friction. American policy makers, including senators close to Reagan, had criticized the original Bonn budget.

Schmidt said he will meet with top Reagan aides but that he had not asked for a meeting with the president-elect.

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


