Gooding school fears funding shortfall

BOISE (UP!) — Staff and program cuts will be ordered at the State School for the Deaf and Blind in Gooding if lawmakers don't provide sufficient funding to cover current operations. School superintendent Keith Tolzin today told members of the Legislature's Joint Finance. Appropriations Committee he will eliminate teachers and cut back on services if legislators don't appropriate about \$2.8 million for fiscal year 1982, a \$267,000 increase over current funding levels.





Peavey keys voter law fight

BOISE (UPI) — The Idaho Senate urvived a challenge to Sen. John Yeavey's election without fighting between the political parties.

And with dismissal of the challenge, a new fight erupted over how to solve the state's problems with penalizing election fraud.

At the root of the problem is Idaho's lack of a voter-residency requirement. Individuals need only "intend" to live in the state to register to vote. Registration deadlines, and out-dated, voter rolls also have contributed to voting problems, lawmakers say.

A host of bills are expected to come-before lawmakers quickly-now that the election contest has been eliminated. In addition, lawmakers on both sides of the aisle are calling for repeal or reform of what they call the out-dated and vague 1890 law under which: Peavey's election was contested.



In march from White House to Capitol 50,000 protest-'73 court abortion decision

WASHINGTON (UP1) — Trudding 30 abreast up Pennsylvania Avenue, thousands of anti-abortfonist demonstrators marched from the White House grounds to the Capitol Thursday to demand, a constitutional right-to-life amendment.

In a parade with no bands and few spectators, the singing, chanting lobbyists proclaimed as "infamy" the 1973 Supreme Court abortion ruling they blame for "carnage" they equate with Adolf Hitler's holocaust. Leaders of the "March for Lifet," organized by Neille Gray, planned to meet with President Reagan after the march.

More than an hour later, the paraders reached Capitol Hill, split into columns assigned to lobby the House and Senate office buildings, and began making the rounds of congressional offices.

The anniversary of the court decision sparked sharp debate. Amendment supporters likened abortions to Hiller's goal of exterminating the Jews in Germany, while opponents contended a ban could lead to a "Big Brother" government operation insuring all pregancies go to term.

MVMH changes billings

TWIN FALLS — New billing pro-cedures for Magic Valley Memorial Hospital go into effect Feb. 2. Alter that date, the hospital will bill only-five-insuring agencies for outpa-tient services. They are: Medicare, Medicaid, Blue Cross, Workman's Compensation and the Rural Health Clinic.

Medicaid, Blue Cross, Workman's Compensation and the Rural Health Clinic.

Patients with other insurance or no insurance will be informed of charges and be asked to pay at the time of service. Insured patients will be given necessary documentation to bill their own companies. Reimbursement will then go directly to the patient, rather than to the hospital.

Uninsured patients unable to pay the total bill at the time, will be asked to make a partial payment or to set up a monthly payment plan.

Previously, outpatients could request the hospital to bill any insurance agency for services.

Outpatient services include such things as X-rays, laboratory tests and emergency treatment, if a person is not subsequently admitted. Billing procedures for inpatients, or those admitted to the hospital, and billing for outpatient surgery will not be changed.

The new policy—is—an—effort to improve the hospital's financial status as it embarks on its extensive renovation and building program.

Richardson estimates about half of the hospital's 3,000 outpatients a month are covered by one of the five insuring agencies and would probably—not be affected by the new stipulations. He also said most area doctors' offices require payment at the time of service, which means patients would.



Family hopes Iranian-American will be released soon

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The release of the 52 American hostages has given hope to the mother, son and brother of an American still imprisoned in Tehran that he too might soon be set free. There has been little mention of three other Americans arrested in Tehran in the months after Iranian militants took over the U.S. embassy. One of this three is Mohl Sobhani, 44, an Iranian-born U.S. ciltzen who came to the United States in 1956. Sobhani returned to Iran to work in 1976 on an American passport. He was arrested Sept. 6 at Tehran Airport, as he was about to board a plane to the United States. Most of Sobhani's family including his elderly mother and a son. Scott, a freshman at UCLA, live in the suburban Van Nuys' district. His brother, Morris, lives in Santa Barbara, Calif. They are afraid to talk

too much about Sobhani for fear of jeopardizing his chances for freedom.

A family spokesman said their spirits were lifted by Tuesday's release of the \$2 hostages, however.

"We are hoping that the release of the hostages will open up a dialogue between the United States and the Iranian government," the spokesman said.

"We hope this will ease the situation to the point that they might be able to release the other priscorers."

Before the 52 Americans were released, the family held out hope that Sobhani and the other two Americans would be included in some sort of "package deal." When Sunday's announcement of a linal agreement mentioned only the 52, their last hopes were dashed.

After his arrest, Sobhani's relatives in the United

States spent two weeks trying to find out what had happened to him.

Sobhani's wife, who is also in Iran with the couple's 4-year-old daughter, eventually learned that he was being held at Evin Prison in Tehran. She said she was permitted to speak through a window for two or three minutes at a time.

The family went months without any direct word from Sobhani. On Menday, one day before the 52 hostages were released, they finally received through the Red Crossa letter he had written last November. In the letter, Sobhani said he was still in prison in Tehran, but made no mention of any charges against him. The spokesman said the letter indicated he was in good health, and said he looked forward to being released.

The spokesman also said Sobhani seemed more-

concerned about his relatives in the United States than about his own siluation. The relatives say they have not been able to get any information on Sobbani from the U.S. State Department and do not know if American officials are doing anything to secure his release. Last November, a State Department spokesman said he did not know what Sobbani was charged with and said officials were not including him and the other-two Americans in the hostage negotiations.

Also still held capive in I ran are Cynthia Dwyer, 49, a freelance journalist from Buffalo, N.Y., who was arrested May 5 at her hotel and has been charged with espionage; and Zla Kahn Nassry, a naturalized U.S. cilizen who was born in Afpanistian and was thought to be a leader in the Afghan resistance to the Soviet occupation.

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union charged Thursday that CIA psychologists will brainwash the former U.S. hostages before allowing them to return home in order I.o. wipe out any feelings of sympathy toward Iran they might have.

The official Tass news agency also accused the American press of stirring up a "hullabaloo" over alleged mistreatment by Iranians and-criticized President Reagan for not committing himself to former President Carter's agreement on terms for the release of the 52 Americans.

"Before the former, hostages are allowed to meetpress representatives, they will be subjected to a detailed interrogation and brainwashing, and a big group of CIA experts and psychologists are already there for the purpose," said the Tass report datelined Washington.

Tass såid this was the result of "strong pressure from influential financial circles of the United States which are not going to release from their hands the wealth of the Iranian people."

Earlier, the Communist Party newspaper Pravda charged Carter played with the lives of the hostages, while negotiating their release and said the United States was still carrying out "an unbridled anti-Iranian campaign.



NEW ORLEANS - The bottom line on Super Bowl XV is: For the 23 minutes of commercials during the game, NBC will reap about \$12.6 million.

Throw in the two-hour pre-game show, the post-game show and the rebroadcast of the game_at_mid-(the repeat gets the bargain-basement commercial rate of \$30,000 per minute com-pared with \$550,000 -for-the-live gamel, and you come up with an avalanche of dollars that could reach \$18 million.

Put another way, commercial spots in the game have sold for more than \$9,000 per second.

Now that you know all that, NBC's investment of \$6 million for rights_to_this_gold-plated-pigskin fiesta doesn't seem like a bad deal.

Ironically, NBC is the network that started all this madness. Over four decades ago - on Oct. 22, 1939 - NBC broadcast the first pro football game ever on television. The Brooklyn Dodgers (yes, a football tearn too in those days) played the Philadelphia Eagles before a crowd of 13,051 people and exactly one TV camera. Since hardly anyone then owned a TV

set, the audience was rather small.
And now the Eagles will play the
Oakland Raiders Sunday at 4 p.m.

Superdome.

Primarily because of the captivating nature of the teams, NBC is confident it will shatter audience records. The record is the 102 million people who watched Super Bowl XII when Denver lost to Dallas, a game also played in New Orleans

As is usual with the premier event in American sports, NBC is leaving no stop unpulled for the broadcast. Each year the event seems to be bigger. The network has brought 130 people to New Orleans to work the game, along with 15 cameras, 10 replay machines, three miles of video cable and four miles of audio cable

That's the nature of television, an octopus that seems to grow more and longer tentacles every year. For Super Bowl XVI next year in Pontiac, Mich., there'll be more of everything again.

The most visible members of the

NBC force are Dick Enberg and Merlin Olsen, probably the best sports team in broadcasting, who'll handle play-by-play and color, respectively.

Former pro quarterbacks Len Dawson and John Brodie are on hand to provide whatever insight they've got on what the quarterbacks on the field are up to. the Bryant Gumbel will be host of the pre- and post-game shows. Mike

(MST) in the New Orleans are overlooked by everybody else. NBC is just coming off an inter-

esting but failed experiment with its announcerless football game from Miami last month.

For viewers, the game was a thumping bore. We become labora-tory rats for NBC and didn't like it one bit. As much as fans grouse about announcers, the game proved how necessary they are to keep us abreast of what the devil's going

However, one benefit of the experiment was that NBC's cadre of commentators realized what we knew all along - they talk too much.

Consequently, this Super Bowl should contain "a lot less talk than you're used to hearing." according to NBC Sports Executive Producer Don Ohlmeyer.

After the announcerless game, Enberg says, he and Olsen took it upon themselves to clam up, stimating that in subsequent reg ular-season and playoff games their chatter was cut "by maybe 20 percent, and I don't think anybody noticed

"All of us talk too much," he says. "There's a good reason for that — we're there to talk.

"But we've learned that some things can go unsaid. And the better the game, the less you need the announcers."

One reason Enberg and Olsen Adamle and Bob Trumpy also will vow they'll talk less is that NBC be around to reveal what details, will have better pictures to offer.
