Clinics close

Idaho Migrant Council shuts down rural health care facilities

By STEPHANIE SCHOROW

TWIN FALLS — Amid uncertainty bout prospects for rural health care, laho Migrant Council clinics in Twin alls and Burley close today.

The clinics have been ordered by the Seattle regional office of the Public Health Service to end direct patient care as of March 31. Clinic managers, say a few staffers will remain at the clinics next week to. finish phase-out chores and answer phane calls.

Staffs are boxing up equipment and supplies, and attempting to refer pa-tients to other area health providers, a difficult task, says Twin Falls clinic

records specialist Donna Whitten.
"It's a bad time because migrants are beginning to come into the area," she said. "A lot of people have the feeling they won't find medical treatment because of not being able to may."

treatment because of not being able to pay."

The PHS recently discontinued funding of the IMC clinics because of alleged mismanagement and other deficiencies. IMC officials say the timing of the PHS's decision disregards the needs of low-income migrant and seasonal farmworkers.

No other agency has yet been granted funds for handling rural health care in the Twin Falls and Burley area.

But delays caused by the state's Certificate of Need law may scotch

But detays caused by the same of certificate of Need law may societh the plan. Meanwhile, clinic managers are unsure what will happen to clinic's equipment, medical supplies and thousands of patient files. IMC officials—say, they are awaiting PHE's directives in these areas.

Whitten and John Moore, Burley clinic manager, said files will remain in the clinics for now. Patients may sign a release form and blck up copies of their files or direct copies to be sent to a dootor of their choice. The clinics—are required to homo patient requests for record transfers. For record transfers, a member of the Burley clinic's staff said after she had sent a patient's record to the designated patient's record to the designated patient's record to the designated—doctor,—she—was—phoned—by—the—

doctor's office, saying they were re-turning the file. She said she was told to "send the patient over first" rather than the file.

Tom Romero, INC operations chief, said the INC's five clinics have more than 22,000 files. He said the council-will decide whether to centralize the files or somehow maintain them in the clinics' areas.

Because much of the clinics' equipment was purchased with federal funds, the PHS must direct the IMC as to its eventual transfer. Romero as to its eventual transfer, Romero said. The PHS has not yet done so, he

said.

Whitten said those seeking help for medical problems have not being referred to specific physicians.



Burnett turns the tables

Carol Burnett's victory over the National
Enquirer may go a long way toward cleaning
up this country's teeshy publications.
A California jury decided Thursday the
actress had been libeled in a story and
awarded her \$1.6 million. She initially sought
\$10 million, claiming a story about her being
drunk at a Washington dinner party was "a
pack of lies."

Even before the trial had -concluded, Burnett's suit spawned a number of other lawsuits by entertainers and other celebrities who claimed they too, had been libeled in National Enquirer stories.

Burnett's suit was not without a great deal of personal frustration or cost. It took her five years and \$250,000 in legal fees to win her fight. But now that she has won, more persons in the 'public eye' who heretofore might have been loathe to seek refress will be encouraged to step into the courtroom.

will the decision change the Enquirer's trademark? It remains to be seen since the tabloid will appeal the decision. But the initial decision has got to have them quivering at least a little. It was the first libel suit against the Enquirer to get into court.

For years, the Enquirer and numerous other Proryears, the Enquirer and numerous since pairoting publications have been having a field day with public figures, particularly those in the enter ainment industry. Every conceivable rumor, en'anglement, tidbit, gossip, relationship, etc., has been grist for the mill; the more sensational, the better.

The Burnett decision scinforces the principal that although the First Amendment guarantees freedom of speech and press, it does not mean freedom to publish lies and untruths that smear someone's reputation. The First Amendment carries with it a responsibility, one the trash publications have long incred. ong ignored

But the sad fact is that such magazines have simply been pandering to the gluttonous appetites of their readers. The National Enquirer and others, are sold extremely successfully through supermarkets where shoppers make gossip and sex as necessary as butter and eggs.

The fact that such magazines have flourished is another indication of how low morality has deteriorated in this country. It goes hand in hand with the calibre of television and movie entertainment these days — sex, violence, blood, guts, gore, more sex.

But Burnett has taken them on indication the days of open season celebrities are over.

The case and resulting publicity no doubt have done wonders for the National Enquirer's circulation. But only in the short run — for the handwriting is on the wall; they'd have to be pretty stupid to ignore it.

"Many are the old ploneer stock of people who are natives of the region."

The first play in Oakley was presented in 1883 by a drama group of ploneers who used a wagon cover for a stage curtain. One of the members of that dirst group was Severe's greatgrandfather.

From log cabin_beginnings, the drama in Oakley received a real boost in the arm when a private kilzen, B.P. Howell, built a playhouse in 1904 at his own expense. That playhouse is the moving force behind the council.

"If the pioneers wanted something done, they did it themselves," said Severe. His group is crusading, pioneer-style, to save the Oakley Playhouse.

Don't quit coffee yet

NEW YORK (UPI) — Don't decaf-feinate yet. A new study by scientists says coffee drinking in moderation is not harmful.

The report released Wednesday was at odds with some linking even minimal coffee drinking with birth defects, cancer, heart attacks, diabetes, ulcers, and emotional disorders.

As recently as last week, scientists at the Harvard, School of Public Health said in a "New England Journal of Medicine" article that coffee drinkers may be more susceptible to pancreatic cancer.

"There is little evidence to support such charges," said Wednesday's report from the American Council on Science and Health.

report from the American Council on Science and Health.

The ACSH acknowledged sensitivity to califeine varies and that those who consume large amounts dally — more than 5 cups of coffee or 15 sodas — are likely to have health problems.

But the ACSH report said califeine—will not harm the health of most of the 182 million Americans who regularly ingest the central nervous system stimulant in some form.

"A review of more than 10,000 scientific articles on the relationship between caffeine and health has found no alleged disease associations based—on valid human evidence," said Dr. John Todhunter, a Catholie University biochemistry professor and coordinator of the study.

Caffeine is a naturally occurring chemical found in more than 83 plant species. Coffee is the most common source in the American diet. Other sources are tea, cocoa, some soft drinks, many over-the-counter drugs—especially cold and heddach, remedies.

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (UPI).— Dick Fosbury; who revolutionized high Jumping with the "Posbury Flop", is one of 10 people to be inducted into the National Track and Fleid Hall of Earne in August.

The others are the Clyde Littlefield, Bill Bowerman and the late Jim Elliott, all countes; sprinter Dave Sime, long jumper Willye White, steeplechase runner George Young, distance runner Fred Will, hurdler Percy Beard and the late track and field writer Jesse Abramson.

Fosbury, now a construction company owner and county engineer at Retchum, had a jumping style which attracted anglentlon around the world. Instead of using the traditional sideways roll to clear the bar, he jumped backwards.

The jump was called the "Fosbury Flont" and many young high jumpers began to limitate Fegbury's style.

In 1966, Fosbury set an Olympic record with a high jump of 7 feet, 4½ inches.

Fosbury and the others will be inducted into the hall Aug. 14, bringing its membership to 94 men and women since it was founded in 1974.

- Elittlefield, 86, coached the University of Texas track team 14 years. He now lives at Auslin, Tex.

- Bowerman, Jongline I rack coach at the University of Oregon and coach of the 1972 U.S. Olympic track team: also played an active role in the development of track shoes and other equipment.

•Elliott, who died Sunday, led Villanova teams [6] dozens of track and field titles; two of his athletes, Iton Delany and Charles Jenkins, won Olympic gold medials.

•Sime won the Olympic silver media for the 160 Heart dissh at 9.3. He is an opthalmologist in Marin, [F1].

•White is the only woman to have earned a place or five U.S. Olympic teams, She won the silver media in the long jump in the 1986 Olympics; also won 13 national long jump littles. She now works for the Bureaur of Family Health Services in Chicago.

It was a cooperative effort between the U.S. Bureau of Land Management, and Fish and Game, both providing money for the collars and personnel.

A new experimental net was to be placed across openings into which the antelope would be driven by

helicopter and become captured in the net for tagging. This was assuming they ran into the net as scheduled. The first attempt north of Kimama resulted in two captured animals but, a large section of net was blown down by the helicopter and most of the animals escaped. Two additional attempts, including the one near Patterson Reservoir described in the opening patagraph, were unsuccessful. Fishing season néars

Before general season fishing usually involves at least one trip to Niagara Springs.

The majority of us fish one small rea where the water comes out of the area where the water comes out of the steelhead hatchery back into the ori-ginal stream bed. There is a lot more to this area that just this one lishing spot.

Last Sunday, when my fishing partner and I where there, no one was fishing the flats below the popular spot and the fish were churning.

A new fishing spot is available in this area. The outlet of the private fish hatchery is accessable. There is a parking area and a fence hole for access to the trail leading to the river.

But, I want some of you to try the rapids downriver from Niagara Springs.

When you reach the bottom of Niagara grade, turn right through the log arch and follow the upper road to the fence which has a locked gate and a sign not allowing motorized vehicles.

a sign no morning vehicles.

The parking area will take about six vehicles. J suggest having hip boots or waders and fish the rapids that form before the large waterfall. Fishing these rapids should be done like—tishing a small stream. Many of the reachable waters are just that, small streams that spread out into channels making some nice fishing holes.

I have used a various assortment of fles in the past in this area, but have always been beaten by the balt fisherman. The scrag fish are plentiful now. The red horse will take anything you get to the water.

The smart local boys catch a few of these red horse and cut them into the shape of small minnows. This will slow down the trash fish problem but not stop is at this time of year.

My fishing partner and I kept the trash fish in a plastic bag and had some fine fertilizer when we got home.

Probably the most opoular spot in e rapids is the lower falls where the the fishermen fish the edges of the swift water.

The area is semi-beautiful and will vide you some new vistas for your

Yes, Mom and the larger kids could make it down to the lower falls, but mother will cuss all the way.

To go directly to the lower falls, walk down the road from the parking area until you see some popular trees and turn toward the river. You may have to cross the irrigation ditch when it is full so some balancing expert has provided a three-log bridge to cross. From there, a slight trail leads you to the lower falls.

Please bring all your scrap fish and trash out. Heek, those trash fish make-excellent lertilizer for your outdoor plants. Besides, the next time I go to the area and it stinks of rotting fish, I'll swear.
