

## 15 die as light planes collide over Colorado

LOVELAND. Colo. (UP1)—An-airpiane-loaded-with-skydivers collided with a small commuter airpiane over northern Colorado Friday, tilling 15 poople, the Larimer-County sheriff office asid.

Three skydivers and the pilot of the smaller airpiane easingle-engine Cessnn 266—parachuted to sately-afferthe crash, but two other skydivers were killed. All 11 passengers and the crewmen on the twin-degiac commuter craft, a Handley Page turbo-prop owned by Air U.S., were killed.

The commuter airplane was on a regularly-scheduled flight from Denver to Gillette, Wyo., said Rod Getty, director of operations for the airline. The plane was flying over the Loveland Fort. Collins. Airport when the crash

occurred.



## Students shot fleeing burning dorm

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (UPI) — A student altegedly threw a Molotov cocktail into the hallway of a University of Michigan dormitory and then shot to death two students as they fled the building.

Ann-Arbor police arrested Leo Kelly, 22, a junior psychology major from Detroit, in his room at Bursley Hall shortly after the early morning shooting, Kelly was scheduled to be arraigned Saturday on an open

The suspect was dressed in leather pants; a sleeveless T-shirt and vest as he was led away by police. On his bleep was the burned-in brand of the Greek Tetter "Omega," which somemembers of the black fraternity Omega Psi Phi wear on their arm. A

member of Omega Psi Phi confirmed that Kelly belongs to the fraternity. Wilnesses said the sequence of events was unclear, but it appeared that Kelly tossed the Molotov cocktail from the door of his room into the hallway, and then opened fire with a shotgun as students ran down the hall. No other injuries were reported and the fire was quickly extinguished. A shotgun was taken from the suspect's room, police said, No motive for the attack was given. It was the second shooting incident at the dormitory in a little over a month. On March 8, police said, a student pulled a 32-caliber handgun and fired on another student during a scuffer in the main lobby. Police said they did not think the incident was related to Friday's shooting.

Killed Friday were Edward Siwik, 19, a freshman from Detroit, and Douglas McGreaham, 21; a junfor-honors student from Caspian, both residents of the 600-student dormitory housing men and women students on the North Campus.

McGreaham, a resident adviser in another part of the dormitory, had rushed to the sixth-floor unit housing 50- male students when he heard the fire alarm go off. Siwik lived in the unit.

sgt. Harold Tinsey of the Ann Arbor police department said Siwik and McGreaham were shot in the sixth floor corridor during a general evacuation of the seven-story dormi-

McGreaham died at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital.

The shooting occurred during the final week of classes at UM, Spring term examinations begin next week. # Bodies of 15 miners recovered from Colorado coal mine

REDSTONE, Colo. (UPI) — The bodies of 15 miners killed in an explosion deep inside a gassy Colorado coal mine were recovered Friday.

An investigation was begun immediately to find out why they died.

Rescue teams wearing special breathing masks picked their way through piles of rubble in the mino tunnel to find-nine of the bodies about 32 hours after a pocket of methane exploded Wednesday.

Five more bodies were found about three hours later, and the last victim was discovered at 6:30 a.m. MST—nore than 38 hours after the accident.

The bodies were taken by pickup truck to Glenwood Springs, 30 miles north of the Dutch Creek No. 1 Mine-owned by Mid-Contineat Resources Corp.

The victims were found about 7,200 feet inside the

sloping mine tunnel, which was described by one mine inspector as one of the gassiest mines in the nation. The explosion apparently was caused by a pocket of methane gas, a volatile hydrocarbon associated with cometing could have been done to prevent the explosion. The same mine was the scene of another explosion in 1965 which claimed nine ilves.

After that accident, the state's chief mine inspector at the time said the Church Creek No. 1 Mine was the state gassiest in the nation:

"The investigation, especially with the loss of life, will be from top to bottom," and federal whine Safety and Health Administration spokesman Rick Kulczewski.

Kulczewski said it was too early to tell if something

could have been done to prevent the explosion.

Members of the victims' families met Friday and decided to hold a joint memorial service Sunday at Glenwood Springs High School. Pitkin County Coroner Don Davis, who is considering an inquest into the accident, sald the victims would be buried separately next week.

In memory of the 15 dead miners, Lt. Gov. Nancy Dick, acting in the absence of Gov. Richard Lamm, proclaimed Tuesday a statewide day of mourning.

It had been a long vigit for the families, who huddled by a fire built in a rusty steel drum on the road to the mine. They held out hope that the 'men were alive until the bodies were found.

men each, were delayed in getting to the victims because

The mine had large fans on the outside of the unnel
which were used to pull the methane gas out of the mine
and bring in fresh air. A pocket of methane, possibly
ignited by a spark from high-voltage equipment in the
mine, was blamed for the explosion.

"From the size of the explosion, the feeling is that theylitt some kind of pocket (of methane," said Dog
Bowman, mine environmental control officer. "I'd say it
happened in an instant."

Federal health officials warn volcanos can be hazardous to your health ATLANTA (UPI) — Reawakening of the ash-spewing Mount St. Helens volcano in Washington poses a major public health hazard for the western United States, federal health of-ficials said Friday. The national centers for Disease Control warned that local planning is now, necessary not only for

Control warned that local planning is now necessary not only for future activity of Mount St. Helens but also for at least it other volcances strung out from north washington to northern California in the Cascade Raine.

Around-the-clock monitoring of the volcano's activity is being undertaken by the U.S. Geological Survey Center in Vancouver.

The CDC said public health haz The CDC said public health haz-ards caused by ash falls include increases in ashma and orothchitis cases, already documented after each of the Mount St. Helens erup-tions last year, and the possibility of workers in certain occupations contracting-sillocies. a hunt dison workers in certain occupations contracting-silicosis, -a-lung-dis ease caused by sand-like particles found in the volcanic ash.

Dr. Peter Baxter of the CDC's Center for Edvardimental Health said the possibility of a future gigantic Mount St. Helens eruption could not be ruled out.

He noted 60 people died when, after days of ominous rumblings, Mount St. Heiens came alive May 18, 1980, after being dormant since 1856, throwing ash over four states, and sending a river of lawa and mud down the mountainside.

Another big eruption, he said, could spew as much as a foot of volcanic ash on populated areas to miles away, turning day into night and causing massive power blackouts.

The first volcanic blast of Mount
St. Helens flung ash over
Washington, Idaho, Montana and
north Oregon.



WASHINGTON (UP1) — The growing personal income of Americans is not keeping up with rising prices, the Commerce Department reported Friday, and so Americans appear to be cutting back sharply on gasaline purchases.

## Church leaders protest Salvador policy

WASHINGTON (UPI) — For the first time since the Victnam War, the leadership of the nation's Protestant churches took to the streets to protest U.S. foreign policy — this time in a Good Friday vigil over El Salvador.

In a "way of suffering" prayer vigil and protest, leaders of 12 denominations and the National Council of Churches urged an end to U.S. military aid to El Salvador and the "continuing crucifixion" of the Salvadoran people.

The "way of suffering" re-enacts
Jesus' last hours and his journey to
Golgatha-where he was crueffied on Golgatha: wh Good Friday.

"We make these prayers and peli-tions on behalf of the people of El Salvador who are new under the cross," the Protestant leaders said. Salvador will readers said.



The manager of the building of World War II vintage, said it catered to the elderly: Residents said many of the 180 units were vacant. The average age of tenants was between 55 and 60, the manager said.

Officers speculated the dense nature of the smoke may have been caused by a recently installed lobby carpet made of petroleum-based fibers.

## Soviets scuttle peace force

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Administration officials said Friday the Soviet Union has informed the United States that it would veto a proposal to send a United Nations force to end the fighting in northern Lebanon.

The Soviet warning effectively kills the idea for the force, which Secretary of State Alexander Haig endorsed last week when he met in Paris with French foreign minister Jean Francois-Poncet.

The French made the proposal after two weeks of heavy fighting between Christian militia forces and the Syrian Arab Deterriest Force in Belrut and the city of Zahle, 31 miles east of Rejut

The U.S. officials said the Soviet rejection of a U.N. force is a setback but that diplomatic efforts, also involving the Saudis, continue and hope remains that the fighting will not develop into a major regional conflict or in the dismemberment of Lebanon.


U.S. and diplomate sources said Haig exerted pressure on the israelis to call off what they describe as a large-scale military incursion to re-scue the Christian population. The



The scan is recorded on videotape and may be played back by the patient's physician, who can slow-lit down or stop it to examine potential trouble spots. The new machine replaces a three-year-old cardiogram machine which produced one-dimensional images, recorded on paper. TWIN FALLS — By using the principle of the echo, Magic Valley doctors are peering jnto the living heart.

A new machine at Magic Valley Memorial Hospital in Twin Falls allows doctors—and their patients—to watch the heart as it beats within the body.

An "echocardiogram" machine uses ultrasonic waves to project a two-dimensional image of a cross-section of the heart on a small video screen.

The slightly blurry image shows the dark patches of the heart's major arteries and the opening and closing of the valves; the movements bear a strange resemblance to the regular fluctuations of a sea anemone.

tions of a sea anemone.

By measuring the thickness of the heart walls and checking the pulsations of the valves and arteries, doctors may detect blood clots and tumors or diagnose heart disease.

The portable machine, acquired in January by the hospital, represents "the stafe of the art" in cardiac technology, said Dr. James Emery, medical director of the hospital's cardiplogy department.

Réspiratory-Care Services, a Mississippi-based organization, provided the \$50,000 machine under its contract for respiratory care with MYMH. Hospital officials say the machine is the only one of its kind between Boise and Sait Lake City.

The echocardiogram uses no radiation, no X-rays and no chemicals to produce the image. Rather it uses the same principle as radar. High frequency sound waves — hose with more than 20,000 cycles per second — are projected towards the heart through a "transducer," a device pressed against the patient's chest.

The waves bourge off the heart's surface and the state of the patient of

patient's chest.

The waves bounce off the heart's surface and are picked up by
the transducer. The machine distinguishes minute variations on
the heart's surface and projects an image of a cross-section of
the organ on a video screen.

By tilting the transducer to "film" other cross-sections, the
entire heart is examined.

Yet, an echoeardiogram scan is "non-invasive," that is, nothing is actually inserted into the body. Nor can the patient hear or feel the sound waves, although the pressure of the transducer sometimes creates a slight soreness.

The machine has been safely used on a pregnant woman to record the beating of her unborn infant's heart.

Scanning takes about a half hour to complete by a technician.

Emery expresses unreserved enthusiasm for the machine, aying, "It opened up more information I just didn't have with

The service's immigration "raids" are "free-wheeling, open-ended searches in which large numbers of people are interrogated to ferret out the few who may be undocumented," the committee said.

Bernadine E. Ricker, Fort Hall,

chairman of the advisory committee, said INS. Interrogated people "on-the-basis of their chinic appearance, in-truding on the security and privacy of many American elizens and tegal residents."

The committee also complained the right to an attorney is not granted by the INS to migrant workers during all. "crucial" is alges during the deportation-process.—The panel said-legal-counse! was necessary to prevent people from being intimidated, maxing incriminating remarks or leaving the country without a hearing.

In addition, the panel arged the federal government to simplify the process by which-loans are granted for renovation and-construction of farmworker housing and to inspect

migrant labor camps every year.
Federal agencies also were urged toearmark more money for development-of-migrant-housing and-topublish in English and Spanish and
distribute summaries of federal regulations that apply to migrant housing.
The committee also urged creation
of-a-task-force-to-plan-efforts-toimprove living conditions in farm
camps and urged the government to
help Spanish-speaking farmworkers
file complaints about housing violations.

"Undocumented workers are forced to tolerate housing totally unsuitable for human habitation." Ms. Ricker said. "Because of their illegal status, undocumented workers are easily victimized and dare not complain."

## Boise motel protests room tax

BOISE (IIPI) — A conflict between the Greater Boise Auditorium District and a Boise motel about the constitutionality of a local hotel motel room tax goes beyond the contesting parties and is of "major" importance statewide; a deputy attorney general

said.

In a brief filed at 4th District Court this week, state
Tax-Commission attorney Ted Spangler said any
resolution of the case "will affect tax policies and
intergovernmental relations of major importance
throughout the state,"

The auditorium district filed suit against the Royal
Inn last October, alleging that for the previous five
months the motel had refused to pay district hotel-

motel rooms taxes.
In 1979, the district imposed a 2 percent room sales tax for occupancy of up to seven days on all hotels and

motels within its jurisdiction.

In its respose to the sult, Royal Inn asked the court—to-declare—the tax unconstitutional. The room-taxing—authority was granted to local governments by the Idaho Legislature, but the inn claimed the state Constitution prohibited giving local governments power to levy taxes other than property taxes. Spangler, siding with the auditorium district, said in his brief that the hotel's interpretation of the Constitution was Tawed.

"Because many critical local government functions rely upon property-tax revenues, consideration of alternative revenue sources will be increasingly important," Spangler said. "Clear dofinition of the constitutional fimils within which alternative revenue sources may be provided by statutory enactments is a matter of major significance."

In 1980, the hospital had 6,665-pa-tient-days, compared to 6,191 in 1979. (A patient day is 24 hours spent by a person at the hospital.) Its occupancy rates have declined from a high of 71.9 percent in 1978. That year, the hospi-tal generated an operating income of \$92,221.

Richardon noted the hospital lost two doctors in 1978, and only galned one in -January - 1881; which may account for decreasing utilization.

Policy and ad-ministrative discounts (those set by board directive) increased from about \$1,500 to \$6,700.

Overall, the hospital saw an \$18,700 decrease in these deductions from revenues, from \$306,800 of \$488,071.

But uncollectable accounts came to about 14.5 percent of total revenues, which is higher than the national average of 10.5 percent, Swenson said.

Because hospitals are traditionally "labor latensive" industries, much of their expenses are incurred in wages, salaries and employee benefits, Swenson said. About \$50 percent of the bospitals' so verall expenses are for

their expenses and employee benefits, Swenson said. About 63 percent of the hospital's overall expenses are for personnel expenses, up 20 percent from 1979 to 1980. Overall, expenses increased 17.4 percent.

The largest losses in revenues were incurred in routine care areas, not musual for hospitals, Swenson said.

## Mormon Church grows in England during poor economic conditions

As in the United States, members donate one-tenth of their pre-tax income to the church, and endeavor to stash away a year's supply of food and essentials to tide them over emergencies.

The church has bought one 305-acre and plans to buy more to supply food to Mormons in need and Jobs to moumployed—church—mombers—A ratiler-truck leaves the church's warehouse at Birmingham once every two-weeks with Jood and-necessities—for church welfare programs.

The church encourages members to turn down state welfare benefits.

"Our emphasis is on self-sufficency," said Grant: "We-worry-about the demoralizing effect of going

father of the church's current presi-dent-Spencer-W-Kimball-The second-president, Brigham Young, arrived here in 1840 to serve two years as a missionary.



Individually, their salaries are not unusually high; Greg makes \$28,000 a. year as an accountant for a small computer company. Linda recently returned to work after a seven-year-piatus and found a job in her former specialty of copywriting paying \$18,000 a year.

Their combined pay of \$46,000 puts them in a tax bracket just under 50 percent (half to the IRS). Greg resents the "new" feeling: "the tax angle makes me wonder whether I should strive for a higher-paying too." The says. "And Linda wonders too." "It's not that simple when we real-

our business. People are less and less enthusiastic about high salaries that just seem to melt away at tax time."

A Solution: Negotiating compensa-on packages with employers that naximize after tax income via fringe

As an illustration, when Greg goes As an illustration, when Greg goes for an interview involving a new job offering a salary of \$35,000, he could save himself and the new company money. He can do this by negotiating realistically with the prospective employer and basing his salary expectations on his family's current needs.

Since right now Greg and Linda are not. In need of a dramatic salary increase. Greg might propose a \$22,000 -income supplemented by a company car and a credit card covering cost of gas, oil and maintenance. Greg's reasoning might go like this:
"It have a new car every five years.

years from now it'll be next to worthless. So I'm paying \$2,000 a year forthe car, plus at least \$1,000 more for

ahead at tax time."

This reasoning could apply to a whole spectrum of employee benefits and perquisites widely available to day. There are the familiar benefits: pensions, medical and dental insurance, educational benefits. And there are the less commonplace: travel to conventious and sales meetings, stock options, financial planning assistance, profit sharing, deferred income plans, many others.

#### AMC reports loss of \$52.7 million

SOUTHFIELD, Mich. (UPI) — American Motors Corp. Friday reported a net loss of \$52.7 million for the first quarter of 1981, compared with net earnings of \$1.3 million for the same period last

Net sales for the quarter ended March 31 were \$598 million, down om \$789 million in the first quarter of 1980, AMC said.

AMC said combined worldwide automobile and Jeep vehicle wholesale sales in the first quarter were 71,277 units, compared with 103,703 units for the 1980 quarter.

"The auto recession has proved to be deeper and tonger-lasting than anyone anticipated and American Motors has been affected along with the rest of the industry," Gerald C. Meyers, AMC chairman and chief executive officer said.

"Nonchless, we are carrying on with all of our planned product programs to assure our future health." Meyers said. "In the meantline, we have implemented stringent economy measures, cut our salarled work force by more than 12 percent and eliminated all-but necessary outlays."

#### Transamerica earnings edge higher

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI).— Transamerica: Corp., the enter-tainment and financial services combine, earned 88 cents a share in the first quarter up from 87 cents a year ago even though net operating income was down by \$5.7 million.

Gains on foreign currency translations and investments trans-actions offset the shrinkage in operating net. Sales rose to 51.995 billion from 31.075 billion a year earlier. Net income was \$57.52 million against \$57.65 million.

The major revenue gains were in life and property insurance and consumer lending. Entertainment income was down a little and travel service business up marginally.

The Occidental Life Insurance subsidiary had a record first quarter.

#### Southern Pacific profits show leap

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Chairman Benjamin F. Biaggini of Southern Pacific Co., said that the railroad combine's first quarter profit spurted to 85 cents a share from 33 cents in the recession-struck 1980 first quarter.

Biaggini, said the economy is showing definite and encouraging signs of recovery. He said the railroad was benefitting from its new freedom to meet competition and adjust to rising costs.

Southern Pacific earned \$22.85 million on revenues of \$778.3 million in the quarter, up from \$8.93 million a year ago on revenues of \$678.64 million.

In addition to gains all major classes of rail traffic, the company's other subsidiaries had operating income of \$20 million in the quarter as against only \$6.6 million a year earlier.
