Inflation protection target of budget cutters' remarks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two leaders in President Reagan's battle to curb federal spending Sunday took aim at the inflation protection built into the nation's social welfare system, declaring the safeguards are too generous.

In defining the targets for savings in the 1983 and 1984 budgets, both Treasury Secretary Donald Regan and Senate Budget Committee Chairman Pete Domenici admitted a tough battle lies ahead on Capitol Hill in the drive to rein back the so-called entitlement programs.

In separate television interviews, both men said reforming the automatic increases in welfare payments — including pensions and medical care for the poor and elderly — is a key avenue for pursuit of a balanced budget.

Domenici, R-N.M., said the deficit for fiscal 1982 will be between \$60 billion and \$80 billion, but he expects Reagan's 1983 budget will "dramatically cut deficits."

"We have to cut back on growth," he said on CBS' "Face the Nation."

Domenici outlined "three outlay controls" he expects to be pursued — limits on the cost-of-living increases for entitlement programs; caps on the growth of federal assistance to the states; and curbing the expansion of

military spending to a "real" expansion of 5 percent annually.

Regan, on ABC's "This Week," said, "We have to look at Medicaid, we have to look at pensions, we have to look at the cost of living indexes and what has been going on."

"For example, this year, those who are under cost of living adjustments because of inflation, who are dependent upon the federal government for some type of payment, will receive over 11 percent."

"We know inflation isn't going to be 11 percent this year, so they are being overly compensated. . . . Something is wrong there. . . . I think that it's in change of that nature that we'll be looking in the '83 and '84 budgets."

"Obviously we're going to have a fight with Congress on this," the Treasury chief said.

Although Domenici listed Social Security among the areas that must be reviewed, Regan specifically excluded the old age program, saying it should be left alone pending a report from a special study commission that has not yet been set up.

Domenici said he expects Reagan's next budget — due for delivery to Congress in January — "to set . . . this country on a path that dramatically cuts deficits in '83 and '84."

"The entitlement programs of this

country — all of the pension programs, Medicare, Medicaid, ADFC, and all of those that automatically spend out and in addition have automatic kickers each year. . . . I believe they are going to have to be reformed and their growth is going to have to be curtailed," the senator said.

He said that a 25 percent curtailment in the growth of all entitlement programs would save about \$10 billion in 1983 and 1984.

Regan also pifer some economic estimates for next year, when all of the seats in the House and one-third of the Senate will be up for grabs.

By spring, he said, the "economy will start to pull out of this recession."

He said that by next fall unemployment — a critical factor in an election year — "will be somewhere around 7 1/2% to the 8 1/2% (percent) range."

Reminded that a full percentage point range represents millions of Americans out of work, Regan said: "Well, you know, we're very upset by this. We're very sorry about all this unemployment. It's not something that we're trying to accomplish or that we're trying to bring about — unemployment to solve the problem high interest rates."

MX, B-1 face final hurdle in Senate weapons debate

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Reagan's most controversial weapons requests — the MX-missile and B-1 bomber — face their final congressional hurdle this week when the Senate acts on the most expensive weapons program in U.S. history.

Both systems, with a combined cost of \$4.41 billion, are expected to survive efforts to trim the \$28.5 billion defense — appropriations bill during Senate debate. The Senate version is \$7.6 billion more than Reagan asked, and \$11.9 billion higher than the House version, approved Nov. 13.

"The committee supports the need for increased defense spending to meet the threats to U.S. national security interests in the 1980s," said the Senate Appropriations Committee in its report on the measure.

"The major increase in Soviet defense spending throughout the 1970s

as well as Soviet adventurism in Africa, Asia and Latin America pose a serious threat to U.S. security interests throughout the world," it said.

The Senate bill proposes spending \$2.4 billion for the B-1 bomber and \$2.01 billion for the MX missile, a combined total \$110 million more than passed by the House.

Democratic Sen. Ernest Hollings of South Carolina and Carl Levin of Michigan have announced they will propose eliminating the B-1 funds and re-allocating some of the money to other weapons programs.

Opposition to basing the MX missile in existing fixed silos rather than in a multiple deceptive shelter was softened after the administration notified Congress in mid-November it is still considering some kind of mobile basing mode.

Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska,

chairman of the defense appropriations subcommittee, has said most of the extra money in the Senate bill is to cover anticipated inflation and cost overruns on major weapons programs.

The committee report "strongly suggested" that Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger designate the U.S. Marine Corps as the lead service for cover and planning of Rapid Deployment Force missions.

It also said the mission of that force, created mainly for fast action in an emergency in the Persian Gulf region, should be expanded to include other parts of the world. The committee specifically mentioned the Caribbean.

The Senate appropriations bill includes \$13.2 billion for military personnel, \$14.9 billion for retired military personnel, and more than \$63.4 billion for operations.

Convention on genocide due hearing

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. William Proxmire senses he may near victory in a 15-year struggle to get the United States to join an international covenant outlawing genocide — a document guaranteeing "the right to live."

The Wisconsin Democrat has opened nearly every Senate session since early 1967 with an emotional plea urging ratification of the 1948 U.N. Genocide Convention.

After nearly 2,500 appeals, Proxmire now has a chance to turn his crusade into reality.

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee this week will begin ratification hearings for the convention, which was unanimously approved by the General Assembly and so far has been ratified by 81 nations.

The Soviet Union and most of its Warsaw Pact allies have ratified it. Most of America's NATO partners have done likewise. But not the United States, even though it was submitted to the Senate by President Truman 32 years ago.

"I would like to say that at long last here may be light at the end of the tunnel," Proxmire said last week when he was told of the hearings, which open Wednesday. Proxmire is scheduled to be the leadoff witness.

"This is very, very good news," said Proxmire, 66, who has served in the Senate for 24 years and who believes the Genocide Convention "is a moral document . . . a call for a higher standard of human conduct."

The convention was the first major post-World War II international human rights agreement approved by the United Nations and came as shocked world reacted to the systematic extermination of ethnic groups — most notably Jews — by Adolf Hitler's Nazi regime.

New efforts by senator

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Harrison Williams, fighting to keep his Senate job despite his Abscam conviction, is ready to launch a new effort to win a full Senate hearing before his colleagues vote this week on expelling him, a spokesman said Sunday.

Walter Gold, Williams' press secretary, said a resolution calling for such a hearing is "scheduled" to be introduced before the Senate early this week by a senator "to guarantee Williams' constitutional rights."

Williams also is seeking postponement of the expulsion vote, now scheduled for Dec. 3. As things now stand, the Senate will vote based on the evidence presented to its Ethics Committee — basically the materials used to convict Williams in federal court.

Former Navy man Nance top adviser

International strategy familiar

WASHINGTON (UPI) — James W. "Bud" Nance, the retired Navy admiral and former test pilot named Sunday to take over temporarily as President Reagan's national security adviser, has long experience as a international strategist.

The 60-year-old Nance has been serving as the No. 2 member of the national security team and stepped into the front role when Richard Allen announced he was taking administrative leave in order to publicly air the controversy over a payment he received from Japanese journalists.

Nance graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1944 and reached flag rank — rear admiral — in 1970.

During his 35-year career, he served as a naval aviator, including being a jet test pilot, and was com-

mander of the aircraft carrier U.S.S. Forrestal from 1968-70.

Nance began his career in planning and strategy in January 1970 under the Joint Chiefs of Staff, when he was named deputy director of the National Military Command Center and also chief of the Studies Analysis and Gaming Agency.

From 1972 to 1975 he served in various high positions in Europe. His last Navy duty was as assistant vice chief of naval operations at the Pentagon.

Nance retired from the Navy in 1979 and served as a policy adviser to Republican senators and also as a special consultant to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee during its deliberations on the SALT II treaty.

Aging session opens amid walkout threats

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The White House Conference on Aging opened Sunday, and its top official urged dissident delegates not to walk out over charges the administration tried to stack the meeting on policies affecting more than 25 million Americans.

Health and Human Services Secretary Richard Schweiker, defending the rules he wrote, said he wants sessions of the conference's 14 committees to be "the most free-wheeling and wide-ranging possible."

Schweiker told a news conference he met with the conference's advisory board Sunday and urged all delegates — including senior citizen leaders who have threatened a walkout — to "try it for a couple of days."

"I asked that before any rash actions were taken in terms of either walkouts or in terms of any kind of dissident note, that they really give it a try for a couple of days," he said.

Schweiker said he expects the con-

ference to discuss a wide range of issues, "including embarrassing ones" for the Reagan administration. But he said, "This is not a pro-Reagan conference. It is not an anti-Reagan conference."

Schweiker said he expects proposals coming out of the conference may include a ban on mandatory retirement and recommendations for catastrophic insurance.

Following a buffet Sunday night, the conference will hear speeches today by Schweiker, Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., chairman of the House Select Committee on Aging, and Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa., chairman of the Senate Special Committee on Aging.

Some senior citizen leaders, already angry over attempts by the Reagan administration to cut Social Security benefits, threatened a walkout if the administration tries to produce a "rubber stamp" for its policies.

Trooper cutbacks: causes and cures

—Thinning the ranks of the Idaho State Police means less law enforcement and less effective law enforcement.

For the criminal element in the state, announced trooper cutbacks could hardly have been better news. For law-abiding citizens, it is an ominous development.

And it could get worse in 1982 if the Legislature doesn't come up with \$566,000 in supplemental funding sought in January by the Department of Law Enforcement (DLE).

The department has laid off 17 persons to date, seven of which were state troopers. Two men were let go in the ISP's fourth district, which encompasses the Magic Valley.

Lagging auto sales are blamed, since the state police force is funded from new car licenses, registration and title fees. But John Andreason, director of the Legislative Fiscal Office, also blames DLE finance errors for contributing \$300,000 to the department's \$1.1 million carryover debt. He charges those mistakes occurred in 1977 and 1979, uncovered by the 1980 audit.

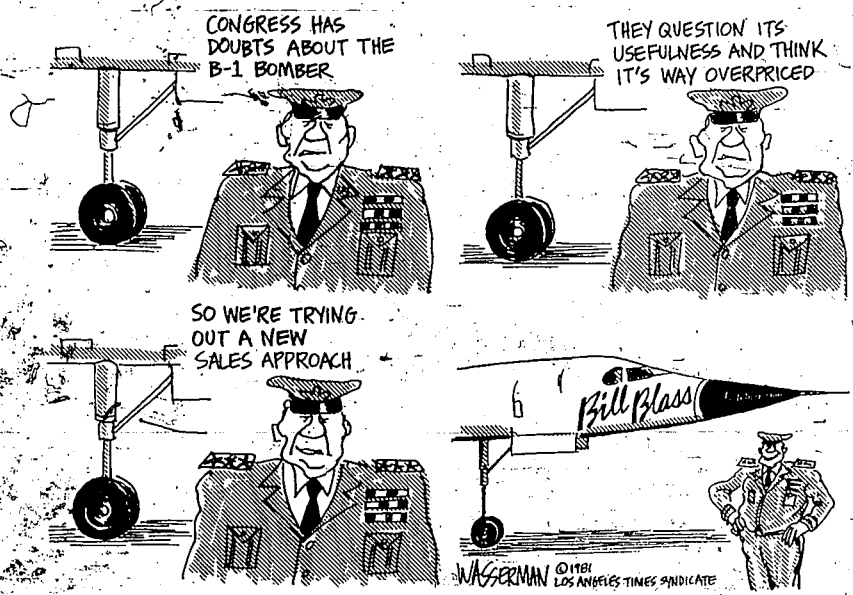
There are two points to be made. One is that NO department of the state should be allowed to carry over debts from one fiscal year to another. The DLE should operate on a balanced budget.

More importantly, the system of funding the department has got to be changed. It is precarious and foolish to fund law enforcement based on auto sales receipts. The department's allocation should come from the general fund.

Gov. John Evans is expected to propose a funding change in his 1982 budget recommendations. He also is expected to present a supplemental funds request that he says should balance the department's budget.

But how this plan will fare with the Legislature is uncertain. State agencies have made supplemental requests totaling \$3.2 million. There may be only half that amount to be distributed.

In the short run it does not look good for the Idaho State Police. The DLE may get enough funds to prevent further layoffs, but by then the system will have been considerably weakened.

Why Allen ought to be fired

WASHINGTON — At this writing the flap over National Security Adviser Richard V. Allen appears to be subsiding, though the Justice Department may yet revive the matter by recommending that a special prosecutor be retained.

In the meantime, a few sharp things need to be said — not to the chastened Mr. Allen, but to persons in high office everywhere.

Public office is a public trust, and those who accept public office ought never to forget that political truth. At the level of the White House, the first obligation of a public servant — an obligation that transcends even the obligation to render good service — is never to embarrass one's president. In this regard Mr. Allen blundered. He blundered indefensibly, and he ought to be fired out of hand.

The facts of the matter are reasonably clear. Prior to assuming his highly public and responsible post last January, Mr. Allen had been in the international consulting business. Among his close friends and good clients was a Japanese colleague, Tamotsu Takase. At the time the Reagan administration was coming into office, a women's magazine in Tokyo, Shufu no Tomo ("Women's Companion"), wanted an interview with Nancy Reagan. Wheels turned. Mr. Takase's wife Chizuko got in touch with Mr. Allen. Could he help? He could. The day before the inauguration Mr. Allen welcomed free-lance writer Fuyuko Kamisaka at Blair House, introduced her to the president, and used his influence to get the interview lined up. Mrs. Reagan spent 10 minutes with the writer on Jan. 21. That same day the visiting journalists handed Mr. Allen an envelope containing 10 \$100 bills. Such a gratuity in Japan is known as "thank-you money" and is frequently paid either to the individual interviewed or to the person who arranges the interview.

Mr. Allen received the money and instructed his secretary to put it in a safe. His intention was eventually to turn it over to the proper authorities, but in the rush of post-inaugural activity he forgot about it. In September the cash was discovered. Presidential counselor Ed Meese called in the FBI. The story broke on Nov. 14, and Mr. Allen has been in hot water ever since.

God knows he deserves it. Dick Allen is no dummy. He is a brilliant fellow who has been moving in top political circles for years. It is almost incredible that he did not instantly recognize a potential time bomb when it was thrust in his hands. Alarm bells should have gone off in his skull. Clang, clang, clang! Could he have forgotten how this thousand-dollar thank-you might be perceived? That envelope was the kind of object for which an 11-foot pole is kept in the office; it is to handle things you would not touch with a 10-foot

pole. Mr. Allen's lame excuse for not instantly returning the cash is that he "did not want to embarrass the Japanese." It is the lamest excuse I ever heard. Embarrass his dear friend Chizuko Takase? What kind of dear friend could have failed to recognize the gross impropriety of this little honorarium?

This was not a matter of bribery. Let us reject that notion out of hand. But it was most certainly an act of wretched judgment on the part of a man whose judgment is of critical importance. It was a failure of perception, a failure to conceive the possible consequences of an innocent event. National security advisers ought to be made of sharper wits.

Nancy Reagan, to her lasting credit, knew what to do. The Japanese ladies sent her a \$75 stationery box as a thank-you gift. Mrs. Reagan did not wait 10 months or 10 days or 10 minutes. She instantly shipped the box to the White House archives. How could Mr. Allen have failed to do the same thing?

Unlike the lean and hungry Cassius, Dick Allen did not think too much. His problem was that he didn't think enough. In times past the same problem has afflicted such presidential pilot fish as Harry Vaughan, Sherman Adams and Hamilton Jordan. Caesar's maxim equally applies to thoughtless fellows: Such men are dangerous. The rule for White House aides is cast in stone: Be circumspect, gentlemen, or be gone.

Bradford for humanities post? Read his writings

WASHINGTON — The rare occasions when Republicans wrestle with intellectual matters make one wish the occasions were even rarer.

Consider the current process of selecting a new head for the National Endowment for the Humanities. Some Republicans have promoted the candidacy of a professor who believes that the first Republican President was unbalanced, evil and a national disaster. This has provoked those, like me, who revere Lincoln and still smolder with indignation about the Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854.

Mr. Bradford of the University of Dallas supported George Wallace's 1972 presidential campaign and represents the Nostalgic Confederate remnant in the conservative movement. He has been endorsed by 16 senators, some of whom, I suspect, have not curled up at night with his writings. Anyone who reads them can imagine the entertaining inquiries that would ensue in any confirmation hearings, were Bradford nominated.

Professor Bradford, elaborate on what you call "Lincoln's lasting and terrible impact on the nation's destiny."

Professor Bradford, leaving aside your denunciations

of Lincoln's "Cromwellian" and "Bonapartist" attributes, his "paranoid style" and "antinomian morality," his establishment of a "Northern Gulag" and his other "high crimes," could you explain your opinion that a "useful analogue" to Lincoln is Hitler?

"Professor Bradford, the Senate would be fascinated to hear more about your idea that 'there is a great question in philosophy as to the ethical propriety of one man's having property in another. It is equivalent to the question of whether monarchy and democracy are valid systems in politics.'"

"Professor Bradford, when you say that 'like any human institution, the Southern social system was as good or bad as the people who administered its regimen,' are you not saying that the regime of slavery was good when administered by 'good' slave-drivers?"

"Golly, Professor Bradford, do tell more about how 'an expansive view of "natural rights" with regard to Negroes has undermined our inherited constitutional system.'"

Oh, my. Senators might not even have time to dwell on Bradford's volunteered preview of his NEH administrative policies: "I'd give more (grants) to Texas and Oklahoma. . . . The nomination of Bradford would

be a Christmas present to the Democratic Party, and evidence of Republican philistinism — indifference toward the Republican past and today's culture.

Although Bradford's argument is couched in strident and opaque language (I do not know what he means by Lincoln's "gnosticism," but he is not conferring a compliment), he is no philistine. His argument involves less of a misunderstanding of what Lincoln did than a profoundly mistaken moral judgment about what Lincoln did.

Bradford says Lincoln replaced America's "positive pluralism" with a "uniformitarian" doctrine, turning his "private morality" regarding slavery into law. What Lincoln actually did was insist that there are closed questions even in an open society.

The great crisis of American history was defined in a statement by a senatorial candidate in the Middle West in 1838: "We of Illinois . . . tried slavery, kept it up for 12 years and, finding that it was not profitable, we abolished it for that reason." With three words — "for that reason!"

Stephen Douglas defined slavery as a question of price, not principle. This was the logic of the Kansas-Nebraska Act, which repealed the Missouri Compromise by permitting the people of Kansas and Nebraska territories to vote slavery in or out.

To the South then (and, I gather, Bradford today) the issue was whether the federal government could constitutionally legislate morality regarding conduct (such as slavery) that was, in Bradford's words, "not covered by the original federal covenant," the Constitution. Lincoln became the greatest statesman in the history of democracy because he drew a line in the dust, limiting popular sovereignty. He argued that Douglas and the Kansas-Nebraska Act, by expressing moral "indifference" (Lincoln's word) about slavery, were teaching and enshrining the proposition that "there is no right principle of action but self-interest."

Today, as then — as always — the central problem of American life is that a nation dedicated to that proposition can not endure. The greatest test of leadership always is the task of getting people to listen to what Lincoln called "the better angels of our nature," and thereby rise above self-interestness to public spiritedness.

As the 16th Republican President tries to do that, it is unseemly for some people in his party to advocate a conspicuous position for a shrill desecrifier of the first Republican President. Political desecrifiers can contribute to the public stock of harmless pleasure, but it is not harmless for a great political party to mock its noble past.

First shipment due at White House in mid-December

China factory working hard on huge order

TRENTON, N.J. (UPI) — With a little luck several thousands of pieces of colored china will arrive at the White House by mid-December.

The shipment is part of the 4,732-piece set of Lenox china ordered by First Lady Nancy Reagan — a \$269,000 purchase which has evoked criticism of the Reagans for the expenditure.

President Ronald Reagan brides when the china is mentioned along with his budget cuts affecting the poor. At one time he publicly said his wife was getting "a bum rap" about the purchase.

Reagan said Lenox is making the 19-piece place settings at cost and the china is being

paid for by the Knapp Foundation, a private donor.

In Pomona, N.J., the 1,400 factory workers at the Lenox plant are "working fast and furiously," on the service for 220, in ivory and banded in red and gold, said Beverly Mills, Lenox sales promotion manager. Red is the first lady's favorite color.

"75 to 80 percent less than half will be done in time for Christmas," said Ms. Mills. "There will be enough place settings to entertain."

But the White House has not yet announced plans for the unveiling. In announcing the new White House china, before the rush of bad publicity, Mrs. Reagan had said she wanted to have the Lenox dinner

service in time for Christmas.

Sheila Tate, Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, said no date has been set for the arrival, but it is expected by mid-December.

"The White House has not decided whether it will release the new pattern at a small press conference, where reporters could come and look at it, or at a dinner party," Ms. Mills said.

If there is a Christmas party, Lenox does not know who will be invited, she added.

"We have not been told who would be the first to eat off it."

Lenox expected to know by early December when the delivery would be ready and would then be notifying the White House.

"At this point, the whole factory is working on different parts of the service. We've also had to make some adjustments on the pattern," Ms. Mills said.

Lenox designed White House china for Woodrow Wilson in 1918; for Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1934 and for Harry Truman in 1951.

The 19 pieces in the \$1,000-per-place setting service for the Reagans includes, a service plate, dinner plate, fish plate, salad plate, soup plate, dessert plate, fingerbowl plate, butter plate, teacup and saucer, demitasse cup and saucer, bouillon bowl, cream soup cup and stand, cocktail cup, berry bowl, cereal bowl and ramekin.

Kissinger's Latin tour fees add up

SANTIAGO, Chile (UPI) — Racing through Chile's capital in a black limousine escorted by five swarming police motorcycles and eight security cars, former U.S. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger looked more like a visiting head of state than a university professor.

Booted in Brazil, protected by tight security in Peru, and cheered by businessmen in Chile, the former diplomat proved he is probably the most paid lecturer in Latin America, where he charges \$15,000 per appearance.

Businessmen and diplomatic sources estimate Kissinger's two week-long South American speaking tour earned him nearly \$15,000 in lecture and appearance fees — a handsome sum for a man who has not held public office since 1976.

In Brazil, Peru, Chile and Argentina, Kissinger was given diplomatic style welcomes and held hour-long talks with the presidents of those nations. In most cases he was the guest of honor at lavish cocktail parties thrown by the governments.

President feels press has given him fair shake

WASHINGTON (UPI) — After 11 months in office, President Reagan, troubled by a falling economy and controversies surrounding his own top officials, still feels reporters have treated him fairly, his communications chief said in an interview released Sunday.

But the president also believes reporters have given Mrs. Reagan a "bum rap," said David Gergen, assistant to the president for communications in a U.S. News & World Report interview.

"All in all, we do believe that his treatment by the press has been fair," Gergen said. "In fact, his press relations have turned out better than one might have expected, especially when you consider the attitude toward him held by some on the East Coast a year and a half ago."

Gergen said respect for Reagan has

grown since he took office and the press has gotten to know him better.

"There is no question that he has a masterful touch in dealing with the media and with the public in general," Gergen said.

Gergen also said the press is more balanced now than it was 10 years ago and has become more "disillusioned with the promises of big government of the '60s and more willing to consider the possibility of private enterprise as a solution."

Gergen agreed that Reagan has been perceived as a rich man's president, adding, "I think he believes that Mrs. Reagan, in particular, has gotten a bum rap on the redecoration of the family quarters and the purchase of new White House china. He has been more bothered by criticism of her than by criticism of his own program. But both of them have

been taken to dealing with it in a lighter vein."

Gergen said there has been "a tendency to feast upon personality conflicts as opposed to true matters of substance. Also, it seems to me that there has been a tendency to overdramatize and exaggerate the extent to which the cuts in federal spending are affecting people at the lower end of the income scale."

Reagan "recognizes that recent stories about squabbling or feuding in the administration have been based on conversations with true-life, flesh-and-blood people," Gergen said. "We all need to guard against journalism becoming a form of gossip."

As for leaks by the administration, Gergen said it is a "time-honored tradition in this city, and I am sure we will never see the end of it. I just think that anonymous personal attacks or

loose talk are unhealthy."

He said a news conference with 150 or 200 reporters present, "is not necessarily the best vehicle for presidents to respond to questions regularly."

Special U.S. envoy returns to Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — U.S. Presidential Envoy Philip Habib arrived on his fourth mission to the Middle East Sunday in an attempt to build the shaky four-month Lebanese cease-fire into a lasting peace.

Habib, whose last trip produced a cease-fire that ended fighting between Israel and the Palestinians, carried with him the outline of a plan for Lebanese "national reconciliation," sources close to the talks said.

Lebanese Foreign Ministry officials and U.S. Ambassador Robert Dillon met Habib at the airport

on his arrival from Rome and he was driven away under tight security and a virtual news blackout.

Habib was scheduled to meet today with Lebanese Prime Minister Cheifik Wassan, Parliament Speaker Kamel Assad and Foreign Minister Fuad Bulros, government sources said. President Elias Sarkis is in Switzerland for a medical check-up.

The U.S. plan for "national reconciliation" in Lebanon is believed to center on strengthening the Lebanese government and army as a major step toward restoring order in the strife-torn nation.

Sale of plane parts to Libya under probe

CHICAGO (UPI) — A federal grand jury is trying to determine whether a U.S. firm is illegally selling military plane parts to Libya, an attorney for the company confirmed Sunday.

Tencom Corp., Northbrook, operated by Nedim Sulayk, 28, a Turkish citizen who attended school at the University of Illinois-Chicago Circle campus, is under investigation for allegedly shipping spare parts for American-built C-130 military cargo planes to Libya.

Myles Ambrose, Sulayk's attorney, said his client is cooperating with the investigation. "My client feels he has done nothing

illegal or improper," Ambrose said. "He will cooperate with authorities so that a speedy resolution of all questions can be achieved."

Japan knows Neal's name

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Steven Neal, D-N.C., has started the Japanese by suggesting they step up their defense spending by paying the United States a \$20 billion "security tax."

Neal, not exactly a household word in the United States, is big news in Japan for his resolution recommending that President Reagan work out an agreement for the Japanese to fork over 2 percent of their gross national product.

That, Neal said, would amount to a tidy \$20 billion annually, and help offset some of Uncle Sam's military costs in Asia and the Middle East.

Neal's resolution, introduced in late October, is one of four before Congress that urges the Japanese to increase their military expenditures and play a greater role in their own defense.

Pope holds hope for Geneva talks

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope John Paul II revealed Sunday his weekly personal messages to Presidents Reagan and Leonid Brezhnev expressing hope the Geneva disarmament talks would lift the "specter of a possible nuclear conflict."

Addressing some 30,000 people in St. Peter's Square for his weekly blessing, the pope noted that the United States and the Soviet Union were set to begin talks today on reducing nuclear arms in Europe.

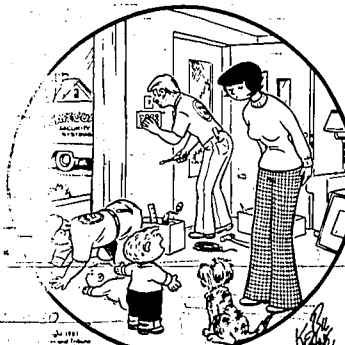

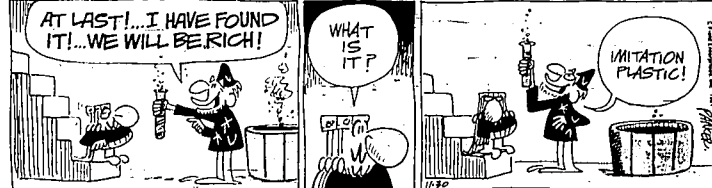

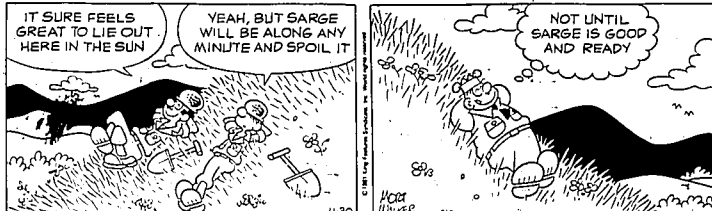

He is romantically interested in me and it is mutual. Why does he behave this way?

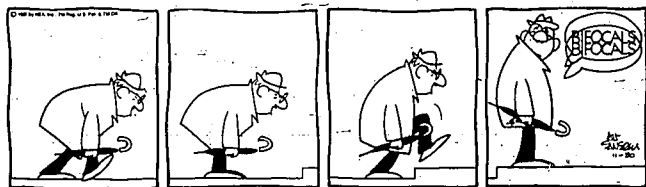

ERA ratification receives push during week

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The National Organization for Women, noting only seven months remain to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment, declared this week "ERA Awareness Week."

Beginning today, ERA supporters were to take to the street corners in major cities to pass out leaflets and wallet-size cards containing the text of the amendment and some NOW chapters planned to place ads in newspapers with the text.

NOW said its goal is to make every American aware of the full text of the ERA by early December.

"All the polls show that the majority of Americans support the Equal Rights Amendment by a 2-to-1 margin," said NOW President Eleanor Smeal, "but when they see the exact words, this support rises to 80 percent."

Evidence of this was shown in an Iowa poll in

October conducted by the Des Moines Register and Tribune Co., according to NOW. The poll discovered 80 percent of the voting age population supported passage of the ERA when they found out the exact words of the statement. NOW said similar polls conducted around the country revealed the same conclusions.

The amendment has been ratified in 35 states, but three more states are needed by June 30.

NEW YORK (UPI) — A teenager sucked into a huge ice crushing machine that severed his leg was reported in satisfactory condition Sunday following 13 hours of surgery to reattach the limb, officials said.

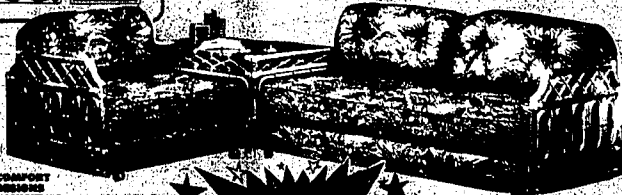
A Bellevue Hospital

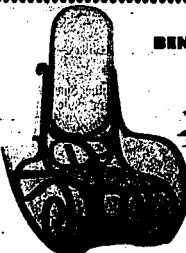

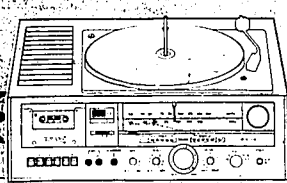
